

RAMBLIN' AROUND

Two bills regarding the disposition of land in the Fort Stanton Marine Hospital Reservation were introduced in the House of Representatives in July by Rep. Antonio Fernandez.

The bills were referred to the Committee on Interior and Insular Affairs.

Both bills appear to be detrimental to the interests of the State of New Mexico in the operation of its newly acquired hospital.

While they would convey to the State the hospital and its adjacent structures and facilities, they restrict the amount of land in no event to exceed one thousand five hundred acres.

That is only one-nineteenth of the amount of land that the Federal government used in its operation of the Marine Hospital. The total land involved is 27,727 acres. Why should the State be restricted in its operation to 1,500 acres? Why the limitation? In our opinion, the State can administer the range and timber and watershed in a far more efficient manner than any past or future Federal agency.

Section 3 of both bills provides alternative disposition of Fort Stanton Hospital and land not conveyed to the State:

"H. R. 6728, Sec. 3. The title to the remaining public lands and improvements thereon within the Fort Stanton Marine Hospital Reservation not disposed of under section 1 of this Act is declared to be in the public domain for disposition under the public land laws, and shall be turned over to and administered by the Department of the Interior in the same manner as other public lands in the public domain."

The companion bill, H. R. 6728, is similar to the other, except for Section 3, which reads: "Sec. 3. The title to the remaining public lands, and improvements thereon with the Fort Stanton Marine Hospital Reservation not disposed of under section 1 of this Act is declared to be in the United States in trust for the Mesquero Tribe of Indians, and shall be administered by the Secretary of the Interior for the benefit of the said Indians."

Full citizenship for all Indians should be granted in the near future. First, of course, must come the acknowledgment of just claims against the United States government, such as we are told the Mesqueros have. This could best be done by payment of damages in cash. Surely, with all the billions we spend abroad, a way can be found to scrape up the money to pay just claims of the American Indians, however and whenever they arose.

Printed elsewhere in the News are 11 constitutional amendments submitted to the people by the Twenty-first Legislature. They represent the best efforts of the current legislature and are intended to make needed revisions in the State's fundamental law. One of the amendments—No. 4—was introduced by Lincoln County's Representative L. S. Drake. Study the amendments carefully, then go to the polls and vote!

ENGINEER OUTLINES NEW WATER SYSTEM FOR CARRIZOZO

A picture of the requirements and cost of a new water distribution system for Carrizozo was given the Village Trustees at their regular meeting Tuesday night.

The outline was presented by Ashley Clason, engineer of El Paso. Mr. Clason and associates are familiar with Carrizozo's water situation, having made a previous survey two years ago. Tuesday night Mr. Clason brought with him a revised map showing the location of every water user and a system of mains and fire hydrants that will meet insurance underwriters' specifications.

Mr. Clason's preliminary survey, which he submitted subject to any changes that may be suggested by the trustees and utilities manager, Lloyd Topfitt, included:

1. Replacement of mains where necessary to give an average pressure over the town of 60 lbs.
2. Fire hydrants to give overlapping coverage.
3. An elevated reservoir.
4. A booster pump station.
5. An automatic chlorinator.
6. Elimination of dead-end mains wherever possible.

If the town continues to use its present source of water supply, Mr. Clason said an elevated reservoir of at least 50,000-gals capacity would be required, along with a booster pump station.

Should the town develop its own source of water through two or more wells, the elevated reservoir and booster station would not be needed. In its place would be a larger reservoir of perhaps 200,000 gallons capacity, situated on higher ground, with gravity feed.

The trustees were greatly interested in developing a source of well water for Carrizozo and instructed Mayor Roberts to contact a well driller regarding exploratory work in the vicinity southeast of Carrizozo which has been recommended by the State School of Mines in Socorro as a likely area to find good water. A tentative estimate on rebuilding Carrizozo's water system was given by Mr. Clason. He said the figure would be close to \$122,500. If the town decided to develop its own wells, there would be a further cost, including pumps, reservoir and mains, of approximately \$125,000.

He proposed that the cost be met through both general obligation bonds and revenue bonds. "It is very possible," he told the trustees, "that your State Treasurer will buy the bonds, at a rate of interest not to exceed 3%."

One point that Mr. Clason made that has an important bearing on any decision that the citizens of Carrizozo may make about their water system, is the matter of insurance rates. "You will find," he said, "as other communities have that brought their fire protection up to underwriters' standards, that insurance rates will be cut in half."

The Trustees will again consider the water problem at their next meeting, at which Mr. Clason agreed to be present.

Corona Schools Buy Government Houses

Five of the six government houses, built on the south end of town for the Corona Airport workers and never occupied, were recently purchased by Superintendent L. Parker for housing the faculty of Corona public schools.

"These houses are prefabricated, insulated, air-conditioned, and were built and furnished with stoves and refrigerators, ready for use. But conditions changed and plans for the Government's airport, 11 miles northwest of Corona, near Cedarvale, never materialized.

