Another time I was helping Sam dehorn a yearling heifer.

From what I learned, Oscura was a thriving little town for several years.

The Divident Mine and Milling Company had a mill at Estey City.

In Oscura there were two stores, Burns and Grays. It had a post office, a rooming house, blacksmith shops and a garage.

Almost every place around Oscura had a well. There were orchards on the homesteads and they had good fruit and the trees did well.

Later, when my children went to school at Oscura, there were two teachers and 15 or 16 in the school.

We bought a ranch in the Jicarilla in February of 1942 and moved there May 19 that year.

I've spent almost all my life in New Mexico and it suits me all right.

Democrats Adopt 1956 Platform

The 1956 platform adopted by the Lincoln County Democratic party, released last week for publication, follows:

"We, the Lincoln County Democratic candidates for office, recognizing our responsibility for the welfare of our fellow citizens, submit the following program to the voters of this county and pledge our future support hereinafter:

"Roads — We place ourselves squarely behind the promotion of good roads in Lincoln county and we pledge our offices to advance any possible road construction and particularly to support primary, secondary and farm-to-market roads; and to follow the Land Use Committee on priorities. Among the more important projects to receive emphasis are:

State Highway 37, Ruidoso-Angus to Federal Highway 380
State Highway 42, Corona to Cedarvale and
U. S. 380 Highway to Nogal.

"We are fully aware of the importance of maintaining a full complement of road machinery and in retaining the present system of one maintainer for each of the three Commissioner's districts; further (recognizing that over one half of the county roads are in Commissioner's District No. 2) we strongly favor the purchase of an additional maintainer to be used primarily in this said district.

"We favor the placing of the Alto-Monjeau road on county maintenance after it has been placed in suitable condition.

"We will resist any further encroachment on Lincoln County's natural water resources. Further, we favor the development and exploration for possible additional supplies.

"County Purchases — We believe that as much as possible of our county's taxpayer's money should be kept in our county; therefore, we favor the exercising of tighter controls over the expenditure of funds for materials, supplies, printing, etc., the purchase of which should be made in Lincoln County as far as possible.

"County Government — We favor efficient and honest government, integrity in officers, cooperation between the various county officers and more efficient voting methods. We favor the purchase and installation of voting machines throughout the county where it is proved that the adoption of same would result in saving to the county taxpayer.

"Tourists — We recognize that the tourist industry in our county is one of our most beneficial interests; therefore, we pledge the maintenance and promotion of all our existing excellent attractions, and the development of any future possibilities and additions to this flourishing branch of our economy.

"County Fair — We pledge our offices and place ourselves on record to support the present and future Lincoln County Fair.

"Welfare — We recognize the public's responsibility to the needy and aged; and favor aid to those who are in need."

Social Security Officer To Be in Carrizozo

Ruth Penfield, claims representative of the Roswell Social Security Administration office, will be in Carrizozo, Friday morning, October 26, 1956, to assist local residents in making applications for old-age or survivors insurance benefits and to give general information concerning the Social Security Act. She will be at the office of the New Mexico Dept. of Public Welfare, Court House, between the hours of 10:00 a.m. and 12 noon. If you are on active duty in the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marines or Coast Guard, you have new Social Security protection commencing January 1, 1957. Your Social Security will add to any retirement pension you may earn from the Armed Forces by long service. Your widow and minor children can be paid monthly benefits at your death, whether or not it was service connected; if you have enough Social Security credits to be insured.

Brucellosis regulations are to be tightened on January 1, 1957, as at that time no breeding cattle can be taken to another state unless they are from a certified brucellosis-free area, or are tested, says Ralph Dunlap, Lincoln County extension agent. Breeding cattle cannot be taken into a certified free area in the state unless they meet these conditions. Even heifer calves or yearlings for feeding will be placed under quarantine so that no breeding stock can be obtained from this source without testing. To get an area (usually a county) certified, all livestock owners must test at least 20% of their breeding cattle, along with all dairy cattle and registered cattle. With cattle num-

