Inside the Capital

WILL HARRISON'S Inside the Capital SANTA FE, Nov. 2.—Forces of Gov. John Simms and Lt. Gov. Joe Montoya broke into open hostility in the fight for the Demo chairmanship of Sandoval County. Ernest Miera, chief clerk for State Secretary Natale Buck, represented the administration in the rump meeting that selected an anti-Montoya man for the post. Sen. Tom Montoya, brother of the lieutenant governor, presided at the meeting which named Montoya's first cousin, J. F. Castillo, a land office employee, as chairman. The election was called to fill the place made by the resignation of Tom Montoya who said he wanted to get clear to devote his time to the legislature's welfare investigating committee.

SIMMS SHOWING A NEW SPIRIT. The governor's new energy in fighting his critics in the party showed also in San Miguel and Socorro Counties. State party headquarters has delayed since early last summer in ruling on the disputed chairmanship of Socorro. Down there J. Q. Gallegos, who is no Simms Democrat, claimed election to the chairmanship but months later the party was still recognizing Sam Zimmerman who was vice-chairman when Ernest Peralta resigned to become a state liquor inspector.

Acting State Chairman John Joe Wilkinson said that he had not had time to go into the Socorro situation. The governor traveled to Las Vegas to placate the San Miguel chairman, Sheriff Manuel Ortiz, who had said that he was planning to quit in protest of administration job policies. The governor left a Highlands football game at the hall to visit with the unhappy chairman. The San Miguel trouble was eased by the conference, at least for a while.

LEUTENANT GOVERNOR TINKLES OF PRIMARY. Lieutenant Governor Montoya, on the outs with Simms since last year's primary when the Simms crowd opposed his nomination, appears to be the leader of the dissident group in what is apparently an effort to assure his own renomination. There has been talk among some administration leaders of replacing Montoya in next spring's primary.

The filing time for that primary, incidentally, is just four months away, March 6, and there's only one day for filing. URANIUM BOOM NOT SO RICH. New Mexico's rich uranium boom is not enriching the state bank account. The severance tax collected on uranium mining came to \$1226 in the first three months of the business year, July, August and September. The levy is one-eighth of one per cent on the value of the ore after a lot of deductions are made. Governor Simms proposed raising it to 2 per cent, the same as is paid on oil and potash, but the special session of the legislature would have none of it.

SENATOR AFTER WELFARE CHISLERS. State Senator Tom Montoya, mentioned above, hopes to take charge of an investigation of chiselers on the relief rolls for the legislature investigating committee which goes to work soon with \$61,250 to spend. Committee members will get \$15 a day and expenses for time on committee work.

Another member of the committee who wanted his name withheld until the new group is organized, said he would ask for a report on the circumstances of a transfer of assurance on the welfare department's TB san at Socorro at an expense of more than \$1,000.

The policies held by three Republican agencies operated by Earl Douglas, M. L. Miera and Holm Buraum had two years to run at only 78% of the regular premium rate. The insurance was transferred to the Baldwin Agency, Mrs. W. J. Eaton and Jake Stapleton and is subject to the payment of the full 100% premium the first year under the new policies. All of the agencies are in Socorro County.

