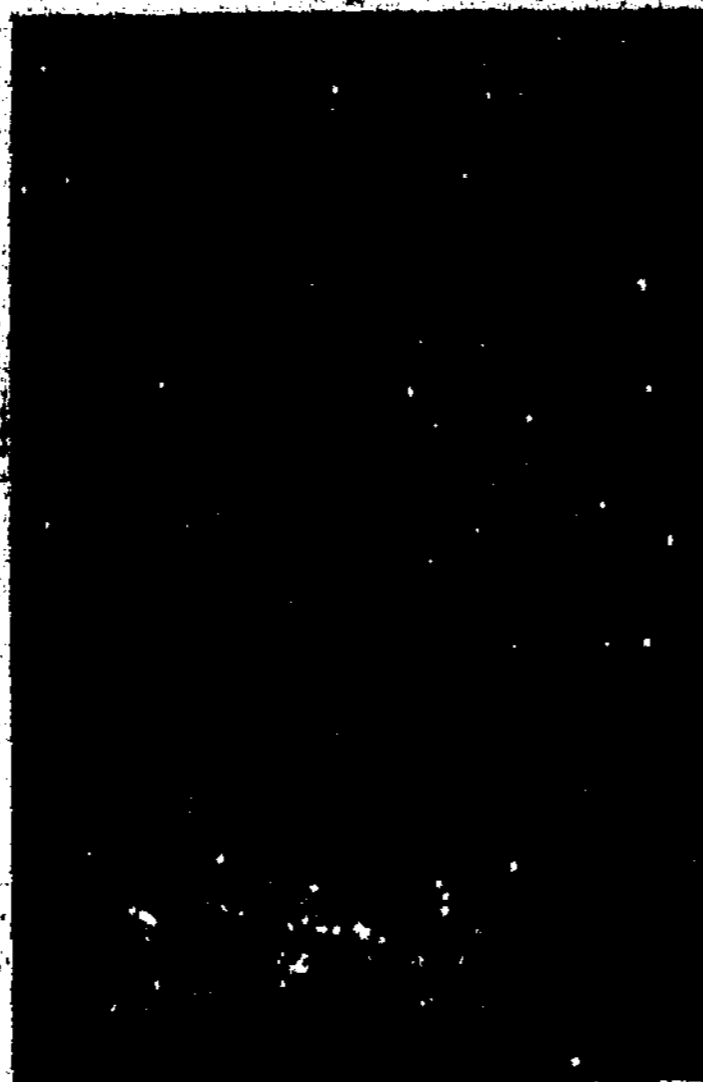

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Trustees Accept Proposals for Added Water Improvements

At a meeting Tuesday afternoon, Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo accepted the proposal for the water works extension as set forth in documents on file with the town clerk. The proposal, outlined by the engineering firm of W. E. Turney and Associates, calls for the expenditure of \$9,700 for a chlorinator and tank foundations and the sum of \$23,758 for a 10-inch supply line into town from the newly developed town well.

