It was reported to the News this week that five shade trees have been removed from the premises of the Spanish Mission church in Carrizozo. It was stated that the identity of the person is known and the request is made that the trees be returned so that they can be replanted. It is the intention of the parishioners of the mission to maintain the church and grounds and hold services on Sunday.

It became known in Carrizozo this week that a GI from Red Canyon, in El Paso on a week end pass, got some rough treatment there at the hands of a couple of plainclothesmen. We hope to get more details on this later. El Paso businessmen are very concerned about the status of the Fort Bliss installation in their city, and it would be good public relations to get the full cooperation of the El Paso Police Department.

Alvin Harrow of Roswell was a Lincoln County visitor Monday in connection with district highway matters. He reports that all of Southwestern New Mexico is very dry and that old timers say they have never experienced a winter as mild as the present one. Many wheat growers in the Fortalea area are faced with the loss of their crop unless moisture comes soon.

News from Socorro, La. that the New Mexico Tech Golf Course has a new look. Bulldozers have dug out feet from the hill which separates the first two holes. Grass and trees will be planted on the excavated area, adding further to the beauty of the course.

He will supply competition, he says, in the Democratic Congressional primary "which has been missing for the past six years." . . . Another Democrat, Floyd Cross, of Truth or Consequences has announced for the Corporation Commission . . . In Lincoln County there has been little political activity on the surface to date. State Sen. J. G. Moore says he will formally announce his candidacy for re-election next week. . . The people in Truth or Consequences aren't going to get a chance to vote on a name change after all. After a visit by two Ralph Edwards' men and a meeting of the Soc-City council it was decided not to submit the question of name change at the forthcoming special election . . . Unless there is more favorable opinion expressed than there has been to date, it is doubtful if the Lincoln County Commissioners will call an election to vote bonds to build a courthouse . . . The same situation applies regarding a new sewage system for Carrizozo.

## Lincoln County Goes Over Top in Farm Bureau Drive

The week-long drive of the Lincoln County locals of the New Mexico Farm & Livestock Bureau was only two days old when this county went over the top. Lincoln county's quota was 202. The News was advised Tuesday evening that 214 memberships were signed.

A kickoff supper last Saturday at Pearl's Cafe in Capitan opened the 1955 membership drive. All communities in the county were well represented.

John Augustine, state farm bureau secretary, was the principal speaker. He stressed the importance of membership in the farm bureau thus gaining the benefits of farm bureau services. Farm Bureau, he said, brings to the attention of New Mexicans the importance of agriculture—the state's largest industry. It acquaints the people of the state with the part being played in the development of agriculture by the Farm and Livestock Bureau.

J. C. Johnson of Otero county, member of the State Farm Bureau Board, gave a brief talk and commended Lincoln County's progress in agriculture during the past few years and the part Farm Bureau has played in the growth. Mr. Johnson was present at the initial Lincoln County Farm Bureau organization meeting several years ago.

Team captains for the membership drive met Tuesday morning of this week in Carrizozo. They reported the drive to date has been very successful and that the quota is within sight.

"It is our purpose to ask each and every farm and ranch family in Lincoln County, not now a Farm Bureau member, to become a part of the largest agricultural organization in the history of the world," Charles A. Jones, County FB chairman, said this week.

"We want new members because each additional farm and ranch family adds to our efficiency in fulfilling the purpose for which this organization was founded—a voice for rural people and a place where the individual may express his needs and desires—through group action for the majority's thinking," he added.

on a hot day in summer, we stayed in the house with the doors closed because my father had heard that there were Indians on the warpath and they were coming in that direction. All day we waited for those Indians to come but they didn't show up.

There were soldiers at Fort Stanton. One of the houses at Fort Stanton was a blacksmith shop and my father being a blacksmith got a job. He worked there a couple of years, I guess, and he would work all week and my mother would hook up the mules and put my brother, 17 months older than I was, upon the wagon seat and give him the reins and tell him to drive carefully. That's all she could do. Then wring her hands until he got back.

My father worked at Fort Stanton about two years and got a job as blacksmith at the V V Ranch.

While he was working at Fort Stanton somebody told him about a Mexican, living over west of us, who had a milk cow that he wanted to sell. So he saddled up his favorite mule and rode over there and bought the cow and calf for ten dollars. We were really fixed for living when we got that cow. Living was pretty hard in those days, but the cow sure saved the day.

