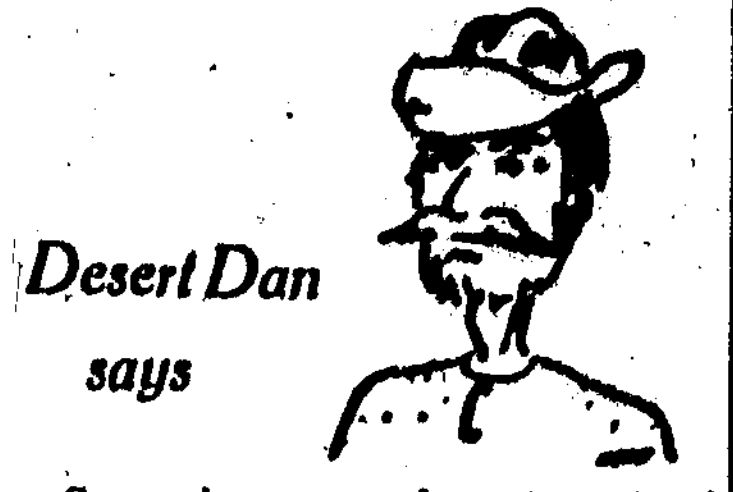

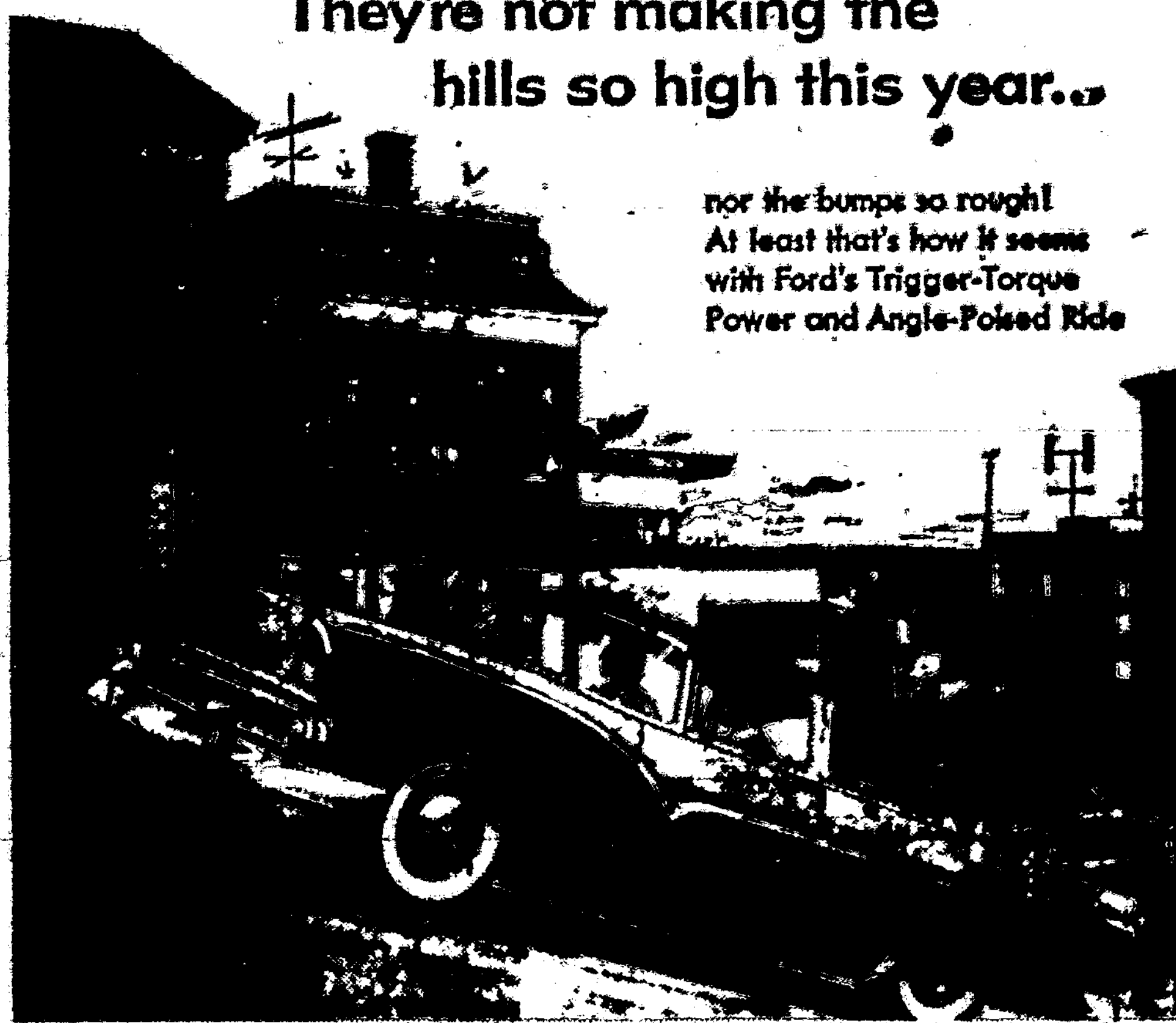
Man With Wooden Leg Kicks Off Power

Brucellosis Testing Is Good Insurance

Brucellosis testing is getting started in this area with many of the ranchers having the test done at the same time as they brand.

Brucellosis can strike fast and hard once it gets into a herd, as a dairyman in the Tularosa area can readily say. This dairyman had a clean herd 30 days before the test when seven cows out of 31 were reactors. Another test later brought four more reactors. The dairyman is now planning to dispose of his entire herd at a loss because of brucellosis. The infection seems to have been brought in by two untested cows he bought.

If as calves, the cows had been vaccinated for brucellosis, his loss would have been small, as a vaccinated animal seldom contracts the disease. Even though the farmer or rancher does not have brucellosis, he can very easily insure his breeding herd by vaccinating his calves at six

May 11 is 20th Anniversary of REA

In years to come, millions of farm homemakers may consider May 11 as their emancipation day. That date this year marks the 20th anniversary of the Rural Electrification Administration of the U. S. Department of Agriculture. REA has made loans to rural electric systems which serve 60 per cent of the farms added to rural power lines since 1935.

