Town Trustees and Citizens Discuss Sanitation Matters

Problems of sanitation, city beautification and a discussion of the municipal swimming pool were taken up at a special meeting called last Thursday evening by the Carrizozo town trustees.

Present at the meeting and taking part in the discussion were Mayor Marvin H. Roberts, trustees Clifford R. Zumwalt and R. L. Sherrill and H. G. Walk, utilities manager...

Mayor Roberts said the trustees would work with every organization to do something about removal of the dump, the garbage pickup situation and cleaning up the town generally.

STATE BUYING OUT OF CONTROL

SANTA FE, Dec. 13—A year and a half ago an officer at the state mental hospital was caught buying lumber in lots of slightly less than \$200 in what was assumed to be a dodge of the state purchasing law requiring competitive bidding on purchases above \$200.

He was killed and dragged through the courts for months on a criminal accusation before going free on a legal technicality. Joe Valdez, the one who had all the trouble, must be thinking now that he was born a couple of years too soon.

Now the institutions and even the state purchasing office are not only ignoring the \$200 limit but are making purchases up to \$1000 without so much as an informal inquiry on prices. AGENT IGNORES HIS OWN RULE

A 1935 law set up the opening for the break-down of policy. It provided for advertising and formal bidding on purchases in excess of \$1000 but set no rules for purchases at lower levels. The old law, which some lawyers think is still effective, required three price quotations on purchases between \$200 and \$500 and at least three sealed bids on purchases between \$500 and \$1000.

The purchasing office distributed a memorandum early this year asking that the old procedure be followed on all smaller purchases but Purchasing Agent Charles Horn hasn't followed his own instructions.

The largest beneficiary of the break-down of competitive buying is Mayor Paul Huss of Santa Fe who is also state treasurer of the Democratic party and a dealer in office supplies. His business with the state jumped from \$34,000 last year to more than \$120,000 in the first 11 months of 1935 with most of it consisting of sales without competitive bidding or sales in which his bid was not the lowest offered.

Perhaps the strangest thing to come up in state buying in recent months was the purchase of supplies for the September special election. The state board of finance decided to bypass the purchasing law and authorized the Valliant Printing Co. of Albuquerque to prepare the supplies at a cost not to exceed \$17,000.

The action also bypassed State Secretary Natalie Buck who is supposed to have charge of election matters. Apparently miffed, she expressed the opinion that the \$17,000 maximum quoted by Valliant was too high and asked that the job be opened to public bidding.

The bids that came in indicated she was right. Valliant bid \$6500, Ward Anderson of Albuquerque was a couple of a hundred lower and the Bronson firm of Las Cruces offered to do the job for about half the Valliant figure. It wound up by Valliant getting the job at much less than half the original estimate but well above the prices offered by others.

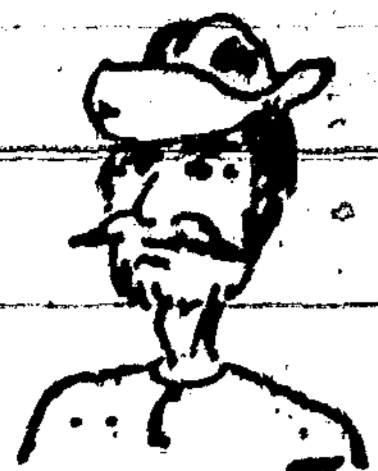
TOM MCGRATH HAS 'EM WORRIED Tom McGrath of San Miguel who wears a green chili pepper on his lapel on St. Patrick's day has become a source of worry to several state officials who will be seeking renomination next spring. McGrath of Spanish lineage and Irish name has been a strong and dangerous competitor in the past. He was barely nosed out of nomination for auditor in 1930 by Bob Castner in the Demo primary, and has made other strong but losing runs.

This time he has campaigned as never before. He has been on the road practically full time for five months organizing and agitating welfare department clients on one hand and warning Spanish American residents on the other that they are about to be excluded from state affairs. When the rumor was spread in Santa Fe the other day that he was plotting to run against Joe Montoya for lieutenant governor it wasn't 24 hours until he received a flattering commission from Acting Governor Montoya as a colonel aide de camp on the governor's staff and a friendly, sweet letter.

