County's 1955 Tax Budget Approved

Manuel Baca of the State Tax Commission met with the Lincoln County Commissioners Monday to review the county's 1955 tax budget. For the purposes of taxation the 1955 property valuation is \$13,951,070. This compares with a total of \$13,788,412 for 1954. The county's bonded indebtedness for hospital bonds has been reduced during the past year to a sum of \$147,000.

PICKETT A YD FROM WAY BACK

SANTA FE, July 27 — Ingram Pickett, the governor-dreaming corporation commissioner, was on hand for the Young Democrats' state convention in Las Cruces last weekend plugging for his own cause and recalling to some of the not-so-young observers his former participation in the Young Demo movement.

Pick undertook reorganization of the Young Democrats in 1947 when he was on the land office payroll under John Miles, at that time land commissioner. For a whole year he travelled the state in a state automobile with a state credit card, drawing a salary from the land office and for much of the time also a daily expense allowance.

ELECTION FAVORS PICK'S AMBITION

Pick, the only state official formally to address the Young Demos, got in a blow at Amendment No. 6 coming up for consideration at the Sept. 21 election which would prohibit him from running for governor without resigning from the commission, and saw a state chairman elected who is at least sympathetic with his ambitions.

State Rep. Mattias Chacon of Rio Arriba who beat out Eveline Robinson of Los Alamos for the top job was commonly referred to as a "Pickett man" in the campaign preceding the roll call and didn't bother to deny it until after he was elected, saying then that he would take no sides in the primary. It was a rather natural thing to say since the Young Demos' constitution prohibits activity for or against primary candidates.

PICK THREATENS AMENDMENT LOSS

Pickett's campaigning in Las Cruces and most everywhere else in the state against No. 6 is threatening defeat of the important amendment unless a movement develops for its defense. The ban on Pickett running for governor is only a remote detail in the proposal.

Basically it would strengthen state control over utility rates and services, put them all in an enlarged corporation commission, and force the utilities to justify rate increases before ordering them into effect.

Its weakness comes from the ill-advised ban on corporation commissioners running for any other office without resigning, and from the quibbling provision that they may be elected or appointed as designated by the legislature.

FOUR WITTS ON PAYROLL

The family of Charles Witt, brother of State School Superintendent Georgie Lusk, is prospering at the statehouse. Mrs. Charles Witt works for Mrs. Lusk in the education department's textbook division at \$345 a month and so does Mrs. Witt's daughter-in-law, Mrs. Boston Witt, \$200. Mr. Boston Witt has joined the comptroller's staff at \$250 and papa Witt, Charles, has taken a \$450 place in the tax commission. Mrs. Lusk is apparently beyond the nepotism act in the employment of kin-folks because of a technicality in the law. It provides that relatives may be employed only with the consent of the person responsible for approving the employing official's bond. The state school superintendent is not required to put up bond and some legal ones think that it excuses her from the terms of the act.

BOARD MEMBERS GET RAISES

Three members of the new personnel board appointed by the governor awhile back to control the pay and classifications of statehouse workers have had pay increases since they took over. Board Chairman Santos Quintana of the land office was raised from \$600 to \$700 a month, Jacobo Barth of the corporation commission from \$405 to \$505, Pat Murphy of the education department from \$305 to \$665.66 a month. The board has not had time so far to act on higher pay rates for employes at large.


STATEHOUSE COFFEE TALK



SMOKING OUT A WOLF'S DEN

More than a half century ago while I. M. Harkey and his two small sons were moving their herd of 400 goats from the High Mesa on the west slope of the White Mountains to a different range, Harkey became ill with rheumatism and had to go to Hot Springs (Now Truth or Consequences) for treatment. He left the boys, John W., about 14, and C. C., 12, to take care of the goats.

The boys were camped with the herd in the mouth of Tanner Canyon above the I Bar X Ranch. The goats were kidding at that time, and the kids were staked around the camp with strings, then called bed ticking.

After an all-night rain, the boys came out of their tent one morning to find that a lobo wolf had made off with six kids.

There were lots of lobo wolves in those days, John Harkey of Carrizozo recalls, and at night the canyons virtually roared with their howling. You could hear the wolves a mile and a half away.

John told his brother they had better "trail it up and kill it" or the lobo would be carrying off more kids. Armed with their jointly-owned 25-35 Winchester, the boys trailed the lobo into the head of Tanner Canyon. They walked up to the front of the den which was on a little ridge.

They heard wolf pups barking and playing in the hole, and the boys thought the old one was in the den with the pups. They decided to dig out the pups and the old one.

