

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

(A tape-recorded interview describing the first jail in Lincoln.)

(This interview, describing the first jail in Lincoln County, was made at the home of Mrs. Amelia Church in Roswell, August 18, 1953. It has been loaned to the News through the courtesy of John Boylan, curator of the Old Lincoln County Court House Museum. Mrs. Church, now 94, lived in Lincoln from 1873 to 1879.)

MRS. AMELIA CHURCH
Lincoln's first jail was built in 1877, just before the Lincoln County war. It was built about 200 feet in front of our house—between our house and the river. George Peppin was the contractor. He dug a pit about 20 feet by 10 feet and I suppose about 12 feet deep. They brought pine logs from the Capitan Mountains and peeled them and laid the floor of logs and the walls and the roof down in the pit.
They cut a doorway, called a trap door. The pine logs, as I remember, were about 10 inches through. Then they cut a doorway in the roof and they built a ladder, which was removable and could be dragged upstairs.
Then they built two rooms of adobe on this log structure. That was where the jailer and his family lived. The two rooms were the same size as the pit. They had a flat roof and windows like every house. But the pit had nothing, not even ventilation.

The first jail occupant was Billy the Kid. He'd been in this pit, as I remember about three weeks. When it was necessary for him to come out, the two guards took him to the back of the hut. When he was put back in they would take the ladder out and close the trap door. The ladder was kept upstairs.

My mother would see the boy when they would take him out and back. She knew that he was only 18 years old and felt so sorry for him. And, of course, coming from Ireland, we always had tea at 5 o'clock. She felt so sorry for the boy that she made a little pot of tea and took it over to the jail and asked the jailer to give it to the little boy that was in the jail. He never knew who sent it, or anything about it.

There was half a vacant lot between our house and Juan Patron's house. I think Billy the Kid had been in jail about three weeks when one night my mother woke me up and said, "Listen! Listen to the horses!" They were going through this half lot, between our house and Juan Patron's. We wondered what had happened. In about 15 minutes they came back and went up over the mountains to Ruidoso. They evidently came down and went back over the same trail. The next morning we heard his friends had taken the Kid out.

Who the men were we don't know, but they told the jailer to open the jail and they took the Kid out and took him home.

The Kid had been brought up to Lincoln from the Chisum ranch. He had worked for Chisum and they had fallen out in a settlement. That was before the Lincoln County war.

I don't think there was ever anybody in that jail but the Kid. He was the first one. Oh, there was lots of talk about drowning people in there and they talked about drowning the Kid, but they didn't have any water there, but it ran along the edge of the mountains. A big ditch at the foot of a hill supplied water for the whole town. We could cut a trench any place in the ditch and water our gardens and everything, and we were higher than the jail. The jail was down at least ten feet from where our foundation was. And they used to talk about it that they could turn the ditch and drown anybody in there.

We left Lincoln about five years afterwards and the jail was standing then. About five years later, I went through Lincoln and the jail was gone. It was all leveled.

Large Turnout Predicted for Election Tuesday, November 6; Vote Early

With interest running high in county, state and national contests, a heavy turnout of Lincoln County's voters is predicted as election day nears.

As the polls open in the County's 20 voting precincts, a total of 4279 will be eligible to cast ballots.

Polls open at 8 in the morning and close at 7 p.m.

The county clerk's office will be open all night Tuesday to receive the ballot boxes.

Voters are reminded that ballots must be properly marked according to instructions on the ballot.

"Vote early," is County Clerk Inlee Hunt's advice to the electorate. "By voting early in the day you will make certain not being caught in a last minute rush."

Under New Mexico law, polls close at 7 p.m., and no ballots may be cast after that time. This fact was emphasized by an opinion just issued in Santa Fe by the office of the Attorney General.

The law itself declares that "no ballot shall be received" by "the election officials" "after seven o'clock in the evening."

Thus, no vote—either paper ballot or vote by machine—is legal if cast after that deadline, according to the Attorney General's opinion.

"The law undoubtedly should grant some leeway for the casting of ballots by voters who are already in the polling place at the closing hour—but it does not," said Secretary of State Natalie Smith Buck. Her office is charged with general supervision of all state elections in New Mexico.

