ASK MANDAMUS IN UTILITY CASE

An application for a writ of mandamus has been filed in the district court. Entitled State of New Mexico on relation of Wel-

In the application, Welcolin Armstrong, "a consumer of utilities," through his attorney, Geo. L. Zimmerman, sets forth a number of complaints, among them:

"The Board of Trustees cannot give undue advantage to one consumer over another."

"The aforesaid board has allowed various accounts to accumulate over substantial and prolonged lengths of time."

The application states that the arrearages were "due to gross negligence on the part of the trustees," and that it was "discriminatory against other users."

"This relator, along with other taxpayers and others similarly situated, is legally entitled to have utility laws enforced and collected."

The application further stated that Welcolin Armstrong paid his bills on time and asked that the Board of Trustees take steps to collect of W. A. Deatherage or pay the bills themselves.

VILLAGE FILES SUIT AGAINST W. A. DEATHERAGE

The town of Carrizozo has filed suit against W. A. Deatherage in the amount of \$2,004.45, the amount owing for utilities.

Deatherage, former operator of the Steak House in Carrizozo, is reported to be operating a cafe in Truth or Consequences.

The application for writ of mandamus has been forwarded by the County Clerk's office to Judge W. T. Scoggin for his consideration.

In the event the judge issues a temporary writ a date will be set for hearing to show cause why a permanent writ of mandamus should not be issued.

Wednesday of this week, an official notification of the writ of mandamus had not been received by the town trustees.

Judge W. T. Scoggin was reported this week to be in Colorado Springs attending a conference on juvenile delinquency. He is expected to return around July 7.

Las Cruces Law Firm Drafts Contract On Bonito Water

E. Forrest Sanders, attorney of Las Cruces, member of the law firm of Garland and Sanders, met with Mayor Marvin H. Roberts and the Board of Trustees in Carrizozo, June 25, to discuss the Bonito system water contract with Alamogordo.

Attorney Sanders submitted a draft of a contract he has prepared regarding furnishing of water to Carrizozo by Alamogordo.

The contract provides for a minimum of 100,000 gallons per day or 10% of the flow of the pipeline, whichever is greater, to be supplied Carrizozo. The price would be 20 cents per 1,000 gallons.

Alamogordo is to assume all maintenance expense of the pipeline and dam.

The contract has been submitted to Mayor Robbins in Alamogordo for their consideration.

Town officials said there would probably be a conference between the two towns regarding Bonito water in the near future.

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Eagle Creek Water To Be Discussed With S. P. Officials In July

At a meeting in Capitan this week, directors of the Eagle Creek Water Supply Association discussed plans to send representatives to San Francisco to talk over details of Eagle Creek development with officials of the Southern Pacific Company.

An appointment has been made for July 23 with the general manager of the Southern Pacific in San Francisco.

The Association consists of representatives of Ruidoso, Capitan and the State Department of Public Welfare. Herbert Holt, attorney for the latter State agency, is expected to attend the conference, as well as Richard H. Robinson, attorney general, and Frank C. Boyce, the Association's counsel.

Don Swearingen, mayor of Ruidoso, and James E. Harcrow, Capitan Village councilman, were appointed to represent the Association at the conference, subject to their confirmation by the councils of Ruidoso and Capitan.

The Association hopes to negotiate for the purchase of Eagle Creek water rights and pipeline.

The visit was in keeping with Armed Forces Day celebrations by U. S. military personnel throughout the world. The crew members spent the day showing visiting Japanese civilians around the ship.

Task Force 95 is the UN's blockading and escort force assigned the peace patrol mission in the Far East.

Travel to Gran Quivira Continues to Climb

Visitor travel to Gran Quivira National Monument for the month of June totaled 535 persons, an increase of 12% over June, 1953, bringing the year's total to 2453.

