AUGUST 1 DATE SET FOR HIGHWAY 54 DEDICATION

Sunday, August 1, has been set as the date for the official dedication of the new stretch of paving, 34 miles in length, between Carrizozo and Corona.

The August 1 date for the celebration was announced this week by Vernon Petty, president of the New Mexico Highway 54 Association.

Tentative plans are to have the celebration at a site six miles north of Carrizozo where the new highway joins the old.

The Lincoln County Committee has been advised by the State ASC Drought Committee that the drought program will be terminated at the close of business July 15, 1954.

WHEAT QUOTA REFERENDUM

On July 28 wheat growers will vote for or against a marketing quota program for the 1955 crop of wheat.

As required by law, the Secretary of Agriculture has proclaimed wheat quotas subject to a grower referendum.

The final decision on whether or not quota controls will apply to 1955 wheat production will therefore be made by farmers themselves.

State Tax Official Will Review Town's Budget

The Carrizozo Town Trustees are to meet Monday with Manuel Baca, secretary of the State Tax Commission, at which time the budget for next year will be submitted for his approval.

At their monthly meeting this Tuesday, the trustees considered the request of Town Marshal Severo Gallegos for a sign for his car. Trustee Sherrill was appointed a committee of one to look into its purchase.

The trustees will accept bids to buy a surplus 2500-gal. water storage tank now located in the city park. Bids may be submitted in writing to the town clerk.

Mayor Roberts said he would like again to call the attention of utility users to the applicability of Rate Schedule 2.

"This schedule," he said, "clearly states that in order to qualify for this rate, the consumer must use an electric range, an electric hot water heater, or both.

A lengthy report was submitted by the Mountain States Inspection Bureau, following their recent survey of fire protection in Carrizozo. A number of recommendations were made regarding water supply, adequate fire fighting equipment.

"The Village contemplates the expansion and development of a source of supply with elevated storage or storage reservoir maintained in order that approximately 60 - 70 pounds may be maintained in principal mercantile district under maximum consumption conditions.

Regarding the existing system, the conclusion drawn was that: "The present water supply system is not designed for fire service and little to no water is available for fire fighting purposes.

Meals and bills are minor considerations of the Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting. There is one thing the men don't want you to miss.

If you have never been to the Nogal Mesa Camp Meeting, let me tell you a little about it.

There is plenty of camping room for all who care to bring house trailers or tents.

Breakfast is served about 8 a.m., with a short service following. The next religious service is in the tabernacle about 10:30 a.m., with dinner at noon.

The men meet out in the open under the prayer tree, the ladies in the tabernacle and children in the newly-built shelter.

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EXCAVATION FOR SWIMMING POOL ENLARGED TO 35x75

The first work undertaken will be to build the forms, with the walls to be poured first.

New County Budget Ready for Approval

The Board of County Commissioners, meeting Wednesday, spent a considerable part of the day going over the budget for the coming year, as prepared by James E. Harcrow, County Clerk.

The tentative County budget totals approximately \$253,000, as compared with \$250,206 for last year.

Assessed valuation in Lincoln County has increased to \$13,788,415, as compared to \$12,458,129 last year.

This year, County Clerk Harcrow reported, the County received additional revenue from automobile licenses of approximately \$4,000 over last year.

The Commissioners purchased a power lawnmower for the Courthouse lawn.

Quiz Man in Connection With Highway Fatality At Picacho Hill

Vaughn S. Faulkner, 45, Roswell filling station attendant, was being questioned by the Sheriff's Office in Carrizozo Wednesday in connection with a car wreck and death of an occupant July 1 on Highway 70 at Picacho Hill.

A woman, identified as Zulla May Powers, 45, of Roswell, was found dead in a sedan which was driven or plunged into a gully 24 feet below the highway.

The investigation Wednesday was conducted by T. L. Thompson, Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff, Ruidoso.

The fatality was reported last week by a Greyhound bus driver to Roy Foreman, Lincoln County Deputy Sheriff, of Riverside. He notified State Police in Roswell.