"The closing time of the polls was changed from six to seven p.m. by the Legislature in 1951, but no provision exists for the casting of ballots after the deadline, as the law reads."

THREE COUNTIES VS ALBUQUERQUE

Sant Fe, Oct. 31.—The John Simms-Ed Mechem wrestle for governor goes to the mat Tuesday with the outcome probably hanging on the voting in three heavily Democratic counties and in Albuquerque where the Republicans have their big guns in place.

Eddy, Lea and Grant are being watched to offset a Republican lead guessed to run no less than 6,000 in Albuquerque. If they can match Albuquerque it would tip the odds towards Simms, if they fall Simms would be in a bad spot.

The burden fell on the steadfast three after other erstwhile dependable Demo counties developed symptoms of weakness. They are Chavez, Curry, Quay and Roosevelt of the Little Texas area, McKinley and Santa Fe on the other side of the state.

POLL FAVORS IKE AND ED

Meanwhile a tally of some 4,000 poll ballots marked in 21 New Mexico communities showed—

Heavy support for re-election of President Eisenhower; An edge of favor for Republican Ed Mechem for governor; A big lead for Democratic Congressmen Tony Fernandez and John J. Dempsey;

A margin of safety for other state-level Democratic candidates, with the possible exception of Joe M. Montoya for lieutenant governor.

The only mass polling attempted was in Albuquerque which casts almost a quarter of the state vote and in Santa Fe which is a pivotal county in the 1956 run.

The samplings taken in other communities are too small to be regarded as a true estimate of political sentiment but together they reveal a pattern of public thinking.

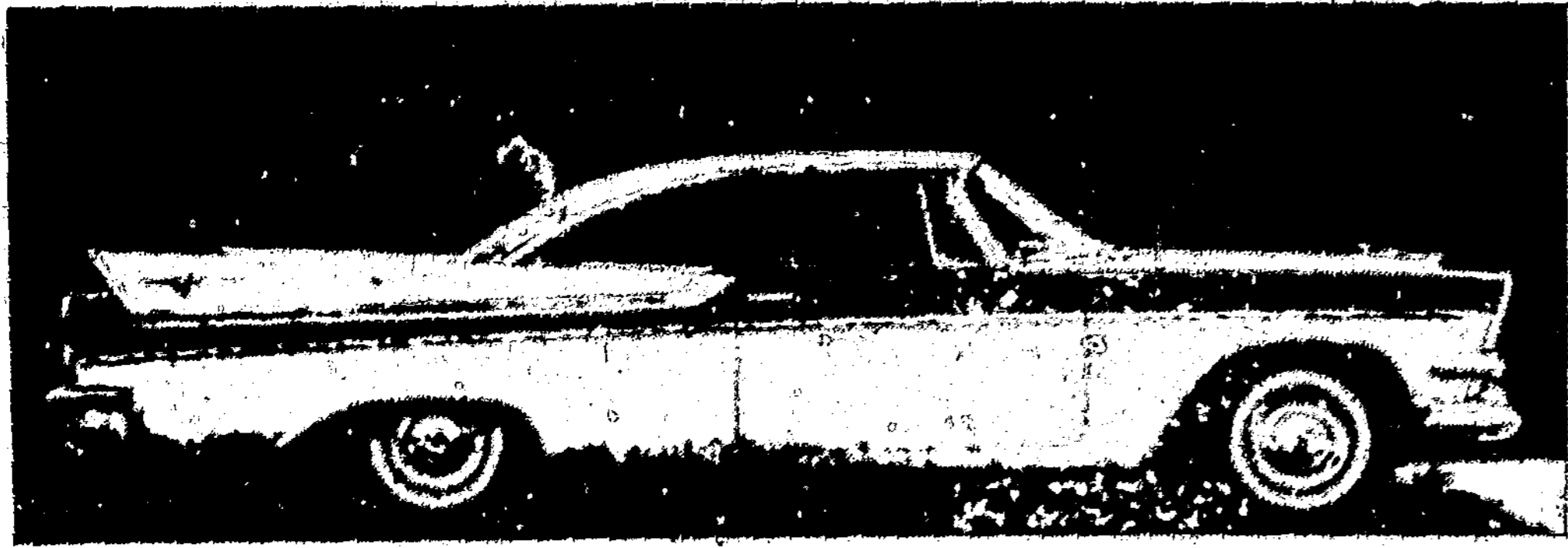

The poll is seriously lacking in sentiment from the northern counties of heavy Spanish-American population, and there is nothing from the Democratic southwestern corner of Grant, Luna and Hidalgo counties. Also lacking is a sampling from the Valencia, McKinley and Catron areas of western New Mexico.

