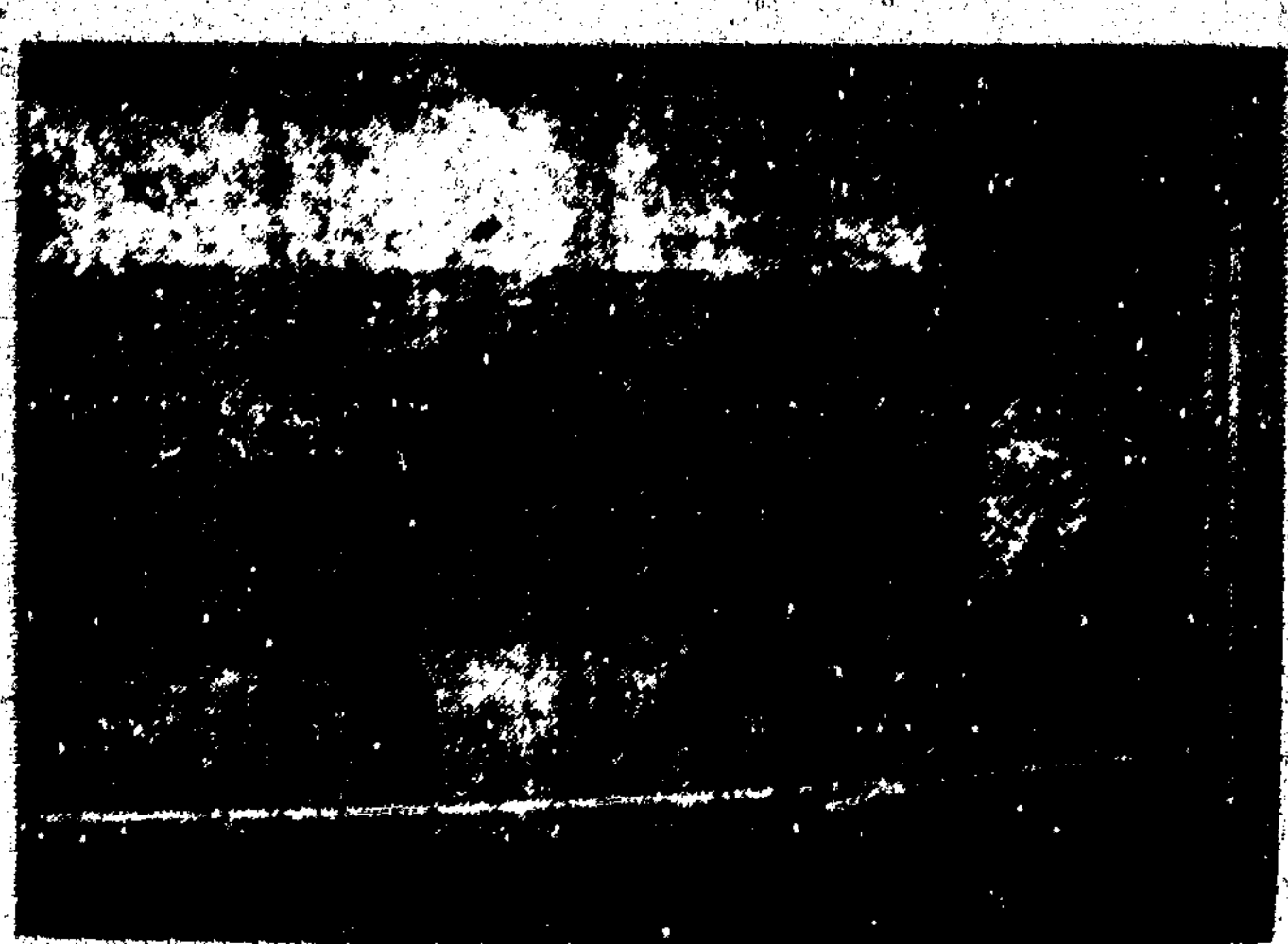

JAL SPRINGS DISTRICT UPSET

District 5B coaches were taking another look at season records of such top seeded teams as Dexter, Hagerman and Captain last Saturday evening at Roswell and wondered what was left out as Jal and Eunice squared off for the 1955 tourney cage title, with the Jal Panthers copying the tourney title, 36-32.

