Some say that Christmas is becoming too commercialized; that the deep spiritual significance of Christmas is overshadowed by materialism. It is a time when friends write to friends whom they may not have heard from since last Christmas; it is a time that brings goodwill to men and joy to little children. Information on Social Security Available in Carrizozo Dec. 29

Miss Ruth Penfield, Claims Representative of the Roswell Social Security Administration office, will be in Carrizozo, Thursday morning, Dec. 29, to assist local residents in making application for old-age or survivors insurance benefits and to give general information concerning the Social Security Act.

She will be at the office of the New Mexico Department of Public Welfare in the Court House, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 12 noon.

According to Miss Penfield, over 70 million people are now insured under the Federal social security program. Therefore, it is important that the Social Security Administration be notified when a worker dies; retires between ages 65 and 72; and when he reaches age 72 regardless of retirement.

A person does not need to retire after age 72 to collect social security payments, but he does have to file an application for those benefits. That is true also for both retirement benefits and survivor benefits. Payments do not start automatically.

If a person delays more than 12 months after he could become entitled to payments, he will lose some monthly payments that might have been received.

The mailing address of the Roswell Social Security Office is simply "Social Security Administration, Roswell, New Mexico."

Car with Narcotics Stopped at Duran

The alertness of a gasoline station attendant in Carrizozo resulted in the arrest last Friday of three men suspected of running narcotics.

Vestal Means, on duty at the Texaco station west of town, had been given the description of the car which law enforcement officers in the Southwest had been looking for for two days.

When the 1955 Ford Fairlane, with three passengers, drove into the station at 9:15 p. m., Vestal recognized it as the one sought. The men bought cigarettes and coffee and while they were drinking the latter, he contacted Zane Lalle and Kenneth Means.

Officer Fay Harkey and the sheriff's office were alerted; also W. H. Rickerson at his service station at Highway 390 and 54. Mr. Rickerson saw the car cross the intersection and head north on 54 at 9:32. Sheriff Bradley, Deputy Sheriff Albert Vega and Officer Harkey set out in pursuit and were within two miles of the car when it was stopped at a roadblock in Duran by State Patrolman Charles Anaya.

The men offered no resistance. They were brought back to Carrizozo and identified as Leopoldo Olgun, 24, of Denver; J. B. Mingo, 23, of Denver and Toby Anthony Gallegos, 22, of Englewood, Colo.

Heroin valued at \$900 in its raw state, was found in a front panel of the car, left of the instrument panel. Charges of possession of narcotics were filed against the men.

The arrest had a bizarre ending for one of the men. The following morning Olgun was found dead in the bullpen. He had hanged himself with a belt. The Shaw Mortuary this week shipped his body to Denver, where he had a wife and four children.

Gallegos and Mingo have had a preliminary hearing in Alamogordo and are being held under \$5000 bond each. They have been ordered held for Federal action on the narcotics charge.

Fruitgrowers Favor Advertising Fund

At a meeting of a committee of county fruit growers Monday in Hondo the growers decided to favor the voluntary contribution of one cent per packed box of fruit towards advertising funds for New Mexico fruit. The views of this committee will be taken to the State Fruit Committee in Albuquerque on January 16.

In the discussion led by Graf-ton Henry, the group decided they would like to have additional demonstration plots on alfalfa varieties and fruit spray control.

Other suggestions coming out of the meeting were that a fruit production estimate, as accurate as possible, be made in Lincoln County, as well as other areas in the state. By this means, they would be able to attract a larger number of buyers. Along with this it is hoped to have a weekly report on the amount of fruit left for sale in the area.

The group was in favor of having a demonstration of a rotary cutter and its use in orchard prunings, and suggested that a meeting be held about the middle of March.

A. T. Pflingsten, who had just returned from an apple growers meeting in the state of Washington, gave the group a few of his experiences, as well as information he had gathered in that area.

He also said that the growers of fruit trees were using a rotary cutter to clear the orchards instead of a mower, as the shredder chopped all top grasses and weeds, instead of leaving them laying loosely about.

He also said the fruit trees were hurt considerably by an early freeze in November that would likely set fruit production back several years in some areas of the Northwest.

Kennecott Will Sell Its Houses to Employees

Hurley, N. M. — In order to make its housing units available for purchase by employees on reasonable terms, Kennecott Copper Corporation has sold its community townsites in four states to an independent realtor, C. D. Michaelson, general manager of Kennecott's Western Mining Divisions.

