## HENRY SILVA KILLED ON CAPITAN STREET

Henry E. Silva, Jr., 49, of Capitan was struck and instantly killed by a passing motorist at an intersection in Capitan shortly after 12 o'clock midnight Sunday.

Wilbur Sherrell, 24, of Roswell, driver of the car that struck Mr. Silva, said the latter was lying on the pavement and he could not stop in time. His car passed over the inert man and caused instant death.

Virgil Hall, deputy sheriff of Capitan, was driving behind the Sherrell car and arrived at the scene of accident almost as soon as it happened.

An inquest was held at the office of Myles W. Gaston, justice of the peace, shortly afterwards. The verdict was that Mr. Silva's death was caused by being struck by an automobile.

Witnesses to the accident were also interviewed later by District Attorney C. C. Chase Jr. and Sheriff Bradley and their conclusion was that it was an unavoidable accident.

## SEVERAL WITNESSES

Other witnesses to the accident were motorists Austin Bryant and family, formerly of Tinnie, now of Gallup. They were traveling east and arrived at the death intersection almost simultaneously with the Sherrell car.

Henry E. Silva, Jr., had made his home in Capitan all his life. He is the son of Rebecca Silva and the late Henry E. Silva Sr.

A veteran of World War II, he had been employed with Johnnie Cooper in ranch work at Arabela. Survivors, in addition to his mother, are a son, Baltazar Silva of the U. S. Army; two daughters, Stella Chavez of Deming and Dora Munoz of Hurley; four grandchildren; six brothers, Fred Silva of Alamogordo, Alfred Silva and T. Silva of Capitan; Willis Silva of Tularosa; Livorio Silva of Los Alamos; and M. Silva, USN, of Philadelphia; four sisters, Frances Peralta of Capitan; Katie Leslie and Addie Major of Carrizozo, Mrs. Jose Archuleta of Las Vegas, N. M.

Services were held in Capitan Wednesday morning, with interment following in the family burial plot.

They stopped to give assistance, then notified the Carrizozo hospital and the sheriff's office.

An ambulance brought the injured motorist to Carrizozo for treatment. Late Wednesday he was moved to the Veteran's Hospital in Albuquerque.

Mr. Miller is the husband of Madeline Sanchez, sister of Carrizozo and the son of Mr. and Mrs. Manuel Miller of Capitan.

**Arrest Made for Theft From Liquor Store**

Charged with breaking into and entering Jonnie's Package Store in Carrizozo and stealing liquor, Amada A. Crawford, 52, is being held in the County Jail in lieu of \$1,000 bond.

Crawford was arrested by Sheriff Glen Bradley late Sunday morning after a passerby had reported the man was acting in a suspicious manner in front of the store.

The suspect is charged with breaking a plate glass window in the package store and stealing a fifth gallon of liquor. He waived preliminary hearing when taken before Justice of the Peace Myles W. Gaston in Capitan on Monday, and was bound over to district court.

## Suits Name Ruidoso Officers, Police Judge

A suit was filed in District Court last week against Dewey L. Gann, city marshal of Ruidoso, and A. B. Munsey, State police officer, by Golda Davis, complainant, alleging imprisonment and restraint of her liberty.

Through her attorneys J. B. Newell and Edward Trizev, Mrs. Davis alleged violation of her constitutional right to give bail for her appearance.

She asks for \$10,000 damages, plus costs and "such other and further relief as the court may deem meet and equitable."

The complaint states that on "Sunday, July 19, 1933, at Ruidoso, the defendants by force compelled the plaintiff to enter the city jail of Ruidoso and there imprisoned her and restrained her of her liberty for one hour and a half upon an alleged charge of violating a village ordinance."

The complaint further states that "said jail was then in a dirty, filthy and unsanitary condition, then having on each of so of mud on the floor, no chairs, a filthy dirty cot or bed with a dirty, filthy mattress which was damp and unsanitary; that plaintiff became ill as a result of such illegal confinement and was treated by a physician who gave her several shots of penicillin and for which she paid the sum of \$14."

