

ALBUQUERQUE VOTERS TO PICK GOVERNOR

Santa Fe, Aug. 15-Albuquerque, a city of great ups and downs and left and right turns in politics, looks like the deciding force in who's going to be governor of New Mexico next year.

The big town registered 58,000 votes in the last presidential election in 1952. That was almost a quarter of the whole state, more than the total vote cast in 17 of the 32 counties. A turn out this year of more than 60,000 is anticipated.

The vote in the city is up and down-17,000 in 1954, 58,000 in 1952, 36,000 in 1950, 41,000 in 1948.

Albuquerque voted a 4,000 margin for the Democratic candidate for governor, John Simms, in 1954; there was a 6,000 majority for the Republican candidate, Ed Mechem in 1952, and a 9,000 margin for the same guy in 1950.

(Continuing the account as recorded in a diary of a trip made in a covered wagon from Lone Elm. Kansas, to Capitan, New Mexico, by Mr. and Mrs. William Ferguson and Mr. and Mrs. L. R. LaNay and their sixmonths'-old daughter. Fay. The time was Pall of 1896.)

Sept. 16-M's birthday - 21 years old. We said we would rather light (except for the bread). Camped for supper about 5 miles west of Lyons in 'a man's barnyard. Has quit raining but cold as the dickens. We are 45 miles from Larned and have been on the road 11 days. Think we shall get there

nice people wanted us to stay

in house. Their home is Purcell. Sept. 17 — Sunday morning— Got very late start about 9 a.m. Roads good for a while. Had dinner near Ellinwood. Camped for night about 1 mile from Great Bend. Got terribly frightened. Woke up in the night and heard some men out in the road arguing and swearing. Will got the gun down and loaded it. then waited for the next act. but it never came. After fooling around for half an hour in the buggy, one of them said as they went by: "Don't drop it there. them folks wouldn't know what to do." Guess it must have been dynamite. Of course we didn't

morning came. Sept. 18—Got started west 20 minutes till 8. Only took a short lunch between Dunder and Pawnee River. Got to Larned at 5 p.m. All glad to stop. Everybody well-and I guess glad to see us.

sleep much and were glad when

Sept. 21—Again on the road after a two-day layoff. Didn't get started until 11 a.m., so concluded not to stop for dinner but just took a chort lunch 🗯 we drove along and the poor old mules didn't have anything until supper time. We were all glad to be going again. Stopped for supper 5 miles from Garfield. Found plenty of wood and water and a fireplace. We slept outside on the ground for the first time and the mosquildes
