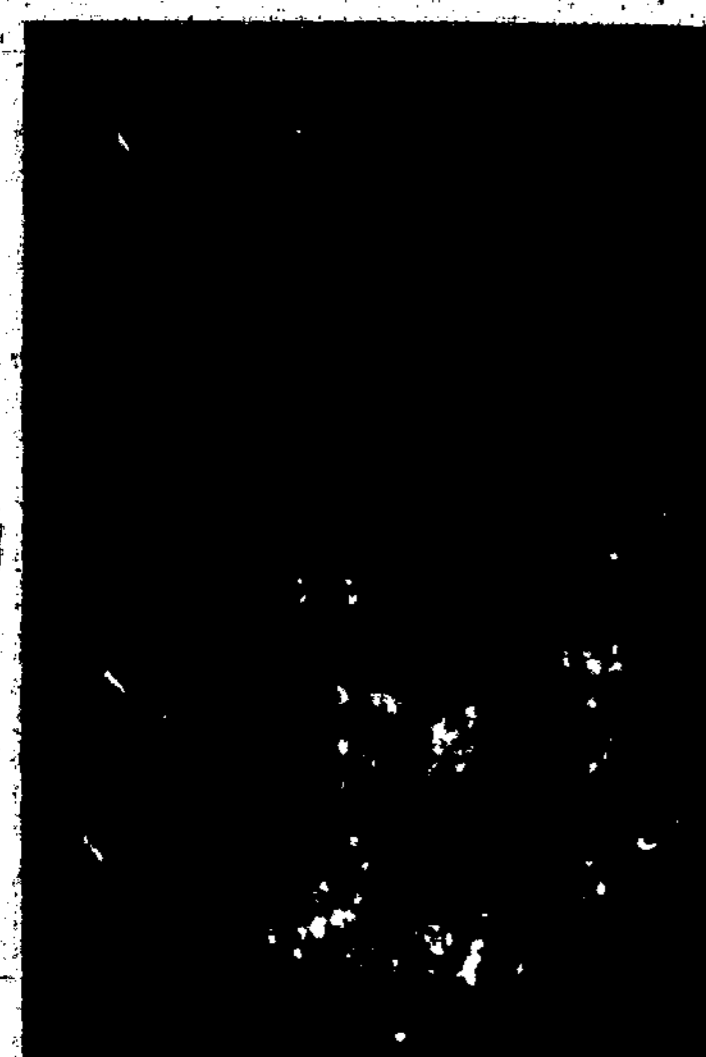


Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

Types Recreated Interviews With People Who Helped Build Lincoln County



MRS. J. A. SIMPSON

My name is Mrs. J. A. Simpson. I was born November 6, 1868, in Palo Pinto county, Texas. My parents were James and Ava Yates. My mother's name was Hamilton. When I was a child my father farmed. His health wasn't too good and the doctor advised him to go west. He went there in 1879. There were ten children in our family. Five lived to be grown. One of my brothers, Daniel T. Yates, is now retired and lives in Hobbs. Another, Amos W. Yates, is a wheat rancher at Forest, New Mexico. My sister, Mrs. Brunetta Bristol, lives in Corona, California.

I went to school in Cooper, Texas. I didn't go to school very long. It was altogether different in those days than it is now.

I was married September 20, 1885, to Joseph A. Simpson, in Palo Pinto county. My husband was the youngest of a family of seven children and was born and reared in Grayson county, Texas. He was only four years old when his father died. With the help of older sons, his mother raised the family. One of the ways she helped was to make their clothes from cloth that she wove on a spinning wheel. She also spun the thread.

In 1899 we moved to Midland, Texas. We ranched there for three years and moved to Eddy county, where we lived three more years. That part of the country is now known as Monmouth. It was only a ranch headquarters when we were there. We were near the Hat Ranch, owned by Scott and Robinson, and the LTD Ranch, owned by the Littlefields. J. F. White was foreman of this ranch. His son, J. P. White Jr., now owns a cotton processing plant in Roswell.

After three years of ranching in Eddy county we moved to Emma, Texas. It was then the county seat of Crosby county. Crosbyton is now the county seat. We left Emma in 1899 and started west again, with some horses and cattle. We were looking for a good ranch country, with grass and water.

