

RAMBLIN' AROUND

I got a tooth that gives me a fit. Keeps me jumpin' all day. But all I can do is grin and bear it.

'Cause Roswell's 90 miles away. "See your dentist twice a year." The State Dental Board tells us. That's good advice and pleasant to hear. But I ain't got the time to take the bus.

In a statement from Washington several weeks ago, U. S. Sen. Dennis Chavez suggested that the towns most interested in Lake Bonito water organize into a water district and argue their interests in Lake Bonito. The Senator further expressed the belief that what the Government takes it should also be willing to replace.

The Army, or the Southern Pacific, or Alamogordo, or all of them together, are completing details to take most of Bonito's water to Alamogordo, and as far as Carrizozo is concerned, no effort has been made to replace anything. Carrizozo is expected, on the other hand, to expend thousands of dollars in an attempt to find a source of supplemental water supply.

Before limiting our supply of a known source of good water, it would seem that the transferors would first do some exploratory work at their own expense, and discover a source of domestic water for Carrizozo. Then they could say in effect to Carrizozo: "We have found good well water. If the quality meets your approval, we'll develop it and pipe it to your town to exchange for certain of your rights to Lake Bonito water." The Southern Pacific would probably be reluctant to do further water exploration work in this area as they tried it unsuccessfully in the early days. But the Army might be willing.

The question is, what are the rights of Carrizozo and other county towns to Bonito water. That is a matter for the court to decide.

In the beginning the Southern Pacific diverted the Bonito stream system to furnish water for its boilers and for its employees along the line from Carrizozo northward. There is a question which the SP put first, the boiler or the employees, but no doubt it was consideration for the latter that prompted the territorial engineer and later the court to permit the diversion of water across the divide.

Now that diesel have replaced steam boilers the Southern Pacific wants to get rid of the natural water resources they developed, even if it means transferring it to another county. The Lincoln County communities which have been using the water are being given an allotment, but it is not sufficient for summer usage or for future development, and they are expected to find at their own expense supplemental sources of supply.

Times have changed in New Mexico in the past five years. Many towns and cities have had unparalleled growth and development, Alamogordo for one. That town would not have been interested in Lake Bonito a few years ago. It is possible that Lincoln County may also have considerable growth in the future and will need all available water. There are rumors that a uranium processing plant might be built at Capitán. Should this take place, there would immediately be a demand for a source of good water such as that in Lake Bonito.

It is still not too late for Lincoln County communities to get together and argue their interests in Lake Bonito.

Judge Scoggin made an important point in his talk last week to the Lincoln County Safety Council that was overlooked by this reporter. It was that children should not depend too much upon safety crosswalks. There is an occasional motorist who will disregard all warning signs, and if a child happens to be in the way an unfortunate accident will result. His advice to school children was to be careful at all times when crossing streets, even though they may be using crosswalks.

In this connection, the school boy or girl should return the courtesy of the careful motorist who drives slowly through school zones and stops at all safety walks when children are waiting to cross. The children should cross quickly and not keep the motorist waiting any longer than necessary.

CENSUS QUERIES SOON IN THE MAIL

The Bureau of the Census will never underestimate the power of a woman, especially during the 1954 Census of Agriculture in October and November.

"Farm homemakers can be a tremendous help in making this a complete and accurate farm census," says Census Director R. W. Burgess. "They can help cut costs and save time."

He suggests that homemakers can help their husbands fill out questionnaires, look up records, and answer census takers' questions if their husbands are absent. Wives' answers to some of the questions usually will be just as accurate as their husbands'.

RESIDENTS ASKED TO FILL OUT QUESTIONNAIRES

Mrs. Hazel Perry is crew leader for the Agricultural Census for Otero and Lincoln Counties. In Carrizozo this week, she stated that each and every box holder in the County will receive an Agricultural Questionnaire. They will probably be mailed out during the last week in October.

"Upon receipt of your Questionnaire," she asks, "would you please fill them out at once, in order to save your time and that of the enumerator when he calls?"

Sections of the questionnaire probably will be of special interest to some homemakers. The section on facilities and equipment asks whether the place has a telephone, piped running water, electricity, television and a home freezer.

Farm labor and off-farm work sections include questions about labor by members of the family other than the farm operator.

