In the light of recent events the building committee for Carrizozo's municipal swimming pool made a wise decision last fall to postpone construction until spring.

Marvin H. Roberts, mayor of Carrizozo, informed the News this week that it is the hope of the town officials to have the municipal swimming pool in operation by early summer.

Carrizozo is planning to use the proceeds from the State-collected tax on cigarettes to finance the pool's construction and Engineer W. F. Turney has been asked to draw up contract documents to submit for bids on the pool; also estimated cost.

Mr. Turney's office prepared last fall blue prints and specifications for the pool, on which a partial start has already been made.

From donations made last summer, approximately \$2,000 has been spent for lumber, cement, sand and gravel and other material. When the building committee decided last fall to postpone the pool's construction until this Spring, most of the cement was returned to the Big Jo Lumber Company for full credit.

Printed in an adjoining column is news of a protest filed with the State Engineer over the proposed transfer of the Bonito system to Alamogordo.

AWARD BID ON REVENUE BONDS

At a special meeting Tuesday of the Carrizozo town board of trustees the lowest of four bids was accepted for a \$40,000 issue of municipal water revenue bonds.

Authorization was given the firm of Lucas, Elsen & Waackler of Kansas City to issue the bonds which are to be paid for over a period of 20 years. The average interest rate on the bonds is 3.888%.

The successful bidder is represented in New Mexico by W. Quinn & Co., of Albuquerque. Others submitting bids were the firms of Robt. E. Schwere Co. of Omaha; Columbia Securities of San Antonio, Texas; and Woodward & Zuber of Phoenix.

All members of the board of trustees, also Mayor Marvin H. Roberts, Attorney Frank C. Boyce and Town Clerk Ruth S. Ricker were present when the bids were opened. Acting in an advisory capacity were Engineer W. F. Turney and Sen. J. G. Moore, former clerk of Lincoln County.

WELL TO BE IN OPERATION IN ABOUT THIRTY DAYS

Reporting to the trustees on the progress of the water well project, Engineer Turney said that the storage tank adjacent to the well was finished except for testing, painting and sterilizing. Both tank and new pump are to be tested in about three weeks and Mr. Turney said it was probable that all would be ready for operation in thirty days.

TOWN TO CONTINUE TO GENERATE OWN POWER

Mr. Turney, who has concluded a study of Carrizozo's power costs and rate structure, said the town could generate its own electricity cheaper than it could buy from the REA.

BIDS OPENED FOR NEW FIRE TRUCK

With Fire Chief Fay Harkey present at Tuesday's meeting to read the bids, proposals were read from seven firms to sell Carrizozo a new fire truck. The bids ranged in price from \$12,500 to \$14,995. Awarding of the bid will not be made until a further study is made of the bids and type of equipment offered.

This is the largest number of teams ever entered in the relays. Old timers will be recognized in the afternoon and there will be a program of speaking and music. Also on the program are dances by the Mescalero Apache Indians.

The Alamogordo C. of C. will furnish free coffee.

FILE PROTEST IN BONITO TRANSFER

Alamogordo, April 6 (From the Alamogordo Daily News) — Alamogordo city officials disclosed today that a protest to the transfer of Bonito waters to Alamogordo and Holloman has been filed with the state engineer.

The protest was filed by George Shipley, Alamogordo attorney, on behalf of three residents of Carrizozo. Mr. Shipley subsequently has left for a European trip.

Although admittedly surprised by the turn of events, Mayor John Rolland declared today: "We'll fight this thing to the very limit of our power."

The objection raised in the protest lodged with the engineer last week contends that the Bonito waters were transferred to the Southern Pacific railroad for municipal purposes at points along the road including Carrizozo, where the three persons named as principals to the protest reside.

Originators of the protest action were named as Grace M. Jones, Carrizozo abstractor; J. H. Fulmer, Jr., and Leandro Vega, merchant.