The poll was taken before the CIO-AFL labor convention in Albuquerque which was full of praise for Simms and which unquestionably turned some votes in favor of the Democrat. Earlier the labor group had refused to endorse either Simms or Mechem.

The late activity of the Simms organization and reports of plenty of money being available for getting out the Simms vote also points to an improvement over the showing he made in the poll.

Dodge Increases Power To Aid Driver Control

"All the power that any safe driver would need" in the words of Dodge President M. C. Patterson, has been built into the larger engines of the 1957 Dodge swept-wing passenger cars.

The new engines provide "full-time driver control" of the 1957 cars under all conditions of weather and terrain and with ample reserves of power on tap to enable motorists to "get out of difficult situations before they happen," Patterson said.

Compression ratio of the popular Getaway Six-Cylinder engine, available in Dodge Coronet models, has been raised to 8.0 to 11 horsepower is 138 at 4000 rpm.

Displacement of the Dodge Red Ram V-8 engine has been increased from 315 to 325 cubic inches and the compression ratio raised to 8.5 to 1. Horsepower is 245 at 4400 rpm. Designated to operate on regular fuels, the Red Ram V-8 is standard equipment in Coronet V-8 and Royal models.

The Super Red Ram V-8 engine for Custom Royal models is equipped with a four-barrel carburetor, dual exhausts and extensions, special distributor, special air cleaners and a four-barrel intake manifold. Horsepower is 260 at 4400 rpm.

Hondo Bus Drivers Now On Time Schedules

After some time spent in the experimentation of setting up time schedules for bus drivers, Supt. Montes has announced that the plan has worked effectively and soon all of the Hondo bus drivers will be on definite time schedules.

The purpose of this plan is to insure the further safety of the pupil who stands at the roadside to wait for the bus each morning, and mimeographed copies of the schedule of the Kimbrell bus running to Riverside have already been put into the hands of parents. Thus the parent knows at precisely the moment the bus is due, and children are spared the long waits at the roadside where danger always lurks.

Mrs. Albert Kimbrell has reported that the time schedule she worked out has been entirely successful, and as soon as the four remaining drivers complete theirs, all of the buses in the Hondo Valley Public Schools will be operating on time schedules. Another device to accelerate the loading of buses and the safety program of the school is the designation of definite loading stations on the school grounds.