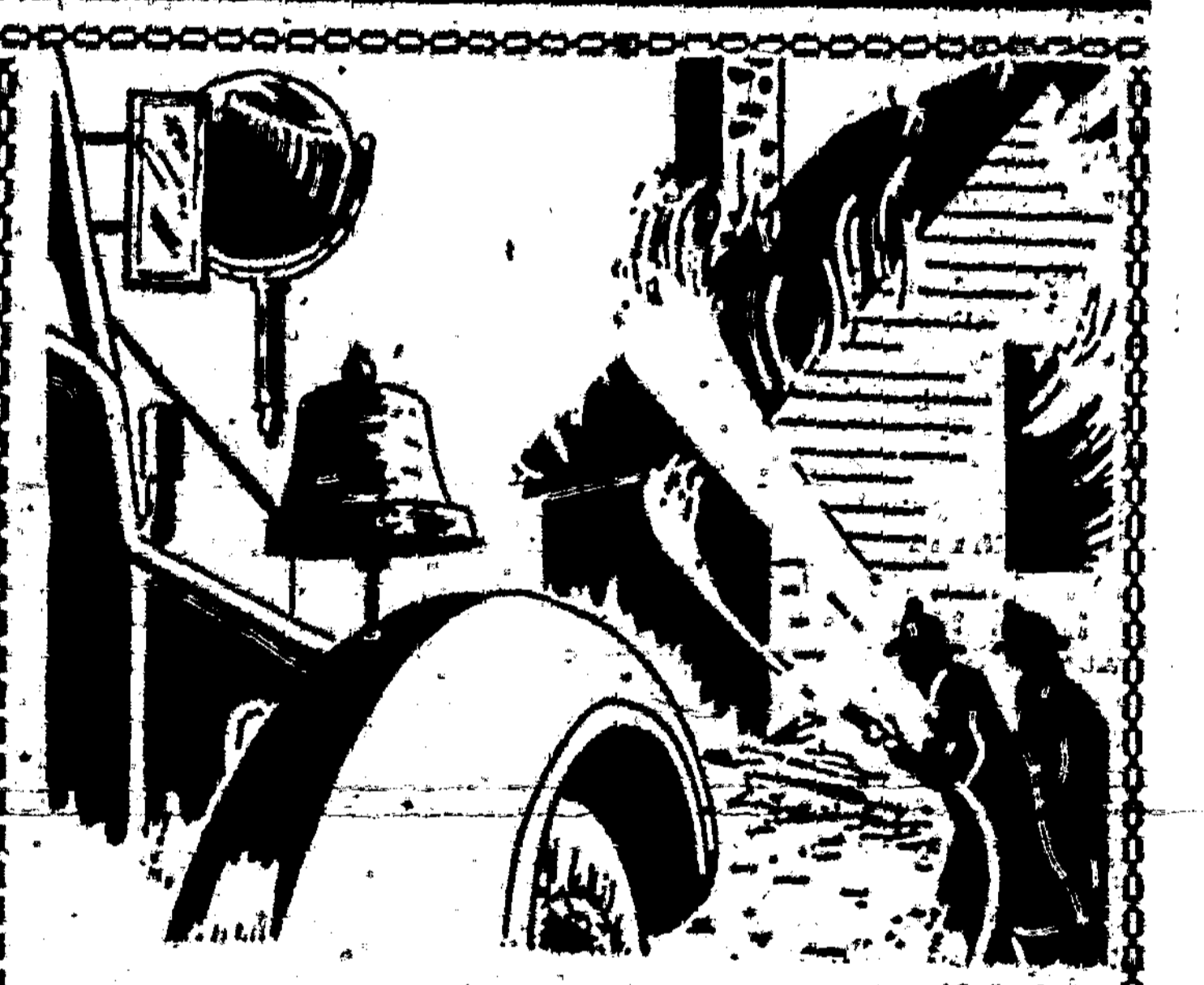

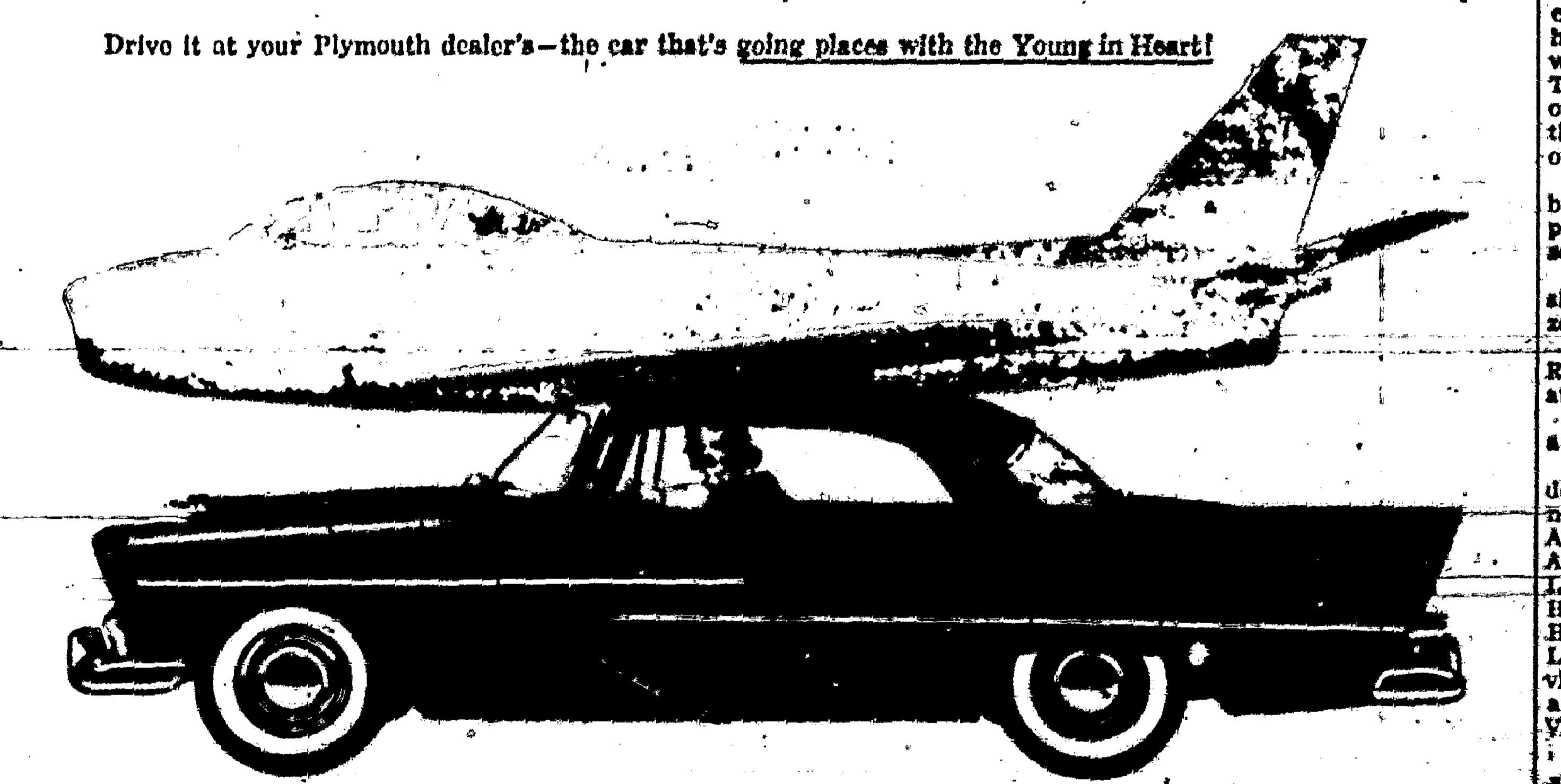

THE BURIED TREASURE AT MANZANO

The fattest lambs were brought to slaughter, the best wines were purchased in Bernalillo. Far into the night, the villagers feasted, danced and drank until they fell into the sleep of exhaustion.

At sunup a few of the revelers awoke and asked one another where their beloved Don might be. They looked about and saw that his mules and wagon were gone.

They came at last to the ruins of the old church. There, they discovered a pile of freshly-dug earth near a hole in the center of the altar foundation. In the hole was a stone vault, pieces of rotted wood lay in the vault, and tossed to one side of the hole was a broken, rusty, ancient lock.

Excitement seized the little village, but no one got up a party to follow the Don; and within a few days the village settled back into its quiet ways. And the oldest inhabitants still shook their heads in disbelief.