City officials were meeting here this afternoon with Daniel Brenton, Carrizozo attorney who has represented the city of Alamogordo in proceedings leading to the transfer of the Bonito water rights to Alamogordo and Holloman Air Force Base, to study the new protest and to plan the city's fight against the move to block acquisition of the waters.

Spokesman for the city pointed out today that the city filed its application for transfer of the waters in October, 1954, with the United States on behalf of Holloman.

"The time in which objections should have been lodged, according to regulations of the state engineer, expired Dec. 9, 1954," the spokesman continued. "One protest was filed from the Pecos Valley Conservancy District of Roswell, which the city has moved to dismiss on the grounds that the Pecos Valley district has no powers over the waters 90 miles removed from their area."

"The only explanation readily available for the long delay in the filing of the present protest is that the protestants must feel the city and Holloman will be successful in their petition to dismiss the objection of the Roswell group, and wish to have their objection on record to delay granting of the application for transfer of the Bonito water right to us," the city spokesman added.

Prospects For Apple Crop Appear Good

After a survey of several different parts of the Hondo Valley, the prospects for an apple crop seem good. Although from one to four of the blossoms are dead in the cluster of five or six, the remaining blossom, if fertilized, will provide a good crop. County Extension Agent Ralph Dunlap said this week. The use of bees in the orchard will help insure a full set of the remaining blossoms, he suggests.

Mr. Dunlap said that, on the average, the development of the apple blossoms are at least a week behind 1954, and two of three weeks behind 1953. The full blossom was noted last year about April 12, and March 23 in 1953.

Unless more freeze occurs later, there is a good chance of a full apple crop and a fair peach crop. At the fruit growers' meeting Monday night, Clyde Keaton compared figures on apple prices throughout New Mexico. The apples in Lincoln County averaged \$2.14, whereas other areas averaged \$1.28; and the apples packed through the shed averaged \$2.84, including the culls sold through the shed.

