

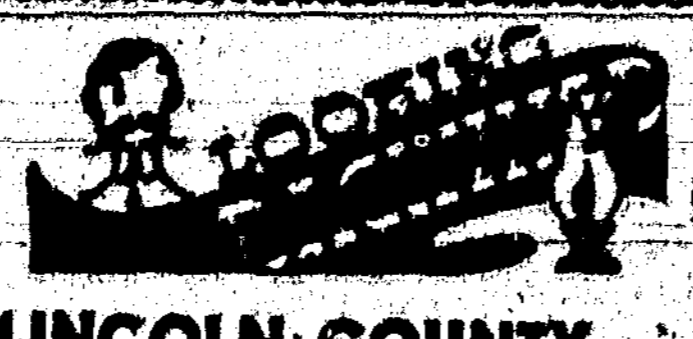


Desert Dan says

Clemente Candelaria Completes Training

Kids Had Big Day At Fishing Derby Above Bonito Lake

After a brisk shower around noon Sunday the weather cleared and a perfect afternoon greeted the hundred-odd men, women and children who made the first Kids' Fishing Derby a memorable occasion.
The fishing contest for children and ladies was held at the Blue Hole above Bonito Lake and was sponsored jointly by the White Mountain Game Protective association and the State Game Department, through its district warden, Marion F. Embrey.

Sixty boys and girls under 14 baited their hooks and took their places on the banks as starting time was waved at 3 p.m. Six hundred legal size trout had been planted in the clear water in the miniature lake the latter part of the week by the Game Department. There were plenty of targets for the bait. The trout could be seen swimming about in the clear, cold water of the pool, fed by a spring at the upper end.

A total of 24 prizes were awarded which had been donated by merchants and individuals in Capitan and Carrizozo. The first prize to be given away was the one for the first trout caught and before a minute had passed, Ben Neal Chapman had a fish on the bank. This lad, 10 years of age, proved to be the champion fisherman of the day. He also won a prize for the fourth fish caught and went on to get his limit of 12 before the time was up for the end of the contest.

Orlando Lucero, 12, of Carrizozo, caught the second trout and was only two short of the limit after an hour and a half of fishing. He won three prizes.
Alward Dixon, 11, of Capitan, caught the third trout and the prize that went with it. Young Dixon also caught a nice string.
The Neal Chapman family of Carlsbad and Ruidoso will be a name long remembered in connection with the first kids' fishing derby. Three of the Chapman youngsters, Ben, Kenneth and Carolina caught 30 trout between them and their mother, Mrs. Neal Chapman, added five more to the string when she took part in the ladies' 30-minute fishing contest. She won three of the four prizes awarded for women—a fishing net for the largest trout caught by any

lady, a fish chain for catching the largest fish (8 1/2 in.) and a pole for being the lady fisherman coming the longest distance.

Mrs. A. L. LaMay of Roswell had the honor of catching the first fish. It was not only the first one she had ever caught, but it was also the second largest caught by all of the ten ladies who fished.

THE HAUNTED HOUSE IN SANTA FE

A century-old house on East Palace Avenue in Santa Fe, diagonally across Saliz Arroyo from 511 North Armijo Street, once had a solid reputation for being haunted.

This story was told by Capt. Owen Wood, whose home has been 511 North Armijo for 56 years. As a teen-ager in Santa Fe about 50 years ago, he had a hand in keeping up the haunted reputation of the house.

An Otero family originally owned the dwelling and it became known as the Otero house. Later, a man, who was not a member of the Otero family, hanged himself in the house. And it was not long afterwards that occupants of the East Palace house felt sure the dead man's ghost had returned. They heard the tin roof rattling at night, as though a ghost were walking there.

Wood and the other boys in the neighborhood were aware of the ghost that walked the tin roof at night, and they gave a new twist to the ghostly goings-on. The drain pipe from the kitchen sink ran into Saliz Arroyo. The boys hollered into the pipe, and weird, ghost-like voices floated into the kitchen.

One family which occupied the house became so frightened by the rattling roof and the drain-pipe voices that a priest was induced to sprinkle holy water in the home to scare away the ghost.

About a week later the neighborhood boys heard of this and they gleefully redoubled their hollering into the drain pipe. They changed their voices, and again weird, hollow sounds, different from the cries of the previous drain-pipe ghost, filled the

kitchen at night. The house's reputation for being haunted became so firmly established that it was vacant for some years.

Then, during World War I Santa Fe experienced a housing shortage. Ghosts or no ghosts, families began living in the house again. It hasn't been haunted since.

THE WISE SHERIFF.

In 1905 when Felipe Lucero was sheriff of Dona Ana County, he devised a tactful way of getting drunk cowboys out of Las Cruces before trouble started. S. L. Benick of Truth or Consequences recalls.

Sheriff Lucero would offer to race the cowboys to their chuckwagon just outside of town. He'd get them lined up, and the race would begin. As they neared the chuckwagon, the sheriff would drop out of the race, but the cowboys would keep on going to where they should have been some time earlier.