Also on the worrying seat is Auditor Jim Hannah. Most everybody around the statehouse thinks McGrath will file against Hannah if no other gets in the race. And there's also talk of McGrath getting in the corporation commission run against

**School Maintenance Cash Reserve Up**

School maintenance cash reserves increased almost \$2.5 million, from \$11,964,585 to \$14,426,426 during the fiscal year ended June 30, 1955, according to the Taxpayers Association of New Mexico.

For the current school year maintenance fund budgets increased \$1 million, from \$44,253,882 to \$45,273,465. Total budgets, including school district direct levies and debt service, increased almost \$6 million from \$54,374,439 to \$60,115,331.

Although there was budgeted \$49,896,016 for current maintenance and operation, actual expenditures last year totaled only \$43,925,807 for current operation. This year's budgets for the maintenance and direct charge funds total \$54,744,073, which means that estimated expenditures for the current school year are 24.6% higher than actual, compared to an estimated increase in enrollment of about 10%.

Included in the budget total is \$2.8 million of emergency funds, which is used only if enrollment exceeds estimates to the point that additional teachers are needed.

**State Farm Bureau Takes Stand on Educational Issues**

(Resolutions—Continued)  
 Federal Aid to Education—We oppose federal aid to education of the type that would result, directly or indirectly, in the subjection of school systems to control by the Federal government.

Kindergarten in Public Schools. Whereas, present schools are over-crowded, and whereas, there is a lack of finances to operate the state school system. Now, therefore, be it resolved, that the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau go on record as opposing kindergartens until such time as this situation can be corrected.

Policy to Act Upon Educational Issues—Farmers and ranchers pay substantial amounts in taxes for the support of the pub-

lic school system. Their children form a substantial portion of the students who are enrolled in our public schools. The basic purpose of Farm Bureau is "to promote, protect and represent the business, economic, social and educational interests of the American farm and ranch people, and to develop agriculture." We feel justified, therefore, in setting forth the following general policy in regard to educational issues.

