### Program Marks Completion of New School in Hondo

Fitting ceremonies Thursday evening marked the dedication of the new \$133,000 Hondo Valley grade school building. It gives the district an educational plant the equal of any in the state.

The new building will serve both grade and high school pupils. It has six classrooms for the instruction of pupils from the first grade through the eighth. Two offices and a total of four dressing rooms are also provided.

Facilities that will be shared by high school pupils are the gymnasium, kitchen and dining room. The grade school building adjoins the high school.

The gymnasium has overhead butane heating, recessed ceiling lighting and windows are provided with shades for the daytime showing of movies. A large stage has knotty pine facing on each side; also rest rooms and dressing rooms. The curtain on the stage has an attractive scene in the center, flanked by advertisements of many business firms in Lincoln and Chaves counties.

Though the need for a new grade school building in Hondo was pointed up 25 years ago, it has been during the administration of Supt. Fermin S. Montes that it has been brought to realization. During the dedication program a number of speakers highly praised Mr. Montes for his efforts in fostering and completing the project. He in turn gave the credit to the school board of trustees, to the architect and builder and to the people of the district who voted the necessary bonds.

The Hondo Band and Chorus, under the direction of Jess Lara, played and sang during the program. At the conclusion an open house was held. Teachers were in their classrooms to welcome the visitors and refreshments were served in the cafeteria. The committee in charge were the Mmes. John Hamilton, Fermin Montes, George Slaberson, Frank Tittsworth and Mrs. Juddy McKnight.

Superintendent Montes was master of ceremonies at the dedication program. He recounted the history of education in Lincoln County and particularly that of the Hondo schools. At intervals he introduced several who had taken an important part in education there thru the years. The first introduction was Mrs. Louise Coe.

Mrs. Coe was superintendent of Lincoln County schools from 1923 through 1925. In 1928 she became superintendent of the Hondo schools, and worked toward school consolidation and building up of interest in better schools. "Though we dreamed of such a school building as you have today," she said, "it would not have been possible without Mr. Montes. He had the energy, initiative ability and the confidence of the people to bring it about."

### FIRST SUPERINTENDENT

J. W. Wilfirth of Springer, another honored guest, was introduced and related some of his experiences while serving as the first superintendent of the Hondo school from 1921 to 1924. Fermin Montes was one of his pupils, he recalled. Mr. Wilfirth was also coach of the basketball team that had six boys on the roster. He told how they pushed his Model T ford up the Bonita grade to get to a game with Captain. Mr. Wilfirth recalled that he was affectionately nicknamed by one resident, Juan Montoya, "El maestro de la yaca pinta" (the spotted cow). "Everyone in Hondo," he said, "is extremely proud of the progress the Hondo community has made through the years."

Mrs. Thomason Insall, librarian of Socorro, was another guest introduced by Mr. Montes. Mrs. Insall followed Mrs. Coe and was superintendent of the Hondo school for two years. "Mr. Montes was a freshman then," she said, "and because of his outstanding talent, I urged him to go on with his education and come back to Hondo to lead the school." Mrs. Insall first came to Hondo as a high school girl. Her mother was postmaster and her father operated the Tittsworth store. In conclusion, she said she would like to give a flag for the new building's flagpole, in honor of her parents.

### Five Men Pay Stiff Fines for Game Violations

Pleading guilty in justice of the peace court in Carrizozo last Saturday morning to a game violation charge, four men were fined a total of \$950, plus costs. Their arrests grew out of the illegal killing of a cow elk and a bull elk on the Willis Lovelace ranch between Carrizozo and Corona.

The men were Cpl. Henry Belk of Carrizozo, Charles White of Vaughn and Sgt. Frank Marr and Raymond Phares of Carrizozo. A fifth man, J. P. Aguilar of Tecolote, was fined \$250 for the possession of illegal deer meat.

The fines were assessed by Justice of the Peace Clarence E. Shaw at the conclusion of a morning's hearings in Carrizozo. The case attracted statewide attention and investigation was conducted for several days before a number of State officials were able to piece together several conflicting accounts of what happened.

Present at the hearing Saturday morning were State Game Warden Bill Humphries; Walter Kegel, assistant to the State's attorney general; Ray Bell, chief of law enforcement, State Game Department; Roe Meyer, U. S. Game Management of Roswell; Sheriff W. G. Bradley; Justice of the Peace Shaw, Willis Lovelace, Attorney H. Elfred Jones, and a number of others. Mr. Jones was engaged as counsel by Mr. Aguilar.