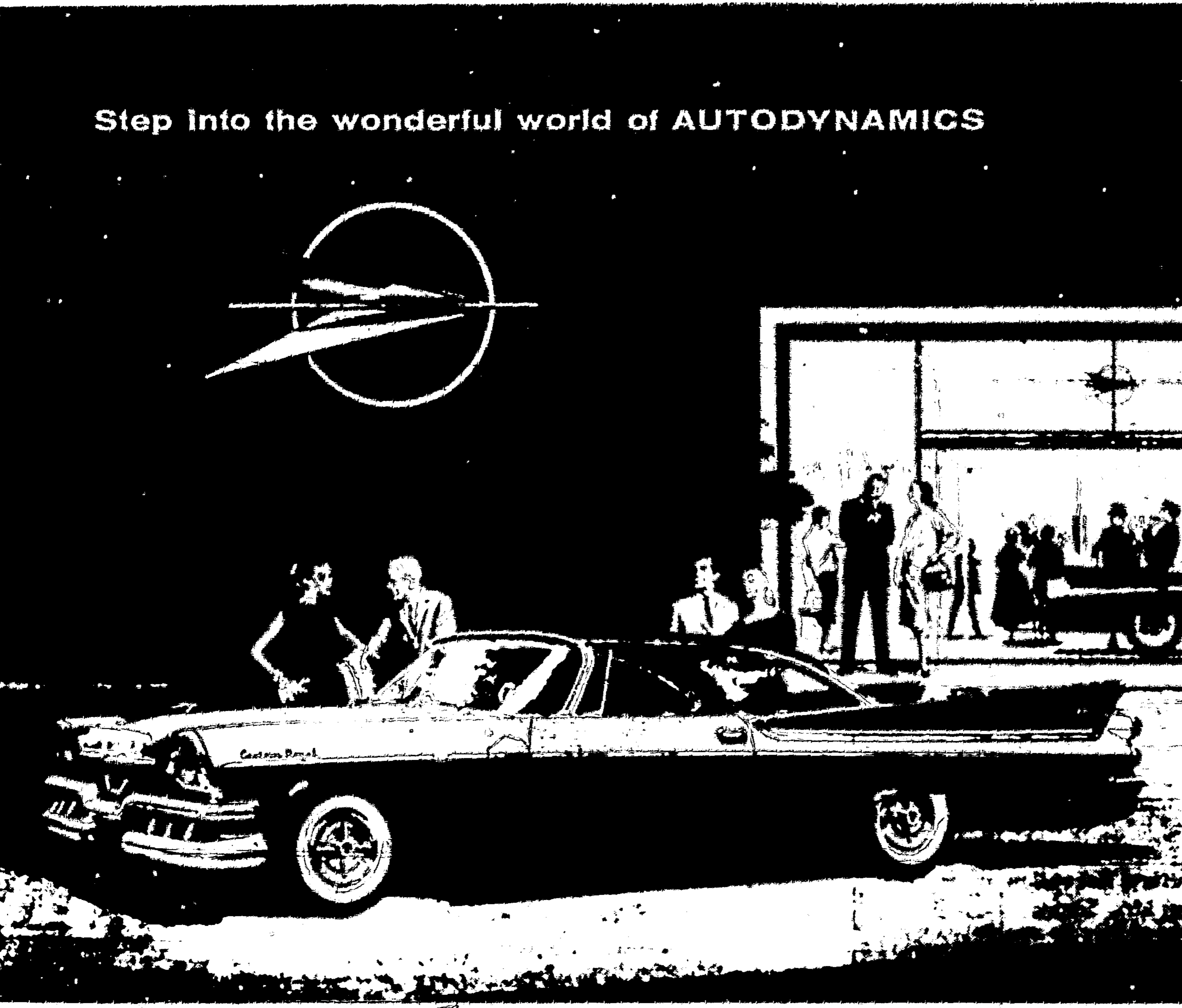

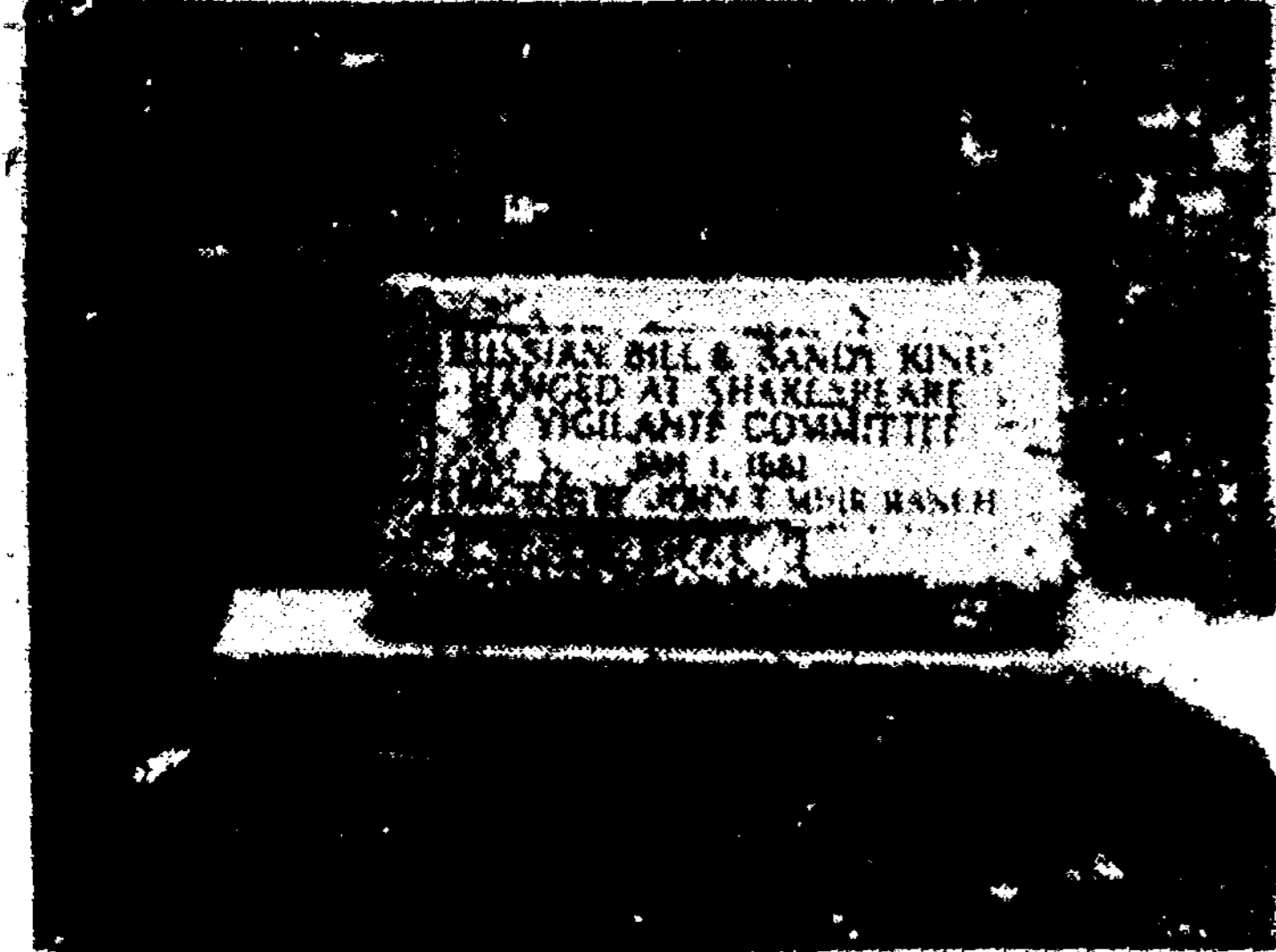

FOLKLORE CORNER

Two early-day outlaws, Russian Bill and Sandy King, have one of the finest headstones in historic Shakespeare because of the efforts of Mrs. Emma Muir, pioneer Lordsburg resident. She persuaded her grandsons to buy a home to mark the grave of the outlaws.

Some people call it Mrs. Muir's cemetery. She has visited Shakespeare Cemetery hundreds of times in the last 70 years. Children she knew when she was a child in the former mining town of Shakespeare are buried there. Others with whom Mrs. Muir grew up in Shakespeare and near-by Lordsburg lie in the cemetery, as well as persons from the now vanished town of Pyramid in the Pyramid Mountains south of Lordsburg.

When she was Emma Marble, a child in Shakespeare, Mrs. Muir, her sister, Ella, and their mother, Mrs. William Marble, sometimes rode to the cemetery with Mrs. O. J. Smyth in her surrey to decorate the graves of the children, the honest citizens and the outlaws with bouquets of wild flowers and sprays of green desert brush. Mrs. Smyth was the wife of the last president of the National Mall and Transportation Co., the stage line. She had a very gentle horse which her small son drove.

Many years later, through the persuasion of Mrs. Muir, an attractive tombstone was erected over the single grave of the outlaws Russian Bill and Sandy King. They were hanged in the Grant House in Shakespeare by a vigilante committee on Jan. 1, 1834, the year before Mrs. Muir came there as an eight-year-old child. Mrs. Muir persuaded her grandsons, John, William and Rex Kipp, that it would be worthy to spend some of their money for a stone to mark the outlaws' grave.

According to Mrs. Frank Hill

of Shakespeare, Russian Bill was hanged for allegedly stealing a horse, and Sandy King for being a "damned nuisance." Shortly before he was hanged, Sandy shot a finger off a store clerk, who in turn shot King out of the saddle as he started to ride away.

Through a slight oversight the outlaws' bodies were still hanging in the dining room of the Grant House, the stagecoach station, when the passengers on the morning stage arrived for breakfast. Parts of the ropes with which the outlaws were hanged still dangle from the beams in the Grant House.

