Bids Called for Construction on 37

The State Highway Department has called for bids for May 25, 1956, on several highway projects in New Mexico. Among them is Federal Aid Project No. S-1226(2) in Lincoln County.

This proposal is for construction on New Mexico Highway 37, from Angus Southerly. The approximate length is 2.027 miles. The proposed construction consists of two-lane, grading, drainage structures, controlled gradation sub-base, base course, double penetration bituminous surfacing, one bridge, 4-25 ft. span precast concrete slab superstructure on steel pipe columns set in concrete block substructure, and miscellaneous construction. This contract must be completed in 124 working days.

FHA and GI Loans Available for This Area

FHA and GI loans are available for this area to build new homes. The News was informed this week by John Wischart, Big Jo Manager and A. A. Brooks, builder, who have in making his permanent home in Carrizozo. Mr. Brooks, who has moved his family to Carrizozo, is building a new home for Mr. and Mrs. Fred English.

Home sites as well as the homes must meet FHA requirements. These can be explained by either Mr. Wischart or Mr. Brooks. The latter holds a general contractor's license and has had 11 years experience in all types of building. He built several homes in Roswell where they lived last year.

Wheat Producers May Apply for Allotment

Herman Melchen, ASC director for Lincoln County, states that wheat producers may request application for a 1957 wheat acreage allotment. Wheat producers are eligible to fill out these forms when there was no wheat produced on their farms in 1951, 1953 or 1955. If they wish to apply they may secure the forms at the ASC office in the Courthouse in Carrizozo and fill them out not later than June 15, 1956, for committee consideration.

Copper Corp. Mill Processes Bingham Ore

Starting this week, lead, copper and silver ore from the Bingham low-Bingham mines is being processed at the Carrizozo mill of the New Mexico Copper Corp. An eight-hour shift is operating the mill at the present time. Ore from the Surprise mines at Nogal is to be run at a later date. The mill recently processed custom lump ore from White Oaks.

John J. Keel, of Washington, D. C., vice president of the New Mexico Copper Corp., spent a few days in Carrizozo last week. He stated he was pleased with the development work on the company's properties since his last visit here about a year ago.

Egg Production Climbs At Vega Poultry Farm

Egg production at the Vega Poultry Farm in Carrizozo is continuing to climb. The hens were laying over 800 eggs daily the first part of this week. After the eggs are laid in cages they are picked up three times daily and are cooled, candled and graded, ready for delivery the following day.

Every Friday 15 cases of these quality eggs are delivered to stores in Ruidoso. Leandro Vega Jr. makes deliveries every other day to customers in Carrizozo.

Budget Hearings Set for Lincoln County

The Tax Commission of New Mexico has scheduled county and municipal budget hearings for Lincoln County on Monday, Aug. 27.

The county budget will be taken up at 9 o'clock in the morning and municipal budgets at the following hours: Carrizozo, 1:00; Corona, 2:00; the latter two at the Carrizozo town hall.

On Tuesday, Aug. 28, the Captain budget will be reviewed at 10 in the morning in Captain and the Ruidoso budget at 2 in the afternoon at Ruidoso.

Carrizozo Trustees Discuss Sewerage, Bonito Water Use

The Carrizozo board of town trustees and mayor met Tuesday evening at the town hall with Attorney Frank C. Boyce. He brought them up to date on his work up to the time of the municipal election in connection with the sewer bond issue.

In the past, he said, the State has purchased municipal bonds, provided proof was shown that they cannot be sold on the open market. Sale of the bonds to the State would be most advantageous to the town, he said.

Mr. Boyce presented a bill for services rendered in connection with the bond issue in the amount of \$200. The trustees voted to pay the fee.

Mayor Withers announced the appointment of H. Elfred Jones to represent the town in legal matters. Mr. Jones was instructed to proceed with preparation of papers to submit to the State for approval of the sewerage disposal system.

Town Clerk Johnson Stearns was instructed to contact several engineers in the Southwest regarding Carrizozo's proposal to build a sewerage disposal system.

The clerk was also asked to contact pump dealers on the price of both a new and used pump to be used to put Bonito water from the Southern Pacific line into the elevated reservoir south of town. The size of pump recommended by railroad water officials is 100 g.p.m., which would put 144,000 gals. daily into the city's tank. Utilities Manager Welk stated that the town's present consumption of water is running between 175,000 and 200,000 gals. daily. A revision of the rates upward when Bonito water is again used was also discussed.

MEETING ON MAY 10

A regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Carrizozo May 10 at 7 p.m. was attended by the following: W. S. Withers, mayor; F. L. Sherrill, Leandro Vega, L. Z. Manire, W. W. Mercer, Sally Ortiz, Welcorm Armstrong, H. E. Jones and Johnson Stearns, Clerk.

Three applications for occupation licenses were read and approved—Paul R. Wilson, Pick's Freez and Burger Bar and Riverside Electric. The question was raised whether \$5 was the correct amount to charge the Riverside Electric for an occupation license, it being an out-of-town firm. The clerk was instructed to check on same and if incorrect to contact these people for any additional amount.

H. G. Welk, utilities superintendent, stated that he would need some additional transformers and as there wasn't enough money left in the budget for capital outlay to provide for these, he requested the board to transfer \$300 from equipment to capital outlay for this purpose. Motion made by A. T. Roberts and seconded by L. Z. Manire that clerk be instructed to write state comptroller for authority to make this budgetary transfer. Motion carried.

Application from Cosmo Gallegos read. Mr. Gallegos stated he would handle garbage collections for \$370. Since his application was vague in its meaning, it was referred to the next meeting.

Wendell Watson, Carrizozo High School principal, announces that two members of the Carrizozo High School 1956 graduating class have been granted university scholarships for 1956-1957.




