RAMBLIN' AROUND

"People, only people matter," said President Eisenhower in a recent talk before a national assembly of delegates to an American Red Cross convention. His eloquent words emphasized that in peace time or in war, the American Red Cross is the first organized agency to give aid and comfort when disaster strikes. The Red Cross has a long record of service to America. Hardly had one small branch been organized before the turn of the century when it had work to do to relieve victims of a great forest fire in Michigan. The following year Mississippi floods swept over the country for hundreds of square miles and a 400-ton steamer was loaded with clothing. It started down the river flying the Red Cross flag—the first of many ships of mercy to fly that banner. . . . So on, down through the years whenever calamity or disaster struck. The Red Cross has made mistakes, such as during World War II when cigarettes and like articles were sold to servicemen. Many of the latter have been severely critical of this policy, though it was made by the Armed Services board, not by the Red Cross.

Red Cross officials freely admit now that it is unpopular to sell cigarettes, etc., to servicemen in wartime and they will never again be forced into a vendor's role. Gifts are now made outright to the men in uniform, with no strings attached. Be that as it may, it seems that a few mistakes can well be forgiven in view of the long record of the American Red Cross in serving humanity.

Funds donated in Lincoln County this year to the Red Cross are apportioned approximately on a 50-50 basis — half remaining in the county and half going to the national organization to be used for programs such as disaster relief and blood production.

A glance at the list of Lincoln County residents who will work with Red Cross during the coming months is enough assurance that funds collected for local use will be put to the best possible use.

In its February 17 issue the Albuquerque Journal reported that a monthly map posted at an Atomic Energy Commission office in that city, listed several areas in the state showing unusual radioactivity. He operates an irrigated farm in Valencia County, but is a property owner in Hondo and is a registered voter in Lincoln County.

Edward Penfield, treasurer of the Democratic County Central Committee, presided over the pre-convention meeting.

Mrs. Marie Rooney was named secretary of the convention.

R. C. Nunez is chairman of the County Central Committee.

SEWER BOND ISSUE TO BE PRESENTED TO CARRIZOZO VOTERS

The Carrizozo town trustees and the mayor met Monday night with A. G. Classen, the town water engineer, to discuss the question of submitting a bond issue to improve and extend the existing sewerage system and construct a sewerage disposal and treatment plant.

Mr. Classen submitted an estimate of the cost of a sewerage system which would serve 97% of the homes and businesses within the town's incorporated limits. It would be large enough to take care of the town's normal growth in the foreseeable future.

It was brought out that the existing sewer lines are overloaded at the present time and serve a relatively small part of town. Mr. Classen pointed out that construction prices were declining on this type of work and that there would be considerable saving in having the water and sewer installations made at the same time; also the fact that the town streets would not have to be torn up at two different times.

Meets Health Requirements
The proposed plan will meet all of the requirements and conform to the rules and regulations of the New Mexico State Health Department.

The estimated increase in the tax rate necessary to pay for the sewer system would be \$1.25 per \$100 assessed valuation for the first year. Thereafter, revenues from the sewerage system would be used to reduce the tax rate per \$100 valuation.

After discussion, the town trustees voted unanimously to authorize their town attorneys, Brenton & Boyce to prepare the necessary papers for submitting a bond issue of \$150,000 to the voters for their decision at the April 6 town election.

A majority of votes cast will be necessary for the approval of both the water bond issue and sewerage bond issue. Each issue will be voted on separately.

Carrizozo Band Having Evening Rehearsals

The Carrizozo school band is having rehearsals every Monday night, under the leadership of Leon White, new band instructor.

Planning activities for the band members, such as attending a band clinic in March, a Spring concert and possibly a series of summer concerts in the town's park.

Mr. White came to Carrizozo where he directed the music program. He was born in Springfield, Mo., and was graduated from high school there. He is a graduate of the Southwest Missouri State College Conservatory of Music; also a graduate and post-graduate of the Busch Conservatory of Music in Chicago.

Mr. White studied conducting under Arturo Toscanini and spent three years in concert work throughout the United States Canada and Mexico. He taught music in schools in Missouri before moving to the coast of Texas. There he taught nine and six years in Rosenberg and years in Texas City.

Mr. and Mrs. White have five children, four of whom are of school age.