Appearing before Justice of the Peace Shaw, the men entered a plea of guilty to the following charges: Belk (2 charges), illegal killing of a cow elk and illegal killing of a bull elk. Marr, Phares and White were charged in separate complaints of aiding and abetting a violation, possession of illegal elk meat. Aguilar was charged with the illegal possession of deer meat.

Mr. Lovelace discovered the violation Monday morning. The same elk were killed in a pasture not far from his home. The pair was so tame they would eat cigarettes from his hand. Mr. Lovelace reported the killing to Game Warden Humphries and the investigation began at once. Assistant District Attorney Kegel, at the trial, summarized events before and after the elk were killed, as follows:

**BULL ELK PROTECTS MATE**  
Mr. Belk, a soldier, hunting for the first time, became separated from the rest of the group. He came upon the cow elk and emptied his gun. He was chased up a tree by the bull elk but finally scared the animal away and went down the road still lost. He came to the section house at Tecolote and told Mr. White that he had killed what he thought was an elk.

Belk borrowed an 8 mm. gun from Mr. Aguilar and went back and shot the bull elk. Later, White, Marr and Phares helped Belk dress out the cow elk. They could not find the wounded bull elk. (It was not until Thursday that Mr. Lovelace located the bull elk, nearly dead.)

The meat of the cow elk was dumped in the Carrizozo cemetery. Mr. Kegel said it was difficult to determine the exact guilt of each person involved. White, he said, was involved in both the deer violation and the elk violation. "Aguilar set a bad example for his young son. Sgt. Marr and Phares were a little less guilty in degree than the rest. In no event should a small fine be levied."

After a 10-minute recess Justice of the Peace Shaw assessed the following fines: Belk, \$200 on each of two counts; White, \$250; Aguilar, \$250; Marr and Phares, \$150 each. A total of \$25 court costs was also assessed.

The elk were from a herd of approximately 75 established on the Lovelace range lands by the State Game Department. Mr. Lovelace has taken a personal interest in the herd and has bought several elk to add to the foundation herd. They have done well and the present herd has grown out of about 30 animals originally placed there. Part of them were secured from the Wyoming Game Department in exchange for wild turkeys.

### RAMBLIN' AROUND

An informational booklet issued by Northrop Aircraft Inc. of Hawthorne, Calif., describes some of the operations of the Radio Controlled Airplane Target School, Fort Bliss, of which the Oscura and Red Canyon Range Camps are important parts. An article says of Oscura: "Oscura Range Camp, located some ten miles west of Oscura, N. M., is the operational base of the 1st GM Group (RCAT Section). Their mission is to provide targets for Nike 'packages' or groups-in-training, and regular units, which fire on the targets from the Red Canyon Range Camp located about 1000 yards north. Because of a shortage of day range time (Holloman and White Sands are both very active during the day) night firing has become a necessity.

"Under the capable direction of Lt. Wm. F. Borm, the group has conducted a tireless operation, already exceeding this year the 653 flights they made in 1954.

"Targets are usually recovered the following day. Lava beds in this area make recovery difficult since they will break through under the weight of a man. Lt. Borm has been employing a helicopter to retrieve targets from the lava bed."

They have just completed a new grade school building, the equal of any in the state. It's been a long pull, getting their educational plant finished. In his dedication remarks last Thursday, Superintendent Fermin S. Montes reviewed the history of public education in Lincoln County. It is reprinted below:

### History of the Schools of Lincoln County and the Hondo Valley

The year 1891 was supposedly the beginning of education in Territorial New Mexico. Prior to 1891 many attempts had been made to provide some type of education for those who wanted it. After 1891 people felt that real progress had been made as they tried to provide education for the masses. To those early educators, we owe a great deal for their efforts in providing some type of schooling for their boys and girls.

It may be of interest to the people of Lincoln County to know that it was 1909 when the first high school course was inaugurated in Lincoln County in the town of Carrizozo. One teacher was employed to do high school work. In 1912 the legislature gave the counties the right to establish high schools.

The first county high school established in Lincoln County was opened in Captain in 1912 with 12 pupils. This was known as the Lincoln County High School. The A.D.A. had increased to 35 by 1924 when five teachers were employed. At the same time that these efforts were going on for high school education in Lincoln County, the little town of Lincoln had established a two-year high school in 1921, with an enrollment of 48. The A.D.A. for 1925 was 20.

