



SIMMS' CHOICES WORRY POLITICOS

SANTA FE, Dec. 15 — Early Simms appointments have given the jitters to a bunch of established political figures who are beginning to wonder if they are going to get any recognition at all in the creamy pot of the new administration.

They are learning what the governor-elect meant when he said statehouse jobs would be filled upon political recommendations but that he was reserving the positions for people of his own choice.

The selection of Fred Barron for Employment Security Director, a place always in the past handled as a major political plum, was received with the common expression "Who's he?"

Ed Swope, a good Democrat all right, but out of New Mexico for 21 years, got the prison warden appointment over the candidacies of several who had been up to their necks in current party affairs.

As this is written the governor-elect is still dicker with Republican Ed Hartman to stay on at least for a while as state comptroller, and failing to get him the governor-elect is expected to turn to Darwin Sprouls of Clovis, another political unknown.

The trend of the early selections gave politicians the jitters but a lot of Joe Citizens are dancing happy about it. Barron with no political claims but a 10-year career in the Employment Security office is ideal for the place; Swope is one of the outstanding prison men in the country, and Sprouls, a respected young certified public accountant, is better qualified than the politically backed aspirants for the important place.

GOVERNOR-ELECT HAND TO REACH

The nervousness of the boys who claim they got out the vote has not been improved by the friendly but offish and non-committal attitude Simms has adopted in dealing with them. He seems to be restricting his counselling to those of his so-called palace guard—Albuquerque lawyers Charlie Spann, Everett Grantham and Erwin Moise, and the former Santa Fe newsmen Dick Everett who has been selected to serve as Simms' secretary when he takes over.

Some of the best-known figures of the campaign still have not had any assurance that they will get the places they seemed so sure of before the election. Even Mike Gallegos, one of the half dozen top figures in the original Simms group, doesn't know yet if he is to get his old job as motor vehicle commissioner; Joe Bursey who invented the tourist bureau director's job and worked full-time through the campaign without pay, doesn't know if he is going back; H. Gene Atry, campaign tour manager who spent a lot of his own dough, hasn't had any official encouragement about his application for purchasing agent.

POLITICOS EYE JOBS IN BUREAU

The politicos are particularly anxious about the bureau of revenue with its half dozen well-paid directorships, scores of free and easy field jobs with automobiles and per diem allowance, and of course those scrambled-after places in the state liquor office.

Hanging fire on jobs outside the bureau are Murray Hintz, who is hoping to go back to his old place as welfare director; Charlie Basset, father of the retiring secretary of state, who is trying to get back in as ports of entry director; Charlie Roehl, for his old place as park commissioner.

What's hurting the politicos this time is a combination of Simms' promises during the campaign not to reinstate the old Democratic crowd in the statehouse and the serious money problem that has developed in the state government.

The crisis in the demand for money and the amount that is coming in doesn't leave much leeway for the new governor to indulge in favors for politicians new or old. It looks like he is picking performers first and politicians later.

CAPITOL PEOPLE UPSETTING THEIR PAY

Statehouse people expecting to stay on the job during the next two years haven't been shy about signing new budgets for presentation to the legislature which specify salary increases for themselves.

Topping the list is John A. Garcia, state mine inspector, who

PUMPING PROVES CARRIZOZO WELL GOOD PRODUCER

Carrizozo's new water well south of Carrizozo is proving to be a good producer as test pumping is in progress by the drillers, Perry Bros.

Pumping began Tuesday morning. The initial flow was 125 gallons per minute, but the flow has continued to build up. Wednesday morning it was reported by the drillers that water was being pumped at the rate of 200 g.p.m. and several hours later it had exceeded 300 g.p.m.

The drillers put down a 22-inch hole through a formation of gravel and sand to a depth of 215 feet. There blue shale was encountered and drilling was continued to around 250 ft.

The well was sealed off at the 215 feet level, a 10-inch casing installed and the well was improved with gravel pack the entire depth.