Out-of-state travel increased noticeably as the summer season opened, according to Channing T. Howell, superintendent. Persons from 24 states took the opportunity to visit this historic area which stands as a memorial to the Spanish Mission system and which is preserved by the National Park Service for the enjoyment of present and future generations.

The campground was used by 145 people, principally for picnicking.

Mr. Channing says the large Staghorn Cholla Cactus plants are in full flower at this time. Many of the visitors have taken advantage of the opportunity to photograph the beautiful red blossoms.

There is no charge for admission to the monument, or visit the mission and Indian ruins, or to view the monument's exhibits.

John Harkey, chairman of the swimming pool building committee, said this week that the cement and steel have been ordered. The gravel, donated by Lowdermilk Construction Co., is stockpiled at Ancho and Mr. Harkey's concern is to get it moved to Carrizozo without charge.

KIN-FOLKS ENJOYING STATEHOUSE CHECKS

SANTA FE, June 1.—The uproar raised about Corporation Commissioner Johnny Block hiring his sister at \$305 a month as his secretary and saying that he didn't care if it did bring a lot of criticism, recalls that he's not the only one making a family affair of the state offices.

State Treasurer Rich Grissom has his daughter on his payroll. Secretary Ben Roach has several times had her father and sister on the payroll list. Highway Engineer Pete Erwin has his brother-in-law as second in command, Revenue Commissioner Manuel Lujan has his daughter and a sister-in-law in his department. Everyone of the kinfolks deals manages to detour the state law which the citizens have assumed was intended to keep the families off the payroll.

The Grissom and Lujan family combinations are legalized by a gimmick which permits nepotism if approved by the official who is required to approve the bond of the officer doing the hiring.

\$100 COFFEE POTS AND PAYROLL STUDENTS

The health, welfare and education departments continue to permit employes to go to school while on the payroll without any firm assurance that they will return to their jobs. The highway department is studying plans for a new building with 70,000 square feet of floor space. That's twice the amount presently used which brought groans from those who think the department is already spending too much inside and not enough outside building roads. The state recently paid \$200 for two copper coffee pots and \$100 more for punch bowls, punch glasses and spoons for the Museum of International Folk Art at Santa Fe. The Ward Hicks advertising agency of Albuquerque is practically cornering good radio time all over the state for the Democrats during October. Also being reserved are big chunks of TV time. They could overtake \$100,000. Republicans stand to clear nearly \$30,000 from last week's \$50-a-plate dinner in Albuquerque. The wife of one of the top statehouse officials accompanied him on a state-paid junket to Las Vegas, Nev., a while back and since returned home to miss his plane home. She hit a jackpot on a 60-cent slot machine at the airport and the worried official was afraid he'd have to wait until she put all 170 of the coins back into the machine before he could take off. But she didn't and they did get back home on time. Indicative of the fine moral tenor of Nevada's legalized gambling is the law which absolutely forbids a gambling license to any applicant who has been convicted of a felony—within the past five years. Rex Bell, the former movie cowboy and husband of Clara Bow (remember?) is the Republican nominee for lieutenant governor in Nevada. He runs a little clothing store. Bill Torrington, the young assistant attorney general who beat the telephone rate increase in quitting August 1 to practice in Farmington.

SOCORRO GAS TIC CALIFORNIA 17c

The town of Socorro buys gas wholesale from the El Paso Natural Gas Co. at Belen for 21 cents per thousand cubic feet which the same company pumps on out to California and wholesales for 17 cents.

The difference in prices was brought up in a study made by Vicente Trevino Jimenez of the University of New Mexico, something that he shouldn't have done because he was at once called "ignorant" by Dick Spurrier, director of the oil conservation commission. I know because a while back I had the bad judgment to publish the fact that San Juan county gas was being sold to some California residential accounts cheaper than some residential users in San Juan county could buy it and Land Commissioner Johnny Walker, another member of the oil commission, said that I didn't know what I was talking about.

Anyone who ventures criticism of the gas situation in New Mexico is in for the same temperate "ignorance" treatment from the public servants who are paid to look after the local public interest in these matters.





