Game of 'Chicken' Fatal to Youth

As a result of playing the deadly game of "Chicken," in which another youth was killed, a Roswell juvenile, 14 years of age, has been committed to the State School for Boys, Springer.

Israel Pena of Roswell was the lad killed. In the version of the game of "Chicken" in which Pena lost his life, an auto is driven at high speed toward a group standing in a row.

The juvenile committed was the driver of the auto. The cases against six other boys involved in the game are pending.

Return Two Convicted Youths to Las Cruces

Sheriff Frank Z. Romero of Dona Ana County was in Carrizozo this week to return two youths to Las Cruces where they will start serving jail sentences imposed on them in District Court here.

They are Robert Boyd, 17, and Harley Paul, 18, both of Las Cruces. The youths, convicted of rape, were sentenced last Saturday by Judge J. V. Gallegos of Tucuman. A sentence of 24 months in jail was imposed on each.

Trial of the youths by a jury of six men and six women began September 23, before Judge Gallegos in Carrizozo. The case went to the jury the night of the 20th and a verdict of guilty was returned after midnight the 30th.

Hondo Students Attend South Central Meeting

After meeting September 23 with Ruidoso to discuss plans for the district meeting, the members of the Hondo High School Council attended the South Central District meeting at Carrizozo on October 8.

Representatives from the districts of Alamogordo, Tularosa, Mountainair, Ruidoso, Carrizozo, Weed, Corona and Hondo attended the meeting. Bonito Montoya, of Hondo, is vice-president of the South Central organization.

District Judge Tells PTA of Progress in Juvenile Work

Youth Direction is Program's Keystone

Progress being made in the Third Judicial District in meeting youth problems was outlined to the Carrizozo PTA Monday night by District Judge W. T. Scoggin.

Under Judge Scoggin's guidance, the youth direction program, or "district probation office," has grown from one paid worker to a staff of ten trained people.

"Largely through our efforts," the Judge said, "we now have a juvenile code as good as any in the country." He defined probation as a means to correction.

Judge Scoggin described the work of the Third Judicial District Youth Commission. It has a three-fold program, he said, to teach boys and girls how to live and play together, give them guidance in becoming better fathers and mothers tomorrow, and third, the intelligent handling of the juvenile delinquent.

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Be Sure of Identity Before Cashing Check

Sheriff Wm. G. Bradley reported this week that a new wave of bad check writing has struck Lincoln County, as well as the rest of New Mexico, within the past 30 days.

The sheriff asks everyone taking checks to secure positive identification of the writer. If out of the county, the license number of his vehicle should be secured.

A \$50 check was recently passed in Green Tree with the purchase of \$35 in merchandise. The store operator took down the car license and called the bank in Roswell on which the check was written.

It proved to be worthless and in two hours Sheriff Bradley's office had issued a warrant for the man's arrest, but the subject had sufficient time to make his escape from the state.

Another recent case was a motorcyclist who cashed a smaller check in Captain Warren Gaston notified the sheriff's office and the man was picked up before he got to Roswell.

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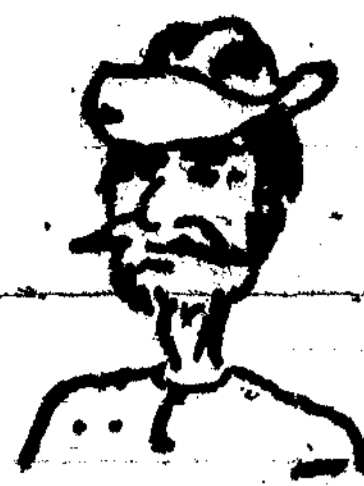

Census Presents Figures on County's Farm Economy

Lincoln County's agricultural economy is presented in statistical form in a preliminary 1954 Census of Agriculture just released by the U. S. Department of Commerce.

The number of farms in the county in 1954 is listed at 418, compared to 405 in 1950, with an approximate land area of 3,109,760 acres. Of these 41 were 10 acres and under, while 186 were 1000 acres and over. The trend is toward larger farms. In 1950 there were 169 farms of 1000 acres and over. In 1954 the number was 186.

