RAMBLIN' AROUND

A success story, being written in shining letters, hastened to its final chapter in Carrizozo this week with the tragic death of James Earl Harcrow, Lincoln County Clerk. The fact that he was elected county clerk when only 24 years of age, is an index of his ability, but it does not tell all the story. His pleasing personality, administrative ability and civic mindedness are other chapters in his book of life that was all too short. Surely Earl Harcrow's star would have continued to rise had he been spared, Lincoln County can be proud and grateful to have had one of its own sons serve it so well.

County and city officials this week expressed sentiments that will find an echo among all who knew Earl. Said one of his closest friends, County Treasurer S. E. Grelsen: "He was one of the most capable young men of this state. His untimely death is certainly a great loss to the community."

Sheriff Glen Bradley — "Earl Harcrow will indeed be greatly missed by all who knew him and all who simply knew he was the County Clerk. Everyone within the Court House will greatly miss him. His death was not only a great shock, but an even greater loss."

Lloyd Vigil, County Assessor — "I feel a great personal loss. Earl was a very good friend and a most efficient co-worker, and his smiling face will be greatly missed in the Court House. He was a man of great ability and his death means a great loss to Lincoln County."

Mayor Marvin H. Roberts — "In losing Earl we lost one of the most promising young men the County has ever had. He was a brilliant young man with a promising future. I join with all his many friends in mourning his passing."

Other sentiments expressed by those who knew him well were: "Earl Harcrow was one of the most progressive young men of today. He will be missed by those in the country as well as by those in town." "Earl was one of the most civic-minded men of this community. Everyone will miss him in more ways than one." "This was one of the most promising of careers. He was indeed an outstanding young man. His death is a great loss to all."

County Commissioner Charles A. Jones had a difficult announcement to make last Monday. He was presiding over a meeting of the road planning committee when word came to him that Earl Harcrow had just died in the Carrizozo Hospital. A hush fell over the group when they were told the sad news. The meeting finally got under way again, after a minute of silent tribute. Among numerous other community organizations, Mr. Harcrow was also a delegate to the road planning committee.

Among the most shocked to learn of the death of Lincoln County's clerk were the Board of County Commissioners. As clerk of the board, Mr. Harcrow had been a close co-worker for the past two years. Commissioners George Fuchs and Alfonso Soto were in attendance at the road planning committee, along with Commissioner Jones. Mr. Fuchs, who with Mrs. Fuchs, had planned to leave Thursday for a three weeks' trip to New York City, postponed their departure.

HUNDREDS PAY LAST RESPECTS TO J. EARL HARCROW

A throng estimated at well over five hundred mourners gathered Wednesday afternoon at the Capitan High School auditorium to pay their respects to James Earl Harcrow, Lincoln County Clerk, who died in Carrizozo Hospital Monday morning. Seldom has the county been stirred to such depths as in the passing of this young man, who at the age of 26, had won high regard in county and community affairs.

Mr. Harcrow underwent an operation Saturday morning for the removal of a gall bladder. He apparently was making a successful recovery when complications set in Sunday and his death occurred at 9:30 Monday morning.

The Rev. William B. Holmes, pastor of the First Presbyterian Church of Ruidoso, officiated at Wednesday's services. A close friend of Mr. Harcrow, Rev. Holmes recalled in his brief eulogy, conversations they had had through the years. Rev. J. H. Kerr read a passage from the Scripture. Musical tributes included "The Lord's Prayer" by a Capitan High School choral group and two solos "The Old Rugged Cross" and "In The Garden," by Mrs. Leota Flanagan. Mrs. Fletcher Hall accompanying on the piano.

Burial was in the Angus Community cemetery, with the Carrizozo Lodge L. O. O. F. in charge. Arrangements were by the Shaw Mortuary.

Pallbearers were Virgil Hall, Fletcher Hall, S. H. Fuchs, J. O. Payne, Mack Taylor Jr., and Ray Province. Honorary pallbearers were Lloyd Vigil, Glen Bradley, Albert Richardson, A. T. Roberts and Frank C. Boyce.

