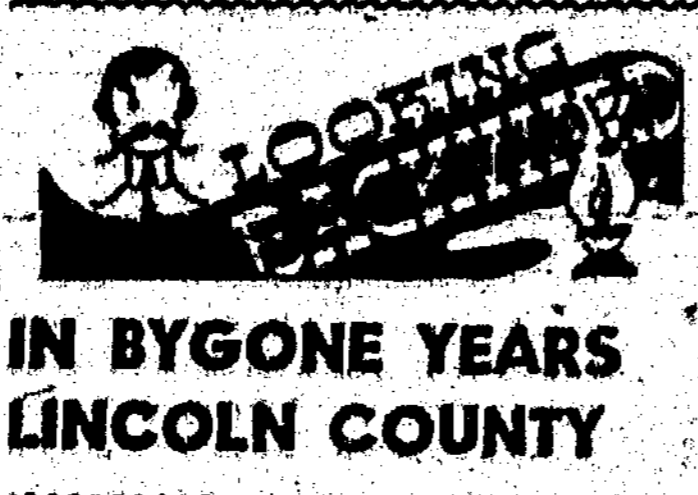

Author Tells Story of Battle for Tarawa

A special Tenth Anniversary Edition of Robert Sherrod's memorable "Tarawa—The Story of a Battle" will be published during the month of April as a practical tribute to those gallant Marines who lost their lives there. The anniversary edition will pay the foundation for a fund with which the Second Marine Division Association will finance college education for deserving sons and daughters of the Division's heroic dead. According to Brigadier General David M. Shoup, who won the Medal of Honor on Tarawa, a portion of the price of every book sold will be earmarked specifically for that purpose. Additional direct contributions to the fund will be accepted and placed one hundred per cent to the credit of the fund. Plans for management of the fund already are being worked out.

John Cole, whose home has been at San Paatrico, has been appointed sheriff of Lincoln County by Gov. McDonald. Mr. Cole arrived Tuesday, took the oath of office and the county is now no longer without a sheriff.

Four prisoners who were confined in the county jail escaped from the jail Sunday evening without notice to Jailer Burnett of their intentions. Two of the four prisoners still at large, had penitentiary sentences hanging over them.

Sidney Wilcoxon died at the I-X Ranch and was buried in the private cemetery near there. The deceased had lived in the county many years. He served in the Southern Confederacy thru-out the Civil War and wore with

William R. Rodgers Lands on Iwo Jima

(By the Far East FTHNC)
Marine Pfc. William R. Rodgers, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Rodgers of Ancho, landed on Iwo Jima with the Third Marine Division during the recent "Operation Flag Holes."

Nine years and a month after the first landing, the Marines came through the surf and dug out a beachhead in the familiar volcanic ash, amid the ruins of World War II. They powered their way inland, directing their attacks against an "enemy" force, acted out realistically by the Second Battalion, Fourth Marines, who had spent a month digging in for the "battle."

Following successful completion of the mission—to seize, occupy and defend Iwo Jima—memorial services were held for the more than 4000 marines and sailors who gave their lives in 1945 to take the island for use as an American airbase.

Memorial Ass'n Buys White Oaks School

At the monthly school board meeting last Thursday night the Carrizozo Municipal Board of Education voted to accept the bid of the White Oaks Memorial Association for the school building in that community.

The association agreed to pay the advertising costs and the sum of one dollar; also to assume any costs connected with furnishing a warranty deed for the property.

The board is following a policy of placing such properties, wherever possible, in the hands of some community group where it will be perpetuated for the common good. It was felt that this end was emphatically served in the case of the White Oaks community.

The school board also voted to maintain a summer school open to all high school children of the school district. Tuition expenses will be ten dollars per child. This sum is charged in order to defray the expenses of a teacher inasmuch as there would not be sufficient funds otherwise to defray the costs.

Carrizozo Marine Training for Combat

CAMP PENDLETON, CALIF. (FTHNC) — Marine Pfc. Erlendo Valles, son of Mr. and Mrs. Frank Valles of Carrizozo, is undergoing four weeks of individual combat training at this Marine Corps training base.

