**New "Beep, Beep"  
Sets SP Ry. Clocks**

There is a melodious "beep,  
beep" instead of a mechanical  
"click-click" as Southern Pacific  
greeted the New Year.

In previous years the thou-  
sands of clocks in the Southern  
Pacific stations all along its  
lines have been set by a pre-  
cision time signal clicked out over  
a telegraph network from San  
Francisco at 8:57 a.m. daily.

Now that telegraph keys are  
being replaced by telephones,  
Southern Pacific has devised a  
"time-tick-tone oscillator" that  
transmits a "beep-beep" series  
of notes to give a time signal  
over designated lines without  
disturbing conversation.

The new device duplicates the  
precision time tone signal sent  
out from the National Bureau of  
Standards at Washington, D.C.  
It could, with adjustments, com-  
munications engineers admit,  
duplicate any holiday tune.

in Area of Taos**

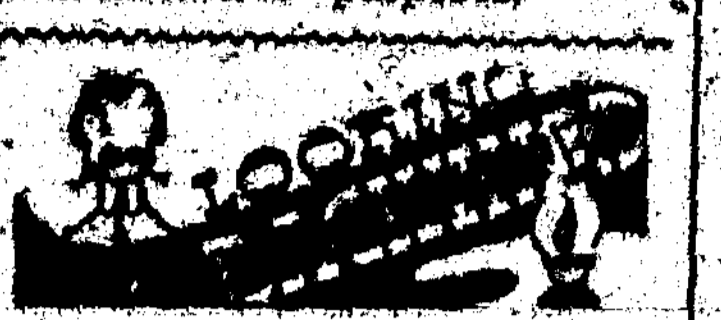
Taos, N. M.—Fair conditions

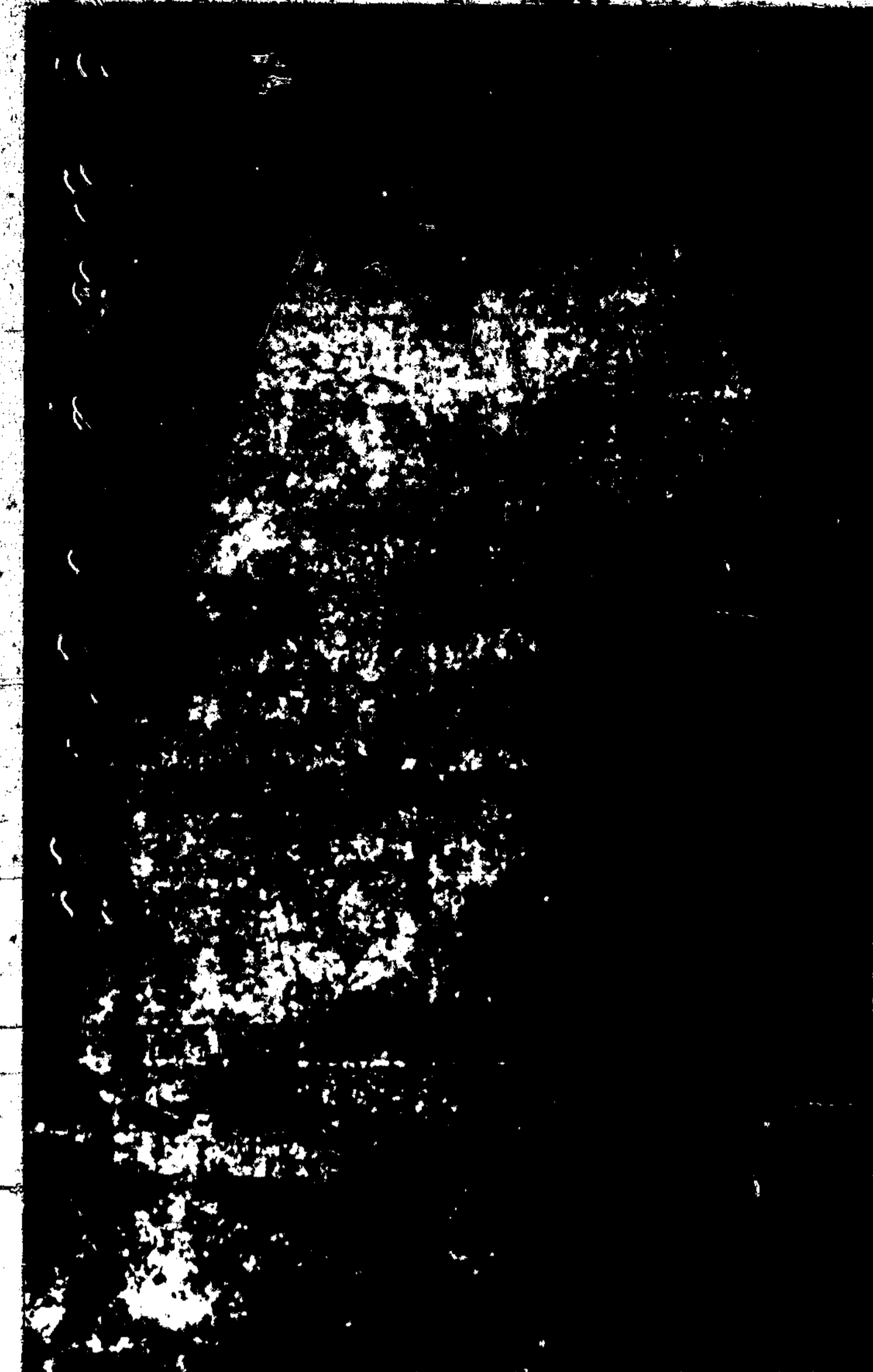

The Grizzly Bees had the same percentage as the A's, losing to Alamogordo 32 to 39; to Ft. Sumner 45 to 62 and then turning the tables on the Tularosa sub-varsity 58 to 26. The Tularosa Bees took the measure of the Grizzly Bees in a previous encounter by a margin of 10 points.

The Grizzlies played one of their poorest games to date in losing to Texico. They went in an overtime period, the leads to the fourth quarter leading 35 to 22. # Farm and Ranch

## Pruning Fruit Trees Important Winter Job

The quality and quantity of fruits produced in New Mexico's home orchards in 1955 will depend to a large extent on the care trees are given this winter. One important job that must be done properly—preferably during February or March—is pruning.

