For twenty years the Greer have held 1, 100 and 1000. It started way back when Nathan Salinas originally made gubernatorial candidates to both parties with the understanding that his candidate, John Greer, got the coveted numbers. Both Salinas and Greer have died, but the tradition continues.

Building to Continue "At a Rapid Rate"

Home building and modernization will continue at a rapid pace in New Mexico for at least the next three years.

That's the forecast of the Gas Appliance Manufacturers Association which recently completed a survey, indicating that a

minimum of 25,000 new houses will be constructed and an additional 10,000 remodeled in the state.

The GAMA estimate is based on studies of anticipated new gas house heating customers through the 1953-56 heating season.

Results of the survey indicate that 10,000 new houses will be equipped with gas this winter.

S. P. Uses "Audigage" Marking Ballot With To Detect Flaws in Rails Check Invalidates Vote

Ultrasonic waves are now at work making Southern Pacific a safer railroad, J. W. Corbett, the railroad's vice president in charge of operations, said.

The Audigage, an electronic "stethoscope" that uses ultrasonic waves to locate hidden flaws in rails, is in operation on SP lines, he said. The instrument checks rails where joint bars or other track fixtures interfere with close inspection by visual or detector-car methods.

Using a simple electronic principle, Audigage directs the waves through metal rails. Its operator "hears" the waves through a set of earphones. When the waves are reflected from a flaw, the sound in his earphones changes pitch. The operator then marks the rail for inspection and replacement before the flaw can grow into a break.

By adding the Audigage's search unit along the rail, an experienced operator can find even small defects inside the rail.

The instrument weighs only eleven pounds. It is carried in a luncheon on the operator's back.

Audigage is another new development of modern science used by Southern Pacific to provide improved, safer rail service, Corbett said.

Santa Fe, Dec. 16—Marking a ballot with one of more check marks makes the entire ballot invalid in New Mexico elections, according to an official opinion issued by the state's attorney general.

Only the prescribed mark "X" is legal on ballots in this state, Attorney General Richard H. Robinson has informed Secretary of State Beatrice A. Roach.

That official opinion was based on a recent ruling by the Supreme Court of New Mexico.

In its ruling on the marking of ballots, the state's highest court held that a check mark comprised an "identifying mark" of the sort specifically prohibited by law.

The attorney general pointed out that under this ruling, the "intention of the voter" principle could no longer be legally applied in the counting of votes.

While state law has always been clear in requiring the use of "X" marks on ballots, many voters have used check marks instead, particularly in the case for straight party votes at the top of the ballot in general elections, according to precinct officials in several counties.

Hereafter, election officers who count votes bearing one or more check marks will be in specific violation of the law and liable to penalties, under the court ruling and the attorney general's opinion.

**Army Officer Praises
Women's Club Work**

The following is a letter received by Mrs. Vera Snow, president of the Carizzo Woman's Club, from Charles L. Bolte, General, U. S. Army, Vice Chief of Staff:

"I have just returned to Washington to become Vice Chief of Staff of the United States Army after 14 months service in Germany. I am glad to be able to tell you personally that the importance of the contributions of the General Federation of Women's Clubs to the GYA centers cannot be over-estimated.

"During my services in Germany, I had an opportunity many times to see the materials sent by your clubs, and can assure you that every yard of material, so carefully selected and generously contributed, has been used to its full advantage in the development of this important program to promote German-American understanding.

"As you know, the sewing classes to which you have sent thousands of yards of material attract girls between the age of ten and twenty. These girls represent a tremendous potential upon-door policy brings in the butchers, the bakers and the working man's daughter, as well as the daughter of the nation. Your sewing class material attracts hundreds who learn that our men and women in uniform and many of the wives are helpful in conducting GYA classes in English, in civics, in American history and literature and about other activities. German boys and girls learn about us.

"It is the hope of the military that this program which has been in existence only seven years will develop such mutual understanding that it will never be necessary for us to take up arms in Germany again. Therefore, it is with a great feeling of gratitude that I learn of your willingness to gather together materials this year. Whatever you can do in your clubs and in your communities to further the GYA program will bring returns to each and every one of us in America.

"The following articles are still needed: Woollens, rayons, cottons, cardigans, jackets, flannel, pattern books, wool for knitting and crocheting, cotton for knitting and crocheting and knitting needles."

Farm Bureau's Resolutions

(Continuing resolutions adopted at the recent convention of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau.)

