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HERE'S HOW . . .

MAKE A BUNK BED

For the children's room, or the summer camp, bunk beds are space savers, and are easy to make.


The bed posts are of 3 by 3-inch lumber, each 74 inches long. The dimensions below are easy to follow. The cuts for insertion of the head boards and end framing rails are 1/4-inch deep. Drill 1/4-inch holes for the bolts with which the side rails will be fastened later.

Bed-ends are assembled by gluing the head boards and end rails and securing them with No. 6, 1 1/2-inch wood screws, countersunk.

Slide rails of 1 by 3-inch lumber, 80 inches long, are drilled to match the holes in the posts. To each side rail is added a slat-support rail, a strip of 1 by 2, 74 inches long, securely glued and screwed into place. Four pairs of glue blocks, placed 20 inches apart, provide 2 1/2-inch slots for the slats.

The completed side rails are bolted to the bed-end assemblies. The 8 slats are 1 by 3-inch lumber, each 38 inches long.

All sharp edges should be rounded or beveled.



The scholarships are part of a \$5000 fund donated in various amounts to the school, and administered under the Hotel Dieu School of Nursing Scholarship Fund.


Young women interested in nursing as a career who want to apply for a scholarship may make direct application to the school. Registration for the new class will be held September 1.

New Irrigation Well Drilled Near McIntosh

According to the Torrance County News, an irrigation well drilled on land owned by the Charles Wilson estate northwest of McIntosh, tested 1283 gallons per minute.

The well was drilled to a depth of 185 feet. Bill Saline of Federal, who has an option to buy a farm on the estate, plans to move there soon and build a home at the site of the new water well.

New Alfalfa Planting Ready for Cutting

Report 28 Polio Cases in State To Date

Cases of polio in New Mexico up to July 10, totaled 28—an increase of one over the same time last year. The five-year median for polio incidence, to date, is 27 cases.

Nine new cases were reported for the second week in July—two in McKinley county, one in San Juan, two in Bernalillo, three in Lea and one in Valencia.



NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

Good Attendance at Sheep Demonstration

The demonstration at the Marley ranch had a good attendance. Mr. Marley had a group of 125 ram lambs from his ranch, with the lambs showing all variations as to the different points to look for on each lamb.

Bill Snyder demonstrated several points in selecting a lamb. These points were wool length, wool grade, belly wool, straight legs, open face, good mouth, inverted eyelids, coarse wool on the breech, and off color wool.

Mr. Marley also specified that the horned lambs be culled, as he preferred polled type of sheep.

Also on exhibit were several bucks, one of which rated a 9.4 lbs. yield of clean wool as adjusted to a mature age.

Urge Wheat Farmers to Vote in Referendum

The County Agent urges all wheat farmers to go to their local voting place Friday, July 23, and cast their vote in the 1955 wheat quota referendum.

The final decision on whether or not quota controls will apply to 1955 wheat production is up to the farmers. They should not underestimate the gravity of the situation we are faced with on wheat.

Any wheat producer who will have in excess of 15 acres of wheat for harvest on grain in 1955 is eligible to vote in the referendum. He stresses that all county producers should study the issues involved, make their decision, and let that decision be known in the July 23 referendum.

Producers can get information on local voting places, hours of voting, locally eligible voters, and program details from their County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office or from County or community ASC committeemen.

ASC Committee Elections in August.

Elections for County and community ASC committeemen will

be held in New Mexico during the period of August 2 to 20. H. Mark Rickman, chairman of the State Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee, announced this week.

In calling attention to the impending elections, Rickman also pointed out several changes in regulations governing the election, qualifications and duties of County and community Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committeemen. Major changes would be:

1. Create County and community election boards which would conduct the annual elections of committeemen.

2. Limit to three the number of consecutive terms a farmer may serve as a County or community committeeman, except that where all three members of the County committee have already served three consecutive terms, one member shall be eligible for election to one additional term.

3. Prohibit officials of general farm organizations from serving as members of County ASC committeemen, and

4. Prohibit County committeemen from acting as sales agents or employees of the Federal Crop Insurance Corp., marketing quota review committeemen, and as employees of their own County offices.

Farmer Control Strengthened

The revised regulations should strengthen farmer control of local program administration and stimulate wider interest and greater participation in community elections, the State ASC chairman stated. They should also encourage more farmers to serve as community and county committeemen.