The sale includes housing in the towns of Santa Rita and Hurley, N. M., site of the company's Chino Mines Division.

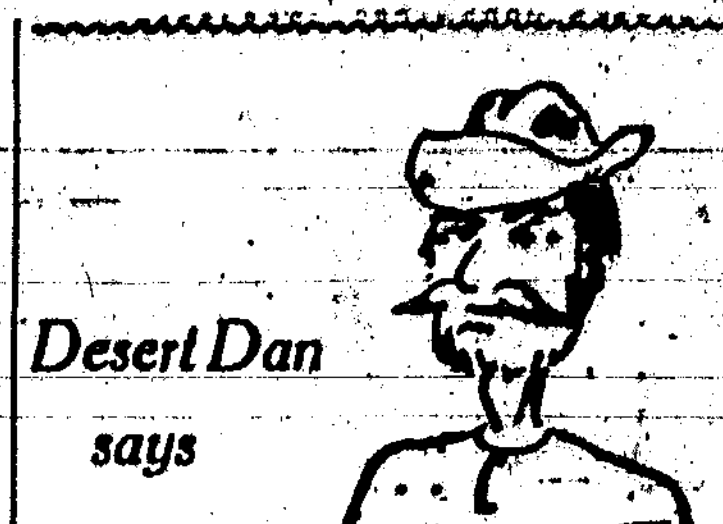
By selling its housing units and utilities, estimated to involve \$5,000,000 worth of property in New Mexico, Utah, Nevada and Arizona, Kennecott will

discontinue its role of landlord and encourage home ownership among its employees, Michaelson said.

The new owner of the townsites is John W. Galbreath and Co. of Columbus, O., which has handled numerous such housing projects in various parts of the country.

At Kennecott's Chino Mines Division, the transaction, estimated to involve around \$1,500,000, will affect residences, land and community facilities in Hurley and Santa Rita, according to W. H. Goodrich, Chino general manager.

Before sale of the houses gets underway, Galbreath will station representatives in Santa Rita and Hurley to consult with prospective buyers.

He spoke of the part taken by the Spanish and Mexican people in making the history of Lincoln County; their stability and customs, their love and charity and their Catholicity. Fr. Villafranca spoke of the badge of the Holy Name, of the formal ceremony of induction and its aim: To build a strong faith in God and Country. He praised the beauty of Lincoln County, its peaceful ways, its large families and few delinquents. He asked the men to join the Holy Name Society and to make resound in the St. Rita Parish the words of a pious man:

"To a higher shrine of love divine My lowly feet have trod I ask for fame no other name Than this, a Child of God!"

Eleven men of the parish attended the meeting. A resolution was adopted to give a Christmas gift to the good sisters of St. Rita's school. The meeting closed with the Holy Name prayer.

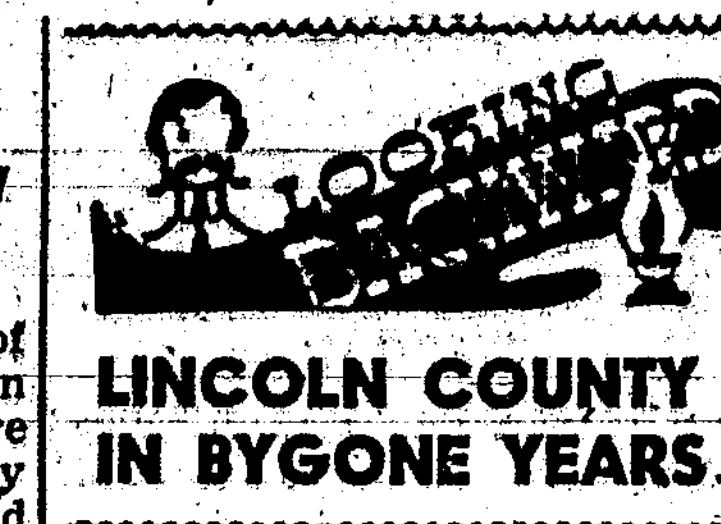
BUY UTAH PROPERTY

January is Report Month for Aliens

Washington, D. C. — Commissioner J. M. Swing announced this week the Immigration and Naturalization Service expects some 2,600,000 aliens to report their addresses in January under the 1956 Alien Address Report Program.