Capitan Plans Tourney For Grade Hoopsters

Plans are being made in Capitan for an invitational basketball tournament for fifth, sixth, seventh and eighth grade teams.

As outlined this week, the tournament would be held two days, March 12 and 13, with possibly 16 teams taking part, including Hondo, Corona, Capitan, Carrizozo, Saint Rita, Ruidoso, Lincoln, Picacho, San Patricio and Mesalero.

Teams from the fifth and sixth grades would play off one day and seventh and eighth grade teams the next day.

Lincoln County's two units of the New Mexico Farm & Livestock Bureau began this week to plan for the organization's annual membership drive, which will be the week of March 7 through 14.

Directors of the County units met Tuesday night at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Bill Shrecengost in Hondo to discuss the program for the annual enrollment of members. Mrs. Shrecengost presented a preliminary outline of plans to the directors. Team captains are also to be appointed.

Wayne Powers, Bureau organizer for the southern part of New Mexico was present.

One feature of Farm and Livestock Bureau week is to be a joint radio program with Chavez County over radio station KBIM.

Lincoln County and Luna County also have a wager on which will have the largest percentage of membership on a total county population basis. The stakes are: Luna County, a hundred pounds of beans vs. Lincoln County, three bushels of apples. The winner will be decided on the basis of each county's membership November 1.

Capt. Charles Snow Delivers U. S. Food to Isolated Germans

BREMEN, GERMANY, Feb. 14 — A U. S. Airforce C-119 Flying Boxcar, commanded by Capt. Charles Snow of Carrizozo, N. M., today parachuted 14,000 pounds of food to hungry residents of the Island of Juist. The Island has been cut off from the German mainland for two weeks by ice.

Capt. Snow's plane made two flights from Bremen today, each time making several low passes over the North German Island before parachuting the food.

During the second flight, Juist children stood in formation to spell out "Danke," German for "thank you."

The island was cut off three weeks ago when the shallow sea separating it from the north German mainland froze. The ice is not strong enough to bear vehicles or sleds.

Mayor Hans Wiers of Juist reported today the last flour on the island had been exhausted and that there had been no supplies of fish for five days.

Grownups and children alike waved and danced excitedly as the seven tons of flour, meat and other foodstuffs floated down from the skies beneath colorful parachutes.

Copper Corp. Official Visits Properties Here

John J. Keel of Washington, D. C., vice president of the New Mexico Copper Corporation, was a recent visitor to Lincoln County, inspecting the company's mine and mill. While here Mr. Keel was the guest of C. E. Degner, president of the corporation.

The mill in Carrizozo which is to process ore from the corporation's Conqueror-Rio Tinto mines, is complete except for wiring and the installation of a diesel engine powered electric plant.

Mr. Degner states that Vice President Keel was favorably impressed with progress made at the mill, also with the various ore bodies opened up at the mines.

Another recent visitor to the corporation's properties has been Cooper Shapley, of Deming, noted metallurgist and a member of the Atomic Energy Commission. Mr. Shapley made the selective flotation sheet for the mill and the blue print for its construction. He will return to give technical assistance when the mill begins operation.

Mr. Degner states that the metallurgist was pleased with both the mechanical construction at the mill and the ore bodies in the first and second levels of the mine, which will supply ore for the mill.

Rio Grande to Flow 'Well Below Normal'

The water supply outlook for the Rio Grande in Colorado and New Mexico is for well below normal stream flow during the 1954 season, according to the Federal-State cooperative snow survey and water supply forecast of the Soil Conservation Service, U. S. Department of Agriculture, and the Colorado Agricultural Experiment Station.

Snow outlook to Feb. 1 is about 80 per cent of normal at higher elevations and much less at lower elevations. The most probable summer flow of the Rio Grande is about 75 per cent of

normal in the San Luis Valley, and less in per cent of normal in New Mexico.

These estimates are subject to considerable revision as the season advances, the agencies state, but the chances that summer flow will be above normal in New Mexico are about one in ten. Soil moisture conditions are fair in the San Luis Valley and poor along the Rio Grande in New Mexico.

HEARINGS BEGIN ON DISPOSITION OF FT. STANTON LANDS

(From the Albuquerque Journal's Washington Bureau.)

WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 19.—Efforts to settle the future of Fort Stanton in New Mexico gained little ground here today. After two hours of testimony the House subcommittee on public lands adjourned the matter until further witnesses could be called.

Rep. Antonio Fernandez's bill, HR 6728, designed to give to the Mescalero Apaches all of Fort Stanton reservation not required for the administration of the state hospital there, ran into objections from subcommittee members.

The Rev. Wendell Chino, president of the tribal business committee who put up the case for the Mescaleros, admitted that the tribe has claims in court for all of southern New Mexico between the Pecos and Rio Grande.

"What bothers me," Rep. William A. Dawson (R. Utah) said, "is that if we pass this bill it will look like Congress recognizes your claim. Wouldn't that influence the court in the case?"

Attorney I. S. Weissbrodt explained that a provision could be expressly included in the bill preventing such an interpretation.

Rep. Ken Regan (D., Tex.) expressed his concern for possible Indian claims below the Texas border.

"To date, the record has been that Indian claims do not apply to Texas because there is no public domain in the state," Weissbrodt replied.

STATE PRESENTS CLAIM
Stelner Mason, State Department Welfare official, then put in the state's claim for 12,760 acres of Fort Stanton reservation—rather than the 1800 to which they would be limited by the Fernandez bill.

"The primary reason is to protect the water rights of the Ft. Stanton hospital," he said in explaining the larger request.

Mason also asked for transfer of sufficient water rights to maintain present and future increased capacity of the hospital.

Fernandez then took the stand to tell the subcommittee that he believed Indian claims should come first in the area outside the immediate hospital grounds.

"If this bill doesn't pass, I'd like to see all the land transferred to the state as institutional land to be held in trust for the hospital," he said.

Dempsey told the subcommittee, "I generally agree with Mr. Fernandez but I am for giving the hospital as much land as is necessary for its administration and all the water rights needed. What's left should go to the Indians. But if the Indian claim is rejected by Congress, I think the state should get the whole reservation."

Fernandez expressed regret that U. S. Public Health Service, which formerly administered the hospital and reservation, did not present witnesses to clarify some of the past practices.

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

GET RID OF CATTLE LICE

Winter gains in beef cattle may be reduced greatly by heavy infestations of lice. And lice may cut down dairy cattle production. Lice are at the worst during late winter and early spring.

Cattle with lice can be seen scratching and rubbing on trees, posts and fences. If treatment is delayed, patches of bare hide will appear where the hair has been rubbed off.

It is very simple to get rid of lice in your herds, and it will pay you big dividends. Your beef cattle will put on more weight, and your dairy cattle will speed up milk production.

Sprays or dusts of rotenone, pyrethrum, methoxychlor, DDT, toxaphene, lindane, benzene hexachloride, or chlordane to get rid of lice, or if the weather is cold use a powder or dust.

Sprays or dusts of rotenone, pyrethrum, methoxychlor, or lindane are the only ones recommended for use on dairy cattle.

Remember that many of these insecticides are poisonous. Be sure to follow the directions on the container when mixing any chemicals. Keep the insecticides out of feed containers and watering troughs.

If weather is bad, wait until it clears up before spraying recently weaned calves. Don't use oil sprays on cattle. If you use a power or hand sprayer, be sure the insecticide is thoroughly mixed.

Outline New Program Of Wool Payments

Leading authorities say that wool production in the United States is a very "sick" industry and in need of a new program. Congress long since established a goal of 360 million pounds of shorn domestic wool as necessary for the national interest. On the other hand, our present production is closer to 299 million pounds, which figure reflects a near-continuous decline in production under the support program. Moreover, at an annual storage cost of about a million dollars a year, our government has been sole heir to nearly 100 million pounds of CCC-purchased domestic wools. This surplus accumulated in recent years under the commodity support program—and while foreign imports continued to fill the bulk of our U. S. consumption.

Bill Snyder, extension wool marketing specialist at A&M College, points out that the new administration-sponsored wool bill now before Congress would do away with the commodity support program—all wools selling freely on the open market. Under this bill all growers would receive the same percentage payment of their selling price as required to raise the average national price for the marketing season to the incentive level set by the Secretary of Agriculture.

