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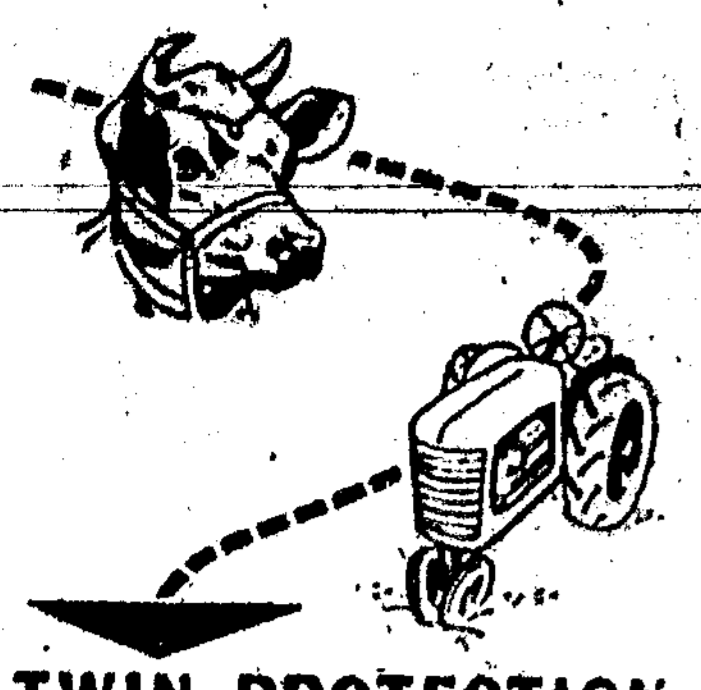
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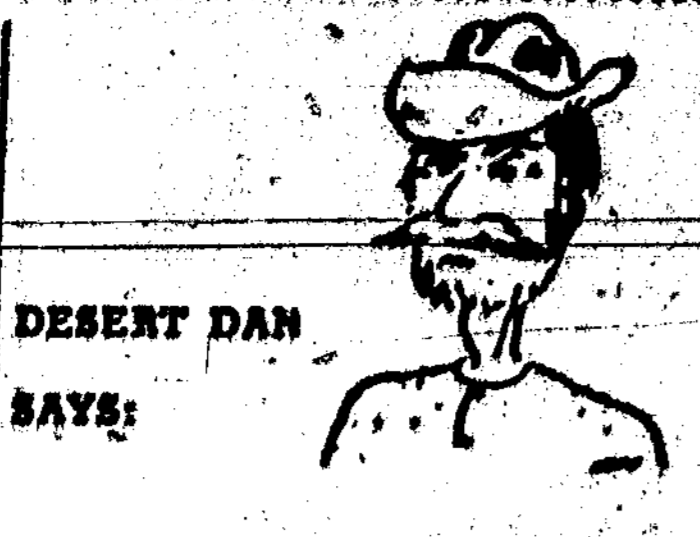

ZOZO GRIDMEN WIN OPENER FROM CAPITAN

Displaying a strong running attack and a stout defense, the Carrizoso Grizzlies scored a 12 to 6 victory Friday over their traditional rivals, the Capitan Tigers. The game was played on a soggy field and a light drizzle fell during most of the game.

The Grizzlies also showed a passing offense, completing three tosses out of four attempts. Robert Vega hit his receivers for two completions and Leroy Nowell made good one out of two.

Leroy Sidwell and Tom Barnett reeled off runs of 45 yards and 35 yards, respectively, but they were cancelled out by 15-yard penalties. In this department the Grizzlies were set back a total of 105 yards during the game, against 5 yards in penalties against the Tigers.

For Capitan, Eddie Womack's throwing arm was responsible for the Tigers' march down field in the fourth quarter, one to Joe Gallegos and another to R. G. Stewart, taking the ball almost to the Carrizoso goal line.

Here the Tigers were checked by the Grizzly goal line defense. Two tries at the line failed and the Grizzlies were penalized half the distance to the goal by an offside. The ball seemed only inches from the last stripe. Another Tiger lunge at the line failed to gain and again the Grizzlies drew a penalty for offside. A Tiger pass over the goal line was completed and then dropped.

The Grizzlies took over, but fumbled and Capitan was again knocking at the door. A forward pass, Womack to Joe Aldaz put the Tigers back in the game with 6 points. The try for point failed.