The Commissioner explained that under the 1952 Immigration and Nationality Act every alien in the United States must report his address to the Service each January.

More than 2,300,000 aliens filled cards last January under the program, and the figure is expected to reach more than two and one-half million in 1956.

Marcus T. Neely, district director for West Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and Colorado, said 95,046 aliens registered under the program in this district last year, and a slight increase is expected under the 1956 registration.

The Immigration spokesman pointed out that every non-citizen (except persons in diplomatic status and foreign representatives assigned to the United Nations) in the United States must report his address to the government, January each year.

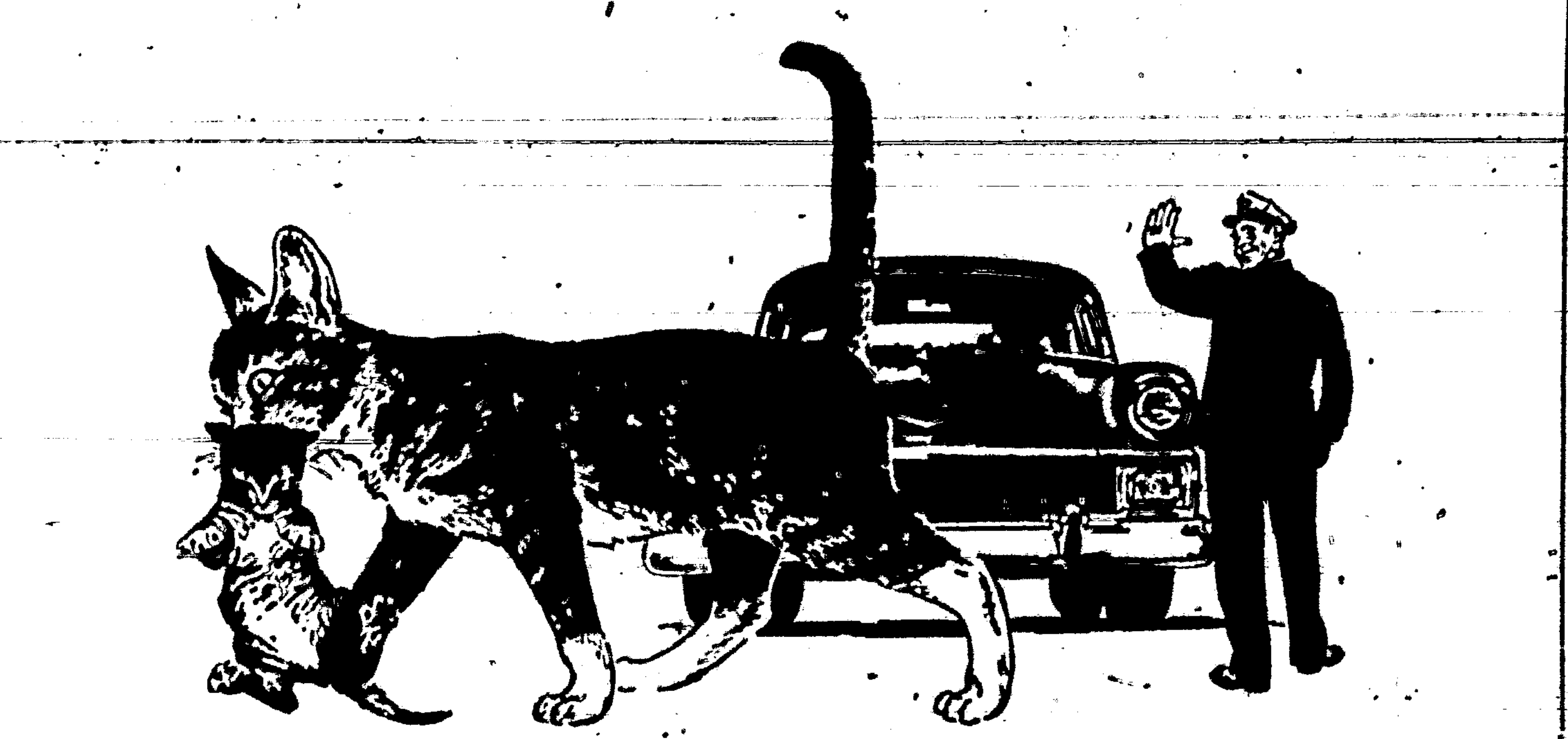
He said each alien must fill out a registration card available at U. S. Post Offices or at the nearest Immigration office.