The complaint further states that her husband, Lester Davis, had been arrested about two hours before by the same defendants; that he also was not afforded an opportunity to make a bond and that "the defendants acting with other police officers and officials of the Village of Ruidoso, and especially the justice of the peace, acting as police judge, one Chas. Wessom, have entered into and been acting in concert with the defendants."

## 48 TURTLES TO RACE ON ACHIEVEMENT DAY IN CAPITAN

A total of 48 turtles will line up at the starting post for a race in which the best turtle will win, at Lincoln County's 4-H Achievement Day, September 19 in Capitan.

Arrangements for the turtle race were made Monday night in Ruidoso at a meeting of organizations and individuals sponsoring the Achievement Day for youth of the County. Representatives were present from the chambers of commerce of Ruidoso and Capitan; County Agent Ralph Dunlap; Fletcher Hall, general superintendent; and department superintendent J. P. McKnight, (sheep division); Mrs. Ray Carpenter (clothing division); Mrs. Arnell Evans, (4-H assistant under Mrs. Carpenter) and Pat Jones (Asst. in the rabbit division).

It is planned to sell the turtles at \$5 each, to businessmen over the County. The money so raised, plus an admission charge at the fair, for adults only, will go toward paying the expenses of Achievement Day.

## GREASED PIG CONTEST

Another contest that is being arranged is catching a greased pig. This event is for livestock exhibitors only. The first competitor who catches the pig keeps it.

## Defendant Asks Court For Change of Venue

Judge A. W. Marshall of Deming was the presiding jurist in Carrizozo Monday morning. He heard lengthy testimony regarding change of venue of a case from Lincoln County to a court in another county. Roy Stewart is suing R. V. Oberholzer for \$5,000 and costs, growing out of the alleged shooting of five horses and a mule in Ruidoso two years ago.

Attorneys W. C. Whitley and Geo. Zimmerman, representing the defendant Oberholzer presented arguments in favor of moving the trial to another court, Garland and Sanders, attorneys for the plaintiff, opposed the change.

Judge Marshall took the case under advisement.

## N. M. Copper to Haul Machinery to Mill Site

C. E. Degner, president of the New Mexico Copper Corporation, states that the flotation equipment is being moved to the company mill site this week and that the Harding ball mill will be moved next week.

The concentration tables will be trucked also in from Joplin, Mo., by the first of the month, with other necessary equipment. The company is cutting the station in the main shaft on the 210-foot level at the Conqueror Mine this week and drifting will start Monday to intercept the ore body that was opened up on the 136-foot level.

Ore is being developed for mill reserves.

## Wheat Farmers Endorse Marketing Quota Setup

Lincoln County's wheat farmers have voted unanimously in favor of federal marketing quotas on next year's wheat crop. The vote was 5 for and none against.

The nation-wide tally, with 47 states reporting showed Monday nearly 360,000 in favor of quotas and 63,000 against them. This is more than the necessary two-thirds majority needed to carry the proposal.

In Roosevelt county, 120 wheat farmers voted for controls and 20 against.

The decision means continued high price support—at 80% of parity, with penalties for those who grow more than their quota.

Herman McKibben, Lincoln County PMA office manager, told the News this week that his office is still taking applications for another 30-day supply of drought emergency feed.

## STATE PENSIONERS PLANNING LAW SUIT

SANTA FE, Aug. 18.—Fifty retired State and city and county employes have hired a lawyer (Frank Zinn of Santa Fe) in an effort to get in on the new increased pension rates. The attorney general has held that those already in retirement are not eligible for the new higher rates. Jimmy Huggins of Carlsbad, a 33-year payroiler, is leading the movement for the court challenge. If they win the old boys will pay the lawyer the amount of their increase for one month. It's quite an item—means the difference in \$150 and \$250 a month for some.