ATTORNEY CITES BACKGROUND OF BONITO WATER

(Daniel R. Brenton, Carrizozo attorney, has submitted to the News for publication the following analysis of the Bonito water system.)

BRENTON On or about the year 1900 the El Paso & Rock Island Railway Company was formed to construct a connecting railroad line from Carrizozo to Santa Rosa, where it joined with the Chicago Rock Island & Pacific Railway Company, thereby perfecting a through route from the East to the west coast.

After a few months of operation it was found that the management had not made a sufficient investigation into the water conditions along this line. Many wells were drilled at great expenditures of money, only to find an alkali water that was unfit for the boilers of steam locomotives and, also, unfit for the domestic needs of the employees of the railroad.

Conditions were so bad that railroad employees became ill and steam locomotives were constantly being stalled and laid-up because of defective boilers and the lack of steam for locomotion. In order to continue in operation the company was forced to haul great quantities of water from El Paso, which proved to be an expensive operation. Finally, under the guidance of Judge Hawkins, the railroad decided to acquire lands with valuable water rights in the upper reaches of the Bonito stream system; and divert such water across the mountains to the lines of the El Paso & Rock Island Railway Company for railroad and domestic uses.

APPLICATION MADE

The application was made to the Territorial Engineer on May 21, 1907, for a change of the use of the water from irrigation so that

"instead of such amount of water being diverted through said ditches respectively to point of diversion, the same may, by the undersigned be changed from the places now respectively made to a point on the South fork of the Bonito River to be selected and more particularly described when surveys thereof are completed; and that the place and manner of application and use of said water may also be changed by the undersigned so that instead of use thereof for agricultural and domestic purposes, as now conducted, the same may be used for engines and trains and for drinking and other domestic purposes along the line of the railroad so owned by the undersigned. And for reason of said application the undersigned states as follows: That it is a corporation organized under the laws of New Mexico and is the owner and in operation of a line of railroad extending from Carrizozo, New Mexico, to Santa Rosa, New Mexico, which is a section of country devoid of any water suitable for engine purposes or for domestic use; and which requires purification and treatment at great cost and expense before the same can be used for such engine purposes, but when so treated is unfit for use for domestic purposes; that by virtue of said scarcity of water the undersigned has been unable to procure at any other point tributary to the line of railroad, a satisfactory supply of water with which such operations can be conducted; and that inability to do so has resulted and is resulting in great loss to it in the management of its train and railroad, and that such absence of water fit for domestic use largely tends to prevent it from employing and settling along its line of road, as is necessary, employees sufficient for the operation thereof."

OBJECTIONS FILED

After such application was duly advertised many objections were filed to it by persons owning lands below Fort Stanton with valuable water rights in the Bonito stream system. Hearings were duly had, and Vernon L. Sullivan, the Territorial Engineer, granted the application on July 2, 1907, in the following language:

"It is therefore ordered that the application of said El Paso and Rock Island Railway Company as so made and filed in this office, be and the same is hereby approved as herein contained, and that said applicant be and it hereby is

VFW District Meeting Held at Capitán

Representatives from Hobbs, Carlsbad, Roswell, and Capitán attended the VFW District No. 7 meeting held October 17 in Capitán. Approximately fifty members, their wives and children, enjoyed a chicken dinner served by the Auxiliary.

Among the discussion topics at the business meeting was one on "Teen-age Delinquency."

Allowed and granted permission and right to change the place and manner of diversion, conveyance and use in the manner and way and for the purpose as described in said application, of so much and such part of said five (5) cubic feet per second of the water of said Bonito River as the applicant may require for said uses and purposes.

