**Lincoln County Made Best Record in State in 1953 Seal Sale**

Lincoln County achieved an enviable reputation in last year's Christmas Seal sale. According to a bulletin of the New Mexico Tuberculosis Association, Lincoln County not only reached its potential, but exceeded it, the only county in the state to reach this high mark.

Lincoln County ranks 14th in the state, according to its effective buying income. This potential figure is based on a complicated formula which considers the wealth of a county, and was computed by George Pierson, field representative.

Lincoln County's potential seal sale was estimated to be \$903. The total seal sale amounted to \$868.

Other counties that approached their potential last year were Bernalillo and Santa Fe.

Funds derived from Christmas Seal sales are dedicated to eradication of man's age-old enemy—tuberculosis.

**Mrs. Jane Turner To Be County Director For March of Dimes**

The appointment of Mrs. Jane P. Turner, as Lincoln County director for "March of Dimes" was announced last week by R. P. "Bob" Conway, New Mexico chairman for MoFD.

"As we prepare for our 1955 March of Dimes appeal—January 3 to the 31st—we pray that the end is in sight," Mr. Conway said. "The Salk polio vaccine may be the answer, but its value will not be known until the University of Michigan report is complete in April.

"We are on the offensive now, carrying the fight right to this dread crippler. Yet the fight is not over—although 9 million vaccinations of three shots each will be available next year for children who did not receive vaccine in the field trials this year. Pregnant women and first grade children are also scheduled to receive the vaccine.

"Before volunteering to serve in my present capacity," Mr. Conway adds, "I was March of Dimes chairman for Bernalillo County. During this time, I have seen heartwarming results made possible by our appeals of previous years. I sincerely hope, and feel, that we can finish the job in the foreseeable future, if we keep fighting, and driving ahead, as hard as we have in the past—or even harder."

**Three New Polio Cases in State**

Three new cases of polio—two in Grant county and one in Bernalillo, brought the total number reported in the State to date up to 226. This compares with 103 cases of polio to date last year and the five-year median of 131 to date.

A. A. Farotti, head of the New Mexico Western music department, will conduct tryouts for the all-state band and orchestra, which will appear in Albuquerque in January.

**Survey Finds Water of Many Towns Deficient in Fluoride Content**

SANTA FE, Dec. 30—As a result of surveys recently conducted by the Dental Health Division of the New Mexico Department of Public Health, it was found that Santa Fe Junior High School students have four times as much tooth decay as students of the same age in Belen.

This is evidently due to the fact that Santa Fe has little or no fluoride in its water supply, whereas Belen has just enough to prevent tooth decay in children using this water all their lives.

Low percentages of tooth decay were also found in junior high school students in Lovington and Lordsburg, two communities with adequate concentrations of fluoride in their water supplies.

In the student groups compared, the only significant difference was the amount of fluoride in the water supply. Per capita income, food habits, and racial origins of the groups were essentially the same.

At the present time more than one thousand communities in 34 different states are now adding fluoride to the water supplies to bring it up to an optimum level for the prevention of tooth decay. New Mexico is one of the four states in the country where fluoridation has not yet been adopted by any community.

Chemical analyses of the public water supplies of 88 different communities in the state have revealed that four have no fluoride in their water supplies, 54 others are deficient, and 40 have a sufficient amount so that fluoride would not have to be added.

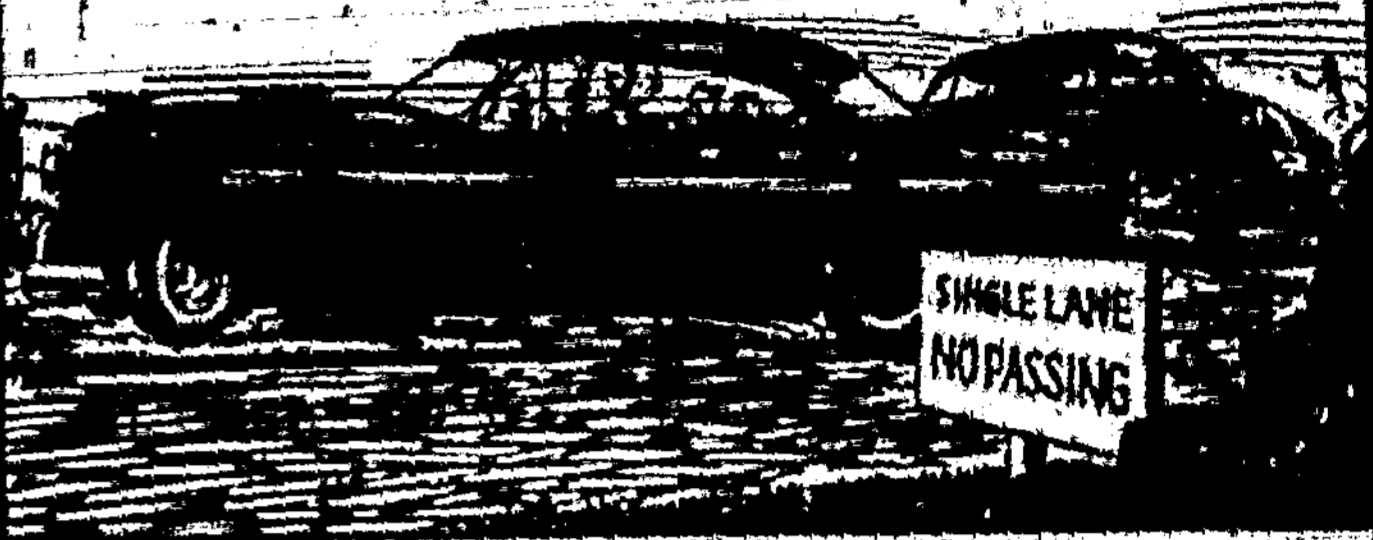

SW States Approve Beetle Quarantine

California will soon impose a quarantine against importation of products from premises which have infestations of the Khapra beetle, according to Dr. R. A. Nichols, dean and director of agriculture at the New Mexico A&M College, who recently testified at a public hearing on the subject at Fresno, Calif.