Parents may fill out cards for their children under age 14. Legal guardians of aliens in custody, care should fill out the address reports for such persons.

Mr. Neely said any alien who is ill may send a friend or relative to obtain the address report card for him, and return the card after it is filled out.

After filling out the card at a Post Office or Immigration office the alien then gives the card to a clerk, and he has fulfilled his obligation under the Act.

The spokesman warned that any alien who willfully violates the address report provision of the law may be fined up to \$200, imprisoned for 30 days and deported.

Mink Travels Far To Please Milady

Washington — The modern mink—even before it passes on to the Park Avenue promenade, is a well-traveled little animal. A few years ago 250 of them flew the Atlantic from the United States to Norway to help stock farms there. Recently 340 entrained at Dauphin, Manitoba, bound for Newfoundland to build up the island's mink industry and thereby capitalize on a plentiful supply of whalemeat.

America's 5,000 mink farmers sold a record 2,700,000 skins last year. Wisconsin produced more than a third of the Nation's farm-raised pelts, says the National Geographic Society. Other leaders were Minnesota, Illinois, Michigan and New York.

DEMAND NOT SATISFIED
In addition, trappers marketed 100,000,000 skins, boosting the value of mink pelts to 60 per cent of all raw furs produced in the United States.

Still they didn't satisfy demand. America, the world's leading mink producer-consumer, also imported 1,800,000 skins in 1954, a new high. Of these, skins from Canada represented a little less than half the number, though three-fifths of the value, indicating their fine quality. Japanese mink, second in quantity among the imports, is much less prized because it is yellow and has to be dyed.

Before the war, fur traders imported Chinese mink and kollinsky, the Siberian mink. But both of these, like all furs from Communist countries, have been barred by Congress since 1951.

The only other foreign source today is Scandinavia. It was the Swedes who first exported the word "maenik" which became mink. The Choctaw Indians also had a word for the elegant skin a woman loves to touch; they called it "tonl." To the Germans, it is simply the "Nerz."

In America the wild mink takes to both forest and water. Sweetwater areas show a tendency to produce thicker, darker colored furs than salt water sections. From North Carolina southward pelts get thinner and redder, except near Lake Maurepas in Louisiana. There, in the presence of sweet water, the mink grows a dark coat like its northern brother's.

In the wild the omnivorous, polygamous mink is a lone roamer. Even the female, a fiercely protective mother, likes to go it alone, as soon as she releases her kits. Once a year, late in April or early in May, she pro-

duces an average litter of four. By August her brood is ready to fend for itself. Her daughters issue grandchildren the following spring—unless they are trapped.

TWO COAT CHANGES
The mink's winter fur — it changes coats at the enviable rate two a year — reaches its prime in November.

The chief interest of experimenters is in colors of pelts. Steeped in the laws of heredity, breeders in past two decades have worked up more exquisite color tones than Mendel himself could have imagined. The first mutation produced in quantity was the blue-gray platinum, trade-marked as silverblue.

Then came pastel, followed by palomino, blufrost, white, amber gold, and sapphire, the guard hair of which is a sparkling sky-blue and the underfur, a softer blue. To add to the confusion, each breeder usually dreams up his own name for the mutants so that the public has been pelted with names like breath-of-spring, green eye pastel, and half-blood (redressed as starlight).

A single sapphire pelt has brought as high as \$380 at auction. Figure 65 to 100 skins to a single coat—and there goes one man's annual bond clippings.

The average price of a farm-raised pelt today runs about \$25. A finished, full-length coat may cost from \$4,000 to \$10,000 or more. It is easy to see why, when one considers the letting-out process by which the coat is created. Each pelt is cut into tiny, 1/4-inch diagonal ribbons which are sewed into strips that run the length of the coat. Into one coat go nearly seven miles of thread and more than 700 hours of highly skilled labor.

HOW TO KEEP A COAT.
How much longer a mink pelt will travel once it reaches the back of its ultimate bearer depends on the wear and care she gives it. Fur experts advise hanging a mink coat on a heavy, shoulder-shaped hanger in a cool, roomy closet. Should it become wet, don't brush or comb. Simply shake and allow to dry away from any heat.