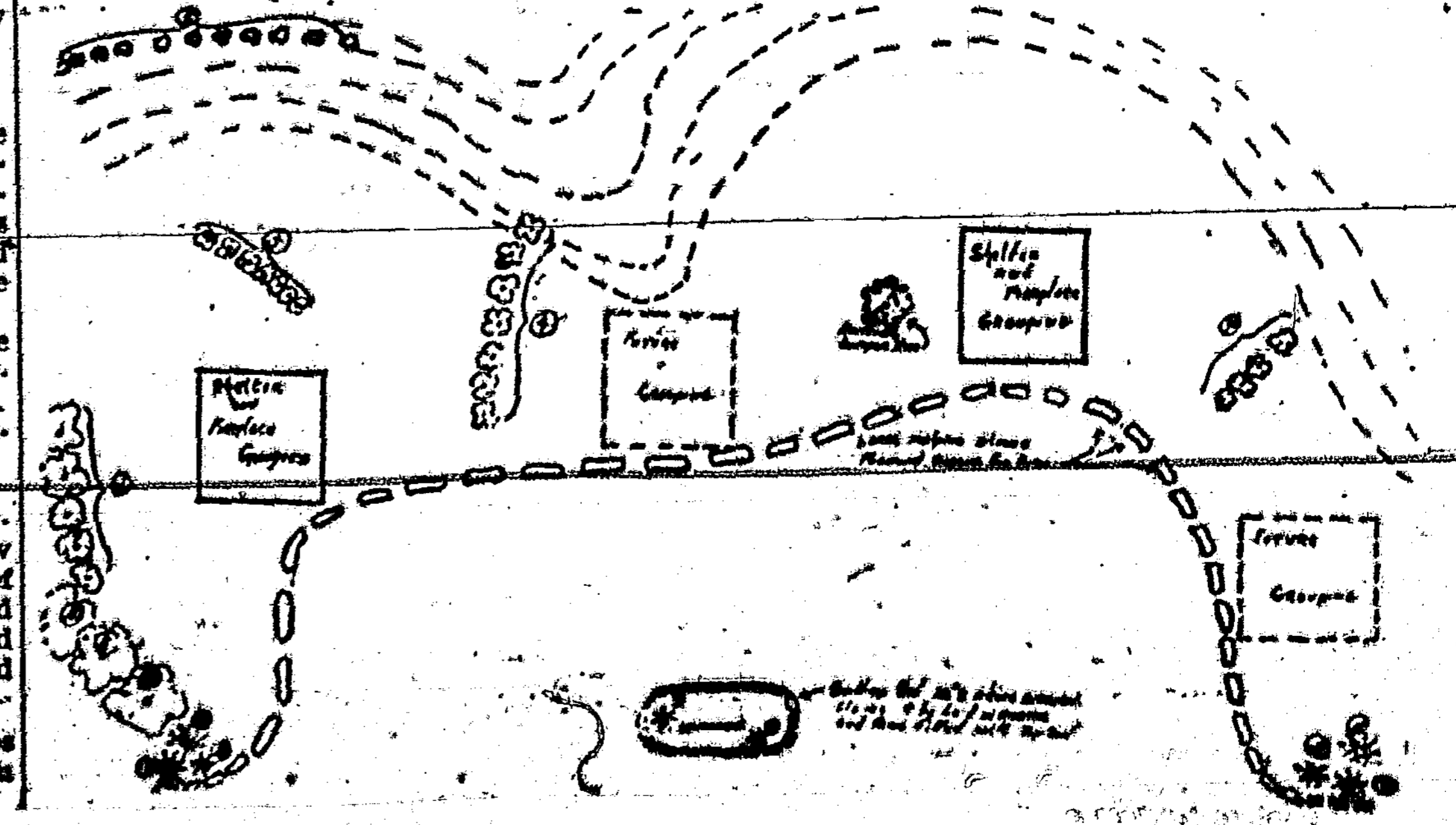
Overnight Visitors in Carrizozo

The questionnaires must be accurately filled out by the pensioner and returned to VA within 30 days after it is received. Failure to return the questionnaire within 30 days will result in stopping pension payments, VA said.

The questionnaires apply only to those receiving payments from VA for non-service-connected disability or death. They do not apply to those drawing compensation (VA payments for service-connected disability or death).

All income received by the pensioner, whether it be from wages, interest, retirement or gifts, must be reported on the questionnaires, with the exception of payments from VA for disability or death, including

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**Veterans Receiving VA Questionnaires**

Veterans Administration this week began mailing out its annual income questionnaires to one million veterans and survivors of deceased veterans who are drawing VA pensions.

The law requires that VA obtain information from pensioners concerning their anticipated income for the coming year, that VA may determine their eligibility for pension under the income limitations or ceiling.

The annual income "ceiling" for a pensioner, without dependents, is \$1,400; with dependents, \$2,700. Those with annual incomes above these figures are not eligible for VA pension.

**Colorado River Week Observed in February**

"Colorado River Week" — a week set aside to call attention of the citizens of the nation to the need for the Colorado River Storage Project — will be observed in four states beginning February 13.

The week is sponsored by the Upper Colorado River Grass Roots Inc., a citizens group pushing for support of the river project. Colorado, New Mexico, Utah and Wyoming will join in observance of the week.

During the week, citizens can show their support of the great river project by becoming Aquilantes (water vigilantes). Aquilantes will contribute \$1 or more to the nationwide education program being sponsored by the Grass Roots organization, and also will help by letter-writing and by learning the facts of the project.

The Colorado River Storage Project now is before Congress. It calls for a series of dams along the Colorado River and its tributaries in the four states.

over the Canadian River Basin was exactly opposite to that of the upper Arkansas Basin. The lower valley stations experienced above normal precipitation while the precipitation was much below normal over higher elevations of the Sangre de Cristo Range. Somewhat above normal runoff may be expected for the main stem of the Canadian River while only about 85 per cent of normal runoff is in view for the Mora River and tributaries.

**Water Runoff Prospects Poor in Most Basins**

Below average precipitation in the major watersheds of New Mexico for the year ending Dec. 31, 1954 is reflected in the reservoir storage data just released by the U. S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau, Albuquerque.

Two dams on the Pecos River, Alamogordo and Red Bluff, held more water on Dec. 31, 1954 than on Dec. 31, 1953. Other dams showed considerable lower levels.

Following are the number of acre feet held by various dams on Dec. 31, 1954 and comparative figures for 1953:

The San Juan and the Northwest watersheds received 93 per cent of normal precipitation from Jan. 1 to Dec. 31, 1954. Figures for other watersheds for the same period are as follows: Canadian and Northeast, 73 per cent; Pecos and Southeast, 84 per cent; Northern Rio Grande, 78 per cent; Southern Rio Grande, 75 per cent; Gila and Southwest, 78 per cent. New Mexico had 80 per cent of normal precipitation for the year ending Dec. 31, 1954.