Old Man Upset was a familiar figure at the St. Peter's gym site of the 1955 basketball marathon, as fourth seeded Hagerman felt his touch Friday and were blasted into the consolation bracket by the tourney champ, Jal, 61-55, after previously defeating Jal thrice in regular season play.

Approximately three hours and one-half later another top seeded five, Captain, who had been hand-picked to at least reach the finals by all the so-called experts, felt the effects of the tourney fine and were outclassed, out-fought, and a six-foot, five, center named Earl Allison, did the remaining damage as Coach Ralph McGuff's Ruidoso Warriors turned in a scolding party on Coach Duane Darling's five, to the tune of 48-33.

ZOZO SCORES EUNICE
A few minutes later, some 300 fans from Eunice, New Mexico, thought perhaps Old Man Upset

never did take a vacation from the lair of St. Peter's gym, when the Carrizozo Grizzlies, led by a six-foot, one-inch lad, Skipper Harkey, who did everything with the basketball but make it talk, gave Eunice a 10-2 beating during the first quarter of play, but relinquished their lead only after the Cardinals had re-supplied their point-getting total from the charity stripe.

Coach Ken Willis' live threw up an effective zone defense against the Eunice Cardinals which limited the ball-hawking outside lads to four field goals during the first half of play.

The game Grizzly crew fell to a 20-29 disadvantage midway in the third period when Ronald Darnell split the meshes with three consecutive one-handers from the side, but Skipper Harkey, Robert Vega and company went to work on a full-court press and climbed to a 33-31 lead midway in the last stanza. Charly tosses, buckets by Tom Hiser and Ray Wallach placed the Cardinals in front by five points, a lead which was cut to three counters, but never relinquished.

Eunice went on to dispose of upset-minded Ruidoso, 30-22, on Saturday morning, flogging Earl Allison to 9 points and forcing the Ruidoso five to play Henry Tib's infamous type of basketball, "Wellshoot when we get darned good and ready."

JAL JOLTS DEXTER
The Jal Panthers, not to let Old Man Upset sit idly by, asked for his aid and received it, when they edged past the top-seeded Dexter Demons, 49-41, in the other semi-final battle. Dexter had previously been undefeated in district tourney, but received a warning early in the tourney that things might not go according to form, when Hondo, truly a tourney dardhorse, made Coach George Lewis' crew pull out all the stops to win, 65-52.

It was just too much Sunday Bealrd and Claude Davis, as the Jal Panthers played havoc with the Eunice stall tactics, and copied the tourney title, 36-32.

In early tourney games, the Carrizozo-Grizzlies had too much scoring punch for the eventual consolation winner, St. Peters, ousting the host school from championship competition, 47 to 42. Skipper Harkey was again the mainstay for the Grizzlies, tossing in 18 counters, while Billy Hicks was contributing 12 to the Carrizozo cause.

ST. PETERS WINS TROPHY
The upsets were not confined to the championship bracket alone, as St. Peters took the measure of Hagerman, who had been ranked in the number four spot in the tourney, in the consolation finals, 73-66. This was