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED

Whereas, the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau in annual convention in Albuquerque, New Mexico, this 2nd day of Dec., 1953, commends the Secretary of Agriculture, the Hon. Ezra Taft Benson, for the aid given to the livestock industry with direct appropriation from the Congress with Sec. 82 funds, and urge continuation of this worthwhile program, and

Whereas, we stand unalterably opposed to direct government price supports and controls on livestock and meats, Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, we recommend that the American Farm Bureau Federation work with the incoming Congress against any legislation that would provide for a direct government support program.

The New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau recommends that the drought feed program be continued through the winter months on abeyance supplies, due to condition of roads in some areas of our state, or continued until there is an ample supply of grain in the spring, and at direction of FMA.

Whereas, stockmen who receive feed grains and meal find it necessary to have these feeds processed into cubes suitable for range feeding, and considerable cost and time is involved in getting feeds transported many miles to a processing plant for cubing, and

Whereas, many stockmen prefer a high protein cube for winter feeding, which is not being processed at this time for emergency drought feed distribution.

Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, by the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, that the Bureau go on record in support of action that will result in the United States Department of Agriculture including in the emergency feed program high protein-range cubes, and to work out whatever arrangement that is necessary to get cubes manufactured, and to pass the processing cost on to the producer.

SOIL WATER CONSERVATION

Whereas, soil and conservation improvements contribute to the security, the welfare and the taxable assets of the whole nation of agricultural products from lands improved by soil and water conservation improvements increase the payable income tax of the operator of such agricultural activities on these lands, Be It Resolved that the Farm and Livestock Bureau of New Mexico request that the present interpretation of the in-

come tax laws be changed so that soil and water conservation practices be considered an item of expense deductible from the gross income of the operator in the amount of the actual cash paid for such improvements.

GRAZING FEES

Whereas, recurring droughts in New Mexico, as well as economic conditions which seriously damage the livestock industry at regular intervals, make

Whereas, the New Mexico state legislature in 1929 established reasonable grazing fees on state lands in accordance with carrying capacity of the range, Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved, that we urge the State Land Commissioner and State Legislature to recognize this situation and assist in certain grazing fees on State lands at the present level.

Whereas, SB2348 and H. B. 6731 are identical bills, introduced in the 35th Congress, have for their primary objective the improvement of the National Forest and Soil Conservation lands and administration thereof, by providing a method of improving these lands by grazing permits under rules and regulations promulgated by the Secretary of Agriculture;

Specific terms and conditions under which transfers of grazing privileges may be made;

Directs the Secretary to maintain base property standards as a qualification for grazing privileges;

Causes a two-year study to be made by the Secretary and submit his recommendations to the Congress for a basis of equitable fee charges; and

Prescribes by suitable rules and regulations a procedure whereby actions of departmental officials may, upon appeal by grazing privilege holders be reviewed by the courts, and

DAMAGE BY GAME ANIMALS

Whereas, deer are causing serious damage to orchards, vineyards and vegetable fields, therefore, be it resolved that the New Mexico State Farm Bureau recommends to the New Mexico State Game Department that they establish a supervised program to control the deer from the fields by methods of controlling the deer population in affected areas. Antelope should also be included.

We wish to commend the State Board of Health for their recent action in giving the State Health Director more authority in running the Health Department. We wish to assure the State Health Director we are ready to cooperate with him in every way possible to produce the best milk possible.

