

# RAMBLIN' AROUND

Times change and so must laws. This was brought out in a recent case in District Court, State of New Mexico vs. Carl deBord, charged with allowing minors to remain on premises where liquor is sold. When the defendant waived right of trial by jury, the case was heard in Alamogordo on April 13 before Judge Federick. An old New Mexico statute (1901) makes it an offense for any minor to remain on premises where liquor is sold. However, we are informed by District Attorney C. C. Chase Jr. that a more recent statute (68-1012) permits minors to be served alcoholic beverages when accompanied by parents, and the latter interpretation is the one generally accepted nowadays. The old-time saloon has disappeared and in its place have come cocktail bars and establishments serving both food and drink. The problem is how to control the conduct of minors in these establishments without an absolute ban that would work hardship on many businesses that serve both food and drink.

To clarify the question, District Attorney Chase spent Wednesday and Thursday in Santa Fe last week, consulting with Eladio Baca, chief of the State Liquor Division, and with Chester Hunker, chief legal counsel of the Bureau of Revenue. He reports that a regulation is being issued to fill the gap in the event the old statute should be repealed. It will, in effect, supplant the outmoded statute. In the meantime, the case State vs. deBord has been indefinitely continued.

Vernon Petty, president of the New Mexico Highway 54 Association, is busy making plans for the celebration marking the opening of the new highway between Carrizozo and Corona. A tentative date of July 4 or 5 has been set for the event. Mr. Petty welcomes any and all suggestions for making the celebration one that will long be remembered. Already down on his list of tentative events are a barbecue, specialty acts, old timers' reunion, aerial show, the Mounted Patrol, music and dancing and short talks by distinguished visitors.

Many complaints are heard of the bad condition of the road between Carrizozo and Corona. It's rough going for those who have to use the road every day, but there's one consolation. The blacktopping of the new Highway 54 is under way and it won't be long before there will be smooth sailing between the two towns. It is reported from Corona that the compressor plant of the El Paso Natural Gas Company is almost completed.

Due to the alertness of two Carrizozans last week, an AWOL soldier and a stolen car were picked up by Sheriff Bradley's office and Patrolman Eddie Apodaca. A soldier, later identified as Brock Starnage, stepped into the Big Jo Lumber Company to say he was out of gas and out of money. Mrs. Bob Gibson and Fred Chavez became suspicious, phoned the license number to the sheriff's office. They investigated and questioning revealed that the soldier had taken the car from a dealer lot in Alamogordo, put on a license plate from another car, and headed north. The car had only six miles on the speedometer when he left Alamogordo. The soldier has been arraigned, placed under \$1,000 bond and turned over to the military.

With the opening of the trout fishing season Saturday, south of Highway 66, a number of local anglers are making preparations for the day. Fishing at Nopal Lake has been reported good for several weeks with many legal-sized trout being caught. Nopal Lake is a favorite of many from the east side—51 license plates being counted there on one day. There is a possibility that Bonito Lake may be opened for recreation and fishing. If this should come about, Lincoln County would attract anglers from all over the Southwest.

Judge W. T. Scoggin sits behind a new desk in district court these days. It is of solid maple, made by a Las Cruces craftsman. The old desk and chair have been given to the Old Lincoln County Courthouse Museum.