The insect, which was first reported in California, has infested 14 kinds of stored food products in 50 warehouses in seven southern California counties, Dr. Nichols says. New Mexico and Arizona have also reported infestations of the beetle. Colorado and Arizona have issued quarantines against importing any New Mexico products which might be beetle infested.

New Mexico will soon issue a quarantine edict against importing such products from other infested states.

Products which have been infested include barley, wheat, rice, oats, milo, pinto beans, all-purpose pellets, and oriental poppy, alfalfa, cotton, pea, and honey sorghum seed. Potential damage to these stored crops runs into millions of dollars. The beetle will eat practically any edible stored product, including hay—it will also eat wool and cotton clothing and paper.

At a meeting in Denver on December 1, federal and state officials from several western states were to decide on quarantine regulations to be imposed on infested areas in California, New Mexico and Arizona.

The Khapra beetle, which originated in India and Ceylon, is considered the worst insect pest of stored food products in the western hemisphere," Dr. Nichols states, adding, "It will take the combined efforts of all agricultural workers to rid the Southwest of this great destroyer of food and feed."

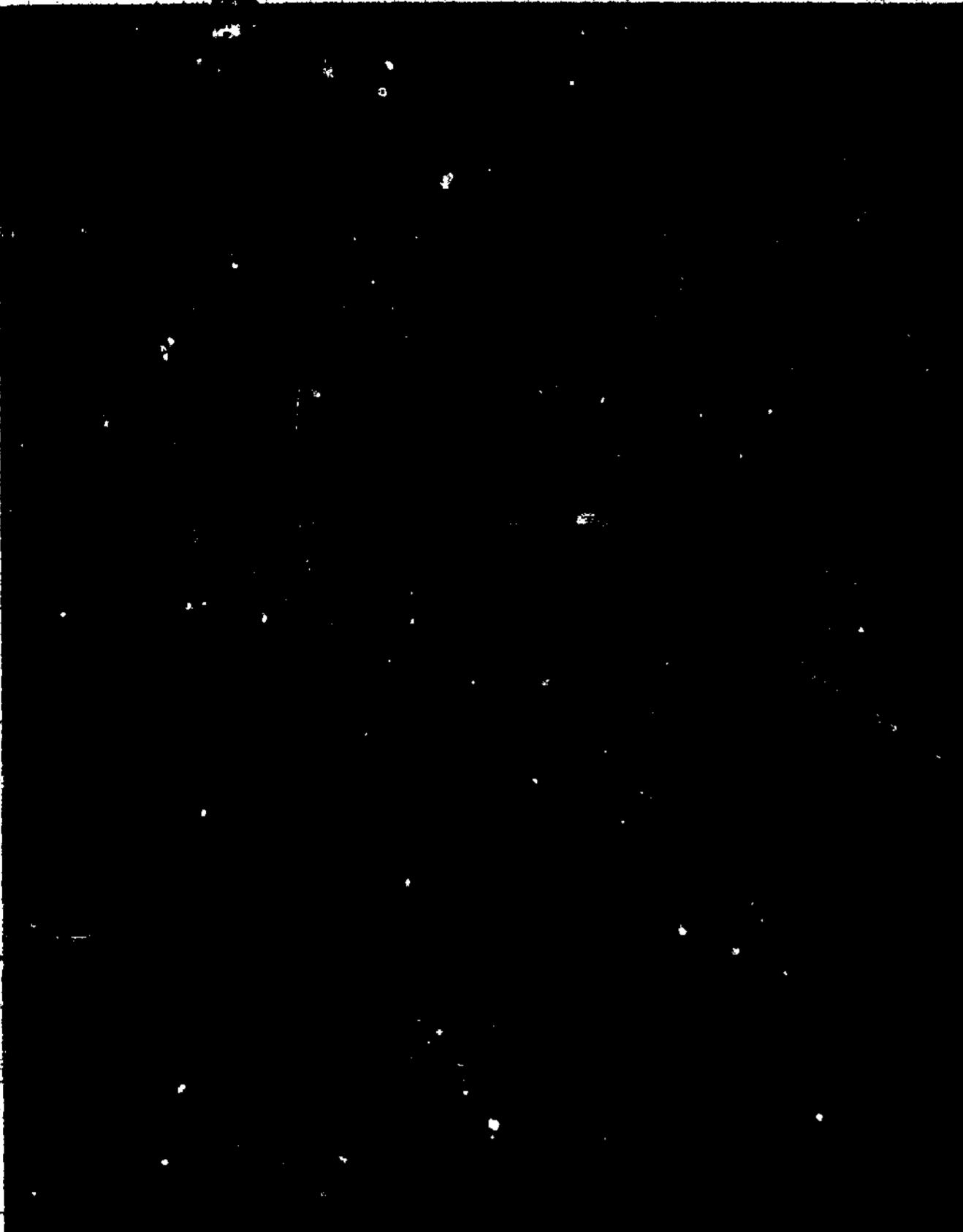