Surviving Mr. Harcrow are his widow, Nettie Harcrow and infant son, Edward Earl; his father, Alvin S. Harcrow of Roswell; two brothers, Alvin S. Harcrow Jr., of Roswell and Donald E. Harcrow of Capitan; a sister, Mrs. Allene Clees of Artesia and his grandmother, Mrs. Hattie O. Harcrow of Capitan.

BORN IN ROSWELL
James Earl Harcrow was born in Roswell March 13, 1928, but most of his life was spent in Capitan, where he attended school. Following his graduation from high school he served two years as a pharmacist's mate in the U. S. Navy, 18 months of which time was spent as assistant to the personnel officer at the Naval Hospital in Corpus Christi.

At the conclusion of his naval tour of duty, he enrolled at Highlands University, Las Vegas, N. M., where he majored in business administration. Following his graduation he was employed on the clerical staff of the U. S. Public Health Service Hospital at Fort Stanton, where for two years he was in charge of budget accounting and auditing vouchers.

He was police judge in Capitan; also justice of the peace there, achieving the distinction of being the youngest justice of the peace ever to have served in the State of New Mexico. He resigned this position early in 1952 to become deputy clerk of Lincoln County. That fall he was elected to the office of county clerk, and was re-elected to the same office in 1954.

On July 19, 1952, he was married to Miss Nettie McInnis and the couple made their home in Capitan. A son, Edward Earl, was born March 4, 1954. One of the youngest officials ever to hold office in Lincoln County, Mr. Harcrow's energy and talents were directed along many lines. In college he was a member of Mu Chapter of Kappa Sigma Kappa national fraternity. He was a past noble grand of Carrizozo L. O. O. F. Lodge, past president of the New Mexico County Officers Association.

Shell in Tobacco Rough on Daddy

Darden T. Grimes of the El Paso Natural Gas Compressor Station suffered an unusual accident last week.

His baby girl had gotten into some 22 shells, and while playing, put one in his tobacco. The shell exploded in Mr. Grimes' pipe while his thumb was over it. His hand was burned and bruised.

CARRIZOZO ASKS FOR BIDS ON REVENUE BONDS

A comprehensive report on Carrizozo's municipal light and power and water distribution was submitted to the Town Trustees last Thursday.

The result of months of study, the report was prepared by the engineering firm of W. T. Turney and Associates. It was prepared in two parts—one dealing with the production and distribution of electrical power and the other an analysis of the water works system—improvements, costs, expenses, revenues, rates, and outstanding obligations. In both surveys conclusions and recommendations were made.

Carrizozo's new water well including pump, pipeline and storage facilities, will probably be in operation within 60 days and Mr. Turney recommended that the following rates for water be put into effect at that time:

Carrizozo's water users are at the present time paying one of the highest rates charged in the state for domestic water. The new rates, if adopted, would put Carrizozo closer to the middle bracket as regards rates among communities in the State. Water here would cost consumers less than in Santa Fe, Tucuman and Capitan. It would be somewhat more than is charged for in Las Cruces, Alamogordo and Helen.

In his recommendations on Carrizozo's municipal water distribution system, Mr. Turney stated that funds are needed in the immediate future in the amount of \$40,000 to meet existing debts and planned improvements.

"Conservative estimates of income and all debt services," his report read, "indicate that a total Revenue Bond Issue at this time in the amount of \$85,000.00 could be issued with a coverage of 1.67 to 1. At this time only \$40,000 are to be issued and the balance is to be available upon request."

Following a discussion of this recommendation, the Trustees authorized City Attorney Frank Boyce to draw up a proposal for a revenue bond ordinance. (Next week — Engineer Turney's report on the Carrizozo Municipal light and power distribution.)

SET UP PLANS TO MAKE USE OF POLIO VACCINE

The State Health Department through its District Health Officer, Dr. James R. Scott of Las Cruces, and County Nurse Mrs. Lela Brewster has started the necessary organizational work in Lincoln County for the vaccination for Polio of all first and second grade pupils whose parents request it.