Beginning in 1922, Lincoln had a three-year high school until the close of the 1930-31 school term when the A. D. A. had dropped to nine. After this term the students were transported to Carrizozo in the spring of 1933. J. W. Wilfirth, who was principal of the Hondo School, asked for additional money to employ one high school teacher for the year 1933-34. His request was granted; thus, began the high school instruction in Hondo. Four teachers were employed.

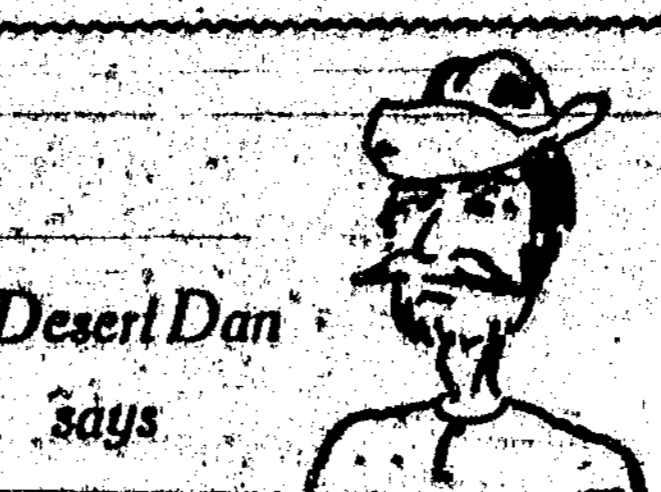

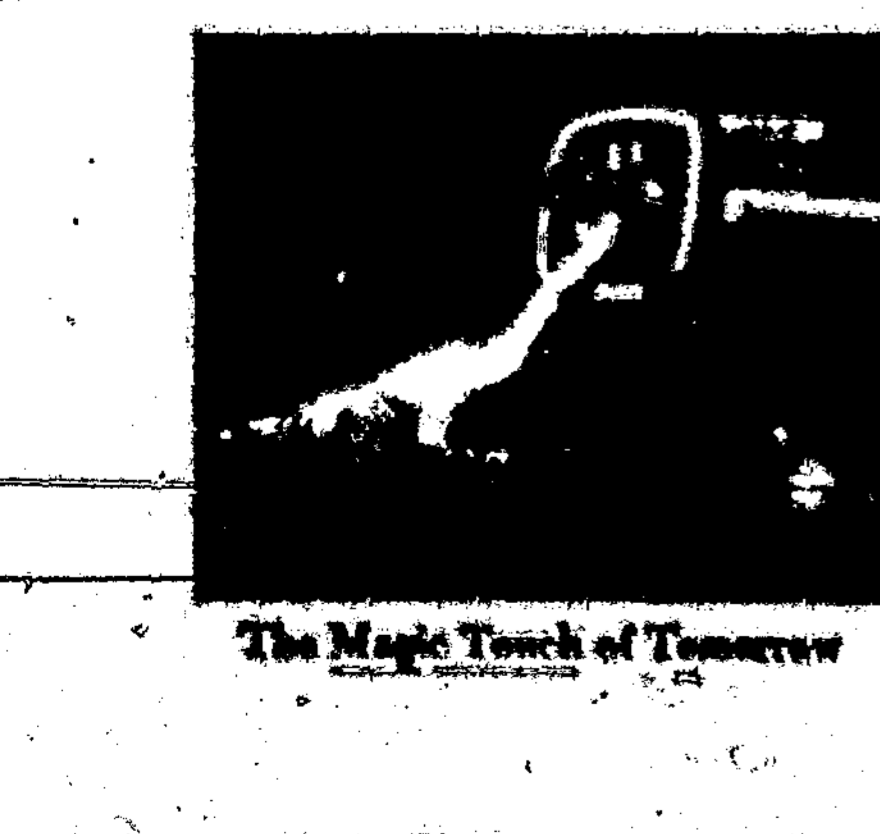

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# THE FOLKLORE CORNER

## SCHOOL DAYS IN WHITE OAKS

A small, four-page souvenir, with an American flag on the first page, which bears the words "White Oaks Public School, White Oaks, N. M., May 10, 1900." is a prized possession of Mrs. E. E. Lemon of Carrizozo. It is her report card for the year she finished high school.

The second page indicates how tough school was in 1900: "The figures opposite the subjects represent the average standing. 100 denotes perfect, 95 excellent, 90 good, 85 fair, less than 80 not satisfactory."