GRIZZLIES SCORE TWICE
The Grizzlies scored quickly at the opening of the second quarter and added another TD before half time. Leroy Sidwell's line bucking piled up yardage and Tingo Gallegos sparked with a 30-yard run. Both tries for points were blocked.

A light rain began to fall at the end of the first quarter and continued throughout most of the game.

A bonfire and pep rally, led by the high school band was held in Carrizoso Thursday evening prior to the game with Capitan.

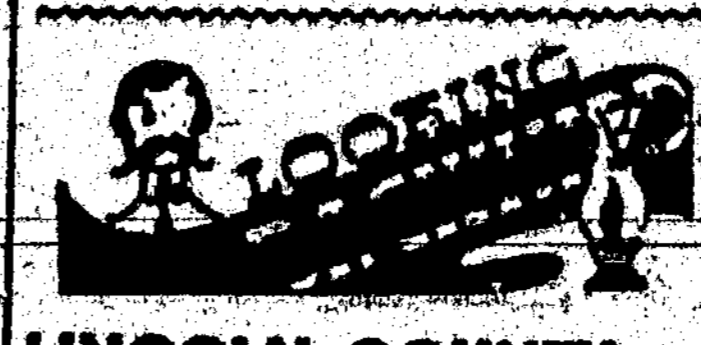
OTHER SCORES:

Senator Dennis Chavez Suggests Solution for Lake Bonito Problem

WASHINGTON—Senator Dennis Chavez has suggested that the four New Mexico towns most interested in Lake Bonito as a source of water organize into a water district in order to argue their interests in Lake Bonito.

The lake, water in which has been developed in past years by the Southern Pacific Railway, might be sold for partial use by Holloman Air Force Base.

One of the four towns, Capitan, has been unable to develop a satisfactory source of domestic water supply, the Senator said, while Ruidoso faces short supply. Fort Stanton probably has a small senior water right to part of Bonito water, and the fourth town, Carrizoso, will be dependent upon Lake Bonito.

"If the federal government attempts to withdraw the entire right at Lake Bonito for Air Force purposes; it will leave at least four towns in not too good condition," the Senator said. "The alternative, and more lasting solution, is the development of an alternate water supply in the area, and a water district probably would be necessary for this development; or to argue the matter of federal acquisition."

Senator Chavez, senior Democrat on the Senate Appropriations Committee subcommittee handling funds for the Air Forces, said he would be willing to take the matter into the Senate if the affected towns would organize in an effort.

"It could well be that in order to obtain waters from Lake Bonito, the Air Forces would be willing to ask appropriation for development of the alternative sources, and such a solution would be acceptable in all probability," the Senator said. "If the government takes, it should also be willing to give towards the replacement."

The Senator said he proposed that the entire matter be carefully considered before any action is taken in the Congress.