**MONEY IS SET FOR ELECTIONS**  
It would be something if this election-loving State wound up with not enough money to hold an election. Secretary of State Bea Roach has \$24,000 to pay for the special vote September 15, which should cost her office about \$28,000 and for the primary election, which will cost the office about \$15,000. Ordinarily these kind of situations are met by the benevolent board of finance which makes up the difference, but this time the finance board had been tied up by the legislature and apparently cannot make such an appropriation. Now it appears that either a special session of the legislature will be necessary to appropriate for the elections, or printers and newspaper will be asked to put on the cost the State secretary's bills, and gambler on the legislature approving payment.

**WHY THEY SEE RED ON TELEPHONE RATES**  
One reason that so many people are outraged by the constant increasing of telephone rates is the comparison of long distance charges within the State, which the companies set by proclamation, with those charges made for longer calls outside the State, which are set by the Federal government to earn a fair profit.

Here are a few: From Santa Fe to Gallup, person to person at daytime charge, \$1.65. To Holbrook, Ariz., 50 miles farther, the charge is \$1.50.

From Santa Fe to Farmington \$1.65, and on up to Durango, Colo., 80 miles away, \$1.25.

From Santa Fe to Las Cruces \$2.03 and for a 45 miles longer call over the same line to El Paso, \$1.60.

From Santa Fe to Carlsbad \$2.03 and to Pecos, way down in Texas on the same line, \$1.61.

It costs \$2.16 to call Hobbs from Santa Fe but only \$1.35 to hook up with Seminole, Texas, way down the road from Hobbs.

To call Clovis from Santa Fe it costs \$1.78 for three minutes and \$1.30 for a call to Farwell, Texas, 10 miles beyond Clovis.

You can call Amarillo, Texas, for \$1.32, but it costs \$1.65 to get Sarton, N. M., which is maybe a hundred miles nearer on the same route.

The charge to Clayton up in Union County is \$1.65 and if you want to call through Clayton on out to Boise City, Okla., the fee is \$1.50.

The rate from Santa Fe to Raton is \$1.46 and you can save money by making a longer call to Trinidad, Colo., \$1.15.

The last telephone rate increase is in the supreme court. Its final settlement is expected in maybe June of next year. By that time a million and a half will have been collected in disputed increased rates. A court order has provided that the money be returned in the event the rate is held unjustified. But there is a catch involved. You must make a claim to get the dough back. So, therefore, save your telephone statements.

**STARBUCKS IN A HURRY**  
Larry Ryon is making \$600 a month as press agent for Lana Commissioner Johnny Walker, and Revenue Commissioner Manuel Lujan—\$300 a month each. . . . The delay in enacting the measure for a second Federal judge for New Mexico is encouraging to the prospects of Gov. Mechem for the lifetime appointment. The Congress which had already agreed on the measure put it over until next year. . . . Joe McCarthy and Bill Langer, senators, have let it be known that they will not vote against replacement of Sen. Dennis Chavez by Republican Est. Hurley. They are Republicans. . . . Gov. Ed Mechem is hanging back on running for senator. Republican party leaders are telling him that without him the party is sunk in 1934. . . . There is considerable sentiment around for Lt. Gov. Tibb Chavez to go for Congress next year. . . . State Secretary Beatrice Roach took her mother and her daughter, Jimmy, to Seattle for the secretary's convention. Fagge Charles Bennett, busy on a new job selling meat-tor supplies, declined the trip.

**FAIR PREMIUM BOOK GOES INTO MAILS**

ALBUQUERQUE (Special) — New Mexico's version of the book-of-the-month is going into the mails daily to thousands of avid readers.

Literally, however, it is the book of the year—a 293 page volume packed with facts and figures and a storehouse for fall plans. It is the 1953 New Mexico State Fair Premium book.

Just off the presses, the premium book details more than \$210,000 in prize money and awards to go to the best in New Mexico livestock, farm, arts and science fields.

Issued under the supervision of Secretary Manager Leon Harris, the premium book lists highlights of the 15th annual exposition to be held at the State Fair Grounds in eastern Albuquerque for nine days beginning Sept. 26.

In a foreword, Governor Edwin L. Mechem described the exposition as "the opportunity of seeing what our State produces of inspecting prize-winning displays of agriculture, and livestock, of arts and crafts."

"On exhibition will also be the finest examples of our great industrial development and our progress in home building," the Chief Executive added.