FINAL RITES FOR JOHN DOWNING

Neighbors and friends from all over Lincoln County joined with bereaved relatives last Friday to pay their final respects to John Riggs Downing for whom services were held at the Captain Baptist Church, Rev. J. M. Kerr officiating. The Westrum Mortuary of Roswell was in charge of arrangements.

Mr. Downing, who had been in ill health for six months was stricken with a heart attack about 11 o'clock Wednesday at the Downing ranch home, 35 miles north of Captain. His death was almost instantly.

He was born January 20, 1893, in Jack County, Texas, the son of John B. and Ida Downing. He had been a resident of Lincoln County for 34 years. He served in the Army in World War I.

Mr. Downing had a bright outlook on life and was a good friend and neighbor to all. His keen sense of humor made him an especial favorite with the young people.

One of the latter, who knew him well, said: "If I had any troubles or problems he always managed to cheer me up. 'Never mind the little things,' he'd say, 'they'll turn out OK.'"

Taking part in the funeral services was a ladies quartet—Mrs. W. G. Shreeve, Mrs. Fletcher Hall, Mrs. Fred W. Pfingsten and Miss Ethelyn Phillips. They sang "Shall We Gather at the River" and "Abide With Me."

Gravestone services were conducted by Carrizozo Lodge No. 30, I. O. O. F. of which Mr. Downing was a member. Interment was in the Captain cemetery.

Funeralbearers were Francis Owens, Charles Jones, Walter Jones Sr., Bill Edgar, Grady Eldridge and Graciano Ylari.

Elephant Butte Storage Lowest Since 1951

(From the Hot Springs Herald) Truth or Consequences—Elephant Butte Lake was down to 60,157 acre feet the last week in June—the lowest for this time of year in the history of the lake. A year ago the lake contained 209,193 acre feet. Two years ago storage totaled 419,262 acre feet.

In 1951 the storage finally got down to 17,600 acre feet after court action halted releases of water.

The Elephant Butte Boat Dock Co. in 1951 moved to a spot nearer the dam and with the continued drop in the water level, the company has moved the dock almost back to the same place it was in 1951.

BUIDOSO BANK'S DEPOSITS EXCEED MILLION DOLLARS

Deposits in the Buidoso State Bank passed the million dollar mark last week, according to T. B. Hood, executive vice president of the institution. The new bank in Buidoso has been open less than a year.

CATTELMEN FIGHT ARMY LAND GRAB

Speakers on many subjects of direct importance to the cattle industry were heard at the second quarterly conference of the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association recently concluded at Truth or Consequences.

One of the important resolutions passed was the Bombing Range Extension resolution, as follows:

"The War Department... is in the process of purchasing additional lands in Southeastern New Mexico, adjacent to the Alamogordo and White Sands bombing area.

"Whereas, it has been and still is the policy of the livestock industry of New Mexico to prevent further acquisition of lands by the Federal Government within the State.

"Be it resolved that the New Mexico Cattle Growers Association in session this 25th and 26th day of June, 1954, at Truth or Consequences, N. M., definitely opposes the present contemplated purchase and any further purchases by the Federal Government.

"Be it further resolved that the president of this organization continue his efforts to arrange for a public hearing of the House Committee or Senate Committee, or both, to the end that the aforementioned purchase be prevented."

The Army is seeking an additional 647,800 acres of land for its operations in Otero County. Such action, it is said, would put another 21 ranchers out of business.

Another resolution at the convention asked the Federal government to set up a hay program that would enable ranchers in drought areas to maintain their foundation herds.