The water supply forecast, on respective runoff in the various basins also looks very gloomy, according to a report from the U. S. Weather Bureau and U. S. Soil Conservation Service, Albuquerque. The current water outlook is for water-year runoff of from 65 to 85 per cent of average for most of the Rio Grande Basin. For the Rio Chama and the lower main stem of the Rio Grande, somewhat lower percentages are indicated; inflow into Elephant Butte Reservoir is expected to be near 45 per cent of the 10-year average.

In the San Juan Basin, a water-year runoff of 80 to 85 per cent average is expected for Animas, Los Pinos and other northern tributaries of the San Juan River if precipitation for the remainder of the season is near normal. However, the outlook for the extreme headwater area, as indicated by the forecast that the 62 per cent of average runoff for the San Juan River at Rosas, is even less promising. For the lower portion of the main stream, the indications are that the runoff will be about 70 per cent of average.

November-June runoff for the Pecos Basin is expected to be in the range of 80 to 95 per cent of average. The fall precipitation pattern

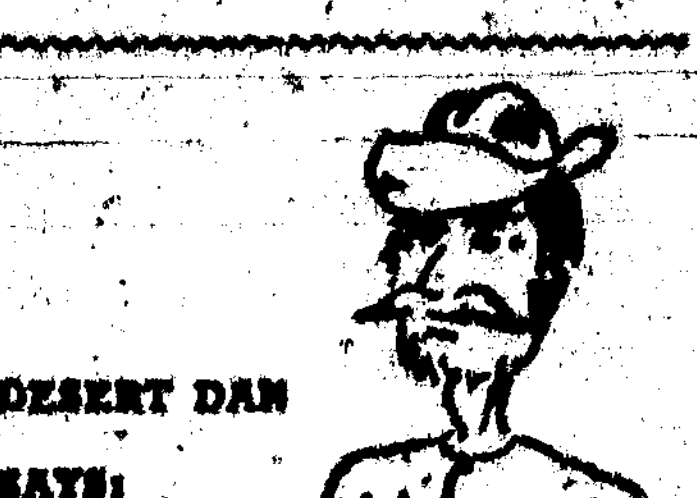
**Las Vegas Bids for Cowboy Hall of Fame**

The Cowboy Hall of Fame became a reality recently at the organizational meeting of the trustees in Denver, which adopted papers of incorporation, by-laws, elected officers, and set up machinery to decide on a permanent location for the project at the next meeting of the trustees March 15.

Attending the first meeting from New Mexico was Trustee Albert K. Mitchell of Albert, New Mexico's other trustee is A. D. Brownfield of Deming. Las Vegas is one of the more than twenty western cities seeking the Hall of Fame. Mitchell was named first vice chairman of the organization and appointed to the executive committee. Brownfield was appointed to the membership committee.

The project will be known officially as the Cowboy Hall of Fame and Museum and will be organized along lines similar to the Baseball Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N. Y. It will pay tribute to rodeo cowboys, stockmen cowboys and ranchers who helped build the west and who, today, keep western traditions alive through rodeo.