An appeal was made from the decision of the Territorial Engineer to a Board of Water Commissioners, which was provided for under our statutes at that time, and after extensive hearings, the decision of the Territorial Engineer was approved. It might be of interest to note that Hewett & Hudspeth of White Oaks and M. T. Catron of Santa Fe, among others, were attorneys for some of the contestants. After the decision of the Territorial Engineer the matter was appealed to the District Court, but was dismissed for lack of prosecution. However, throughout all of these proceedings and many proceedings thereafter for the change of points of diversion and for a transfer from direct diversion to storage and for leave to construct the Bonito dam, etc., the applications for the use of the water and the permits for its use from the State Engineer clearly specified that the water was for railroad and domestic purposes. This restricted use was carried on through the final adjudication of the whole matter in the Bloom Land & Cattle Company case, where, in the allegations of the Complaint, it is alleged that the water was to be used for railroad and domestic uses along the line of the El Paso & Rock Island Railway Company; and in the final decree, which was entered on the 26th day of June, 1934, we find the following provision:

"and to take out of the natural water shed of the Bonito River stream system a maximum flow of five (5) cu. ft. per sec. and no more; that the said rights are for railroad and domestic purposes and uses along the line of the El Paso & Rock Island Railway Company as the said line of said railroad existed in 1907."

WATER USE INCREASES

Nowhere in any of the proceedings is the right extended to the use of the water for municipal purposes. However, as the communities along the railroad grew and the population consisted of more than just railroad employees and those dependent upon the railroad for their livelihood, the railroad was forced for humane reasons to allow an increased use of the water to other inhabitants in the towns and villages. It was, however, very careful to restrict the use of the water to the uses specified in the permit from the State Engineer and the final decree in the Bloom Land & Cattle Company case. At no time did it ever allow the water to be used for general municipal purposes, such as the irrigation of lands, the watering of trees and lawns, etc. These matters were carefully covered by contract with the various municipalities, which contracts also were very liberal to use a limited amount

Eagle Creek Ass'n Receives SP Offer to Sell Water Rights

The officers of the Eagle Creek Water Supply Association announced this week that they have received an offer from the Southern Pacific Company to sell the Eagle Creek water rights to the Association, together with approximately 1045 acres of land located in the Eagle Creek area. The offer was sent in a letter signed by R. L. Halliwell, general manager of the Southern Pacific.

The board of directors of the Eagle Creek Association met in Roswell Wednesday, Oct. 10, to consider the offer. Present at the meeting were James E. Harrow, president; D. O. Murphy and Fletcher Hall from Capitán; Dan Swearingin, secretary; Harold Jones and A. J. Gates from Roswell; and Herbert Holt, attorney for the Department of Public Welfare, representing Ft. Stanton, and Frank C. Boyce, attorney for the association.

The Southern Pacific Company asked for a reply to their offer by December 15, 1954. Officials of the association said they were expecting to receive a feasibility report from W. A. Turney & Associates, engineers for the association, on the problem of building storage facilities on Eagle Creek and furnishing Roswell, Capitán and Fort Stanton with water.

Water Contractor To Start Work Soon

P. R. Burn, successful bidder for extending and improving the Carrizozo municipal water system, will soon begin work on the project, the town trustees were informed Tuesday. They met with Mr. Sampson of the engineering firm of Ashley G. Classen & Associates of El Paso. The trustees have requested the contractor to start work first on the mains in the south part of town.

Mayor Roberts has appointed trustees Juan M. Martinez and Friday Sherrill to work with the contractor, helping him get as much local help as he can use. Trustees A. P. Sliton Jr. and Clifton B. Zumwalt were appointed to work with the contractor on any construction details that may arise.

State to Spend \$330,000 on Hwy 37

At a recent conference in Santa Fe with C. O. Erwin, state highway engineer, George Fuchs, Lincoln County Commissioner, was given some good news regarding Highway 37. He was assured by Mr. Erwin that a contract for \$330,000 to be expended on this highway would be let in February of 1955. Of this amount, \$35,000 will go for street widening in Roswell and the balance be spent on Highway 37.

It is estimated that the contract to be let will build five miles of improved road from the Roswell airport toward Angus.

Ft. Sumner vs. Grizzlies Next Wednesday



COUNTY DEMOCRATS ADOPT PLATFORM

At a meeting last week in Capitán, candidates of the Lincoln County Democratic party adopted the following platform to submit to the voters of Lincoln County:

"We favor intensive efforts to improve the county and secondary roads. We believe that such roads are essential for our livestock industry, the development of our mineral and natural resources which are determined to further in this county, and the maintenance and furtherance of our tourist industry.