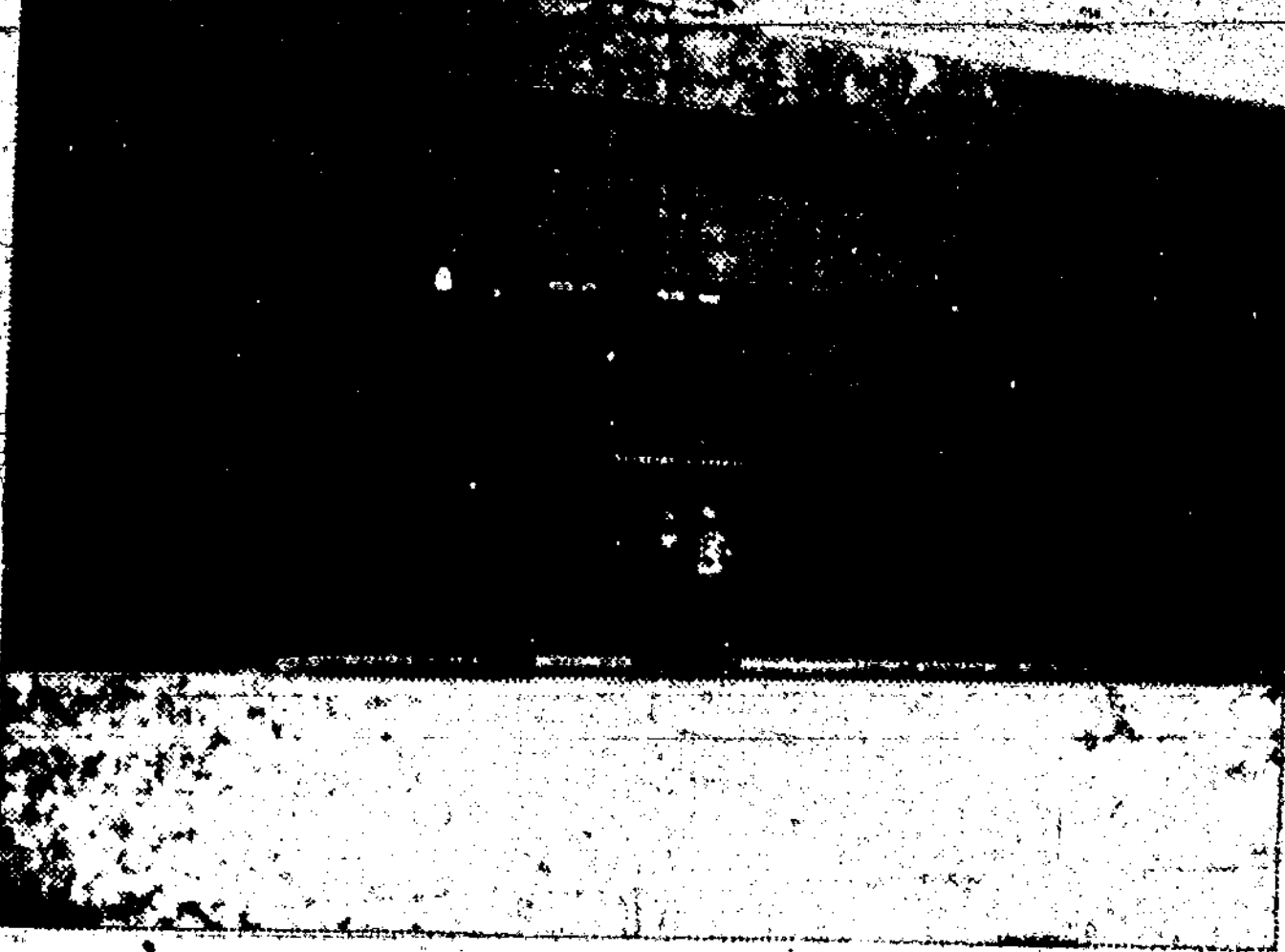

## ALAMO TAKES UP OPTION ON BONITO WATER SYSTEM

Official announcement was made this week that Alamogordo has acquired an option to purchase Bonito lake and dam, Bonito river water rights, Nopal lake and connecting pipelines. Eagle Creek water, it was stated, was not included in Alamogordo's option.

The funds with which to consummate the deal are at hand, the News was informed, from government sources.

At a meeting in Carrizozo Monday night, attended by town officials, Attorney Daniel Brenton, Air Force representatives and Mayor Walter Mullins of Alamogordo, several phases of the proposed transfer were discussed.

One of the conditions of purchase is that Carrizozo be supplied with Bonito water at a "reasonable rate, which will be eventually determined." This rate has been mentioned at around 14c or 15c per 1,000 gals.

Carrizozo would be asked to share in the maintenance cost of Bonito lake and the pipeline down to Carrizozo, he was stated.

Another condition of Alamogordo's purchase is that the guided missile project at Red Canyon be supplied with water at Carrizozo, as well as the Southern Pacific Company.

A further stipulation is that communities between Carrizozo and Alamogordo, such as Three Rivers be supplied with water.