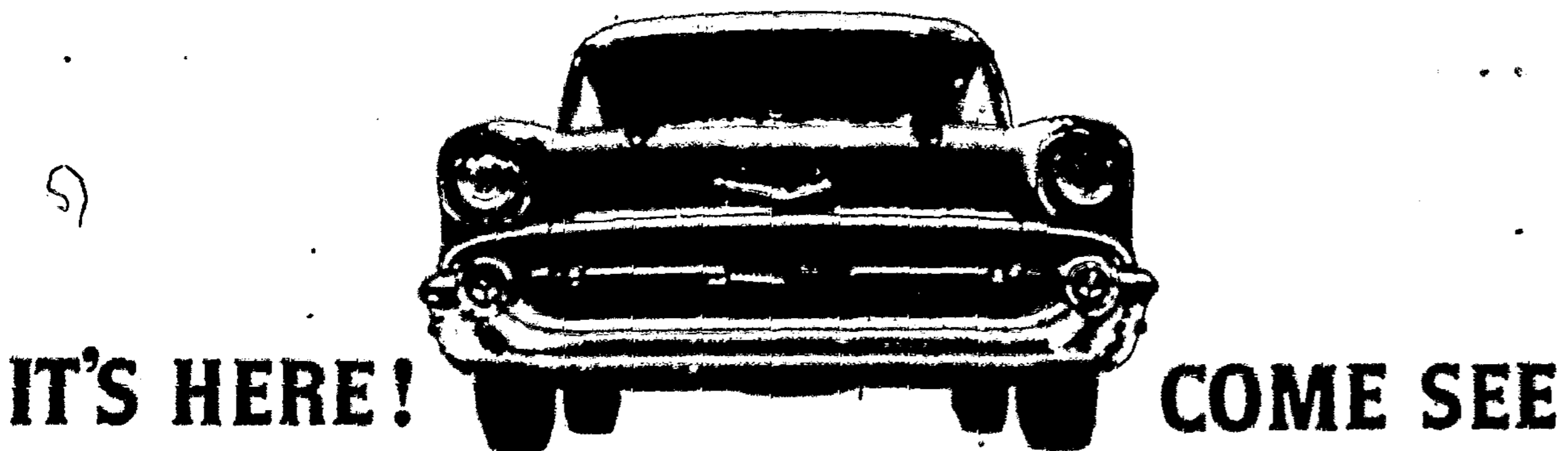

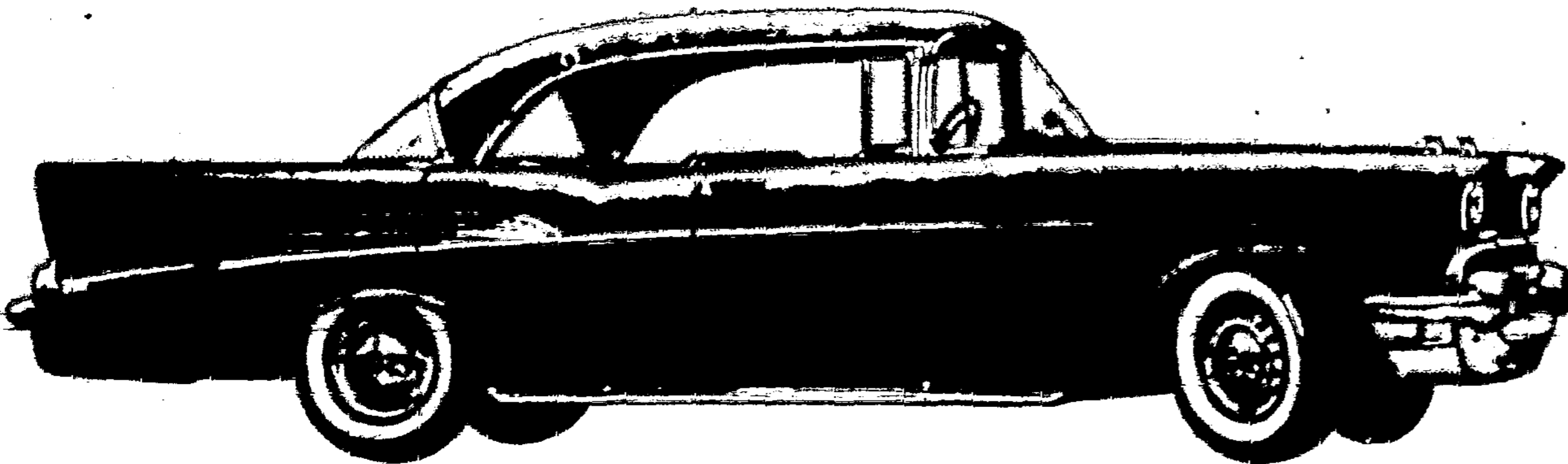

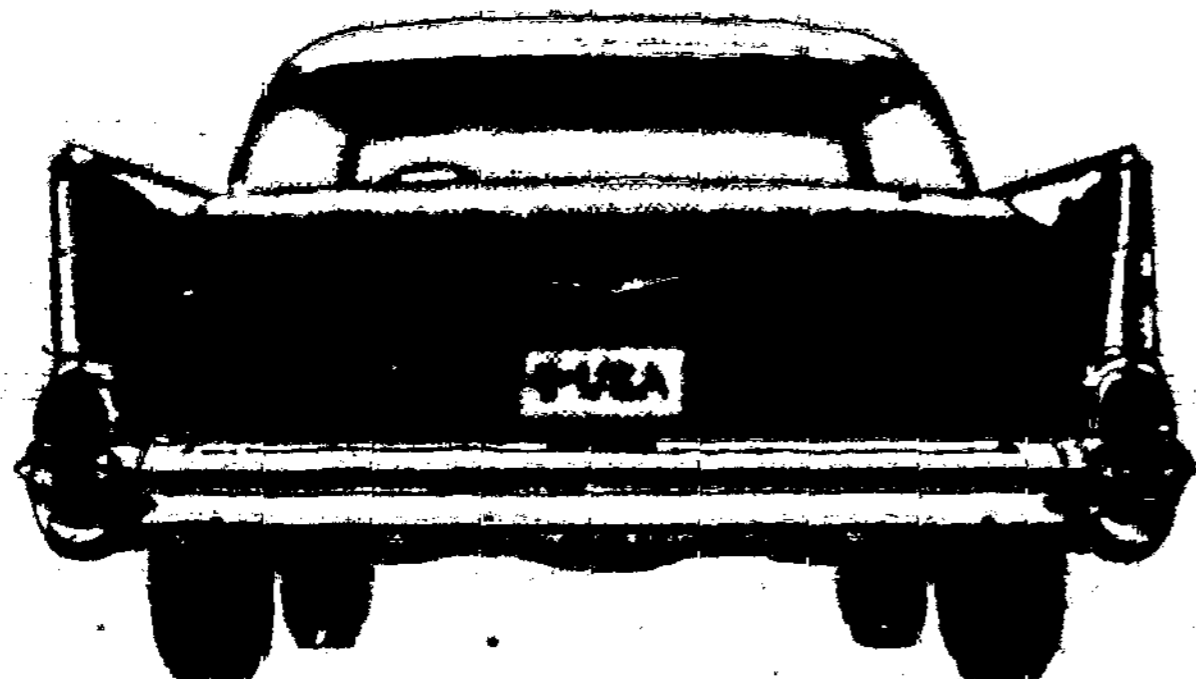

RESOLUTIONS

11. Whereas the State and Federal government own a great percentage of land in New Mexico, be it resolved that it is their responsibility to locate and permanently mark the section corners of this land, and be it further resolved that this be done in areas where these corners are not now permanently marked.

12. Be it resolved that the emergency drought feed program be continued.

13. Be it resolved that rural electrical and telephone cooperative programs be carried on and encouraged where necessary to supplement inadequate or non-existent service of private companies; that all cooperatives be operated on an efficient business-like basis, and that administrative staff and expenditures be reduced and kept to a bare minimum, and that the American Farm Bureau Federation and State farm bureaus be urged to carry on an educational program for the general public as well as ranchers and farmers, upholding the true nature and proper place of the REA in our economy.

14. We recommend legislation to restrict private utilities from entering an area that is served by existing REA and RTA cooperatives, and that private utilities be required to furnish adequate service within one year in any area declared thereon or such area shall be declared open.

15. Unless satisfactory agreement is reached to supply the necessary amount of energy for farm use at reasonable rates, it may be necessary to use Rural Electrification Administration funds to finance the generation and transmission facilities farmers need. We will oppose any efforts to change the present law which makes this possible.

16. Be it further resolved that REA go ahead and furnish electricity to places which they have by-passed, and that RTA operation be speeded up.

17. Be it resolved that the proposed paving of State Road 42 from Cedarvale east follow as nearly as possible the present road.

18. Be it resolved that the County Commissioners purchase another maintainer, and that said maintainer remain in District No. 2.

19. Be it resolved that a County Commissioner live in the district from which he is elected, and that each commissioner shall be elected within his district.

20. Whereas there has been untold damage to the ranch property of the state, and thoughtless hunters seem to have no regard for private property of the rancher; nor have any regard for the grassland which they drive over and therefore ruin, be it resolved that the camps be more localized in designated areas, and the hunters not leave the established ranch, state and forest service roads, and that no hunting be allowed within a mile of farm and ranch homes.

21. Be it resolved that we are opposed to any land transfer between the forest service and the State Game Department that would make a game farm out of the Gallinas Forest area.

22. Be it resolved that there be a substantial reduction in imports of foreign wool until the

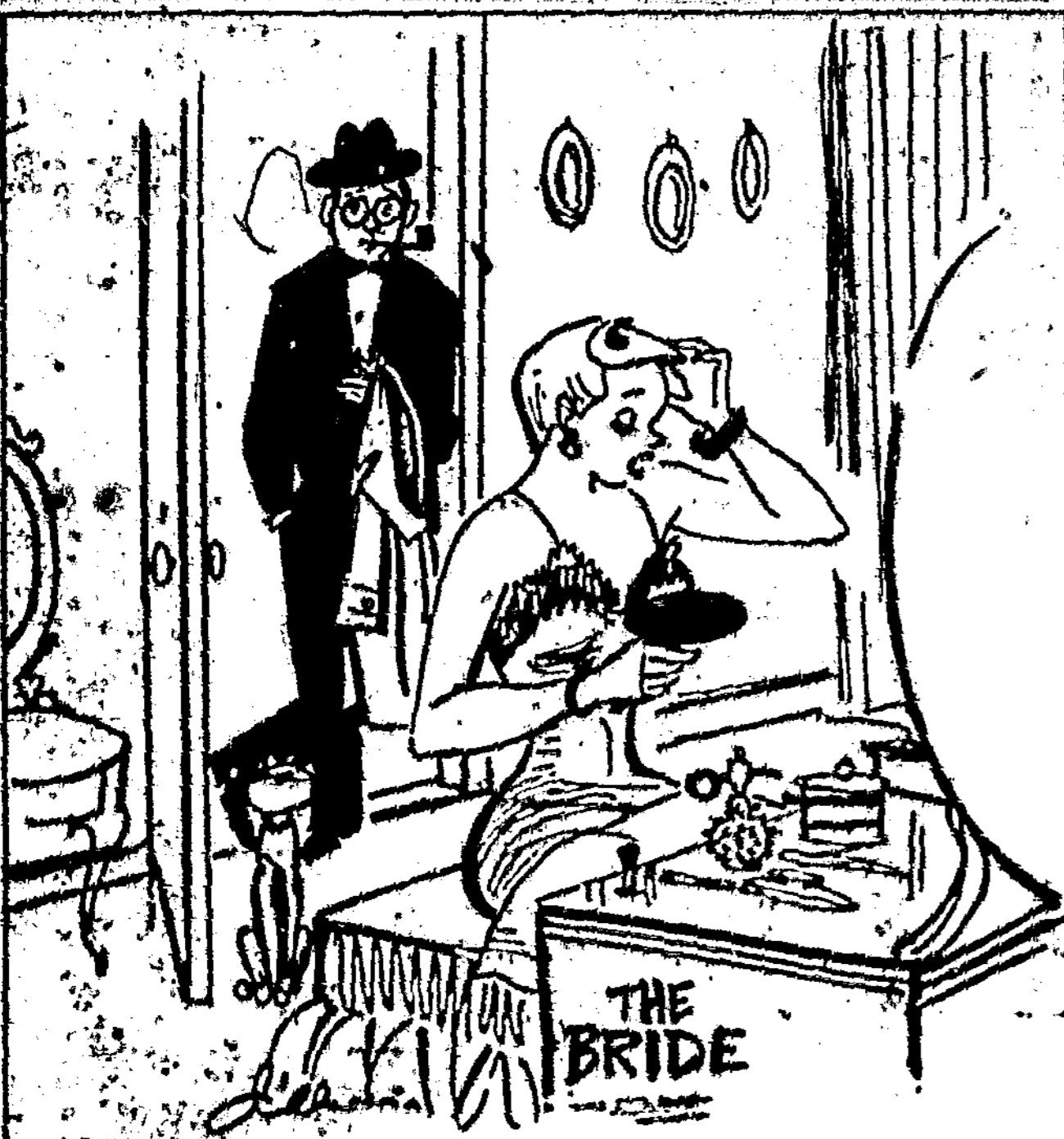