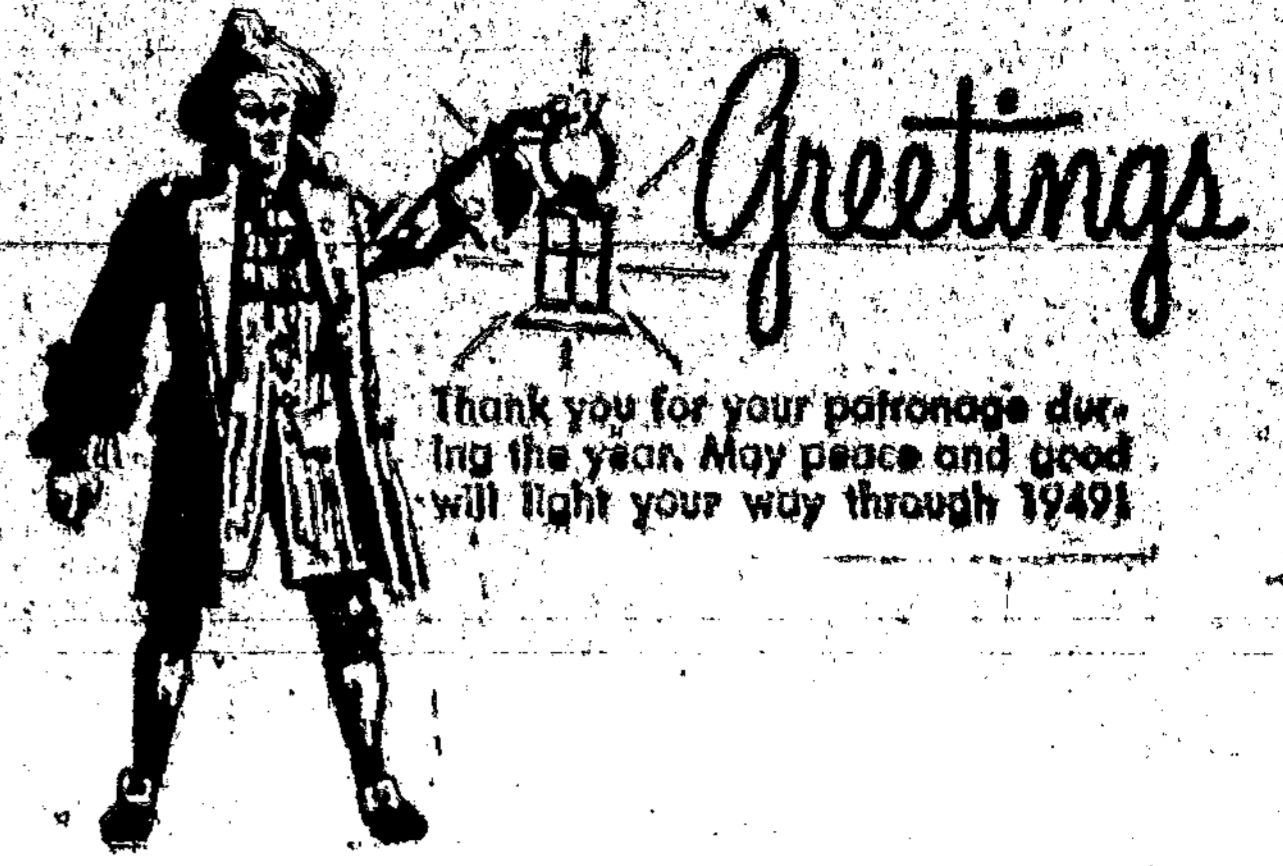
The State Dairy Sanitary Code is rewritten from time to time to meet changing dairy conditions.

The State Health Director is therefore requested to include the Dairy Committee Chairman when revising the State Dairy Sanitary Code.

We request the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau Board of Directors to appoint a committee to make a study of the agricultural operations of all state institutions to determine whether or not these operations are feasible and should be continued.