Use of telephones in farms reporting declined in 1954 to a figure of 62 from a total of 73 phones in 1950. Farms using electricity in 1954 were 352, compared to 277 in 1950. Television sets were in 62 farm homes in the county in 1954, piped running water was in 250 homes and home freezers in 141.

In type of farms reporting in 1954 there were two dairy farms, five cotton, 53 fruit and nut, 109 unclassified farms, and 236 livestock farms. There were no poultry or vegetable farms reported.

National Park Service Holds Conference

The National Park Service held its biennial conference for all National Park and National Monument superintendents at the Great Smoky Mountains National Park in Tennessee and North Carolina, September 19 to 24 inclusive.

Theme of the conference was "Public Services" and included topics such as public relations, cooperative activities, administration, operations and interpretive services. Principal speakers

at the conference were Secretary of Interior Douglas McKay and the National Park Service Director, Conrad L. Wirth.

Superintendent Channing T. Howell and Mrs. Howell of Gran Quivira National Monument attended the conference along with 175 other superintendents from the United States, Alaska, Hawaii and Puerto Rico. Mr. and Mrs. Howell returned from the conference by way of Florida, Louisiana and Southern Texas.

Travel figures for the month of September to Gran Quivira National Monument released by Channing T. Howell, superintendent, show a total of 823 persons in 240 cars came to view the Spanish Missions and Pueblo Indian ruins which are located in the monument. More than 200 visitors used the campgrounds.

Gran Quivira National Monument stands as a memorial to the early Spanish mission system and is preserved for the enjoyment and education of present and future generations. The Monument is open to visitors all year, free to the public and can be reached by traveling north on Highways 54 and 10 from Carrizozo.

Brigadier General John P. McFarland, State Director of New Mexico Selective Service System announces that the Selective Service College Qualification Tests for the 1955-56 school year will be held on Thursday, Nov. 17, 1955 and April 19, 1956.

Applicants for the test should submit their applications at the earliest possible date. Applications for the test to be held on November 17, 1955, must be postmarked not later than midnight November 1. Applications for the test to be held on April 19, 1956, must be postmarked not later than midnight March 5, 1956.

The testing centers in the State of New Mexico are: Albuquerque, University of New Mexico; Las Vegas, New Mexico Highlands University; Portales, Eastern New Mexico University; Roswell, New Mexico Military Institute; Santa Fe, St. Michael's College; Silver City, New Mexico Western College; Socorro, New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology; State College, New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanic Arts.

Application blanks for the test to be held on November 17, 1955 may be obtained from the student's nearest local board and should be sent in as soon as possible to the Selective Service Testing Section, Science Research Associates, Inc., Chicago, Ill.

THE FOLKLORE CORNER

RECOLLECTIONS OF EARLY DEMING

Mrs. H. D. Green moved with her family to Deming in November, 1883. Deming then was called a "rag town" because so many persons lived in tents. She remembers her father, Edward Pennington, standing up suddenly at the supper table one night in the spring of 1884 and blowing out the coal oil lamp as he heard the sound of galloping horses. The rustlers were riding into town again to shoot out the lights in homes. Dangerous as the rustlers' sport was, no one had been killed or wounded. Deming officers seemed unable to stop the rustlers' forays into town. A sheriff was brought over from Arizona to end the rustlers' sport.

As Mrs. Green recalls, it was on the night that her father blew out the coal oil lamp at the supper table that the Arizona sheriff and deputies killed five of the rustlers. Their bodies were laid out on the platform of the Southern Pacific Railroad Station as a reminder of the fate awaiting other rustlers who might take a notion to shoot up the town for fun.

The sheriff did a salutary night's work. No more rustlers rode in to shoot out the lights in Deming homes.

The Town's First Church

The first church in Deming was built with gamblers' and saloonkeepers' money. They believed the town needed a church, although they never attended. City mechanics donated their labor and put up the brick Methodist Church.

