Lincoln county's farm youth exchange student is N. Chikke Gowda, 27, from the state of Mysore, India.

N. Chikke Gowda is married. He was born June 13, 1926, and his home address is Doddagattigannabte, Hoskote, Bangalore district in Mysore state, India.

Mr. Gowda has lived in a farming village 10 years. He works in the fields where the principal crops are paddy (rice), sugarcane and potatoes.

Among his hobbies are badminton and photography. He has brought to this country books, pictures, handicrafts, India dress and a camera.

The section in India he comes from is described as a health resort where Mahatma Ghandi came to recuperate following one of his long fasts.

"It is hereby ordered that public hearing be held by the State Corporation Commission, Monday, June 8, 1953, at Mabry Hall, Highway Building, the Capitol, in Santa Fe, at 10 a.m., for consideration of the said increased rates."

SANTA FE, May 19.—All the fuss these foreign senators are making about our elections out here is just a lot of ignorant misunderstanding.

Now take the case of that election clerk in Ojites Frios in a primary election a few years back. There was a big rain that filled an arroyo near the polling place and the voters couldn't get to it.

Another case of stern justice concerned that of a young Rio Arriba county politician who came to Santa Fe, found an election going on, joined the fun and voted five times. He got caught and dragged into court, where he was fined \$100 and given a 60-day suspended sentence.

LEGISLATURE ALSO ACTS

It's not only the courts but the legislature too that safeguards the voting out here. The last contest for a seat in the house, that was in the 30's, found the loser complaining that he could not make the grade because his political foes had shanghaied a polling place in San Miguel county and his friends couldn't find it.

"In one precinct in said county on said election day certain persons without authority moved the voting place 15 miles from the place fixed by the county commissioners in the election proclamation, and then other persons by force and intimidation again moved the place to another point still farther away.

The finding must have been of some satisfaction to the squawking candidate even if he didn't win the seat. But the legislature did write a stern letter to the officials in San Miguel county warning them not to do anything like that again.

BATHROOM COUNT BACKFIRES

There are all kinds of cases of New Mexico heading down to enforce the election laws. Maybe you remember that election in McKinley county sometime back that was when a bunch of courthouse officials locked themselves in a bathroom and marked enough absentee ballots to give their side the victory.

And there was one guy who really served time in the pen for voting other people's ballots. He was an election official over in Guadalupe county. He was a guy who was just being a good party man on the night of election, helping count the ballots and occasionally marking one for a friend.

Along about midnight he must have got sleepy or careless or something because the Republican officials caught him. After a considerable argument the Republicans decided to go back and mark an equal number of ballots for their man and thus make everything even.

That brought up some unpleasant court business and District Judge Harry Bigbee sentenced the man with the pencil lead under his nail to a year or two in the pen.

He got out in a month or two and acting Gov. Jawbone Jones and Judge Bigbee got beat for re-nomination at the next election.

**NEW MEXICO LABOR MARKET**

**ALAMOGORDO AREA**

Construction continues to be the principal activity in the area, with little or no change occurring in the employment level during the past month. Jobs currently under way include the 100-unit Wherry Housing project, a 70-unit by the Public Housing Administration, several military buildings, two highway projects, street lighting program, and a number of private residences. The Wherry project, recently started, is working a limited force, but will need additional workers as the job progresses, until peak of about 500 has been reached.

The active file count of job seekers is 433, including 100 in the entry group. The shortage list includes mathematicians, radio technicians, mechanical engineers, physicists, electrical and mechanical draftsmen, watchmaker, machinists, instrument maker and sheetmetal worker. Building construction skills may be in short supply in the next 90 days.

**ALBUQUERQUE AREA**

Milder weather has accelerated employment in construction and related lines. The A. T. & S. F. Railroad has laid off an additional 140 workers. It is reported that if not all, of these workers will be absorbed in other departments. Certain highly technical and professional skills continue in short supply in this area.

**ARTESIA AREA**

Labor market conditions remain dull. Petroleum, the area's main industry, while holding its own, is doing no hiring, except for replacement purposes.

**Charles W. Boone In Navy Training Exercise**

PACIFIC FLEET (PHTNC) — Taking part in "Operation Seajump," a large scale amphibious training exercise off the coast of Southern California, is Charles W. Boone, electrician's mate third class, USN, son of Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Boone of Carrizozo, serving aboard the attack transport USS Menard.

The climax of the exercise will be a full scale land assault by amphibious forces supported by air units and helicopter landing attack forces, against an "enemy" entrenched at Camp Pendleton, Oceanside, Calif.

Naval units taking part in Seajump include aircraft carriers and air squadrons, destroyers, submarines, minesweepers and various types of amphibious ships, landing craft and units.

The exercise is designed as a means for providing advanced amphibious and land warfare training and improving the readiness of Naval and Marine forces of the Pacific Fleet.

Even though many of the participating units are veterans of Korea, they constantly engage in training exercises to maintain proficiency in the use of combat tactics and special weapons.

Vice Admiral Harold M. Martin, Commander First Fleet, is conducting the exercise which has been ordered by Admiral Arthur W. Radford, Commander in Chief, U. S. Pacific Fleet.

**County Governments Spend Average of \$1 Monthly Per Capita**

SANTA FE, May 20.—New Mexico's 32 county governments are expending an average of \$1 per month per capita, or a total of over \$3,000,000 a year.