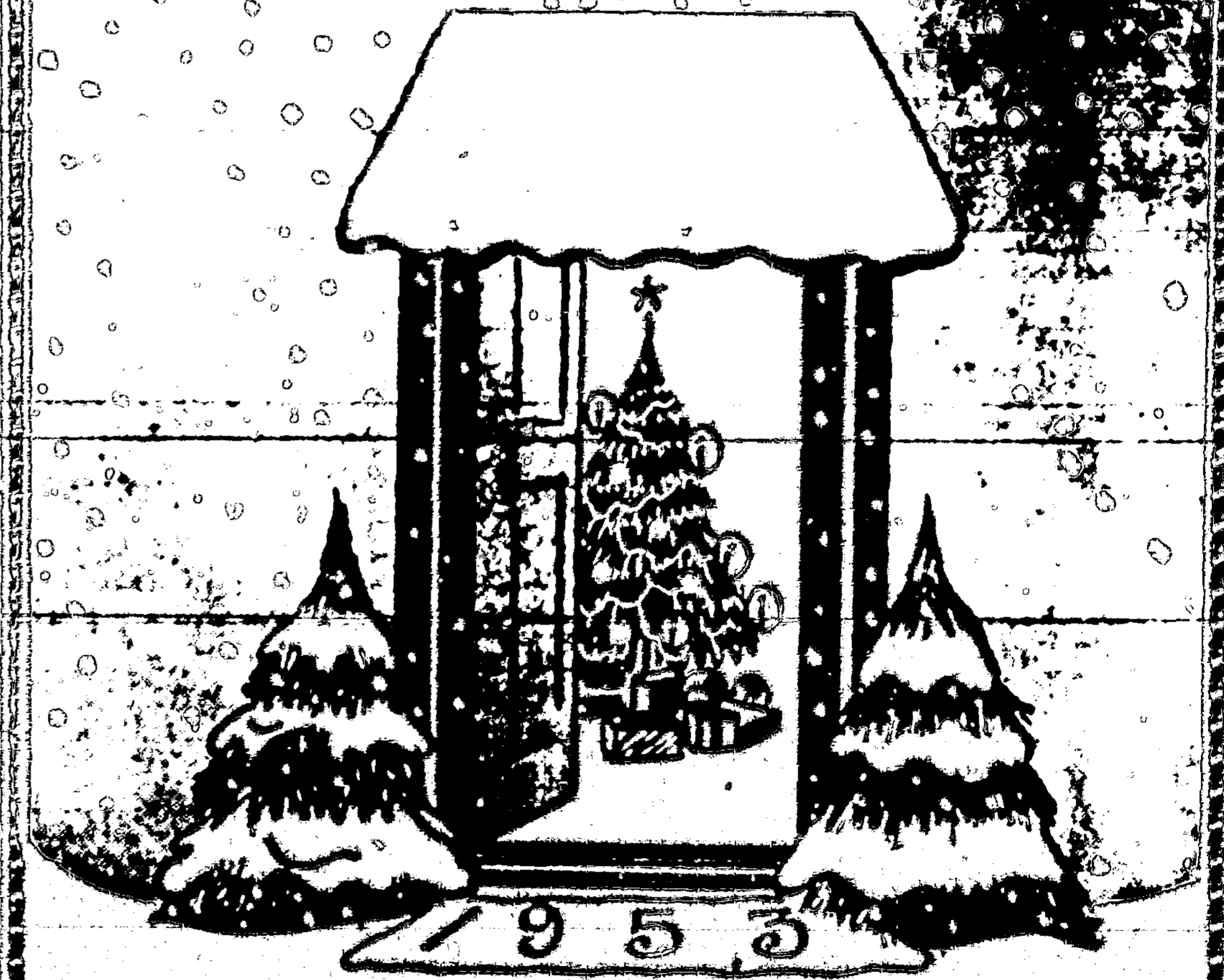

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

KNOW YOUR APPLES

It pays to know your apples, when shopping for fruit. Some apples are best for eating, some for cooking.

Here is a run-down of some apples and their varieties compiled by the U. S. Department of Agriculture:

Jonathan—A red apple with green to yellow undertone, tart in flavor, good for eating, storing, pies, and all apple desserts.

McIntosh—A light to deep red apple with a mild flavor and sweet aroma for eating fresh or using in salads or appleauce.

Grimes Golden—A clear yellow apple with russet dots, excellent for baking and pies, also for eating out of hand.

Stayman—A dull, red apple

often grey dots, excellent for all purposes.

Winesap—A bright red to purplish red apple, which is usually small in size. It is excellent for all purposes.

Rome Beauty—A solid red or striped apple, especially good for cooking as a sauce or baked.

Delicious—A glossy red apple, with mild flavor, good for eating out of the hand or in salads and desserts.

Tax Laws Provide for Farm Operating Losses

Farmers in New Mexico who suffered an operating loss this year should investigate provisions of the Federal Income Tax laws that make allowances for such losses, points out J. Z. Rowe, extension economist with New Mexico A&M College.

If you show a net loss on your farm business this year (because of unprofitable farm operations)

you can use this business loss to offset income in other years. Rowe says. If you paid Federal income taxes on 1952 income, you may be able to claim a refund. This is done by refiguring the tax on the 1952 income taking into account your loss in 1953. If this does not take care of all your loss incurred in 1953, you can carry any of the remaining loss forward for five years.

Your first step would be to claim a refund, using form 843, on your 1952 taxes paid on the basis of your 1953 operating loss. Then if this does not take care of all the loss, you may carry this forward to offset income in 1954-55-56-57 and 1958 in that order. You will determine whether you had an operating loss on your farming operations by the final figure you arrive at on Schedule 1040F, page 1, line 10.

"The computation and claiming of a business loss on your farming operations is not as easy as it sounds," the economist adds. "Farmers who wish to claim such loss should obtain the services of a competent tax consultant or contact a representative of the Revenue Service.

KNOW YOUR GRASSES

INDIAN RICE GRASS

Indian Ricegrass was once one

of the most important Western range grasses. Old timers tell of it growing so thick it appeared as fields of grain. The wake of overgrazing that has caused Indian Grass to practically disappear, except in inaccessible, ungrazed, or conservatively grazed range land. It does not respond favorably to deferred grazing.

Ranchers consider it a very good all-around grass because livestock seek it out both summer and winter, indicating that it cures exceptionally well on the stalk and is very nutritious.

This perennial bunch grass grows from one to two feet tall. Desert and semi-desert ranges of sandy soils seem to be its native habitat. Southern exposures and full sunlight apparently are required when it is found in the pinon juniper belt to around 10,000 feet.

The nutritious, plump seed were once used as a food staple by many western Indians. A flour or meal was prepared from the seed and held in high esteem, particularly by the Zuni Indians of New Mexico.