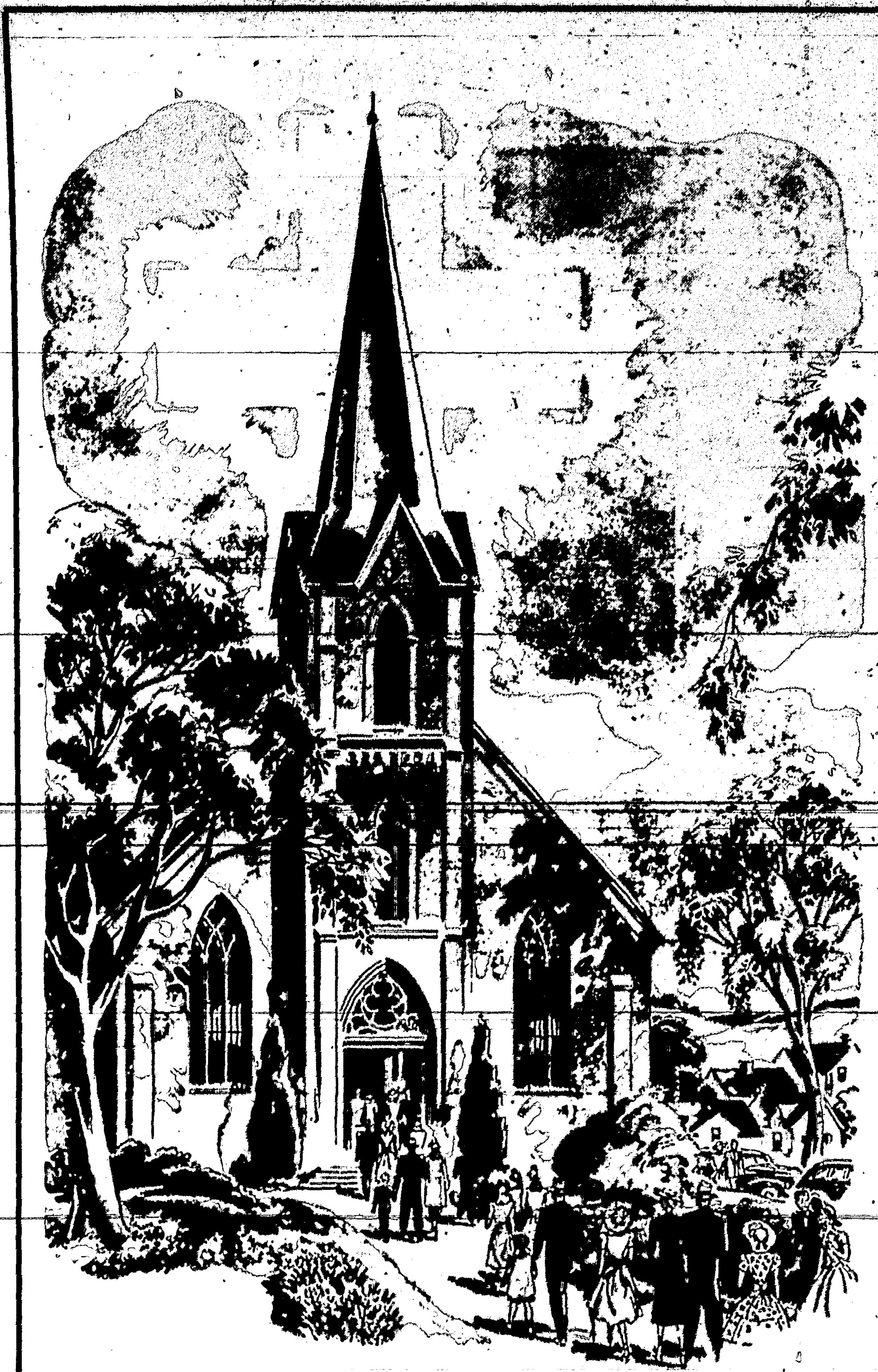

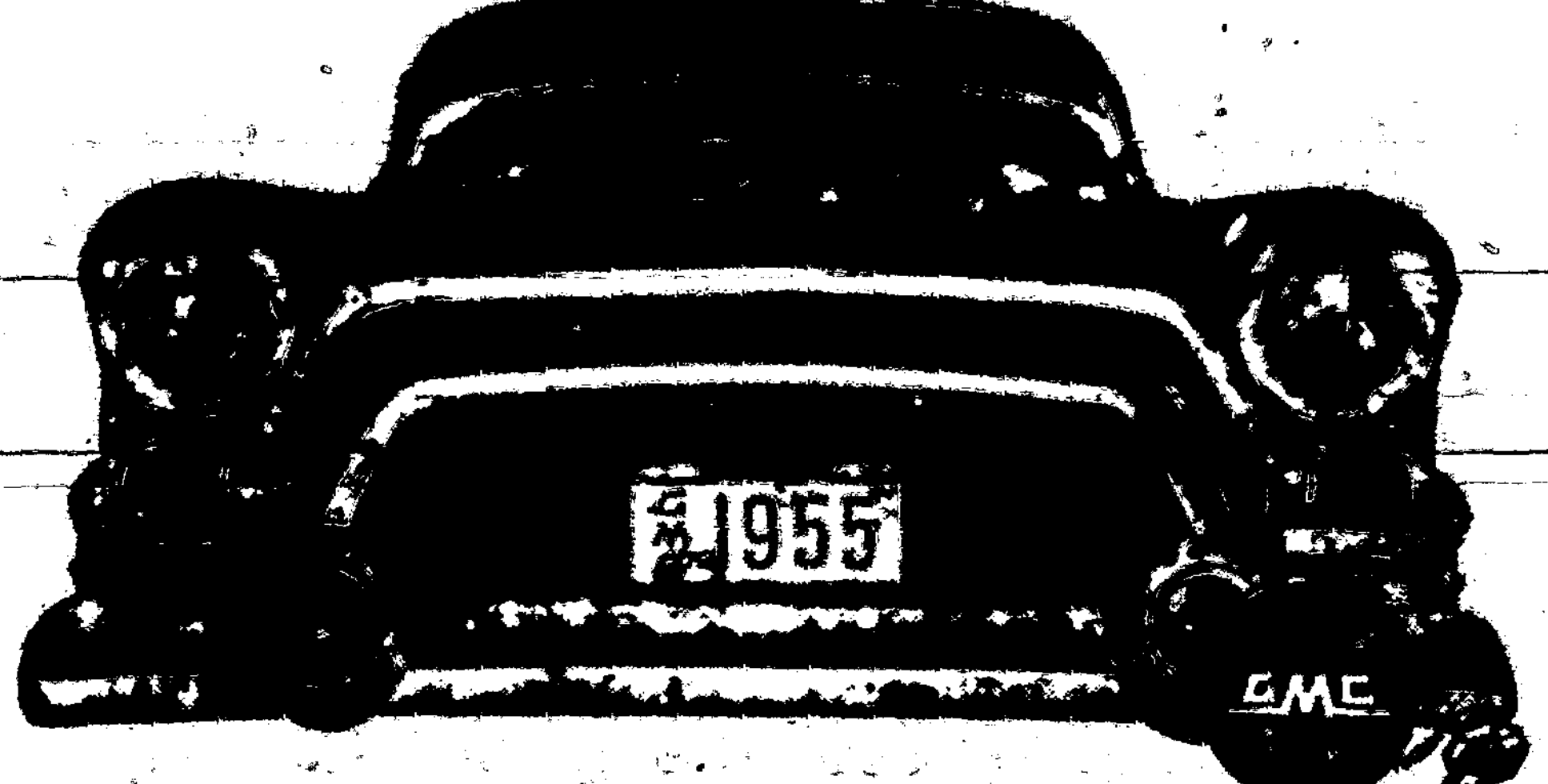

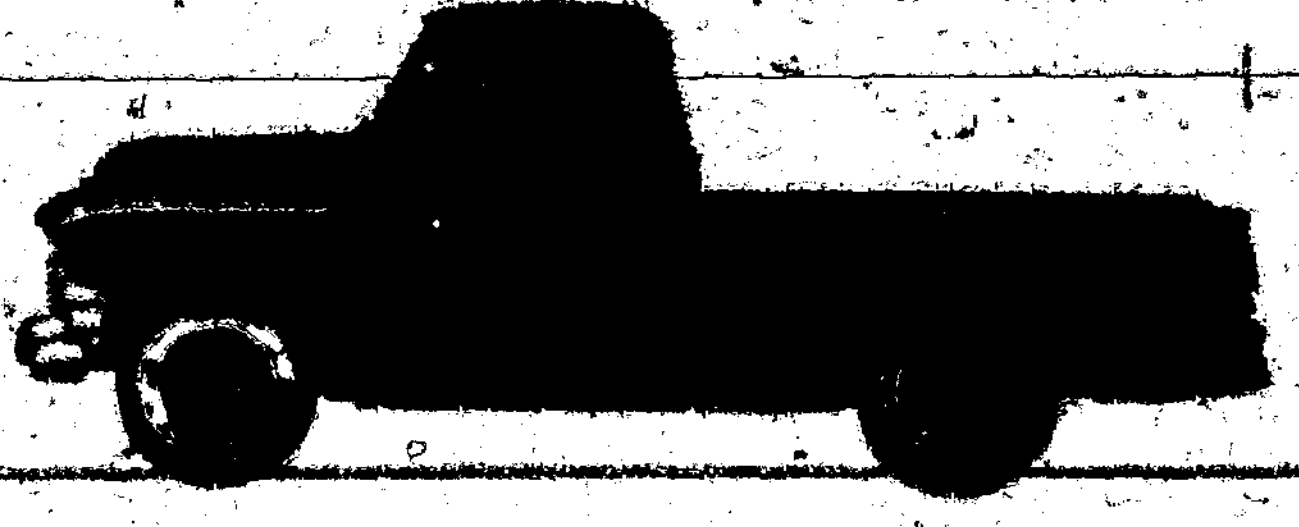

LETTERS TO EDITOR

Editor, News:

I noticed in the newspaper the old people who are drawing a state pension, are going to request Governor Simms to call a special session of the Legislature to find some way to raise money for their benefit. This drastic cut of 35 percent made by the State Welfare Dept. is going to be awfully rough on these people.

