ALBERT T. PFINGSTEN

When the Southern Pacific changed to diesel power they were willing to sell the Bonito Farms to someone who would assume the risks in maintaining the water right and would be friendly to their way of thinking. After three years of negotiating I was finally able to buy the farms and I feel that my long service with the railroad company and that of my father had a good deal of influence on the company in selling them to me, because I believe if they would have sold them on an open market they would have got more for them than they asked me.

Last year I bought 600 trees for replacement but they got here so late that I had so much other work to do that I didn't get them planted. It was in 1934 that I bought them and when I got the irrigating, pruning, plowing and other chores done, it was too late. I will plant the 600 replacement trees this spring.

The replacement trees will not be new acreage but will fill in where the deer and other misdeeds have killed out the trees. The deer have killed over 600 trees in one orchard alone. The sportsmen were a little bit depressed because I wanted to kill off the deer damaging the trees, but I figured they could grow more deer easier than I could grow more apples.

We call the first orchard below Captain the Hog Pen Orchard. The reason it has that name is that during the time that they had the sailors off the S. S. Columbus interned at Fort Stanton they needed something for the boys to do and they rented that spot for a garden. Well, instead of raising a garden they built a hog pen and they raised hogs with their garbage. They had 100 to 150 hogs there so we called it the Hog Pen Orchard.

The next orchard down is the Terrace Orchard. Then the next one is by the Big Rock. The Chavez place is 50 some acres and in the Burleson place there's 33 acres. The deer did most damage to the Vorwerk and the Hog Pen orchards. The Vorwerk Orchard has 25 acres. The upper Spring Orchard has 18 acres and the lower Spring Ranch 41 acres. The Kirkland Orchard has 53 acres—407 acres of young orchards all told. Seventy-five per cent of the trees are Star King or Double Red Delicious and the rest Rome Beauties, Jonathans and Stamen Winesaps.

COURT HOUSE RESTORATION

The old Lincoln Court House was in rather a dilapidated state back when WPA days came along and they began a project to more or less restore the old courthouse. At one time it had been used for a school and they used to have dances upstairs in the old courtroom. The WPA project stuccoed the outside of it and partly worked over its cornice boards and did some other work. They didn't do a whole lot.

Most of their activity was directed by the Eastern New Mexico Historical Society and the Historical Society bought the site of the old Torreon and rebuilt it. Then we had a couple of ex-governors in the state. One of them needed something to do so the state decided to make George Curry, State Historian.

They assigned him to the old court house in Lincoln. The ex-governor was ambitious and he did quite a bit for the old Lincoln County Court House. Then about the time of the old governor's death the legislature passed the bill establishing the Old Lincoln County Memorial Commission.

The commission is composed of members from the seven counties that were carved from the Old Lincoln County as it was back in the 80's. The commission members are appointed by the governor and serve in staggered terms.

The legislature made an appropriation of, I believe \$5,000, to operate, restore and fix up the old court house, somewhat in the condition it was when Lincoln was the county seat. We have put on a new roof and floored the stairs and have put up many cases and exhibits, repainted the inside of the court house and have restored the old judge's bench and the jury box. The commission has long range plans for a gradual restoration and preservation of the whole town of Lincoln. Recently they purchased three of the older buildings and building sites in Lincoln and have started work on the old Hulbert house.

It will depend on how we fare at the next legislature as to how soon we can restore them, but it is our hope to reconstruct the old Wortley Hotel. We may put a little modernization on it because it had 16 hotel rooms, all of them with outside entrances.

and no plumbing. We hope to modernize it just a little bit when we do reconstruct.

The commission is now composed of the following members: Mr. Keltcher, member at large, who lives in Albuquerque; Colonel Luck who is an ex-commandant, NMNM, Roswell; Frank Kendall of Carlsbad; Mrs. U. D. Sawyer of Carrizozo; Mrs. Ora Lee Skipworth of Fort Sumner; Mr. Kerr of House, Mr. Mayhill of Otero County, and myself. We think we have a good board. It is strictly not a political board at all. Until a very recent canvass none of us knew what political faith any other one had. We work very congenially together and it is our hope that we can gradually bring Lincoln back so that all of it won't be lost.