The per capita figure for Lincoln County will be \$32.66 for the fiscal year ending this June 30, according to data released today by the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.

Oil-rich Lea County is due to have the highest rate, with county expenditures there amounting to \$45.44 for each man, woman and child within that county.

Lowest in the State, the county government costs in Rio Arriba will amount to only \$6.07 per capita for 1952-53.

**Poor Weather Limits Fishing at Conchas Dam**

Field personnel of the State Game Department made a spot survey of fishermen (and their fish) at Conchas Dam over a recent week-end; however, poor weather limited the usual crowd to only 600-odd anglers.

Checkers counted a total of 23 stations on the lake's access roads. A total of 262 automobiles were counted, of which 104 were out of state, mostly Texans.

The cars carried 654 anglers, or an average of 2.5 fishermen per car. They caught 4.9 fish per person at a rate of .55 fish per hour's effort. The field men counted totals of 2,904 crappie (largest, 14 in.); 42 large mouth bass (largest, 3 1/2 lbs.); 37 catfish; 102 walleyed pike (largest, 5 lbs., 25 in.); and 38 bluegills.



**Study Classes Available For WSPG Personnel**

 White Sands Proving Ground  
 May 20.—Military operations with peculiar designations are not confined to front-line combat areas. At White Sands Proving Ground this week "OPERATION FOXHOLE UNIVERSITY" was initiated for the benefit of post personnel placed on a temporary duty status at the outposts of the huge range areas necessary to the Army Ordnance

program. "Operation Foxhole University" is unique, but its designation is extremely fitting since the project actually takes a university education to soldiers unable to attend a higher seat of learning (group study classes) at the main post. Last week Capt. John J. France, information and education officer, and the education center's civilian advisor, Dr. B. L. Gohlman, of Las Cruces, visited Oscura Range Camp. They brought with them loads of "Operation Foxhole University" informational material. Over 55% of the assigned personnel registered for correspondence courses through USAFI (U. S. Armed Forces Institute) and forthcoming group study classes at the Range Camp, in television. An instructor will be provided for three off-duty-hour classes each week. "Operation Foxhole University" will also be carried out at other distant locations where members of WSPG personnel are temporarily stationed over the 200 mile range area in the New Mexican desert. Oscura Range Camp, one of several outposts comprising the huge areas surrounding the Proving Ground, is located on "Three Rivers Ranch," once owned by Secretary of Interior A. B. Fall. The range camp's geographical location became notorious in earlier history when Billy the Kid roamed the Mal Pais lava beds, and in the Lincoln County War when the famous outlaw hired out his guns for the highest price.

Today the soldier-technicians are billeted in a modern range camp with comfortable barracks. They eat in a conventional Army mess hall and spend after-duty leisure hours in their day room.

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



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
### Steel Capacity Has Risen Sharply



The steel capacity of the South and West has risen sharply and large gains have been made in other districts, says Steel Facts, issued by American Iron and Steel Institute. Over the nation, 84 companies now make steel in 27 states, against 72 companies in 1939. There are 143 steelmaking plants, compared with 128 in 1939. Eleven states gained more than one million tons of steel capacity each, since 1939.

### Richard Dobson New State Entomologist

Mike Swoboda, State extension entomologist for the past two years, has resigned to accept a position with a commercial insecticide company in Phoenix, Ariz., effective May 1.

Richard Dobson, former instructor of entomology in the biology department at A&M, has been appointed to replace Swoboda. Dobson, who will receive a doctor's degree in entomology at Oregon State College, will assume his duties as extension entomologist with New Mex. A&M College about July 1.

### STATE'S FARM LAND WORTH \$17.38 AN ACRE

The average farm value per acre of farm land and buildings in New Mexico is \$17.38 per acre on March 1, 1953. This is a drop of 74 cents per acre from last year. The average value of farm land in New Mexico is second lowest in the United States (Wyoming is the lowest). The average value per acre in the mountain states was \$25.36. The U. S. average was \$30.31 per acre.

The Inter-Tribal Indian Ceremonial, held at Gallup each summer, receives a Legislative appropriation of \$25,000 a year.

### Feeding of Livestock Feature of Program At A & M College

The economics of livestock feeding will take the spotlight on the program of the fourteenth annual Livestock Feeders' Day at the Agricultural Experiment Station of New Mexico A&M College, June 8, according to J. H. Knox, head of the animal husbandry department.

"Because of the economic uncertainties facing livestock feeders now, we have tried to assemble as much information as we could on the market situation and prospects," Knox said. "We also were fortunate in being able to obtain as speakers two New Mexico livestock feeders, who will discuss feeding methods which they have found to be particularly successful under practical operations."

The program opens at 9:30 a. m., in Hadley Hall on the campus at State College, with the following speakers:

### Small Plant Bugs Reported Near Here

An invasion of small plant bugs was reported this week at the Stevens place, 3/4 mile southwest of Carrizozo. The bugs are numerous in the pasture, County Agent Ralph Dunlap reports, and are capable of damaging edible plants. To control them, he advises using a spray of 50% wettable DDT—2 lbs. to 100 gallons of water. If the plants sprayed are to be eaten, he says rotenone dust should be substituted for the DDT.

If the bugs should become numerous around the house, nearby weeds should be sprayed.

Mr. Dunlap describes the bugs as being a half inch long, brown in color, with an orange fringe and white dots over the back. On reaching the adult stage, the bugs develop wings.