Two meetings have been held in the County, one in Carrizozo February 28 and one in Ruidoso March 7. Others will be held in order to acquaint parents throughout the County with the proposed program.

The Health Department has sent out letters of explanation to parents and interested persons, and others will follow later.

The vaccine has not yet been licensed, but we must be ready when and if it is. We hope the "go ahead" will be on hand so the program can start in Lincoln County April 11.

Mrs. J. P. Turner was elected general chairman for the County with Mrs. William MacVeigh vice-chairman. The personnel of our schools as usual is doing a great deal to help the program. All clinics for vaccination will be held at schools.

Beta Sigma Phi Sorority of Ruidoso volunteered to help with the program there. The leaders are Mrs. Leon Farrar, Mrs. Vic Lamb, Mrs. Weldon Garner and Mrs. Dan Swearingen. Volunteers will keep the necessary records and help doctors and nurses in any way they are asked.

At the March 14 PTA meeting in Carrizozo there will be a one on hand to tell parents more about this program and try and answer any questions.

Something New Added At Farm Bureau Supper

Name Herbert Brunell New "54" President

Herbert Brunell of Alamogordo was elected president of the New Mexico Highway Association at the annual meeting held Monday in Alamogordo.

Vice presidents were elected to serve for the towns along Highway 54. Among these were Roy Shafer of Carrizozo, Mayor Cleve Brown for Corona, Johnson Stearns for Vaughn and Lon French for Carrizozo.

A resolution was adopted asking the State Highway Association to erect more prominent Highway 54 markers at the intersection with 70 in Tularosa and with 66 at Santa Rosa.

Other matters discussed were the consolidation of the U. S. Highway 54 and Mexico's Highway 45, which join in El Paso; also the matter of U. S. Highway 54 not being included in the national trans-state highway development program.

Attending from Carrizozo were Vernon Petty and L. Z. Manire, past president and past secretary, respectively, of the State 54 Association, and Roy Shafer.

First Aid Course at Hondo High School

A new class in first aid sponsored by the Lincoln County Red Cross Chapter, will be taught at Hondo by Dr. Peter J. Starr of Riverside, New Mexico.

The first class will be held on Thursday, March 17, at 7:30 p.m. and will meet at the Hondo grade school. Thereafter, the group will meet each Thursday evening at Hondo High School.

This will be the third first aid class sponsored by the Red Cross in Lincoln County during the past year. Two other classes, both taught by Dr. Ram Branderstock in Ruidoso, graduated 35 persons in standard first aid. Of this number five persons received college credits for a course at Texas Western College.

Girl and Boy Scouts number in eight were also graduated in the course as were four Scout leaders.

The new course at Hondo is open to anyone who is interested in taking it.

Specialists to Talk At Irrigation Meeting

Many specialists in the field of farm irrigation — both equipment and technique — will speak at the Irrigation Day program Friday, March 11, at Tularosa. It is sponsored by the Otero County Electric Cooperative, Inc.

Theme of the meeting is "The need for a sound maintenance program and service program for irrigation pumping equipment. At 9:50 in the morning, Walter Ray, mayor of Tularosa, will give an address of welcome. On the day's agenda are topics such as maintenance of pumps and switching equipment, pumping plant wiring, irrigation pump design and efficiency tests and a question and answer period. The latter will be in charge of Walter Wade, Otero county agent.

COUNTY WELL REPRESENTED AT ROAD MEETING

Delegates to the Lincoln County Road Planning Committee met Monday at the Courthouse in Carrizozo to elect officers for the coming year and to discuss road problems in the county.

Charles A. Jones was re-elected chairman of the committee by acclamation, as was Archie Perkins of Corona for the position of vice chairman. Mrs. Marie Walker was appointed secretary.

A number of road matters were discussed under the heading of new business, among them black-topping the new Arabela road and redesignating Highway 42 east-out-of-Corona as No. 1-priority-for-development.