We had two covered wagons trailed together, with a chicken coop between the two, a chuck box in the back of the second wagon with a keg of water fastened on the side, and of course we had our cooking utensils, dishes, groceries and so forth in the chuck box. We had a big canvas top back, with curtains to fasten down in case of a storm. My husband drove the four-mile team that pulled the wagons and I drove the two horses pulling the back. That's the way we came back to this Territory.

We came through Portales, which just had a few tents then. The country was pretty well open, with very few fences. Since cattle travel much slower than horses, my husband's brother, Clayborn Simpson, and his wife and three children, had gone ahead with the cattle. His son Floyd, daughter Alpha and our son George drove the cattle. A few days later we came along with my brother Amos and my husband's nephew, Will C. Simpson. (Will Simpson worked for the Sanitary Board for a good many years and was sheriff of Grants County two years. He is retired and living in Deming at this time.)

The brother-in-law would bed the cattle down at night near his camp, get up early in the morning ahead of the calves and milk the cows to have milk for their meals. We overtook the brother-in-law's party and the cattle near Fort Sumner. We went from there to a place called Liberty, near where Tucumcari is now. We moved on to what is called Bull Canyon, about 25 miles from Liberty, made dug-wells and spent the winter.

As I said before, we were looking for a good ranch country, with grass and water. At Bull Canyon the grass was tall enough and the water was easy. You could scrape a hole in any slope and the water would rise. We had practically grazed the cattle through and they hadn't been damaged too badly, but we

had to feed all winter and we realized that wasn't what we wanted.

In July of the next year we again started west, looking for a ranch country. We crossed the Pecos at Antioj Chico and bought groceries there. The population was mostly native in that part of the country at that time. We didn't speak their language and they didn't speak ours. Before we left Bull Canyon we hired a native who had been apprenticed out when he was seven years old and had crossed the ocean several times. He had learned our language and almost forgotten his own. From then on, he drove the four-horse team, my husband and our daughter Saluria drove the stock horses and I drove the hack as we traveled west.

We crossed the Rio Grande at a little Spanish town not far from La Joya. We went on to Magdalena and on out almost to the line of Arizona. We rested our cattle at old Fort Caliente. But the country was dry and people had shipped cattle out. Of course, grass and water were what we were looking for. We turned back and crossed the Rio Grande again, this time at La Joya.

The cattle were footsore and we rested them for a few days at La Joya. They cut hockschoes in half and put shoes on the big bull to enable him to make the trip. Still the bull was not able to travel, so he was sold.

At that time it had rained and there was water in the lakes all over this part of the country. Northeast of Corona, about 25 or 40 miles, was what they called the Seven Lakes. It was full of water. We left the stock there and my husband and I took the hack and started for the Capitan mountain foothills to look around that part of the country. We weren't accustomed to the country and it seemed to be just over there a little ways. We took the baby, three years old, with us. We fixed a lunch for noon and meant to get to the mountains by evening. It was so much farther that we had a lunch for supper, but we didn't have any left for breakfast or for dinner the next day. Our little girl got hungry and whispered in my ear, "Mommy, can I have the crumbs in the sack?"

At that time George Spence and his family lived about 35 miles down the canyon, but there was a lot of rough country between his ranch and where we were. We finally found a weak spring of water with a barrel over it and I cooked some food. Then we followed some wagon tracks up to the headquarters of the Spence Ranch. From this ranch there was a dim road over to the Capitan mountains. We went over there and looked around for several days and came back a different way. There were no roads, you might say.

New Bangs Rules for Cattle Shipments in Effect January 1

All interstate shipments of cattle except steers, spayed heifers, and calves under eight months will be regulated by federal law after January 1.

Following are the regulations: Slaughter cattle not known to have brucellosis can be shipped interstate to slaughter houses or public stockyards, or to a point approved by the USDA.

Cattle from brucellosis-free herds and areas require only an official certificate. Officially vaccinated animals under 30 months can be shipped with an official certificate unless they are being shipped into a modified-certified brucellosis-free area. In this case, they must also be accompanied with a permit from the livestock sanitary official of the state of destination.