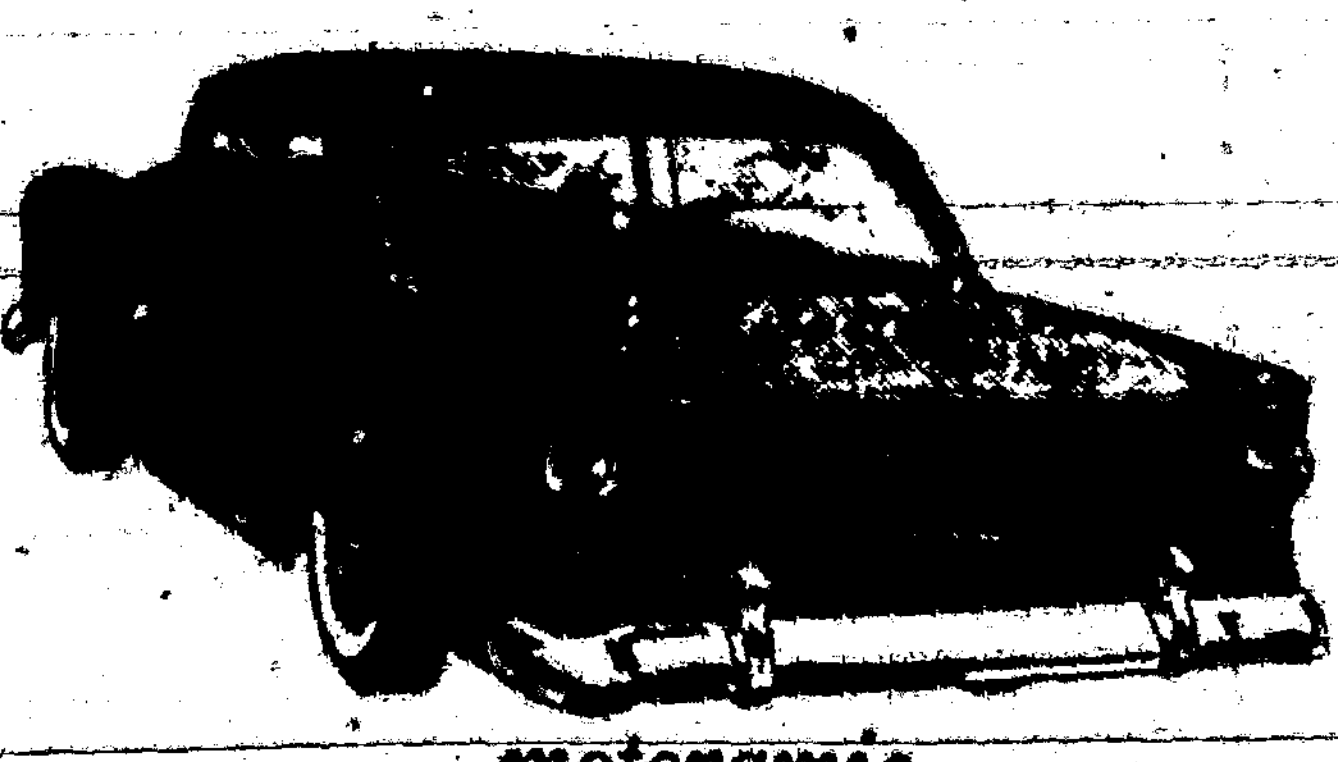

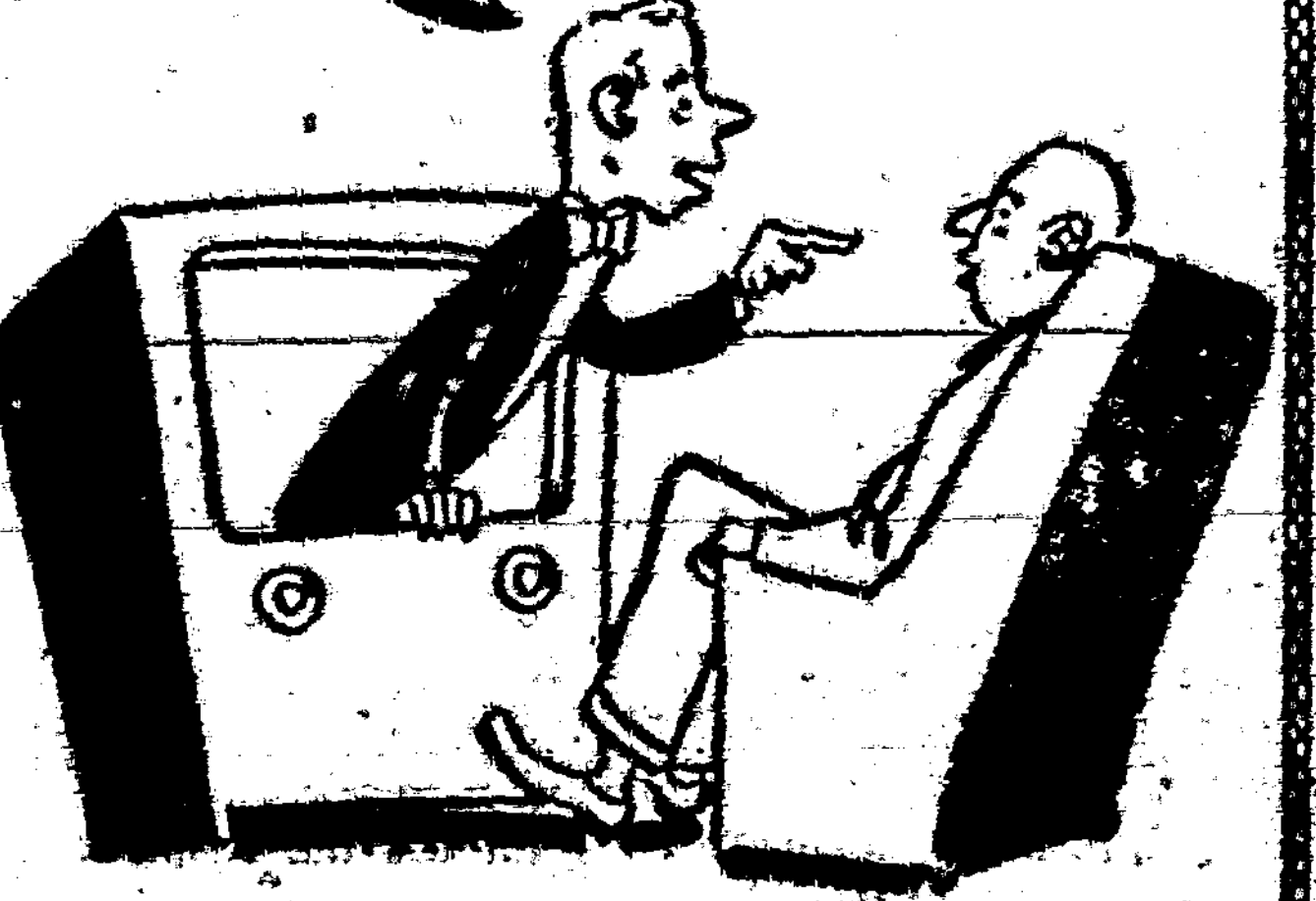

#### Ask The Teen-agers About Town's Faults

WASHINGTON—If you want to know what's wrong with your town, ask the teen-agers, suggests the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. They'll pinpoint your faults for you in a way that will make you squirm. But you'll probably find their criticisms sound.