I was married on December 30, 1922. My wife's maiden name was Ora Manning. She was a school teacher also. However, I managed to keep her from teaching school except part of one term that she substituted. We were married in Roswell. I was teaching school at White Oaks at the time we were married.

Mrs. Betty Shrecengost is our only child. We lost two.

### SOIL CONSERVATION WORK

It seems like nature played into our hands forming the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation district. The State Conservation law had been passed about 1940 and in 1941 the flood disrupted all irrigation structures, dams, ditches and some homes in the three valleys which are the heart of the Upper Hondo Soil Conservation district.

At that time there were the CCC boys and they were available and of course the forest service stayed in with us and we organized our district board. We got right to work and a crew of CCC boys stationed at Fort Stanton started cutting logs. We contracted for a dragline and a drag line operator. We rebuilt several of the washed out dams on the Ruidoso and the Hondo streams with the facilities made available to us, along with the technical advice.

We rebuilt a lot of the old ditches. The state engineer was very cooperative in allowing us to take water in any way we could get it in 1942, because the ditches had been completely disrupted from the flood in 1941. (Continued on Back Page)

### Food Mart Gives \$100 To Town's Fire Dept.

In appreciation for their promptness in putting out a blaze that had started in the Food Mart March 17, the Carrizozo Volunteer Fire Department was sent a check for \$100 by the store management.

The check was signed by G. W. Foster, president of Food Mart, and mailed to John Tilch, local manager. Mayor Marvin H. Roberts handed the check over to the firemen at their meeting Monday night, and read the accompanying letter from Mr. Foster.

It expressed the firm's thanks for the firemen's prompt response to the alarm and their efficiency in quelling the blaze.

The fire started in a motor of a frozen food compartment. "We found a ticklish situation when we got to the fire," Chief Fay Harkey said.

"The fire was smoldering because it was in a closed building, with little oxygen to feed it. The building was filled with smoke which could have ignited when we opened the door. Fortunately, this did not happen."

Refrigerating gas had escaped into the building and the firemen had to wear gas masks as they put out the blaze around the burning food box.

There were no strings attached as to how the fire department could spend the money. They discussed remodeling a small building they own into a two-room apartment, which would be rented. Jess Garrison was appointed to make an estimate of the cost of remodeling.

A large turnout of voters is expected in Carrizozo's municipal election next Tuesday to cast ballots for town officials and a sewer bond issue of \$165,000.

In addition to electing municipal officials, Captain and Ruidoso will vote on bond issues to improve and enlarge their existing water supply. Corona voters have a bond issue before them to develop a supply of water.

In Carrizozo there is a division of opinion over immediate resumption of use of water from Lake Bonito.

There are two tickets for mayor and two trustees. Seeking re-election are Mayor Marvin H. Roberts and Trustees Clifton B. Zumwalt and Juan Martinez.

Opposing them is the Peoples ticket of Wayne C. Withers for mayor and Leandro Vega and L. Z. Manire for trustees.

The general obligation bond issue of \$165,000 to build a new sewage system and disposal plant is on a separate ballot.

The polls open at 9 a.m., and close at 6 p.m. Voting is in the fire hall.

Coronans will vote on a bond issue in amount of \$50,000 to be used in constructing a water system.

In Captain, Mayor D. O. Murphy is unopposed for re-election, as are Fletcher Hall Jr., and Virgil Hall for councilmen (4-year terms) and William L. Holmes, councilman for the unexpired two-year term.