These loans have been important in raising the percentage of farms having electric service from 11 per cent in 1935 to about 93 per cent now. And it is because of the availability of electricity that most farm homemakers now can have the same conveniences as city families. When a farm home has an automatic water system and electric water heater, it then is possible to have an automatic washer, clothes dryer, dishwasher, garbage disposer and similar kitchen aids. Food freezers have proved to be a great boon to the farm wife and her family.

Rural electrification also has benefits for city consumers. Electric milking machines, milk

coolers and bulk milk handling equipment not only lighten the work of the farm family, but may mean that city folks get better milk and more of it.



It Takes 2145 To Make a Bargain

The old saying that it takes two to make a bargain undergoes some changes when labor unions and the Chino Mines Division of Kennecott Copper Corporation meet for collective bargaining.

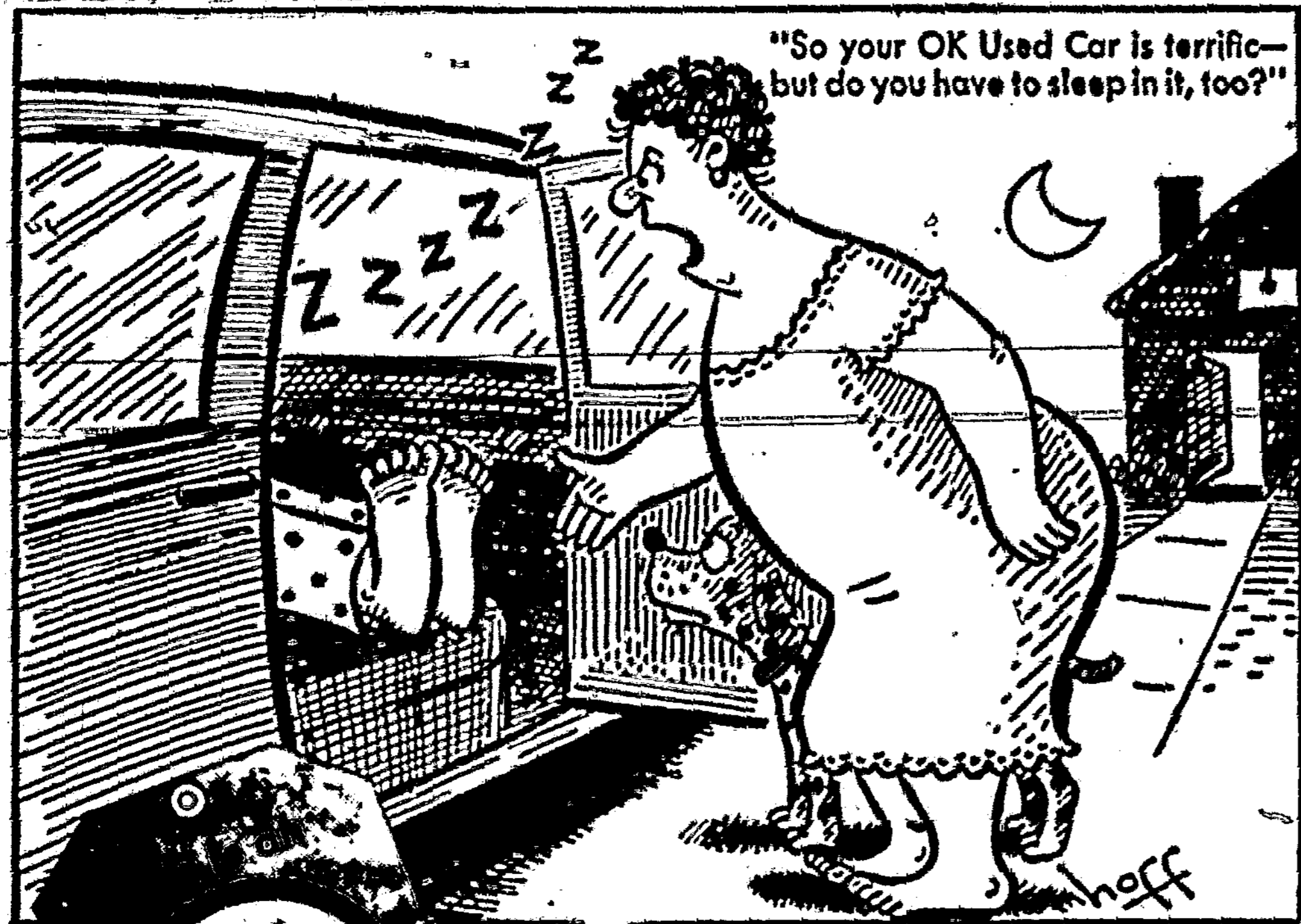
In this case, it takes about 2145 to make a bargain. For that is the number of the company's 2500 employees who are represented by local labor unions.