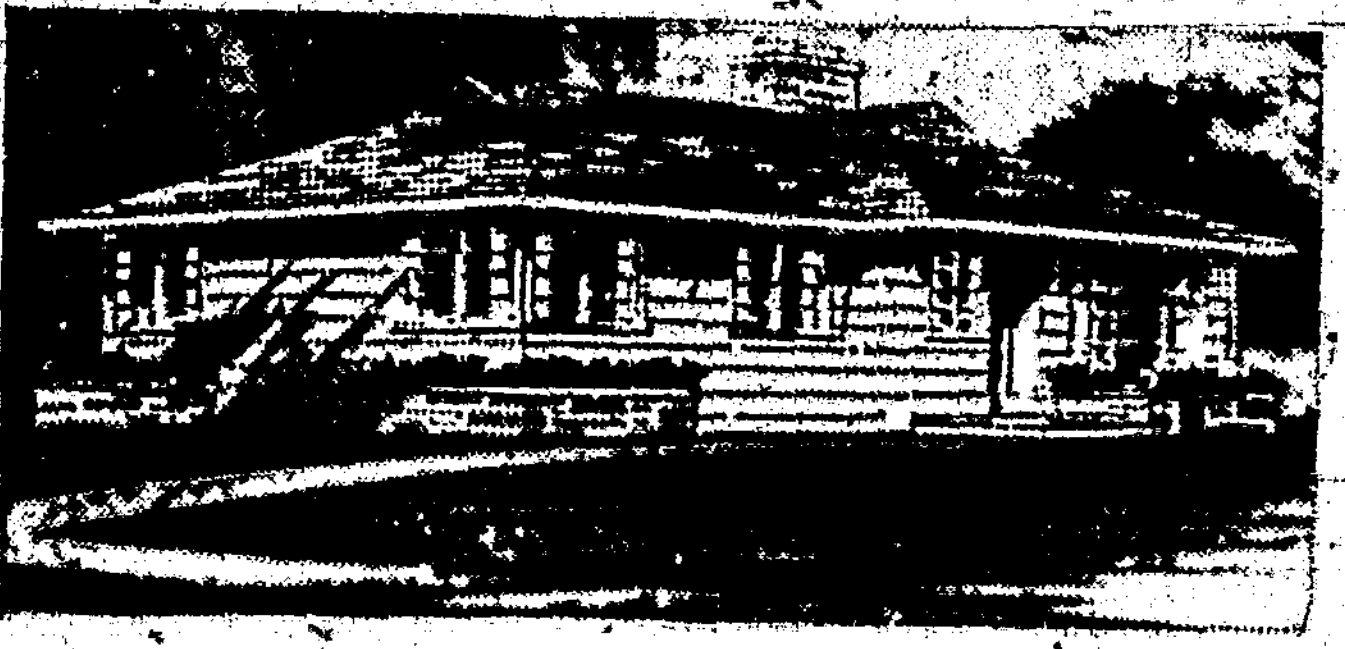
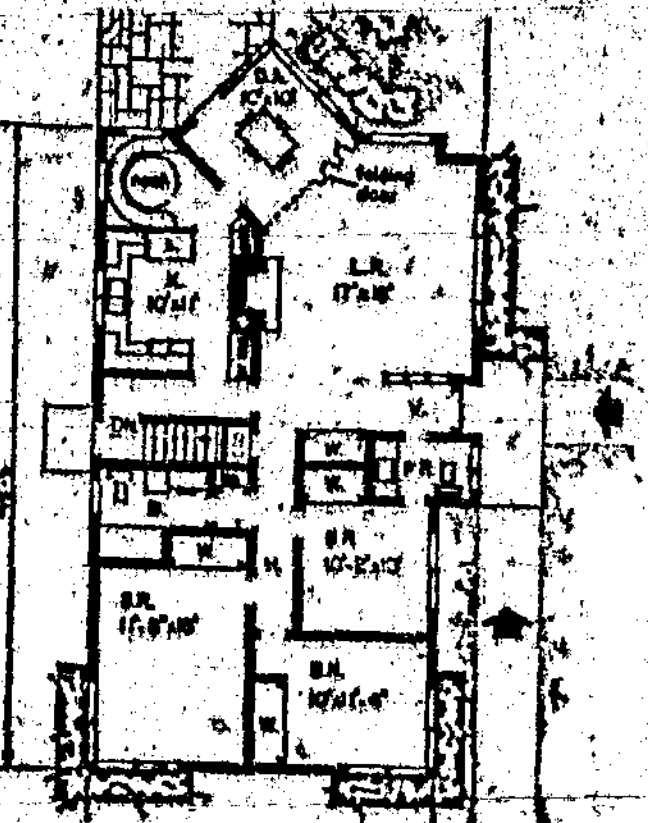

Besides Lincoln County, there were 4-H members from Chaves, DeBaca and Otero counties.