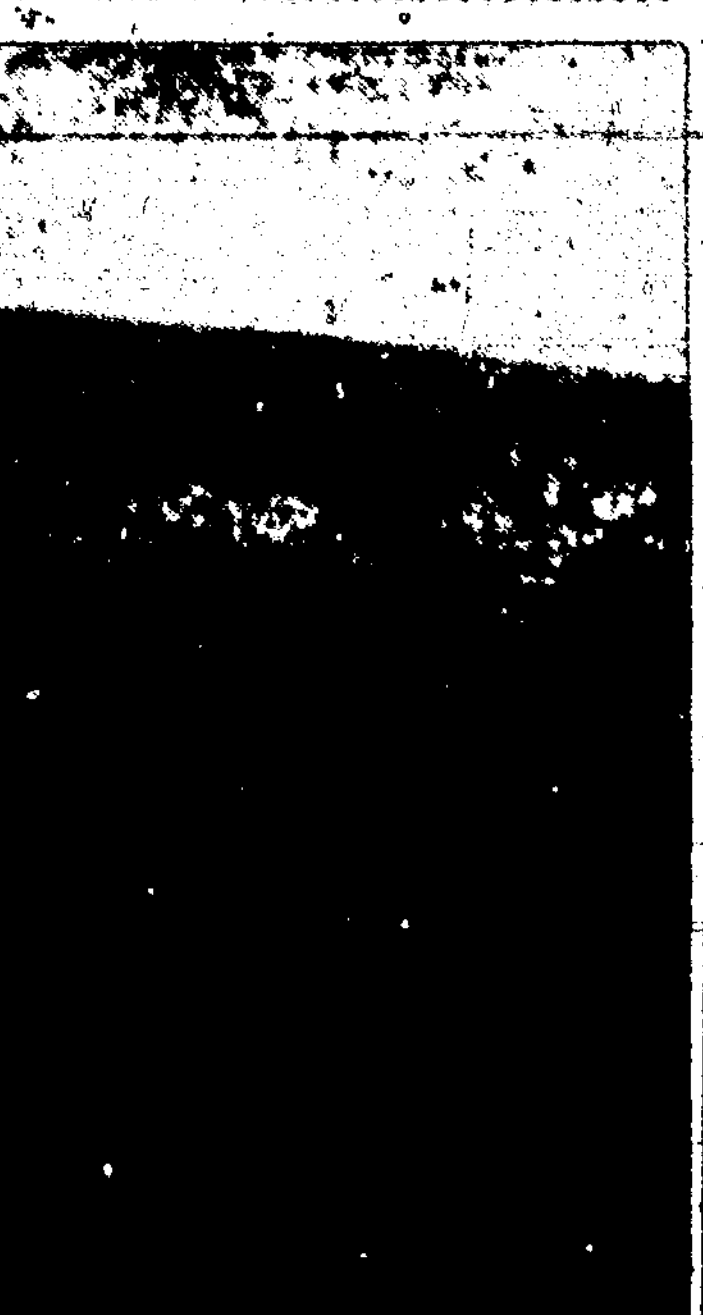
Capitan's voters will ballot on a general obligation bond issue of \$35,000 to bring soft water from Eagle Creek to Capitan. Ruidoso's water bond proposal is for \$350,000 for an Eagle Creek pipeline and to extend the present water works system.

## Appoint Committee On 'Hopper Control

Lincoln county ranchers indicated interest in grasshopper control by attending a meeting held in Capitan Monday night.

After George Fulkerson had explained to the group the control program and the possible infested areas, a committee of ranchers was appointed to act on grasshopper control if the need arises.

The committee members are Ralph Pearson, R. W. Floyd, Albert and Farrell Watson, Grady Eldridge and George Sineros.

These members will keep informed of the grasshopper situation in their areas.

Also, in the Anecho and Corona areas, if grasshoppers develop and interest is shown in control, Corbin Hester of Corona and Mr. Straley of Ancho were asked to talk over the grasshopper situation with the ranchers in their area.

Heavy grasshopper infestation was indicated by 1955 surveys in the Fort Stanton area, Encinoso, Tinnie-Arabela and the area east of Carrizozo, as well as a considerable portion along the east county line extending into Chaves county.