Sending the mink coat off for an annual cleaning and for storage in an air-conditioned vault protects the natural oils of the pelts and restores their suppleness. It also guards against the fur's most vicious enemy, the moth.

"You can always tell a furrier," one of them has said, "by his agitation in the presence of a moth. If you see a man chase a moth, in the subway for instance, you may know he is interested in the fur business."

CHRISTMAS IN SHAKESPEARE

Mrs. Emma Muir of Lordsburg spent her first New Mexico Christmas in the mining town of Shakespeare. It was 1882, and she was eight years old. Shakespeare, then a good mining town, had its big holiday event on Christmas Eve, a banquet and party in which the children took a back seat to prospectors.

Lordsburg, then was hardly more than a railroad stop, and near-by Shakespeare was the main town in what is now Hidalgo County.

As in most mining towns of the time the men greatly outnumbered the women. The children, however, were the real minority in Shakespeare. They numbered eight or more, as Mrs. Muir remembers. Her sister, Ella, was among the children.

There were many prospectors in the hills around Shakespeare at that time. People in town thought it would be fine to invite them to a Christmas Eve party. One chief purpose was to give the prospectors a chance to get away from their monotonous cooking and sit down to a real word went out to the prospec-

tors in the hills that they were invited to a Christmas Eve banquet in the restaurant of Jim Black, captain in the Territorial Militia. Happily, the prospectors trooped in. Everyone in town was invited, too.

The women in Shakespeare baked numerous pies and cakes, especially for the prospectors. One of the men in Shakespeare made a round trip of about 25 miles with wagon and team to get a Christmas tree in the Burro Mountains to set up in Captain Black's restaurant.