The first minister was the Reverend Stanton who did the inside finishing. After he had completed the job, Reverend Stanton said: "I guess I can do anything better than preach, but I want to preach."

Nearly everyone in Deming went to the Methodist Church, which probably was completed in 1882. Mrs. Green and her brother attended Sunday school there.

The next church to be built in Deming was Holy Family Catholic Church.

Indian Raid Scare

Rumors of raids by the Apache Geronimo caused excitement in Deming in the 1880s. Once, when it was rumored that Geronimo would raid the town, most of the people were placed in boxcars which were hauled some distance out of Deming.

Birth of The Headlight

When Edward Pennington came from Las Vegas to Deming, there were two struggling dailies in town. He bought the papers and consolidated them into a weekly. The first issue of the Headlight carried an illustration of a locomotive headlight, giving the weekly paper its name.

Some years later the Republican Party in Deming split during an election campaign. Pennington supported Harvey Whitehill for sheriff. Whitehill was defeated, and the winning GOP faction boycotted Pennington's Headlight. Pennington later sold the weekly.

Rev. Max T. Neel, minister of the Oaklawn Church of Christ, married the couple in his home October 7, at 8 p.m., in the presence of a few close friends and relatives.

The bride wore a white French embroidered organdy dress with scalloped detail and a matching short jacket. She wore a white jeweled hat with short veil and carried white carnations on a white Bible.

The couple were attended by Joan Stokes and W. P. Brown, formerly of Ft. Stanton and lifetime friend of the bridegroom.

Shirley is attending Polytechnic High School, where she will be graduated at mid-term.

James (known to his many friends as Jimmie) was reared at Captain and Ft. Stanton. He attended high school in Captain, later moving with his father to Fort Worth and was graduated from Polytechnic High School.

After a short trip the couple will make their home at 5010 Trenton Dr.

Sheep Grubs Present In The County

By RALPH DUNLAP
Lincoln County Extension Agent

I have noticed a few herds that have heavy infestations of sheep grubs in Lincoln County. The grub causes a discharge flecked with blood from the nose. These grubs are the larvae of the bot fly and are most satisfactorily controlled after the first heavy frost in the fall. The method of control is by thoroughly irrigating the nasal passages with a 3% Lysol solution while the sheep is restrained on its back. The sheep is then quickly put back on its feet to prevent strangling.

If you are interested, I will be glad to give you more information on the control of the head grub.

Grasshoppers cover a larger area of Lincoln County than I had originally anticipated. Thru

reports from ranchers and a survey by the state grasshopper control personnel, hopper infestations have been found east of Carrizozo, on the Nogal Mesa area, Fort Stanton area, north of the Capitan Mountains, and in the Tinnie-Arabela area. The extent of the infestation in the Capitan Mountain area and around Tinnie is undetermined, but covers considerable area. From the Tinnie area, the hopper infestation probably connects with the infestation found around 13-mile draw in Chaves County. Estimates of 100,000 acres were given for the Capitan and East Carrizozo areas last year. It would be to the ranchers' advantage to now note the hoppers in his area and be ready to participate in a control program next year if the need arises.

Sun Supplies Power For Telephone Line

Fire Danger High in Grassy Forestlands

With the colorful autumn season now at hand in the National Forest areas, visitors and hunters by the thousands are driving into the high country to view the aspens and woods in fall colors, and to hunt big game. C. K. Collins, chief of fire control of the Southwestern Region of the Forest Service said this week: "Danger from fire is especially high in areas where grass is maturing after the rains of late summer, and dry leaves falling from the trees create a high hazard. Fires at this time of year

burn grass and browse that wildlife need for feed during the winter, and Collins warned that warming fires left by big-game hunters are the biggest cause of autumn fires. Over 23,000 acres of national forest land were burned in 1955 in Arizona and New Mexico, compared to 12,000 acres in 1954. Visitors and hunters are asked to take special care with smokes, matches, campfires, and firearms to keep autumn fires out of the forest.


