Of the many tributes paid the late Hardy H. Shrum, one that marks him as a man of fine character was made this week. It came from a friend who probably knows him better than any one else outside of his immediate family—a fellow employee, who said: "Hardy was well known over the county and was loved and respected by all who knew him. He was a loyal husband and father and a dependable employee, with a host of friends and relatives to mourn his passing."

If the "Last Escape of Billy the Kid" continues to improve as it has during the past two years, the event should win not only statewide, but national attention. Kids Fishing Derby Sunday Above Bonito Lake

Sunday afternoon, August 14, will be a big day for women and children who like to fish. It is the date of the Kids' Fishing Derby, sponsored by the White Mountain Game Protective Association.

The men folks will have to sit this one out. The event is to take place at the Blue Hole above Bonito Lake and the hours for kids fishing will be from 2 to 3:30. From 3:30 to 4 ladies over 14 will take part in a 30-minute fishing contest. The ladies must exhibit a fishing license before entering the contest.

The age limit for children is 14 years and under. Children under 6 must be accompanied by a parent or guardian. Prizes donated by Lincoln County businessmen and individuals include awards for the largest fish, the first fish, for the most fish, the shortest fish; for boys with the most freckles and girls with the longest pig-tails.

The Blue Hole will be stocked in advance to insure plenty of fish for the kids to try to lure onto their hooks.

Other rules that will be in effect for the Kids Fishing Derby are:

- Each contestant must furnish his own fishing equipment and bait.
- Only one pole, line and hook is allowed each child.
- No physical assistance is to be given by parents or bystanders.
- Limit of catch is 12 fish for each child.
- All game and fish laws must be obeyed.

Carrizozo Advised To Use Well Water

On the basis of a second analysis made June 15 this year, the New Mexico Department of Public Health has advised Carrizozo to "make 100% use of its newly developed water supply."

A letter from the PH department to Mayor Marvin H. Roberts also stated that it "definitely did not recommend" mixing water from Nogal Lake with the well water at the present time. Some samples of water from Nogal Lake, the report stated, "do not conform with our required standards." This condition, the report continued, "has been due to the discontinuance by the Southern Pacific of its treatment plant for Nogal water. Last year this treatment was discontinued. With the increased influx of fishermen and picnickers at Nogal Lake and on the upper watershed of Bonito Lake, the watershed sanitation problem has been difficult to control."

"We are happy to report," the letter continued, "that the Southern Pacific Company is in the process of making several changes that will aid in providing stricter watershed sanitation control. This will require a period of time to produce effective control." The report stated that, although the well water presently being used is harder than the surface supply of the Southern Pacific, "its safety is beyond reproach. If the current protection is maintained. In the future, if improvements justify it, the change in the Nogal supply, it could be mixed with Carrizozo's well supply."

ANALYZE WATER

Regarding the quality of the well water, the Health Department's report had the following to say: "Samples of water for chemical analyses were taken on December 1, 1954 and June 9, 1955. Although these analyses indicate some increase in the hardness of this water during this period, there is no indication of an objection from the public health standpoint. The total solids and sulphate contents are somewhat higher than that recommended, but we have numerous supplies in the State of New Mexico that exceed these amounts, with no apparent ill effects."

"Ordinarily, the fluoride, iron and magnesium contents of a water cause most difficulty, and these elements are well within the requirements for the new Carrizozo well." Excessive sulphates can cause difficulty with the taste and odor of a supply but, this does not appear to be the case for the well at Carrizozo. The chief objection is the comparative hardness of the new well supply to that of the surface water secured from the Southern Pacific Co.'s pipeline."

Carrizozo Qualifies for Eighth Class Fire Rates

Carrizozo's new water supply system meets the requirements for a reduction in fire insurance rates, the town has been notified by the fire insurance rating division of the Mountain States Inspection Bureau.

