Delegation Asks Improvement of State Road 37

In an effort to get action on the improvement of Highway 37 from Ruidoso to U. S. 380, a delegation from Lincoln County met Friday with Governor John S. Limms.

Present from Lincoln County were its three commissioners, George Fuchs, chairman; Chas. A. Jones and Alfonso Soto; also Pat Chubbuck, F. L. Richardson and Ralph Brown of the Ruidoso Chamber of Commerce.

"1. Shorter connection between Ruidoso and the rest of Lincoln County, particularly the county seat, Carrizozo.

"2. Shorter connection between Ruidoso and Albuquerque, Santa Fe and the other northern part of New Mexico.

"3. Improving business connections between Ruidoso and Albuquerque.

"4. Lighten the traffic load between Ruidoso and points east.

"5. It will give our tourists a scenic loop drive from Ruidoso through Capitan and Lincoln.

"6. It is appreciated the fact, part of this road has been improved but full benefit of this expenditure will not be realized unless the remainder of 37 is improved.

"7. It is important to the economy of Lincoln County revenue wise and otherwise that this area (Ruidoso) of Lincoln County be developed to its fullest extent because this area is the most active area of Lincoln County and is responsible for a good part of taxable income to the County Treasurer."

DUKE CITY C. OF C. IN ACCORD

The two Albuquerqueans who attended the meeting with the governor, stated their agreement as follows:

YOUTH TAKEN TO INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL

Mike Marquez, 16, one of the youths connected with the Capitan store robberies, was taken to the Springer Industrial school on Monday by Sheriff Wm. Glen Bradley. The youth has been made a ward of the district court and the state institution until he reaches the age of 21.

Two other youths in the gang have been returned to Oklahoma by E. C. Campbell, sheriff of Beaver County. They are Larry Abner McConnell and Edward Dean Chill. They will stand trial for breaking into and entering and grand larceny.

Oklahoma has two warrants out for the arrest of Harry Lee Dodd, confessed leader of the gang. He is also wanted by New Mexico authorities and possible Federal charges may grow out of his alleged check forgeries.

Sheriff Bradley warned the public this week to be extremely cautious in cashing checks where the signers or endorser's are not known. More fraudulent checks have been passed in the state and action during the past few months than at any previous time, he says.

AWOL Private Taken Back to California

The Lincoln County Sheriff's office was informed this week that Pvt. John W. Grimes had been apprehended by the Sixth Army area and has been returned to Ft. Ord, Calif., for disciplinary action.

Pvt. Grimes was reported AWOL from Ft. Bliss November 16, 1954. He is wanted in Lincoln County on the charge of issuing \$350 in fraudulent checks in Corona during the hunting season. The checks were written on a non-existent bank.

J. H. Fulmer Jr. Elected President Carrizozo C. of C.

Officers and directors of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce were elected and a constitution and by-laws accepted at a meeting held last Thursday in the Courtroom. Approximately twenty charter members of the organization attended.

The directors proceeded to elect the officers for the chamber, as follows: J. H. Fulmer Jr., president; Bob Gibson, vice-president; T. G. Moore, secretary-treasurer.

Fred English and T. B. Smoot were elected to serve on an executive committee with the president, vice-president and secretary-treasurer.

Annual dues for 1955 were set at \$10 per member.

The new board of directors is to meet this Thursday night in the office of J. H. Fulmer Jr.

New Ordinances Designed to Lower Insurance Rates

Three ordinances designed to put Carrizozo in line for a reduction in fire insurance rates were adopted at Tuesday's meeting of the town board of trustees.

A building code ordinance was adopted as well as a fire prevention code, as recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Commercial buildings, within the established fire limits of the town must henceforth be constructed of fire-proof materials.

The third ordinance adopted specifies that fire department equipment and personnel be used within the town limits, except that when sufficient personnel is available to man the older fire fighting apparatus, the latter could be used outside the corporate limits.

In the order of its regular business the trustees approved the transfer of a business license from A. T. Roberts to W. H. Rickerson, dba the Monte Vista Service Station.

Two building permits were issued, one to Pick Warden to repair and change the exterior of the Pick's Freez and Burger Bar building. Geo. McBride, contractor. Another permit was issued to Sid Wilson, self contractor, to make a \$500 addition to a dwelling.