It was about 1881 when we moved to Carrizozo. It was just cattle country. There was just a depot and then there was a store. I think John Gallagher was the first one to build a store here in Carrizozo.

We owned a cattle ranch in Coyote Canyon, eight miles north of White Oaks. We were sitting there real quiet one evening when a man came along leading his horse with a pack on it. He came back and asked to stay all night saying that Mr. Cooper had directed him to Red Lake but he couldn't follow his directions.

Mr. Branum never turned anybody down. He told him "All right, get down and unsaddle your horse. They didn't want cows, just horses. I remember one time, when

## Judge Scoggin Denies Motion to Dismiss District Court Cases

In district court this week Levi Hostosavit, Mesalero, was fined \$50 and \$50 court costs for driving while his driver's license was revoked. The fine was suspended.

Judge W. T. Scoggin overruled a motion to dismiss two cases, State of New Mexico vs. B. G. Robertson and State of New Mexico vs. Arvel Runnels and W. F. Ecklund. The defendants were represented by Attorneys Geo. L. Zimmerman and G. T. Watts.

The motion to dismiss was on the grounds that the U. S. Government had exclusive jurisdiction. Judge Scoggin overruled the motion, holding that the State of New Mexico and the U. S. Government have concurrent jurisdiction in National forest lands.

Messrs. Runnels and Ecklund are charged with cutting 38 trees from government property. Mr. Robertson is charged with larceny of a quantity of trees. Dean Earl, assistant supervisor of the Lincoln National Forest at Alamogordo, testified on the question of venue—the place from which the trees were alleged to have been taken.

The cases will be tried by jury at the Spring term of district court. District court meets again January 30.

## Copper Corp. Mill To Run Two Shifts

The Carrizozo mill of the New Mexico Copper Corp. began two-shift operation this Thursday. C. E. Degner, company president, informed the News that lead, silver and copper ore are being processed.

Custom ore, as available, will also be handled at the mill, he says. Eight men will be employed in the two-shift operation.

## Charles W. Boone In Fatal Accident

Word was received in Carrizozo Wednesday evening of the accidental death near Miland, Calif. of Charles W. Boone, son of J. J. Boone of Carrizozo. He was employed by the Southern Pacific in a signal maintenance group.

One other man was killed and seven were hospitalized in the truck accident, which occurred along the railway right-of-way. It was reported in a brief message to the News that Boone's family is in Carrizozo. His body will be returned to Carrizozo. Funeral arrangements are pending at the Shaw Mortuary.

## Committee of Wool Growers to Study Market Problems

Approximately sixty wool growers from all sections of Lincoln County, including a few from Chaves County, met Tuesday in Carrizozo to discuss wool and lamb marketing problems.

Following an afternoon's discussion, a committee was appointed to study the wool marketing situation in this county. Several problems were brought out by the growers, such as:

1. Marketing small lots of wool. A possible solution would be a pooling agreement among growers.

2. Making better use of wool warehouse facilities in Roswell. Would a new wool warehouse in Lincoln County offer better services than those now available?

There was a division of opinion on these and other problems affecting wool marketing. Ivan Watson of A&M College, gave the group background information on feeding lambs. He explained why present prices do not favor the feeder of lambs.

Various types of sheep jackets were on exhibit for the growers' inspection. The committee named to study wool marketing is composed of Charles A. Jones, Clint Sultemeier, Bud Walker, Charles Fuller, Mike Nalda, Joe Skeen, Fred McTeligue, Robert Corn and Truman Sanders. The committee plans to meet in Carrizozo February 20.

The wool growers will have a wool marketing demonstration at the Clint Sultemeier ranch east of Corona on June 23. The group also expressed interest in having a county range sheep show in the fall of 1955.

Dick Stoddard, A&M wool marketing specialist, gave information on the wool incentive program. Although the marketing year is not over, he said that indications are that the present national average price for wool of 40 cents per lb. will be maintained. The incentive price level for wool is 62 cents, giving the grower a 55% incentive payment on his wool.

## Light Precipitation in Most Parts of County

Dry range conditions in the county and fire hazards in the Lincoln National Forest were given temporary relief in most of the county by a light rain and snowfall early this week.