Further, says the Chamber, their complaints will give you clues about what to do with teen-agers themselves. Juvenile delinquency undoubtedly could be cut by putting the teen-agers' suggestions into effect.

These conclusions are based on a unique survey conducted by the Independence (Iowa) Chamber of Commerce in the town's two high schools. The Chamber asked 160 juniors and seniors for frank answers to 24 questions about the community. The students were asked for their opinions on how to improve recreational and social facilities in Independence, what they thought of retail stores and whether they intended to remain in their home town, making it their home.

The students made it clear they needed better recreational and social facilities. They called for more selection and variety in stores, new lighting and color schemes, new store fronts and fewer "pouncing" clerks. About 50 per cent asked for a store specializing in clothes for teen-agers.

The most revealing answers dealt with their plans after graduation. Seventy-three said they expected to leave Independence, 18 expected to stay and 11 were undecided. As in other small towns, the chief reason for the plans to leave was the lack of job opportunities.

The Independence Chamber reports that it has taken to heart the teen-agers' views. It is formulating plans for the development of present business and industry and to obtain new industry. Other improvements are in the works, too.

The National Chamber suggests that other towns might get similar results from consultation with their high school youngsters.

#### Catdom's Aristocrat Grows Scarce in Iranian Homeland

Washington—The Persian cat, silken-haired sophisticate of many an American living room, is becoming something of a rarity in its Iranian homeland.

"Allah protect us," lamented a leading Iranian newspaper recently, noting the outside demand for Persian kittens. "We may even have to import cats."

The Persian cat, always a bit high-hat but just as fond of a place by the fire as any household pet, has helped spread the name of Persia—modern Iran—around the world, says the National Geographic Society. As has the Persian rug, the Persian cat has come to stand for the soft comforts of luxury living.

Some of the best examples of the Persian type inhabit the rugged regions of Kurdistan in northwest Iran or the wilds of Afghanistan.

Yet nobody knows whence came the first Persian—or when. Unlike the common breeds whose lines are traced back to the sacred cats of ancient Egypt, their origin is lost in the shadows of time.

Naturalists theorize that the Persians may be descendants of Pallas, wildcat that still lives in the cold, barren mountains and steppes of central Asia.

Long-haired and bushy-tailed, the Pallas species is much different from the sleeker members of the cat family, large or small. For an ancestor of feline aristocracy, Pallas' wildcat has a definitely low-brow look, with short, rounded ears set low on a broad crown.

Cat fanciers divide all domestic catdom into two classes—long-hairs and short-hairs. In the long-haired group are the numerous varieties of Persians, which through interbreeding now includes Angoras from the Turkish province of Ankara, formerly Angora.

The short-hairs are everyday cats of street and farm, plus the exotic Siamese, Burmese, Abyssinian, and the tailless, rabbit-gaited Manx.

As admiring owners of Persians know, these lordly characters are apt to be more temperamental than their garden-variety relatives.

Leading more sheltered lives, Persians also are less likely to get their names and exploits in the papers for professional mousing, pole-climbing lengthy falls, or encounters with high voltage wires.

The Persians—white, blue, red, cream, silver or tabby—come into their own at exclusive cat shows where alley-cat entries are few and far between. Their graceful movements, their quiet-eyed contemplation of the world awaken a feeling of admiration. More than almost any other animal, they seem made to be caressed.

But though long-haired and privileged, the Persian shares feline traits that have enchanted cat lovers and revolted cat haters through the ages. No less than the others, the regal, silk-cushion Persian is equipped by nature to return, if necessary, to the wild life of its forebears. As a witty Frenchman once wrote, "God made the cat so that man could have the pleasure of petting the tiger."

