I want to say that my mother and father were two of the best people in the land. We were all happy at home and never fussed or quarreled about anything.

I can tell you something about a murder case that happened here when there wasn't any law. I was about eight years old at the time.

We didn't see much of the law in those early days. There wasn't even a doctor nearby in '87.

I have two sisters who passed on and three brothers. Beekie Hurley and Joe Hurley were my half sister and half brother.

I was married to Mack Rowland in 1896 at Angus. Rev. Skinner, Baptist preacher, officiated. He also married my sister, Mrs. Robinson.

I moved to Carrizozo in 1914 and have raised my children here and they went to school here.

One day when I was canning peaches I got tired and came in to sit down.

The girls of long ago seemed to have quite a fussle. They didn't wear buttons and bows; they wore bangs and a bustle.

At 12 o'clock they'd have to rush home to please their parents' fancies.

They'd stop and linger by the door and all of a sudden you'd hear:

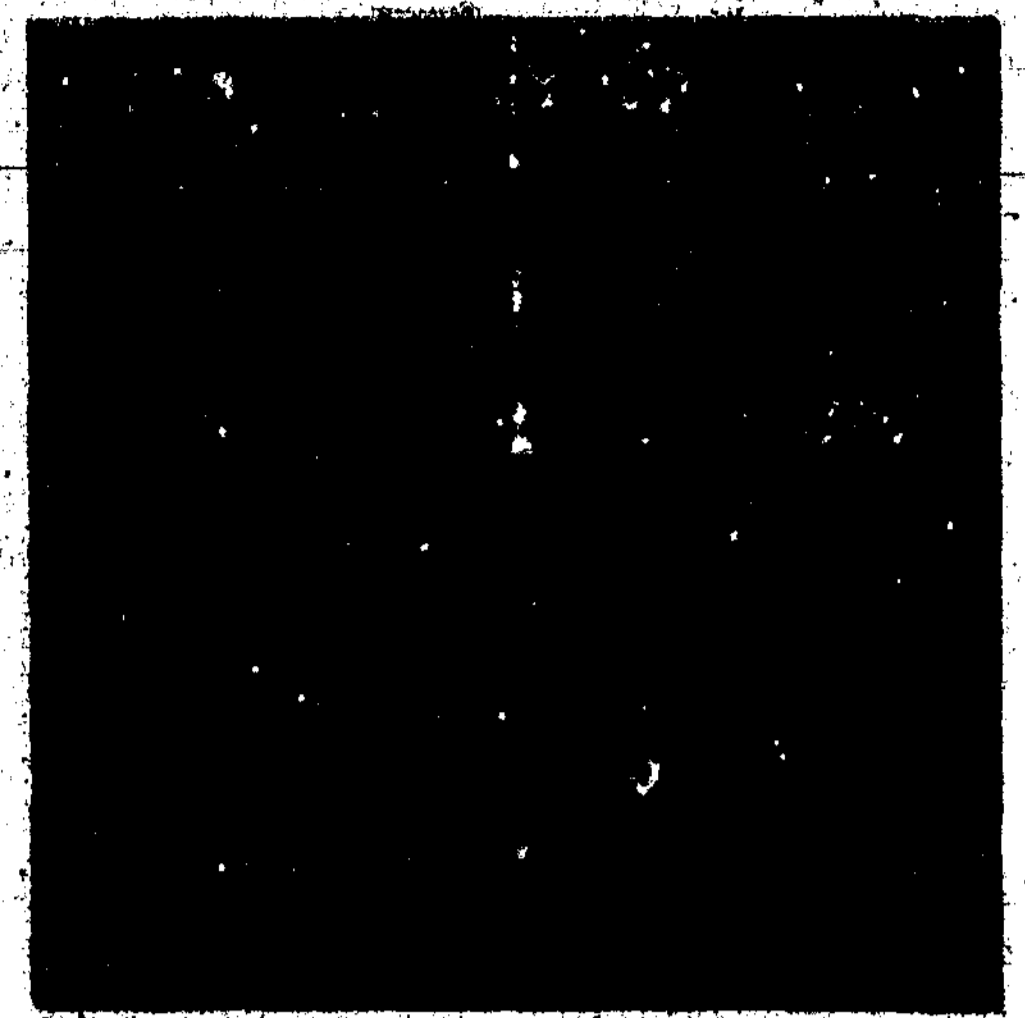
"Oh, my! That boy's an awful bore!"