Mr. Fulkerson indicated that from interest shown they would be in this area from time to time throughout the summer.

Cost of 'hopper control is still estimated at 20c an acre.

John Durkin, extension entomologist, was also at the meeting and representatives from all infested areas in the county.

The Presbyterian church of Corona, is planning a scheduled week of revival services beginning April 24 through Sunday, April 29.

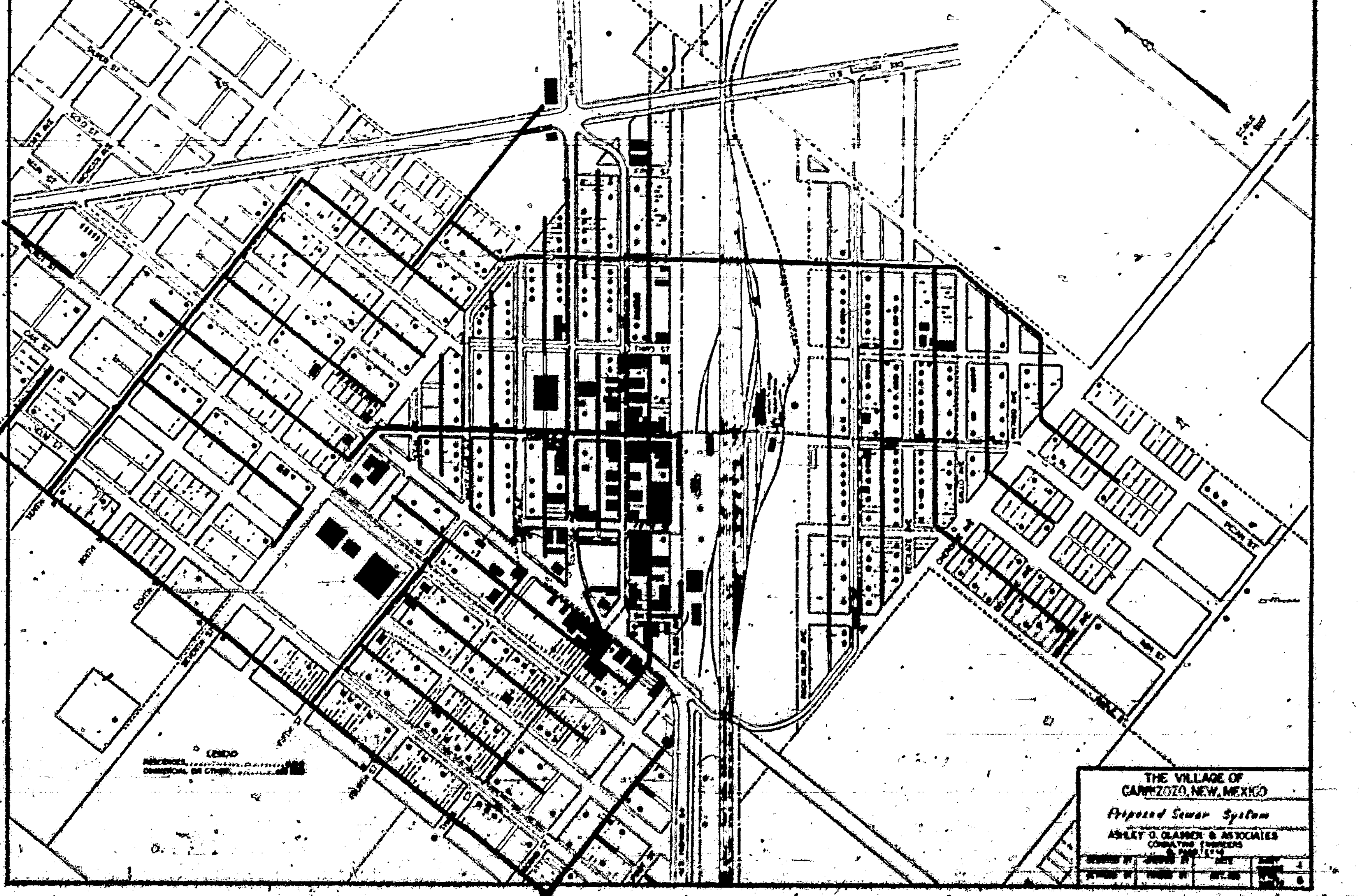

Another famous New Mexico landmark will be seen on live television screens throughout the country when the nomadic weekly series, "Wide, Wide World" visits Acoma Pueblo on Easter Sunday, April 1. Miss Loy Davis closed a successful term of school at upper San Patricio.

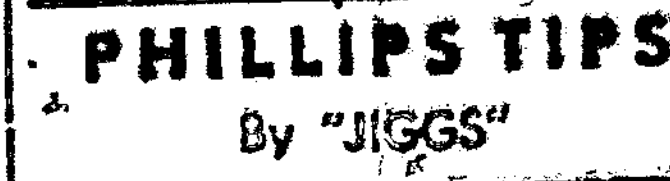
John R. Green, old time conductor, purchased a ranch north of Captain.

### County's Service Firms Have \$213,000 Payroll

Receipts of 86 service establishments enumerated in Lincoln County in the 1936 Census of Business amounted to about \$1,449,000, according to a preliminary report covering service trades, published by the Bureau of the Census, U. S. Department of Commerce.

The combined yearly payroll of the county's service establishments was \$213,000. They reported 63 employees of whom 53 worked fulltime in the pay period ending nearest November 15. Proprietors actively employed in the operation of unincorporated businesses numbered 96.

Establishments providing personal services numbered 24 and reported receipts of \$109,000.

Establishments primarily engaged in automotive repair, parking and other automotive services numbered nine and had receipts of \$181,000.

Establishments listed as "all other services" in the preliminary report numbered 53 and had receipts of \$159,000.

"Personal services" group includes such businesses as barber and beauty shops, cleaning and dyeing plants, laundries and laundry services, garment alteration and repair services, funeral services, photographic studios, shoe repair shops and shine parlors, as well as other personal services.

