Sheriff Bradley, who is custodian of the courthouse and its grounds, spoke of the maintenance problems of the old part of the building, as well as the crowded condition in the jail in the annex: "There were 19 in jail over the week end," he said, "and we have facilities for only six." The county does not have, he said, separate quarters for housing juveniles, as required by law.