Each day of the fair, the premium book points out, is dedicated to an individual, an industry, or a group. Included are Governor's day, Veterans and Armed Forces day, All-Schools day, Wool growers, Palomino, Cattle and Quarter Horse day, Indian day, Albuquerque day, Dairy Promotion day.

The premium book, as always, carries detailed regulations concerning entry, shipment and care of exhibits, the Queen's contest, the State Fair Parade, Horse Racing and the Rodeo. In addition to general information, it lists schedules for judging, 21 fair departments, 14 junior departments and events, a schedule of other fairs and expositions, superintendents of various sections, agricultural officials in the state and counties, and special attractions.

Deep in its pages, where detailed information is given on rules and awards for each department, the premium publication tells the story of an increase of more than \$10,000 this year in awards to be offered.

Meantime, seeking renomination in the Democratic primary next May, Corporation Commissioner Ingram Pickett is campaigning against the Mountain States phone company.

No one will be surprised if two or three of his fellow Democrats announce for the same job. But Pickett can be expected to all but ignore them and continue his campaign against the telephone company whose recent rate raise the Corporation Commission is opposing.

Pickett, of course, announced publicly that he would pay his residence phone bill on the basis of the previous lower rate and not on the new higher basis which the Commission disapproved, pending the court ruling. This was a pretty obvious publicity gag on his part but \$600 took it seriously.

The Highway Department checked with the Commission the other day to see whether the department should pay its July phone bill on the basis of the old or the new rates—and was told to pay what the phone company said was owed.

NEEPE — Federal investigators will be about the State shortly to ascertain whether any ranchers buying drought-relief feed at cut rates are obtaining more than they actually need—for possible resale at a profit on hoarding. . . Still talk of a special session of the Legislature to vote on a proposal to abolish the pre-primary "designating" convention law which went into effect only last year. . . George Stephens, long-time State land office timber expert, may run for State auditor next year, say his friends. Likewise, Tom McGrath of Dills, perennial candidate for that office. Both are Democrats. . . Populous Bernalillo County, which already has 117 voting divisions, must divide several. More than 1000 votes were cast in some of them last fall and 800 is considered the desirable maximum. . . New Mexico is to receive this year a total of 75 million dollars in Federal funds to help finance new highway construction and improvement projects.



## (PROPOSITIONS TO BE VOTED ON IN A SPECIAL STATE ELECTION, SEPT. 15, 1953, STATE OF NEW MEXICO)

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 1

#### TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

#### SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 8

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 9, SECTION 12 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO MUNICIPAL INDEBTEDNESS AND RELATING TO QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTERS IN ANY MUNICIPAL ELECTION WHEREIN MUNICIPAL DEBTS ARE INCURRED, AND TO ELIMINATE THE PROVISION THEREOF REQUIRING THAT THE ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF INCURRING INDEBTEDNESS BE HELD AT A REGULAR ELECTION FOR COUNCILMEN, ALDERMEN, OR OTHER OFFICERS OF SUCH CITY, TOWN OR VILLAGE.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 9, Section 12 of the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows:

No city, town or village shall contract any debt except by an ordinance, which shall be irrevocable until the indebtedness therein provided for shall have been fully paid or discharged, and which shall specify the purposes to which the funds to be raised shall be applied and which shall provide for the levy of a tax, not exceeding twelve mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within such city, town or village, sufficient to pay the interest on and to extinguish the principal of such debt within fifty years. The proceeds of such tax shall be applied only to the payment of such interest and principal. No such debt shall be treated unless the question of incurring the same shall have been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors thereof as have paid a property tax thereon, or shall have been exempt from the payment of such property tax during the preceding year, and a majority of those voting on the question by ballot deposited in a separate ballot box, shall have voted in favor of creating such debt.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election, or at any special election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose, whichever is held first.