Pruning shapes a tree and determines the distribution of fruit when it starts bearing. It controls quality and quantity of fruit production. It removes dead and diseased wood and helps combat insects and diseases. Pruning also lengthens the life of trees by protecting properly shaped trees against limb breakage and decay. It can be of help in reducing the amount of thinning required at a later date.

All fruit trees are not pruned the same way. If you're in doubt about how to prune a particular tree, ask at the Lincoln County Extension Office in Carrizozo for "Pruning Hardy Fruit Plants" (USDA Farmers' Bulletin No. 1870).

Peach trees require much more severe pruning each year than do apple and pear trees. For example, peach trees bear fruit on one-year old wood and each winter about one-third of the growth should be cut back. However, before you remove any wood, you should first remove dead or diseased wood and branches and twigs which cross and rub.

## Watch Weight Loss in Ewes Due to Lamb

Ewes that lose weight during late pregnancy are easy victims of lambing paralysis.

An ewe should gain 25 to 30 pounds from the time she is bred until she lambs. About half of this gain should be made during the last month before lambing.

The best way to insure the proper gain is to feed each ewe from one-fourth to one-half lb. of grain, and 3 to 4 lbs. of legume hay a day, beginning a month before lambing. If the sheep are on good winter pasture, the amount of grain and hay can be reduced.

Another danger for ewes due to lamb is vitamin A deficiency, especially in sections of New Mexico which were unusually dry this past summer and fall. Symptoms of the deficiency are blindness, watery discharge from the eyes, and still-born or weak lambs that die shortly after birth.