A pupil who made less than 80 in a subject had to take it over again, Mrs. Lemon said. Most of the teachers were from the East and required real studying by their pupils.

Mrs. Lemon's standings for the final year were: Spelling 87; writing 96; arithmetic 90; grammar 90; U. S. history 89; physiology 93; algebra 93.

Two in the White Oaks class of 1900 went to New Mexico A&M College. They were William Gallacher, (now a rancher near Carrizozo, and Mrs. Ruth Martin, now of Lincoln. But those in the class who stayed in White Oaks also got two years of college work through the unique plan of E. S. Coombs, the

principal, who was from Illinois. At his suggestion the two students attending A&M sent a list of subjects they were studying and the courses were given for those who wanted to take them. Regular school was over at 3 p.m. The college classes were taught from 3 to 5 p.m. The "extension course" continued for two years.

White Oaks students who got two years of college at home were beaides Mrs. Lemon: Richard Hamilton; Pearl Keith; Jeanette Lee; Nellie McMains; Roy Treat; Mabel Walsh; Gussita Kastler; Colbert McMains; Julian Taylor and Ethel Walsh.

Mrs. R. E. Lemon of Carrizozo, who grew up in White Oaks, used to ride the milk route with her father in 1888. They would be on the route before sunup to sell milk at the mines and in White Oaks.

Capt. Lee drove a hack and delivered his milk from 10-gal. cans by quart and pint dippers. The price was five cents a quart. The dairyman had regular customers, and most of them bought milk by the half gallon and gallon. He milked more than a dozen cows.

Sanitary regulations would not permit that kind of delivery today. But, says Mrs. Lemon, "no one ever died of germs."

ployed to teach grades 1 through 8. The A. D. A. for the year 1924-25 was 11. By 1925-26, the average daily attendance had reached 20, and the high school became a two-year accredited high school until 1930-31 when the high school became a four-year accredited high school.

All the grades—1 through 12—were taught in the four rooms which constitute the present old Hondo Elementary School, and in which classes were taught for the last time on Friday, Nov. 11, 1926.

In 1925-26 Picacho offered one year of high school work but the A.D.A. was only seven. The school was not accredited, and was therefore dropped at the end of that year. One person who is still living in the Picacho community was a teacher in the early part of the 19th century, and taught school in lower Huidoso, San Patricio, and Sunset.

He is W. E. Kimbrell. Prior to his teaching, all of the instruction, except for private tutoring was done in Spanish. Mr. Kimbrell, however, started instruction in English.

Two rooms of the old Hondo Elementary School were built with money from the first bond ever to be sold for the purpose

of school construction. The bond was sold in 1902 to the late J. V. Tully, Sr. of Glencoe. Later the two other rooms were added to this first building. Captain, however, had voted bonds in the amount of \$2500 in 1901. This was the beginning of a feeling of responsibility on the part of the public for taxing themselves to construct school buildings.

The people who served as superintendents of the Hondo School, beginning in 1923 to November, 1943, when I became superintendent, are J. W. Wilferth, now of Springer, N. M.; Mrs. Louise H. Coe, of Glencoe; Mrs. Azella T. Insall, of Socorro; the late A. M. Freeman; S. G. Hester, of Tucson, Ariz.; and Ralph Herrick, whose address I do not know.

In 1935, under Mr. Freeman as superintendent, the Hondo High School became an independent district, after which bonds were voted, and a new high school was built. In the fall of 1948, the students moved into the present high school building. During that year the enrollment was 65. In 1951 the State Board of Education divided Lincoln County into five school districts, and this first building, Captain, did away with the superintendent of schools in Lincoln County. At that time our district became what is now known as the Hondo Valley Public Schools, under the direction of a five-man school board. Our present school district, No. 20, includes Picacho, Arabela, Bluewater, Tinkle, Hondo, and San Patricio. At present there are 20 teachers, a librarian, and a clerical assistant in the Hondo Valley Public Schools. There are six buses in operation in our district. These buses are owned and operated by Mrs. A. N. Kimbrell, Manuel Montoya, Ben Sanchez, Pedro Salcido, Eloy Torres and Tom Babers. Our buildings are cared for by four custodians—Mike Maez, Mauro Sanchez, Pablo Montoya and Dan Salas. This year the enrollment in the high school—grades 9 through 12—has reached 124. In the elementary grades—1 through 8—the enrollment is 278.