RICHARD ORTIZ

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Tape Recorded Interviews With People Who Helped Build Lincoln County

MAGGIE BROWN ESPEY

My name is Maggie Brown Espey. I was born in Stone County, Mo., in 1879. My father was Thomas Marion Brown and my mother Eliza May Brown. We had ten in our family and two other children.

My folks got tired of living in Missouri and wanted to make a change and come west. So, on May 1, 1894, they started west with Arizona their destination. That was how my sister Ellie got her middle name of "Arizona." My dad thought that was the prettiest name he had ever heard.

When we left there were 29 wagons in the train and my father's wagon was in the lead. Along the way some of the party stopped in Kansas and others went to Colorado. Six families finally came to White Oaks—two families of Mays, the Browns, Emersons, Daltons and the Hurts.

I was too small to remember much about the trip but it must have been an interesting one, from what my mother and father told me later. They stopped along the way and camped, sometimes a week at a time. The men folks fished and hunted rabbits, antelope and prairie chickens. Coming through Kansas there was no wood and we had to do our cooking over a buffalo chip fire.

One day my father's wagon came upon a camp site. A can of coffee was still warm where the fire had been. My father picked up a pair of diamond cuff buttons and he said he suspected that the camper had left in a hurry when he saw our approaching wagons. My father later sold the cuff buttons for \$25.

When we got to White Oaks two of our relatives—Uncle Miles May and Uncle Henry Emerson joined a large party going farther west. Harold Orwig was also with them. He was married to a distant cousin of my mother's. When they got as far as Beserve, N. M., then called Yrisco, the Indians got so bad they stopped at a stone fort. The Indians were said to be Geronimo's Apaches. Harold went out to get a bucket of water and the Indians shot and killed him. Several others, who were out looking for wood, managed to get back to the fort. Soldiers from Fort Stanton and places in Arizona came to round up the Indians. Uncle Miles and Uncle Henry came back to White Oaks.

The families that came with us to White Oaks all stayed around in this part of the country and some of them are here yet. Clark Hust lives in Las Cruces. He is 84 years old. One of Clark Hust's boys lives in Magdalena.

We stayed in White Oaks about two months. Then my father bought a little place in Tortolito Canyon and we lived there 12 or 13 years. It was two or three miles from Nogal. All the school I ever went to was at Nogal. We walked over the hill about three miles to school. Lee Breece was my first teacher. He was an uncle of Henry Feebles. Another teacher was a Mr. Whorton. I was what you might say educated in a primer. Our textbook was the McGuffey reader. I think I got up to about the fifth or sixth reader. We didn't have grades then.

We farmed in Tortolito Canyon and my father freighted from San Antonio, N. M., to Fort Stanton. When we lived in White Oaks he freighted the ore from the mines down to the mill. He did anything he could to make an honest living. After we moved to our homestead on the Bonito he did truck farming and he had the contract for several years to carry the mail from Angus to Parsons City and back every other day. On the days he wasn't doing that he worked for Mr. Peters on his farm. The mail came to Angus by back from Captain.

Our neighbors on the Bonito were the Skinners, the Zumwalt, Lauthers (Mr. Lauther was the Methodist preacher), the Ferrys, Graftons, Berrys and Crockett. We had lots of neighbors and lots of friends. The Brazels were living on Eagle Creek at that time and I was at Anna Brazel's wedding dance. I went in a buggy with a man named Joe Hill.

When we first moved to Tortolito Canyon my Grandfather May had a hound named Old Sounder and another dog called Black Pup. One day when the dogs were up in the hills they jumped a deer and ran him down to our place. Grandma May ran outdoors, grabbed up a pine knot and killed the deer in our back yard.

Another time later, when my husband was carrying the mail from Angus up to Parsons he saw a bunch of hounds gathered around and barking up a tree. The dogs belonged to Mr. Perry, below us. Mack saw something up in the tree. It was dark and he couldn't tell for sure what it was, but he didn't hear any sound, so he fired a shot in that direction. A voice came down from the tree: "What are you trying to do? Shoot me?" It was the Perry boy. He had climbed up the tree trying to knock out a bobcat.

When we were kids we didn't have movies to go to and we had to make our own amusement. We would have parties every week or so. The neighbors kids would gather in. We would pull taffy and play games and not postoffice either, because our dad was always there.

There wasn't a church in Nogal and we didn't even have a Sunday school at first. Finally a man by the name of Eppo moved to Nogal. He started up a little Sunday School on Sunday afternoon. We nearly always went to that. He had two sisters, Lulu Epps and Artie Eppo. The sisters soon moved away.

We were still living on the Bonito when the railroad company started putting in the pipeline. My brother hauled pipe and my mother and I ran a boarding house and boarded some of the men working on the pipeline. There was a sawmill there at the time and we also boarded some of the sawmill workers. We had no rough characters. Everybody was nice.

Facilities at Fort Stanton will be inspected and a public hearing held pertaining to the operation of the hospital in connection with the welfare and Indian patients.

The State has a contract with the Indian Department for treatment of Navajos, now numbering over a hundred in the hospital.

Among those who will appear before the committee are Dan Kuslanovich, business manager, and Dr. Meyer, acting medical director of the hospital; also D. O. Murphy, mayor of Captain; County Commissioner Geo. Fuchs and Herman Kelt, Carrizozo postmaster, who will inform the committee of the importance of the hospital to the economy of Lincoln County.


Exercises Friday for Jr. High Graduates


Mrs. Annie Withers and Mrs. Dorothy Current were elected as cooks for the hot lunch program for 1956-57.





A long letter was printed from Joseph Modill in which he described how Abraham Lincoln outgeneraled Stephen Douglas in the latter's bid for the presidency.