This additional direct subsidy to growers would be paid from unobligated wool tariff revenues. Further, the administration bill, favored by the National Wool Growers Assn., would provide a high "incentive" level of subsidy payments, when open market prices are low, Snyder states. And it would be low in cost of administration. It would not burden nor complicate the free flow of wool from range to manufacturer. Incidentally, this bill does not provide the same "per pound" payment to growers, as previously announced. It does include a "percentage" payment of selling price. Moreover, this payment is not determined by comparing average selling price to 90 percent parity—rather, this comparison is to an incentive level, the wool marketing specialist explains.

Snyder cites a working example under the proposed administration plan. If the incentive level were set at 50 cents per grease pound and the average national selling price were 40 cents, then the additional payment would amount to 10 percent of 25 per cent. Hence, better quality clips sold at 60 cents, for example, would then receive an additional check amounting to 15 cents per grease pound. Such payments could amount to a "double" incentive—incentive to increase the domestic sheep population and incentive to produce higher quality, higher selling wools, he adds.

Capitan Bees set the pattern for the evening by getting away to a commanding lead in the first quarter, holding the Grizzly Bees to 5 points from the free throw line while scoring 15 in the first stanza.

BEEF CONTINUES IN PLENTIFUL SUPPLY

Live for today and enjoy beef in the living. Beef continues in plentiful supply. The latest news on the general meat situation is that the year's total production of meat will be high again this year, although probably not as high as last year for fewer cattle and lambs are on feed and hog slaughter will be down.

Cattle numbers on farms Jan. 1, 1954, were only a little below the 93.7 million of Jan. 1, 1953, but the number of cattle on feed was 9 per cent smaller. During the coming months, less fed cattle will be slaughtered. Slaughter of all other cattle may be larger than last winter. This means that consumers will find more medium and lower grades of beef on the market.

Farmers saved 9 per cent fewer pigs last fall than a year earlier, hence pork is not particularly in good supply. But since hog producers are on record as planning to increase the number of sows to farrow spring pigs by 6 per cent, it's forecast that after mid-year hog slaughter will begin to exceed a year earlier.

Fewer lambs are being fed this winter than last. Lessons from the Bible THE STORY OF JACOB

(Fifth of a series)

Before Jacob can materialize his dream and fulfill his vision he needs preparation. After Bethel comes Peniel. After the dream comes the struggle. Self must be conquered before life can be at its best. It takes more than vision to make a great and useful life. It takes power and power requires preparation.

The preparation of Jacob came at a place called Peniel. Peniel came because of crisis. Jacob had to meet Esau on the morrow and he was afraid. Esau had a score to settle with Jacob, a debt to pay, and in preparation for what he feared was coming, he turned to God. The story reads like this:

"And Jacob was left alone; and there wrestled a man with him until the breaking of day. And when he saw that he prevailed not against him, he touched the hollow of his thigh; and the hollow of his thigh was out of joint as he wrestled with him. And he said, 'Let me go for the day breaketh.' And he said, 'I will not let thee go, until thou bless me.' And he said unto him, 'What is thy name?' and he said, 'Jacob.' And he said, 'Thy name shall no more be called Jacob, but Israel; for as a prince thou hast power with God and with men, and hast prevailed.' And Jacob asked him, and said, 'Tell me, I pray thee, thy name.' And he said, 'Wherefore is it that thou ask after my name?' And he blessed him there, and Jacob called the name of the place Peniel; for I have seen God and my life is preserved. And as he passed over Peniel, the sun rose upon him, and he halted upon his thigh. Therefore the children of Israel eat not of the sinew which shrank upon the hollow of the thigh, unto this day; because he touched the hollow of Jacob's thigh in the sinew that shrank." (Gen. 32:24-28.)

Legend tells us that Jacob was a man of supernatural strength. God had caused the dew of the resurrection to drop upon him and his physical strength was so great that even in this combat with an Angel he was victorious until 'touched in the thigh. However this may have been, there is reason to believe it is true, for it is evident that Jacob was a determined and strong man. Up to this point his determination and strength were always self-centered. Jacob was ambitious for himself. He was not master of himself, but mastered by his desires, ambition and plans, in these employed unscrupulous and cunning methods. Now he faces himself and comes to the turning point of his career.

What happened to Jacob as he wrestled in a picture of God's dealings with His children today. Are we faced with some difficult problem? Are we opposed by some apparently insuperable obstacle? Are we at our wits end in view of some