Following a discussion, it was moved by Mr. Perkins that any surplus left over from previous allotments be used on State Road 42 as a No. 1 priority. This resolution was adopted by a close vote of 5 for and 4 against. It was decided to give the resolution further study at a later meeting of the committee.

Delegate Guy Dabney brought up the question of how roads are to be built and how they are to be finished. "The Tinnie-Arabela road has good drainage and a good grade," he said, "but loose gravel on this road is becoming a problem. Are these roads to be black-topped?"

State Highway Engineer Carlson, who attended the meeting, along with District Engineer Bird, stated that black-topping the Tinnie-Arabela road was not in the original planning and that it might be difficult to accomplish now.

Regarding Highway 42, Mr. Perkins stated that the replacement of a bridge three miles east of Corona was urgently needed.

A committee was appointed to study revision of the committee's by-laws. Named on the committee were Guy Dabney, Archie Perkins and George W. Shanks.

A resolution presented by Guy Dabney was adopted by voice vote. It follows:

Whereas, the priorities set up by this committee for the improvement of Federal Aid Secondary roads were based on farm-to-market tonnage, and Whereas the original reports made by B. A. Luck and Guy Dabney show the tonnage on the Angus-Ruidoso area to be 630 tons and the tonnage on the Nogal-Angus area to be 776 tons, and

Whereas a mistake was made in placing the Angus-Ruidoso area ahead of the Nogal-Angus area as shown by tonnage reports,

Therefore, be it resolved by this committee that dating from today, the Nogal-Angus area be placed as priority No. 3 and the Angus-Ruidoso area be placed as priority No. 4 in our future road building program and that the Commissioners court, State Highway Commission, and the Federal Bureau of Roads be advised of this action.

Bite by Skunk Causes Death in California

A human death due to rabies was reported recently by the California Department of Public Health. The victim, who was on a hunting trip, was bitten twice by a skunk in two attacks while sleeping.

The skunk returned the next morning and was killed by the patient's husband. Nine doses of antirabies vaccine were given, but this treatment was not started until one month after the incident. The patient's illness was characterized by difficulty in swallowing, photophobia, generalized weakness, salivation and apprehension.

Rabies virus was isolated in mice inoculated with the patient's brain tissue. Inoculation into animals with the skunk's brain produced inclusion bodies typical of rabies.

Brucellosis-Free Area Is Lincoln County Aim

Dr. Bob Bond will be in charge of the Brucellosis eradication program in Lincoln county during the coming year. An effort will be made to test all dairy and registered cattle, plus at least 20% of all range cattle. The final aim of this program is to have this area accredited as a Brucellosis-free area. As another precaution, calfhood vaccination is being carried out in many herds at 6 to 12 months of age.

Sheep Shearing Starts On County Ranches

Sheep shearing has started for 1955. The Sutherland, Coates, and Skeen ranches are through shearing, with George Clements, Lee Corn, Sil Johnson just about through. At the Coates and Skeen ranches, several good fleeces for the coming year were selected.

Ivan Watson helped Joe Skeen select 56 ewes for registry with the Debouillet Association. To register, the ewe must have at least 3 inches of fine wool with a 6 lb. clean wool weight, and must be a good size or about 120 lbs. or over in range condition.

Fertilizing Grain Crops Means Increased Yields

Nitrogen and phosphorus fertilizers will increase grain yields on land that has not been in alfalfa or which has not had a green manure crop on it in the last few years. Much land in the cotton-growing areas of the

state has not had a soil-building crop on it for a long time. Some of this land is now in winter barley, and more will be seeded to barley and other grains this year.

Although cotton on this land may have been well fertilized, the fertility of the land will be low, especially in nitrogen. There will be a carry-over effect of phosphorus, but not enough for high yields.