Should the Governor call a special session, I would suggest he would draft a bill requesting the Legislature to raise the pari-mutuel handle at these race tracks in New Mexico from one percent, earmarked Public Welfare funds. This would not be a burden on the taxpayers of New Mexico. This raise would not hurt the race track operators as this amount would be deductible from the Federal and State Income tax.

In the early part of the last session of the Legislature I mailed each legislator a mimeographed letter giving them the information regarding these race tracks. I pointed out that our neighboring states who have legalized pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing; Colorado gets four percent of the handle, Arizona gets five percent, our state only receives one-half of one percent.

The operators of the New Mexico race tracks hold 30 cents out of each two dollar bet, besides the breakage which is approximately three fourths of a cent they hold back on each dollar paid to the winners of each race.

The pari-mutuel handle at the race tracks in New Mexico last season was approximately \$10,000,000. If the Legislature in the past session had passed a law raising the state's take to four percent and the Governor had signed the bill, with the federal matching money, it would have added over a \$1,000,000 to the Public Welfare funds.

It would cost the taxpayers of New Mexico approximately \$3000 for a special session of one day and if this should materialize would mean a big dividend to the Public Welfare funds compared to the cost of this special session.

There was a lot of publicity about the powerful lobbying done by the truckers and liquor industries. Operators of these race tracks also did some clever lobbying, quietly and under cover. House Bill 54 which advocated additional increase of one-half of one percent of pari-mutuel handle earmarked Juvenile Funds and County Salaries in the judicial districts the race tracks operate in. This bill was referred to committee on Taxation and Revenue. No action was ever taken by committee on this bill.

One member of the N. M. House and Revenue Committee stated H. B. 54 had been "taken care of," and that there would be no additional state raise in the pari-mutuel take.

As long as we have legalized gambling on horse tracks, the State should receive decent revenue from these tracks.

Single copies of the list of publications may be procured from the Department of Information, Extension Service, P. O. Box 757, State College, or from local county extension offices.

Couple Contract Illness From Pet Parakeet

According to a recent bulletin of the New Mexico Department of Public Health, a 70 year old woman and her husband, 71 years of age, both contracted psittacosis from contact with a parakeet given to them last Christmas as a gift. The illness in both patients was quite severe and was characterized by fever, malaise, cough, diarrhea and pneumonic consolidation. Tetracycline was administered and both patients responded satisfactorily.

Complement-fixation tests for psittacosis confirmed the clinical diagnosis. The suspected parakeet had originated from a large commercial aviary in California and had been purchased in an Albuquerque pet shop. The bird became ill a month later and died within three days.

Writer-Artist Describes Lincoln — Land of "Billy the Kid"

Illustrated with four of his colorful and graphic paintings, a story on "Billy the Kid Country" by artist John Meigs appeared in a recent issue of "Ford Times" magazine.

The paintings portray Billy the Kid's prison in Lincoln Courthouse, the Tunstall store, postoffice and museum, and Captain Gap, Billy's escape route from Lincoln.

Excerpts from the article follow:

Travelers hurrying along through New Mexico on U. S. 70 are often unaware of an almost legendary land near at hand, a country frequented in the 70's and 80's by a young desperado named Billy the Kid. Here in the central part of the state are the places where he worked, rustled cattle and killed men.

It was not until he came to work as a cowboy in Lincoln County around 1877 that the legend of Billy the Kid settled down to semblance of fact. He worked

COMPETITIVE POSITION OF WOOL TO IMPROVE

"Consumption of synthetic fibers such as nylon, orlon, glass fiber, etc., increased from about 0.6 pounds per person in 1947 to 1.8 pounds per person in 1954," James Gray, USDA agricultural economist, State College, told wool producers at the Vaughn Wool Clinic recently. "However, there are two factors which may tend to slow down, if not to reverse this trend," he said. "They are acceptance of the 'Make it With Wool' program by the consumer, plus continued research in chemistry to improve wool and increase its competitive position with other fibers."