"We propose that the county be divided into three county road patrol districts, and that three groups of adequate road machinery (each group consisting of one auto, patrol grader plus allied equipment) be operated and maintained. One patrol group to be assigned to a district it will best serve which will be under the direct charge of one member of the Board of County Commissioners and an operator. We propose that gas, oil and supplies be purchased within the district assigned to the patrol group. By these means the people will be more efficiently and economically served and much needless expense and time will be saved over the present clumsy method of transferring heavy equipment back to the county seat for servicing and dispatch.

"We pledge that as county officers we will devote the necessary time and duty to our office. We do not propose to officiate.

WILL HARRISON'S Inside the Capital

DEMOCRATS NEED WALKER ON U DEAL. SANTA FE, Oct. 20.—Some of the 30 or 40 Democrats who were fired from the land office when Manny Walker took over as commissioner a couple of years ago have joined Republicans in trying to build a uranium fire under the Democratic official.

They are shooting at the transaction earlier this month in which prospecting permits on 7500 acres of state land which had been granted by the land office for something less than \$300 were sold in a private transaction to a uranium company for a consideration in excess of \$250,000.

The permits on the school land in Valencia and McKinley counties were held by Dick Bokum, a personal and political associate of Walker's and Nash Hancock and Tom Old of Santa Fe.

Several of the Democrats let out by Walker in 1953 have been giving aid and comfort to John J. Coury, the Republican entry against Walker, in his effort to get the permits deal before the U. S. grand jury in Albuquerque. Coury has also had assistance from some of the Chavez faction people in Albuquerque, who have a score with Walker that dates back before the 1953 firing.

The time is mighty short to get any big stinkaroo going against Walker and the chances are pretty good that he will do better in his 1954 run than he did two years ago against the popular Dub Evans. Walker has made peace with many of the public land grazing people who fought him so hard in 1952, and you may recall that he was promised a mean fight for re-nomination last spring which didn't even come close to developing.

SALE SUGGESTS CHANGE NEEDED

The \$200 permits that were sold shortly later for a quarter million do, however, point up a shortcoming in the system of handling the state's prospective uranium land.

Most of the land involved had been claimed by a McKinley resident, W. A. Greer, and was in litigation. Some of the land involved had been held by the Atomic Energy Commission as highly favorable for uranium production and the AEC had requested the land office to undertake geological exploration of the sections involved. All the land had been described by competent geological authorities as lying in the most favorable uranium prospecting district of the Colorado plateau. And there was already substantial uranium production in both McKinley and Valencia.

Under those conditions it's fair to assume that the state might have gotten more at public auction of the permits than the \$300 received in the private sale that was handled at the bare minimum of \$25 a section and without notice to other prospective bidders.

Under existing practices there is no limit on how much public land an individual may tie up for exclusive prospecting at \$25 a square mile if the land commissioner wants to give it to him, and no legally defined requirements for him to justify holding the land year after year. Any rewriting of the uranium rules should perhaps also include another look at the 5% royalty the state gets from uranium production on state lands. In the past year the state has collected about \$300 in royalty from uranium production. The Navajo's royalty came to about \$500,000.

PREDICT 50,000 STRAY-AT-HOMES

The lack-luster campaign has developed a real likelihood that there will be a drop off of some 50,000 from the number that marked ballots in the 1952 hysteria. In 1952 there were 240,000 voting for governor, a drop-off of 50,000 would still make the 1954 election the second biggest in state history with 190,000. In 1950 the vote for governor was 180,000; in 1948, a presidential year, it was just under 190,000 and all the others were well under that, 190,000 figure.

The figure could drop well below the 190,000 mark — there are plenty of signs. You don't see many cars with candidate's stickers, there has been little newspaper advertising, and a complete lack of hat-throwing enthusiasm or clinched fist antagonism among the voters. The clubs and organizations that usually supplement the activity of the political parties have not put in an appearance this time. Even the so-called "young" organizations have been in the background. The biggest factor





of water and were subject to cancellation on ten days' notice. Thus, the contract with the Town of Carrizozo reads as follows:

"PROVIDED, that the second party shall by rule, ordinance or regulation, strictly forbid the use of such water for sprinkling yards, lawns and streets, or for use for irrigation and watering stock, and any and all other purposes except those strictly of a household character, and enforce the same strictly and forfeit the privilege, of any person violating the same, of receiving any further water under the terms hereof.