Good response from 60 pounds of available nitrogen and 40 pounds of available phosphorus may be expected. If barley was fertilized when planted last fall, it won't need additional fertilizer this spring, unless it is being grazed. As soon as livestock are removed in the spring, an additional 35 pounds of nitrogen should be applied. Grain planted this spring should be fertilized with 60 pounds of nitrogen and 40 pounds of phosphorus at time of seeding. On land which is low in fertility, the rate should be increased to 80 pounds of nitrogen and 45 pounds of phosphorus.

At present fertilizer prices, an increase of nine bushels of barley per acre will pay a 60-40 rate of application. The increase may be great enough to realize a \$2 or \$3 return for each dollar invested in the fertilizer.

Get Things Ready For Sheep-Shearing

It's time to get ready for sheep shearing. Remember last year how you promised to fix that broken panel, or that hole in the shearing floor to avoid breaking a sheep's leg? Does the wool packing stand need strengthening, or nails removed that have been tearing the wool bags? Do it now, and avoid a

Losses that could have been prevented. There are many little ways to increase the efficiency of the shearing crew and helpers.

This year, all wools will compete on the open market under the new wool act and the incentive payment is based upon the woolgrower's net return. To realize the highest possible returns, the woolgrower is advised to prepare his wool for market in the best possible manner.

You need to furnish a good shearing platform with a trip board to keep from dragging on dirt and to aid the shearer in throwing the sheep. Furnish a "sweeper" to keep the floor clean, and to see that tags are taken up with the fleece. Tags should be bagged separately. Have good quality paper twine for tying the fleeces. Bag staple wool separately from clothing wools, and fine wool from coarser grades. Keep the clip in identifying lots.

If you have black-faced sheep or any black sheep, shear them last, or clean the shearing floor of loose black fibers.