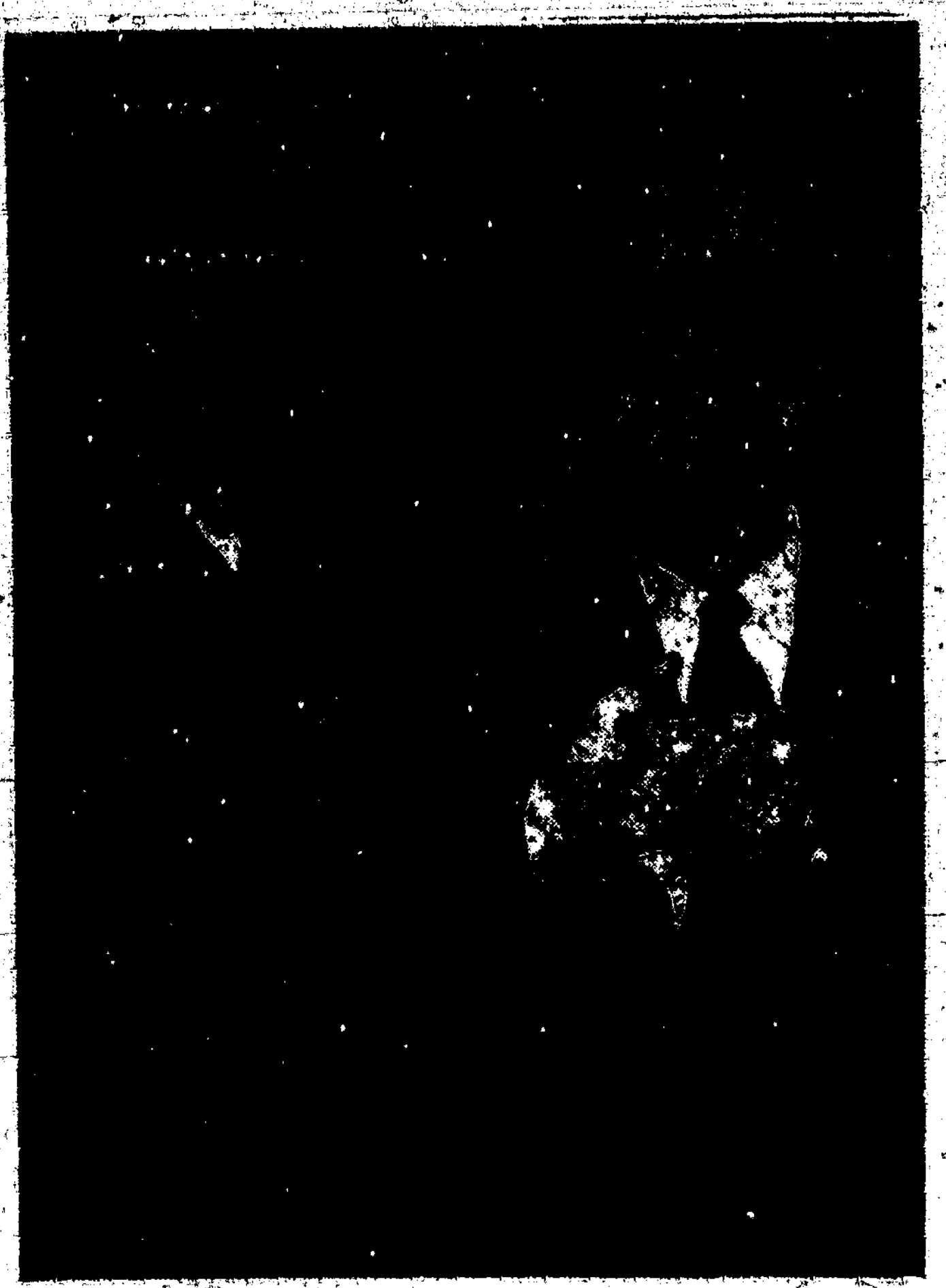

**PROPOSE PLACING CHECK ON SOLICITATION OF FUNDS**  
The Executive Committee of the New Mexico Society for Crippled Children and Adults has unanimously endorsed a bill which will be introduced in the Legislature to require registration of charitable organizations and professional fund raisers. Prepared by the Legislative Committee of the Bernalillo County Council of Social Agencies, the bill is backed by the Community Chest of Bernalillo County.

Charles C. Broome, Albuquerque, President of the Crippled Children's Society, said, "This bill would protect the public against unscrupulous fund drives, and no legitimate charitable organization would have anything to fear from its enactment into law."

A cooperative program to inform small firms of the steps necessary to obtain financing through issuance of securities has been announced jointly by Wendell B. Barnes, Administrator of the Small Business Administration, and Ralph H. Demmler, Chairman of the Securities and Exchange Commission.

Under the program, the Securities and Exchange Commission will provide the Small Business Administration with current information on SEC regulations applicable to the issuance and sales of securities by small firms, services rendered by the Commission in aid of compliance therewith, and similar matters of interest to the small business owner. Regional and Branch Offices of the Small Business Administration, particularly those located in areas where the SEC does not maintain offices, will serve as centers of this information for small business concerns.

