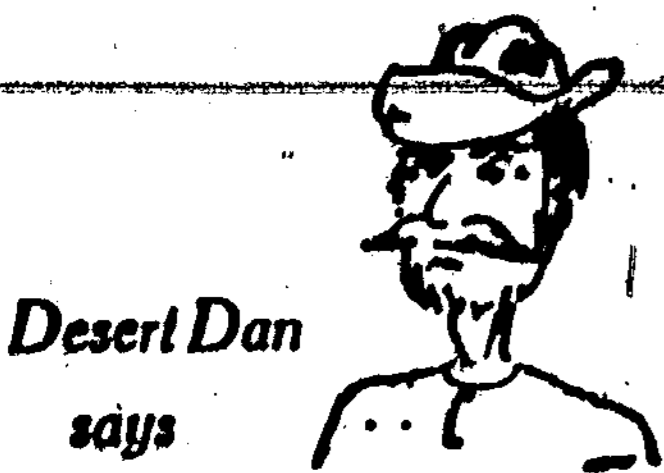

# THE FOLKLORE CORNER

## SIX TRAPS— SIX PANTHERS

More than 30 years ago when S. L. Renick of Truth or Consequences was ranching in the San Andres Mountains, panthers (mountain lions) and wild horses were numerous. A fellow with whom Renick was riding one day took a strong fancy to a peculiarly-colored colt in a bunch of wild horses. If a colt were not branded and had no mother, it was customary at that time to consider the animal yours if you caught it.

The horses were back in the top of the mountains and getting harder to handle. The fellow roped the colt, and its leg was broken when it was thrown. He had to kill the colt to which he had taken such a fancy.

Renick suggested they ride back about a mile and get six panther traps. They set the traps, with drags, around the dead colt. Returning in a day or so, the two men found the traps gone. Renick's dog took up the trail, and that day the men shot six panthers in six traps.

## DEATH AND BURIAL OF A NAVAJO

Some 700 Indians had gathered for a three-night dance on the Navajo Reservation. Among them was Antonio Lopez, who bootlegged on the side. The Indians were of two minds on bootlegging, according to John Arrington Jr. of Farmington, who then operated a trading post. There was too much drinking

at the dance, and Lopez was run over by a car. He was taken to a doctor, but there was nothing that could be done for him.

Before he was buried at Shiprock, his family came to the trading post and bought a Pendleton-shawl, a saddle, and food so that the dead man could properly journey into the Navajo hereafter. They shot his Palomino, the horse he would need in the few days it would take Antonio to ride "across the border."

## GOOD HAYING DAYS

In 1912 the country around Carrizozo was all open range controlled by big cattle companies through ownership of watering places. And the gramma grass grew thick on Carrizozo Flat.

During that year John W. Harkey, a Carrizozo old-timer, homesteaded four miles south of Carrizozo. Hay was on the flat by the ton for the cutting, and if a man cut around a piece of grass and did not interfere with the big ranches' established watering places, the hay was supposed to be his.

Harkey recalls that he and his wife trailed a mowing machine behind their wagon on the road to Nogal from Carrizozo. Four and one-half miles down the road they turned off and stretched their tent. Harkey mowed around approximately a section of grass that would have yielded almost a ton to the acre. He put up several stacks of hay which he fed to his cattle.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 1 TWENTY-SECOND LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JUDICIARY COMMITTEE SUBSTITUTE FOR SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 A JOINT RESOLUTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF SECURING FAIR LEGISLATIVE REPRESENTATION FOR ALL COUNTIES; PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO SECTION 3, ARTICLE 4, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO TO PROVIDE FOR THE NUMBER, QUALIFICATIONS, AND APPOINTMENT OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO.

SECTION 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Section 3 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

Section 1. Every citizen of the United States, who is over the age of twenty-one years, and has resided in New Mexico twenty months, in the county ninety days, and in the precinct in which he offers to vote thirty days, next preceding the election, except idiots, insane persons, persons convicted of a felonious or infamous crime unless restored to political rights shall be qualified to vote at all elections for public officers. The legislature may enact laws providing for the voting of qualified electors absent from their places of residence on the day of any election. All school elections shall be held at different times from other elections. The legislature shall have the power to require the registration of the qualified electors as a requisite for voting, and shall regulate the manner, time and place of voting. The legislature shall enact such laws as will secure the secrecy of the ballot, the purity of elections and guard against the abuse of elective franchise. Not more than two members of the board of registration and not more than two judges of election shall belong to the same political party at the time of their appointment.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior thereto which may be called for such purpose.

## CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NO. 3 TWENTY-SECOND LEGISLATURE STATE OF NEW MEXICO SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11 INTRODUCED BY: SENATORS CALVIN HORN, R. C. MORGAN AND I. N. CURTIS. A JOINT RESOLUTION PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE V, SECTION 14, OF THE CONSTITUTION OF THE STATE OF NEW MEXICO RELATING TO THE STATE HIGHWAY COMMISSION AND PROVIDING THAT EXPENDITURES BY THE COMMISSION SHALL BE SUBJECT TO SUCH CONTROL AS MAY BE PROVIDED BY LAW AND PROVIDING THAT THE PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT BE SUBMITTED TO THE PEOPLE AT THE NEXT GENERAL OR SPECIAL ELECTION.

SECTION 1. It is hereby proposed to amend Article V, Section 14 of the Constitution of the State of New Mexico to read as follows:

Section 14. A permanent commission to consist of five (5) members is hereby created, which shall be known as the "State Highway Commission". A. The state highway commission is empowered and charged with the duty of determining all matters of policy relating to the design, construction, location, and maintenance of state highways and public roads. It shall have general charge and supervision of all the highways and bridges which are constructed or maintained in whole or in part with state aid. It shall have charge, subject to such regulation as may hereafter be provided by law, of all matters pertaining to the expenditure of highway funds. It shall have the power to institute any legal proceedings deemed necessary to the exercise of its powers. It shall have all powers which are now or which may hereafter be conferred on it by law.

Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior thereto which may be called for such purpose.

Section 3. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior thereto which may be called for such purpose.

Section 4. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the next general election or at any special election prior thereto which may be called for such purpose.

above districts to which said county or counties may be contiguous.

Section 1. The members of the commission shall be appointed by the governor with the advice and consent of the senate for overlapping terms of six (6) years each. One member shall be appointed from each of the five (5) aforesaid highway commission districts and such member shall reside in the district from which he shall be appointed. Change of residence of a highway commissioner to a place outside of the highway district from which he was appointed shall automatically terminate the term of such commissioner. No more than three (3) of the said commissioners shall belong to the same political party. Each of the said commissioners, in order to qualify as such, shall take the usual oath and execute in favor of the state a surety company bond, in a form approved by the attorney general, in the amount of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000.00) conditioned upon the faithful performance of his duties. The governor shall submit the appointment of commissioners to the senate for confirmation not later than the 5th day of each regular session of the legislature. A three-fifths (3/5) vote of the senate shall be required for confirmation. The appointment of such commissioner or commissioners shall become effective upon the date of confirmation by the senate and no commissioner shall be appointed in any event without confirmation by the senate except that commissioners may be appointed by a majority of the remaining members of the highway commission, to fill vacancies until the next regular session of the legislature, at which time an appointment shall be made for the balance of the unexpired term. In the event the governor should refuse or fail to submit the highway commissioners to the senate for confirmation in the manner above provided, the senate shall appoint and confirm the highway commissioners. The members first appointed shall determine by lot from among their group two (2) members to serve two (2) year terms, two (2) members to serve six (6) year terms, and one (1) member to serve a four (4) year term. D. Highway commissioners shall not be removed except for incompetence, neglect of duty or malfeasance in office. Provided, however, no removal shall be made without notice of hearing and an opportunity to be heard having first been given such commissioner. The supreme court of the state of New Mexico is hereby given exclusive original jurisdiction over proceedings to remove highway commissioners under such rules as it may promulgate and its decision in connection with such matters shall be final. The state highway commission shall appoint a competent chief highway engineer, who shall be chief administrator of the highway commission and shall have charge of the hiring and firing of employees of the highway commission subject to the control and supervision of the highway commission.

prescribed and subject to the restrictions imposed by law. The Legislature shall prescribe the powers and duties of the Commission and the compensation of its members.  
Section 2. The Legislature shall have the power to enact laws to define, regulate and control all public utilities. Subject to such exceptions as may be provided by law with reference to utilities owned and operated by political subdivisions of the State or by cooperatives, corporations or associations formed to furnish utility services to rural areas in cooperation with the United States of America, the Legislature shall delegate, no administrative authority to regulate and control public utilities except to the State Corporation Commission, provided that such administrative authority so delegated may at any time be altered, amended or repealed by Legislative act.  
Section 3. The Legislature shall provide for the organization of corporations by general law. All laws relating to corporations may be altered, amended or repealed by the Legislature, at any time, when necessary for the public good and general welfare, and all corporations, doing business in this State, may, as to such business, be regulated, limited or restrained by laws not in conflict with the Constitution of the United States or of this Constitution.  
Section 4. The police power of this State is supreme over all corporations as well as individuals.  
Section 5. The right of eminent domain shall never be so abridged or construed as to prevent the Legislature from taking the property and franchises of incorporated companies and subjecting them to the public use, the same as the property of individuals.  
Section 2. The amendment proposed by this resolution shall be submitted to the people for their approval or rejection at the general election to be held in November, 1955 or at any special election prior to that date which may be called for such purposes.