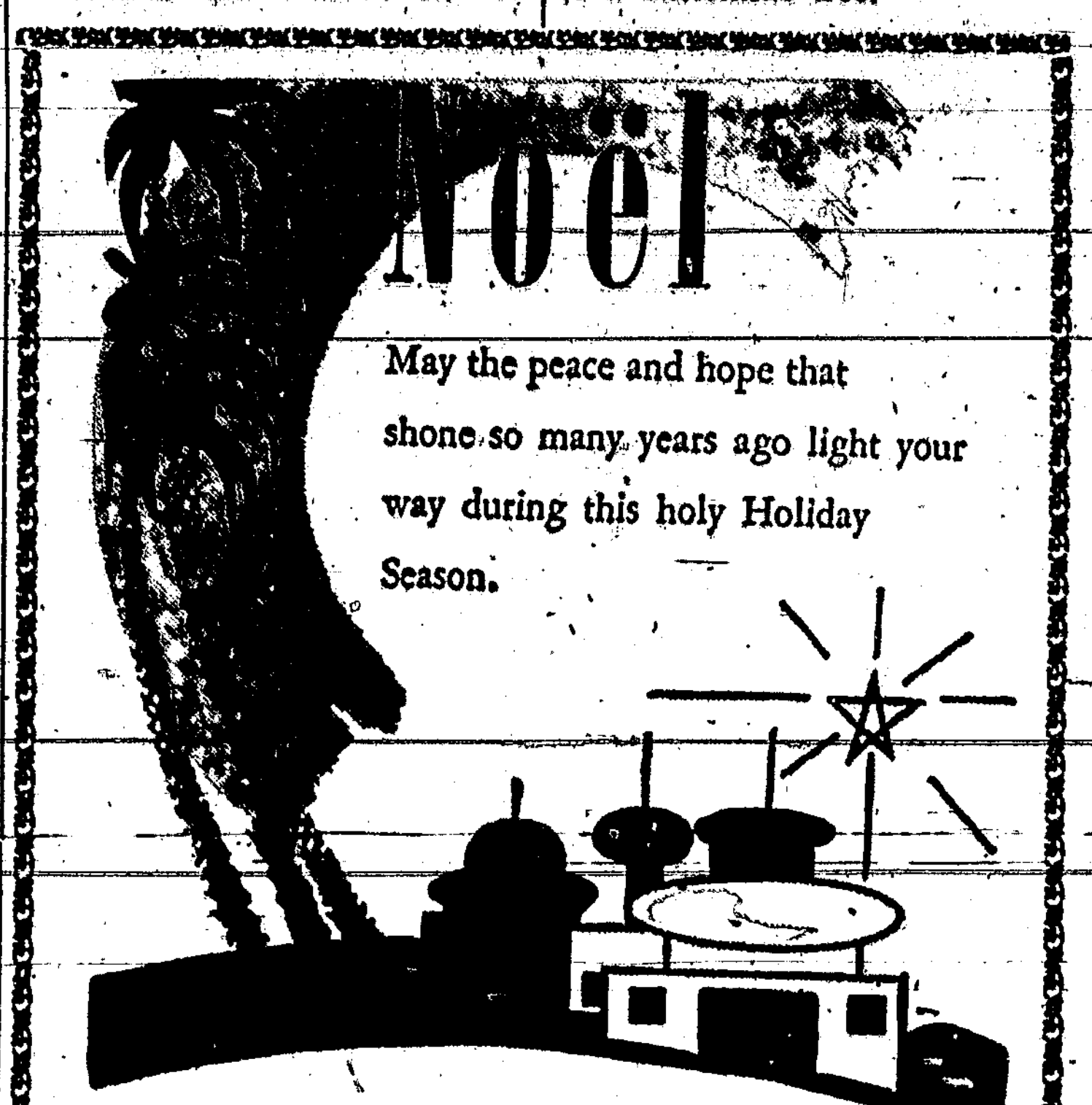

Be Sure of Your Traffic Rights: You Could Be Dead Wrong

Too many New Mexico motorists have mistaken ideas about their rights as drivers. As a result, too many of them end up in trouble with the law, losing long and costly lawsuits—or become dead wrong.

That's the opinion of an insurance executive who examines scores of accident reports each week, E. A. Hook, resident secretary for Lumbermens Mutual Casualty Company and Southwest branch manager for the Kemper Insurance group.

Hook said the vast majority of drivers involved in accidents apparently honestly believe they were in the right at the time, but investigation subsequently shows most of them were partially or completely in the wrong.

"The motorist who has erroneous conception of his rights and who drives accordingly is as much a menace on the road as the deliberate law violator," the Kemper executive asserted.

He listed a number of driving misconceptions as common in New Mexico:

1. "The Driver on the Right Always Has The Right Of Way At An Intersection."—That's incorrect, yet some drivers take for granted that the right-of-way rule protects them completely. Accordingly, they proceed thru all intersections in the belief that all cars coming from the left must yield to them. Because they keep practically no lookout to the left, they are constant hazards.

New Mexico law, Hook said, states that the car in the intersection first has the right of way. Only when two cars approach the intersection from different directions at approximately the same time does the car on the right have the right of way.

2. "Cars Have the Right of Way Over Pedestrians At Intersections Where There Are No Traffic Lights"—No, yet too many drivers apparently think so. The Kemper executive said the law gives pedestrians the right of way at ALL intersections and at ALL marked crosswalks.

Some pedestrians, too, appear to be confused about their rights from their I-dare-you-hit-me attitude. Pedestrians must yield the right of way to cars at places other than intersections and marked crosswalks and they also must obey traffic lights.

A blind pedestrian, however, who raises or extends a white cane or who is being led by a guide dog has the right of way anywhere, anytime.

3. "When A School Bus Stops To Pick Up Or Discharge Children, You Have to Stop If You

Are Behind It In The Same Direction."—Only partly correct. Our state laws says you have to stop whenever a school bus stops no matter in which direction you're driving.

4. "You Don't Have To Stop On Yellow When A Traffic Signal Is Changing From Green To Red."—Wrong. New Mexico law requires approaching traffic to stop as soon as the light turns yellow unless the car already has entered the intersection.

5. "You Can Start Through An Intersection When The Light Changes From Red To Yellow."—Wrong again. Under state law, you're not to start until the light has turned green—and even then you're supposed to wait till all pedestrians and vehicles have cleared the intersection.

6. "You Can Make A Turn Anytime As Long As You Signal."—Not so. To make a turn, you have to be in the proper lane and you are required to signal at least 100 feet before you turn.

7. "You Can Pass Anytime As Long As You See An Opening."—Wrong. New Mexico law says you have to give a car coming from the opposite direction at least 100 feet clearance after you have passed. You shouldn't pass at all when approaching bridge, viaduct or railroad crossing.

8. "Cars Must Watch For Pedestrians Walking On The Roadway."—While that's a good idea, the law says a pedestrian must walk on the left side of the road or on the left shoulder and must step off to the left when a car approaches.