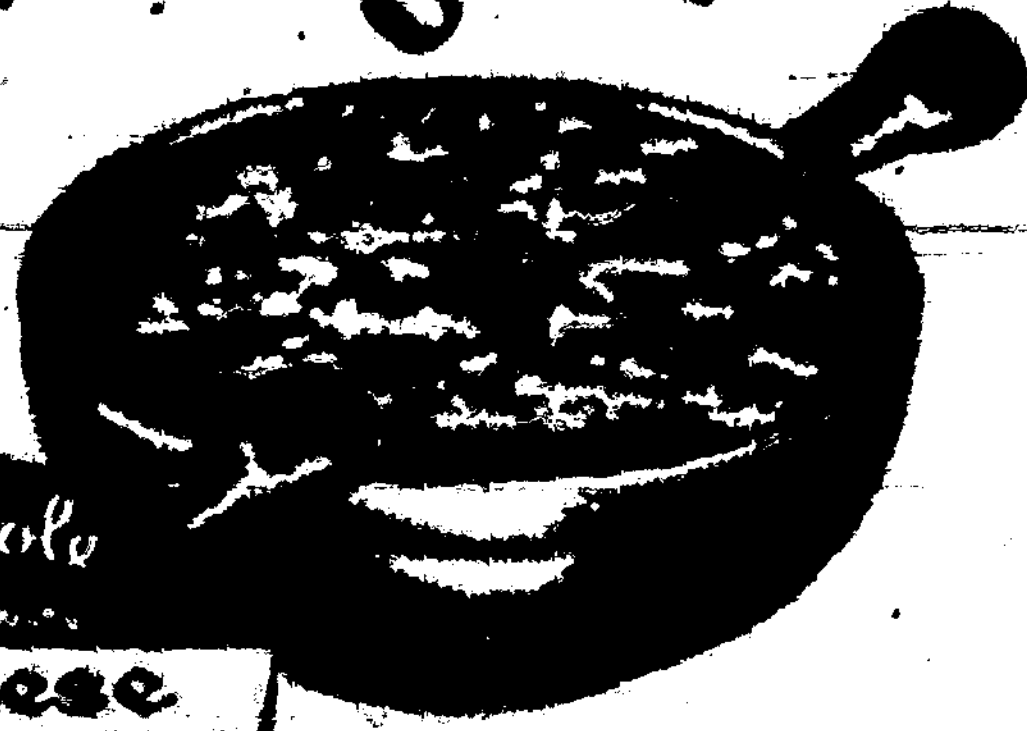

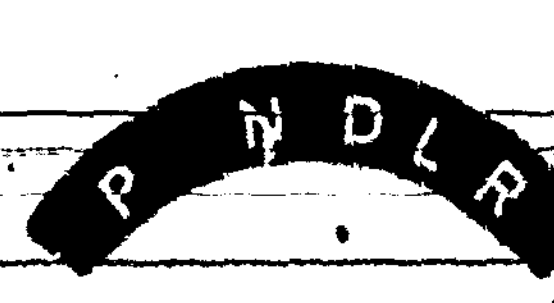

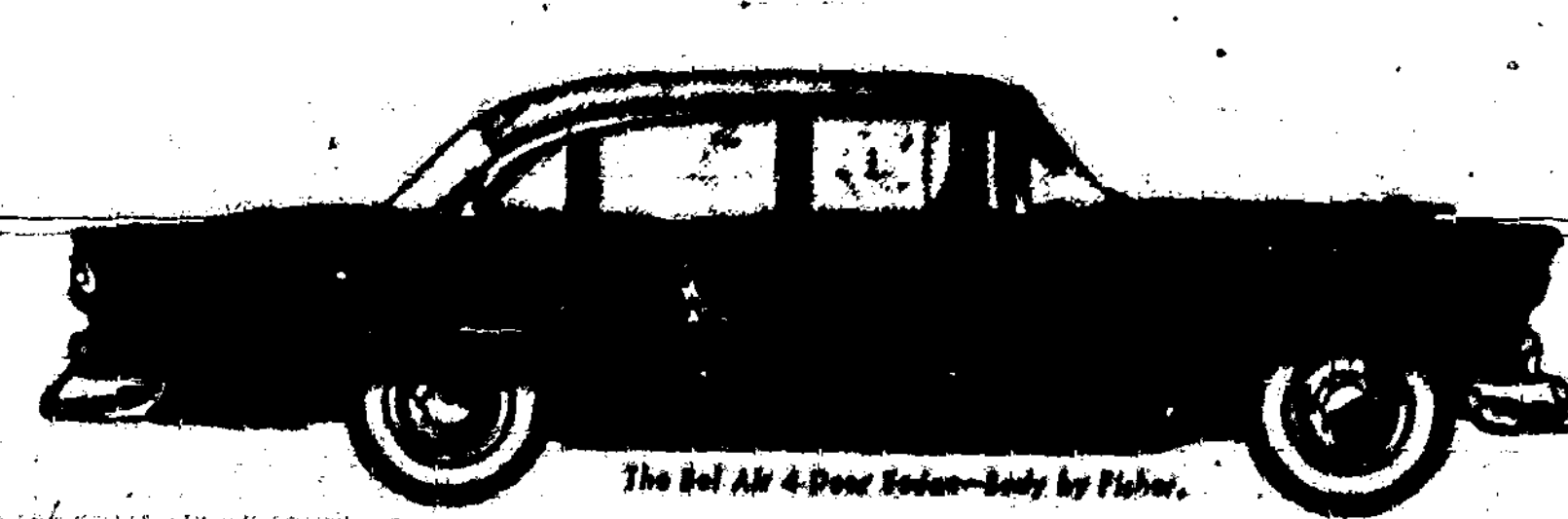

BY A DAM SITE

It was a happy occasion last Saturday when over 200 residents of Clayton and nearby areas gathered together with Game Department personnel for ground-breaking ceremony on Clayton Lake dam site. Adolph Kraebie was master of ceremonies. Clayton's Mayor McDade, Union County Commissioners, and State Senator W. C. Wheatley and others spoke briefly. The Clayton Chamber of Commerce served coffee and doughnuts, and in spite of inclement weather the response to the gala event was excellent.