The combat training is normally given to all Marines upon completion of recruit training before they are assigned to a duty station or school and also to men scheduled for overseas duty.

The trainees learn that all Marines are basically infantrymen whether they serve as cooks, typists, truck drivers, or with an aviation unit.

The course of instruction includes infantry tactics, advanced schooling in weapons, first aid, demolition, and field fortifications.

STATE GAME DEPARTMENT NEWSLETTER

Congratulatory notes are coming in from all over the State, pertaining to the lengthening of the deer season and the change in hunting hours. The most recent notes are from the De Baca County G.P.A. and the Curry County G.P.A. The State Game Commission set the big game season for November 6 to November 21, which is much longer than previous hunting seasons. Also, the noon opening was knocked out. The season will open one half hour before sunrise. Daily hours are from one half hour before sunrise to one half hour after sunset.

A. Garner, project leader under the water-development program of the New Mexico Department of game and fish, stated today that the agreement has been signed by both parties in the White Sands Game Department water-development area. The department now has the go-ahead to retain and maintain permanent water units consisting of windmills and springs.

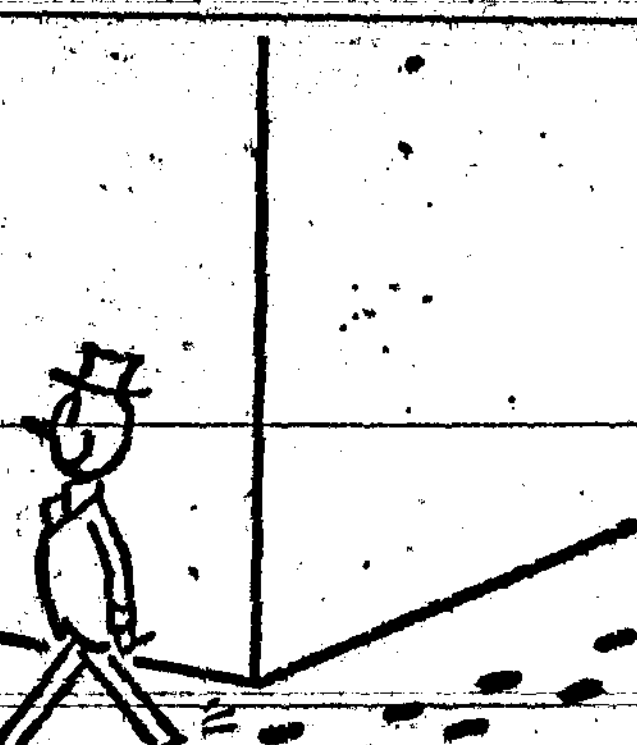

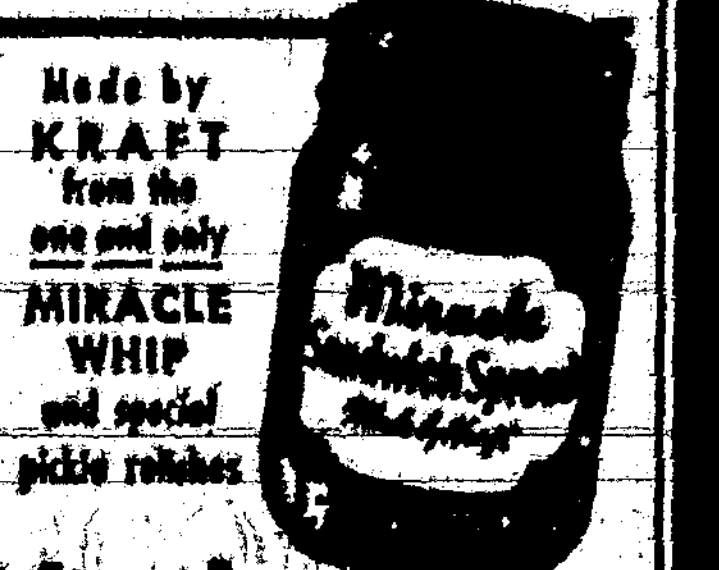

News and Views from Your Nation's Capitol

WASHINGTON, April 22.—Stockpiling of strategic metals and minerals under the recently announced "long-term" defense procurement program will start in about two weeks, according to information given the Rocky Mountain States Congressional Committee by Director Arthur S. Flemming of the Office of Defense Mobilization. The actual buying will be done by the General Services Administration under directive from ODM.