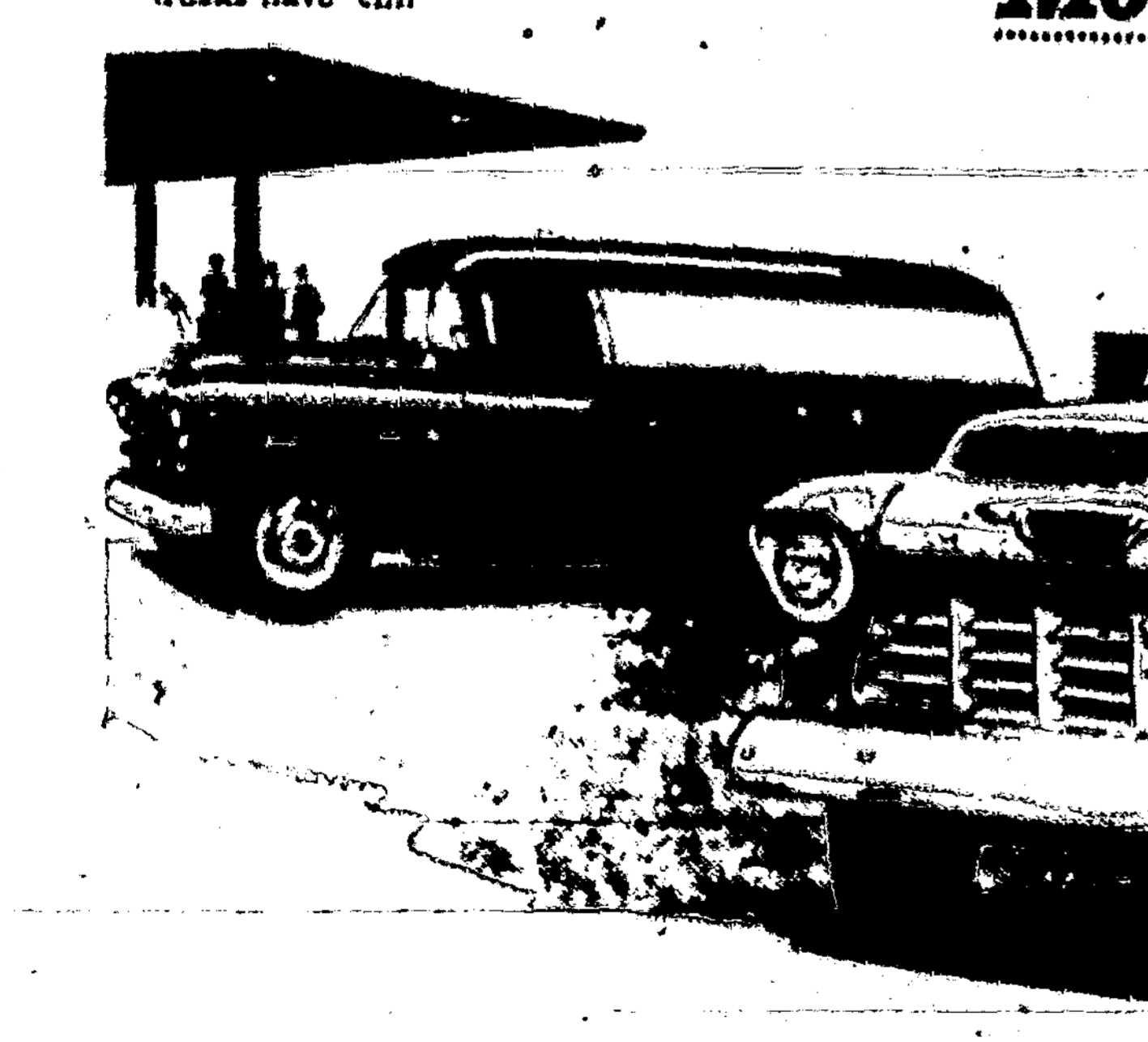

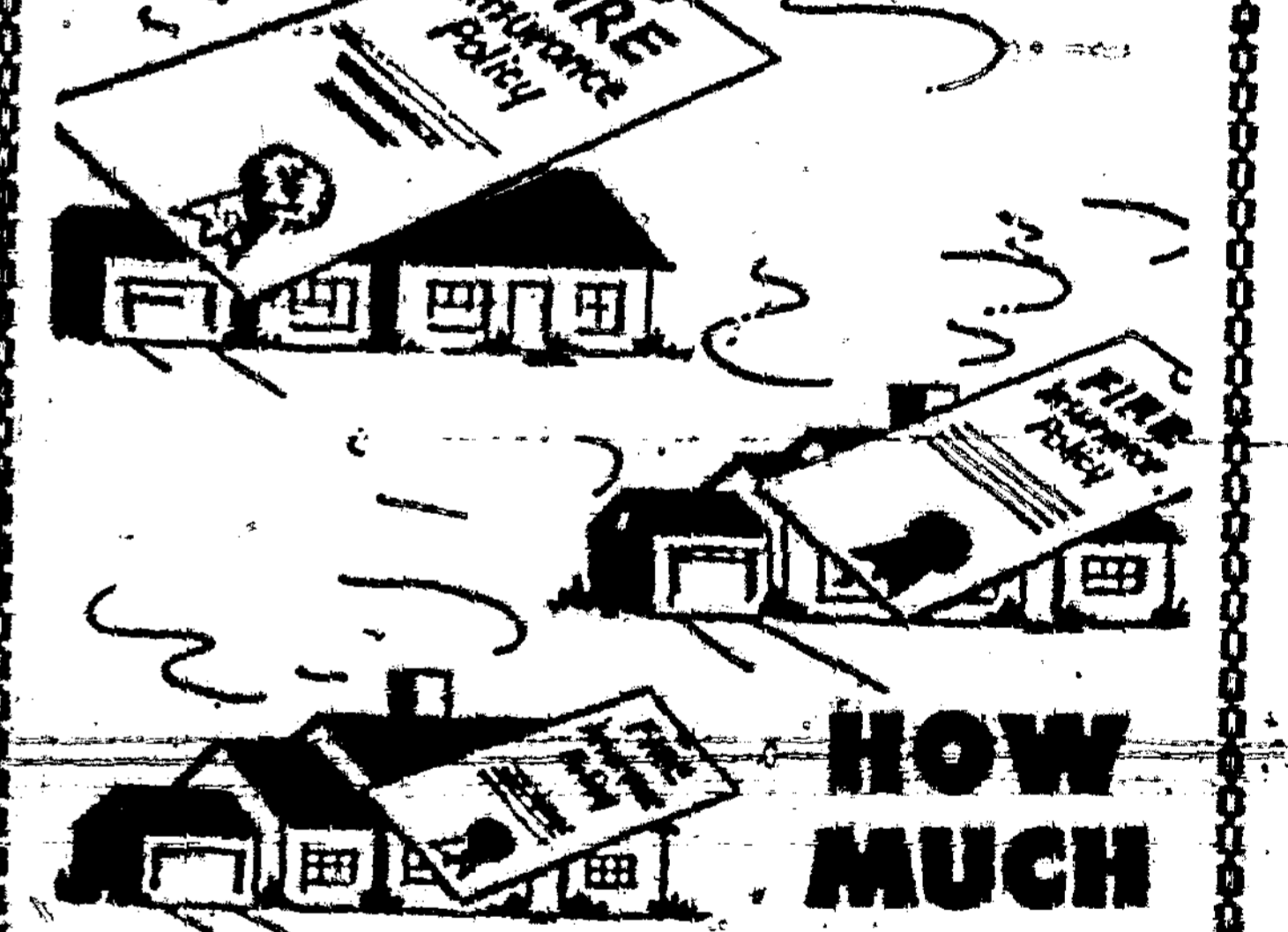

# THE FOLKLORE CORNER

## THE LEGEND OF SHIPROCK

The legend of Shiprock was told to John Arrington Sr. of Farmington by a Navajo medicine man in a hogan. This is the legend as Arrington recalls it.

After the Navajos first settled in Northern New Mexico about 400 years ago, torrential rains fell for many days and they were forced to retreat to high ground.

From their land, flooded by the great rains, the Navajos took melon, squash and corn seeds, two or three goats, and a sheep or two. They started to climb Shiprock, the famous landmark in Northwestern New Mexico, and finally the rising waters forced them to the top of the mountain.

Soon the waters washed up Mon Hee, the Coyote, and Shice the Bear. The animals were friendly to the Navajos, and although the Coyote and the Bear tried to molest the sheep and goats, they were easily shooed away.

And then the flood waters washed a fighting mad sea monster onto Shiprock. The monster attacked the Navajos and tried to kill them. The Coyote and the Bear joined in the fight on the side of the Navajos, and the sea monster was killed. From that time the Navajos will not kill a bear or coyote, and they claim they can talk with these animals.

## THE STORE THAT NEVER OPENED

The storekeeper of the Alamogordo shops of the El Paso and Northern Railroad suspected that the head painter was using

too much paint because the amount taken out of stock far exceeded any visible applications. He reported his suspicions to G. H. Haynes, then a special agent for the railroad. The case occurred about 1905.

Haynes' investigation showed that the head painter was preparing to go into business for himself at the railroad's expense. After Haynes arrested the fellow, he found \$1,150 worth of paint stored in several houses in town, including the culprit's home.

Haynes traced the head painter's business enterprise to Estancia, then a new town. The fellow had rented a store there and was planning to open for business with the stolen paint. None of the paint had yet been taken to Estancia.

The paint thief was kept in jail about a week. A straw bond (a bail system under which a person says he will go bond so that the prisoner can be released) was fixed up. The fellow skipped to Mexico and was never heard of again in Alamogordo.

