NEW WATER WELL TO BE PUT ON PUMPING TEST

Carrizozo's new town water is to be put on a 48-hour pumping test this week. In a telephone conversation with Mayor Marvin H. Roberts on Saturday, W. F. Turney, project engineer, said preliminary tests of the water showed it to be of good quality. A complete chemical analysis of the water is being made.

MOST NEW WATER MAIN CONNECTIONS MADE

Work has been practically completed on the transfer of the town's water supply from the old to the new mains. Work was under way this week digging up old 4-inch mains for reconditioning and future use. This work was specified in the contract with the P. R. Burn Co.

TRUSTEES TO NAME NEW POLICE MAGISTRATE

Clarence E. Shaw, police magistrate of Carrizozo, submitted his resignation this week to the town trustees. It will be effective as soon as a successor is named, probably after the first of the year.

In other business at their meeting Tuesday afternoon, the trustees approved the application of Lloyd Vigil to move the location of Jannie's Package Store and to change the license from a retail package store to a dispenser's license. The proposed new location is the building south of Paden's Drug Store.

The trustees adopted a resolution asking for bids for the purchase of a police car for the town. It is to be a new 1955 Ford, Chevrolet or Plymouth, of either 6 or 8 cylinders. The bids are to be opened at the next regular meeting of the trustees.

Carrizozo Laundry Adds New Equipment

A Carrizozo home industry that has been expanded recently is the North Main Steam Laundry, operated by Mr. and Mrs. F. G. Misner.

Laundry equipment now includes a locomotive-type high pressure steam boiler. It feeds steam into a starch cooker, washer and extractor which removes 95% of the moisture from clothes; a steam dryer for fluffing woollens, blankets, underclothing and towels; also into a steam vault where starched articles of clothing are kept.

Also using steam is a 100-inch sheet mangle from a shirt collar and cuff and a shirt body press.

The laundry employs two full time employees and one part time worker, in addition to Mr. and Mrs. Misner.

Mayor Proclaims "Safe Driving Day"

Mayor Marvin H. Roberts of Carrizozo has issued a proclamation declaring December 15 to be Safe Driving Day in Carrizozo. He has designated S. M. Gallegos, chief of police, as director of Safe Driving Day within the town limits.

All citizens are urged to cooperate with this program, designed to keep the entire United States free of traffic accidents during the 24-hour period of December 15, 1954.

The proclamation further states: "This constitutes the first time that all 48 of the United States of America have united in a common attack on a social problem of the scope of traffic safety."

REPORT ON STATE FARM BUREAU CONVENTION

A very successful thirty-fourth annual convention of the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau was held in Albuquerque last week. Many heated issues faced the members, but all were settled in the democratic way.

Delegates from Lincoln County were Mr. and Mrs. Bill Shreengost, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Bonnell, George Limscher, Bert Pflingsten, Wilbur McKnight, Buster Bird and Mr. and Mrs. Charles A. Jones.

Members of the state resolution committee were all the county presidents, who put in many hours working on the resolutions from the counties, sifting and consolidating them before they were presented to the delegates for their consideration.

Registration began at 9 a.m. December 1, the rest of the day being spent with the different commodity meetings. Lincoln County had a representative at each group. The ladies had a meeting and luncheon at noon at the Franciscan Hotel.

That night there was an organization banquet for the county presidents, county chairwomen and county organization directors, which was followed by a vesper service. The invocation was given by Clarence Stringer and the address by Rev. James Braun.

December 2 was taken up with meetings. The different speakers for the day were Delmar Roberts; Mayor Marice Sanchez, Albuquerque; Riley Arnold, field representative, southern region, AFBF; Gov. Edwin L. Mechem; Walter Randolph, vice president AFBF, and Mrs. Eugene Jones, director, southern region Associated Women, AFBF.

The annual dancé was held that night. December 3 was the day that the many resolutions were voted on; officers elected and reports made by different committees.

Delmar Roberts was re-elected president, as were W. B. McAllister and Stephen Brock, vice-presidents. It was very gratifying for the Lincoln County Farm Bureau to have so many of their resolutions adopted by the State Farm Bureau. Some of those which originated in Lincoln County are as follows:

MINIMUM VALUATION

1. Be it resolved, that the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau urges the passage of legislation raising the minimum evaluation of a county from \$14,000,000 to \$20,000,000 before said county becomes a first class county. (Senator Ike Morgan of Roosevelt County has assured us that he will introduce this bill in the next legislature and we urge our Lincoln County Senator and Representative to back this bill.)