The grandsons also bought a tombstone to mark the single grave of two unnamed pony express riders, who were killed by Indians near the San Simon, Ariz., stage station, and Fort Bowie, Ariz., on Aug. 25, 1877.

The tombstones were erected in the name of the John T. Muir Ranch.

Perhaps the most touching story of Shakespeare Cemetery is that of Jane Hughes, the child who was buried with a beautiful china doll cuddled in her arms.

The china doll was brought to Shakespeare from Virginia City, Nev., by Mrs. Muir. A year or so after she arrived, Jane's sister Mary came to the Marble home and offered a \$5 gold piece in exchange for the doll. Jane had greatly admired the doll, and Mary said that the pretty plaything would make her ill sister happy. The last time Emma saw the doll was on the day of Jane's

funeral, as it lay cuddled in the child's arms.

Jane was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Nick Hughes Sr. Although her grave is unmarked, it is easily located. She was buried beside an uncle, James M. Hughes, whose grave is identified by a weathered headstone.

Some 200 persons are buried in the old part of Shakespeare Cemetery. The mounds of some of the unmarked graves have been leveled by the wind so that even old-timers can only guess whether anyone is buried there.

Few of those buried in the cemetery have relatives now living in Lordsburg and vicinity. People have often returned to look for the graves of their kin, and Mrs. Muir has helped many of them to locate burial sites.

Among those in the cemetery is F. W. Mollitor, a tubercular who went to New Mexico for his health, and was stabbed to death by a drunken outlaw. Mrs. Muir said Mollitor was killed by Charlie Williams, who stabbed Mollitor as he rested on a bench on the porch of the Roxy J. Saloon in Shakespeare. The killing occurred before 1900. The outlaw was never brought to account for the slaying.

In 1879, Ross Wood, manager of the National Mall and Transportation Company, was killed by "Bean Belly" Smith in an argument over an egg, so the story goes. Wood was buried in the cemetery on Dec. 23. He was born Feb. 14, 1850, in Parkenham Ontario, Canada.

Others who lie in Shakespeare Cemetery are: Ella Marble McGrath and Lemuel McGrath, the latter a pioneer schoolteacher in Lordsburg. Mrs. McGrath, Mrs. Muir's sister, died in 1907 and her husband in 1906.

D. A. McDougal, cousin of the Rev. H. J. Furneaux of Shakespeare, who died in the nearby town of Pyramid.

The three-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. T. K. Shine, whose death occurred in February, 1894.

A. J. McGillis, a mining man. Christine Johnson, who was born in Sweden. She came from San Francisco with her husband and child in 1850. Her husband was a hatter, whose job was to see that changes of horses were harnessed and ready to go when the stagecoach arrived.