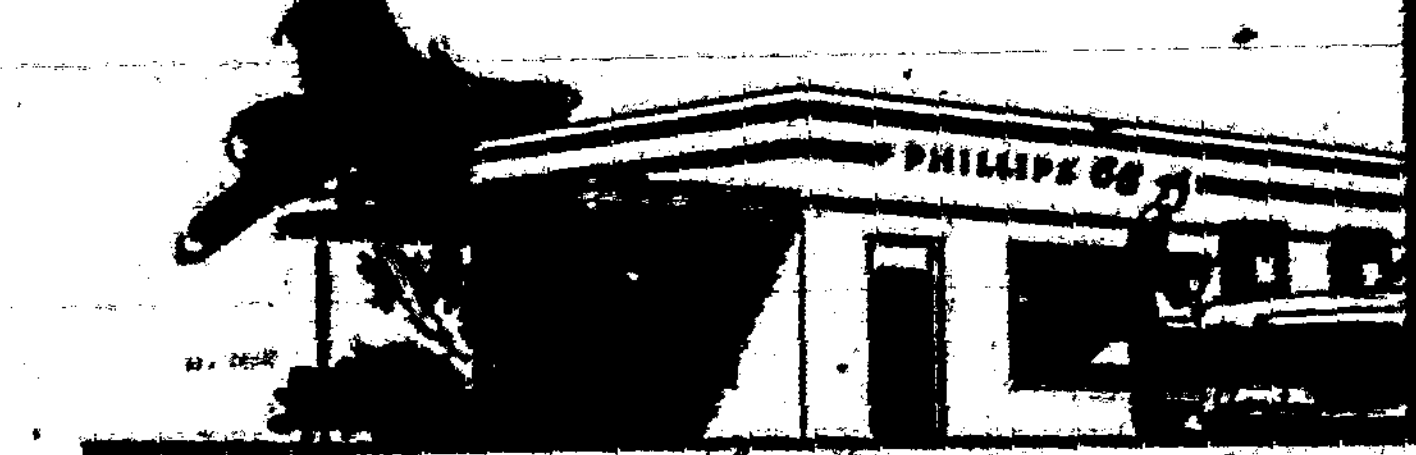

**IT'S ALBUQUERQUE AGAINST THE FIELD**

SANTA FE, Feb. 2.—It looks like it may be the State vs. Albuquerque before the legislature closes.

There is anti-Albuquerque grumbling about giving the University at Albuquerque \$1,650,000 of the \$4.5 million bond issue for a new gymnasium while other schools pleading for classrooms and laboratories got far less.

About a proposed reorganization of the house of representatives which would give Albuquerque some 13 members and more as the city grows; And about a push that is going forward that would permit municipalities to double property taxes and create new taxes to meet a problem that is almost entirely Albuquerque's alone.

**U ENROLLMENT MOSTLY LOCAL**

Governor John Simms, an Albuquerquean himself, gave recognition to the situation when he said early this week that he was concerned about "geographic jealousy" in relation to the University of New Mexico.

There is some basis for the "jealousy" of resentment or whatever you want to call it. The university's enrollment last year consisted of 2042 Albuquerque students, 526 students from out of the state, and 630 students from New Mexico outside Albuquerque.

The proportion of local students was by far the highest of seven state colleges with the exception of Western, located in the far southwestern part of the state.

The Agriculture college at Las Cruces comes the closest to being a state school. The figures there last year were 23% from Dona Ana county, 26% from out of the state, and 51% from New Mexico outside Dona Ana county. Mines had 24% from local Socorro, 33% from other New Mexico counties and 40% from out of the state.

**FEAR ALBUQUERQUE HOUSE CONTROL**

The Albuquerque push for a larger share of the house membership on a formula based on population alone has developed an undisguised fight to block the Rio Grande city from eventual domination of the chamber.

The anti-Albuquerque group is willing to increase the number of Albuquerque representatives from six to nine, but will not go for the other proposal which would automatically increase the number as the city grows.

There is also a gang-up against Albuquerque on the proposition to double property taxes to raise money for city government. The proposal provides that the tax doubling would come about only upon a vote of local people but it permits everybody to vote, not restricting the question to property owners as in a bond election. It's a Duke City measure.

**LEGISLATIVE BACKGROUNDS**

Rep. Ralph Gallegos of Rio Arriba may be trying to end his personal difficulties in offering a bill to legalize gambling. The representative was nabbed twice last year in police raids on games. He had been found the first time and was found not guilty in the second instance. He has a lawsuit pending against Santa Fe Police Chief Ben Martinez for the second arrest. There may be a reason for Sen. Henry Seger's fight to preserve the guaranteed-profits-on-liquor law. The Tucumcari senator's father purchased the Big Wheel Bar in Tucumcari last December. The movement to increase the 3% of 1% tax on pari-mutuel horse race betting is going forward under the leadership of former Rep. Heavy Drake of Ruidoso who is no friend of the Ruidoso track operators. The Ruidoso operators, however, have friends inside.

**STATE GOVERNORS MOSTLY LAWYERS**

Want your boy to be governor? Then send him to law school. John Simms is the third lawyer in a row to hold the governor's office—before him legalists Ed Mechem and Tom Mabry. Of New Mexico's 16 governors, 11 have been lawyers or trained in law. The first governor, William C. McDonald was a licensed lawyer but never practiced. Others were Cass

Washington E. Lindsey, O. A. Larrazolo, Merrit C. Mechem, James F. Hinkle (studied law at the University of Missouri but didn't practice), Arthur T. Hannett, Arthur Seligman, A. W. Hockenhill, and the last three.