State Engineer Grants Transfer Of Bonito Water

The State Engineer of New Mexico filed his findings of fact and conclusions of law in the Bonito water transfer Wednesday morning and also filed his order approving the transfer of the water rights to the Holloman Air Development Center, the City of Alamogordo, Town of Carrizozo, and the Nogal Water Users Association.

The following maximum quantities of water were allowed to each of the applicants: United States of America, for use at the Holloman Air Development Center—1449.02 acre ft. per year.

City of Alamogordo — 1449.02 acre feet per year.

Town of Carrizozo—130.31 acre feet per year.

Nogal Water Users' Association—1.45 acre feet per year.

Reserved to El Paso and Rock Island Railway Company and Southern Pacific Company—57.92 acre feet per year. One acre foot is equal to 325,851 gallons.

The water rights of Nogal and Carrizozo and the Southern Pacific Company are prior to the water rights of the Holloman Air Development Center and the City of Alamogordo.

One of the stipulations in the contract dated August 13, 1954, which was included in the State Engineer's order of transfer, covers the supply of water by the Southern Pacific to northern communities. It follows:

"It is understood and agreed between the parties hereto that a portion of the waters hereinabove reserved for the use of Southern Pacific is for the purpose of enabling it to supply certain limited quantities of water by tank car to water users association, towns, villages and communities northeast of Carrizozo and including Eplia, N. M., who or which at the date of this Agreement are being supplied with waters from the Bonito pipeline system under existing licenses from Southern Pacific, and that as such water users associations, towns, villages and communities procure their own water systems, Southern Pacific will cease to make withdrawals from the Bonito pipeline system at Carrizozo by tank car or otherwise for such communities to the extent of the amount so reserved for such community developing its own water supply, and reduce its withdrawals from said Bonito pipeline system for railroad and/or domestic uses by such amounts, and agree to transfer and assign such fractional share of said Bonito water right to the Town of Carrizozo, and easements appurtenant thereto."

The order was approved and consented to by Gilbert White & Gilbert, attorneys for the Southern Pacific; by Otto R. Haney, Col. USAF, for the United States of America; by Attorney Daniel B. Brenton for the City of Alamogordo; Attorney E. Forrest Sanders for Carrizozo; Attorney L. C. White for the Trustees of Nogal Water Users Ass'n, and by Attorney John F. Russell for the Pecos Valley Artesian Conservancy District.

HOPE DISAPPEARS FOR EARLY SESSION

SANTA FE, July 13—Hopes for an early session of the legislature for relief of some 40,000 people dependent on the welfare department blew out the window this week in what is apparently a stalemate situation between the governor and the legislature.

Disclosure that Governor Simms plans to take off next week for a two weeks vacation puts the earliest possible date for a special session well into August. And there is no reason to believe that the session will be called then unless there is a break of the deadlock that has stalled the session so far.

The legislators and the governor have been sparring on who will take responsibility for the taxes needed for the welfare program. Each has apparently been trying to pass it to the other.

The delay stretched forward as increasing reports were heard here of private individuals and business firms picking up the burden of caring for those most seriously hurt by the payments reduction of last April. A Santa Fe druggist told of supplying an elderly woman diabetic with life-maintaining insulin after she was no longer able to buy it with money from the welfare program that had been cut from \$50 to \$25 a month.

Young Democrats Ready for Fight

Young Democrats hit Las Cruces this week and with what could be an organization shaking fight for the state presidency. Incumbent Eveline Robinson of Los Alamos announced early this week that she would stand for re-election after having been warned off by Albuquerque leaders.

Mrs. Robinson, 28-year-old housewife, moved back into the picture upon being assured the support of Louis Garcia's Santa Fe delegation and his promise to bring other northern counties to her aid.

Any effort to sidetrack Eveline for an outside candidate, Garcia said, would be opposed by northern groups. If she should pull out, he said, the northern counties will present a candidate of their own.

\$15 DELEGATES AT CONVENTION

It's hard to tell what strength the northside or any other area will have in a Young Demo convention because of the system of allocating delegates. The number of delegates allocated each county is determined by the number of YD's in the county. And the number of YD's is determined by the amount of money turned over to the state organization by the county group, each dollar representing one member. Thus it could happen in Las Cruces, and it has happened in the past, that a group could establish a majority in the convention by plunking down the dough to authorize as many voting delegates as necessary—one delegate for each \$15.