The creation of a county election board consisting of the county agent as chairman and the heads of the Soil Conservation office and the Farmers Home Administration office, as well as the heads of each general farm organization operating within the county should help to insure fair and impartial community elections.

These changes are the outgrowth of a year's study of the entire ASC Committee system, Rickman said. They represent the combined thinking of farmers themselves, state and county committeemen and administration heads of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, who have been closest to the problem.



News and Views from Your Nation's Capitol

FUTURE OF METAL MINING STILL VAGUE

WASHINGTON, July 20—The lead and zinc mining industry in New Mexico and neighboring states still is being forced to wait for administrative action that will be the determining factor in its struggle to survive. An urgent plea sent by the Rocky Mountain States Congressional group to the White House for prompt presidential action under the tariff law "escape clause" to increase import duty on those minerals and thus cut down the flood of cheap imports has resulted in some action by the State Department, though there are no definite results thus far.

There is reason, however, to be more hopeful than we were a short time ago. Samuel Waugh, Assistant Secretary of State for Economic Affairs, has advised me as chairman of the Rocky Mountain Congressional group, that he is trying to work out a plan which will help our industry, particularly the smaller mines. Thus far, no details of that plan have been revealed to us.

GAME COMMISSION MEETS

At a special meeting of the State Game Commission July 12, changes were made in the Pecos area elk season and in the Vermejo Ranch deer season. The Pecos elk season, originally set for Oct. 2-10, is now established as Nov. 23-28. The number of special licenses is reduced from 300 to 150. Deadline for application remains August 30. The Commission reduced the number of licenses to 150 because of unfavorable weather conditions for the late season. The State Game and the local Forest Service favored the change in season dates to avoid conflict with a trail ride scheduled for the October dates in the Pecos area.

The Vermejo Ranch deer season was extended to coincide with the elk season in that area. The new dates are Oct. 13-Nov. 5, as well as the regular deer season, Nov. 6-21. It is expected that the Game Department will make some progress toward solution of a long-standing problem—deer over-population and heavy over-browsing of the Vermejo range. The first step is the liberalization of the season, to allow for greater harvesting of the excess deer.

Seasons and bag limits on migratory birds will be set at the August 2 meeting of the Game Commission. At that time the U. S. Fish and Wildlife regulations will be in the hands of the Commission.

TROUT STATISTICS

The New Mexico Department of Game and Fish planted over 463,000 trout in New Mexico waters during June. Some 57,000 of these were legal size. In the fiscal year ended June 30, over 3 1/2 million trout were planted, more than 600,000 legal size. Compared with the previous year, there was a 100,000 increase in number of legal trout planted.

EXCUSE IT, PLEASE

Newsletter thanks the correspondent who pointed out an omission from last week's item on the chukar partridge. It is the Turkish chukar that was first introduced into the State in 1951. Indian chukar had been introduced several years earlier. Exception has also been taken to another item in last week's Newsletter. "Credit for recent increase of game and fish is given to the wildlife biologists, etc." was not an editorial comment. It was the expressed opinion of New Mexico Sportsman, the official publication of the New Mexico Game Protective Ass'n.

NEWS IN BRIEF

The week of July 25 to July 31 is Farm Safety Week over the nation. Following are a few rules of safety to follow this week and always:

HARVEST SEASON IS ACCIDENT TIME

"Harvest time is accident time on the farm." When grain harvesting machinery, with its high speed cutting mechanisms, its shafting, chains and gears are operated in the "rush of harvest," the chances for accidents mount rapidly. It is a season when haste is often emphasized without necessary caution.

The first step for safe operation of harvesting machinery is to put it into good condition before the harvest begins. This means that seats, controls, steps and other similar features of the machine should be in good repair. Shields or other safety guards must be in place before a machine is taken to the field. The following rules for harvest safety are recommended by the National Safety Council:

1. Always be alert, never take a chance.
2. Always stop all machinery before oiling, adjusting or unclogging.
3. Avoid wearing floppy or ragged clothing.
4. Start smoothly and slow down for turns and rough ground.
5. Avoid operations too close to the edge of ditches or embankments.
6. Small children are definitely out of place around harvesting machinery.
7. Avoid jumping off equipment before it has come to a full stop.
8. Remember to look both ways as you approach a highway and cross with care.
9. On a highway obey the signs and rules of the road and don't forget to use headlights and tail lights at night.

The operator of the machine must be alert and observe the safety rules — never take a chance.