Carrizozo's supply of Bonito water has been tentatively set at 200,000 gallons daily, dependent upon stream flow and amount in storage, as has been the case in the past.

## VAUGHN TO DEVELOP OWN SOURCE OF WATER

Vaughn recently passed a bond issue to distribute its own water and has been given 20 miles of transfer pipe by the Southern Pacific. A water well belonging to the Santa Fe has been leased.

## STREAMS COMMISSION HEARS REPORT ON EAGLE CREEK

At a meeting in Santa Fe on April 22, the Interstate Streams Commission heard a feasibility report on Eagle Creek, presented by W. Carlos Powell, water engineer. He reported that there was ample water available for

Capitan, Ruidoso and Fort Stanton provided an impounding reservoir was built, which he said was feasible.

He further stated that Ruidoso could financially undertake the project but that it would cripple them for further financing if they undertook it alone.

Alamogordo, through its mayor, Walter Mullins, suggested that Alamogordo cooperate with Ruidoso and Capitan in connection with Eagle Creek and that that his city would buy, for delivery to Holloman, any surplus water and that in addition, water from the Bonito system could be exchanged if needed.

The Interstate Streams Commission adjourned with the suggestion that the communities involved work out a plan in consultation with State Engineer Bilts.

## HEARINGS IN WASHINGTON ON PROPOSED WATER BILL

John Bilts, State engineer, informed the commission members he would attend hearings in Washington on a House bill designed to give local people more authority in reclamation projects. He explained that the bill would authorize Federal loans to privately planned irrigation and water systems whereby funds would be made available for approximately 75% of construction costs, the balance to be provided by the project beneficiary. Such a bill might apply to the Eagle Creek situation, it was pointed out.

## ROSWELL PAPER ATTACKS BONITO WATER TRANSFER

In an article in its April 18 edition, the Roswell Record attacked what it said had been termed "an attempted water grab by the U. S. Government." The article went on to say:

"Information from usually reliable sources also revealed that Alamogordo plans to advise Carrizozo, Vaughn and other communities they will have to find other sources for their water supplies within a year, if Alamogordo takes over."

"This latter action would violate obligations which the Southern Pacific has maintained and which are an inherent burden of the original negotiations under which the Southern Pacific obtained its water rights to impound the water in Bonito Lake."

## STATE PRIMARY ELECTION MAY 4

Tuesday, May 4, is primary election day in New Mexico. Voters in 16 Lincoln County precincts will go to the polls to choose their standard-bearers for national, state and county offices; also precinct officers.

The polls open at 8 a.m. and close at 7 p.m. It is estimated that a vote ranging from 35% to 50% of the total registered will be cast.

The County Clerk's office will remain open all night Tuesday.

There are no contests on the Democratic side above the office of lieutenant governor, for which Joe M. Montoya and Sixto Leva are candidates.

On the Republican side Holm O. Bursum of Socorro and Alvin Stockton of Baton are competing for the nomination for governor and three are entered in the race for representative in Congress, with two to be nominated (See Harrison's run-down of contests in an adjoining column.)

On the county level there is great interest in the County Commissioner race (District 1). George Sineros opposes Alfonso Solo on the Republican ticket and Esquibel (Dick) Fresquez and Fred McTeligue are opposed on the Democratic ballot.

There are no other contests for county offices in the primary election.

For Constable, Ninth Precinct, there is a contest between two Democrats, Billy Petroe and Alfred W. Luck.

Three Democrats are seeking election to Justice of the Peace, Nineteenth Precinct: Charles David Weems, Harold M. Graham and Earl Franklin Strachan.

For constable, Nineteenth Precinct, it's Democrat Frank Barajas opposed to Coleman George Joyce, with no Republican entered.

## Two Men Draw Sentences for Theft

Two drew terms in the New Mexico penitentiary and a third was given a deferred sentence by Judge W. T. Scoggin in District Court action in Carrizozo Wednesday.

Donald Erwin Martin, 25, pled guilty to a charge of robbery and was sentenced from one to 3 years. A dishwasher in the Village Cafe in Ruidoso, Martin took \$135 in cash and ten cartons of cigarettes on April 7.

Martin, who had two prior convictions elsewhere, has a wife and family in California.