The water level was 47 feet before pumping and there was an initial draw down of 18 feet, according to George Perry, superintendent.

A 48-hour test pumping period ended Thursday morning.

PERRY BROS. BRING IN WELL FOR FLAGSTAFF

What is said to be the best water well ever drilled in the Flagstaff, Ariz., vicinity, has just been completed by the Perry Bros. of Glendale.

The firm began drilling the well in the Woody Mountain area, the past summer. Initial tests produced 350 gallons per minute, making a daily production of around 500,000 gallons.

The well was drilled to a depth of 1600 feet, beginning with a hole 18 inches in diameter and tapering to 15 inches.

Water stood at the 1230-foot level when the test started and draw down was only about 43 feet in the first 12 hours of operation. Draw down of the well since that time has tapered off to a slight rate and it was expected that a static level would be reached (Dec. 10).

The next project of the Perry Bros. will be to drill a well on the Bagley place at Corona.

HIWAY 380 FATAL TO DEER, HORSE

Two animals—a horse and a deer—took to Highway 380 with in the past week and caused three motor vehicle accidents.

The first, on December 8, as reported by State Highway Patrolman Eddie Apodaca, was a 220-lb. buck deer vs. two automobiles on Indian Divide. Miles Gaston of Capitan was driving west from the summit of Indian Divide at 6 p.m. when the deer jumped in the path of his car.

Mr. Gaston was unable to stop in time to avoid hitting the deer which promptly leaped into the pathway of another car coming from the opposite direction. The driver of the second car, Francisco Montes of Juarez, Mexico, also struck the deer, this time with fatal results to the animal.

Both cars were damaged and the deer is now in the locker plant of the Capitan High School.

A horse, believed to belong to Holm Bursom of Socorro, came out second-best when it collided with a '55 Mercury, 33 miles west of Carrizozo. The driver, Blanchard Russell Dixon of Aztec, N. M., was en route to Capitan. He also said he was unable to stop his car in time to avoid hitting the horse, which was killed by the impact. Approximately \$1200 damage was done to the car. The accident happened about 11:25 p.m., just before the deadline of Safe Driving Day.

A third traffic accident investigated by Patrolman Apodaca was a two-car collision at 2:30 Tuesday at Oscura on Highway 54. Both cars were damaged as they sideslipped, but none of the occupants was injured.

DEATH CONTINUES TO REIGN ON HIGHWAY

Death continued to reign on the nation's highways in spite of Safe Driving Day. New Mexico contributed to the grim toll to the number of four—all killed in a one-car accident at Perilla west of Magdalena. According to the Sheriff's office at 11:30 Wednesday night 25 traffic accidents had been reported in the state, with two injured in addition to the four fatalities.

vide. According to investigating police officers and the Sheriff's office, the Autocar truck jackknifed and was crushed by the heavy trailer loaded with 6000 gallons of propane fuel. Both overturned and slid 75 feet into a ditch and partially up the other side.

The truck was a tangled mass of wreckage when the two were pulled apart by a tow car from the City Garage. Patterson was extricated from the cab as was the body of Mooney, badly mangled.

The accident occurred shortly before noon Monday. The Carrizozo Fire Department answered a call for help and extinguished a small blaze that broke out in the truck. Volunteer Fire Chief Fay Harkey, Assistant Chief Lloyd Vigil and E. L. Sherrill stood by most of the afternoon, while wrecking cars from the City Garage and Bob Means attempted to right the trailer.

This was finally accomplished after most of the propane had been transferred to tank trucks of the Carrizozo Hardware Co. and Tularosa Basin Gas Co.

Thirty minutes after the accident it was investigated by Frank Wingfield of Artesia, safety inspector for the New Mexico Public Service Commission in Santa Fe. Mr. Wingfield was en route on Highway 380 to Carrizozo on a business trip.

Mr. Mooney is survived by his widow and two small daughters.

