Two proposals before the State legislature that had the people of Lincoln county stirred up met their just fate this week. Both died in house committees.

Repr. Sally Ortiz telephoned the News from Santa Fe Tuesday morning the good word that House Joint Memorial No. 7, requesting the Board of Public Welfare to dispose of Fort Stanton Hospital, had been killed. The action was taken by the House Judiciary Committee.

The Memorial, introduced by Reps. Louis S. Page, J. Gregorio Aragon and Donald A. Martinez, stated in part that Fort Stanton "Duplicates the services performed at the State Tubercular Sanitarium at Socorro at a great cost to the taxpayers of the state."

The good judgment of the Judiciary Committee prevailed and killed this memorial. They are familiar with what the taxpayers' money is buying and know that Ft. Stanton, a gift from the Federal Government, is the best equipped in the State for the treatment and care of tubercular patients.

Until Fort Stanton was taken over by the State, there were not adequate facilities to care for the Navajo Indians requiring treatment for tuberculosis. The cost is borne by the Federal government and in this model institution the patients are given better treatment than had ever been available before.

Repr. Ortiz is to be commended for his efforts to have this selfish legislation killed in committee.

The other Memorial, No. 6, to restore the Fort Stanton reservation to the Mesquero Apache tribe was killed following a public hearing Tuesday before the Lands and Livestock Committee. Wendell Chino, appearing on behalf of the Mesqueros, advanced several arguments for including prior title to the land and its importance to the necessity of the tribe. Appearing against the Memorial were spokesmen for a group of ranchers in the Upper Hondo watershed. They pointed out the distance of fifteen miles which separate the Mesquero Reservation from Fort Stanton, also that the land should be put to its maximum beneficial use.

Regarding the Fort Stanton hearing Tuesday, Sen. J. G. Moore stated that to his knowledge no information had been presented as to the validity of the Indians' claims. Though pleading was ahead for the "pistol-to-kill" bill, he said, and personally he was against it. A public hearing is to be held, he stated, on Senate Bill 76 "relating to the diversion of waters of, or allocated to, the State of New Mexico from one stream system to another; providing that no such diversion shall be approved by any officer, department or agency of this State, without the prior concurrence of the Legislature."

District Game Warden Marion E. Embrey, in Carrizozo Tuesday, reports that fishing has been good in Nogal Lake and that some anglers are catching their limit in a half day. The upswing in fishing is due to the recent planting in Nogal Lake of 3200 legal size rainbows. Fry numbering 2000 have also been planted in Nogal. According to Warden Embrey, legal size trout are planted in the streams and lakes for the main purpose of furnishing sport for the fishermen.

Tagging has shown that they do not have a good survival record when transferred from hatchery to other waters. Fry, however, adapt themselves to the change more readily.

Bids Called for Highway 37 Work

The State Highway Dept. is calling for bids February 25 for the construction of Federal Aid Project No. S-1226 (11) and SP S-1226 (200) located in Lincoln County on State Road 37 from Ruidoso Airport toward Angus and within the city limits of Ruidoso. The approximate length is 5.548 miles.

Proposed construction consists of grading, drainage sub-base, base-course, hot plant surfacing, one multiple opening concrete box culvert and miscellaneous construction.

The contractor will be required to start work within ten days from notification of award of contract and complete the work within 150 working days.

The call for bids states that "All qualified unskilled labor will be employed insofar as possible from lists furnished the contractor by the employment agency designated in the contract. Only persons certified for assignment to work by the State Employment Service shall be so employed. The designated agency for Lincoln County is located at Roswell, John Dean Jr., manager."

When picked up the two men were charged with the theft of a tire and wheel from one vehicle and with receiving, buying, selling or concealing stolen property.

In Police Magistrate Clarence Shaw's court Monday, Salazar pleaded guilty and Lopez waived preliminary hearing. Both were bound over to district court under \$500 bond.

"Death Curve" Traps Another Motorist

"Death Curve" on Highway 380, 3 1/2 miles west of Capitan, trapped another motorist Saturday. A 1955 Buick, said have been driven at a moderate rate of speed, failed to negotiate the dangerous curve, hit the soft shoulder and overturned 1 1/2 times.

The driver, M/Sgt. James Stettl, 31, of Nellis Air Force Base, Las Vegas, Nev., was not injured, but his mother, Mrs. J. T. Stettl, 54, received a fractured left leg and lacerations of the left foot. She was brought to Carrizozo Hospital, then moved by the Shaw Ambulance to Abilene, Texas.