Any vehicle, which includes trucks, used to carry reactors, must be cleaned under the supervision of a federal or state inspector immediately after the animals have been unloaded. As in the past, cartaged and branded reactors can move to slaughter plants under federal inspection or federally-approved plants and stockyards if they have an official certificate for slaughter.

Beef bulls and females can be shipped for feeding and grazing if they have an official permit from the state of destination providing that state requires segregating and quarantining.

Further Discussion On Nogal Road

A delegation discussed the Nogal road improvement project with the Lincoln County board of commissioners at their meeting December 6.

Appearing in behalf of the community of Nogal were John Stearns, Fley Skinnear, Daniel R. Brenton, Ben Pfingsten and A. P. Sifton Jr.

The commissioners agreed to go to Santa Fe to see if the right of way across the Fulton Dugger property and reservoir could be changed.

Newly elected commissioners Clint Sultemeier and Emmett Reese met with the board.

The commissioners will meet December 19 to issue commodities. Their next regular meeting will be Monday, Jan. 7.

Two Men Draw Fines for DWI

Two men drew court fines this week for driving while intoxicated. Appearing before Police Magistrate John Mackey on Monday, Joe S. Yellucas Jr. of Bent was fined \$100 and given a license suspension of a year. He was arrested after his car went off the pavement at the intersection of Highways 54 and 350 in Carrizozo.

John T. Eiby entered a plea of guilty in district court Monday to a charge of DWI and was fined \$100, assessed \$100 court costs and his license suspended one year. The fine was suspended.

Grant for Carrizozo Sewage Facilities Has Been Given Conditional Approval

Santa Fe (Special)—The federal grant of \$150,154 for new sewage facilities in Ruidoso and Carrizozo, conditionally approved last week by the governor's advisory council, will be reviewed at a meeting of the State Board of Health to be held here on December 15.

Dr. Stanley I. Leland, State Health Director, said that the allocation for Ruidoso and Carrizozo will be studied along with the federal grants approved for nine other New Mexico communities. Approximately \$600,000 was allocated throughout the state for construction of sewage treatment works and related facilities.

After action is taken by the State Board of Health, recommendations will be forwarded to the regional office of the U. S. Public Health Service in Dallas for final approval.

Charles G. Caldwell, director of environmental sanitation services for the State Health Department, said that Ruidoso requested \$130,500 for construction of a sewage system expected to cost \$318,500. Carrizozo requested \$19,654 for a new sewage treatment plant estimated to cost \$65,516.

Application of a federal grant for Ruidoso was made by Bud Axline, consulting engineer. The council noted that if the plans of Ruidoso develop as expected, that town will be recommended as among the first to be considered for an allocation after the federal funds are made available by the next Congress.

It was explained that a sewage collection system and treatment plant are badly needed in that community, since at the present time residents of the area use septic tanks and cesspools which do not function too well because of rock outcropping. Mayor D. E. Snyder of Ruidoso attended the meeting.

Appearing before the advisory council for Carrizozo to explain the long-standing need for extending the sewage collection system and for providing an adequate sewage treatment plant were Mayor W. C. Withers and City Clerk J. S. Stearns. The city's spokesman stated that the present sewage collection system and treatment plant are obsolete and serve only a limited portion of the population.

The council was told that city officials have been working for some time with Health Department representatives in securing preliminary information in preparing material which will lead to a more comprehensive sewage collection system and the construction of a modern sewage plant which would be located farther from residential areas. The present treatment plant can only accommodate a population of about 400 whereas the new plant will provide for a population growth of up to 3,500.

The advisory council adopted a resolution commending the State Health Department for being the first of five states in Region 7 to take action on the federal plan.

Prof. J. W. Clark, New Mexico A&M College, State College, served as council chairman. Council members were Dr. Francis A. Reilly, Farmington; E. P. Cocoran and Mrs. Carl Mulky, Albuquerque; Manson Edmondson, Clayton; Robert J. Hoffman, Alamogordo; D. T. West, Hagerman; and Mrs. Concha Ortiz y Pino de Kleven, Palma.

A Carrizozo woman was injured this week when a car in which she was a passenger left Highway 54, a half mile north of Oscura and overturned. She was Mrs. Flora Chavez, who was riding in the car with Mrs. Dorothy Wyatt.