New Mexico's engineers are having trouble figuring the costs of jobs. An Alamogordo road job let to contract last December for \$707,000 has been changed and recharged until its cost is now estimated in the neighborhood of \$300,000. 

Therefore, I John F. Simms, hereby proclaim the week beginning July 24, 1955, as "Farm Safety Week" in New Mexico and urgently request that all rural people institute a campaign to locate and eliminate all accident hazards and to cultivate careful work habits on their farms, ranches, and in their homes.

I also request that all persons and organizations interested in farm life and welfare join in this campaign to make New Mexico a safer and happier place in which to live.





# THE FOLKLORE CORNER

## PLACE NAMES

**Deming (Luna County):** After Miss Ann Deming, daughter of a sawmill man in Indiana, who married Charles Crocker. He was one of four men who built the early lines of the Southern Pacific in this territory, including the line through Deming. (Crocker, along with Leland Stanford and two others were famous as the "Big Four" who were instrumental in the building of San Francisco.) (New Mexico Place-Name Dictionary)

**Tres Hermanas.** A group of three mountains in southern Luna County, hence the Spanish, "Three Sisters." (New Mexico Place-Name Dictionary)

**Colorado (Dona Ana County):** A Spanish-American village just south of Hatch. Spanish "red colored" because of the red hills behind it. Today known as Rodey, renamed for pioneer trader in the region. (New Mexico Place-Name Dictionary)

**Turtle Back Peak** in the Caballo Mountains (Sierra County). The peak can be seen from many points in Truth or Consequences. Its name comes from its shape. You needn't tax your imagination to see the hind leg of a turtle stretched out. (Paul Tooley, T or C.)

**Pyramid Mountains (Hidalgo County):** These mountains, clearly visible to the south of Lordsburg, so called because a peak resembles an Egyptian pyramid. The Pyramids might have given their name to Hidalgo County. When the county, once a part of Grant County, was first organized, a vote was taken in the New Mexico Legislature on whether the new county should be called Pyramid or Hi-

## DEAD MEN'S SHACK

About 1892, J. C. Cady, father of Frank Cady of Truth or Consequences, caught his foot in the cog of a machine while running a well drill, and an operation to amputate a toe became necessary. The nearest doctor was at Fort Stanton, about 150 miles from Weed, where Cady lived, and the only way to get there was by horseback.

A neighbor rode with Cady. At nightfall on the first day out the two men ran into a heavy snowstorm and found a shack for shelter. It was dark as pitch in the shack, and as they entered each man hit his head against an object.

The objects were the bodies of two men, who had been hanged in the shack. The neighbor did not want to spend the night in the cabin. "There's no danger with dead men," Cady argued, and there they slept rather than risking their lives in the fierce snowstorm.

They reported the hangings when they arrived at Fort Stanton, but no one seemed interested enough to investigate. The men probably had been hanged a week when Cady and his neighbor found the bodies.

As Frank Cady remembers, no one ever found out who the men were or why they had been hanged. The bodies presumably hung in the shack until they were skeletons.

Cady was operated on at Fort Stanton. On the way back Cady and his friend were stopped a time or two, but they convinced peace officers they were not outlaws.



member of the family will use during that day.

Saving water is mainly a matter of thinking about the subject whenever you turn on a faucet. Here are some suggestions on both ways to save:

Showers usually require 25 gallons of water—baths, 36. Reduce these figures by turning off the shower while soaping and turing it on again to rinse and save 15 gallons. Substitute a partly filled tub for a full one and save 16 gallons.

Washing dishes under running water can use up to 30 gallons per meal. You can save by using a dishpan or sinkstopper.

Letting the water run all the time you are brushing your teeth is wasteful.

Use the basin instead of the shower for a shampoo.

Turn off the hot-water faucet when shaving and save up to 25 gallons of water.

It is usually best to keep your water heater on an even setting. If you want to know whether you're using the average amount of water, read your meter at the beginning and end of a representative period and calculate your consumption per person per day. If it's 23 to 35 gallons, that's pretty good. Fifty is about average. Anything above that is too high for household use.