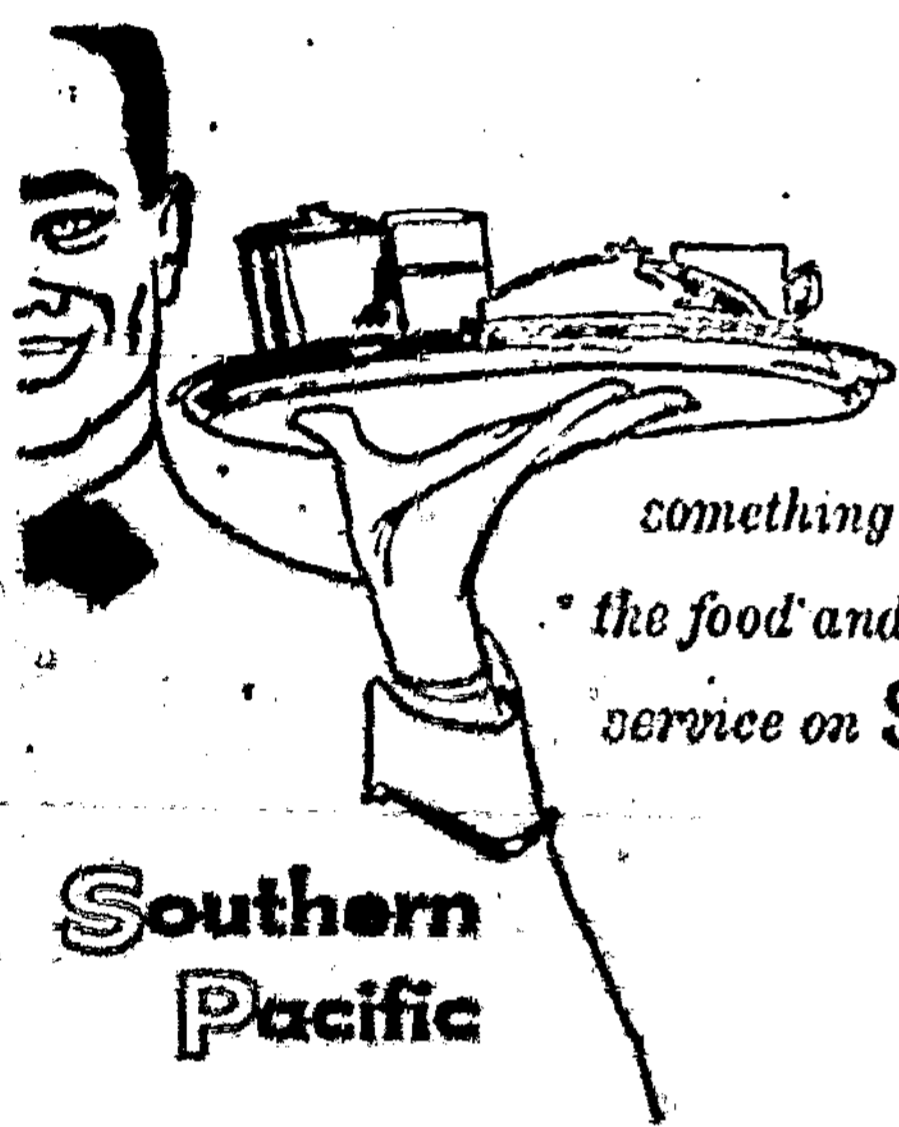

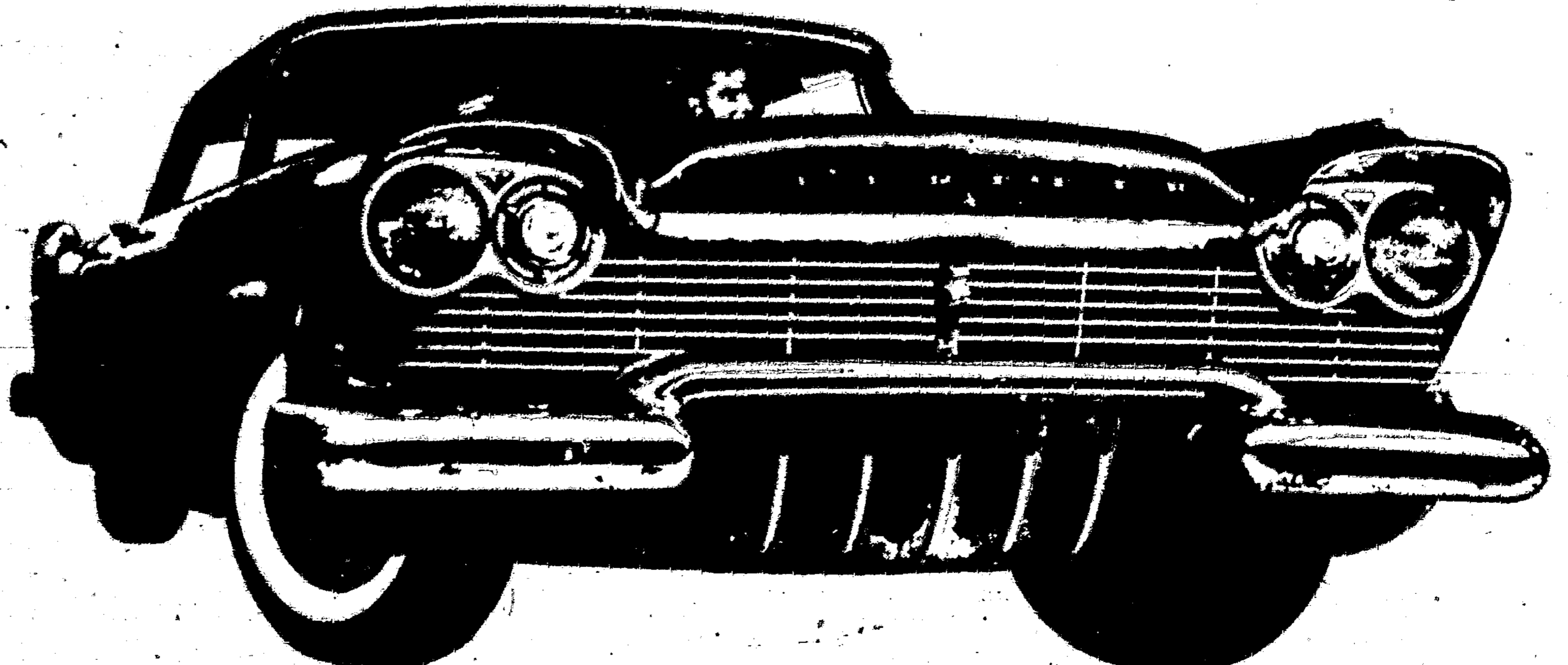

WILL HARRISON'S Inside the Capital

**PRESIDENT IKE
LOOKING BETTER**
Santa Fe, Oct. 24—Scattered polls and samplings of opinion indicate that President Eisenhower is in front of other candidates in the closing weeks of the New Mexico campaign contrary to earlier reports that he had slipped seriously in the state.

Some other indications from inquiries that will be reported more fully next week:

Gov. John Snygar and other Democrats have made serious inroads into the long-time Republican bastion of San Juan county.

Otero county, which is rivaling the San Juan boom in growth, has been the scene of intensive Democratic activity, with indications that governing Republican Ed Mechem will be hard put to maintain the advantage he had in his native county in past elections.

DEMOS LOSING SANTA FE EDGE

On the Republican slide: Santa Fe county which had been cited as a bright spot in the state Democratic picture is showing signs of slipping away. The county had been in the Demo column for a minimum of 1,000 margin for Adlai Stevenson and Governor Simms. Now it's doubtful.

Two weeks before the election the state scene indicated a shade of favor for the Republican candidate for governor, more than a shade for Eisenhower and hardly any hope for other Republicans on the ticket. Republican prospects for governor and president were sustained by continued indications of a high majority, maybe 8,000 or more, in Albuquerque, and a less than normal Democratic majority in the Little Texas area of southeastern New Mexico, something of 8,000 or less.

HOW ABOUT HUBBELL IF MECHEM WINS