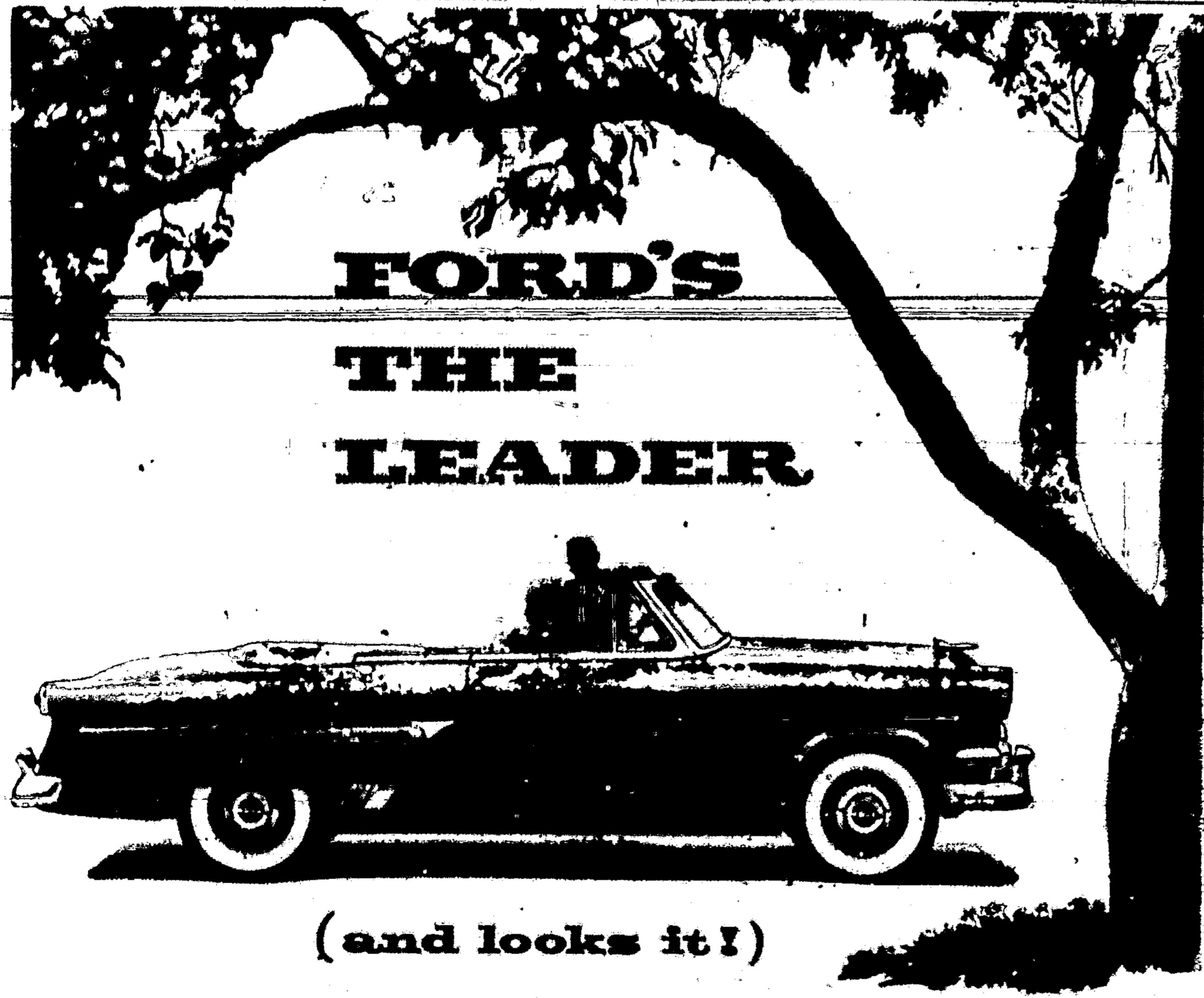

diligence and the least inconvenience to the public or individuals, and said grantees shall within a reasonable time, restore such streets, alleys and public grounds excavated by it, to their original condition as nearly as possible. Provided that in laying, all conduits, pipes or such other structures, and in the repairing of the same the said Village shall be held harmless from all damages on account of all excavations for conduits and other structures, and the said grantees shall assume and pay all liability or risk of damage to persons or property which may arise from the construction or operation of any or all of said plants or systems, and shall save the Village of Carrizozo, its officers and agents harmless from any and all liability that may arise or be incurred from the erection, construction or operation of same.

Section 3. The grantees hereby agree to service all persons in said Village of Carrizozo, upon application and payment of required deposit hereinafter stated and approved appliances installed.

The grantees shall extend its mains and furnish service from time to time therefrom upon a showing that one new bona fide customer for gas service for each 150 feet of net extension required, has signed in writing to take and use gas on such extension. In all other cases the grantees may service such customers with gas of the same quality and at the same prices by individual tank or "bottle" service, but nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the installation or maintenance of individual and separate gas tanks or gas bottles or to prohibit other distributors of liquefied petroleum gas from servicing individual gas tanks or gas bottles within the Village of Carrizozo.

Section 4. Prior to connection, a deposit of \$10.00 shall be required of each private household unit where GAS is used for cooking, water-heating and small appliances. Commercial users and general heating-consumers shall pay a minimum deposit of \$15.00. The grantees shall pay depositors interest on said deposits at the yearly rate of four per cent; PROVIDED, however, that no interest shall be paid on any deposit remaining with grantees for less than six (6) months.

Section 5. The right, privilege and franchise herein granted to Walter Ray, an individual, dba The Tularosa Basin Gas Company, his successors and assigns, is fixed for a term of twenty-five years from the date of the passage of this ordinance, at the expiration of which the Village may, at its option, upon the payment of a fair valuation to the grantee or his successors and assigns, purchase and take over the property of the grantee. The value of this franchise shall not be considered in fixing such valuation.

