



> No further signs develop on the hill until after noon. Then a dart takes shape in the face of the white man, and a threepointed leaf appears along with silectomy. Her recovery was the letter "M" and three crosses.

At about 4:30 p.m. a giant olia takes shape on the hill, reaching to the top of it and completing white man's face now is seen as part of the right side of the olla. In the circle of the olla and to the left of the faces are the three with her family on the Highcrosses, one in the "M," another walks up to the foot of the hill, in the leaf and the third in the third in the middle of the olla;

At the top of the olla, on the right side, two half circles appear. Mrs. Head says these mean: follow the curve of the hill, presumably to long-buried treasure.

It is a fact that by following the curve of the hill you will come to other rocks with designs chiseled into them.

In the small canyon, where the signs appear on the hill, there are three rocks with designs. On the first are three men, with a cross by each one, and an enormous Spanish "G" atop the rock.