The Clyde Marley ranch on the Gallo will be the place for the sheep raisers to visit on July 16 to see the selection of ram lambs. The demonstration will start at 9:30 a.m. and last until 3 p.m.

During the day the growers will have a chance to observe the selection of a ram lamb at 2 to 2 1/2 months of age with a high degree of accuracy.

Also, Mr. Marley will have on hand lambs from Australian matings. W. K. Snyder, extension wool marketing specialist, will conduct the demonstration.

Marketing of apples in the Hondo Valley will be the subject of Clyde Keaton's thesis in connection with his graduate study. Mr. Keaton, extension economist

in fruit and vegetable marketing, has just returned from one year of graduate study toward a doctor's degree at the University of Minnesota.

State Ram Sale Set For August 5 and 6

About 375 rams and 25 registered yearling Rambouillet ewes are slated to go through the auction ring at the 17th annual New Mexico Ram Sale August 5 and 6, says Ivan Watson, extension animal husbandman at New Mexico A & M College, manager of the sale. The sale will be held at the New Mexico State Fair grounds in Albuquerque.

Three hundred of the rams to be offered are Rambouillet, Debouillet and Improved Fine Wool rams; 75 are Columbias, Corriedales and Suffolks. Rams were selected in the spring with particular consideration given to the type of animals needed in New Mexico, Watson says.

The information on specific factors of each pen will be printed in the sales sheet, Watson states. Estimated 12 months staple certification on all rams and ewes with the exception of Suffolks will be announced at sale time.

Single rams and the registered ewes will be sold the afternoon of August 5 beginning at 2 p.m. The pens of Columbias, Corriedales, Suffolks and Fine Wool rams will be sold August 6 in that order.

Watson urges consignors to have their rams at the State Fair Grounds not later than August 4.

When Is Land Terracing A Capital Expenditure?

When is expense for land terracing a deductible item for income tax purposes, and when is it a capital expenditure?

The expense may or may not be deductible, depending on the particular situation, according to a decision handed down recently by the U. S. tax court.

In upholding a Missouri farmer's (J. H. Collingwood) contention that the cost of terracing was an expense rather than a capital expenditure and should be deductible as such, the court stated that the cost of terracing in the Collingwood case "was not so large as to be inconsistent with repair and maintenance expenses." Also there was no stone or concrete used in the construction, but only earth moving was involved in the work.

The court placed a great deal of emphasis on the fact that the terracing did not make the land suitable for new uses, nor did it increase the value of the property. The tax court brought out, however, that ordinarily, terracing does increase the value of the property and that in such cases, construction costs would need to be treated as an improvement to the farm and not as an expense item.

Following the court's ruling, the Internal Revenue Service clarified its position with reference to the treatment of terracing expenses by stating that the principles announced in the Collingwood case would be followed in other cases when the facts were substantially the same.

J. Z. Rowe, extension economist at New Mexico A & M College, said this week that the principles involved and the ruling in the Collingwood case clearly indicate that the farmer will be obligated to substantiate a claim for terracing expenses as a deductible item. The evidence to be submitted might include such facts as probable length of life of the terraces; the uses made of the land before and after terraces were constructed, and the effect of the terraces on the value of the property.

The important thing to remember, the economist pointed out, is that the Internal Revenue Ser-

Old Fort Union Made National Monument

LAS VEGAS, N. M., July 5.—The shrill, stirring call of sweet-toned U. S. Cavalry bugles ring out no more at old Fort Union, but at least it has now become certain that the proud old pioneer presidio on the Santa Fe Trail will never be forgotten.

President Eisenhower has signed the bill which made the site of this historic relic of the frontier and the remaining ruins of its long abandoned adobe walls into the Fort Union National Monument.