Two inches of snowfall were reported in Ruidoso Tuesday, three inches at Capitan, an excess of three inches at Corona and none at Hondo. Carrizozo had a light rain Monday and a brief snowfall Tuesday afternoon.

Traffic in Tecolote arroyo on Highway 56 was tied up briefly Tuesday afternoon when a house trailer skidded across the highway.

Bill Driggers, State patrolman, checked an accident the same day on Highway 70, four miles west of Ruidoso. A car driven by Mr. Brunell of Ruidoso and Alamogordo, skidded on ice and went over a bridge embankment into a canyon. The driver was not injured and the car was only slightly damaged.

In another accident Tuesday morning at Double Crossing between Capitan and Lincoln, Rose Crane of Tinnie, driving a 1949 Ford, skidded on icy pavement and overturned. She escaped with minor bruises, but the car was wrecked. The accident was investigated by Raymond New of Roswell and Sheriff W. G. Bradley.

## D Avenue Power Area To Be 3-Phased

The two men were discovered in an orchard where deer were known to have been feeding. Investigating, Conservation Officer Marion Embrey found a loaded 30.06 rifle and a portable spotlight. The following day the men were taken before Judge Campbell. A date was set for hearing.

Before the hearing was held the men appeared before Judge Campbell and paid their fines.

## Carrizozo Trustees Hear Proposal for Garbage Collection

The Carrizozo Town Trustees, meeting last Thursday were presented a tentative plan for the town's collection and disposal of garbage. It was made by a representative of the General Services Corp. of Albuquerque.

The representative, a Mr. Shore, was given figures on the number of utilities users and said he would return later with an estimate of the cost of such service.

A letter was read on Carrizozo's "Need for an adequate sewerage system and sewage treatment plant." It was written by Robert P. Lowe, State sanitation engineer. He said the present sewerage treatment plant was unsatisfactory because of inadequate capacity, odor problems, fly and mosquito breeding, inoperable condition and its nearness to residences, businesses and the hospital.

"Carrizozo," the letter continued, "is one of the few New Mexico communities that has not either improved or built a new sewage treatment plant in the past six years. Most certainly, the availability of sewers and proper sewage treatment enhance the attractiveness of a community to new residents and hence future growth is dependent on them."

"Property values are increased also. These benefits are in addition to the increased protection of the public health and the control of odor and nuisance problems."

In other business, the trustees approved the application of Leandro Vega to erect a building for cage operations. Material of celotex and iron roofing. Cost, \$1000.

Approved the request of Ortiz Bros to increase and transfer gasoline storage from Camp Mal Pais to a new location a block south and a block east of the railway crossing.

Lt. Col. John J. McCarthy informed the trustees that a position would be open in the near future for a manager of the Post Exchange. Interested applicants may contact Major Paulus, Post Exchange Building, Fort Bliss. The salary would be \$3500 a year.

Total cigarette tax for recreation purposes collected to date, reported by Mrs. W. H. Ricker, clerk, is \$1006.88 for a five month period.

## Zozo Student Council Favors Rec. Center

A vote by the Carrizozo High School Student Council favored a recreation center over a swimming pool, members of the Lions Club were told at their meeting Wednesday night by John Volt, member of the high school faculty.

Mr. Volt said a discussion of recreation needs for the youth of the community came up at a recent meeting of the student council, comprising 14 representatives of the students. In the balloting a recreation center received 437 votes, a swimming pool 363 votes and a YMCA 231 votes. Tennis courts, a baseball diamond, a YWCA and a softball diamond followed in order.

The totals were compiled by a point system which gave the first place vote five points, second place four points, third place vote three points, fourth place vote two points and fifth place vote one point.

The club was asked to assist in arrangements for a visit Friday, Jan. 27, of a ten-man unit from the New Mexico National Guard, which is undertaking a state-wide campaign to help the March of Dimes.

An executive board meeting of the club is scheduled for next Tuesday, 12:30 at the Yucca Grill to make plans for the Guard's visit.

## NELLIE HENLEY BRANUM

Holding her 6-week-old great-grandson, James David Branson, son of Mr. and Mrs. David E. Branson of Roswell, Calif.

