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# FOLKLORE CORNER

## ON A MARCH WITH VILLA

(Editor's Note: This is the second and concluding column on the march with Pancho Villa, which G. Lynn Hatch of Lordsburg, his brother-in-law, Charles D. Turley, and James Whipple made as teamsters in the fall of 1915 from Casas Grandes, Chihuahua, to Naco, Sonora.)

That night the Americans heard the battle for Agua Prieta begin. The three climbed a nearby peak. They saw the bursting shells as the artillery of Villa and Carranza forces duelled. Villa was severely handicapped in the battle — he could not direct artillery fire from the south since the shells would fall on the American side. His forces also were attacking well-entrenched troops.

The forces in Agua Prieta had two powerful searchlights which they played on Villa's forces, making the attackers virtual sitting ducks for artillery, machinegun and rifle fire.

After the United States had recognized the Carranza faction, troops had been permitted to move from Laredo, Texas, to fortify the town. The defenses had been completed by the time Villa arrived.

While the Americans were on the peak, Mexican soldiers sent up word to load water barrels and small arms ammunition on a wagon and drive it to the battlefront. Whipple, who was hauling water and ammunition, drove the wagon.

The next morning, Hatch, Turley and others were ordered to go after wounded men, who had been moved back into a swale. They brought the wounded to camp.

Then a succession of confusing orders followed. At dark they started to move; they had not gone far when they were ordered to return to camp with the wounded.

No further orders were received until the next afternoon when they were told to move on. Near Agua Prieta they turned down a long draw. They saw dead horses from whose hind quarters steaks had been cut. They heard the boom of artillery and the spatter of machinegun fire. After passing the town they came to a road that led south. A soldier galloped up and shouted to them to turn around and take a road back the other way.

Villa had given up trying to capture Agua Prieta.

The Americans turned and drove up the road by the railroad track, and came into open view of Agua Prieta, a mile or 1 1/2 miles away. Wagons ahead were pulling over the railroad tracks. The little mule on Hatch's wagon could not get the front wheel on his side over the track. A Mexican boy tore up and grabbed hold of the wheel.

Just then a shell sailed over their heads and exploded nearby. A Mexican colonel and major jumped off Hatch's wagon and crouched behind the bank. The wagons went south on the opposite side of the railroad for cover. Later crossed the track and followed the column heading west towards Nogales, Sonora.

Night fell, and the teamsters followed the artillery tracks. Later, they found it was only a wood road which ended in the hills. At one especially rough stretch Hatch and Turley had walked ahead to try to make out the road. They stepped aside as a soldier rode up behind them on a little pinto mare. The mare belonged to Hatch's wife and he had hidden the horse in a corn patch on his farm. He did not see the horse again.

The road became so bad they couldn't travel it. It was after midnight and they waited there until morning. At daybreak they looked off the hill and saw Douglas and Agua Prieta only five or six miles away. The teamsters picked their way to the road from Douglas to Agua Prieta and then swung away from the town and west again. At noon, they stopped for burial.

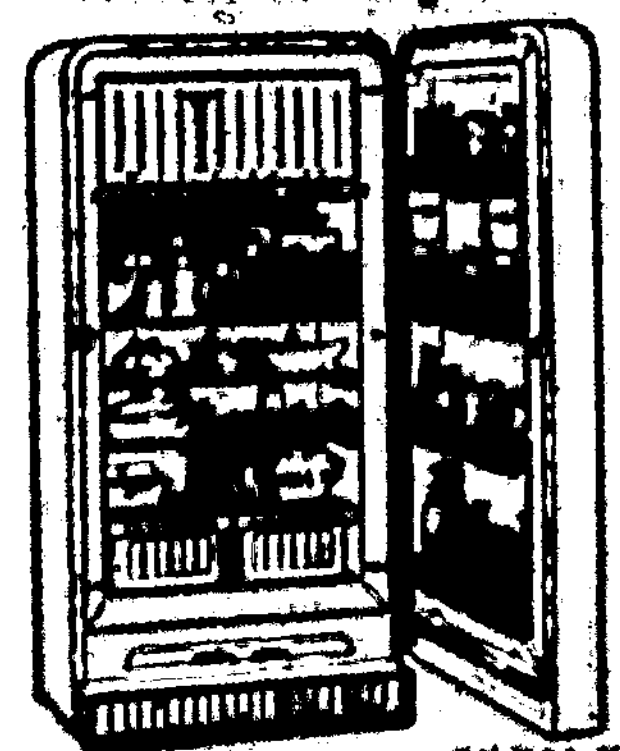

## Conference in Santa Fe Outlines Procedures For Selective Service

Edna M. Laramie, local board clerk in Carrizozo attended a Selective training conference for local board clerks June 5 in Santa Fe.

Mrs. Laramie says that several changes in classification procedure were discussed during this time and which should be of interest to the public and to the registrants already classified into the affected categories.

On February 15, 1956, the President by Executive Order No. 10850, initiated one of these changes in regulations which revised the sequence of selection for induction for those classified in Class I-A and available for service.

The new sequence of selection for induction established six groups under the I-A Class. Under these groups, fathers were placed in the 4th category, meaning that all delinquents, volunteers, and non-fathers, ages 19-25 inclusive, must be exhausted before a call can be placed upon fathers. Hence, all registrants who are fathers and not as yet submitted evidence of such fatherhood, should do so at once.

Likewise, registrants who have reached their 26th birthday and are classified in Class I-A, now come in sub-group No. 5, meaning that all non-volunteers, non-fathers and all fathers (19 to 25 inclusive) must be exhausted before inducting men who have reached and passed their 26th birthday.

Another point of interest is the recent abolishing of Classes I-C Reserve and I-C Discharged and which will probably result in the bulk of these registrants being reclassified in I-V-A, which is the veteran's classification for those who have completed service.

Another purpose of this conference was to instruct the clerks as to the changes in Selective Service operations brought about by the Reserve Forces Act of 1955. These changes include the selection by Selective Service of certain persons who have critical skills for enlistment in units of the Ready Reserve, and the determination of availability of members of the Standby Reserve for order to active duty. No member of the Standby Reserve may now be called to active duty unless Selective Service first determines that he is available for such duty.

Richard M. Lawson, contact representative for the Veterans Administration plans to visit Roswell Wednesday, June 6 and again on the 20th.

Veterans, their dependents or representatives are invited to call on Mr. Lawson at the city hall, second floor, between the hours of 10 a. m. and 5 p. m. on that date for information and assistance in connection with veterans benefits.

Mr. Lawson states that incompetent veterans with service in the Armed Forces since June 27, 1950, and their minor dependents or incompetent beneficiaries are entitled to protection of their estates derived from benefits paid by VA under Acts of Congress.

Such protection is provided by the chief attorneys of VA regional offices (in accordance with State and Federal laws and VA regulations). The chief attorneys maintain supervision over guardians appointed by State (probate and county) courts, as well as legal custodians recognized by VA in their respective jurisdictions.