One of the largest and longest occupied of all frontier forts, Ft. Union was established and so named by Col. E. V. Sumner in 1851. From that date until Major E. W. Wittmore marched the last troops out of it in May 1891, it served as anchor and depot for practically all U. S. military operations in the Southwest.

Kit Carson was one of its famous commanders. During the war between the States it was the base of operations for the Colorado Volunteers and other Union troops who, under command of General Sibley at the battles of Glorieta and Apache Canyon, restored New Mexico to the Union.

The Masonic Order of Northern New Mexico, among others, has been active for some years in working for the National Monument status for Fort Union. It was there that one of the first, if not the first, Masonic Lodges in New Mexico was organized.

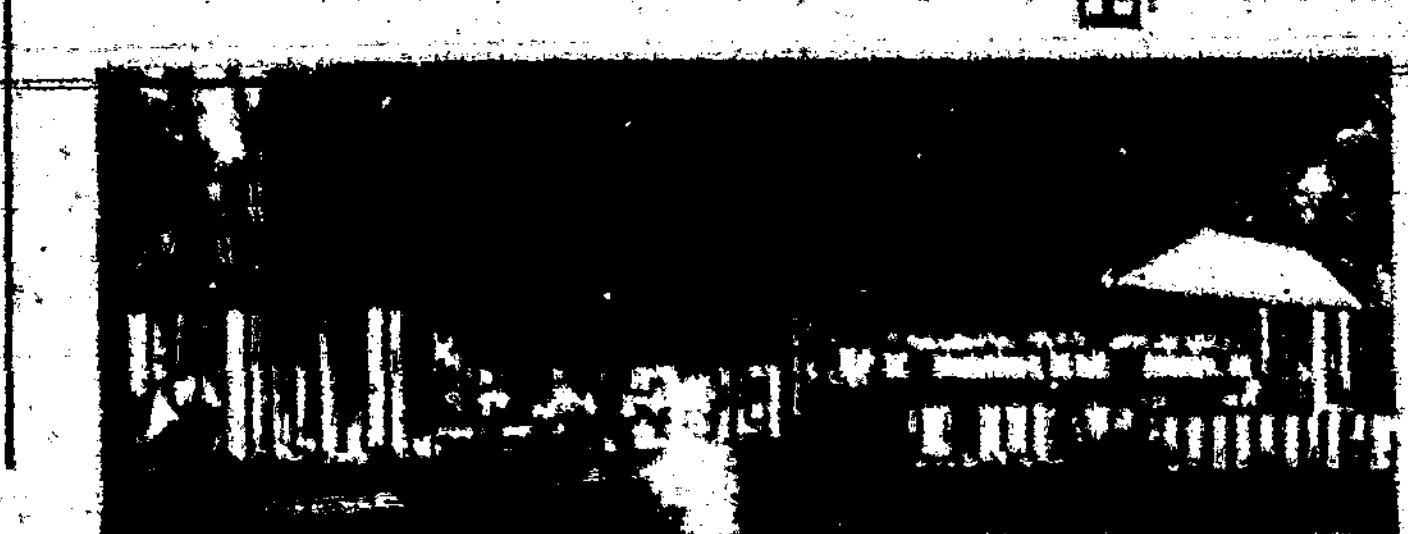

Two deep South, low income, low-literacy states, Mississippi and South Carolina, have more.

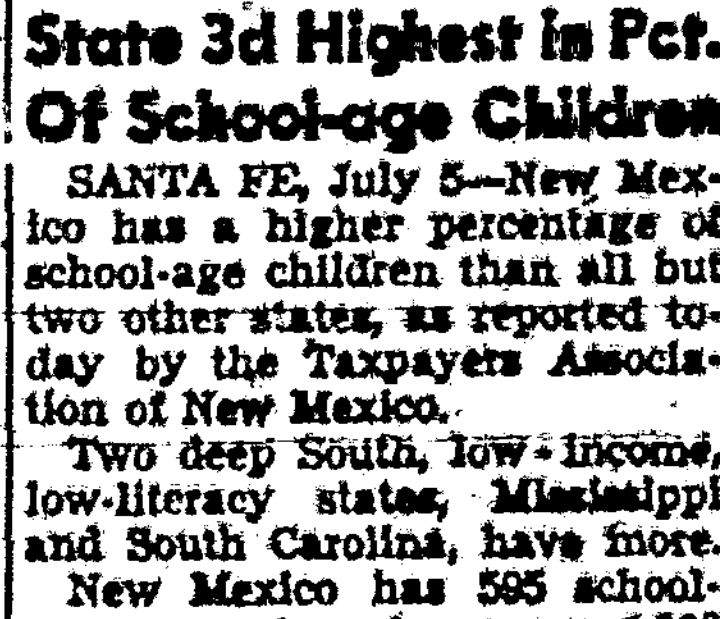
New Mexico has 595 school-age youngsters for every 1,000 wage-earning adults in its population, according to data from the National Education Ass'n.