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 11

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1, ARTICLE 21 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO IN ORDER TO ELIMINATE THE PROVISIONS THEREOF PROHIBITING THE SALE, BARTER OR GIVING OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS TO INDIANS AND THE INTRODUCTION OF SUCH LIQUORS INTO INDIAN COUNTRY.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Section 1, Article 21 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended to read as follows:

Religious toleration — Polygamy — Perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured, and no inhabitant of this State shall ever be molested in person or property on account of his or her mode of religious worship. Polygamous or plural marriages and polygamous cohabitation are forever prohibited.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this Resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next general election or at any special election held previous to the said general election.

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 13

PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 4, SECTION 22 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, BY INCREASING THE NUMBER OF DAYS IN WHICH THE GOVERNOR MAY APPROVE BILLS AFTER THE ADJOURNMENT OF THE LEGISLATURE.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 4, Section 22 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

Each member of the legisla-

ture shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars for each day's attendance during each session and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of the government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Section 5, Article 4 of this Constitution, and he shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next General Election or at any Special Election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose.

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 12

#### Introduced by: Senator Guido Zecca

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 3, SECTION 5, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, RELATING TO EXEMPTIONS FOR HEADS OF FAMILIES AND VETERANS.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Article 3, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. (Exemptions for heads of families and veterans). — The legislature may exempt from taxation property of each head of the family to the amount of two hundred dollars (\$200) and the property, including the community or joint property of husband and wife, of every honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States who served in such armed forces during any period in which they were or are engaged in armed conflict under orders of the President of the United States, and the widow of every such honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States, in the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000). Provided, that in every case where exemption is claimed on the ground of the claimant having served with the armed forces of the United States as aforesaid, the burden of proving actual and bona fide ownership of such property upon which exemption is claimed, shall be upon the claimant.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this Resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next regular or special election held in the State after the adjournment of this Legislature.

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

Each member of the legisla-

ture shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars for each day's attendance during each session and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of the government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Section 5, Article 4 of this Constitution, and he shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next General Election or at any Special Election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose.

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 16

#### Introduced by: Senator Guido Zecca

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 3, SECTION 5, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, RELATING TO EXEMPTIONS FOR HEADS OF FAMILIES AND VETERANS.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Article 3, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended to read as follows:

Section 5. (Exemptions for heads of families and veterans). — The legislature may exempt from taxation property of each head of the family to the amount of two hundred dollars (\$200) and the property, including the community or joint property of husband and wife, of every honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States who served in such armed forces during any period in which they were or are engaged in armed conflict under orders of the President of the United States, and the widow of every such honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States, in the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000). Provided, that in every case where exemption is claimed on the ground of the claimant having served with the armed forces of the United States as aforesaid, the burden of proving actual and bona fide ownership of such property upon which exemption is claimed, shall be upon the claimant.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this Resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next regular or special election held in the State after the adjournment of this Legislature.

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4 SECTION 5 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION TO REQUIRE ANNUAL SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND TO LIMIT SUBJECTS FOR CONSIDERATION AT EVEN YEAR SESSIONS.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 4 Section 5 of the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows:

(a) Each session of the legislature shall begin annually at 12:00 noon on the second Tuesday of January. Each odd-year session shall not exceed ninety days and each even-year session shall not exceed thirty days. No special session of the legislature shall exceed thirty days.

(b) The regular even-year session will undertake as its regular order of business the following in the order given:

- (1) Budgets, appropriations, revenue bills.
- (2) Bills correcting or amending legislation enacted in the previous regular odd-year session.
- (3) Consideration of bills ordered prepared by the regular odd-year session.
- (4) Bills drawn in reference to special message of the governor.
- (5) Reconsideration of bills of the previous regular odd-year session vetoed by the governor.

(c) The provisions pertaining to per diem allowance of each member of the legislature during the regular session shall be applicable to attendance of the legislature during both the even-year and odd-year sessions or any special session.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election held previous to the general election.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election held previous to the general election.

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 7 SECTION 4 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION RELATING TO RESIDENCE BY ADDING A PROVISION AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE VOTING OF QUALIFIED ELECTORS ABSENT FROM THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE.