Partial details of the plan were discussed at a conference between Director Flemming and the bipartisan Rocky Mountain group, which I arranged as chairman for the purpose of ascertaining just how effective the stockpiling program will be in reactivating the domestic metal mining industry. Much of the information is "classified" under Defense Department restrictions, but it is the consensus among the members of the Rocky Mountain group that the program will result in the reopening of at

least part of the lead and zinc mines that are now shut down in our states. Just how far-reaching the effect will be is impossible to predict.

Director Flemming said he believed the program will result in higher prices for the metals and minerals to be stockpiled and pointed out that the lead and zinc market already has reacted with slight price increases. The members of our committee have indicated they are not entirely satisfied that the plan will provide the desired impetus to the mining industry but are hopeful that as a stopgap move it will put the mines and miners back to work until an adequate tariff and import policy can be worked out to provide proper protection against unfair competition in the domestic market.

What Price Housing?
Congressional investigation of the nation's housing program, both public and private, as the result of disclosures of widespread fraud and other irregularities in FHA operations should reveal to the taxpayers just how many millions of their dollars have been wantonly wasted. According to Senator Capehart (R-Ind.) chairman of the Senate Banking Committee, at least \$500,000,000 in "windfall profits" have been reaped by builders of FHA-insured apartment housing projects. It is not possible now to even venture a guess what the total loss of the people's money will be. Facts already revealed, however, justify the belief that there has been a terrific steal. The Senate is delaying action on the Housing Bill until a full investigation has been made.