For an English rancher, J. H. Tunstall, whose unwarranted killing by a posse in 1879 brought on the famous Lincoln County cattle war. The Kid's admiration for his boss and his determination to get revenge led to the long series of murders and the much publicized events of the war in which he participated, culminating with his death at the hands of Sheriff Pat Garrett at Fort Sumner in the summer of 1881.

Scenes of most of his activities during his last years are all along or adjacent to U. S. 70. Fifty miles west of Roswell, at Hondo Junction, U. S. 390 is the first detour in following the Kid's trail. Ten miles west lies Lincoln. It is a town of another era but very much alive. The efforts of one of the first Lincoln museum directors has resulted in modest, but easily read, markers which stand before each historic building or site. These tell in a concise manner the part each played in the early events; the Torreon, early defense against the Apaches; Doan House, scene of early Lincoln hospitality, and later an inn; site of the Wortley Hotel, from which Bob Olinger rushed to his death during the Kid's escape.

The visitor will miss much by not stopping at the old Tunstall store which has been turned into a museum. Part of the building housed the old post office presided over by Mrs. Edgar Phillips who will genially pass the time of day with you. As you approach the end of town the Lincoln County Courthouse looms against the sharp rising hills. In this imposing early frontier building are the major relics and mementos of Lincoln. Here, Billy, after being tried and sentenced to hang, escaped by killing his two guards.

the correspondence between the Kid and Governor Lew Wallace of "Ben Hur" fame, who offered clemency to the young man, are on exhibit. After Lincoln the traveler has two choices. First he can return to Hondo and U. S. 70. By this route he will pass through San Patricio where Billy used to fight and frolic. A mound of adobe clay is all that remains of his favorite hangout.

For those who want to see still more of the Kid's country the road west from Lincoln passes close to old Fort Stanton. Originally established to protect the

settlers from the Apaches it also figured in the early history of the southwest and the Lincoln conflict. At Las Cruces the last of the Kid's country is found three miles east at Old Mealla. Another "Billy the Kid" museum and the scenes of his border gambling days are still in evidence.

Back in old Lincoln the days pass busily and eventfully. School suppers and dances at Ramon's on Saturday night bring out the young and the old. Farmers and ranchers come to the Penfield store to do their weekly trading.