Three-Bedroom Split-Level — from Small Homes Guide



WASP CONTROL

Wasps that build their homes too close for personal comfort can be dealt with easily. Entomologists of the U. S. Department of Agriculture have reported that after dark applications of chlordane or DDT to nests of these insects give good control at minimum risk.

USDA entomologists recommend that chlordane or DDT be applied to the nest at night because wasps are less active then and more likely to be in the nest. Sprays or dusts should be concentrated on nest openings.

Hornets and yellow jackets and their nests can be removed as a unit by plugging the nest opening with a wad of cotton soaked in carbon tetrachloride and then quickly dislodging the nest into a sack that can be burned, buried, or put into an airtight can containing a few tablespoons of carbon tetrachloride. Used on cotton wadding, carbon tetrachloride slows down the activity of these pests and lessens the chance for stings; in an airtight can, this insecticidal fumigant kills the wasps in 24 hours or less.

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

By RALPH DUNLAP

Notes from the Field

In a tour through the Honda Valley with Clyde R. Beaton, extension economist, the apple crop was estimated to be over 40,000 bushels and 1500 bushels of pears, this year. At present the insect damage is slight and the apples are showing excellent size. This year the harvest will start about a week earlier than in 1952 as the trees bloomed earlier.

All the growers want rain but are worried about hail (that sometimes comes with it). The Red Delicious fruit set was small, especially when the percentage of Delicious trees in each orchard is considered.

Mites have been appearing in increasing numbers on the apple trees in the entire county, with heavy infestation reported at Picacho, Honda, Glenocoe and Nogal. Two sprays of Ammate or DN 111 a week apart will control the mites.

In the 4-H judging contest held last week, a junior and senior team were selected to represent the county in the district and State contests. The junior team will participate in the district contest at Artesia on July 28th.

Junior team members are Anthony Fresquez, Douglas McKnight, Judy McKnight and Jeff Shaw.

The senior team — Jon Wild, Jim Casey, Carol Jones and Peggy Clements—will compete in the State contest at State College on August 9-13. The first place state team will attend the Nat'l Western Livestock Show in Denver next January. This trip is sponsored by the New Mexico Cattle Growers and Woolgrowers Association.

Fight Insects in Legume Seed Production

Insects weaken legume plants. The plants then produce fewer blooms and shriveled seeds. The insect problem in legume seed production is that simple.

But the control measures are not that simple. The job requires the right thing, timing, materials and applications—and at the right rate.

The timing: Suggest spraying alfalfa and red clover when the new growth is four to six inches high, and again at the pre-bloom stage. The material: DDT at the rate of 1 lb. actual DDT in 10 gals. of water per acre.

Spray other legumes when they have a growth similar to 4 to 6 inches of alfalfa or red clover. Add a second spray to these legumes, too. The spray controls such inju-

rious insects as lygus bugs, alfalfa plant bugs, and rapid plant bugs. Legumes for seed production should not be grazed. If you decide later not to save the field for seed, it may be pastured by all grazing animals except dairy cows. DDT lodges in the plant tissue and appears in the milk after dairy cows eat the plants.

GRASSHOPPER CONTROL

Grasshoppers can be controlled by adding 1 1/2 lbs. of actual toxaphene to the DDT mixture. One precaution is important. Clean your sprayer if weed spray was used in it last. Pump one gallon of household ammonia with 100 gals. water through the sprayer. Let the mixture stand 6 to 8 hrs.

All insect control isn't one of killing insects. Take bees for example. Honey bees can double or even triple the production of legume seed. If it all possible, provide two colonies of bees for each acre of legume. Two colonies assure pollination. They may be placed in or next to the field to be pollinated.

If grasshoppers invade the field after the bees are brought in, toxaphene may be applied between 7 o'clock evening and 7 o'clock morning to kill grasshoppers with the least hazard to the bees.