Frey Sundayman, 23, of Mesquero was sentenced to from one to two years in the state penal institution when he entered a plea of guilty to stealing a .22 revolver and another gun from the Walker cabin near Ruidoso.

Daniel Avila Jr., 18, of Picacho was given a deferred sentence of three years after he entered a plea of guilty to breaking into a home and stealing several articles. His youth and the fact that this was his first offense influenced the judge to give the youth another chance.

## YOUTH PROBLEMS DISCUSSED AT DISTRICT MEETING

A large delegation from Lincoln County attended Tuesday's meeting in Alamogordo of a tri-county meeting of advisory committees on juvenile delinquency. The meeting was called by Judge W. T. Scoggin, who set up committees in Lincoln, Otero and Las Cruces counties shortly after the first of the year. The committees have been functioning on community and county levels since then.

Those attending from this county were Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Petty, Earl Harrow, R. G. Firman, Wendell Watson, State Patrolman Eddie Apodaca, Sheriff Glen Bradley, J. H. Morris, Cy Leland, R. H. Hedgecock, Edward Penfield and Manuel Chavez, probation officer.

One of the delegates in attendance said "It was the most interesting meeting on juvenile problems I have attended in some time." A highlight was a panel discussion, led by J. M. Sterner of Santa Fe, executive secretary of the New Mexico youth commission. Mr. Sterner has written four books dealing with youth and for 15 years was probation officer for Detroit and environs.

Subjects covered in the panel discussion included driving instruction and courtesy on the road, year-around athletic programs for youth and teaching respect for God, home, country, law and self; also "What can the community and schools do to prevent habitual truancy?"

Written opinions by youths on their own particular problems were also discussed.

It was brought out that the State correctional institutions for youths need additional funds, for a more adequate program.

The next meeting of the advisory board has been set for October 5 in Carrizozo.

Tucker and Howard McDonald of Three Rivers, Penny McKnight of Capitan and Lincoln Cox Jr. of Elk.

A barrel race will be run for boys and girls, 14 years of age and under.

## TRACKMEN MEET IN ROSWELL SATURDAY

Leading high school trackmen from a number of schools in this area of the state will compete Saturday in a district field meet at the NMMI track in Roswell. Lincoln county schools represented will be Carrizozo, Capitan and Ruidoso, taking part in the 5-B events.

Trackmen from larger schools such as Artesia, Roswell, Clovis, Carlsbad and Hobbs will be entered in A competition. Winning athletes will go on into State competition.

The meet gets under way at 9 o'clock in the morning with trial heats in both A and B divisions. Finals will begin at 1 o'clock in the afternoon.

Other B division schools that are expected to enter competition are St. Peters, Dexter, Hagerman, Jal. Eunice and Lake Arthur.

Carrizozo's main threat is expected to be in the mile relay and medley relay. Capitan has a well-balanced track squad, led by Jim Payne, high jumper and 890-yd. specialist. Ruidoso's squad is headed by Earl Ellison, a good high hurdler and Nyles Lackey, a 440-yd. and sprint runner.

On Saturday's program are 11 track and six field events in both A- and B-classes.

## WHAT TO WATCH IN TUESDAY VOTE

SANTA FE, April 28—It's a third rate election coming up Tuesday but it does have some interesting spots. Here are the ones-to-watch.

Republican nomination for governor—Holm Bursum of Socorro against Alvin Stockton of Raton. Bursum, with the backing of the statehouse and party Republican organization, has a head start of perhaps 8,000 votes out of a total expected to run around 25,000. Bursum's chief support expected in San Juan, Albuquerque, and down the Rio Grande. Bursum supposed to win this one but if early reports, which will be from cities with voting machines, show close race or Stockton in front it will indicate upset for Stockton.

There's not another race of any consequence on the Republican side. Warren R. Cobean of Roswell is practically assured of nomination for one of the places for Congress, and Tom Childers of Santa Fe should get the other one. Third in the race is Joe Rendon of Albuquerque who changed his name from Sanchez to Rendon and changed his party affection from Democratic to Republican. (He was a 1952 candidate for Demo nomination for land commissioner.) Any early returns showing Rendon in front would indicate an upset which is possible if the big Spanish vote in the Republican primary should go for him.