The car was driven by Betty Sedillo Canup. She told Sheriff W. G. Bradley, who investigated the accident, that the lights of an approaching truck blinded her. The car struck sand at the edge of the pavement, turned over and righted itself. Mrs. Chavez suffered a cut leg.

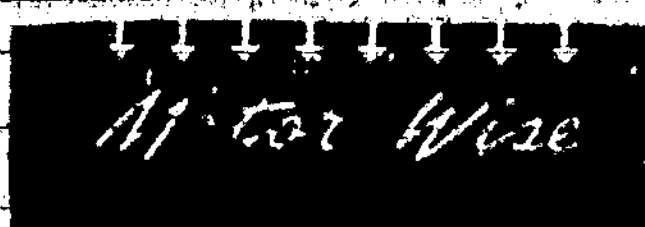

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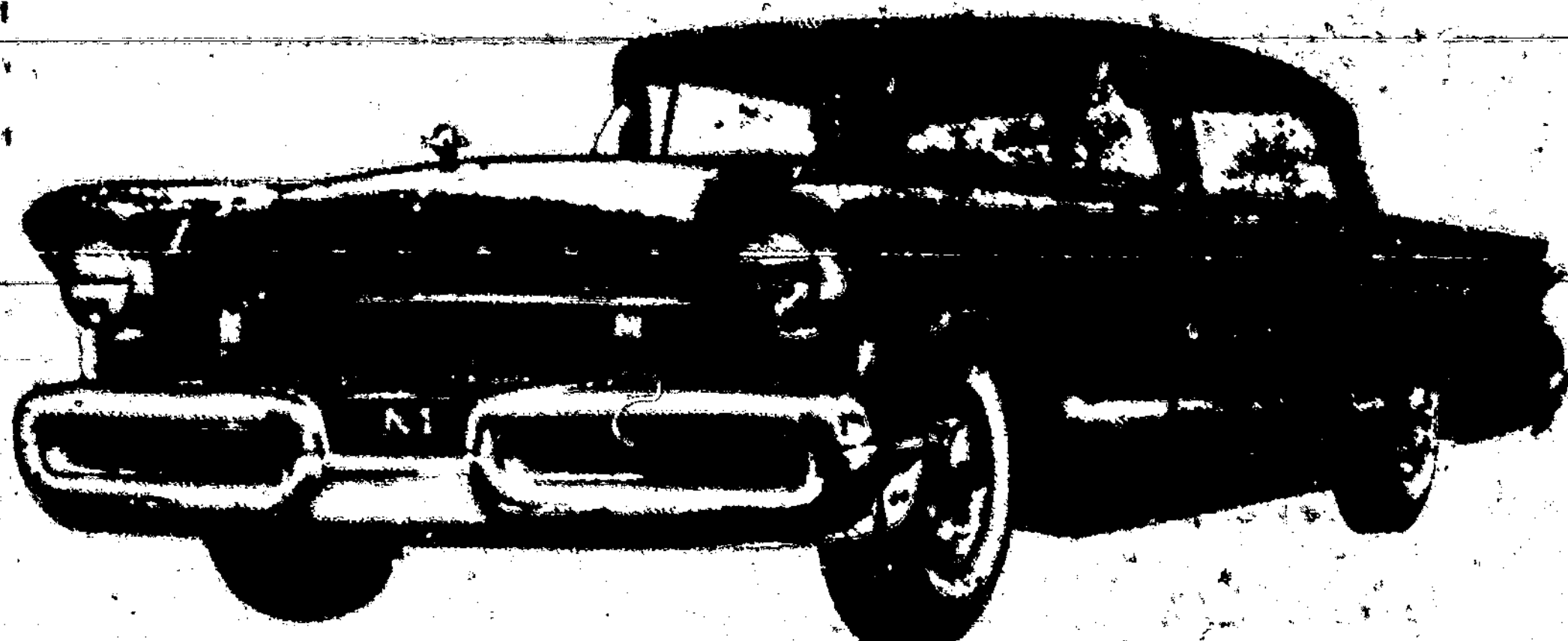