The lake, a project of the New Mexico Department of Game and Fish, will cost nearly a quarter of a million dollars. When completed, it will be the largest impoundment of water in the State to be devoted exclusively to fishing and to water-fowl restoration. It will have 175 surface acres, with a maximum depth of 70 feet, and will be backed up by a dam 950 feet long, 88 feet high, with a crest width of 21 feet and a base

450 feet wide (equivalent to a city block and a half).

Capt. Robert L. Hogan Is Guest Speaker at Lions' Club Dinner

BARBERS CONQUER COURTS AND LAW

SANTA FE, March 9—Barbers, long the darlings of the legislature, have racked up another victory that promises to outshine anything achieved in the present session by any other group—even the truckers.

The tontorialists defeated the board of finance, and the supreme court of New Mexico in pushing through a bill to justify overruling of their budget during the past year and a half.

Rep. Virgil McCollum, chairman of the house appropriation committee was at a point of resigning his post in the fight over the bill, a dozen of the more respected members of the house warned that the measure to give the barbers \$6500 which they defiantly overrode challenged the whole structure of state money but when the roll was called only 17 voted against the senate-approved measure and 35 supported it.

HAIR CUTTERS DEFTY EVERYBODY

The last legislature set the barber board budget at a lower figure than the board had been spending in the past. The state board of finance refused a request to increase the amount. The barbers went to court for more money and the state supreme court held they must abide by the budget set up by the legislature and the board of finance.

After all that they went out and spent the unauthorized money anyway and the 1955 legislature has approved.

The barbers' defense of having levied overspent was that they had to have the money to perform the functions of the board, but here's how the money went:

The legislature of 1953 reduced the pay of the part-time secretary of the board, Bernabe Romero of Santa Fe, from \$300 a month to \$100. Romero got the \$300 anyway by the device of claiming that he devoted 20 days of every month to special work for the board at the \$10-a-day rate set up for members on inspection work. Romero got pay for the 20 days work every month although he worked every

day but Sundays running his barber shop in the De Vargas hotel in Santa Fe.

Fifty a month went for rent of the "barber board office," a six-by-ten enclosure at the rear of Romero's barber shop. The board paid \$17.50 a month for a telephone which is listed in the Santa Fe telephone directory as the De Vargas Barber Shop.

The board paid Bryan L. Prater of Albuquerque \$1300 during the last business year, and member R. J. Carter of Artesia and Farmington \$580 for board work but inspections were made in only 13 of the 32 counties and only one examination was held for applicants for licenses.

SET OWN PRICES WITH FORCE OF LAW

New Mexico barbers already enjoy a legal status more privileged than that of any other service group or profession. A 1937 law empowers the barbers of each judicial district to determine the minimum prices for all barber services in the district and any who charges less is in violation of the law.

The statute goes on to provide that if the state board thinks the prices set by the local barbers are too low it has the authority to raise the prices and woe unto the barber who charges less. The board, incidentally, does not have the authority to reduce established prices which it may find too high.

Thus, with the power to determine prices that the public must pay for, their work and the newly won authority to flaunt the legislature, the governor and the supreme court, the barbers have become the elite of New Mexico citizenry, and perhaps you should start thinking about sending your boy to barber college.

LEGISLATURE IN SHORT TAKES

Legislators just couldn't stand it the other day when Sen. Bob Palmer ridiculed and defeated a proposal to provide all legislators with four-flushing auto license plates and next day called back the bill and approved it. Legislature license and National Association of Sheriff's insignia carried by non-sheriffs are obviously bids for special privileges. . . . Jack Richardson, already a senator from Dona Ana and a member of the board of regents of the state agriculture college was almost burdened with the job of Dona Ana Democratic chairman last week. They had him elected and practically installed before Richardson got wind of it and begged off. . . . The legislature has heard that Grants in western Valencia county may enjoy a new and bigger uranium boom. Committees studying proposed regulation of state leases were told that Sabre Uranium Corp. had located an important body of ore on state land near Grants that runs as high as one per cent uranium, far above the minimum commercial content. . . .