The "only other" contest the Republicans have is for secretary of state and nobody seems to care much how it goes. It's Mrs. Herman Baca of Santa Fe, the organization favorite, against Mrs. Ruth Laws of Santa Fe, wife of one of the public service commissioners.

## DEMOCRATS OFFER FIVE HEADLINES

Democrats don't have a contest until you get away down the ticket to lieutenant governor, but after that there's a bunch of hot ones for the little jobs.

Demo nomination for lieutenant governor—State Sen. Joe Montoya of Santa Fe and Sandoval counties against Sixto Leyva who represented Sandoval in the legislature and is now a resident of Albuquerque with a voting residence in Santa Fe. Montoya, former lieutenant governor and legislator since 1937 at first supposed to win this one in a walk but has encountered powerful opposition which now makes it look like a race. First returns from city voting machine precincts should give indication of way election going. A Leyva win would be an upset.

Secretary of State—Irene Arias of Santa Fe, Natalie Smith Buck of Carlsbad and Rowena Jopling of Clovis. This one supposed to go to Mrs. Arias but Mrs. Buck has been gaining from the start and Mrs. Jopling apparently standing still. Now it looks like Carlsbad entry has chance of coping lead. Mrs. Buck should lead in early voting machine returns with Arias strength expected to show late.

## SCHOOL JOB RUN HAS STAR BILLING

State School Superintendent—Mrs. Georgia Lusk of Carlsbad against Earl Nunn of Springer. This one has attracted more interest than any other on the Demo ballot. It has brought out the organized educational groups behind Nunn in the first real test of that outfit's strength. Mrs. Lusk, long-time figure in state politics, four times state superintendent and six times a candidate, one term in Congress and several years on Federal war claims commission, encountering serious opposition because of lack of formal academic qualifications. Nunn, younger and unknown politically has conducted ineffective campaign. He looked like winner at first but now it's anybody's race. Early returns should show trend of race.

Corporation Commissioner—Incumbent Ingram Pickett vs. Terry Moynihan of Taos. This one shares top place interest with school super run. At the start it was supposed to be Pickett in a long-legged walk. Moynihan in recent weeks apparently pulling up with prospects of making race of it. Pickett's heavy estate support should show in early returns, with Moynihan showing strength in late reports.

Bond buyers are commended by the chairman for having the character required to keep some of their incomes for themselves.