ONE KILLED IN FATAL CRASH OFF INDIAN DIVIDE

William E. Patterson, driver of the ill-fated truck and propane trailer, pictured above, was removed Tuesday from the Carrizozo Hospital to a hospital in El Paso. Suffering from a fractured jaw, fractured right arm and skull and facial cuts, the injured man was extremely fortunate to have survived the crash in which a passenger on the seat beside him was instantly killed.

The latter was Wm. C. Mooney, 41, of Roswell, owner of the Hot Springs Gas Co. Mr. Mooney was also owner of the truck and trailer which crashed.

The driver, 26, of Hollywood, N. M., apparently lost control of the semi and trailer as they rounded a curve going west, just beyond the Lincoln Forest marker on the east side of Indian Divide.


Of an estimated 450 highway department employees with more than five years of service, 262 will be honored at programs in the state this year.

**1500 Expected at Wool Growers Convention**

Albuquerque (Special) — Explanation of various effects of the "National Wool-Bill" on the sheep industry of New Mexico will highlight discussions during the 52nd annual convention of the New Mexico Wool Growers Association in Albuquerque Feb. 6, 7 and 8, according to Floyd W. Lee, of San Mateo, president.

"Interest in this legislation and a number of other important problems today confronting the wool industry is expected to attract more than 1500 state sheepmen and their families to the convention," Mr. Lee said.

John Simms Jr., governor-elect of New Mexico, will head an impressive group of speakers who will appear on the program. Charles Fuller of Picocho will serve as chairman of the important general resolutions committee and Bob Setterlund, rancher of Artesia, will deliver the response to the address of welcome.

Let me see the county sheriff make a gun play in the street,  
And a victim later buried with his boots upon his feet;  
Take me back to Carrizozo; let me see a poker game  
As in the days when it was prudent not to ask a stranger's name.  
Take me back to Carrizozo where they "sized" a fellow not


Think about this the next time you want to stop in the fire zone in front of the theater. You could be the cause of the death of fifty or a hundred people.



# Farm and Ranch

## GRASS AND LEGUME SEED PROGRAM TO CONTINUE

The USDA program for the purchase and distribution of limited supplies of foundation seed of improved grass and legume varieties to help increase supplies of these seeds for farmers will be continued in 1955 with a program similar to that in effect for 1954, according to Gordon Hoff, extension agronomist at New Mexico A&M.

As in previous years, contracts for the purchase of specified 1955-crop foundation grass and legume seeds will be offered to eligible farmer producers of these seeds, Hoff says.

## J. Z. Rowe To Go to Dallas

J. Z. Rowe, extension economist at New Mexico A&M College, has accepted a position of agricultural economist with the Federal Reserve Bank of Dallas.

## 4-H Activities Are Off to Good Start

4-H activities for the coming year are off to a good start. Judy McKnight and Douglas McKnight of Picocho each have a calf on feed. Judy got her calf from the Fred Pfingsten herd near Capitan, and Douglas got his calf from the T. J. McKnight herd.

Ronnie Eldridge has two steer calves from his father's herd on feed.

Penny and Mary Ann McKnight have calves started on feed from the Ralph Pierson herd.

The El Capitan 4-H Club has already started its 1955 club year and the Hondo Valley club is planning a big turnout for the enrollment meeting for the 1955 year on the evening of January 6, 1955. At this time a movie will be shown, along with enrolling members for the coming year.

## Wool Program Has Incentive Payments

The grower who does a better job of putting up his wool will receive a larger incentive payment in 1955.

Wool shorn or sold on the sheep's back after January 1, and marketed during the marketing year starting April 1, 1955, will be eligible for incentive payments under the new wool program. Here's how the payment system will work in 1955.

The incentive level for 1955 is set at 62 cents a pound in the grease. Growers will sell their wool as usual and keep good records of their sales.

The average net return for all growers in the nation will be figured in 1956 after the '55 wool is sold. The average national net return will be subtracted from the incentive price (62¢) and the difference will be changed to a percentage of the average national net return.