A letter received from the bureau by Mayor Marvin H. Roberts states that "Upon notice from your office covering the delivery and acceptance of the new 500 g.p.m. pumper we shall list Carrizozo for inspection based on eighth class municipal fire protection."

"Inspection of specially rated properties will be conducted as previous commitments have been fulfilled."

Copies of the above letter were sent to H. G. Weik, superintendent of utilities and to Fay Harkney, chief of the Volunteer Fire Department.

SP Celebrates Its 100th Anniversary

The Southern Pacific System celebrated its 100th birthday on August 9, 1955.

It was this day, 100 years ago, when the first spike was driven for the first railroad west of the Rockies—a 23-mile gold rush line to the Sierra Nevada foothill town of Folsom. This was the initial unit of SP's western lines.

To celebrate the centennial, Southern Pacific ordered all of its locomotives operating in eight states—from Louisiana to Oregon—to let loose a 10-second centennial signal at 10:30 a.m., April 9.

No train and engine crews happened to be in Carrizozo at this precise time, but four engineers and firemen were here at 10:30 a.m. They were Engineers A. F. Howard and J. H. Hoffman and Firemen J. L. Brown and A. E. Parnell.

A host of relatives and friends gathered at the First Baptist Church in Carrizozo Wednesday afternoon to pay their final respects to Hardy H. Shrum who passed away at the Carrizozo Hospital at 5 a.m., Sunday.

The church was filled to overflowing by townspeople and friends from many neighboring communities. Rev. Jesse F. Allen, pastor of the Green Tree Baptist Church, was in charge of the service. A duet, Mmes. Lorene Casey and Margie Clouse, sang "In The Garden" and "The Old Rugged Cross." They were accompanied by Mrs. T. E. Kelley.

In his eulogy, Rev. Allen praised Mr. Shrum's contributions to his family, to his church and to the community. "He will not be forgotten," Rev. Allen said. "He will not be forgotten because of his fine family; he will not be forgotten because of his works. In his employment in the water service department of the Southern Pacific Company, he worked in many parts of the county and his thoroughness was well known. If Hardy Shrum did it, you don't need to inspect it."

He came to New Mexico in 1933 and lived on a homestead seven miles west of Carrizozo. He moved to Nogal in 1937 and began his employment with the Southern Pacific. In 1940 he was transferred to Carrizozo and he and his family have lived here since that time. He was a member of the First Baptist Church of White Point, Texas.

Hardy H. Shrum was born at Galveston, Tex., March 16, 1895. He was married to Mary Claunch at Dalhart, Texas, on March 12, 1927. To this union seven children were born—three sons and four daughters—five of whom survive.

Survivors are his widow, Mary, four daughters, Mrs. Mary Alice Peck of Dover, Del., Margaret Shrum, Sara Birtha Shrum and Ida Sue Shrum, and a son, Elmer Hardy Shrum, of Carrizozo. His father, John H. Shrum, of San Angelo, Texas; two brothers, Troy Shrum of San Angelo and Bill Shrum of Eden, Texas, and a sister, Mrs. E. W. McKaughn of Slaton, Texas.

Others include a son-in-law, Lee Peck of Dover, Del.; Frank Leatherwood, a cousin, of Eden, Texas; Alma Leatherwood, a cousin, of San Angelo; Gray Claunch, a brother-in-law, and Sue Schwalm, a sister-in-law, both of Pomona, Calif.; Ollie Lucas, his step-father-in-law, of Dalhart, Texas, and an aunt and uncle of Mrs. Shrum, Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Pipplin of Sudan, Texas.

The Eighth annual Billy the Kid's Rodeo will be held on Sunday, Aug. 21, at Three Rivers. This rodeo, for New Mexico boys and girls only, is sponsored by the Tularosa Lions Club and T. P. Ryan owner of the Three Rivers Ranch.

A new division for boys from 10 through 18 years of age will be held for the first time this year. The only event in this division will be calf roping. Each entrant will rope two calves, and the winner will be named the Champion Youth Calf Roper of New Mexico. The prize for this event will be a large silver cup. Merchandise prizes, donated by merchants of Tularosa and Alamogordo, will be awarded for the first four places, in this and all other events.