"Automotive services" group includes general automobile repair shops, battery service shops, tire repair shops, body repair and paint shops, automobile rentals, storage garages, parking lots, auto laundries and other miscellaneous automotive services.

"All other selected services" group includes business services, miscellaneous repair services, amusement and recreation services, motion pictures, hotels, tourist courts, motels and camps.

# Farm and Ranch

## Kill Tree Pests With Oil Sprays

Don't forget to give your fruit trees a dormant or delayed dormant oil or DN (dinitro) spray. Dormant sprays of oil or DN will kill mite and aphid eggs and scale insects which spend the winter on the limbs and trunks of the fruit trees in your orchard or yard.

Thorough coverage of all the twigs, limbs, and trunks of your trees is very important. Eggs and scales are in cracks and crevices in the bark and in the crotches of limbs and twigs. If a few eggs are missed now your trees will suffer later.

Oils can be applied from now until the green tip stage, on apples and peaches and until just before the buds break on pears and cherries. If you use a delayed dormant spray when buds are breaking, add nicotine sulfate for increased control of aphids. DDT should be added to the delayed dormant spray on peaches to control twig borers.

Don't apply sprays to fruit trees if the temperature is below 40 degrees F or if there is danger of a freeze before the spray has a chance to dry.

## GET IN SWING WITH SPRING

It's spring again! . . . and once again the land takes on a fresh, clean look. For springtime is nature's clean-up time—a time when winter's bleak landscape is displaced by the soft green of renewing life.

Let's help nature by cleaning up around the farm and in the farm house. Give the farm a new look, and make it a safer and easier place to live and work.

Pick up broken glass, rusty tin cans and loose boards with nails in them.