Only one of the six houses was used, that by the chief electronics technician in charge of the airport, O. E. Burns, and family. Mr. Burns was recently transferred to Roswell, and a Mr. Colwell from TorC is now in charge of the airport. He occupies the sixth house, and his family will move here in the near future.

The five houses were declared surplus property by the AAA and were turned over to the General Services Administration.

They were put up for bids—first to other Government agencies, and then to schools. Individuals would have been given a chance to bid, if the school had not wanted them.

The Corona schools were fortunate in securing these houses. Teachers now occupying them are Mr. and Mrs. J. S. Earle, Mr. and Mrs. Everett Dams, R. E. Boyd and family, J. O. Wilkon and family, and the Misses Julia and Dorothy Kerr.

In addition to the houses, the school also purchased the lots on which the houses stand, from Mr. and Mrs. Bill Bagley.

School Enrollment at Captain Is Up to Par

L. W. Clark, superintendent of the Captain schools, reports the enrollment total of 318, which is approximately the same as last year.

Enrollment in the Fort Stanton elementary school to date is 23. Miss Mary Davis, a graduate of Iowa University, is the teacher at Fort Stanton.

JOHNNY'S ENEMIES SHY A CANDIDATE

SANTA FE, Sept. 2—The crowd gunning for Land Commissioner Johnny Walker in next spring's primary has had considerable success in getting recruits, but none at all in developing a candidate.

The opposition to the strong-willed official is considerable. Included is almost the whole Democratic organization in Albuquerque and important Democratic groups in Rio Arriba, Sandoval, Mora and San Miguel.

The whole trouble concerns Walker's hiring policy. For a long time the land office had been a catch-all for party figures needing a job. Walker turned them but and took on a new crowd. He's apparently gambling that his politics can out-politic the old ones who were out loose.

Among those he's taken on are Barbara Sena, sister of Sen. Dennis Chavez, at \$300 a month; Charlie Roehl, long-time Albuquerque political figure, as a statistician at \$275, and half a dozen former county Democratic chairmen.

The land commissioner lost his first tussle with the enemy when he tried to put his friend Dick Bokum of Santa Fe in as State chairman. Bokum lost and Walker made some more trouble for himself by firing a couple of his payrollers who hadn't backed the Bokum move like he thought they should. They were Charlie Bassett, father of Secretary of State Demarco Roach, and Fred Lant, Demo chairman of Catron county.

The anti-Walker Demos are boasting about what they're going to do to the commissioner in the primary, but they are still scratching their heads about who they're going to do it with. Guy Shepard, who preceded Walker in the job, is getting more attention than any other for the run, but there is no agreement on him and no certainty that he would be willing to take the chance.

The man they would like the most, but don't have much chance of getting is Tuffy Holder, the State school budget auditor. Holder won't even discuss the subject so far.

Tuffy could have had the nomination last year, in all likelihood, if he had listened to Guy Shepard and a lot of others who wanted him to run. He got tight up to the edge and then pulled back because his school people pals wanted to keep him in the school job.

Jimmy Farmer of Tucuman has been telling for some time that he will run against Walker but the political crowd hasn't taken it very seriously. They know they will need a heavy weight to get the job done.

**Carrizozo Eligible for Federal Building**

In a press dispatch from Washington, D. C., last week, Carrizozo was named among 33 New Mexico towns listed by the House Public Works Committee as being eligible for construction of Federal buildings.

Cost of the Federal buildings was estimated at about \$20 million. About half of that sum would be spent in Albuquerque; Roswell, \$1,670,000, and Santa Fe, \$1,460,000.

Carrizozo was next with a cost of \$705,000, then came Hobbs with \$575,000 and Raton with \$310,000.

Others, all under \$300,000 were Anthony, Artesia, Aztec, Bayard, Belen, Carrizozo, Clayton, Dexter, Espanola, Eunice, Farmington, Fort Sumner, Grants, Hagerman, Hatch, Holloman, Hurley, Jal, Lordsburg, Lovington, Mesilla Park, Mountainair, Santa Rosa, Socorro, Springer, Taos and Tucumcari.







Mr. Meigs is also interested in the architecture of old buildings and homes. At the present time he is working on an interesting project—that is moving and restoring the old Dow house in Lincoln. In his words, "The Dow house is a fine example of Western Colonial architecture. Its ceilings and trim were the western adaptation of the Federal period." When restored the old house will become a part of Mr. Meigs' home which is located across the river from the Peter Hurd ranch.

**Prof. Edgel Analyzes Possibility of N. M. Business Recession**

How long will the present high level of business activity last? When will it break and how bad will be the much-feared aftermath?

Those are the questions bothering businessmen right now, says Prof. Ralph L. Edgel, writing in New Mexico Business, publication of the University of New Mexico Bureau of Business Research.

Edgel says the picture for New Mexico is not at all rosy. Ranchers and farmers are already experiencing a good taste of a depression in the double form of a drought coupled with falling prices.