Section 6. The grantees of this franchise, or his assigns, shall

bear the expense of laying and furnishing all connecting pipes from the mains to the lot lines of each consumer; and the consumer shall bear the expense of laying and furnishing connecting pipes from the lot lines to where the same are to connect with the meter.

Section 7. The grantees of this franchise shall file a map showing sizes and location of all pipes, plant and equipment; and they shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, and such reasonable rules and regulations as it may enact from time to time. All constructions and material used by the grantees of this franchise or his assigns shall be subject to the inspection and approval of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo; and all such materials and labor and construction shall be to the satisfaction of the said Board of Trustees.

Section 8. The gas distribution system of the grantees, his successors and assigns, shall be conducted in such manner and connection with the main plant of grantees as to give good and sufficient gas pressure to furnish each bona fide customer with sufficient gas for all purposes relating to his business operations and residence usage. The grantees shall provide adequate service at reasonable rates and conform generally with the rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission of the State of New Mexico.

Section 9. As part consideration for the grant of this franchise, the grantees and his assigns agree to pay to the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, each month a sum equal to two percent of the gross receipts of the grantees from sales of gas sold and delivered through meters in said system, through the pipelines of the said distribution system or the meter used therein.

Section 10. The grantees shall have the right to make and enforce such reasonable rules and regulations as are necessary for the successful operation of this franchise, with the sanction of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo.

Section 11. This franchise may be assigned by the grantees; and the terms and conditions thereof in such event shall extend to and be binding upon the grantees' successors and assigns.

Section 12. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 13. This ordinance shall be come effective thirty days after its enactment.