Just below the den was a 40-foot pine tree. Making the rifle, John climbed about 10 feet into the tree where he could see into the den and shoot the old one if she came out. His brother went back to camp for pick and shovel.

After C. C. returned, the brothers started digging, but they struck big rocks and had to give up. Then they decided to smoke out the wolves. While one stood guard with the rifle, the other built a fire in the entrance to the den.

By the time the fire had burned down to coals, the pups began to come out one at a time and, as a pup hit the hot coals, the boys would grab it and kill it. Finally, one "awful pretty black one" came out. It was so pretty they wanted to take it back to camp alive. They tied the pup to a tree with a string, but it kept "a-barking and making a peculiar noise," and the boys were afraid it might call up a bunch of lobos. They killed the black pup.

The brothers smoked out and killed seven wolf pups. The old one wasn't in the den and didn't appear. The boys took the pups to camp and skinned them. The next day C. C. carried the hides to the I Bar X Ranch and sold

them for \$10 each. Bounty on lobos was \$20 apiece then. The ranch turned in the hides at \$20 each to be applied on his taxes. (New Mexico folklore items may be addressed to Ted Raynor, 2715 North San Marcial Street, El Paso, Texas.)







900 Cities Use NBFU National Building Code

Nine hundred cities seeking fire-safe construction of buildings use the model National Building Code of the National Board of Fire Underwriters. Last year 26 cities adopted it in full and 30 others its abbreviated edition, chiefly because the code fulfills their responsibilities for regulating building construction from the standpoint of safety to life from fire and other hazards. It allows, insofar as practical, the use of any material, type of assembly, method of construction or style of architecture that meets the required standards of strength, stability, and fire resistance. Since its original publication 50 years ago, the National Building Code has kept abreast of changing times.

Last year the American Red Cross awarded an average of one certificate every two minutes to persons completing Red Cross Home Nursing courses.

Range Sheep to Be Shown at State Fair

Previous fairs have shown that New Mexico's pampered and prettified registered breeding stock can compete successfully against the best sheep in the nation. But what about the ordinary sheep back home on the range... the sheep that mean so much to the state's economy?

Sheep entered for exhibit must have been grown under strictly range conditions, says J. R. Stauder of State College, superintendent of the Sheep Department. No trimming or artificial coloring of fleeces will be permitted. Complete rules and the list of awards may be obtained by writing to Leon H. Harms, New Mexico State Fair, Box 1693, Albuquerque.

Fine wool range sheep will be judged in two lots, according to weight, and there will be an additional lot for medium-wool animals. They will be judged as individuals, pens of three,



AN ORDINANCE PROHIBITING THE USE OF FIRE FIGHTING EQUIPMENT AND PERSONNEL OUTSIDE THE LIMITS OF THE TOWN OF CARRIZOZO, EXCEPT UNDER CERTAIN CONDITIONS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico, as follows:

Section 1. It is hereby declared to be the policy of the Town of Carrizozo that the fire fighting equipment of the Town of Carrizozo shall not be used outside the limits of the Town of Carrizozo, nor shall members of the Town of Carrizozo Fire Department respond to any calls for assistance in fighting fires, outside the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo, provided, however that surplus fire equipment may be so used if there is sufficient personnel available in Carrizozo to operate the primary fire equipment and fire truck within the Town of Carrizozo in the event of fire.

Section 2. The Chief of the Fire Department shall be responsible for designating the primary fire fighting equipment and personnel needed at all times for the protection of the Town of Carrizozo against fire and shall further designate the surplus fire fighting equipment which may be used in his discretion outside the Town of Carrizozo; he shall further be responsible that no equipment is used outside the Town of Carrizozo unless there is sufficient personnel available within the Town of Carrizozo to operate the primary fire fighting equipment.

BE IT ORDAINED BY the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo, New Mexico:

Section 1. Adoption of Building Code.

There is hereby adopted by the Board of Trustees for the purpose of establishing rules and regulations for the construction, alteration, removal, demolition, equipment, use and occupancy, location and maintenance of buildings and structures, including permits and penalties, that certain building code known as the National Building Code, Abbreviated Edition, recommended by the National Board of Fire Underwriters of New York, being particularly the 1949 edition thereof and the whole thereof, save and except such portions as are hereinafter deleted, modified or amended, of which not less than three (3) copies have been and now are filed in the office of the Clerk of the Town of Carrizozo and the same are hereby adopted and incorporated as fully as if set out at length herein; and from the date on which this ordinance shall take effect, the provisions thereof shall be controlling in the construction of all buildings and other structures therein contained within the corporate limits of the Town of Carrizozo.