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico that Article 7 Section 4 of the New Mexico Constitution be amended to read as follows:

No person shall be deemed to have acquired as lost residence by reason of his presence or absence while employed in the service of the United States or of the state, nor while a student at any school. The legislature may enact laws providing for the voting of qualified electors who cannot be physically present at their polling places on the day of any election.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose.

#### TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO

#### SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 22

#### Introduced by: Special Message from Gov. Edwin L. McMane

#### A JOINT RESOLUTION

PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF A PERMANENT TRUST FUND DERIVED FROM SEVERANCE TAXES ON NATURAL RESOURCES, PROVIDING FOR POWER TO APPROPRIATE THE INCOME THEREFROM, PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF CERTAIN TAXES, PROVIDING FOR THE INVESTMENT AND APPROPRIATION OF PORTIONS OF SUCH PROCEEDS, AND PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THE AMENDMENT TO A GENERAL OR SPECIAL ELECTION.

#### WHEREAS, the income derived by the State from the continual severance of natural resources is being completely consumed without replacement of compensatory value; and

WHEREAS, it is essential to the preservation of the wealth of this State, that a permanent trust fund be created, through the medium of the preservation of a portion of the taxation derived on the severance of such natural resources, to replace the natural wealth of this State now being depleted;

#### NOW, THEREFORE,

#### BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Mexico is hereby proposed to be added as Section 8 of Article VIII:

Section 8. There is hereby created a permanent investment or trust fund to be maintained by the State Treasurer of the State of New Mexico to be known as "THE NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND."

Each fiscal year the revenues and proceeds, except as herein provided, from a severance tax or other taxes, levies or excises (except ad valorem taxes, sales taxes, income taxes, or taxes under the emergency school tax act) on the severance, production, mining, processing or transporting of all mineral, natural resources and forest products severed and saved, or derived from the soil of this state over and above and in the amount they exceed, for said fiscal year, prior pledges from such severance tax including such pledges of said tax, as may be contained in the acts of the Twenty-first Legislature, and over and above and in the amount they exceed, for said fiscal year, the further sum of Four Million, Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$4,750,000.00), shall be covered into the "NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND." Said amount of \$4,750,000.00 of said annual revenues and proceeds for each fiscal year, less such administrative deductions, as may be provided by the Legislature, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature.

Monies placed in "THE NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND" shall be invested by the State Treasurer in bonds of the United States, of the State of New Mexico, of cities, towns, counties, or school districts, of the State of New Mexico, or of institutions of the State of New Mexico. The Legislature may, by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house, provide that such funds may be invested in other interest bearing securities. All investment of monies in this fund shall be first approved by the Governor, the Attorney General and the State Treasurer. The corpus of said fund shall remain intact; only the income therefrom shall be used. Such income may be appropriated and the receipt thereof anticipated and appropriated by the Legislature as it may direct from time to time for the purpose of acquiring sites, the construction, remodeling or alteration of buildings, offices and facilities for the state government, state correctional, penal and reformatory institutions, state hospitals, buildings and improvements for state educational institutions (except common schools), for the construction, improvement and maintenance of highways and bridges and for the construction and maintenance of other public improvements.

Provided, however, nothing contained herein shall be construed to include, prevent, or affect a levy of any tax, now or hereafter provided by law, of not to exceed one-quarter of one per centum (1/4 of 1%) of the gross value of any natural resources severed, mined, saved, or extracted from the soil of the state, the proceeds of which are used exclusively for the research, regulation, control and supervision of the development of such natural product and for its conservation.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this joint resolution, the same shall be submitted to the people at the

next general election or at a special election held prior to such time for the purpose of voting on constitutional amendments. The provisions of this amendment, if adopted, shall take effect on January 1st at 7:00 A. M. of the first January following its adoption.

## CAMERA TOPICS

### WHY AND WHEN TO USE A FILTER

A knowledge of the proper way to use filters can go a long way to giving you more effective and satisfying pictures. Perhaps the best introduction to a discussion of filters is to explain briefly the principle behind their use. As you all know, daylight which appears to have no color, is actually made up of all the colors of the rainbow. You've seen this proved many times when you pass light through a prism which breaks it up into colors of many wave lengths. Any color that we see around us, actually means that this object has the ability to reflect light of one particular wave length. Filters then, are in reality screens which allow only light of certain wave lengths to pass through the lens to sensitize the film.