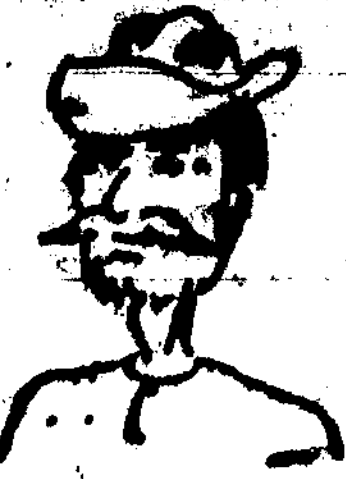

**Kennecott Awards College Scholarships**

Hurley, N. M.—Ten students from five New Mexico colleges and universities will receive \$500 scholarship awards from the China Mines Division of Kennecott Copper Corporation during the school year 1956-57, W. H. Goodrich, China general manager, has announced.

Five of the students are children of Kennecott employees. Under the scholarship plan, children of China employees are given preference if other factors are equal.

**NGB Chief Urges Six Months Training**

In urging National Guard participation in the Army's six months basic training program, Major General Edgar C. Erickson, Chief, National Guard Bureau, in recent talks to National Guard groups around the country, has pointed up the advantages of such training to the individuals who participate; their units and the National Guard as a whole.

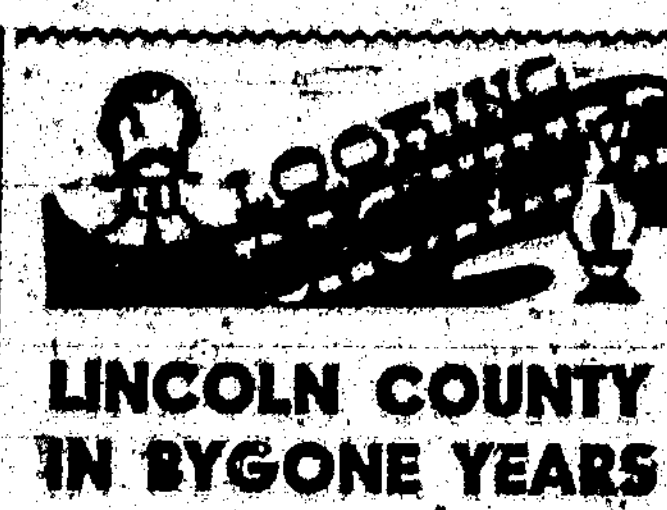
Participation in this program, General Erickson stated, will certainly improve the overall training position of the Army National Guard and there is no question of its value to a young man who has embarked on a career as a civilian-soldier.

He added, "Not only will this six months training fit a young Guardsman for promotion, but in many cases the specialized training he receives will help him in his civilian job. Many of the specialties taught in the Army, such as radio, telephone, auto mechanics, engineering and many others, have civilian counterparts."

The more men in a unit who have completed this basic training, the more advanced will become the overall training of the unit, the Guard Chief declared.

**How Effective is Salk Vaccine?**

The vaccine, according to preliminary reports from thirty states, was approximately 80% effective in preventing paralytic polio during its use in 1955. This is despite the fact that most vaccinated children received only an incomplete series of shots before the height of the polio season. The 1955 experience reaffirmed the results of the 1954 field trials when the vaccine was found from 60 to 80% effective against paralytic polio.

Over 21 million children in the United States are junior members of the American Red Cross. They carry out a year-round variety of community, national, and international projects.

TROUT PLANTINGS

Truckloads of trout were distributed by the Department of Game and Fish between April 25 and May 10. Weighing 10,250 pounds were 113,250 fish, 50,675 of which were over six inches. Into the lower Capolla went 11,500 Loch Leven; and the Carrizozo and Hopewell Lakes got 51,000 eastern brook trout. The remainder were rainbows, which went into the following waters: Rivers—Cebolla, Cimarron, Gila, Jemez, Los Pinos, Mora, Pecos, Pecos, Red, Rio Las Vacas and San Antonio.

Creeks—Bull, Clear, Cow, Gilita, Negrito, Panchuela, Pollza, Santa Clara, Taos upper, Tularosa, Whitewater, Willow and Winslow.

Lakes—Clayton, Hopewell, Industrial School, Nogal, and Wall. Ponds—Beaver Park, Booker, Camp del Rio, Donnell, Eagle Rock, Estancia, Evergreen Valley, Hamilton, Lewis (on Red River proper), Manzanara, Mountain View, Murphy, Palo Verde, Rackley, Rael, Rodriguez (Sedillo (on Red River), Terrell, Tienditas and Young.

Fishing will be permitted on that section of the Pecos River that runs through the property of the Trappist monks at Pecos. Explicit permission must be obtained at the front entrance, each time, according to a memorandum received by the Department of Game and Fish.