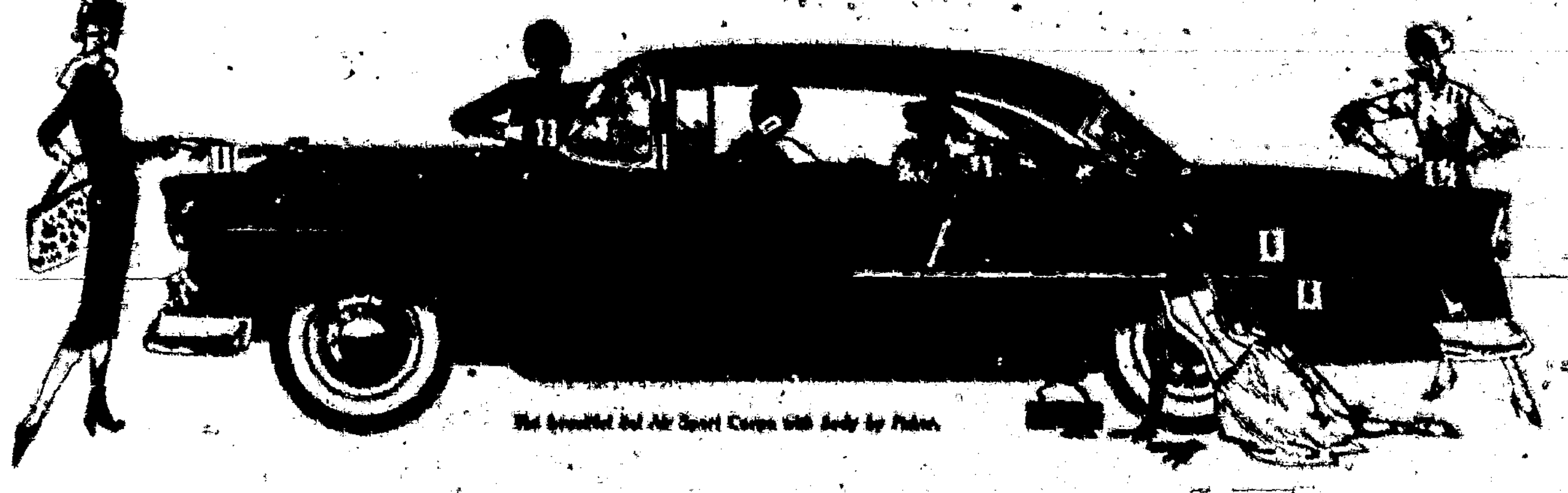

**SP to Run Pipelines
Info Southwest**

Southern Pacific Company is going into the pipe line business for the transportation of refined petroleum products. President D. J. Russell announced recently. This, he said, is in keeping with Southern Pacific's aim to furnish a complete land transportation service to shippers—by rail, truck or pipe line. Plans call for formation of a new company, to be known probably as Southern Pacific Pipe Lines, Inc. Intention is to construct pipe lines from Los Angeles refinery area to Phoenix and Tucson, and from the El Paso refineries to Tucson and Phoenix, Russell explained. Total investment in line, stations and terminal facilities is estimated at \$30,000,000. Products to be handled will consist of regular, premium and aviation gasoline, diesel oil and jet fuel. In announcing the pipeline construction, Russell pointed out that Southern Pacific has the great inherent advantage of its own private right of way, and will be in a position to serve all companies distributing petroleum products in that part of Arizona contiguous to Southern Pacific rail lines. Movement of petroleum products between Los Angeles and Arizona points, on the one hand, and between El Paso and Arizona, on the other, has reached a point where construction of pipe lines is inevitable, the Southern Pacific president declared. There are presently no refineries in Arizona, this area being supplied from refineries in

the Los Angeles basin and at El Paso. It is one of the fastest-growing consuming areas in the entire fast-growing territory that is served by Southern Pacific. The proposed pipe line will generally follow the railroad right of way from Watson (Los Angeles) to Phoenix and Tucson, serving the important intermediate areas of Colton, the Imperial Valley and Yuma. The route to be followed between Tucson and El Paso is the shortest practical one, using the railroad right of way where it is economical to do so. The pipe will be of 16-inch diameter from the Watson refining area to Colton; 12-inch from Colton to Phoenix; and 8-inch to 10-inch from Phoenix to the El Paso refineries, it was disclosed. The line is designed so that its initial capacity could be increased by 50 per cent. "Southern Pacific is convinced by its own studies, and by a market survey made for it by the Stanford Research Institute, that the pipe line project is a very desirable expansion and diversification of the railroad's interest and activities," President Russell declared. "It will enable us to get maximum use out of our private right of way, in line with continuing studies to increase utilization and financial return from such properties." "By addition of pipe line facilities to our rail and truck operations," he continued, "we will be able to offer the petroleum industry the service it desires in order to meet its various land transportation requirements. This situation, we believe, will be very desirable from the oil companies' standpoint."