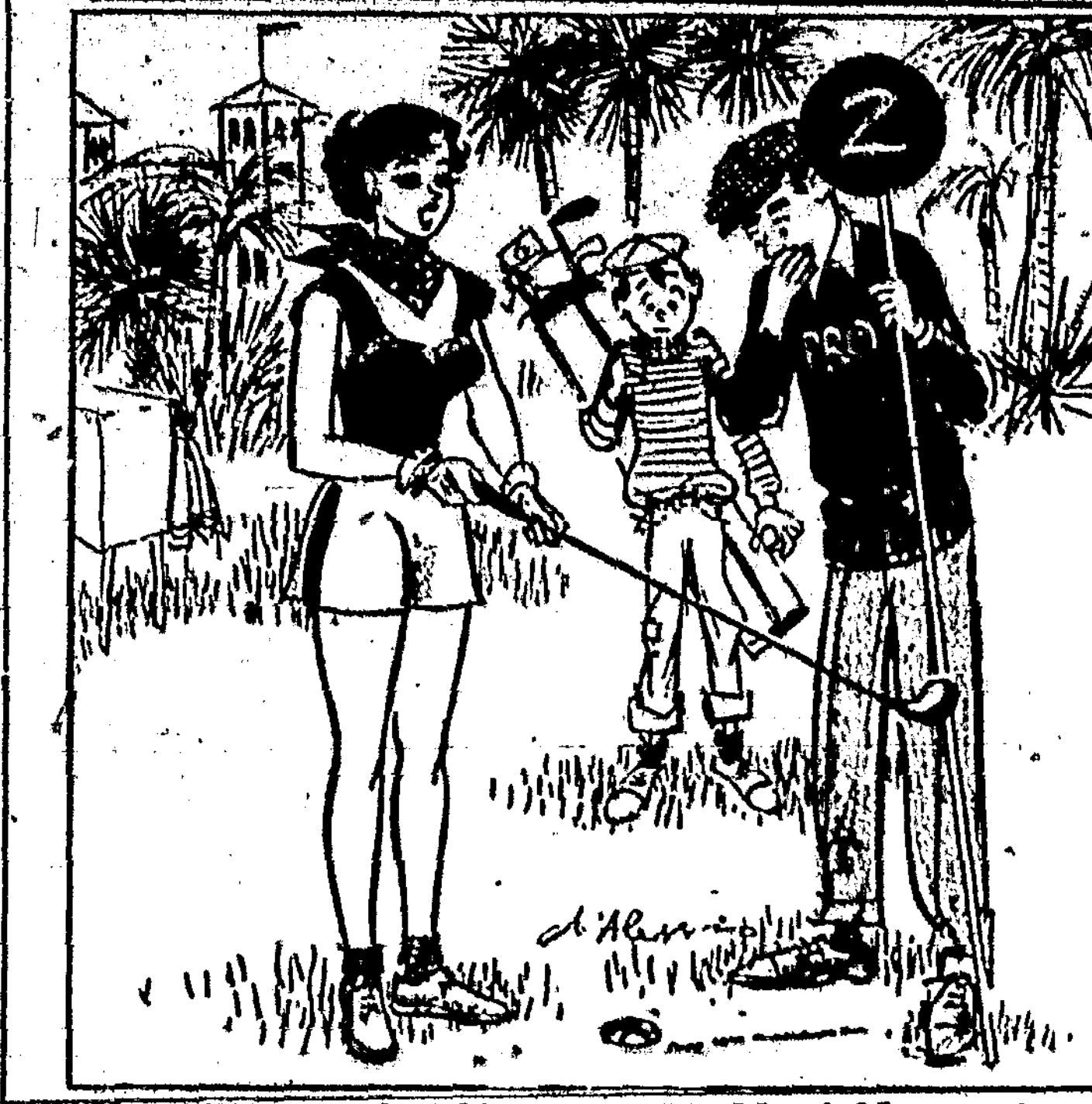

ORDINANCE No. 64

AN ORDINANCE GRANTING TO WALTER RAY, AN INDIVIDUAL, DBA THE TULAROSA BASIN GAS COMPANY, HIS SUCCESSORS AND ASSIGNS, THE RIGHT, PRIVILEGE AND FRANCHISE TO DISTRIBUTE UNDILUTED OR DILUTED LIQUID PETROLEUM GAS VAPORS OR ARTIFICIAL GAS OR NATURAL GAS IN THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO, LINCOLN COUNTY, NEW MEXICO, AND TO USE THE STREETS, ALLEYS, HIGHWAYS, BRIDGES AND OTHER PUBLIC GROUNDS OF SAID TOWN; REGULATING SAID DISTRIBUTION; PROVIDING OTHER REGULATIONS FOR THE CONDUCT OF SAID SYSTEM BY THE GRANTEE; AND REPEALING ALL ORDINANCES AND PARTS OF ORDINANCES IN CONFLICT

HEREWITH,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF CARRIZOZO, NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. Subject to the terms and conditions mentioned in this ordinance, the right, privilege and franchise is hereby granted to Walter Ray, an individual, dba The Tularosa Basin Gas Company, his successors and assigns, to acquire, lay, construct, equip, operate, repair and maintain a system of mains, pipes, conduits and feeders, and the necessary plants, attachments and appurtenances for the purpose of storing, manufacturing, mixing, supplying and distributing undiluted or diluted liquid petroleum gas vapors, or artificial gas, or natural gas, hereinafter termed "GAS" for fuel, power, heat, light and other domestic and industrial purposes, or for any other or either of them in the Village of Carrizozo, Lincoln County, New Mexico, including any territory that may hereafter be annexed thereto; and further, to acquire, lay, use, maintain and operate in, through, upon, under and along the streets, avenues, alleys, lanes, highways, parks and bridges, a system of gas mains and all service pipes, conduits, feeders and the necessary attachments, connections, fixtures and appurtenances for distributing, supplying and colling such GAS for said purposes to the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, and to the inhabitants thereof.

Section 2. The said grantee is hereby authorized, licensed and empowered to do any and all things necessary and proper to be done and performed in executing the powers and utilizing the privileges herein mentioned and granted by this franchise, provided the same do not conflict with water pipes and sewers now existing and that all work done in said streets, alleys and highways or other grounds of said Village, by said grantee, shall be done with the utmost

Section 3. The grantees hereby agree to service all persons in said Village of Carrizozo, upon application and payment of required deposit hereinafter stated and approved appliances installed.

The grantees shall extend its mains and furnish service from time to time therefrom upon a showing that one new bona fide customer for gas service for each 150 feet of net extension required, has signed in writing to take and use gas on such extension. In all other cases the grantees may service such customers with gas of the same quality and at the same prices by individual tank or "bottle" service, but nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the installation or maintenance of individual and separate gas tanks or gas bottles or to prohibit other distributors of liquefied petroleum gas from servicing individual gas tanks or gas bottles within the Village of Carrizozo.