Get rid of the trash that's accumulated all year and clean up that old lumber piled back of the barn.

Give the farm shop a good housecleaning, too; put tools in neat order and assign a place for every tool.

Inspect broken and worn steps and stairs for repairs.

Spread a little paint to brighten up the place; and trim the shrubbery and plant some flowers.

Give everything a place and keep everything in place.

Get in the swing—clean up for spring!

## Protect Horses from Sleeping Sickness

Surveys indicate that outbreaks of encephalomyelitis (sleeping sickness) in horses may be heavier this year in New Mexico than in previous years, says Ivan Watson, extension animal husbandman at New Mexico A&M College. The best way to prevent outbreaks of the disease among horses is to vaccinate the animals—in April or May—well ahead of the most dangerous season, June through October.

Numerous cases of the infectious disease were found in 1955 among horses and mules in several southeastern states and evidence of the disease increased also in several western states, including New Mexico, Colorado and Wyoming.

Mosquitoes are the principal carriers of the sleeping sickness virus and several other insects are also incriminated to some degree, the animal husbandman says. The two viruses causing the disease can infect more species of animals than perhaps any other known viruses, but disease has not been known to pass from one animal to another.

"There seems to be considerable controversy over whether Federal taxes should be reduced this year," said Albert K. Nohl, Director of the Taxpayers Association. "This film sheds a lot of light on the whole problem of Federal finances and we anticipate a big turnout for the showing."

The meeting is open to the general public, but luncheon and meeting facilities will accommodate only 300 persons, so the Association urges that reservations be made early.

## THE FOLKLORE CORNER

### A GEORGETOWN SCARE

The following item is from "Black Range Tales" by James A. McKenna:

The placers near Hillsboro closed down because the Indians were always in the vicinity. Most of the miners went across the Black Range to Georgetown, which was still booming, in spite of the rumors that flew about. It was reported that the Indians had attacked Silver City and other near-by towns.

Everyone in Georgetown went about well-armed. Some carried Winchester; others packed six-shooters with two belts of cartridges and a long knife. No one took time to shave or wash up, too afraid of being caught in the act. At the end of a month of this fear the men of Georgetown had a wild and woolly look.

The ten saloons of Georgetown were crowded all night, and every chair at the 20 gambling tables was in use, though it cost more than the best seat at a horse race. As the mines were running full blast and full time the town was virtually deserted during the day.

Some time after the arrival of

the Hillsboro refugees a badly frightened goat herder dashed into town saying he had seen 50 Indians in the near-by brush close to the graveyard. The town went mad with excitement. Business was at a standstill. Stores, saloons, and all public houses were quickly locked and even barricaded. A crowd of Georgetown men forced the trembling goat herder to lead them to the spot where he had seen the Indians. Hardly had they reached the place when Jim Bragaw shouted, "There they are!" Instantly lifting their guns to their shoulders, the miners peered in to the woods, but they could see nothing.

Sig Lindauer (now dead), for many years a well-known merchant in Southern New Mexico, lifted his double-barreled shotgun, which was loaded for bear. In his excitement, instead of touching the trigger he threw his hand on the lever, forcing out both cartridges. "Vell! Vell! Vot kind of a goose gun is this?" he shouted. "Give me that six-shooter, Helde. I'm not used to this damn blunderbuss."

By the time they had traded guns the goat herder had disappeared, making his getaway during the commotion. It then dawned on the posse that it was a false alarm. The "Indians" had been all in the eye of the timid herder.

The following items were contributed by Mrs. Rachel Floyd of Truth or Consequences:

### THE 13TH PUPIL

About 1922, the people at Elk wanted to open a school for their children. There were 12 children of school age, but 13 were needed so that the state would furnish a building and a teacher.

Uncle Charlie Hanna, great-uncle of Mrs. Floyd, stopped at the Cady Ranch on the Lower Penasco Creek in the Sacramento Mountains and told Rachel's mother about the situation. Rachel went home with Uncle Charlie who lived near Elk and wanted a school for his four children, and became the 13th pupil. The school was opened and a picture was taken of the pupils and sent to the proper authorities.