Farm Bureau Asks For Conference on Highway Safety

(Resolutions—Continued)
H. Conference Relative State Traffic Laws—We request the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau to confer with state officials relative to state traffic laws. We suggest that consideration be given to items such as the installation of appropriate warning signs along highways in areas of heavy farm traffic; and to the provision of satisfactory decelerating lanes to enable traffic to approach, or to leave, the highways, particularly in the vicinity of cotton gins and railway loading sheds.

White-Marking-Line—We recommend that the State Highway Department put a white line at the edge of highways to avoid running off at night and to help avoid accidents.

K. Gasoline and Fuel Oil Taxes—Whereas, the present federal highway use tax on fuels and lubricants applied to agricultural production as well as highway use is discriminatory and unfair. Therefore, be it resolved that we go on record as being in favor of removing this tax on all agricultural production.

L. Return of Gas Tax Revenue to Counties—We request that the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau study the administration of the 1955 law relating to the allocation of a portion of state gas tax revenue among counties for purchase of highway right-of-way and for construction of secondary roads, and to recommend changes designed to grant a greater degree of authority to counties in the use of such allocated funds.

CORPORATION COMMISSION

State Corporation Commission—We request the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau to seek legislation to bring about a constitutional amendment setting up authority for the State Corporation Commission to deny increases in rates for any public utility operating in New Mexico unless the public utility first proves to the Corporation Commission a need for said increase.

We believe that the functions of the State Corporation Commission and the Public Service Commission can be more effectively and economically carried out if they are combined into a single elected commission. We recommend that the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau support legislation that will lead to a consolidation of the two commissions.

COOPERATIVES

A. Regulations and Interpretations of the Revenue Act of 1951 require patrons of tax farm cooperatives to report patronage dividends as income, on both cash and accrual bases, regardless of the form of dividend evidence such as revolving fund certificates, retain certificates, and letters of advice. Such documents have no fair market value; they are transferable only on the books of the cooperative.

they have no fixed maturity date and are redeemable at the discretion of the board of directors of the cooperative. Such dividend evidence does not add to the patron's income, nor does it result in a current reduction of his expense. Court rulings, (Ninth Circuit Court, Caswell Case), have upheld the patron in contesting current Internal Revenue Service regulations and interpretations. We request the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau and the American Farm Bureau and the American Farm Bureau Federation to take appropriate action to have these regulations and interpretations changed so as to remove inequities now existing.

B. We request the New Mexico Farm and Livestock Bureau, the Board of Regents of the New Mexico College of Agriculture and Mechanical Arts, the Wichita Bank of Cooperatives, to establish an annual cooperative training short course in New Mexico for the purpose of instructing cooperative managers, accountants, and members of boards of directors concerning new procedures and developments. We believe that this short course will be of benefit to farmers and ranchers in New Mexico because most of them belong to some marketing, purchasing, or servicing cooperative; and because improved cooperative management will result in better service, greater savings to patrons, and improved public relations.

C. We support true cooperatives and point out their importance to our economy and to the free enterprise system. Cooperatives provide a means by which farmers may deal on an equal basis with large commercial organizations in marketing their products, or in purchasing supplies. Cooperatives equalize the bargaining power of small farmers with that of large farmers. Attempts to destroy the basic principles of cooperative organization and operation should be consistently opposed.

D. Attacks made upon the tax status of cooperatives are often motivated by hostility toward the cooperative principle. All income of cooperatives is subject to taxation, either in the hands of the cooperatives, or as

paid and credited to patrons. We oppose the application of dividend withholding tax to cooperatives, or to other corporations. We support the provisions of existing law that: (1) make patronage refunds taxable only in the hands of the individual patron; (2) make unallocated net earnings of a cooperative, after allowable reserves have been set up, subject to taxation in the manner as profits of any other corporation. We feel that these provisions safeguard the interests of true cooperatives.

Sales Tax on Wells and Tractors—We recommend that the drilling, developing and equipping of irrigation and water wells be exempt from the 2% sales tax, and we further recommend that the sales tax on tractors be lowered to 1/2% (1/2 of 1%).