Other conditions which Edgel found are causing furrowed foreheads include:

The sellers' market which has prevailed since 1942 is threatening to become a buyers' market.

The postwar rise in prices seems to have petered out and inflation has apparently lost its impetus.

The construction boom, which has been the backbone of New Mexico prosperity, has all but lost its drive.

Government employment in the state, which has been the sidekick of construction in holding up the high business level, may be on the verge of dropping off because of the drive for economy in federal expenditures.

These conditions, Edgel writes, have caused many a person to look into his crystal ball and predict a repetition of the great depression—and soon.

Right here, the UNM business economist steps in with the reassuring statement that if a recession comes it shouldn't be as bad as the 1930 affair.

Edgel lists his reasons why a rehash of the 1930 depression is unlikely:

New Mexico has not only more than doubled its population since 1940 but the employed people of the state are busy making a living in many diverse occupations—with their eggs in many baskets, so to speak.

Only 78.8 per cent of the state's labor force was employed at jobs other than on public emergency work in 1940. By 1950, more than 84 per cent was so employed. Total jobs jumped from 140,300 in 1940 to 206,000 in 1950—and 233,000 in 1953.

Fewer people are working on farms and ranches, a lot more persons are employed by the government, more are working for wages, and many more are now in finance, transportation, trade

**To Open Special Areas For Deer Hunting**

Special areas will be opened up this year to hunting for the purpose of better game management. The Mt. Taylor area which has been closed since 1946, will be opened to buck deer only, no turkeys may be taken on Mt. Taylor. The Upper Pecos area will be open to the first 500 men checking in through the checking station on a first come first served basis. One deer of either sex during the regular hunting season. Burns Canyon will be opened to deer of either sex. Turkey Mountain will be opened for taking of 200 animals, first come first served. A deer of either sex. Parts of Colfax County were declared a problem area, overpopulation of deer, the Commission set the ruling that one deer of either sex may be taken in the regular big game season November 7 through November 24 allowing an additional 6 days.

The publication of the regulations will be within the next few days and the exact areas will be given at that time.

**Long Antelope Season**

The State Game Commission today approved the antelope

and other services than in 1940. The average person's income in New Mexico now is far above his annual salary in 1940. Per capita income in 1940 was only \$350 compared to \$1,301 in 1951. The average income for 1953 is still higher.

Better incomes have meant more buying power and a much bigger variety of goods from which to choose.

Changing customers and changing markets in New Mexico have brought about a changed economy. The state's economy, which was largely based in former years on agriculture, mining and lumbering, has turned to a great extent to manufacturing, banking and professional service and trade for its substantial base.

Edgel concludes that none of the changes in the national and state economy mean we are depression-proof. But the changes do mean that any future business recession will be different in character from the great depression of the 30's.

And if the recession comes, we are better prepared to deal with it. The formidable machinery of government, Edgel states, will be set in motion at once, regardless of the party in power. Many of the government weapons against depression are new in the last 20 years, and have not been field-tested against a real recession.

**Extend Fishing Season To November 5th**

The State Game Commission also took action upon a suggestion by one of the Commissioners, as well as the fisheries biologists of the State Game Department, and extended the general trout fishing season to November 18, carrying it through the big game season for this year.

This is an 18 day extension to the regular season. It is contemplated in this extension that a number of the big browns will be taken during that time, inasmuch as the spawning begins approximately November 1, for them.

**State Game Hunter Works in Gallinas Area**

J. E. Barker, assistant district agent of the State Fish and Wildlife Service, informed the News in Carrizozo recently that Thos. W. James, state predatory animal hunter, is now working in the area of the Gallinas Ranger Station. He is exterminating coyotes and bobcats.

Mr. Barker said he would be interested in hearing from any ranchers in the County who are having losses due to predatory animals. His address is Box 5661, Roswell.

**Chicago Motor Club Says 'No Discrimination Against Highway 54'**

Dear "54 Member": This letter is in reply to the many letters and telephone calls received here at the National Office—these are complaints to the effect that the Chicago Motor Club has been diverting traffic from Highway 54 through Kansas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Texas because of dust storms and their hazard for the traveler. We contacted the Chicago Motor Club, and I quote a part of their reply:

"I was very much surprised to receive your letter in which you refer to a recommendation allegedly made by the Chicago Motor Club to avoid US-54 West because of the dust storms. I can assure you that we have not issued instructions to our touring personnel to avoid the use of US-54 due to this condition, as we well realize that dust storms are only temporary hazards and may occur on any one of several highways in a given area. Please assure your membership that the Chicago Motor Club, has, in no way, been responsible for this rumor."