Speculation in political circles has been mounting on the outcome of the run between Demo Lt. Gov. Joe Montoya and Republican Philip Hubbell in the event the Republicans are able to mount enough strength to put in their man for governor.

Santa Fe Joe, the lieutenant governor, has become a faded political character since his exceptionally strong showing in the Demo primaries of 1952 and '54 when he mowed down formidable opposition.

It remains, however, that he was the lowest of all in the great Democratic sweep of 1954. He was at the bottom of the Demo list with 26,000 lead while others won with margins ranging up to Seven-Foot Pickett's 55,000. That, incidentally, is the top majority ever given any New Mexico candidate.

In both of Mechem's earlier wins, 1950, 1952, his candidate for lost governor was second in the list. The first one, Larry Larrazolo lost by a couple of thousand, the next, Frank Ortiz of Santa Fe, by some three thousand.

Hubbell is running this time with the old New Mexico politi-

cal advantage of having an Anglo name and Spanish lineage. That usually works out that all the Spanish voters know of the background and all the Anglo voters know is the sound of the name.

NON-POLITICAL ROCKS HITS FAT

Gen. Pat Hurley, the former secretary of war, ambassador, etc., was knocked out for a few seconds when hit on the noggin by a donkey thrown through the window of a hall where he was attending a Republican political meeting in Santa Fe the other night. The rock throwing was blamed on kids of no particular political registration. Hurley got hit in the head with a Japanese machine gun slug while running for a fox hole at Darwin in the

South Pacific during the recent war and was shot in the shoulder while riding an airplane near the Malong airfield in Java.