SEVENTH: Either, of the parties hereto may cancel this agreement at any time by giving to the other ten days written notice to such effect, and the same shall thereupon become cancelled as of the date named in the notice except as to the accrued and unperformed obligations, if any, of the second party then existing."

DIESEL POWER ERA

When the Southern Pacific Company decided to convert from steam to diesel power, it likewise made plans to dispose of the Bonito water system. It entered into negotiations with the villages and water users along its line from Carrizozo to Epra, leading to the eventual transfer of the water rights to an "inter-community water association." Committees were formed and a prominent engineer by the name of Carlos Powell was retained to make a study of the situation and prepare the feasibility report.

Vernon Petty at that time was the mayor of the Town of Carrizozo and was a member of this committee. After intensive study an adverse report was made and the matter was dropped on the ground that it would be entirely too burdensome and expensive for the Village of Carrizozo and the other villages to undertake the operation of the Bonito system, even if practically nothing was paid for Bonito Dam and Nogal Lake and the water rights.

It is well known that the price of 50c for each thousand gallons paid by the various municipalities and water users associations to the Southern Pacific Company at this time does not begin to pay for the actual cost of this water. The Southern Pacific Company is a private corporation in the transportation business and its officers are obligated to operate the line without serious losses in order to meet its fixed financial obligations and pay a reasonable return on its investment. It was, therefore, the duty of the officers of the Southern Pacific Company to dispose of the Bonito water system for the best price obtainable and still keep a sufficient amount of water to satisfy its limited railroad and domestic uses.

During this period of transition from steam to diesel power by the Southern Pacific, the United States Air Force chose the area between Alamogordo and Carrizozo for the development of its guided missiles. It is one of the most important bases in the United States. Tremendous and unbelievable things are being accomplished in this area. Natural conditions were perfect, except for one thing and that was the lack of good water. The same conditions existed on this base that existed when the El Paso & Rock Island Railway Company attempted to operate its lines with alkali water. The officers of the Holloman Air Development Center brought pressure upon the City of Alamogordo to supply them with greater quantities of water. When such water was not forthcoming, large sums of money were expended by the Air Force, as well as the City of Alamogordo, only to find that the water was very nearly unfit for domestic uses and became increas-

ingly alkali as used.

It was, therefore, natural for these interests to attempt to purchase the Bonito water system. After a considerable investigation and months of negotiations, a contract was entered into between the City of Alamogordo, representing its residents and the Air Force's interests, with the Southern Pacific Company, for the purchase of the Bonito water system. In this contract a substantial amount of water is reserved for the Southern Pacific Company for railroad and domestic uses, and a valuable water right is granted to the Town of Carrizozo in the following language:

"Southern Pacific hereby accepts and reserves and agrees to convey to the Town of Carrizozo, a municipal subdivision of the State of New Mexico, out of said 5 cubic feet per second appropriation and ownership in and to said Bonito water right, 178 cubic feet of water per second, which reservation is equal to a flow of 115,000 gallons of water each twenty-four hours, delivered at Carrizozo for use or sale by said Town for municipal, governmental, domestic, mechanical, industrial or commercial purposes of said Town and its inhabitants upon its agreement to pay the service charge to the City of Alamogordo for all water taken by it at the rate of 20 cents per thousand gallons. This water right shall be prior to the right and estate to be sold and transferred to the City of Alamogordo and shall be subordinate and inferior only to the prior rights as specified in subdivisions (a), (b), and (c) of this paragraph.

EASEMENTS PROVIDED

(Par. (a), (b), and (c) provide water for the Southern Pacific Company, Fort Stanton and Nogal.) Further provision is made for easements of right-of-way, storage and flow in the following language:

"and to said Town of Carrizozo an easement and right of use for the capture, storage, diversion, flow and delivery of the waters herein excepted, reserved and agreed to be conveyed, of the Bonito Reservoir as now located in Bonito River, through and including the Nogal Reservoir site to a point of intersection of said Bonito Pipe Line with the Carrizozo branch thereof which is located in Section 10, Township 7 South, Range 11 East, N. M. P. M., thence in a general southwesterly direction from said point of intersection to a point in the Town of Carrizozo, situated in Section 2, Township 8 South, Range 10 East, in Lincoln County, New Mexico, and the adjuncts, appendages, appurtenances thereto or in any substitutes or replacements of said reservoirs, dams or pipe lines constituting the Bonito Pipe Line System."