PUBLIC CONTESTS AT CHAMA

A fishing contest for children under 14, and a casting contest for adults, scheduled for July 4 at Chama, should bring a lot of folks up there. These two contests are free to all comers. Chama Sports Boosters are the sponsors. Children will fish for trout in a specially stocked pond and will use fishing rod and conventional line and hook.

For the casting contest the prescribed equipment is spinning and fly rods only, with flies used on fly rods. Contests open at 10:30 a.m., Sunday, July 4 at Chama.

Prizes will be awarded and everyone is welcome to try. The New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish commends the gesture, especially the children's contest.

WARM WEATHER IMPROVES FISHING

The prevailing warm weather of the last few days accounts for a marked improvement in fishing conditions. Reports coming in to the New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish from all over the State suggest that the fishing season is really just opening.

WINDUP OF ANTELOPE TAGGING NEAR SPRINGER

Antelope tagging is about over now in the Springer area, reports Biologist Jim McClellan of the New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish. He and District Warden Elmo Traylor have tagged 15 antelope kids—11 bucks and 5 does—in a study of survival, longevity and migration pattern. "Forty-eight hours makes a lot of difference," says McClellan, "when you're dealing with the latest animal in the U. S."

The kids are tagged immediately after birth. Within three or four days they can make 30 miles an hour. The adult antelope has been clocked on the St. Augustine Plains at a sustained rate of 48 m.p.h. In short spurts it is said to make 60.

CIMARRON CANYON PROJECT

A five-year federal-aid project is about to begin in Colfax County on a 33,000-acre tract known as Cimarron Canyon Wildlife Area. The first step is a boundary survey to be made by Engineer Willard L. Bradley of the New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish. Construction of fence and firebreaks along the exterior boundary will follow. Buildings and bridges will be reconstructed and maintenance truck trails will be built. Recreational purposes will be served by construction of trails and improvement

of fishing streams. The cost of this project will be \$200,000. As with other federal-aid projects to date, 75% of the cost will be covered by federal grant, the remainder by State money.

Sportsmen are no doubt aware that the source of such federal money is the excise tax on sporting arms and ammunition. The money is earmarked for wildlife restoration, but in the development of areas for this purpose a happy combination is sometimes possible, creating areas for recreation at the same time.

Colorado's "El Diente" Towers 14,159 Feet

WASHINGTON—The State of Colorado, which boasts more lofty peaks than any other state, can pride itself today on another that exceeds 14,000 feet.

This spring the U. S. Geological Survey, while celebrating its 75th anniversary, found that El Diente (the Tooth) shoulders the sky at 14,159 feet. El Diente hitherto had been overlooked as a high mountain, but new Survey research fixed its true altitude.

In disclosing its finding to the National Geographic Society, the Geological Survey said Colorado can thus add a new peak to the 47 she already lists in the "14,000-foot class."

The Survey is now investigating the Colorado plateau to speed the quest for uranium.

In this work the Survey measured El Diente in southwest Colorado. It also gauged other Colorado peaks and "peaks" some—Wilson Mountain, from 14,250 to 14,249 feet, and Wilson Peak, from 14,026 to 14,017.

OLD TIMERS IN THE NEWS

Frank Patton, attorney general when Clyde Tingley was governor, is coming back to the State to practice after 14 years with the justice department in Washington. . . . James A. J., a New York suburb. . . . The ruling crowd in the State highway department fear they're in for a big shuffle regardless of who wins the run for governor.

Local artists are staging an outdoor art show and other civic groups are cooperating in making this a memorable happening. The famed Santa Fe Trail ended at this very spot and Trail Days motif, prairie schooners to stage coaches, will characterize the festivities.

More than 600 horses and riders will participate in the mile-long parade through downtown streets. This is scheduled for the afternoon of July 8. Programs, eagerly awaited at the big outdoor arena, list three scheduled

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
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
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