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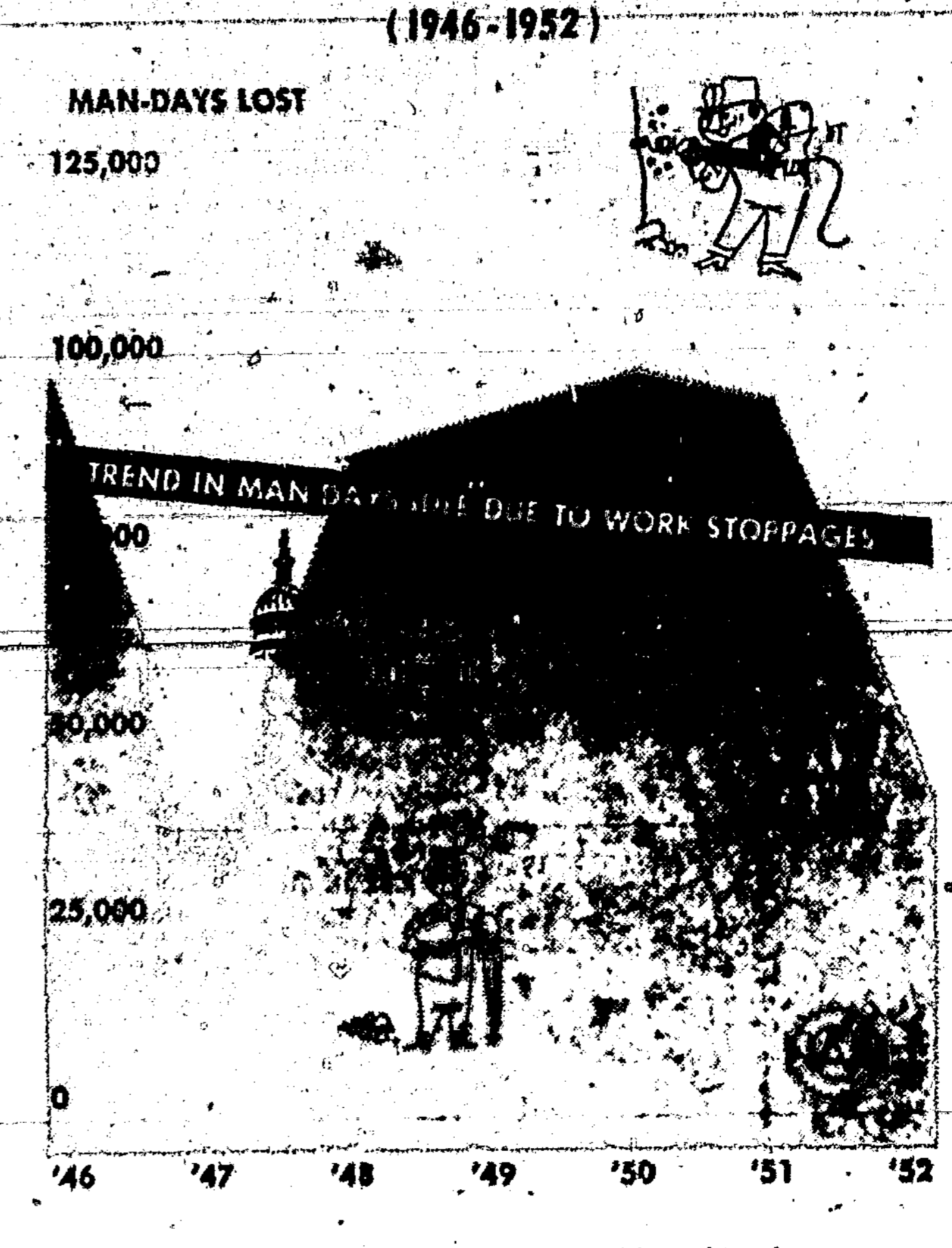
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Although there is no present evidence of fraud in connection with the public housing phase of the program, there is ample proof that it is unjustifiedly costly. So many people have been confused by such terms as "low-cost" that the true facts concerning public housing are not understood. For the second time the House has voted to terminate that program because of those facts.

What are the facts? The records of the Public Housing Administration reveal them. Here they are: The average cost of a public housing unit is \$10,475. About 400,000 of those units have been built or are under construction now. The federal treasury contributes \$34 each year for 40 years toward each unit, including income lost thru tax-free bonds. The local community loses \$89.40 on each unit per year in taxes above the

amount paid if by the federal government in lieu of taxes. That makes the combined annual contribution per unit per year \$443.40. The total for 40 years is \$17,736.

In addition Congress appropriates an average of \$8,000,000 annually for the administration of the Public Housing program. That averages \$22.80 per unit (Continued on Next Page)

per year, or \$912 in 40 years. The entire income of the unit which averages \$33 a month is used for maintenance and operation and payment on the bonds. Simple arithmetic shows, therefore, that the total cost, above all income, for each unit is \$29,123. That means about \$12 billion out of the public purse for the present housing setup. It would save the taxpayers money if the occupants were given an outright deed to the property.

CONFEREES CUT HIGHWAY FUNDS

House conferees on the Federal Aid Highway Bill, which is now before the President for signature, were responsible for a cut of more than \$100,000,000 in matching funds for the states in the 1956-1957 biennium. They forced a reduction in the \$1,020,000,000 authorized by the Senate for each year to \$966,000,000. New Mexico loses about \$500,000 a year in matching funds as a result.

Speaking in protest of the action of the House conferees, I said in part: "Survey after survey made by the various state highway departments and the Bureau of Public Roads have provided us with undeniable evidence that our highways are from 15 to 20 years behind the rest of our economic development. They are, without question, the greatest bottleneck today in our march of progress. They are a constant threat to our defense effort."

I shall continue to urge enactment of my bill which provides for interstate highways in the year starting July 1.