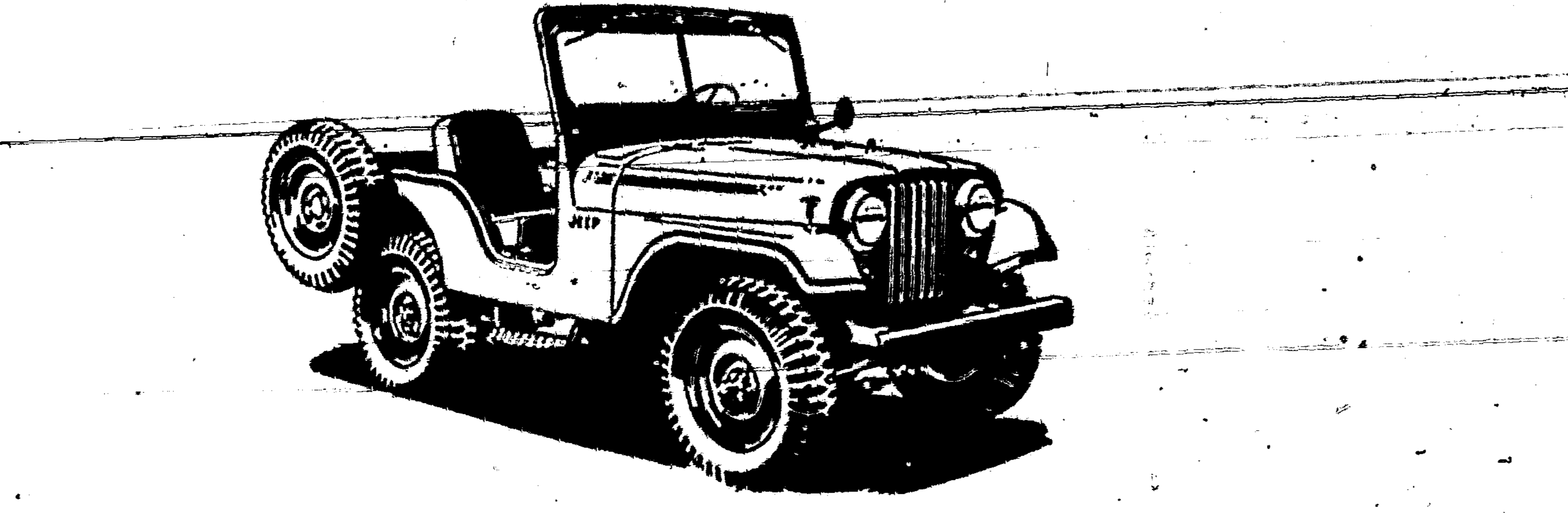

## Agriculture Offers

### Nine 4-H Clubbers Start Calf Feeding

Nine 4-Hers in Lincoln County have started their beef calf projects for next year.

These 4-H members will need to feed that calf so that he will put on plenty of finish. Remember, a beef calf needs about two pounds of concentrates each day for every 100 pounds he weighs, to fatten right.

Start your calf off slowly. Begin feeding him the first day with plenty of good roughage—alfalfa hay, prairie hay, or ground bundles. Try about four to five pounds of the roughage and plenty of fresh water—nothing else. For the next few days, give him all the roughage he will eat. Then, add one-half pound of cottonseed meal and oats to his roughage. Keep feeding him this mixture for the next few days and increase gradually to one pound.

After a week start adding grain to the mixture of roughage and meal. After two weeks, start cutting down on the amount of roughage you feed him, if he does not clean up his grain, and add just a little more grain each day. By the end of five weeks, your calf should be eating one pound of cottonseed meal, five to six pounds of grain, and eight to nine pounds of roughage every day. But if he leaves some of the grain after he has finished eating, cut down on the amount of roughage you feed him the next day.

In choosing the right ration for your calf, check the suggestions in Extension Circular No. 239, entitled "Your 4-H Beef Calf." You can get a copy of this circular free from the county extension office in the courthouse, if you do not already have it.

The J. Moran is a high-yielding oblate-shaped tomato which holds its size well during the harvest season. The fruit remains firm when ripe, but possesses rather large cores. This variety is recommended for the green wrap trade and for the canneries.

Earlypak is another high-yielding variety with firm fruit of medium size and globular shape. This variety is highly recommended for the fresh market trade.

The Wisconsin 55 produces large oblate shaped fruit and is recommended for the production of fruit for local fresh markets.

The Early Garden State, which bears good colored medium-sized fruit, globular in shape, shows promise for fresh market trade.

And the Manalucie, a new disease-resistant variety produces a vigorous plant. Its fruit is medium to small and oblong in shape.

national matters. We shall continue to examine and to evaluate public school laws and the administration of such laws. We propose to recommend changes in such laws and in their administration whenever we feel that such changes will strengthen the school system. We offer our assistance in the formulation of constructive policies and programs that are beneficial to our school system, our children, and to the taxpayer. We will oppose developments that we regard as detrimental to our school system. We will particularly oppose any school activity or program that we believe to be un-American or partisan in nature. We favor renewed and continued emphasis on courses of instruction throughout the entire educational system which will further understanding and appreciation of the American free enterprise system.