I'm Mrs. Nellie Henley Branim. I was born in Missouri on a big plantation but left there at two months of age. My father came to Texas and taught school. The family stayed there until his health broke down and in the meantime my grandfather had developed asthma and they sold his plantation and moved to Roswell. He wrote my father to come to Roswell for his health. So there we were. I don't remember much about the trip. I was very small, but I do remember an incident crossing the Pecos River. I can see that in my mind yet. We had to camp there for three days to dry our bedding out.

We landed in Roswell the first day of November, 1890. We lived there for the winter in what was called a chesoa. They dug down a certain depth and laid logs around and then sticks were laid across and dirt thrown upon them. I slept down there and carved in the dirt.

When it was spring my father and mother loaded up everything and came up on the Bonito, five miles above Fort Stanton and filed on a 160 acre homestead. The big pine trees were cut down and the logs trimmed to build a log cabin. There were lots of trees everywhere at that time.

There were many homesteads all up and down the Bonito and there was lots of water in the creek then.

## BUILD ANGUS SCHOOL

My first school days were at a subscription school. An elderly man named Bingham was the teacher. They had three months of school that year. Each family had to pay so much per pupil. Then after that the whole country around got together and built a schoolhouse across the creek at Angus. There is a schoolhouse there now. They all gathered there and while some of them hauled the logs, others put up the schoolhouse. We went two miles to school and most of us walked the distance, three months out of the year. The school went to the eighth grade, but I don't think they had many eighth grade pupils at that time.

My grandfather, homesteaded 160 acres just above us, adjoining us, and my uncle came up and filed on a homestead just below us. His name was Will Henley and my father's name was Tom Henley and my grandfather was Allen Henley.

I've seen my father sit in the doorway with his old buffalo gun and kill a deer. There were always deer and turkeys when we needed meat. You could kill them when you wanted to.

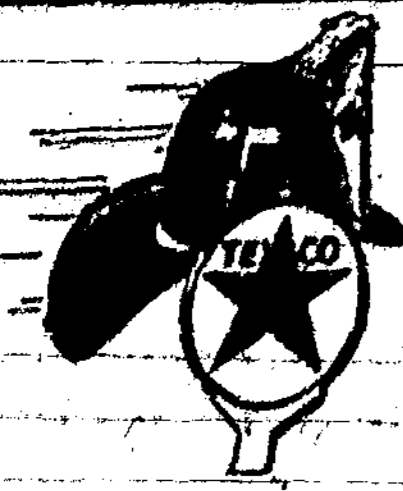
The first year we raised a big crop of Irish potatoes. I can remember that yet. I was a pretty good hand at picking up those potatoes. My father would go down the rows with a turn plow and plow up the potatoes and we would pick them up and throw them in piles along the rows. He loaded up the wagon and drove to Las Vegas to sell the potatoes and brought back provisions.

There wasn't any White Oaks then, or Nogal, or Capitan. There were only a few houses in Lincoln. There was a Captain Roberts there. He was captain of the army. The Lincoln County War was over with when we came here. There were wild animals and wild Indians mostly. The Indians were quite a nuisance. There were several reports around that they had killed people, but I don't think they went any farther than stealing horses. They didn't want cows, just horses.

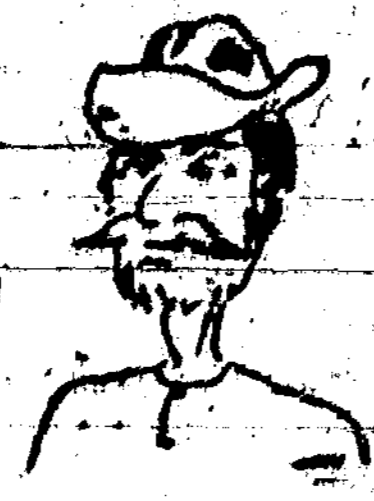

# THE FOLKLORE CORNER

## THE SIGNS ON THE HILL

The face of the Indian with headdress near the foot of the hill at sunrise—the beginning of an elaborate and mystifying design, that develops during the day as the light changes and the shadows shift.

Mrs. Dorothy Head, who lives on a farm west of Rincon Junction, has been watching the signs for two years from her kitchen window, which looks south toward the hill; an estimated 500 feet high. The hill is about a five-minute walk from Mrs. Head's house. Oddly, the whole design, complete by late afternoon, disappears if one walks up to the foot of the hill, Mrs. Head says.