The Southern Pacific also agrees to transfer amounts of water reserved for the villages and communities northeast of the Town of Carrizozo to Carrizozo as soon as such communities procure their own water systems.

This water right has cost the Town of Carrizozo absolutely nothing and is reasonably worth the sum of \$50,000.00. The Town of Carrizozo has an easement of storage and flow in Nogal and Bonito Lakes and the pipeline to Carrizozo, and has agreed to pay the sum of 20 cents per thousand gallons for each thousand gallons that it uses, as against 50 cents per thousand gallons which it heretofore paid to the Southern Pacific Company. Since it is the intention of the Southern Pacific Company to encourage and assist the villages northeast in developing their own water systems, it has the privilege of acquiring additional water rights from the Southern Pacific Company at no additional expense as this work (Continued on Page 6)

is completed. If this quantity of water is not sufficient for the Town of Carrizozo, the City of Alamogordo has agreed to enter into a contract with the Town authorities to provide it with such additional water as it may wish from the Bonito system. The negotiations for the Town of Carrizozo have been conducted by Forrest Sanders, of the law firm of Garland & Sanders, in Las Cruces, New Mexico. I believe that he has done an excellent job for the Town of Carrizozo.

The Town of Carrizozo has been limited in its supply of water and has paid a rather high rate for water in the past. However, there is such a thing as the Town of Carrizozo assuming such extensive obligations in the taking over of a water system or the management of a water system as to cause an undue tax burden upon all of its citizens.

The Southern Pacific Company happens to be a private railroad, enterprise and is not a public utility or a water company. Otherwise the water rates would have been regulated by the Public Service Commission at a price commensurate with the cost of the operation of the system. If the Town of Carrizozo undertook

to operate the Bonito system, it would be compelled to either tax its residents or charge a water rate sufficiently high to maintain and operate the system. This rate would be considerably greater than the rate charged by the Southern Pacific Company, and what would it do with two million gallons of water per day? From previous articles on this subject it would seem that the Town of Carrizozo was being practically left with no water.

Since dieselization the Town has not been restricted in the quantity of the water, except by the price per thousand gallons. It has gradually increased its use of the water during this period from approximately some 15,000,000 gallons per year to 24,000,000 gallons per year for the year 1953. The Southern Pacific Company has granted to the Town of Carrizozo, under the contract with the City of Alamogordo, 115,000 gallons of water per day, or 42,780,000 gallons of water per year, at the very reasonable rate of 20 cents per thousand gallons. If the Town of Carrizozo can use additional water, the Southern Pacific Company has agreed to convey to it an additional water right as its need for this water diminishes in the future. The City of Alamogordo has likewise agreed to

enter into a supplemental contract with the Town for such additional water as it may be able to use. The residents of the Town of Carrizozo are in line for water at a more reasonable rate and any talk of water rationing seems somewhat exaggerated.

COMMENTS BY ERRANT BOYS

AT STATE SCHOOL

Last week the News printed a portion of a report prepared by the New Mexico Industrial School, dealing with juvenile delinquency. It told in the boys' own words, many of their problems and suggestions they made might have prevented their misfortunes. The words are the boys' own and are continued this week.

"Schools should give some kind of education that will help boys and girls to learn a trade that they wish to go into when he graduates."

"Public schools should keep the schools children busy, and not let their minds wander."

"Show us movies and how a boy gets into trouble and we could learn from these movies how to keep out of trouble. Schools should give us books that contain information on how to obey the laws of New Mexico."

"Get some law officer to talk to the students."

"How a boy should be treated if he does get into trouble—so as to help him stay out of trouble later during his life."

"Law enforcement officers should treat everybody alike."

"Should be given a trial pretty quick, or allowed to post bond."

"If sent to an institution, a boy should be given another chance after 3 or 4 months, to prove he has learned his lesson."

"If a boy is to be kept locked up for some time, he should be taken on the roof or someplace where the sun can hit him."

"The law officers could explain to us about the wrong we did."

"The law could investigate from the start to the end. In case if you get sent to this school for something you didn't do."

"A boy should not be mistreated after getting into trouble, but should be advised to try and stay out of it."