**STATEHOUSE IN A HURRY**

The need for two more judges in the Albuquerque district might be relieved if Judge Ed Swope didn't have so much to do. Outside of his court work he is chairman of the state youth council and chairman of the board of the State Industrial School for Boys. There is a possibility former Gov. Tom Mabry may be named to one of the new Albuquerque judgeships with the understanding that he will not stand for election. Nine months more on the bench would qualify him for \$500 a month retirement pay. There has been some talk in the legislature about raising the gas tax a cent—all of it against the reorganization of the highway commission forecasts no change in the department officers. Commissioner Tony Helmann of Harding got his tail up about efforts to entice him off the commission, went independent, got himself elected chairman and looks like he is going to stay independent.

A bill has already been prepared for introduction in the legislature which would prohibit Corporation Commissioner Ingram Pickett from running for governor without resigning his 6-year term as corporation commissioner. New Statehouse people are already talking about Simms for Senator in 1958. State Sen. Calvin Horn, of Albuquerque, is acting like a hopeful for governor when Simms completes his time.

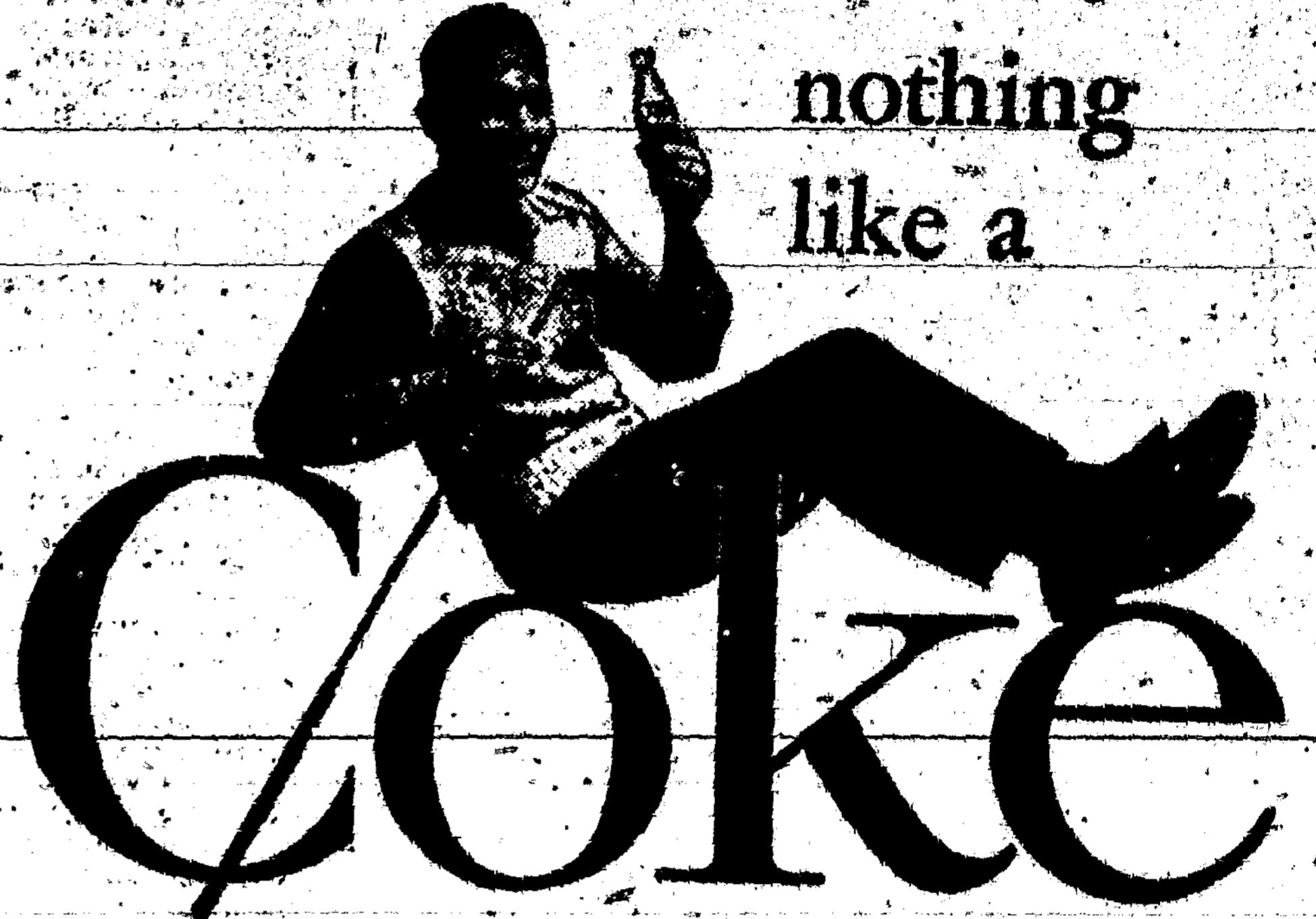