OPPOSE A&M NAME CHANGE

2. We oppose attempts by any person, or group to change the name of the New Mexico College of Agriculture & Mechanic Arts, or to make other changes that will in any way lessen the effectiveness of the agricultural departments of the institution. The college was founded for the primary purpose of improving agriculture and mechanic arts in New Mexico, and it has made substantial progress toward accomplishing this goal. We oppose any attempts to impair its original purpose. We further urge that it require an act of the legislature before a name change can be made.

3. We wish to make a public statement that the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau has not in the past, nor will it in the future, endorse any individual for political office.

4. Be it resolved that the terms of office of the Soil Conservation Districts elected officials be staggered so that at no time could there be an entirely new and inexperienced board of directors coming into office.

5. Be it resolved that the grass lands of Fort Stanton reservation pasture which have been idle for two years, be temporarily (or until final disposition) be made available for use by distressed ranchers who are suffering as a result of grasshopper and drought in the Bonito Lake-Nogal area.

6. Whereas the Fort Stanton reservation involving some 27,000 acres of federally owned lands is now up for further disposition, and whereas we have made careful study of the several proposals for the disposition

MOBILE CHEST UNITS TO VISIT LINCOLN COUNTY

Two mobile chest units of the New Mexico Department of Public Health will be in Lincoln County the latter part of next month. The dates set are January 27, 28, 29 and February 1. Most communities in the County will be visited by the units and an itinerary will be announced later.

W. W. Jonz, health education consultant for the Department of Public Health, was in Lincoln County Wednesday conferring with Mrs. Lela Brewster and others regarding the visit to Lincoln County of the mobile units.

Arrangements are also being made for a visit to the county of the State Mobile Dental Unit. This will be a date early in February.

To make plans for the visit of the Mobile Chest Units, a county-wide meeting is to be held in Carrizozo January 4 at 7:30 in the school library. Mr. Jonz announced. School superintendents and representatives of all organizations are invited to attend this meeting to discuss the survey and methods of operation.

Mr. Jonz outlined the objectives of the Mobile Chest Units, as follows:

To find previously unknown cases of tuberculosis and other chest disorders, including tumors and lung cancer, and certain heart conditions which can be shown by X-ray.

To assist in finding treatment for every case of tuberculosis discovered.

To obtain information which could serve as a guide in strengthening the tuberculosis, cancer and heart disease control programs in New Mexico.

To have a well-informed public on facts about tuberculosis, cancer and heart disease.

It is recommended that every person over 15 years of age have a chest x-ray.

PRISON SETTLES FOR A PONTIAC

SANTA FE, Dec. 8—A request by the state penitentiary board for an automobile for the warden of "Bulck or Oldsmobile" class was rejected by the governor and a so-called baby Pontiac at \$2450 was provided for the warden instead. The pen action came after Mechem a few days earlier had rejected a highway department request to buy a Buick and an Oldsmobile for a couple of members of the brass squad.

Why the governor approved even a "baby" Pontiac for the pen warden was puzzling when it was recalled that the prison people have been repeatedly before the board of finance pleading for extra money to meet operating expenses.

The Mechem administration has made progress in getting the state out of the high priced automobile market. The only deviations this year from the Ford-Chevvy-Plymouth class have been an Oldsmobile for the state police chief, a Buick for the highway engineer and a Pontiac for the chief tax commissioner.

Most all the new purchases are an unattractive dark green and marked on the side, as required by law, showing them to be state property.

With the exception of a luxury automobile for the governor, which has some justification in upholding the dignity of the office, most people think there is no justification for providing state employees with automobiles outside the lowest price group.

There was some saving, however, in the penitentiary request. The order sent in and rejected by the governor was for a \$3500 Oldsmobile 88 Super.

LABOR FEARFUL OF LEGISLATURE

Some organized labor officers in the state fear the next legislature will see a revival of the plan to amend the state constitution to outlaw labor contracts which require workmen to affiliate themselves with any union. The so-called "right-to-work" amendment was sponsored in 1947 by Gov.-elect John Simms when he was a member of the legislature and was defeated only because the Catholic church went out against it. During the campaign Simms repeatedly promised that he would not en-

courage such a scheme again and would even veto it if it came up to him from the legislature.

Trouble with that is, if the legislature should vote for such a constitutional amendment the governor would have no authority to veto it.