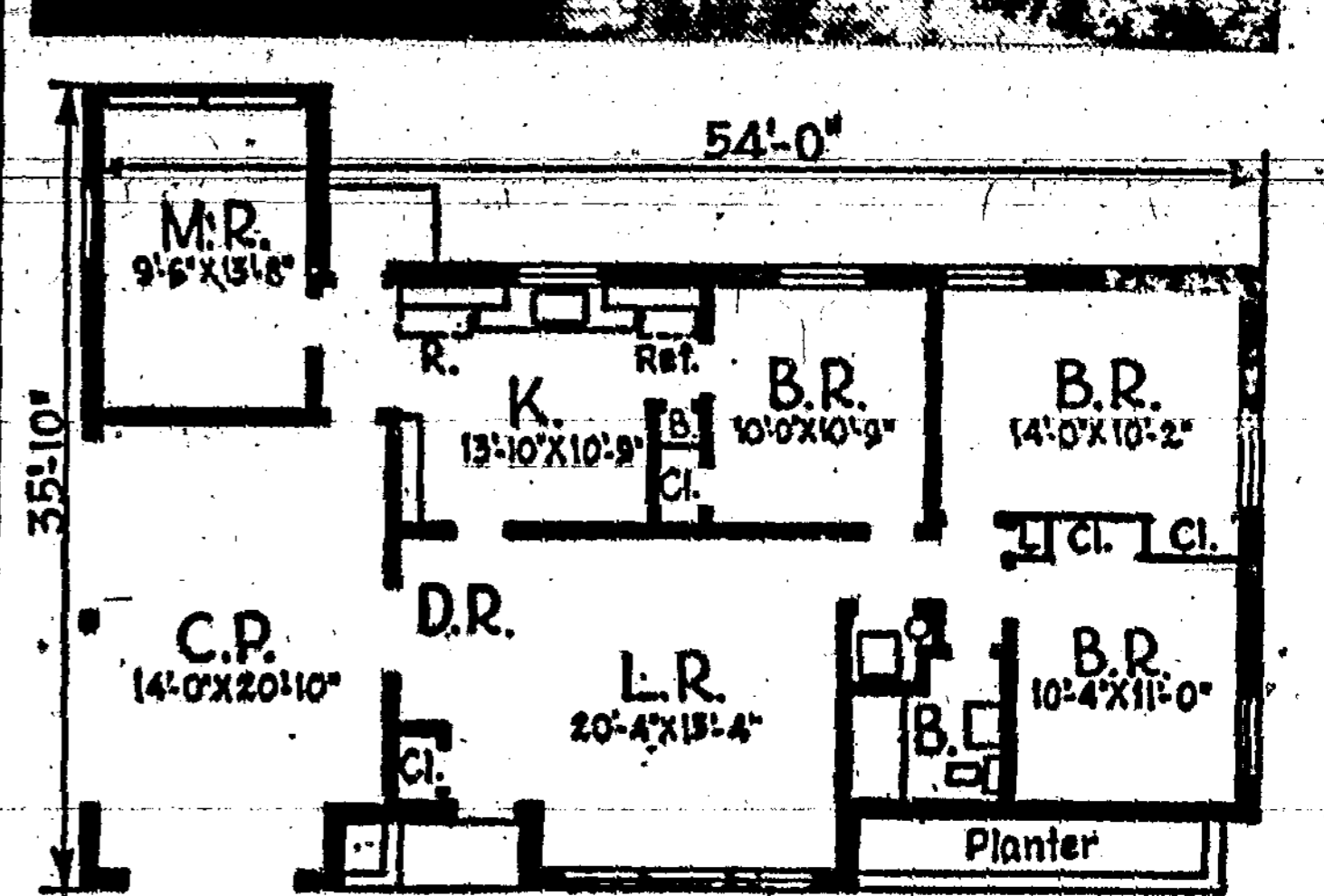
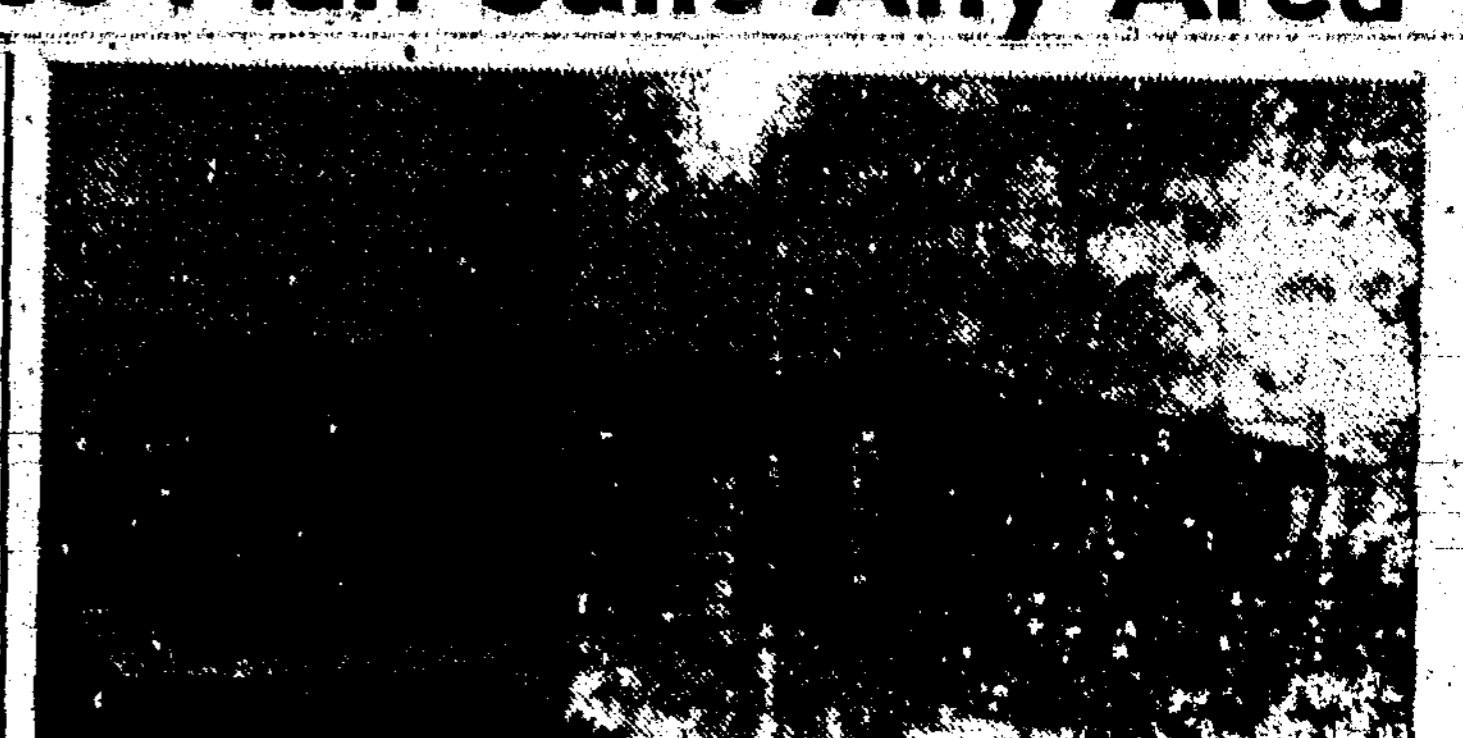
The "Monterey" room adjacent to the kitchen and at the rear of the carport could serve as a bedroom, a workshop, a utility room or a playroom.