SILVER CITY, Aug. 25. — Al Johnson, head football coach at New Mexico Western College will greet 12 lettermen at the Mustang's opening drills Sept. 1. The coach will also have an influx of over twenty outstanding high

White was also named to the Little All-American squad in 1951 when he set an all-time ground gaining record. **NAM President Sees  
Bright Future for N. M.**  
National Association of Manufacturers President Charles E. Sligh Jr., who recently concluded a tour of the Pacific Southwest—Southern California, Arizona and New Mexico—termed these states "the area of the Nation with the brightest prospects." Mr. Sligh made speeches in Long Beach and San Diego, California and also in Albuquerque, where he brought a state-by-state analysis under the title of "After Korea—Jobs, Freedom and Opportunity."

He outlined how since 1947 California has had more than a 54 percent increase in values added by manufactures, as compared with the national average of only 37 percent; Arizona, 51 percent; New Mexico, 119 percent. "In the ratio indicated by such figures, we can see that this area better than any other, is prepared to cushion the readjustment which, of course, must follow the Korean armistice," said Sligh. **A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 9, SECTION 12 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO MUNICIPAL INDEBTEDNESS AND RELATING TO QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTERS IN ANY MUNICIPAL ELECTION WHEREIN MUNICIPAL DEBTS ARE INCURRED, AND TO ELIMINATE THE PROVISION THEREOF REQUIRING THAT THE ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF INCURRING INDEBTEDNESS BE HELD AT A REGULAR ELECTION FOR COUNCILMEN, ALDERMEN, OR OTHER OFFICERS OF SUCH CITY, TOWN OR VILLAGE.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 9, Section 12 of the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows:  
 No city, town or village shall contract any debt except by an ordinance, which shall be irrevocable until the indebtedness therein provided for shall have been fully paid or discharged, and which shall specify the purposes to which the funds to be raised shall be applied, and which shall provide for the levy of a tax, not exceeding twelve mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within such city, town or village, sufficient to pay the interest on, and to extinguish the principal of, such debt within fifty years. The proceeds of such tax shall be applied only to the payment of such interest and principal. No such debt shall be created unless the question of incurring the same shall have been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors thereof as have paid a property tax therein, or shall have been exempt from the payment of such property tax during the preceding year, and a majority of those voting on the question by ballot deposited in a separate ballot box, shall have voted in favor of creating such debt.

WHEREAS, the income derived by the State from the continual severance of natural resources is being completely consumed without replacement of compensatory value; and  
 WHEREAS, it is essential to the preservation of the wealth of this State, that a permanent trust fund be created, through the medium of the preservation of a portion of the taxation derived on the severance of such natural resources, to replace the natural wealth of this State now being depleted;

NOW, THEREFORE,  
 BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:  
 Section 1. That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Mexico is hereby proposed to be added as Section 8 of Article VIII:  
 Section 8. There is hereby created a permanent investment or trust fund to be maintained by the State Treasurer of the State of New Mexico to be known as "THE NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND."  
 Each fiscal year the revenues and proceeds, except as herein provided, from a severance tax or other taxes, levies or excises (except ad valorem taxes, sales taxes, income taxes, or taxes under the emergency school tax act) on the severance, production, mining, processing or transporting of all mineral, natural resources and forest products severed and saved, or derived from the soil of this state over and above and in the amount they exceed, for said fiscal year, prior pledges from such severance tax, including such pledges of said tax, as may be contained in the acts of the Twenty-first Legislature, and over and above and in the amount they exceed, for said fiscal year, the further sum of Four Million, Seven Hundred

Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$4,750,000.00), shall be covered into the "NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND." Said amount of \$4,750,000.00 of said annual revenues and proceeds for each fiscal year, less such administrative deductions, as may be provided by the Legislature, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature.  
 Monies placed in the "THE NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND" shall be invested by the State Treasurer in bonds of the United States, of the State of New Mexico, of cities, towns, counties, or school districts, of the State of New Mexico, or of institutions of the State of New Mexico. The Legislature may, by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house, provide that such funds may be invested in other interest bearing securities. All investment of monies in this fund shall be first approved by the Governor, the Attorney General and the State Treasurer. The Corpus of said fund shall remain intact; only the income therefrom shall be used. Such income may be appropriated and the receipt thereof anticipated and appropriated by the Legislature as it may direct from time to time for the purpose of acquiring sites, the construction, remodeling or

alteration of buildings, offices and facilities for the state government, state, correctional, penal and reformatory institutions, state hospitals, buildings and improvements for state educational institutions (except common schools), for the construction, improvement and maintenance of highways and bridges and for the construction and maintenance of other public improvements.

**N. M. Bankers to Make Conservation Awards**

September is Soil Conservation month in New Mexico. During the month the New Mexico Bankers Association will recognize the soil and water achievements of numerous farmers and ranchers in the State by a presentation of special conservation achievement awards.

The New Mexico Bankers Association recognizes soil conservation as a major problem in our state," says Charles K. Johnson, Arterian, chairman of the Association Agriculture Committee. "Our organization is anxious to assist the program in every possible manner. That is why we plan to make the conservation awards."

The achievement award program was started in 1951 when seven cooperators of the Carlsbad Conservation District were honored at a program in Carlsbad.