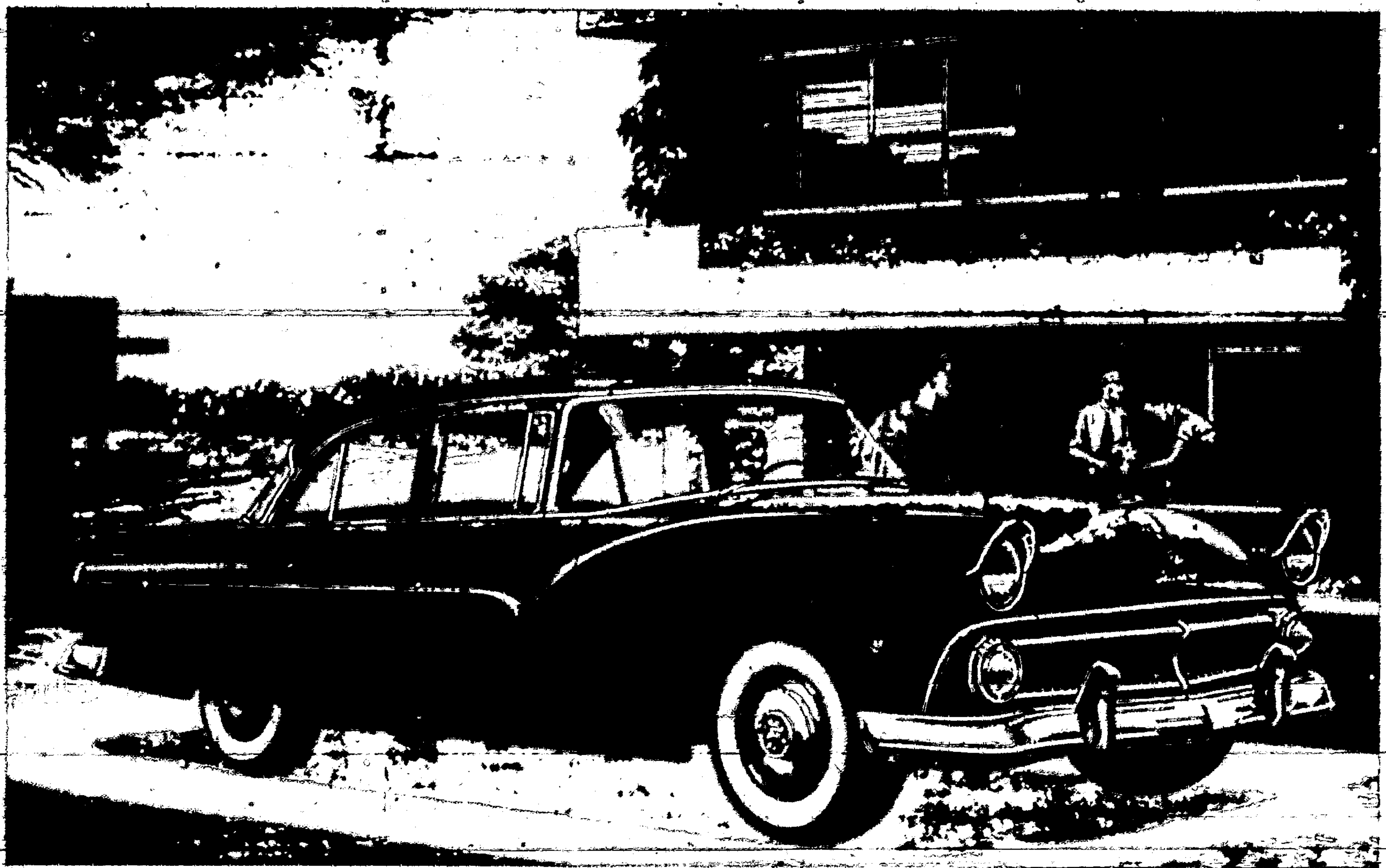

**Record Auto Sales First Two Months of '55**

Record production and sales of new passenger cars, running a neck-and-neck race through January and February, have set industry leaders to revising 1955 forecasts sharply upward.

With production up 45 per cent from the like 1954 period, the millionth new car of 1955 rolled off the production line a full month ahead of last year's counterpart. Sales in the first three months may well exceed 1,500,000 for the best first quarter on record. The upturn began in November, but really gathered speed in December when new-car registrations shot past the half-million mark. They have continued at a similar pace ever since.