THE FOLKLORE CORNER

WHERE THE SONG WAS FINISHED

Elizabeth Garrett finished composing the state song "O Fair New Mexico" in the house at 300 East Second Street, Lordsburg. The upright piano, on which she picked out the tune, still is in the large living room. The piano is one of the treasured possessions of Mrs. Sam Gass, and the two-year stay of Miss Garrett is among her fondest memories.

It was in September, 1915, that Miss Garrett, returning from the fair at San Diego, Calif., got off the train at Lordsburg to sing in the Baptist Church at the urging of Dr. Vermillion, head of the Baptist Sanitarium in El Paso (now Southwestern General Hospital.) Miss Garrett stayed in Lordsburg two years.

Mrs. Gass, then Jennie Marsalls, was delegated to meet Elizabeth and her sister at the railroad station. Jennie's mother had been buried the day before. A quick friendship developed between the grieving young girl and the blind daughter of Pat Garrett, famous New Mexico

sheriff.

Miss Garrett had composed part of the state song before coming to Lordsburg, and she completed it in the Judge C. W. Marsalls home in April, 1916. Mrs. Gass remembers how Elizabeth would get up at any hour of the night and pick out the tune on the piano. The next day Jennie would write out the score.

The State Legislature had to be convinced that Elizabeth's composition was worthy of becoming the official state song. She was asked to first sing and play it throughout New Mexico. Accompanied by Jennie, Elizabeth traveled over the state, presenting her song before high schools and civic organizations.

Miss Garrett composed other songs on Jennie's piano. They were "Senorita, Mine," "Pitter, Patter, Little Drops of Rain," and "Baby's Lullaby."

Judge Marsalls bought the piano for his daughter, Jennie, when she was 14, from the Jenkins Music Company in El Paso. It was shipped to Lordsburg by train. Mrs. Gass remembers her father writing a \$450 check for her present. She has never had another piano.

Besides composing while in Lordsburg, Miss Garrett organized music clubs, gave piano and voice lessons, and taught the use of Spanish castanets. She composed all music for the Harmony Club programs.

"Elizabeth was the happiest person in the world, and she never complained about her blindness," Mrs. Gass said.

Miss Garrett had become blind at too early an age to have any memory of colors, but Mrs. Gass remembers Elizabeth saying:

"I love orange and red, the prettiest colors God ever made." "How do you know they are pretty?" Jennie asked. "I can see them," Elizabeth replied.

**Apple Packing to
Start in Valley
About August 22**

Apple packing operations are planned to start about August 22 at the White Mountain Fruit Growers shed. Mr. Baxter, the operator of the packing shed, indicated that the growers will receive a good price for early, high quality fruit. Plans are to run the shed as many hours a day as may be required.

Fruit prospects in the valley are good, County Agent Ralph Dunlap states, but there is considerable hail damage in some areas. The Glencoe area has a full crop on all its trees, including apples, pears, plums and peaches. The Elzy Perry orchard is putting up a fruit stand to handle early apples, as well as peaches and pears.

He had a large quantity of crab apples ripe and ready to use last week. Many of the trees in Glencoe are bending to the ground because of the heavy crop in the area.

A few worms were noted just starting into the apples. The County Agent advises that use of an immediate spray of malathion will stop these worms as well as control the spider mite which is causing damage throughout the valley. The addition of ovatron to the spray will also kill the mite eggs or else you should use the malathion a week later to kill the mites that hatch.

"Any time over 12 mites are noted on a leaf, you should spray," he says, adding:

"Along the line of sprays, I talked to county agents from Washington, as well as Ohio, and the growers in those areas have to spray 11 to 14 times, whereas the grower in this area seldom sprays over 5 to 6 times. Scab is a tremendous problem in those areas."