The awards will be made in cooperation with the New Mexico Association of Soil Conservation Districts. Certificates of merit will be awarded to farmers and ranchers who have completed 90% of their over-all planned soil and water conservation program, who are using the land to the best of its capability, whose farm plan provides for adequate treatment of the land who have applied suitable practices, and who are maintaining the applied practices.

The awards will be made during special ceremonies where five or more farmers and ranchers in a district or a group of adjacent districts are eligible.

**Does Your Orchard Need Nitrogen?**

Early fall is a good time to check your orchard's need for nitrogen next year. Keeping the amount of bloom, the set of fruit, and the weather conditions fresh in your mind, take a look at the trees in your orchard to see if they are suffering from lack of nitrogen.

If the bloom and pollination were good this year, but the crop is poor—look at the color and size of the tree leaves and at the amount of terminal growth. Symptoms which are commonly associated with nitrogen deficiency are yellow-green leaf color, small size of new leaves, veins and petioles showing a reddish pigmentation, leaves which assume an upright position and petioles which form narrow angles with the stem; current growth of the stems and twigs short and slender, and roots that are slender with a yellowing cortex on the new growth. Good terminal growth and a dark green leaf color indicate that your fertilizer program is paying dividends.

The amount of nitrogen-carrying fertilizer to use for fruit trees depends upon the kind of fertilizer, the age and vigor of the trees, the fertility of the soil and the cultural practices employed. Trees in soil, as a rule, have to be fertilized more heavily than those under clean cultivation. For mature apple trees growing in the soil, the general practice is to use about 1 lb. of 2-1-1 fertilizer for each year of age of the tree. This rule should not be too rigidly enforced.

The exact quantity to be used in each case must be determined by the grower on the basis of his experience. Devitalized trees may require more fertilizer, whereas vigorous trees will require less or no fertilizer. Check your orchard today so that you will be able to compute the fertilizer needs for next year. And, if you need additional information, stop in at the Lincoln County Extension Office.

**NEW LIVESTOCK LOAN SERVICE**

New Mexico ranchers and farmers who have been hard hit by the drought and need help in solving their credit problems may apply for loans under the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture's new livestock loan program. Applications should be made to the Farmers Home Administration office in the area where the farm or ranch is located.

Loans are only for established producers and feeders of cattle, sheep and goats; for applications from those unable to get suitable credit elsewhere, who have good records of operation, and a reasonable chance to succeed.

Funds may be used to buy or produce feed, pay for grazing permits; rent farm buildings, pasture and feed crop land; replace hire or repair farm machinery and equipment; build and repair fences, move livestock to and from grazing places; repair and improve livestock and domestic water supplies; pay essential living expenses, cost of maintaining farm and ranch buildings, and other operating expenses.

The program runs until July 1955, and loans are repayable over periods up to three years at 5% interest.

**Wild Mustard May Cause Stock Poisoning**

There have been at least two recent cases of stock poisoning caused from a wild mustard (commonly called pepper grass). This plant causes partial or total blindness, walking into objects or in circles. Animals are unable to eat or drink; hence the common name, "paralyzed tongue." Affected animals begin to show dullness, loss of flesh, weakness, and become drawn and very thin in a short time.

Poisoning occurs about the time plants come into bloom and usually ceases when the pods mature and the plant becomes tough and fibrous.

This plant is very common and scattered plants may be found practically anywhere in the county at different times of the season. At present it is in bloom in the higher country rather common above 5500 feet.

There are several species of plants which may produce mustard oil glucoside poisoning; however, the one which is causing the trouble now has small white flowers in rather small heads, very narrow leaves, and this plant may grow from a few inches to a foot and a half high. Each flower has four small petals forming a cross; hence the family name of this group of plants — "Cruciferae", meaning cross in Greek.

Most affected animals can be saved with proper care.

Treatment consists of forced watering the animals two or three times a day and if the animals are slow in recovering sufficiently to eat or drink, it is advisable to add some nourishment such as cottonseed meal to the water.

If you have animals with the described symptoms and are unable to identify the plant, check with us at the Soil Conservation Service office in Carlsbad.

**Jr. Gardeners Should Start Planning Exhibits For Achievement Day**

With Lincoln County Achievement Day "Just around the corner," County Agent Ralph Dunlap reminds junior gardeners in the county who will have choice tomatoes, beets, cabbages, and other vegetables ready by exhibit time, they should begin now to plan to exhibit them.

Selecting vegetables to be exhibited at the fair in competition with other vegetables, the County Agent says, is the same as selecting dairy cows, chickens, or other animals for showing. The best individuals or specimens are selected and shown. With vegetables, careful selection is not always practiced.

Mr. Dunlap offers the following suggestions for selecting exhibits:

"Specimens must be uniform in size, shape and color. They must be properly labeled, true to variety name, and free from insect or disease blemish; they must have good eye appeal; be clean, and have that 'freshly packed' look.

"In selecting the vegetables to be shown, the exhibitor should put himself in the position of the judge. The exhibitor will then be more likely to select a prize-winning vegetable.