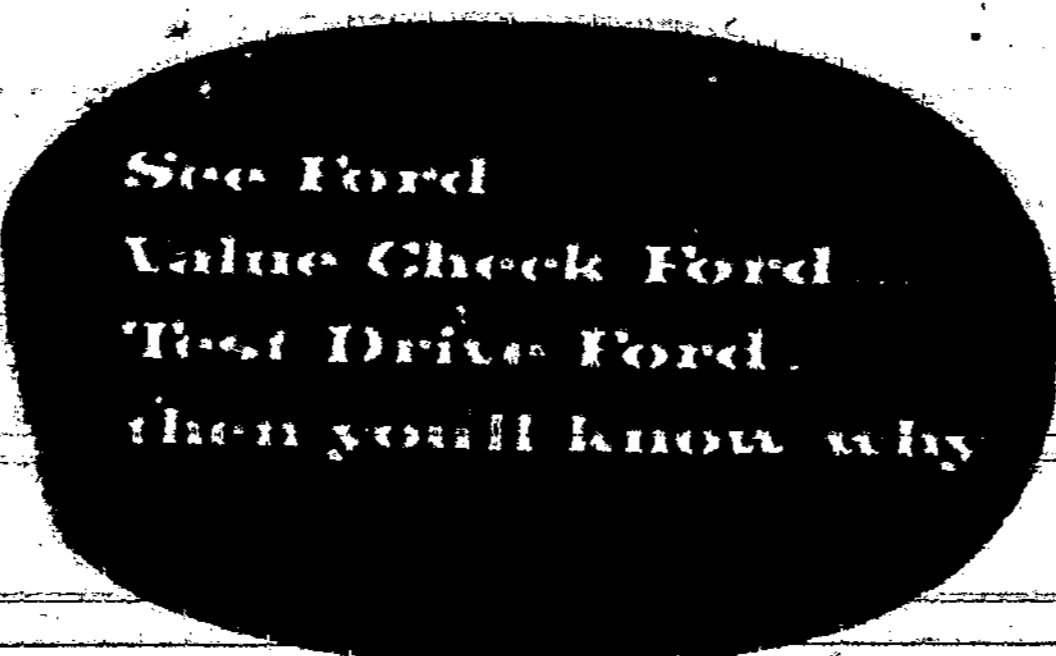

Primary Election Proclamation

WHEREAS, it is provided by the Primary Election Code of the State of New Mexico that the Board of County Commissioners shall at least 15 days before the election by proclamation and publication as therein provided, give notice of the election, the objects thereof, the offices to be voted for, the names of the candidates for each of the said offices as the same have been certified to the County Clerk as provided by law, the names of Judges and Poll Clerks, and the places where said election is to be held in each precinct and election district; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that said Act shall apply to all political parties for any of whose candidates there was cast at the last preceding General Election as many as fifteen percentum (15%) of the total number of votes cast for the Candidates for Governor by all parties at such Election; and

WHEREAS, at the last General Election, the Democratic and the Republican Parties were the only political parties of whose candidates there was cast as many as fifteen percentum (15%) of the total number of votes cast for the Candidates for Governor by all parties at such election; and

WHEREAS, said Primary Election Code provides that the said Act shall apply to the offices of the United States Senator, Representatives in Congress of the United States, and to all elective State, District, Legislative, County and Precinct Officers in the State who are elected at the General Election; and

WHEREAS, all Candidates desiring to participate in the Primary Election for Precinct, County, or Legislative office have filed their declaration of Candidacy and petitions with the Clerk of Lincoln County; in the cases of offices filled by the State at large and districts comprising of more than Lincoln County all Candidates, have filed declarations of Candidacy with the Secretary of State and a certified list of those Candidates have been furnished the Clerk of Lincoln County according to law;

NOW, THEREFORE, by virtue of authority and duty in us vested by law, we the Board of County Commissioners of Lincoln County, and the County Clerk of said County, do hereby publish, proclaim and give notice as follows:

1. That a Primary Election be and the same is hereby called to be held throughout the County of Lincoln and in each precinct thereof on the 4th day of May, A. D., 1954.

2. That the said Primary Election shall be applicable to the following political parties to-wit: The Republican Party and the Democratic Party.

3. That said Primary Election shall be for the purpose of permitting the said Republican and Democratic Parties to nominate Candidates for each of the following offices hereinafter mentioned, and that the names of all the Candidates to be voted upon for nomination for Candidates to Congressional, State, Legislative, District, County and Precinct Offices, are as follows:
