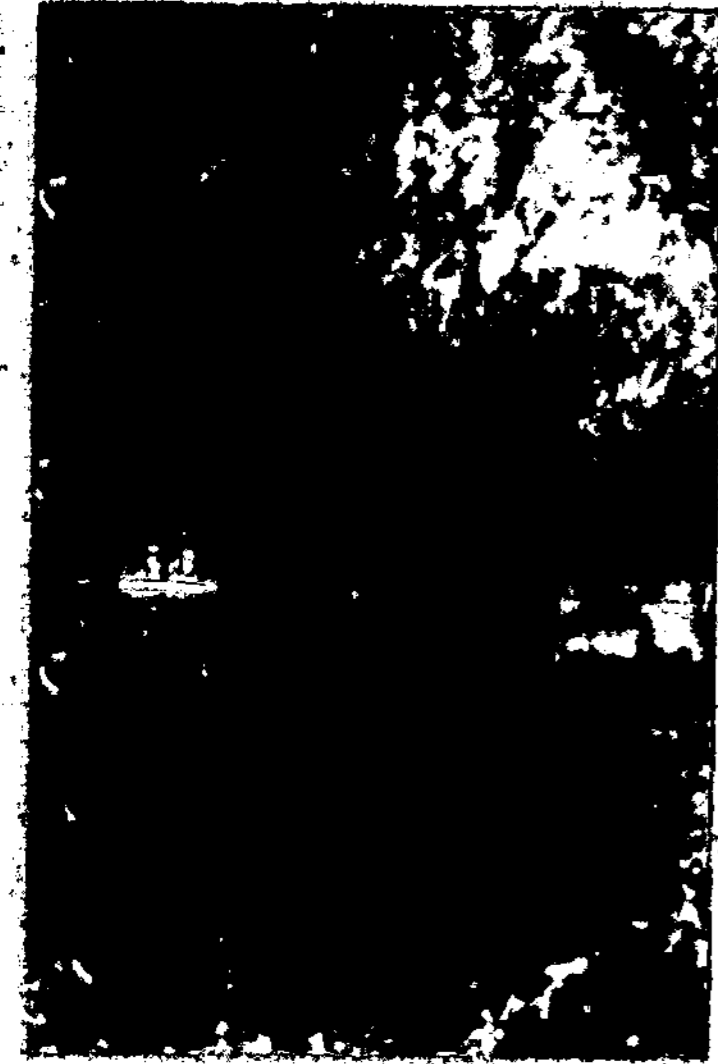

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Tape Recorded Interviews With People Who Helped Build Lincoln County



MR. AND MRS. SAM DILLARD

My name is Maud Dillard. I was born August 31, 1855, at Dobbs Run in Kinney County, Texas. In 1890, when I was four years old, I came to New Mexico with my parents, Henry Russell and Mary Beckett Russell. Our friends called my father "Baldy" and my mother "Aunt Mary." My father's people came from Arkansas and my mother's people were Texans.

I had two half brothers and a half sister who also came with us in the covered wagon. My brothers were John Holliday and George Holliday and my sister was Belle Holliday.

We first moved to Gold Hill, a small mining settlement in Grant County near Silver City. My father worked on a ranch and we spent one winter there. Then we moved to Jornada Flats in Socorro county west of the San Andres Mountains and just over the hill from Mesquite Lake Gap.

My father worked for cow outfits at first and did assessment work. Later on he dug a well and improved his ranch and went into the cattle business on his own. I was then about 14 years old. I never was able to go to school as our ranch was 30 or 40 miles from town. I learned just what my father and mother taught me. I helped my father with the cattle and the ranch work.

In February of 1905 I was married to Riley Caldwell at San Marcial, and we moved to Las Vegas, N. M. There he worked the Agua Fria Company for two years. They loaded and shipped ice from the Gallinas River. After that, we lived on a ranch near Santa Rosa in Guadalupe county for a couple of years.

July 10, 1910, we moved to Captain in Lincoln County. Captain was then pretty much like it is now. They had quit running the mines. Seaborn Gray was running the livery stable and Mrs. Gray was running the telephone exchange. The railroad was running. It came up and back from Carrizozo twice a week. I don't remember when they stopped operating the trains but it must have been 1915 or 1916.

Riley drove the mail back in 1910 and 1911. It went down to Carrizozo and back each day, going around through Nogal. Sometimes it carried passengers and sometimes only mail.

I had two children by Mr. Caldwell, a boy Ell William, who died in infancy, and a daughter Cora, who is now Mrs. Buster Boone of Carrizozo. She is an operator in the telephone office there. Mr. Caldwell passed away in 1925 in California. I worked at the Marine Hospital in Fort Stanton the winter of 1914.

I married Lee Luttrell in April of 1914 and we lived on a ranch near Three Rivers in Otero County. He worked for the Hatcher Cattle Company a number of years. It was owned by M. T. Everhart. We had one son, Oville Luttrell who was born at Captain in 1915. He is married and is living in Alamogordo. He was in the Air Corps during World War II and he took up flying afterwards. He made an aerial antelope survey for the State Game Department for two of three years.

I was divorced from Lee Luttrell in 1922, but I continued to live at Three Rivers and did laundry work to support and educate my two children.

I married Sam Dillard June 18, 1926. We lived on a ranch, two miles west of Ocurra, from 1927 until 1942. We had some Taylor land and also my husband bought another ranch down by the Mal Pais, called the Johnson ranch. It was about six miles from Ocurra. We

were east of George McDonald's place where they set off the atomic bomb.

We were ranching at Ocurra in 1934 when the terrible drought was on. We lost 51 cattle because of that drought. They would get caught in the ditches, stray away, and do all sorts of queer things.

One time my husband and I were gathering stock and we had found a couple of cows and calves. Sam said, "You can take these up the draw (which was a short route home) and I'll go and get some others." I was having a lot of trouble with these cattle as they wanted to go back to where we'd found them. I chased them this way and that for some time, when my pony fell with me. I must have landed on my head, for I was unconscious for quite a while. Sam came loping up on his horse to where I was walking around in circles, and said, "What are you doing?" I told him I didn't know. I must have been "out" for half an hour or so. With his help I mounted my pony and we took the cattle home. I suffered no ill effects from the fall, only a severe headache.

Another time I was riding after cattle in the Mal Pais and I rode up on the brink of a deep hole in the rocks. When I looked down I saw a rattlesnake coiled up on a sort of a shelf down in the hole. I dismounted and gathered some rocks to kill the snake with. When I threw the first rock the bank or rock I was standing on broke off and I fell in the hole with the snake. I didn't get bitten, but that was one time I was scared.

County Farm Bureau Adopts Appeal For Emergency Drought Assistance

The Farm Bureau Drought Committee met in Carrizozo Tuesday morning of this week to outline the program they propose to help the livestock raiser through the severe drought.

After considerable discussion, the group voted in favor of reduced prices on hay and surplus grain, along with a protein supplement if available.

Representatives of the county plan to meet with the State Farm Bureau and representatives of the State ASC next Monday to discuss the plan on a state level.

A report of this meeting and discussion on the drought situation will be given at the annual meeting of the Farm Bureau on November 3 in Carrizozo.

Mrs. Pat Dunning read a draft of a letter she had written, addressed to Secretary of Agriculture Ezra Taft Benson, also to Life magazine, calling attention to the critical situation in the drought areas.

After discussion, the Lincoln County Farm & Livestock Bureau endorsed the letter. Copies of it are also being mailed to all Farm Bureaus in the state and to Farm Bureau presidents in Texas, Arizona and Colorado.

The letter follows:

"We are writing to you instead of going through the usual channels, because this is an intense emergency affecting many and we feel this is the quickest and surest way to bring it to the attention of the Powers that Be."

"We are cattle ranchers of the southwest, who ranch on a business, have been here for years, and intend to stay with it—If we survive. We are not the \$150,000 bull men, nor the doctor, lawyer and merchant who went into the cow raising business when the market was high (for one short year) in areas all over the United States and helped bring about the present (diminishing) cattle surplus. We are the small, medium and large commercial cattlemen who supply the nation's beef, good years and bad.

"We have been beset by a drought that reached its four-gatewide peak in late September when the last chance of summer rains vanished, and with it any hope of grass until next July (The beginning of our next rainy season). Perhaps with a surplus of cattle, the western rangeland has become obsolete. But I wonder—can an immensely growing industrial nation afford to allow the men who have been raising its beef for 150 years, go out of business, school reporter."

MEXICAN GOVERNMENT TO BUY BREEDING STOCK

The Department of Agriculture has announced that the Mexican government will buy \$5,000,000 worth of breeding stock from the Southwest drought area.

Ranchers are asked to come to the Lincoln County ASC office and list the number, age, grade and location of disposable cattle.

Norman McKibben of the local ASC office also states that the value of farmers purchase orders issued under the 1935 emergency feed program will be \$1.50 per cwt. All ranchers who have not picked up their feed may contact the ASC office to have their purchase order changed from \$1 to \$1.50 per cwt.

"All we ask is come way out—to survive in otherwise good times. No give-away programs, but something whereby we can at least buy feed at reasonable prices and add through until it rains. Whatever happened to all that surplus feed? Our cows would know what to do with it, without making the farmer mad."

"Mr. President—we have an idea—there may be holes in it—but it's better to die like a pig than a sheep . . ."

"To stay in the cow business (and to go out of it now at rock-bottom prices would mean years a lifetime rancher could never afford to replace his herds) we would need government aid. Generally speaking, a rancher in the southwest feeds for two months out of the year. Our "winter" is actually in March and April of April and May. It is the dry, cold, dusty wind time when our cows need extra protein to calve and milk because the strength is out of our grass by then. So we always buy feed ahead for such a time. But what we need in this disaster year is a nine-months' feed supply, less the two we are already prepared for. In other words, seven months of aid with hay and grain at a fixed minimum price we could afford to pay and come out a little bit ahead on our cattle, or at least break even."

"We have in most cases bought more than our normal two-months' supply—those of us who have not yet been forced to give up—because we have a little bit more grass than our neighbor or a little more money in the bank. Therefore our area would not be hauling the local farm markets, but helping them with an enlarged feed program. We would be willing through the ASC or Farm Bureau to allow feed for only as many cattle as our various ranches could normally support (in this particular area 8 to 25 cows to the acre).

FOLKLORE CORNER

A BURRO IN THE PALACE

A burro on the verge of starvation was found this morning in one of the vacant rooms at the Old Palace (in Santa Fe). How it came there is a mystery. Ex-Governor L. Bradford Prince, president of the New Mexico Historical Society, made the discovery. He was looking at the rooms which it is proposed to have converted to the use of the Historical Society, when to his surprise he found a burro in one of them.

The animal looked as if it might have been almost as old as the structure itself and was so weak from hunger and thirst

that it had to be carried bodily out into the street. It is believed that the animal, which had been running at large for several days, strayed into the corridor when the hall door was open and had been locked up.

The burro was given some oats which it began eating greedily and also drank a copious amount of water. It lay in the middle of Palace Avenue munching away at its oats and oblivious of the attention it attracted from passersby. No one seems to know who the animal belongs to.

Incidentally, it might be remarked that Mr. Prince's dignity suffered a severe shock to think that it had come to this, the Old Palace around which clusters so much of the history of New Mexico being converted into a burro corral.

The editor of the Carrizozo Outlook, who reprinted this item from the Santa Fe New Mexican, made this comment in his issue of May 3, 1907:

At first thought this seems quite shocking, but when we come to consider the position the burro has held in the business of the territory, he is as closely linked with the history of New Mexico, as the Old Palace itself, and it is quite fitting that he should be associated with that building as a relic of the early history of our territory; then, too, the burro is about the only citizen of the territory of long standing who has never been accused of knocking, or robbing the people through political graft.

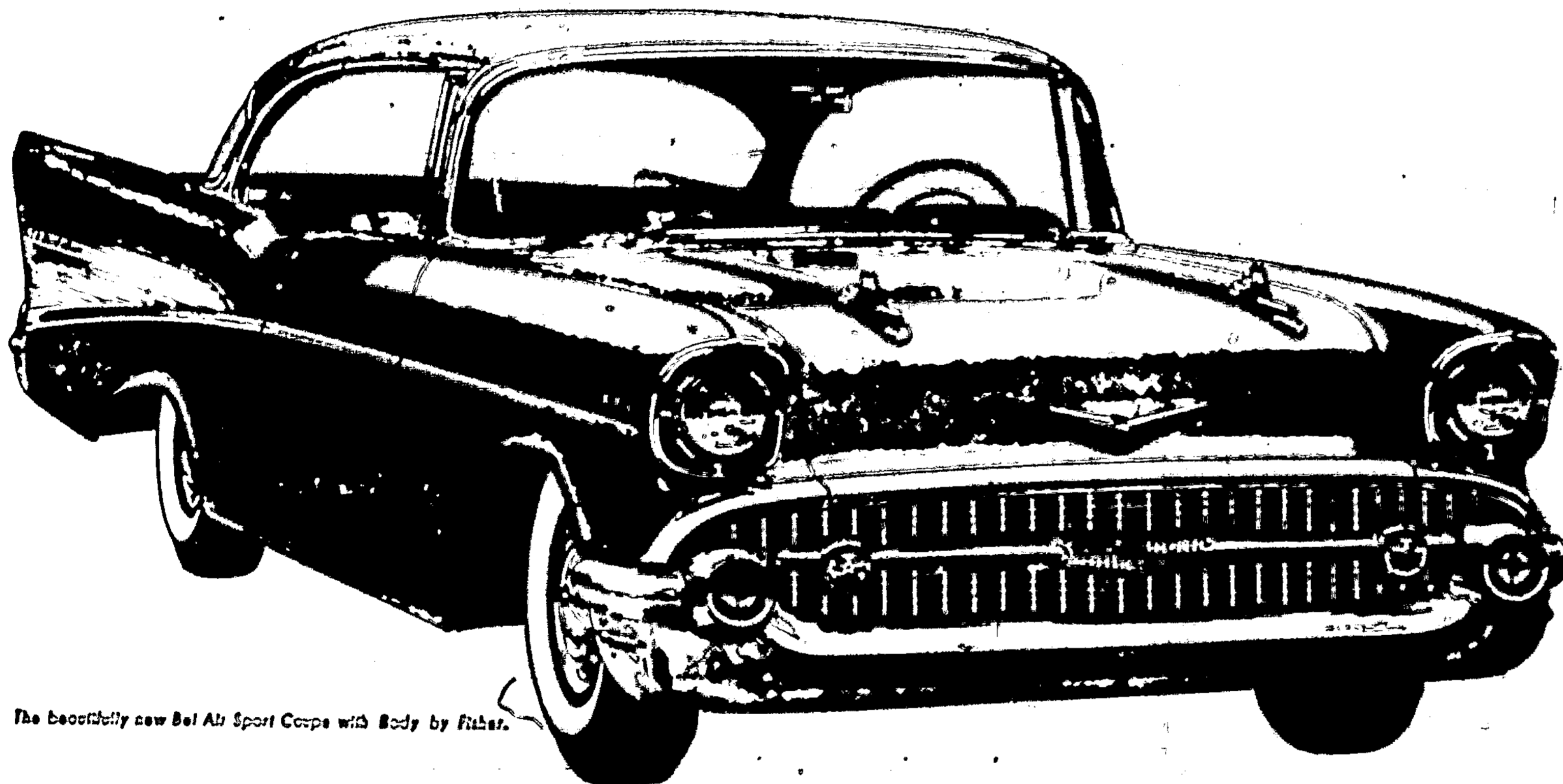

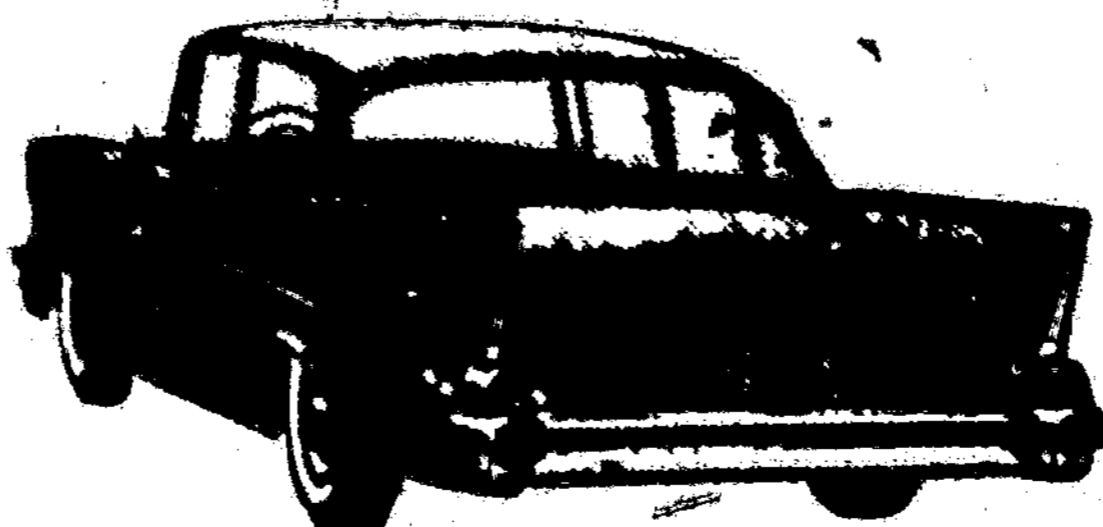

Constant courtroom work, processing approximately 900 criminal and 500 civil cases through Court, and dealing with the problems of 78,000 residents of this District have provided experience in judi-

cial matters that could not be acquired elsewhere in a lifetime.

In the course of this campaign, I have neither solicited nor encouraged the active support, endorsement, or financial assistance of my fellow attorneys or any other group of individuals. Naturally I welcome the vote of everyone, but I feel that anyone elected to the office of the District Judge should take office completely free of any obligation to any individual or group. To accomplish this end I may sacrifice votes, but not principle.

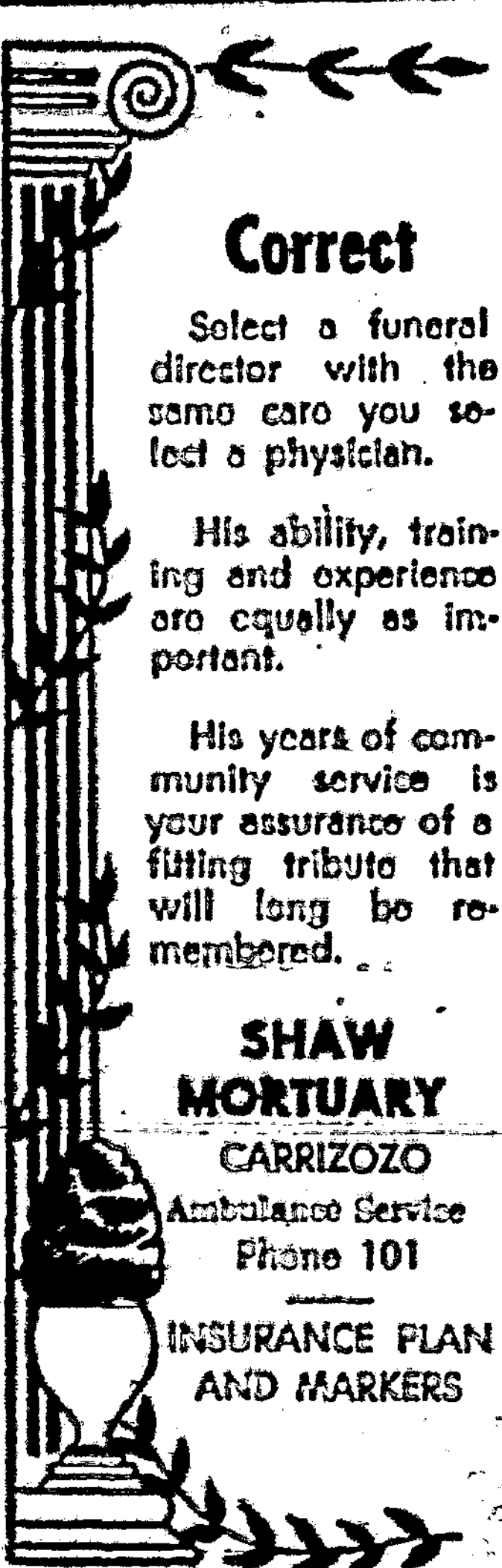

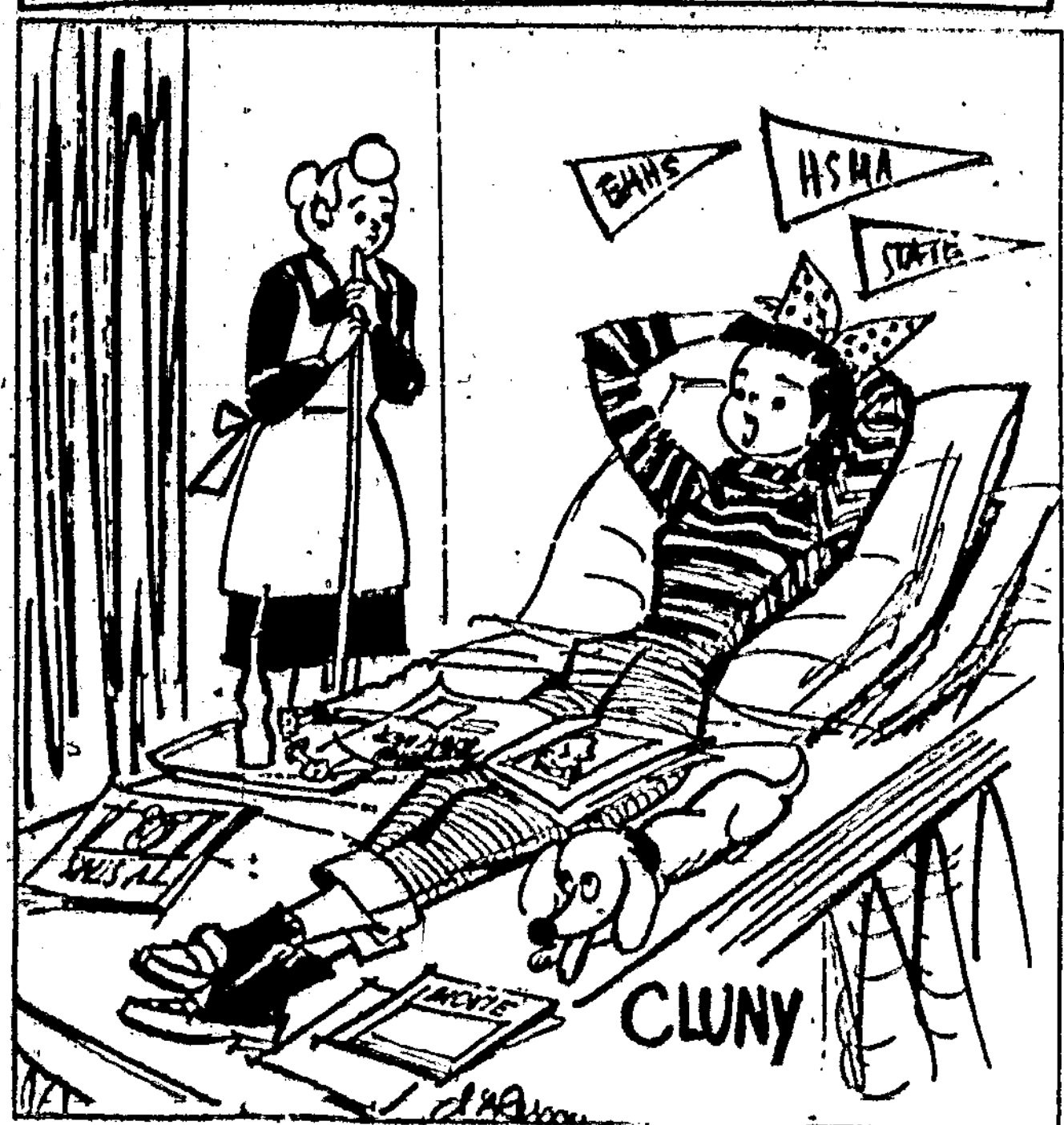

RIO ARRIBA FAMILY LOOKS LIKE CHAMP

Santa Fe, Oct. 17—The Roman Jaramillo family of El Rito looks like the champion among the groups that are participating in the Family Plan in public employment.