That percentage, multiplied by what the grower actually received for his wool is the amount of his incentive payment. This means that growers who get a higher price for their wool by doing a better job of selling it will receive more money per pound in incentive payment.

The idea of the program is to bring the average national price up to 62 cents a pound. If the national average price of wool sold by growers is 62 cents or more, there will be no incentive payments.

## Fallen Tree Leaves Make Good Compost

Put fallen tree leaves to work. All those leaves you are worrying about having to burn make good compost. Or, they can be used as a mulch around trees or shrubs where the soil is cultivated.

Used as a compost, leaves can decay during the winter. Then use them in the spring to build up the organic content of the soil. This is particularly important in New Mexico. But, don't use leaves to mulch perennial

flower beds. Straw or some other light litter should be used as it allows air and moisture to penetrate the beds. Leaves are too heavy and pack too closely. If you're determined to burn the leaves, be sure to burn them well away from trees and shrubs. Even the heat from burning leaves rises and damages the branches. To get a little more fire than smoke, keep the fire small. A small fire always burns faster and is much easier to control.

Dr. R. T. McCartney, veterinarian and poultry pathologist at New Mexico A&M College, will leave February 1 for a position with the department of professional services of the Wyeth Laboratories, with offices in Dallas.

## FARM BRIEFS

### Mashed Potatoes via Package

A team of USDA research scientists report the pilot-plant development of a new kind of dehydrated potatoes with unusual properties. The new product — "potato flakes" — can be rapidly converted to mashed potatoes by addition of either hot water or milk. After whipping, it has the texture and color of good freshly-mashed potatoes and has excellent flavor.

Beginning January 1, 1955, any farm operator who makes a profit of \$400 or more in a year, will be subject to Social Security.

Veterinary research workers have proved conclusively that dogs can and do perspire. They point out that only the heavy, hairless skin at the tip of the nose is without sweat glands.

Dairying produces more gross income than any other productive enterprise.

The farmer gets 63 cents of every food dollar spent for meat; the marketing system gets 87 cents of that dollar.

#### Game Warden Turns Tables on Litterbugs

According to the State Game Department Newsletter, boys will be boys, only this time they were men. The story follows: District Warden Roy Jones came on a campsite in the Guadalupe, abandoned in a deplorably dirty condition. He searched the site for some evidence of the offenders' identity and found it in the form of a deer tag attached to a toy mouse and hung in a tree. Before he set out to identify the tag owner, he learned from the forest ranger that his same camp had been left in filthy condition the past two or three years, after the big game season. When the tag owner had been identified, Jones went to call on him. This is the story he got. The man and his buddies were old pals who hunted together every year, as a matter of fact, they had camped in the same spot the past two or three years. This year they all got their deer except him, so his buddies

played a joke on him. They hung his deer tag on a rubber mouse and tied it in a tree. Jones had all he needed. He rounded up the whole party, made them drive back to the campsite—a little matter of 400 miles round trip—and put that site in shipshape order. **21,276 Deer Checked Out**—A report on the big game season reveals that 21,276 deer have been checked out of check stations. The present figure represents 54% hunter success among 40,414 hunters.

**Clayton Lake Area Approved**—The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service having approved the use of Federal Aid funds for construction of Clayton Lake dam and wildlife restoration areas, the Game Commission is now closing deals with private landowners for lands that will provide fishing and recreation areas.

### High Speed, Alcohol, to Take Christmas Toll

New York, Dec. 16—High speed and alcohol, perennial killers of American motorists and pedestrians, once again will head the list of causes of highway fatalities during the next Christmas week end, when at least 205 persons will die in crashes caused by those two factors alone.

According to a prediction released this week by the Association of Casualty and Surety Companies, the probable death toll from accidents involving high speed or speed too fast for conditions will amount to 124 victims. Alcohol, taken too freely by both drivers and pedestrians, is expected to account for another 81 victims.