Uranium Corporation Seeks Leases in County

Wilburn W. Seal, field representative for the Great States Uranium Corp. of Lubbock, Tex., returned to Lincoln County this week. He is interested in acquiring uranium leases. His company has 16 good showing claims in the Lone Mountain area north of Carrizozo.

Mr. Seal states that if sufficient claims can be acquired his company would consider full-scale exploration and possibly setting up a mill somewhere in the area.

According to Mr. Seal his company has the most modern uranium detection equipment. Air reconnaissance is first made with scintillation equipment. Ground checks then follow when aerial observation warrants.

Outcroppings are exposed by bulldozers and core drillings are made to check out the body of ore and to check values.

While in Carrizozo, Mr. Seal is making his headquarters at the Park Motel.

Legislature Passes Eagle Creek Bill

Officers of the Eagle Creek Water Supply Association, representing the villages of Ruidoso and Capitan, have been informed that a bill to give the Association the power to issue revenue bonds repayable over a term of 35 years has passed both Houses of the Legislature.

The bill was introduced in the Senate by Senator J. G. Moore and was filed as SB49. Under Senator Moore's guidance, the bill passed the Senate early last week without objection. Representative S. M. Ortiz guided the bill through the House of Representatives and spoke in its favor when it came to the floor of the House for debate.

Also speaking in its favor were Melvin E. Tays, State Representative from Lincoln, Otero and Socorro Counties, Representative Rubeck Pankey of Truth or Consequences and Representative Ray Hughes.

The bill passed the House, Friday, Feb. 11 without objection and has been sent to the Governor for signature.

The Association has been awaiting passage of the bill before proceeding with plans to sell revenue bonds to finance construction of storage facilities on Eagle Creek and pipelines to Ruidoso and Capitan.

As soon as the act is approved by the Governor, a meeting will be held by members of the Board of Directors of the Association to discuss the sale of revenue bonds.

Band Clubs to Serve Meals at Saturday's Musical Festival

Members of Band Boosters clubs from Hondo, Carrizozo and Capitan met in Capitan to make plans for the Lincoln County Musical Festival on Saturday, Feb. 19, at Capitan High School.

It was decided that the clubs will serve a noon meal at noon to the band children for 75 cents and an evening meal for 25 cents. Cakes and candy will be sold during the day.

Proceeds will be divided between the Band Booster clubs of the three towns. Parents are urged to attend the festival and eat at the school.

High school bands from Ruidoso, Hondo, Capitan and Carrizozo will take part in the festival. Part of the day will be devoted to prizes for woodwind, brass and percussion instruments. In the evening the matted bands, numbering approximately 125 players, will present a program.

Means Motor Supply Opens Saturday

The new Means Motor Supply formerly opens in Carrizozo Saturday. Free doughnuts and coffee will be served all day.

The remodeling was being completed early this week and the store's personnel were busy arranging the stock of motor supply parts which were arriving daily.

The merchandise, which includes parts for all makes and models of cars, is being placed on 18 rows of shelving the depth of the store and in the display counter the length of the office.

COMMITTEES AIR FT. STANTON BILLS

Three men representing a group of ranchers in the Upper Hondo watershed appeared on Tuesday before a hearing of the House committee on Lands and Livestock in Santa Fe. They were Fred W. Pflingsten, Marvin Jones and LaMoyné Peters.

All spoke against Senate Joint Memorial No. 6, which had previously passed the Senate. The Memorial asked Federal agencies and the Congress to restore Ft. Stanton's lands to the Mesquero Apache tribe.

The delegation from Lincoln County also conferred with Rep. S. M. Ortiz.

Following the hearing the committee voted not to report out the Memorial for House consideration.

The committee members were presented with the draft of a House Joint Memorial which would put Fort Stanton's lands under the management of the Forest Service. The petition calls upon the Federal Government and the Congress "to take whatever steps are necessary to transfer lands within the Fort Stanton Reservation, excepting 1500 acres for management of Fort Stanton Hospital, to the U. S. Forest Service for management and conservation of the Upper Hondo watershed, and to authorize the Forest Service to transfer grazing rights now held in the Upper Hondo watershed area to the Fort Stanton area."