Color filters are of two types, "correction" and "contrast." The first type is used to give black and white film the same degree of contrast that the human eye sees. For example, film is much more sensitive to the color blue than other colors. Consequently, when you take a picture of blue sky it registers on the film much more brightly in relation to other colors than it does in actuality. To compensate for this condition, you should use a filter, in this case a yellow one, which reduces the amount of blue light that can pass through the lens.

A "contrast" filter is used to make objects of a different color stand out from one another on black and white film. By this I mean that two objects which are actually blue and red, might register as the same tone in black and white and thus blend together on the film. This condition can be avoided with a filter, since a filter of one color makes all objects of the same color register brighter on the film and opposing colors register darker, thus increasing the contrast. When using filters, be sure to consult the manufacturer's specifications which give the factors for his own filters used under all conditions and with all types of film.

### County 4-H'ers Attend State Encampment

The Lincoln County 4-H contest winners participated in the State Encampment held at State College last week. Della Joiner, Freddie Titworth, James Talley and Rex Poindexter, representing Lincoln County, were among 325 4-H'ers attending the camp. Della Joiner, the sweepstakes winner of the County Dress Revue, received a white ribbon on her green cotton dress entry. Rex Poindexter, Freddie Titworth and James Talley were one of the 15 teams participating in the livestock judging contest. The County Agent accompanied the group.

### Yellowing Plants May Require Spraying

Chlorosis, or the yellowing of the foliage of ornamental plants such as trees, shrubs and roses is often due to the unavailability of iron which is needed for the green coloring in plants.

According to L. C. Gibbs, extension horticulturist at New Mexico A & M College, chlorosis in New Mexico is most frequently caused by highly alkaline soils, however, in some cases it is also the result of poor drainage and overwatering. If plants are not being over watered yet have a yellowish colored foliage with only the veins of the leaves showing green coloring, the condition can be corrected by spray applications of a mixture containing a to a pound of iron sulfate to 100 gallons of water, or for smaller quantities, 1 tablespoon of iron sulfate per

gallon of water. The horticulturists say soil applications are also effective in correcting chlorosis and will give a long-lasting and more permanent effect than sprays. However, the iron is slower in becoming available to the plants.

The horticulturists says chlorotic plants, two or three years old, except roses, can be treated with one pound of iron sulfate applied in a series of holes 6 to 10 inches deep scattered around the plant. These holes should not be closer than 18 inches to the main trunk. Use only one-half pound per plant for roses. Broadcast applications are also satisfactory if the iron sulfate is worked into the soil well. Regardless of the method of applying the iron sulfate to the soil, the areas treated should be thoroughly watered following treatment in order to obtain maximum results, he says.

Chelated iron which is a new stable form of iron can also be used at the rate of 20 to 30 pounds per acre to correct chlorosis, but at the present this material is too expensive for large scale use.

### Better Cattle Breeding Good Market Insurance

Importance of breeding better cattle as insurance against a buyers market is being stressed by the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association, according to Ed Heringa, Clayton, President. "We are urging cattlemen throughout New Mexico to exhibit livestock at state and county fairs this year, particularly in areas where there has been sufficient spotted rainfall to maintain stock in good condition," Heringa said.

Declaring the annual New Mexico State Fair as a proving ground for livestock bred and raised in New Mexico, Heringa continued: "Only through competitive judging of cattle from all parts of the state at a central location such as the State Fair can livestock producers determine whether or not their stock is meeting the current qualifications demanded by breeders and feeders.

"Under conditions such as the industry faces this year, only the breeders of premium type calves can expect to get the top market price this fall. During the sellers market such as the industry experienced in 1951, most any type calves brought good prices," Heringa said.

Cattle entries will be accepted by the State Fair through September 14th. Ivan Watson, Extension Animal Husbandman of State College, N. M. is superintendent of the cattle division of the fair this year.