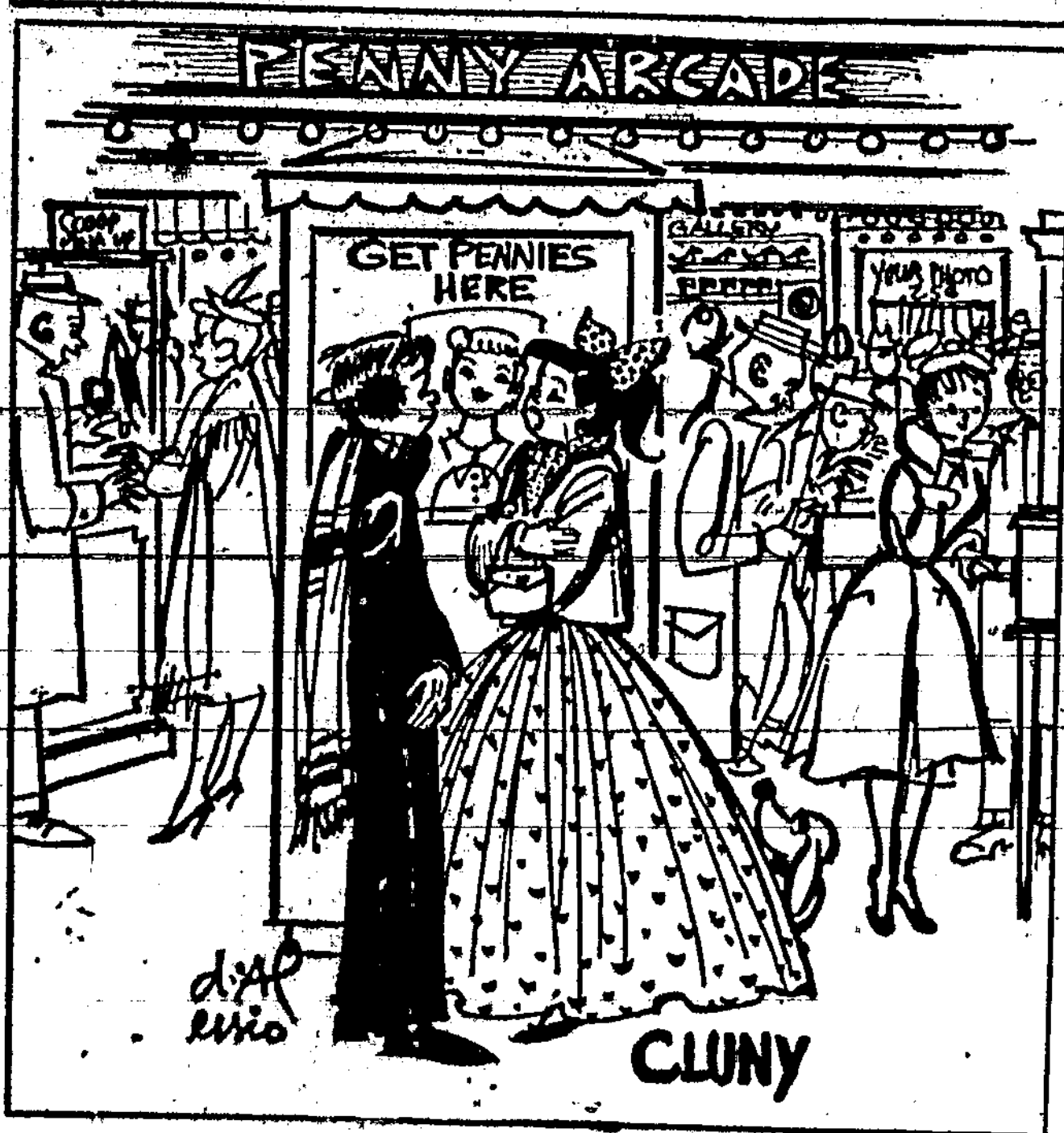
FEDERAL LAND TAXES

Federal Land Taxes—Be it resolved that the Federal Government pay taxes to the various states on all federal lands and improvements controlled or owned by it. This resolution applies in particular to the eleven western states where vast areas of forest land, public domain and land used for military purposes cut down the taxable wealth of these states seriously. We recommend that the government be taxed at the same rate as individual property owners.

Return of Royalty and Lease Monies to Counties—Whereas, several counties in the State of New Mexico are largely state and federal land and that royalty and lease monies go directly to the agencies. Be it Resolved, that part of the royalty and lease monies collected from federal lands be returned to the counties from which they are derived.