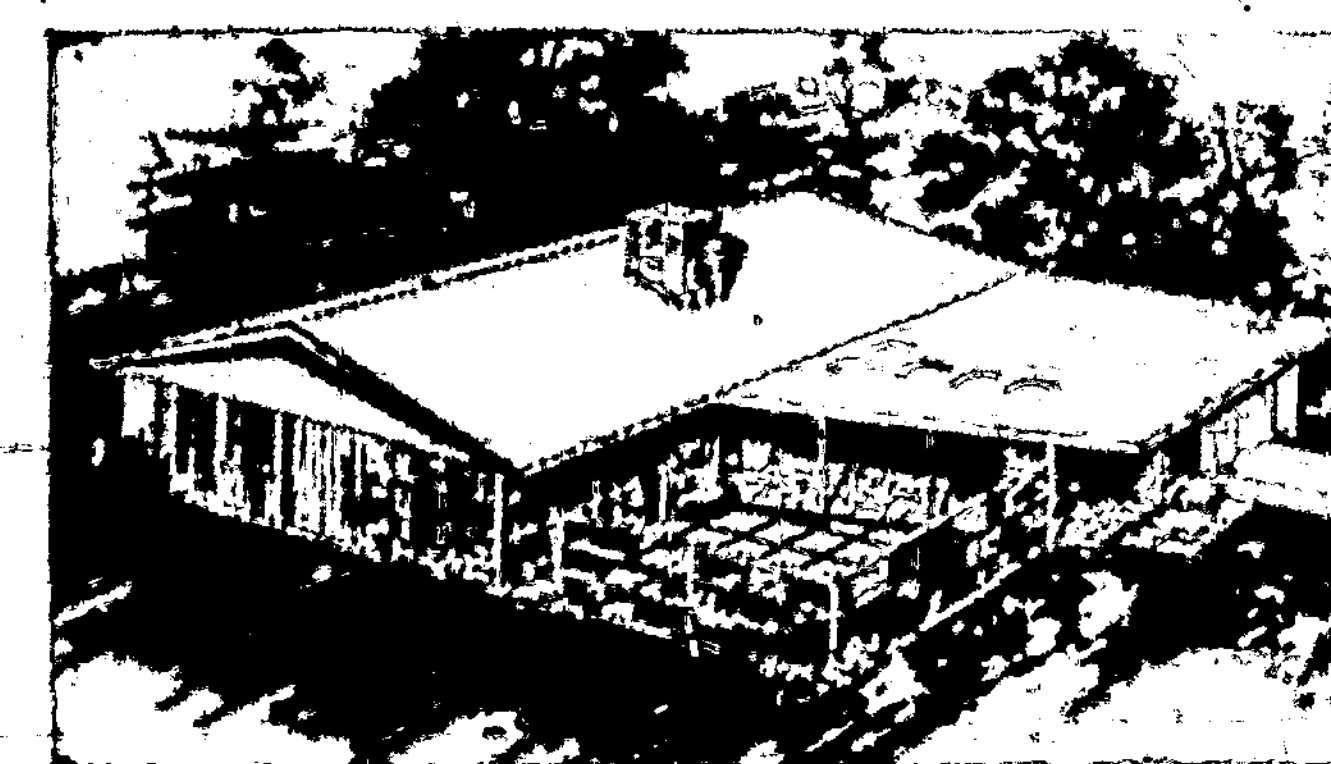