"During the past 15 years the New Mexico State Fair Livestock show has grown into one of the most prominent southwestern exhibits, and special effort will need to be made by producers this year to maintain this record, because of unfavorable range conditions," according to Heringa.

**News and Views From Your Nation's Capitol**  
 By JOHN J. DEMPSEY  
 Congressman from New Mexico

WASHINGTON, Aug. 17.—The first session of the 83rd Congress, which did a fairly good job of cutting appropriations for the 1954 fiscal year, will not go down in history as otherwise having established an outstanding accomplishment record. It did set a record, however, for the amount of legislation troubles it left on the doorstep of the next session.

Whether the strategy of the majority leadership in bringing about early adjournment of the first session and leaving most controversial measures to be considered later is wise, has precipitated one of the sharpest arguments in Washington circles since the Eisenhower administration took office. The consensus appears to be that the majority leaders are taking a long-shot gamble on the hope that they may be able before the second session to hit upon some happy solution of the legislative problems they sidestepped.

Among the majority party platform ghosts that will continue to haunt them next session are reduction of income taxes, extension of social security coverage, legislation dealing with the farm problem, balancing of the budget and several others.

Political observers are predicting that the administration and the majority party leaders are confronted with a task that will be the make-or-break test of their ability the more difficult in view of the loss of Senator Taft as a policy-making wheelhorse.

That part of the administration's program which did get through Congress appears to be largely a continuation of the policies of the former administration. No radical change was effected. It is significant, too, that nonpartisanship prevailed to a greater extent than customary. Had this not been true the record made, even in reduction of appropriations, would not have been possible.

The American people generally are indicating that the record of the first session does not impress them. Honest appraisal of that record bears out their judgment.

**PROMPT POW PAYMENT**  
 It was gratifying to me to be able to get through legislation making immediately available funds to pay the 57,000 pending claims of World War II prisoners of war under terms of the Dempsey bill passed in the 82nd Congress. That measure provided for payment of \$1.50 a day for inhumane treatment and enforced labor in enemy prison camps which held 132,000 of our

boys. The money comes from former enemy funds held by the Allen Property Office.

This new law authorizes the Attorney General to make immediate transfer of up to \$75,000,000 of those funds to the War Claims Commission which had exhausted the available money heretofore transferred in payment of 60,000 of the claims filed. The WCC expects to resume sending out payments at once.

I have advised the WCC that I shall seek immediate action when Congress reconvenes in January on my bill to extend the deadline for filing claims from April 9, 1953, to a date in mid-1954. This will validate about 900 claims filed after the original deadline and give about 15,000 other former prisoners of war, who have not filed, an opportunity to do so. Some of those boys, it is known now, have also been prisoners of war in Korea and have been unable to file for the money the former enemy nations owe them. I have requested also that WCC earmark sufficient of the funds to pay all POW claims still outstanding.

There are about 4,000 former prisoners of war or their surviving dependents eligible for these payments in New Mexico, many of whom are still to be paid.

**N.M. NOT TREATED TOO BADLY**  
 New Mexico has come out better than far in its treatment by the 83rd Congress than appeared likely at the outset. Although the budget did not carry funds for further Middle Rio Grande channeling work, the House Appropriations Committee was prevailed upon to recommend \$1,580,889 for the Reclamation Bureau's program and Congress approved it. In addition \$300,000 for Middle Rio Grande flood control work continuation was provided. Appropriation for further work on the Yarmack project also was made, assuring completion on schedule. Some funds will be available also for continuation of a survey of the feasibility of the proposed San Juan-Chama transmountain diversion project.

The New Mexico delegation also obtained enactment of legislation which puts the Arch Huxley Conservancy District at Tucuman in a more secure financial position. The legislation postpones from 1954 until 1956 the start of repayment to the government of construction charges against the district of \$5,655,000 payable in the amount of \$141,000 annually. This enables the district to bring its development to the point where the payments can be met.

It places the district on a par with others whose contracts were made with the government just a few months later but were given payment deferment under the 1939 law passed in the meantime.