In late October the 13th pupil got a bad case of croup. Her family drove up and brought her home in their Ford car, the only car in the valley.

About a week or two before the 13th pupil became ill, a family with six children, all of school age, moved to Elk, and the school was accused of remaining open.

### THE FIRE IN THE CAVE

One afternoon in the winter of 1923 a snowstorm came up on the Lower Penasco Creek in the Sacramento Mountains. About the middle of the afternoon the storm became very severe. The teacher let out school and went home, leaving the children to get home the best they could.

Among the pupils were the three Cady children, including Rachel, now Mrs. Floyd. They started their 4½-mile ride home on horseback.

The day was growing dark when they arrived at Dead Man's Bluff on Chimney Flats. Other children had gotten there ahead of them and had built a fire in a shallow cave in the hill. The half-frozen children warmed up and rode on home. Their horses

were blinded by falling snow, but the pupils arrived safely. The next day a stranger stopped at the Cady Ranch. He said, "I was about to give up as lost when I saw a fire. I managed to get to the fire in the cave and keep it burning most of the night. I am sure I would have frozen to death if I had not seen the fire in the cave."

The biggest dam we rebuilt, I guess, was the Sunset Dam which washed out again in '34. It was constructed out of native timber which doesn't last too long in dry country. It has not been rebuilt. The state did come in there last year and built up a big spill there but the big flood last August knocked it out again.

The Sunset Ranch now gets water by pumping it. We hope that the state will come in and help rebuild it. Being such a big structure and such an expensive one it would likely bankrupt an individual or the small group of individuals down there to rebuild it under present conditions. Charles Fuller feels that he can pump whatever water he has to have cheaper than he can rebuild the dam.

I talked to some of the fellows up at the state engineer's office and one of them told me that there was a state fund that, in instances where there were enough people served by one of these community ditches, the state would step in and stand a part in reconstructing it. I got one of the boys from the state engineer's office to come down and look this over. I haven't heard anything from them as to whether they are going to do anything or not.

Our upper Hondo SCD board is composed at the present time of Peter Hurd, Charles Fuller, Wilbur McKnight, Ralph Bonnell, and myself. Our district conservationist is Archie Fuchs. We have an engineer by the name of Myers and our faithful clerk, Jack Earling. We have been told we've got the best set of books of any SCD in the state. The members serve without any pay. It's supposed to be a dollar a year job but we haven't received the dollar yet.

In the winter time we do quite a bit of land levelling and in summer during the farming season we work around on the various ranches and do most anything that can be considered conservation work. We have a few times consented to do work that was not conservation work but we set the rate up on that to the commercial rate. Our work is available to farmers and ranchers in the district, cheaper than they can go out and hire commercial rigs to do their work. We have been very fortunate in having kept our rig busy ever since the forming of the district. Most of the time we have two or three months work stacked up in advance.

## SIMMS BLUNDERS COME BACK HOME

SANTA FE, March 23 — Gov. John Simms' indecisiveness in handling labor affairs finally came home to roost with the same organized labor element that he has been favoring calling for his defeat for renomination. They picked Pleckett.

The man who precluded over the AFL-CIO meeting that voted to defeat Simms was James A. Price, member of Simms' important Labor and Industrial commission.

The labor group that is after Simms' scalp is the same one that Simms favored by retaining William Burrell as state labor commissioner after promising potash workers in Eddy county that he would name Sheford Matney of Carlsbad to the post. He antagonized the Eddy county group and quite obviously didn't please the other side which is voting for his defeat.

## FAILED TO CHANGE STATE LABOR BOARD

Simms didn't have the real support of the organized labor in his first run for governor although he explained and apologized all over the place about his earlier connection with the union-busting "right to work" movement and promised faithfully not to try it again, if elected.