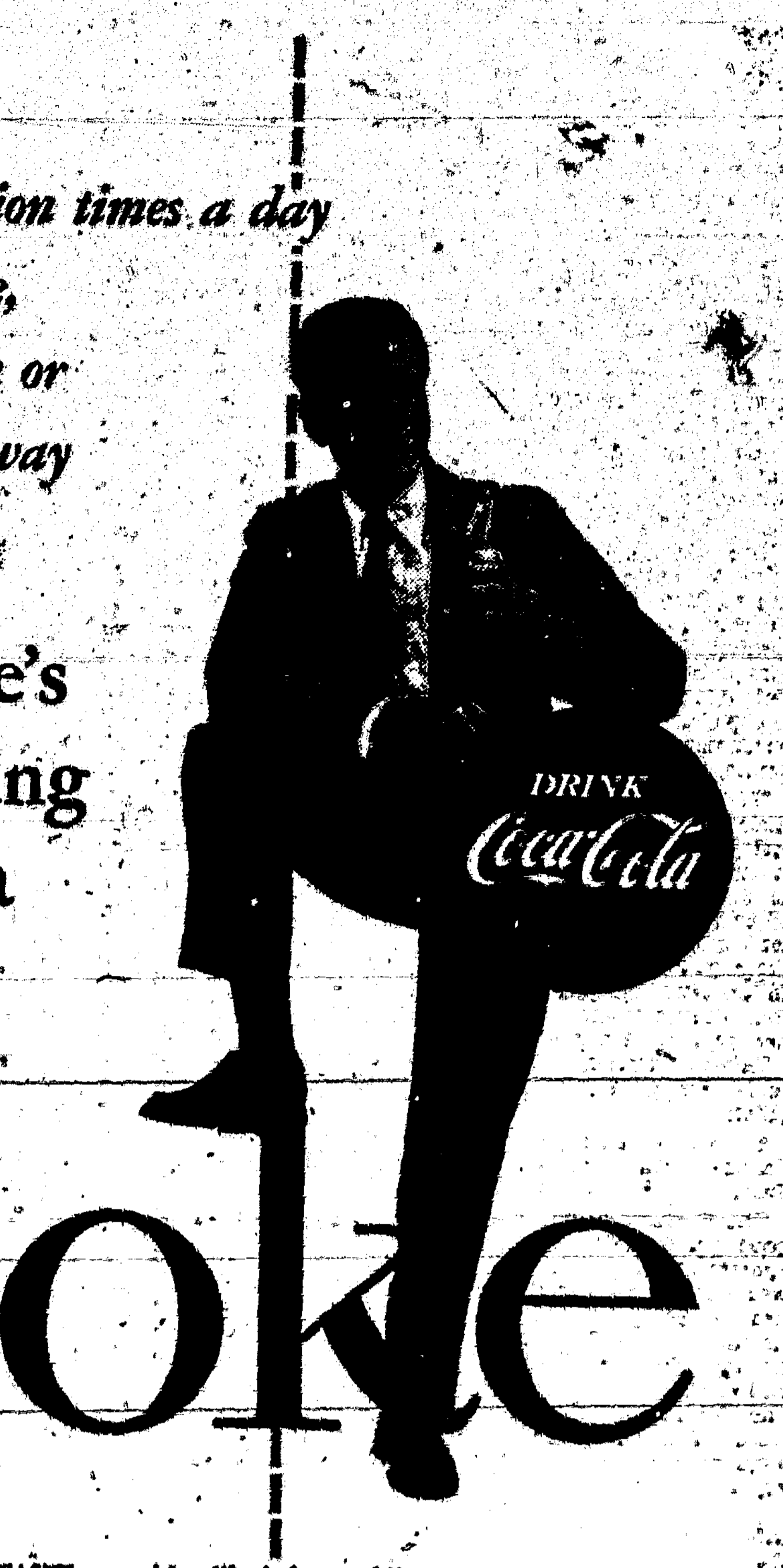
