TRUCK HYSTERIA

RUNS ITS COURSE One of the interesting developments of the 1956 campaign is the subsidence of the Truck-Rail fight which a few months ago looked like it was going to be the hottest thing in the cam-

Gov. John Simms has become gun-shy about saying anything about trucks after the shooting he suffered in the primary campaign for defending the 1055 truck law, and Ed Mechem, the governor-running Republi-

pinned on his lapel. There's not much he could say under the truck plank of the Republican platform. It called for repeal of the 1955 law, all right, and then contradicted itself by advocating higher load limits for "local products." That "local products" could mean most anything and would hardly change the present operation.

BOTH PARTIES PAVOR WEIGHTS

After a year-and-a-half of hysteria the Truck-Rail question has calmed down to the point that the voters aren't likely to be stampeded one way or the other. The high weights that all the fussing was about were adapted in 1943 for cargoes of "natural" products. The 1955 law extended the natural products ilmits to all loads with the result, according to a study made by the Division of Courtesy and Information, of about three per cent of the trucks carrying heavier loads than before.

With both parties devoted to trucks carrying the heavier weights the obvious approach is that of regulating the truck traffic. The highway department road, where heavy loads are causing excessive deterioration. The police, ports of entry, and the highway department are assigned to check and arrest operators with loads bigger or heavier than authorized by law. and every local gop has an obligation to keep the big rigs within the traffic laws.

Melons and cucumbers have both male and female flowers. Pollination by insects is necessary before the female flowers will set and form fruit. Male flowers appearing first in great numbers frequently will dry up. Later more male flowers will form. Prolonged rainy periods can interfere with insect activity, thus limiting fruit set.