The national group sponsoring the right-to-work measure, which is now operating in some 16 states, have stepped up efforts in 1955 in the legislatures of every state where it is not in force.

Antibiotics Used to Curb Pear Blight

The latest recommendations for controlling blight of pears, apples and quinces are contained in a new leaflet issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture. It includes instructions for the use of antibiotics against this blight, a bacterial disease known also as pear blight or fire blight.

The new publication, Department Leaflet No. 17, is a revision of an earlier blight leaflet issued under the same number in 1939. The current issue gives advice on new control materials, such as zinc and the antibiotics streptomycin and terramycin, which have been developed thru research during the past fifteen years.

The author of the revised leaflet, John C. Dunegan of the Department of Agricultural Research Service, says the most important control measure is still the removal of holdover blight by cutting off the dead twigs and cutting out cankers, making the cuts through healthy wood. After every cutting operation, the cut surfaces and tools used must be sterilized with corrosive sublimate.

Pears and quinces are very susceptible to the blight organism. The leaflet points out that it also attacks apples, and at times damages ornamental plantings of hawthorne, spruce, flowering almond and mountain ash.

Single copies of the leaflet may be obtained from the county extension office or by writing to the Department of Information, Extension Service, Box 757, State College, N. M.

Month's Safety Theme Is "Holiday Hazards"

The theme for the Lincoln County Safety Council's work for the month of December is to be "Holiday Hazards," which consist of holiday driving, drunk driving and winter highway and pedestrian hazards.

Since President Eisenhower has set aside December 15 as "S-D-Day" (Safe Driving Day), the Lincoln County Safety Council is asking the cooperation of all law enforcement officers in Lincoln County, the sheriff and his deputies, all constables in their districts, the Mounted Patrol and State Police, in working for a no "traffic accident day" on this date.

W. S. Campbell, president of the County safety organization, states that the Council is also asking that all law enforcement officers in Lincoln County and in the State of New Mexico pay particular attention to traffic in the month of December "to see if we cannot make it a no-accident month."

Mr. Campbell further suggests that residents of Lincoln County, who may have relatives and friends coming to spend the holidays, write to them and ask them to drive carefully and to observe all traffic laws and stop signs. "This," Mr. Campbell says, "will assist in cutting down the traffic deaths in our state."

Cattlemen To Discuss Numerous Topics at Las Cruces Convention

More than six hundred cattlemen representing every county in New Mexico are planning to attend the fourth quarterly regional meeting of the New Mexico Cattle Growers' Association in Las Cruces December 10 and 11, according to Sherwood Culbertson of Lordsburg, president.

"Recommendations for a state legislative program to be pressed in 1955 will highlight action during the meeting," Mr. Culbertson says.

Explaining that additional legislation to help prevent cattle theft; to further control Brucellosis disease in cattle, and to rapidly improve farm to market roads appears necessary, Mr. Culbertson said: "We will also give careful attention to general state taxes and state government expenditures in the interest of assisting to develop a better state government in New Mexico."

State Highway Engineer Pete Irwin of Santa Fe will explain current highway expenditures in New Mexico and outline plans for road improvement. Other speakers will include Gov. Edwin L. Mechem; Frank Bolce, chairman, National Livestock Committee, Sonita, Ariz.; Albert K. Mitchell, Albert, chairman of the U. S. Dept. of Agriculture Committee to Eradicate Foot and Mouth Disease in the Republic of Mexico; Radford Hall, Denver, assistant executive secretary of the American National Cattlemen's Association; Albert Nohl, director of the Taxpayers' Ass'n of New Mexico; Phil Harvey, Carizozo rancher, and Dr. John R. Branson, president of New Mexico A&M College.





of these lands, keeping the best interests of New Mexico in mind, and whereas HR 6729 has been introduced proposing 1500 acres be given to the State of New Mexico for building sites, and the balance of the lands be returned back to the federal government to be administered by the Bureau of Land Management in accordance with the rules and regulations of the Taylor Grazing Act.

Several others resolutions advanced by Lincoln County were either reworded, or tabled for further discussion. Among these was the resolution which asked that the New Mexico State Game Department be held directly responsible financially for the killing of livestock and damage to ranch property by hunters during the hunting season. This resolution was referred to a special committee appointed by the president to work with the State Game Department to formulate a plan which will protect the interest of farmers and ranchers, as well as those desiring to hunt.