"The officers of the law should let their parents be notified."

"If a boy is picked up for something he did not do, a policeman should not try to MAKE him say that he committed the said crime." (Underlining of word "make" is the boy's work, not that of the typist.)

"He should be treated depending on what kind of trouble he got into."

"He should not be sentenced to any Reform School and not set free but put in custody of an officer of the city."

"A boy should be treated in the form that will reform him from his troubles."

"The judge should consider his good behavior as well as his bad behavior."

"If a boy has been going steadily to school and then suddenly stops I suggest they investigate the cause of this. It is usually because studies get to hard or he doesn't understand the things he is told to do."

"Should be taught right from wrong even if he has to be taught the hard way. Should be whipped sensible for his crime. He should not be whipped for nothing."

28 Bull Elk Killed In San Antonio Mts. Hunt

According to the New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish, the San Antonio Mountains elk hunt has been declared a "whopping success," with 28 of these fine game animals being harvested. Ten big trophy bulls were taken which was just exactly what the Game Commission had in mind when the season was set for this early date.

Of the 41 licenses issued, five persons did not show for the hunt. Twenty-eight "connected" for a total of 13 bulls, 12 cows and three calves.

According to the New Mexico Dept. of Game and Fish, one of the reasons for establishing certain areas open to the taking of deer of either sex is to properly manage the ratio between bucks and does. In other areas it is for the purpose of rearing the browse. Still other hunts are established to protect agricultural areas where crop damage exists.

SENATE BILL No. 278
AN ACT

AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF STATE BUILDING AND STATE INSTITUTION BONDS—SERIES-1955, IN THE SUM OF FOUR AND ONE-HALF MILLION DOLLARS (\$4,500,000) TO PROVIDE FUNDS FOR ACQUIRING, ERECTING, IMPROVING, CONSTRUCTING, REMODELING AND EQUIPPING BUILDINGS OF THE STATE, STATE AGENCIES, STATE DEPARTMENTS AND STATE INSTITUTIONS, BUT NOT INCLUDING POLITICAL SUBDIVISIONS OF THE STATE; PROVIDING A TAX LEVY FOR PAYMENT OF INTEREST AND PRINCIPAL OF SAID BONDS; PROVIDING FOR SUBMISSION TO QUALIFIED ELECTORS OF THE STATE AT THE NEXT GENERAL ELECTION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO:

Section 1. For the purpose of providing funds for acquiring, erecting, improving, constructing, remodeling, and equipping buildings of the State, State Agencies, State Departments and State Institutions, but not including political subdivisions of the State, and indebtedness of the State of New Mexico is hereby authorized in the sum of four and one-half million dollars (\$4,500,000).

Section 2. The State Treasurer shall prepare negotiable serial bonds of the State of New Mexico, to be known as "State Building and State Institution Bonds—Series 1955" in denominations as the Governor shall determine, and to be numbered consecutively, and to be dated January 1st or July 1st of the year in which they are issued. Said bonds shall bear interest at the rate of not to exceed four per centum (4%) per annum, payable semi-annually on the first day of July and the first day of January of each year. Payment on the principal of said bonds shall begin not more than three (3) years after the date of their issue and they shall mature thereafter in substantially equal annual installments in such a manner that all of said bonds shall mature not later than twenty (20) years after the date of their issue. Both principal and interest shall be payable in lawful money of the United States at the office of the State Treasurer in the City of Santa Fe, State of New Mexico, or at such other place as may be designated in said bonds. Said bonds shall be signed by the Governor, attested by the Secretary of State under the seal of the State and countersigned by the State Treasurer; and the full faith and credit of the State of New Mexico is hereby pledged for the prompt payment at maturity of the principal and interest of all of said bonds which may be issued and sold as provided in this act.

Section 3. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall be expended solely for acquiring, improving, constructing and equipping state owned and institutional buildings as shall be determined by the State Board of Finance; provided that none of said proceeds shall be expended or allocated until after any report of any survey board or commission created by the Legislature or appointed by the Governor for the purpose of making a survey of needs of various state agencies, departments and institutions, shall have been made and considered. The proceeds from the sale of said bonds shall remain in the hands of the State Treasurer until requisitioned by boards of the respective institutions in amounts approved by the State Board of Finance.