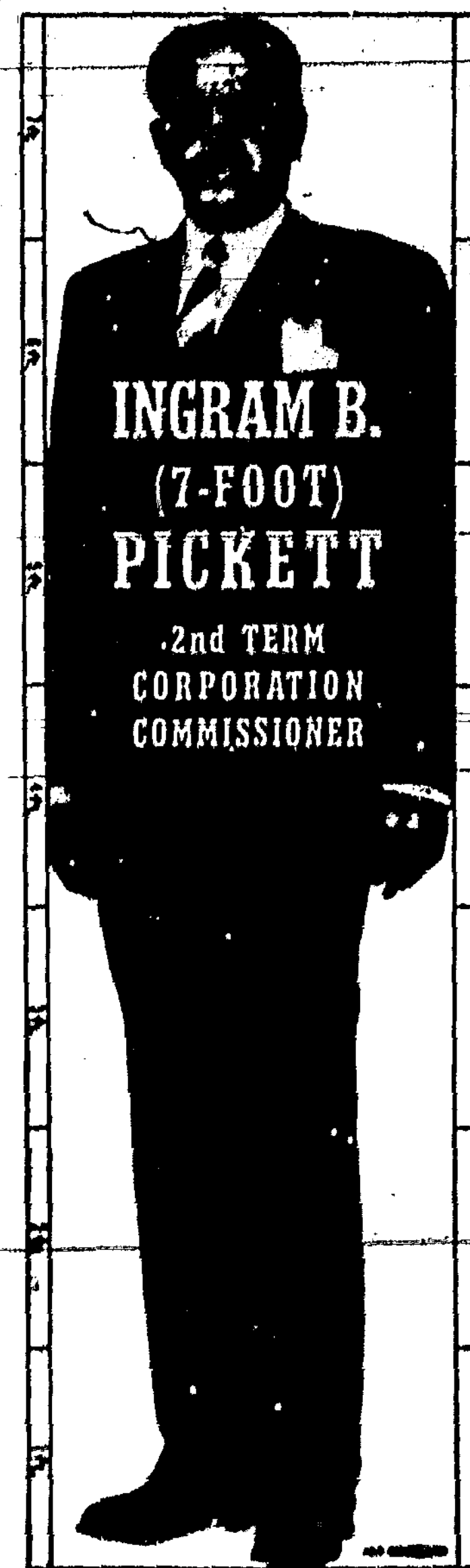
WELFARE SPENDING UP

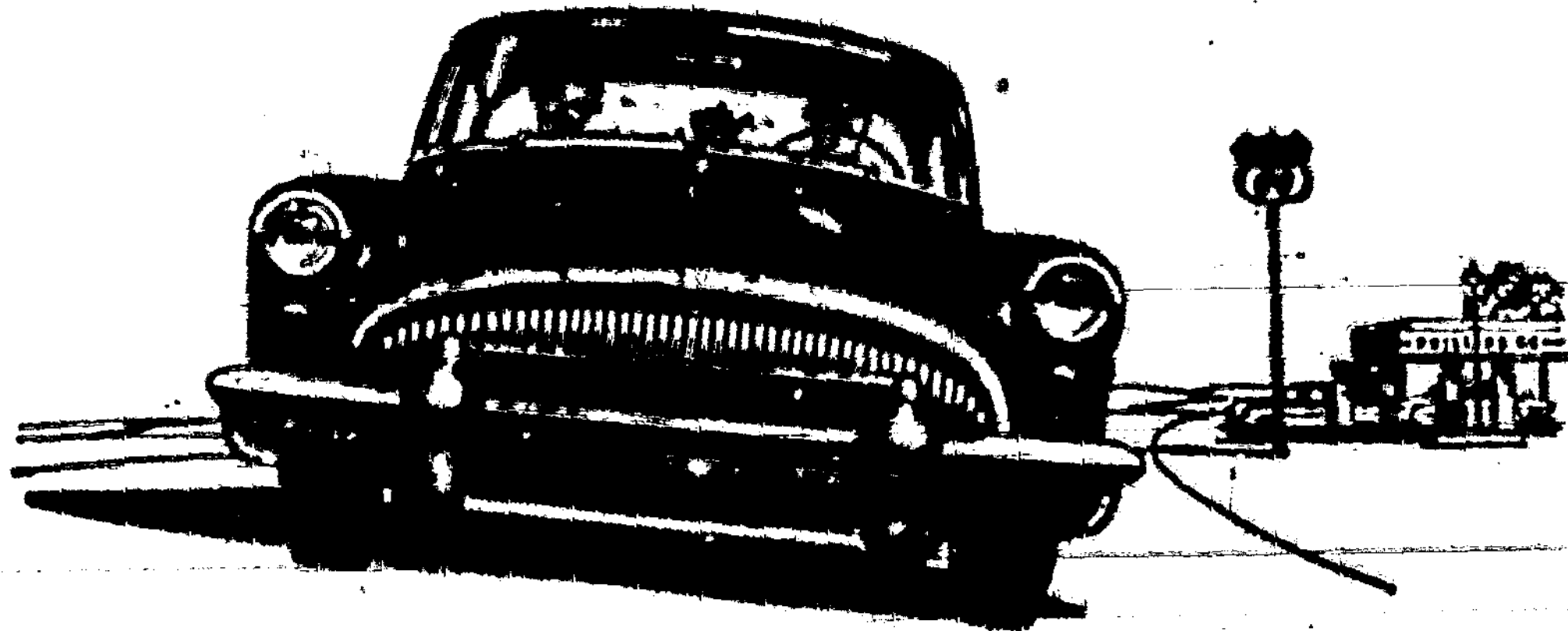

## Facts to Keep in Mind About '54 Wool Clip

Regardless of rumors and statements which growers may hear during the next few weeks in regard to handling their 1954 clip, the following facts should be kept constantly in mind, says Wm. K. Snyder, extension wool marketing specialist at New Mexico A & M College.