Roman Jaramillo Sr. was recently appointed treasurer of Rio Arriba to replace Antonio Guillen who resigned when State Comptroller Dan Smith invaded the Rio Arriba courthouse.

The treasurer's pay is \$4,000. Mrs. Roman Jaramillo Sr. was designated as deputy treasurer, a job budgeted at \$2700.

Son Carlos Jaramillo works for the bureau of revenue in Santa Fe at a rate of \$3120; son Mike Jaramillo is employed by the state auditor at \$3600; daughter Consuelo is employed by the land office at \$3300; son Rudy Jaramillo works for the state employment security commission at \$3300; son Crist Jaramillo works for the state school at El Rito for approximately \$3600; daughter-in-law Mrs. Sohia Jaramillo works for the state education department at \$4560; daughter-in-law Mrs. Roman Jaramillo Jr., works for the land office at \$3600.

It adds up a Family Plan rate of some \$32,000 a year.

ROAD WORK STALLED TO URANIUM MINES

What is commonly referred to as the greatest uranium deposit known, that of the Ambrosia Lake area west of Grants, continues in a state of near isolation because of the lack of roads to haul the ore out.

A plan adopted by the state and federal governments last May for construction of roads into the area has been shelved because the Atomic Energy Commission chose to spend its share of the cost elsewhere.

State Highway Engineer Larry Wilcox said this week that he had been advised by the federal government not to proceed with plans for the construction because the federal share of the cost was not available.

Last May the state highway commission and representatives

of the federal government agreed to construction on State Road 53 from a point on U. S. 85 just west of Grants, north toward San Mateo in which the AEC would pay approximately \$400,000 and the state \$200,000.

From the northern end the AEC agreed to pay the full cost of spurs to the Ambrosia Lake and Devil's Gulch uranium areas and the state agreed to maintain all the roads.

The highway department has been advised that the AEC money for State Road 53 and for the Devil's Gulch spur had been spent elsewhere and that only the Ambrosia spur could be built with money available.

Wilson said State Road 53 is in "terrible" condition and said that it wouldn't be much help if the Ambrosia spur were constructed. Ore from both areas must come out over SR 53 to get to buying stations and processing mills.

SPORTSMEN FEAR LOSS OF SHEEP

Workers at Kohler in Colfax county recently reported seeing a rare Barbary ram in the Vermejo Park area where owner William Gourley sells hunting permits for \$125 upward and guarantees game over a legal season some four times as long as the sap citizen season on the outside.

The Barbary sheep, native of North Africa, were planted by the state game department with considerable expense and great fanfare in an area nearly a hundred miles south of the commercial hunting area. Sportsmen have questioned if the sheep are migrating into the posted Vermejo Park and wonder if they will also be advertised in Texas papers as guaranteed trophies for those willing to pay the price.

herds alive and off the slaughter block. We help ourselves and the coil conservation program by holding feeding cattle in "sacrifice" pastures instead of allowing them to churn the already dead sod into another dust bowl, in search of grass.

"We understand 21,000 cattle went out of New Mexico alone, two weeks ago, and 21,400 last week with more every day — many of them fine young brood cows. We normally ship in November, so you see how desperate the situation is.

"The loan of \$5,000,000 to the Mexican government is a fine move. (The Mexican government in turn will send teams to this country's drought areas immediately to purchase breeding

cows which in turn will be sold to Mexican ranchers on a loan basis.) But it is still not the answer to the long-time rancher who has carefully built up his herds.

"This is not a political issue. It is something that has struck suddenly, leaving us high and dry.

"You are a harassed and busy man, but we have been harassed and busy ranchers and it is time some few of us shouted our silent battle cry: "Stop this slaughter!"