Section 4. The principal of said bonds shall be payable to bearer, or if registered as in this act provided, to the registered holder, as the same becomes

due. Interest coupons payable to bearer shall be attached to each of said bonds and shall be consecutively numbered specifying the number of the bond to which they are attached. Said coupons shall bear the engraved or lithographed facsimile of the signature of the State Treasurer in office at the time said bonds and coupons are prepared and ordered to be engraved or lithographed and such coupons shall be valid obligations of the state notwithstanding that the person whose signature appears thereon may have ceased to be such treasurer when such bonds are issued and sold and said bonds, when duly signed, attested, countersigned, issued and sold as in this act provided shall be valid obligations of the State although they may be issued and sold after the person so signing, attesting and countersigning the same shall have ceased to be the incumbents of their respective offices and although the State Treasurer countersigning said bonds be a different person than the person whose facsimile signature appears on the coupons.

Section 5. The bonds authorized under this act shall be sold by the State Board of Finance at such times and in such manner and amounts as said Board may elect, to the highest bidder for cash at not less than par and accrued interest to date of sale. The State Board of Finance shall publish a notice of the time and place of sale in a newspaper of general circulation in the State of New Mexico and also in a recognized financial journal outside of the State of New Mexico. Such publication shall be made once each week for two consecutive weeks next prior to the date fixed for such sale, the last publication thereof to be at least ten days prior to the date of sale. Such notice shall specify the amount, denomination, maturity and description of the bonds to be offered for sale and the place, day and hour at which sealed bids therefor shall be received. At the time and place specified in such notice the State Board of Finance shall open the bids in public and shall award the bonds, or any part thereof, to the bidder or bidders offering the highest price therefor. No bid shall be accepted which is less than the par value of such bonds plus the interest accrued from the last preceding interest date to the date of sale. Before delivering any bonds sold the State Treasurer shall detach therefrom and cancel all interest coupons which may have matured prior to the date of sale. The said Board may, at any time, sell the said bonds, or any part thereof, to the State Treasurer at private sale at not more than four (4%) per cent interest. The State Treasurer is authorized to purchase any of such bonds with the permanent funds

in his hands for investment at any time. The said bonds shall be legal investment for any person or board charged with the investment of any public funds and may be accepted as security for any deposit of public money.

Section 6. The State Auditor shall make a record in the book kept for that purpose in which shall be entered the date, number and amount of each bond sold and the amount for which the same was sold. Any of said bonds sold may be registered by the State Treasurer upon presentation of said bonds and may be at the request and in the name of the holder thereof in a book kept registered as to principal only, or as to both principal and interest, in which latter case all interest coupons attached to such bond shall be detached, and cancelled. The certificate of such registration with the date thereof shall be endorsed by the State Treasurer on each bond so registered.

Section 7. The expenses incurred by the State Board of Finance in the preparation and sale of said bonds shall be paid out of the proceeds from the sale of said bonds.

Section 8. To provide for the payment of the interest and principal of the bonds issued and sold pursuant to the provisions of this Act there shall be and there is hereby imposed and levied during each year in which any of said bonds shall be outstanding an ad valorem tax on all property in the State of New Mexico subject to taxation for State purposes sufficient to produce an amount equal to one year's interest on all bonds then outstanding, together with an amount sufficient to pay the principal of all bonds as they mature. The taxes hereby authorized, imposed and levied shall be levied, assessed and collected at the times and in the manner that other taxes for state purposes are levied, assessed and collected, and it shall be the duty of all tax officials and authorities to assess such taxes to be levied, assessed and collected.

Section 9. The State Treasurer shall keep separate accounts of all moneys collected under the taxes hereby imposed and levied, and shall use the same only for the purpose of paying the interest and principal

of said bonds as the same becomes due. Section 10. Any holder of any of the bonds issued pursuant to the provisions of this act, or any person or officer being a party in interest, may either at law or in equity, by suit, action or by mandamus, enforce and compel the performance of the duties required by this act of any officer or person herein mentioned. The provisions of this act shall constitute an irrevocable contract with the holders of any of the bonds and the coupons thereof issued pursuant to this act for the faithful performance of which the full faith and credit of the State of New Mexico is hereby pledged. 
VOLE MACHINES AND MODESTY