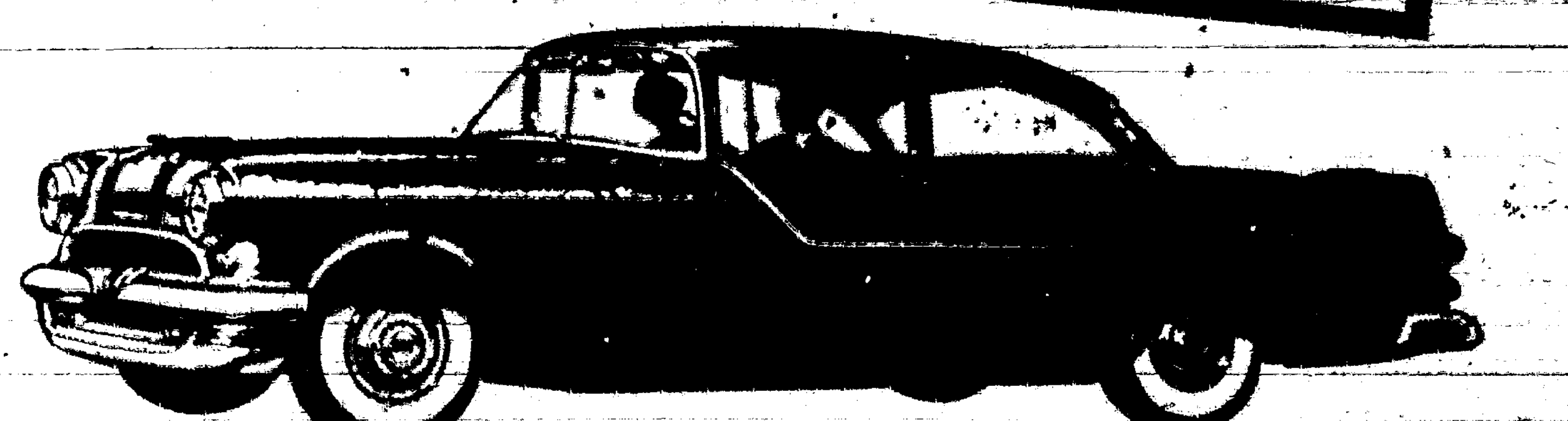

That no discount shall be allowed on the payment of the above rates; that if regularly rendered statement is not paid on or before the 10th day of the month following mailing of the statement, a 10% penalty shall be added to the statement, and that if said statements are not paid in full to the Town Clerk on or before the 20th day of the month, together with all penalties, service may be discontinued at the option of the Board of Trustees.

In the event that a statement shall not be paid in full by the 20th day of the month and service shall be discontinued, a charge of \$5.00 will be made and must be paid by the consumer before electric power can be supplied to the consumer again.

## LEGISLATORS SCHEME SESSION OF THEIR OWN

SANTA FE, April 6.—The possibility of members of the legislature invoking their never-used authority to call themselves into session has come alive as the result of the emergency in the welfare program and a rift between the legislature branch and the governor.

The legislators may call themselves into a session of 30 days or less upon the petition of three-fifths of the members of each chamber. The authority, granted in a constitutional amendment of 1948, has never been used.

Several prominent members have been telling privately that they would prefer a special session called by themselves in which there would be no limitation on the subjects they consider, rather than a session called by the governor which would be confined to the subjects he lists in the call.

## THREE SLAPS AT LAW MAKERS

The governor and the legislature as a whole are not on very good terms after the governor achieved an all-time record in the veto of 43 measures including three distinct slaps at the legislature's effort to gain independence of the governor's branch of the government.

Members were reeveed by his veto of a \$5000 appropriation for a legislative committee set up to work for a Mexican port of entry at Brickland in Dona Ana county, by his veto of a measure which would have empowered the legislature to hire its own expert on money affairs, and by the blue-pencilling of an item which would have taken the legislative council out of jurisdiction of the state comptroller and board of finance in money matters.

In each case the governor referred the legislators to his own officers and board of finance which was precisely what the legislators were trying to avoid.

Several of the members would also like another shot at getting through pet measures which the governor vetoed because of what he said were technical errors.

The governor has already said that he is contemplating a special session to deal with the welfare mess but the legislators may beat him to it judging from the activities of several of his leading members.

## DONA ANA MAN IS PATIENT

Champion job-hunter of the new administration is Lalo Enriquez of Dona Ana county, former veterans advisor at State College. He has put in full working-day time for five weeks at the statehouse in quest of the state park commissioner's post, a \$600-a-month job held by Republican Lee Robinson. Enriquez is a State College graduate.

## WHITEY'S JOB ABOLISHED

Any question about the new highway administration getting rid of the tough and controversial technical engineer, T. B. White, brother-in-law and chief aid of former Chief Engineer Pete Erwin, is answered in a new organizational chart for the department. It abolishes the technical engineer post.