Voting For Rural School Superintendents — Be it resolved that we go on record as favoring legislation permitting only qualified voters in rural districts to vote in elections for rural school superintendents.

Course in Home Management — Whereas, the welfare of our country depends upon sound management, and Whereas, many of our young people embarking upon a marital career do not understand the problems facing them, Now, therefore, be it resolved and Recommended that a course in Home Management be offered to all high school students.

Commercial Truck Traffic. — Heavy trucks are inflicting great damage upon many of our highways. Truckers insist upon using secondary roads that were not originally constructed for this type of traffic. In addition, some drivers of commercial trucks fail to show proper respect for traffic laws and operate their vehicles in a manner that endangers other types of traffic. We urge the New Mexico truck routes designed to remove truck traffic from roads that were not intended to accommodate vehicles of that type.

We ask County Farm Bureaus and Livestock Bureaus to undertake a correction of this situation; to insist upon rigid enforcement of speed laws; to request that truck lanes, or pull out spots, be provided on grades where trucks impede traffic; to study experience gained by other states in connection with the use of a ton-mile tax on truck traffic; and to promote the passage of legislation that will lower gross weight limitations and that will designate definite roads to conduct safety campaigns urging all farmers to use safety hitchers when pulling farm trailers and to paint striped lines on the rear of trailers, with luminous paint.

Excise Tax for Hauling — Since farmers who haul their own products are not required to pay an excise tax and farmers who hire hauling pay an excise tax, this appears to show discrimination.

Therefore, Be it Resolved that the excise tax of 3% on trucking and 6% on railroad freight be abolished on raw agricultural products.

**Recommendations on Highways**

A. Farm to Market Roads — We urge the State Highway Commission to give more consideration to the construction of secondary roads.

We believe that no primary road should be changed to a Federal Aid Secondary Road in order to acquire Federal Aid Secondary money.

B. Littering of Highways — We urge the State Highway Department to study ways of implementing the present law as regards littering of highway rights of way.

C. Adequate Roads Amendment — Whereas, highways and highway transportation are indispensable to the agricultural, economic and social development of New Mexico and the nation as a whole, and Whereas, the improper use of special highway revenues in various states has resulted in many miles of needed highways not being built and deterioration of many roads in which the people have a huge investment, and Whereas, year after year attempts have been made in the New Mexico Legislature to divert taxes levied for highways to other than their intended purpose, and Whereas, any departure from the state's present wise policy of using special highway taxes for highways only would discriminate unfairly against the motor vehicle taxpayer and would be detrimental to the improvement of the state's highway system, and Whereas, the only certain protection against the raiding of road revenue, lies in a constitutional amendment prohibiting diversion, and Whereas, the highways users' organization of New Mexico are sponsoring an Adequate Roads Amendment to the Constitution to protect state, county and city highways funds for all time, and Whereas, the highway users' organization are also sponsoring

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a long range highway program based upon the sufficiency ratings of highways from which a priority system of highway construction can be developed thereby, insuring the construction of the most needed roads first, and the issuance of easy to read yearly reports showing the past construction and the contemplated construction of highways, now

Therefore, Be it Resolved that the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau in convention assembled at Las Cruces, New Mexico November 28 to 30 heartily endorses these proposals and pledges the cooperation of its officers and members to do everything possible to secure the enactment of these proposals at the coming 1957 session of the State Legislature.

D. Rural and Farmstead Turnouts — Whereas, some of the highways in the State of New Mexico are so constructed that it is dangerous to rural route carriers as they cannot get off pavement to service rural boxes, Be it Resolved, that Farm Bureau go on record as requiring the State Highway Department to provide that rural route and farmstead turnouts on all future contracts be paved for protection to all.

E. Raising of Minimum Requirements — We recommend that the minimum requirements for both material and workmanship be raised on our state and federal highways and that closer inspections be kept during construction.

F. Warning Signs on Open Ranges — We recommend that warning signs be used in all open ranges to warn motorists of cattle. There are many open ranges now existing without warning signs, especially on secondary roads.

G. Condition of Highways — We recommend that the State Highway Department be required to keep closer check on the condition of highways and eliminate the many dangerous dips and chug holes; also that in flood season they be on the job to put flares on dips running water.