"Monstrosities should be left at home. An agricultural exhibit at a fair is not a sideshow." The proper size for vegetables which are to be shown is average size.

Premium books listing exhibits to be shown at the Lincoln County Achievement Day, may be had at the County Agent's office in Carlsbad. "Read the list carefully," Mr. Dunlap says, "and then follow the rules and regulations."



### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 1 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 8

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 9, SECTION 12 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION, RELATING TO MUNICIPAL INDEBTEDNESS AND RELATING TO QUALIFICATIONS FOR VOTERS IN ANY MUNICIPAL ELECTION WHEREIN MUNICIPAL DEBTS ARE INCURRED, AND TO ELIMINATE THE PROVISION THEREOF REQUIRING THAT THE ELECTION ON THE QUESTION OF INCURRING INDEBTEDNESS BE HELD AT A REGULAR ELECTION FOR COUNCILMEN, ALDERMEN, OR OTHER OFFICERS OF SUCH CITY, TOWN OR VILLAGE.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 9, Section 12 of the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows:

No city, town or village shall contract any debt except by an ordinance, which shall be irrevocable until the indebtedness therein provided for shall have been fully paid or discharged, and which shall specify the purposes to which the funds to be raised shall be applied and which shall provide for the levy of a tax, not exceeding twelve mills on the dollar upon all taxable property within such city, town or village, sufficient to pay the interest on, and to extinguish the principal of, such debt within fifty years. The proceeds of such tax shall be applied only to the payment of such interest and principal. No such debt shall be created unless the question of incurring the same shall have been submitted to a vote of such qualified electors thereof as have paid a property tax therein, or shall have been exempt from the payment of such property tax, during the preceding year, and a majority of those voting on the question by ballot deposited in a separate ballot box, shall have voted in favor of creating such debt.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election, or at any special election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose, whichever is held first.

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 1, ARTICLE 21 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO IN ORDER TO ELIMINATE THE PROVISIONS THEREOF PROHIBITING THE SALE, BARTER OR GIVING OF INTOXICATING LIQUORS TO INDIANS AND THE INTRODUCTION OF SUCH LIQUORS INTO INDIAN COUNTRY.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Section 1, Article 21 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended to read as follows:  
Religious toleration—Polygamy—Perfect toleration of religious sentiment shall be secured, and no inhabitant of this State shall ever be molested in person or property on account of his or her mode of religious worship. Polygamous or plural marriages and polygamous cohabitation are forever prohibited.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this Resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next general election or at any special election held previous to the said general election.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 3 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 13

Introduced by: Senators Calvin Berk, T. E. Lusk and Benjamin Espinosa

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 4, SECTION 22 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, BY INCREASING THE NUMBER OF DAYS IN WHICH THE GOVERNOR MAY APPROVE BILLS AFTER THE ADJOURNMENT OF THE LEGISLATURE.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 4, Section 22 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

22 of the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows:

Every bill passed by the legislature shall, before it becomes a law, be presented to the Governor for approval. If he approves, he shall sign it, and deposit it with the Secretary of State; otherwise, he shall return it to the house in which it originated, with his objections, which shall be entered at large upon the journal; and such bill shall not become a law unless thereafter approved by two-thirds of the members present and voting in each house by yeas and nays voted entered upon its journal. Any bill not returned by the Governor within three days, Sundays excepted, after being presented to him, shall become a law, whether signed by him or not, unless the legislature by adjournment prevent such return. Every bill presented to the Governor during the last three days of the session shall be approved by him within twenty days after the adjournment and shall be by him immediately deposited with the Secretary of State. Unless so approved and signed by him such bill shall not become a law. The Governor may in like manner approve or disapprove any part or parts, item or items, of any bill appropriating money, and such parts or items approved shall become a law, and such as are disapproved shall be void unless passed over his veto, as herein provided.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the General Election held in November, 1954 or at any Special Election prior to that date which may be called for such purpose.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 4 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 1

Introduced by: L. E. Drake

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4, SECTION 4 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION, PROVIDING FOR THE APPOINTMENT OF PERSONS TO FILL VACANCIES OCCURRING IN THE LEGISLATURE AND PROVIDING THE PROCEDURE TO BE FOLLOWED IN FILLING SUCH VACANCIES.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. Article 4, Section 4 of the New Mexico Constitution is hereby amended to read as follows:

Members of the Legislature shall be elected as follows: Senators for the term of four years, and members of the house of representatives for the term of two years. They shall be elected on the day provided by law for holding the general election of state officers or representatives in congress. If a vacancy occurs in the office of Senator or member of the House of Representatives, for any reason, the County Commissioners of the county wherein the vacancy occurs shall fill such vacancy by appointment; provided, however, that if a vacancy occurs in a Legislative District composed of more than one (1) county, then the County Commissioners of each County in the Legislative District shall submit one (1) name to the Governor, who shall appoint the representative to fill such vacancy from the list of names so submitted by the respective County Commissioners.