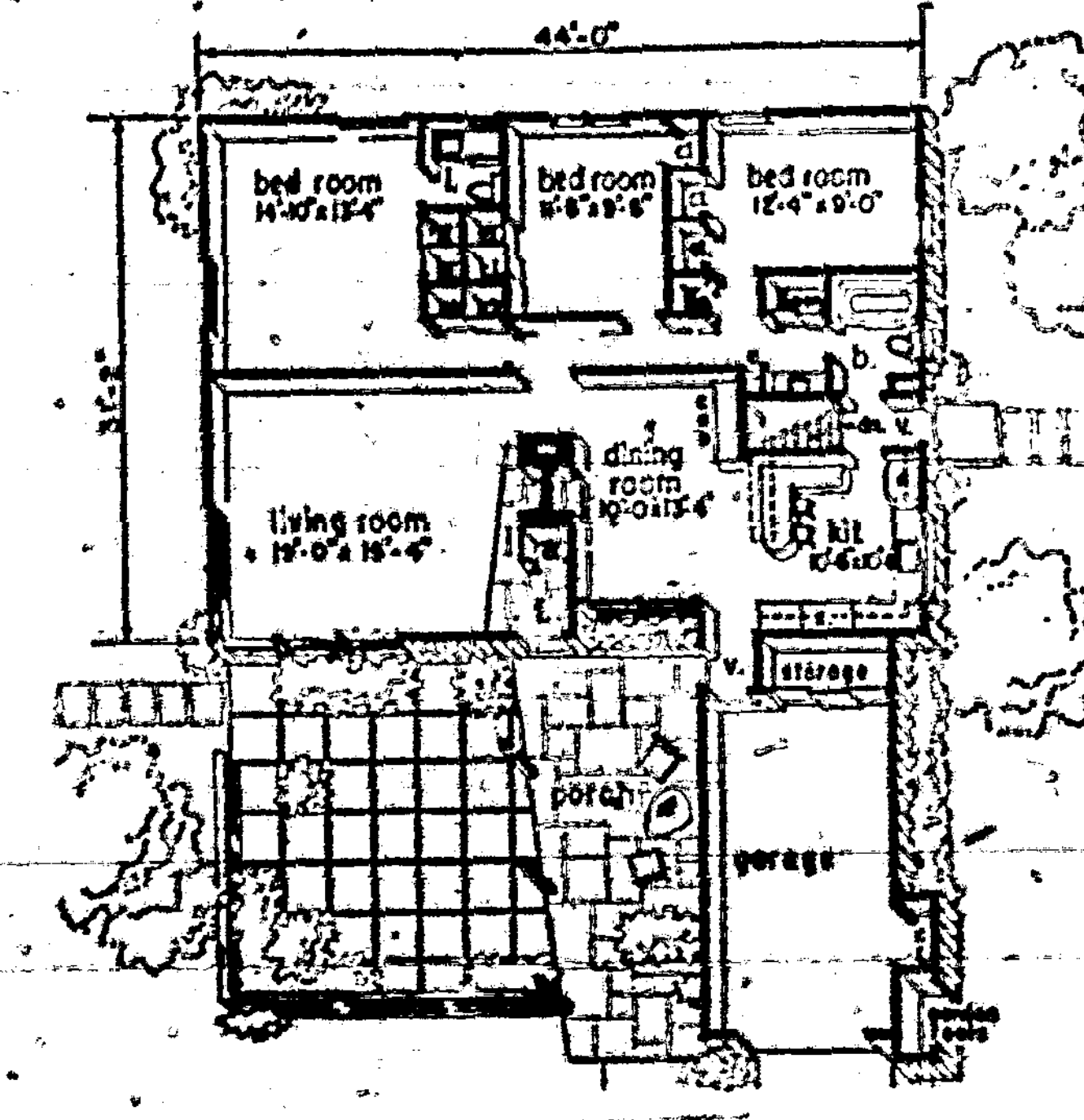