The draft continued: "Whereas, conservation of the Upper Hondo watershed, of which the Rio Bonito and Eagle Creek are parts, is of the utmost importance not only to ranchers and farmers dependent upon the water supply developed from this region but also to the economy of the whole Pecos River Basin, and whereas at present local people and the Federal Government are expending large sums of money to stabilize and improve the headwaters of the Hondo, including the Rio Bonito and Eagle Creek regions, and

whereas the farmers and ranchers possessing grazing rights in this area are not only willing but urge that their grazing rights be transferred to the Fort Stanton area in the interest of the protection of the Upper Hondo watershed and whereas the numbers of cattle so moved to the Fort Stanton area would not completely utilize the forage, and thus would enable the additional shift of livestock from such areas as the Upper Bonito and Eagle Creek watersheds and whereas the reduction of grazing loads in the areas concerned would enable the use of the Upper Bonito and Eagle Creek for game management,

"Whereas, inasmuch as Fort Stanton is within seven miles of the Capitan District Ranger Headquarters, this watershed area could be managed without additional cost to the government by the Forest Service, and whereas the lands involved in this petition should be so used as to benefit the largest number of people in the upper Bonito water system, and whereas the conversion of the Bonito watershed to municipal and military use in and near Alamogordo will benefit the entire United States and enhance its capacity for national defense, and

Whereas the protection of the Hondo watershed from deterioration and erosion will contribute to maintaining a stable runoff to the Pecos Valley and hence to the protection of that area from flooding, siltation and erosion" . . . The petition concluded by stating that "all the ranchers involved in the aforesaid transfer are willing and able to cooperate with the State College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts in maintaining the necessary livestock on the range for experimental purposes."

STATE PAYS \$750 FOR BURIAL BONES

SANTA FE, Feb. 16 - The state hospital for the insane at Las Vegas has paid a Santa Fe family \$750 to compensate for a hospital error which resulted in the family burying the body of a complete stranger who had been identified by the hospital as a daughter of the family.

The action was taken by the hospital board at a meeting earlier this month in a resolution directing that the sum be turned over to "Pablo Moya, for himself, his family and his attorney, David Chavez Jr."

It directed that the body mistakenly buried be exhumed from the Moya family plot and brought to the hospital cemetery.

The error arose over the identical names of the two patients at the state hospital. The Moya family gathered from as far away as California for the funeral services and it was not until a fortnight later when the father met the girl, he thought he had buried face to face at the state hospital that the error was discovered.

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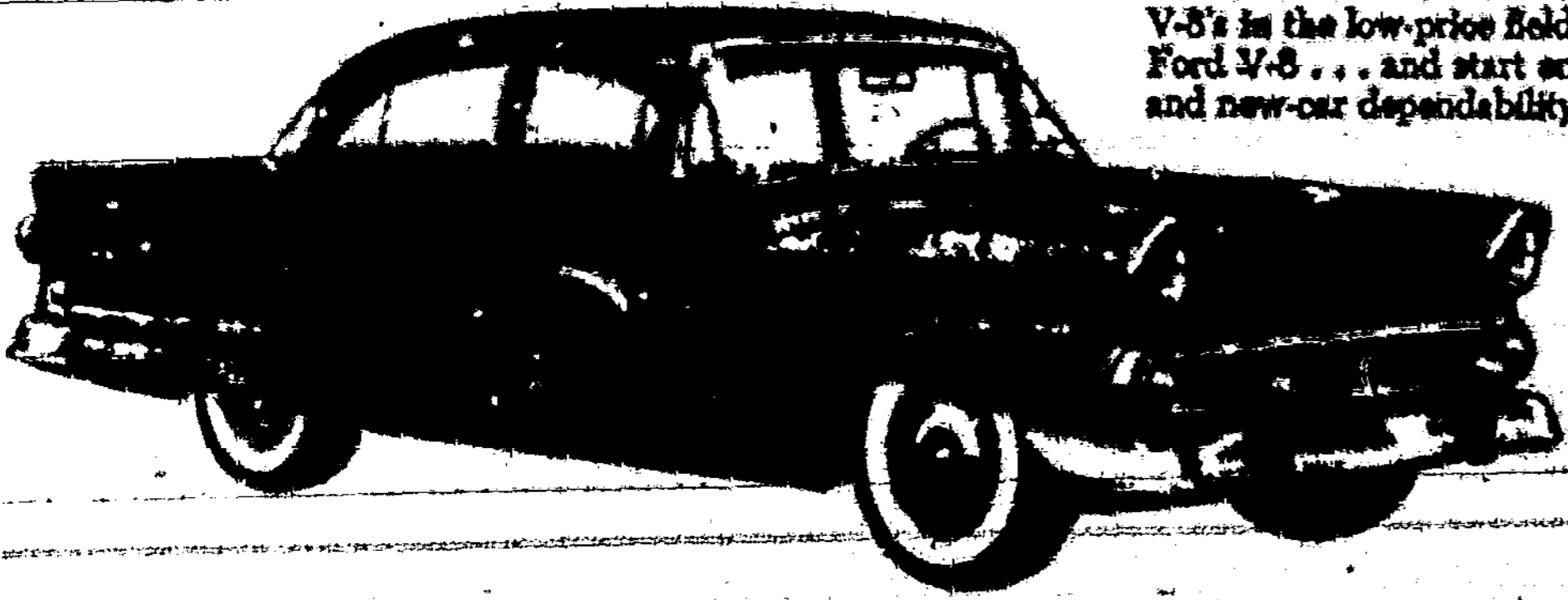