The relationship worsened when Simms' people tried to pass a new workmen's compensation law in what was the bitterest fight of the legislature.

That was the signal for Simms to step in and appoint his own Labor and Industrial commission and at least save the support of part of the labor group. He had on his desk the resignations of all three members but for some reason chose to do nothing.

## ALMOST MOVED LAST SEPTEMBER

He was at the point of naming a new commission to replace the one set up by his Republican predecessor last September after promising the labor job to Matney. But again he delayed and while he was waiting the state Federation of Labor held a convention in Carlsbad and with James A. Price presiding called for the continuation of William Burrell in the labor post and in effect defied Simms to do anything about it.

Simms didn't do anything, apparently still hoping to win over

## Along the Way..

The use of Bonito water is one of the main issues in Carrizozo's municipal election next Tuesday. The Peoples Ticket pledged, if elected, to put the Bonito water back into the mains at once. The Town or Administration Ticket, is committed to use Bonito water after the new pipeline is laid to Alamogordo. To do so now, they state, would mean higher water rates. It is for the people to decide whether they want Bonito water back in the mains now or whether they are satisfied to use the well water until the new Bonito pipeline is put into operation.

Carrizozo voters are also asked to approve a \$165,000 bond issue to finance a new sewage and disposal plant for Carrizozo. Only a small part of Carrizozo is served by the present sewer line and it is overtaxed. The small disposal tank was inoperative during the cold weather and raw sewage accumulated in a pond. A new sewage system is a must even if Carrizozo grows no larger than it is. And there are indications that the healthy growth of the past few years will continue. Two contractors were in Carrizozo this week looking into the possibility of building a minimum of 25 new homes. One of the first questions they asked was about sewer connections. Having a sewer connection means a saving up to \$300 on each home, so it is no wonder that contractors ask about it. A modern sewage collection and disposal system is needed, not only for the growth of our community, but for its health.

Our attention has been called to an item in the October 7 last issue of the News in which criticism was made of a power outage in Capitan. The news item was printed while the editor was away on vacation. It is not the policy of the News to be critical of the REA. On the contrary, we think they have done an outstanding and important work in bringing low-cost power to towns and ranches. Power outages are annoying, but they occur in towns and cities everywhere. The REA, from what we hear, has done a fine job of distributing power to Lincoln county communities, as well as maintenance on its lines and service to its customers.

Lafel Oman, Las Cruces attorney, visited Lincoln County Saturday in the interest of his candidacy for district judge of the Third Judicial District. Mr. Oman opposes Judge Allan D. Walker of Alamogordo in the democratic primary election. Mr. Oman believes the judgeships should be removed from the field of politics and be appointive rather than elective. "However," he said, "I am enjoying getting around to meet as many people as I can. I want the voters to elect the most qualified man for their district judge." This is his first entry into politics. He was urged by friends in the legal profession to make the race. Mr. Oman, while in Lincoln county, visited in Ruidoso, Capitan and Carrizozo. He will return later to visit Corona and other county towns. He was accompanied by attorneys Tom Campbell and E. E. Triviz of Las Cruces and Geo. L. Zimmerman of Carrizozo.

"Southern Pacific hereby excepts and reserves and agrees to convey to the Town of Carrizozo, a municipal subdivision of the State of New Mexico, out of said 5 cubic feet per second appropriation and ownership in and to said Bonito water right, .178 cubic feet of water per second, which reservation is equal to a flow of 115,000 gallons of water each twenty-four hours, delivered at Carrizozo for use or sale by said Town for municipal, governmental, domestic, mechanical, industrial or commercial purposes of said Town and its inhabitants upon its agreement to pay the service charge to the City of Alamogordo for all water taken by it at the rate of 20 cents per thousand gallons. THIS WATER RIGHT SHALL BE PRIOR TO THE RIGHT AND ESTATE TO BE SOLD AND TRANSFERRED TO THE CITY OF ALAMOGORDO . . ."