1. The officially announced 1954 support program by non-recourse loan will be available. Loan values will be approximately the same as in 1953 and these are substantially higher than current market values. Loans obtained under the 1954 program do not expire until April 30, 1955. Interest is potentially free, but if wool can be redeemed to advantage, the rate has been lowered to 3 1/2% from 4%.

2. Growers who take advantage of the loan will be eligible to obtain the benefit of the proposed 1954 "incentive payment" plan simply by redeeming and selling their wool at open market levels. Preliminary statements by the USDA indicate an incentive payment of 8c to 10c above the 1954 loan support program, if the new bill passes.

3. It is exceedingly important that growers sell their wool at full market value in an orderly way during the 1954 season in order to get the full benefit of any possible incentive payment which will be figured as a percentage of the price received by the grower.

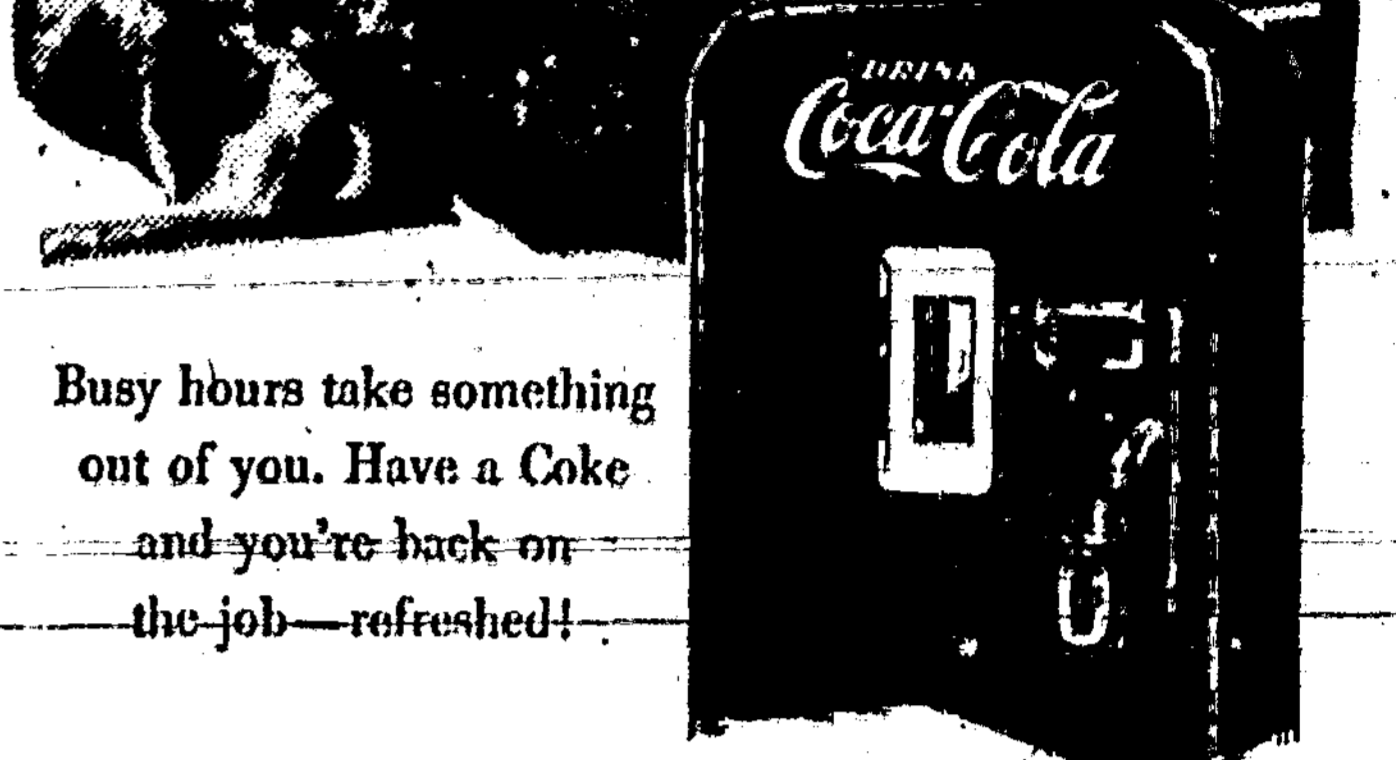