Farmers to Talk At Feeders' Day

Two farmer-stockfeeders, Buford Harris, Las Cruces, and J. C. Moon, Socorro, will explain their livestock feeding setups at New Mexico A & M's 16th Annual Feeders' Day, State College, Feb. 21, J. H. Knox, head of the College's animal husbandry department has announced. Harris will tell Feeders' Day visitors how he fattens stockers with by-products from his farm; Moon will talk on pasture vs. silage. The object of the Annual Feeders' Day is to bring farmers up to date on current feeding and management practices and feeding research.

This year's program will feature reports on feeding gin trash to steers at the Texas Agricultural Substation, Ysleta, by Dr. P. J. Lyerly, superintendent; use

of alfalfa cubes for fattening lambs by F. E. Neale, A&M animal husbandman; and rations for wintering stockers by Knox. Dr. John R. Eyer and Dr. Robert E. Fye of A&M's Experiment Station staff will review the status of the yellow clover aphid on alfalfa; Rex W. Allen, parasitologist with USDA's Agricultural Research Service, will review the results of experimental work on the control of internal parasites of cattle and sheep.

The market outlook for cattle and lambs will be discussed by A. K. Mackey, vice-president of the Oklahoma City National Stockyards, and Fred W. Heep, secretary-treasurer of the National Livestock Commission, Oklahoma City.

A&M's president John W. Branson, will welcome Feeders' Day visitors; Ivan Watson, extension animal husbandman, will be program chairman.

The Feeders' Day program will get underway at 9:30 a.m.

1955 Wool Marketed After April 1 Eligible For Incentive Payments

Wool sheared after January 1, 1955, and sold after April 1, 1955, will be eligible for the new wool incentive payments provided for in the National Wool Act of 1954. Wool producers who shear their sheep between January 1 and April 1 this year and who want their wool to be eligible for incentive payments, should be careful to retain ownership of the wool until after April 1. The wool may be stored in a commercial warehouse or consigned for future sale, but the owner will need to retain title during this period if the wool is to be eligible for payments.

Under the National Wool Act of 1954, the Secretary of Agriculture has announced an incentive price of 62 cents per pound for shorn wool, grease basis, for the 1955 marketing year. Payments will be made to producers if the national average price received by all producers of wool falls below the incentive price.

Each producer should sell his wool for the best possible price, because incentive payments will be calculated as a percentage of the individual producer's net sales proceeds. For example, if the incentive price is 20 per cent above the national average price of wool sold this year, the payment made to each eligible producer will be 20 per cent of his own net sales proceeds for wool. It will not be based on the difference between his own price and the incentive price. In other words, the more a producer gets for his wool, the larger will be his incentive payment.

eradication programs. The emulsifiable concentrates of the BHC and the lindane are not approved for scabies control. All cattle and sheep affected with or exposed to scabies must be dipped under supervision of the Animal Disease Eradication branch of the USDA Agricultural Research Service before being shipped across state lines.

Scabies is caused by mites feeding on or in the skin of an infested animal. The mites are so tiny that they are extremely hard to see with the naked eye. Their feeding irritates the animal's skin, making it itch. An infested animal then rubs against an object or another animal to relieve the itching, and leaves some of the mites. This passes on the disease.

Infested animals go off their feeds, lose weight, and become sluggish. Death may occur unless the right treatment is used. But, both the BHC or the lindane must be applied carefully.

Game Commission Sets Dates for Fishing

U. S. Highway 66 lost its significance for fishermen when the State Game Commission set season dates last week. Previous trout-fishing dates depended on whether you were fishing north or south of Highway 66. This year the dates are May 1-November 30 statewide, except for special waters. Another big change is omission of minimum length limit except for catfish.

There will be no open season on the Santa Fe River and its tributaries, east of Santa Fe city limits. Season remains year round for warm-water fish, except in special waters.

Daily bag and possession were set; trout, black bass and pike perch (walleye) 12; crappie 30; white bass, yellow perch, bullhead, bluegill and other sunfish, no limit; catfish except bullhead, 10, or 25 pounds and 1 fish (which ever is reached first), minimum length 10 inches.