Such legislative appointments as provided in this section shall be for a term ending on December 31, subsequent to the next succeeding general election.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this Resolution proposing the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next regular or special election held in the State after the adjournment of this Legislature.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 5 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 10

Introduced by: Senator Henry L. Koger

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING TO AMEND ARTICLE 4, SECTION 10 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, RELATING TO COMPENSATION OF LEGISLATORS.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 4, Section 10 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

Each member of the legislature shall receive as per diem expense the sum of not more than twenty dollars for each day's attendance during each session and ten cents for each mile traveled in going to and returning from the seat of the government by the usual traveled route, once each session as defined by Section 5, Article 4 of this Constitution; and he shall receive no other compensation, perquisite or allowance.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next General Election or at any Special Election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 6 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 18

Introduced by: Senator Guido Zecca

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 8, SECTION 5, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO, RELATING TO EXEMPTIONS FOR HEADS OF FAMILIES AND VETERANS.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That Article 8, Section 5, of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be and it hereby is amended to read as follows:

Section 5. (Exemptions for heads of families and veterans.)—The legislature may exempt from taxation property of each head of the family to the amount of two hundred dollars (\$200) and the property, including the community or joint property of husband and wife, of every honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States who served in such armed forces during any period in which they were or are engaged in armed conflict under orders of the President of the United States, and the widow of every such honorably discharged member of the armed forces of the United States, in the sum of two thousand dollars (\$2000). Provided, that in every case where exemption is claimed on the ground of the claimant's having served with the armed forces of the United States as aforesaid, the burden of proving actual and bona fide ownership of such property upon which exemption is claimed, shall be upon the claimant.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of the foregoing amendment, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next regular or special election held in the State after the adjournment of this Legislature.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 7 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO HOUSE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 5

A JOINT RESOLUTION

**PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 4 SECTION 5 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION TO REQUIRE ANNUAL SESSIONS OF THE LEGISLATURE AND TO LIMIT SUBJECTS FOR CONSIDERATION AT EVEN YEAR SESSIONS.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 4 Section 5 of the New Mexico Constitution to read as follows:

(a) Each session of the legislature shall begin annually at 12:00 noon on the second Tuesday of January. Each odd-year session shall not exceed ninety days and each even-year session shall not exceed thirty days. No special session of the legislature shall exceed thirty days.

(b) The regular even-year session will undertake as its regular order of business the following in the order given:

(1) Budgets, appropriations, revenue bills.  
(2) Bills correcting or amending legislation enacted in the previous regular odd-year session.  
(3) Consideration of bills ordered prepared by the regular odd-year session.  
(4) Bills drawn in reference to special message of the governor.  
(5) Reconsideration of bills of the previous regular odd-year session vetoed by the governor.  
(6) Hearing interim committee reports.

(c) The provisions pertaining to per diem allowance of each member of the legislature during the regular session shall be applicable to attendance of the legislature during both the even year and odd year sessions or any special session.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in November, 1954 or at any special election held previous to the general election.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 8 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 15

Introduced by: James A. Forland, Hugh Horne, Donald Hallam, Paul W. Robinson, Mansford W. Rainwater

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 6, SECTION 11 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO RELATING TO SALARIES OF JUSTICES OF THE SUPREME COURT OF NEW MEXICO AND PROVIDING THAT THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT BE SUBMITTED TO THE PEOPLE AT THE NEXT GENERAL OR SPECIAL ELECTION.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That it is hereby proposed by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico that Section 11, Article 6, of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico be amended by the people of said State so as to read as, to-wit:

11. (Supreme Court Justices, Salary.)—The Justices of the Supreme Court shall each receive such salary as may hereafter be fixed by law.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the General Election held in November, 1954, or at any Special Election prior to that date which may be called for such purpose.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 9 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 16

Introduced by: Donald Hallam, Lawrence A. Chavez, James A. Forland, Mansford W. Rainwater, Paul W. Robinson

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 6 SECTION 17 OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO RELATING TO SALARIES OF JUDGES OF THE DISTRICT COURTS.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article 6 Section 17 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

The Legislature shall provide by law for the compensation of the judges of the district court.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in November, 1954 or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for such purpose.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 10 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 3

Introduced by: Senators Murray E. Morgan and Guido Zecca

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE 7 SECTION 4 OF THE NEW MEXICO CONSTITUTION RELATING TO RESIDENCE BY ADDING A PROVISION AUTHORIZING THE LEGISLATURE TO PROVIDE FOR THE VOTING OF QUALIFIED ELECTORS ABSENT FROM THEIR PLACE OF RESIDENCE.**

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. It is hereby proposed by the Legislature of the State of New Mexico that Article 7 Section 4 of the New Mexico Constitution be amended to read as follows:

No person shall be deemed to have acquired or lost residence by reason of his presence or absence while employed in the service of the United States or of the state, nor while a student at any school. The legislature may enact laws providing for the voting of qualified electors who cannot be physically present at their polling places on the day of any election.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior to the date which may be called for such purpose.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT No. 11 TWENTY-FIRST LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION No. 12