The second face on the hill appears about an hour after that of the Indian. The chin of the hatless white man rests on the forehead of the Indian. Both faces are several times the size of a human being.

No further signs develop on the hill until after noon. Then a dart takes shape in the face of the white man, and a three-pointed leaf appears along with the letter "M" and three crosses.

At about 4:30 p.m. a giant olla takes shape on the hill, reaching to the top of it and completing the design. One side of the white man's face now is seen as part of the right side of the olla. In the circle of the olla and to the left of the faces are the three crosses, one in the "M," another in the leaf and the third in the third in the middle of the olla.

At the top of the hill, on the right side, two half circles appear. Mrs. Head says these mean: follow the curve of the hill, presumably to long-buried treasure.

It is a fact that by following the curve of the hill you will come to other rocks with designs chiseled into them.

In the small canyon, where the signs appear on the hill, there are three rocks with designs. On the first are three men, with a cross by each one, and an enormous Spanish "G" atop the rock.

A short distance ahead is a smaller rock with a turtle design, and on the third rock is a horse.

Now, if you continue beyond the third rock and into a second small canyon, you will come to a rock on the canyon floor, into which a dart and turkey track have been chiseled.

A turkey track sometimes indicates buried treasure, according to Mrs. Head.

Is the turkey track the end of the trail to treasure in a giant olla buried secretly years ago by white man and Indian? It's anyone's guess.

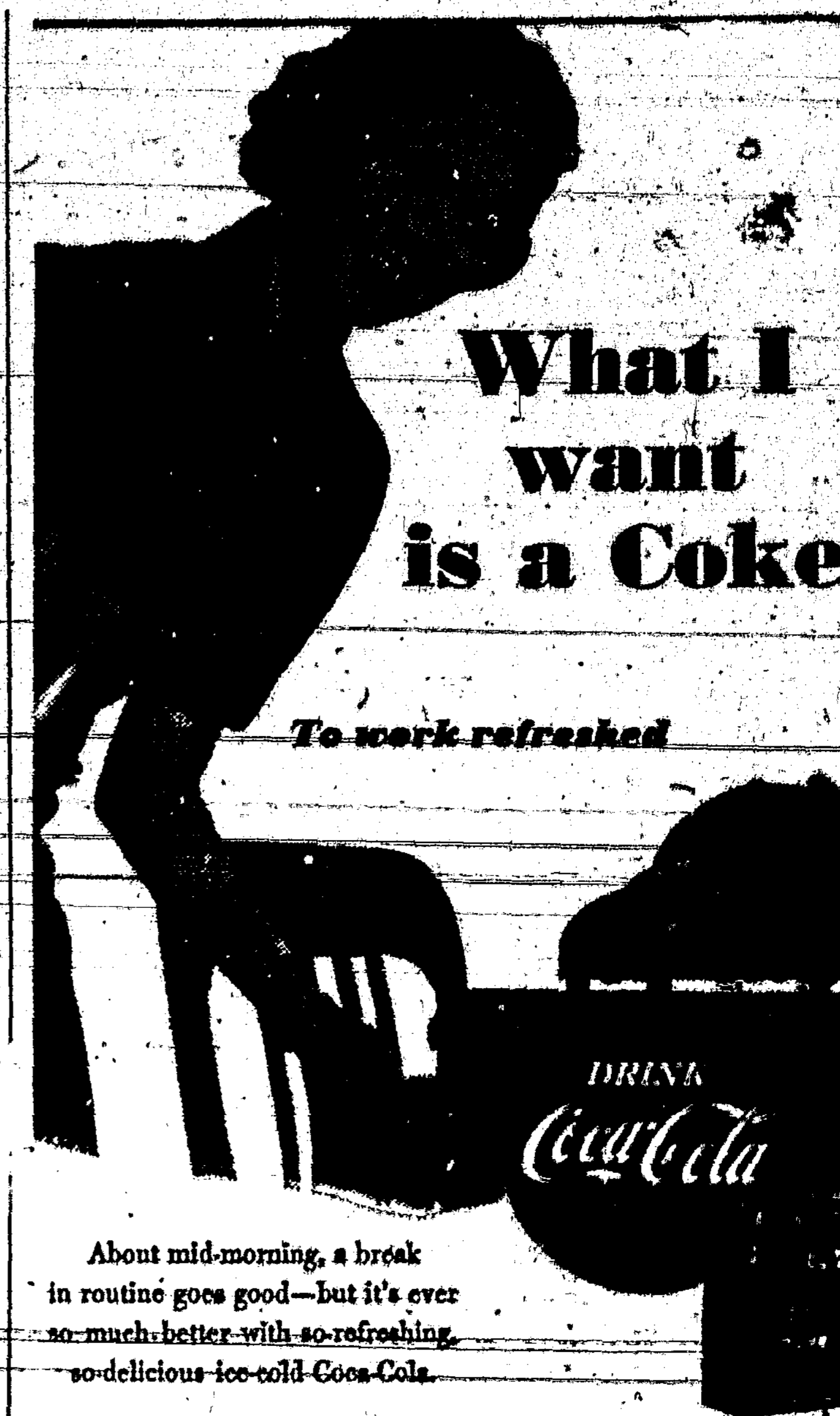
your horse and turn him loose." I went in to prepare the supper and Mr. Branum came in and said:

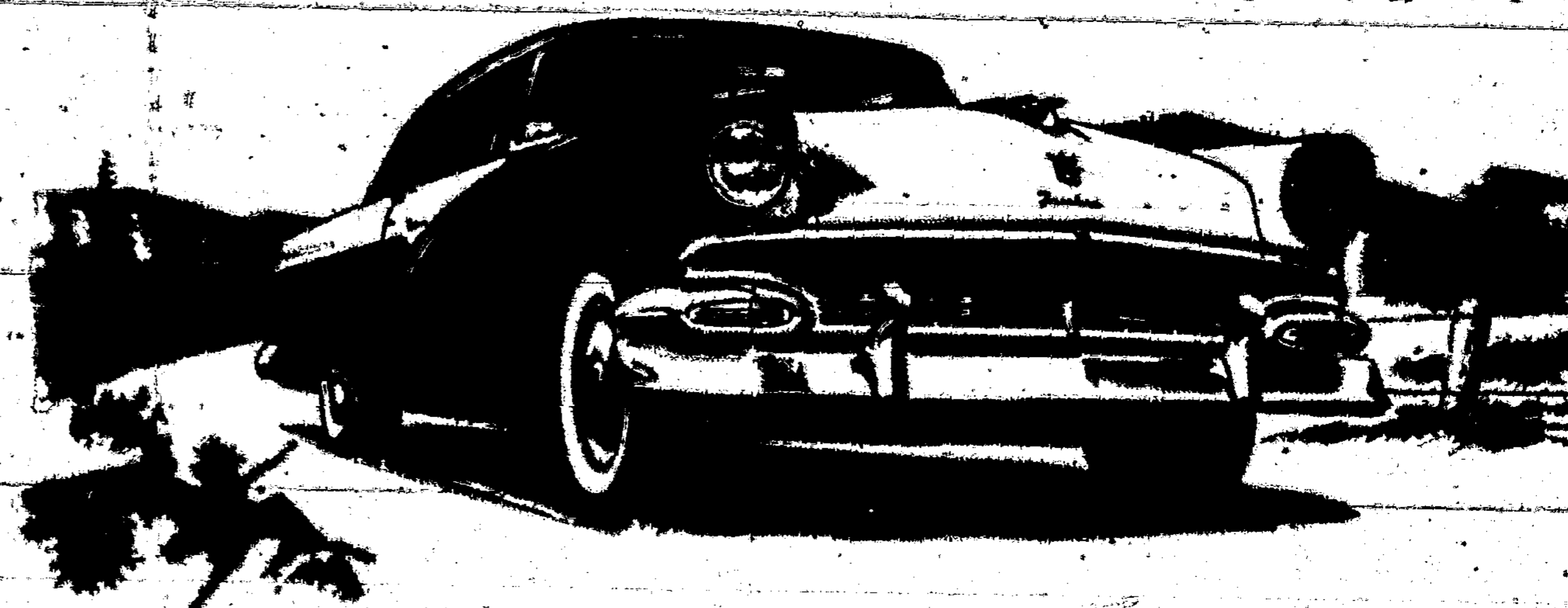