When this goal is reached without interrupting production, it helps all the people of New Mexico enjoy better living.

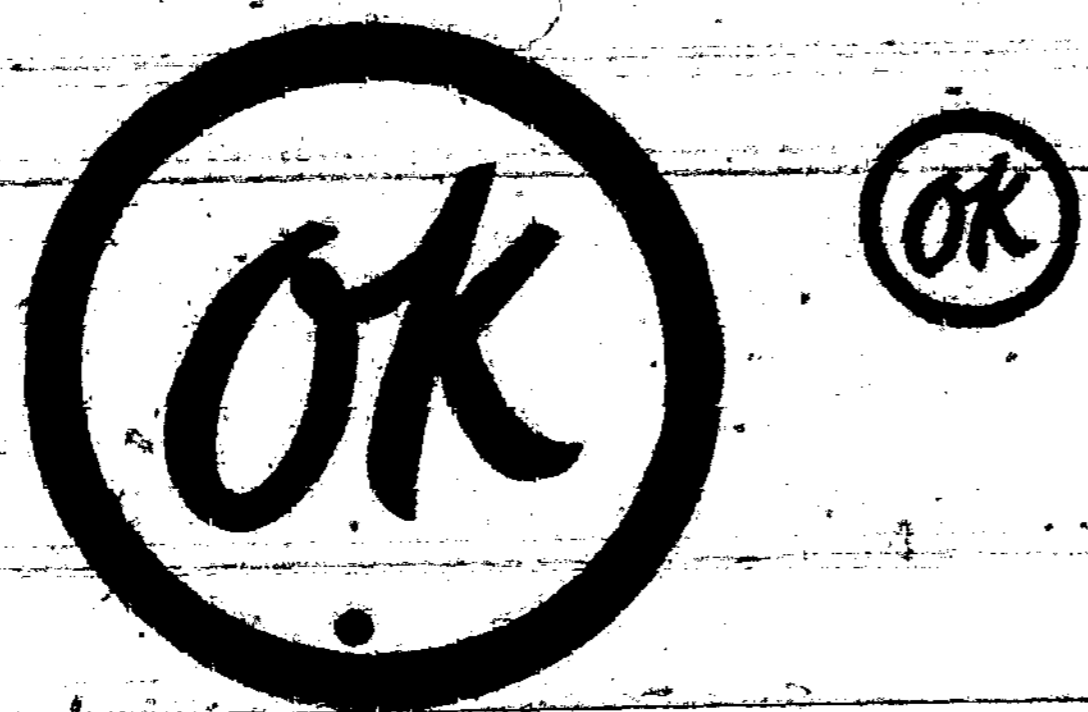