Section 4. Prior to connection, a deposit of \$10.00 shall be required of each private household unit where GAS is used for cooking, water-heating and small appliances. Commercial users and general heating-consumers shall pay a minimum deposit of \$15.00. The grantees shall pay depositors interest on said deposits at the yearly rate of four per cent; PROVIDED, however, that no interest shall be paid on any deposit remaining with grantees for less than six (6) months.

Section 5. The right, privilege and franchise herein granted to Walter Ray, an individual, dba The Tularosa Basin Gas Company, his successors and assigns, is fixed for a term of twenty-five years from the date of the passage of this ordinance, at the expiration of which the Village may, at its option, upon the payment of a fair valuation to the grantee or his successors and assigns, purchase and take over the property of the grantee. The value of this franchise shall not be considered in fixing such valuation.

Section 6. The grantees of this franchise, or his assigns, shall

bear the expense of laying and furnishing all connecting pipes from the mains to the lot lines of each consumer; and the consumer shall bear the expense of laying and furnishing connecting pipes from the lot lines to where the same are to connect with the meter.

Section 7. The grantees of this franchise shall file a map showing sizes and location of all pipes, plant and equipment; and they shall be subject to the approval of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo, and such reasonable rules and regulations as it may enact from time to time. All constructions and material used by the grantees of this franchise or his assigns shall be subject to the inspection and approval of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo; and all such materials and labor and construction shall be to the satisfaction of the said Board of Trustees.

Section 8. The gas distribution system of the grantees, his successors and assigns, shall be conducted in such manner and connection with the main plant of grantees as to give good and sufficient gas pressure to furnish each bona fide customer with sufficient gas for all purposes relating to his business operations and residence usage. The grantees shall provide adequate service at reasonable rates and conform generally with the rules and regulations of the Public Service Commission of the State of New Mexico.

Section 9. As part consideration for the grant of this franchise, the grantees and his assigns agree to pay to the Village of Carrizozo, New Mexico, each month a sum equal to two percent of the gross receipts of the grantees from sales of gas sold and delivered through meters in said system, through the pipelines of the said distribution system or the meter used therein.

Section 10. The grantees shall have the right to make and enforce such reasonable rules and regulations as are necessary for the successful operation of this franchise, with the sanction of the Board of Trustees of the Village of Carrizozo.

Section 11. This franchise may be assigned by the grantees; and the terms and conditions thereof in such event shall extend to and be binding upon the grantees' successors and assigns.

Section 12. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

Section 13. This ordinance shall be come effective thirty days after its enactment.

They are spinning their wheels in the big effort and big spending in the counties. Their common explanation is that they fear the counties will go overboard against them if they fail to match the efforts of the other side. That makes it nice for

more attention from the candidates and the party organizations than those of any other part of the state.

The break-even voting in the counties may cost them something in state influence but it refutes the commonly repeated libel that the people can be controlled at the polls and elections won with money.

WISCONSIN ENTERS NEW MEXICO CAMPAIGN

Big surprise to candidates of this campaign is the New Mexico influence of far-away Sen. Joe McCarthy of Wisconsin. Whether they approve or disapprove of Joe could become a bigger issue here than any local question developed so far. Democrats know it and have made not a single peep against the flamboyant Republican senator. Republicans are in an embarrassed position with one of their candidates for Congress going all out against the Wisconsin senator, the other one endorsing him and the rest of the candidates trying to talk about something else.

Tom Childers of Santa Fe, the McCarthy critic, has been flooded with mail from Republicans and Democrats threatening defeat for his anti-McCarthy position. The uproar against Childers and the comment it raised revealed an unsuspected following of McCarthy in New Mexico. His proponents seem to think nothing of bolting their parties on the subject, and there seems to be a lot of them.

Gov. Ed McChesney, the Republican candidate for senator, sometime back mildly criticized McCarthy but he's been pretty quiet ever since. The Democrats, secretly gloating over the Republican trouble with Joe have carefully refrained from saying anything, taking the politically frankish position that they should not discuss a member of the other party.

The heart of the McCarthy support seems to lie in Democratic southeastern New Mexico. Childers, who has gone too far to back up even if he wanted to, says that the most avid of Joe's friends come from Eddy which has long been the banner Democratic county of the state. Childers should know. He's had many letters from most all of them.