Introduced by: Special Message from Sen. Edwin L. Madson

**A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO**

**PROVIDING FOR THE CREATION OF A PERMANENT TRUST FUND DERIVED FROM SEVERANCE TAXES ON NATURAL RESOURCES; PROVIDING FOR POWER TO APPROPRIATE THE INCOME THEREFROM, PROVIDING FOR THE DISPOSITION OF THE PROCEEDS OF CERTAIN TAXES, PROVIDING FOR THE INVESTMENT AND APPROPRIATION OF PORTIONS OF SUCH PROCEEDS, AND PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION OF THE AMENDMENT TO A GENERAL OR SPECIAL ELECTION.**

WHEREAS, the income derived by the State from the continual severance of natural resources is being completely consumed without replacement of compensatory value; and

WHEREAS, it is essential to the preservation of the wealth of this State, that a permanent trust fund be created, through the medium of the preservation of a portion of the taxation derived on the severance of such natural resources, to replace the natural wealth of this State now being depleted;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. That the following amendment to the Constitution of the State of New Mexico is hereby proposed to be added as Section 8 of Article VIII:

Section 8. There is hereby created a permanent investment or trust fund to be maintained by the State Treasurer of the State of New Mexico to be known as "THE NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND."

Each fiscal year the revenues and proceeds, except as herein provided, from a severance tax or other taxes, levies or excises (except ad valorem taxes, sales taxes, income taxes, or taxes under the emergency school tax act) on the severance, production, mining, processing or transporting of all mineral, natural resources and forest products severed and saved, or derived from the soil of this state over and above and in the amount they exceed, for said fiscal year, prior pledges from such severance tax including such pledges of said tax, as may be contained in the acts of the Twenty-first Legislature, and over and above and in the amount they exceed, for said fiscal year, the further sum of Four Million, Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$4,750,000.00), shall be covered into the "NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND." Said amount of \$4,750,000.00 of said annual revenues and proceeds for each fiscal year, less such administrative deductions, as may be provided by the Legislature, shall be subject to appropriation by the Legislature.

Monies placed in "THE NATURAL RESOURCES INVESTMENT FUND" shall be invested by the State Treasurer in bonds of the United States, of the State of New Mexico, of cities, towns, counties, or school districts, of the State of New Mexico, or of institutions of the State of New Mexico. The Legislature may, by a three-fourths vote of the members elected to each house, provide that such funds may be invested in other interest bearing securities. All investment of monies in this fund shall be first approved by the Governor, the Attorney General and the State Treasurer. The corpus of said fund shall remain intact; only the income therefrom shall be used. Such income may be appropriated and the receipt thereof anticipated and appropriated by the Legislature as it may direct from time to time for the purpose of acquiring sites, the construction, remodeling or alteration of buildings, offices and facilities for the state government, state correctional, penal and reformatory institutions, state hospitals, buildings and improvements for state educational institutions (except common schools), for the construction, improvement and maintenance of highways and bridges and for the construction and maintenance of other public improvements.


Provided, however, nothing contained herein shall be construed to include, prevent, or affect a levy of any tax, now or hereafter provided by law, of not to exceed one-quarter of one per centum (1/4 of 1%) of the gross value of any natural resources product, mined, severed, or extracted from the soil of the state, the proceeds of which are used exclusively for the research, regulation, control and supervision of the development of such natural product and for its conservation.

Section 2. In the event of the passage and approval of this joint resolution, the same shall be submitted to the people at the next general election or at a special election held prior to such time.

next general election or at a special election held prior to such time for the purpose of voting on constitutional amendments. The provisions of this amendment, if adopted, shall take effect on January 1st at 7:00 A. M. of the first January following its adoption.

**Soil Conservation Bring New Terms to Use** The soil conservation movement and soil conservation districts have brought into everyday use terms that are not always readily understood by many who have an interest in the land but are not directly associated with it. Some of the common terms are:

**Land Leveling**—not just smoothing of the land surface but the altering of the topography by moving earth to a planned grade for the efficient use of irrigation water without erosion or other damage.

**Cover Crops**—the growing of crops, usually legumes, for soil protection and improvement. These crops are not usually harvested but are turned back into the land.

**Residue Management**—the use of crop residue, animal manures or other materials for soil protection and improvement.

**Conservation Irrigation Systems**—all parts of the water application system including ditches, turnouts, ditch checks, erosion control structures, etc.

**Irrigation Water Management**—after the land is leveled and the irrigation system is in, the term refers to the application of the right amount of water at the right time in accordance with the needs of the crop.

**Rotation Hay and Pasture**—alfalfa or grasses or mixtures of these usually grown in rotation with cotton or other crops.

**Conservation Surveys**—a soils map or soils inventory in which the land is classified on the basis of land use, soil units, land capabilities and conserva-

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