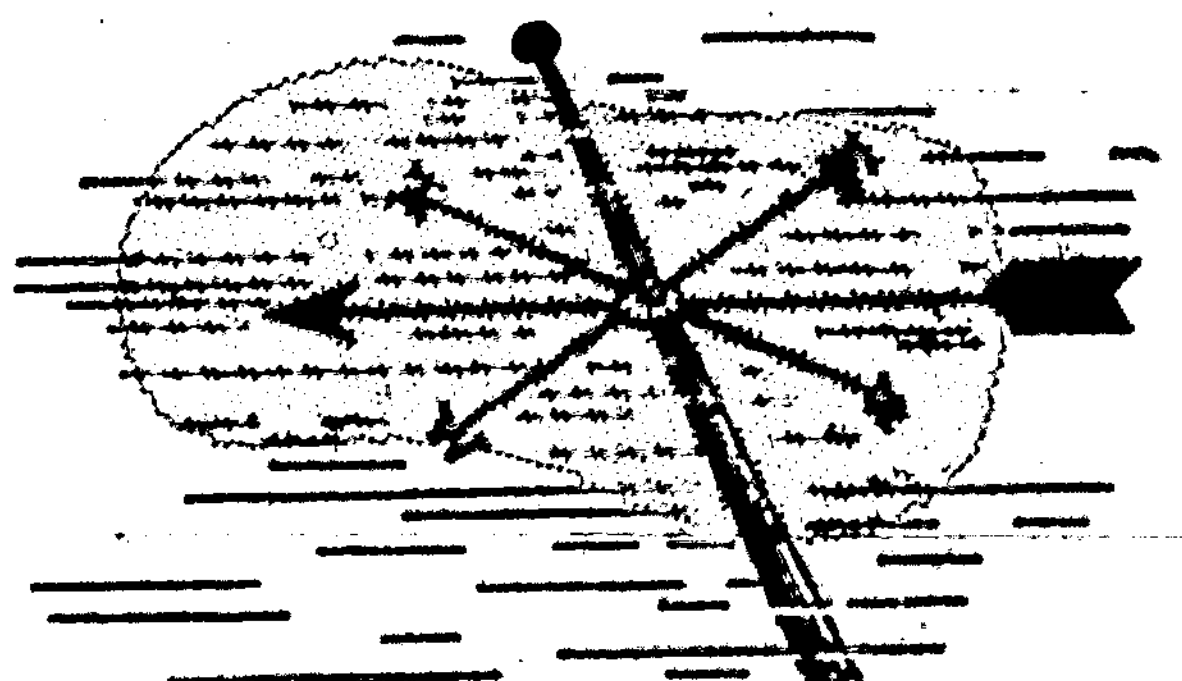

FOLKLORE CORNER

The Yolk of The Pay Car

During several years in the 1890's the Southern Pacific Railroad paid off its men in gold coins. A pay car, which started either in San Francisco or Los Angeles, ran to El Paso or New Orleans. The cashier was stationed in the back end of the car, the interior of which looked like a small bank. The car would stop in railroad towns, and the men would step up and be paid in gold coins, wrapped like coins now are in a bank. Lordsburg was one of the stops on the pay car's route east.

The wreck of the pay car occurred about 1896, as Claude Fuller of Lordsburg recalls.

The car was paying off railroad men in San Simon, Ariz., west of Lordsburg. The local leaving Lordsburg and heading west had orders to wait on a sidetrack about eight miles east of San Simon.

But the crew of the Lordsburg local was anxious to be paid, and they thought they had time to reach San Simon before the pay car left. Running against orders, the local opened up with full steam. Meanwhile, the pay car and locomotive had left San Simon and were travelling full

steam towards Lordsburg. Due to a sandstorm, the crews could see only a short distance ahead. The local and the pay car locomotive crashed head-on. The firemen and the engineer in the pay car engine were killed. The engineer on the local lost a leg and the fireman an eye. The pay car burned.

Because it takes extreme heat to melt gold, most of the coins were recovered. The fire, however, left a smooth black coat on the gold. The coins had to be reassembled, and it was some time before the railroaders got their pay. Lordsburg was one of the railroad towns in which lots of black gold circulated—a reminder of the wreck of the pay car.

Christmas Ad ... 1893 Style

On Dec. 21, 1893, the Old Abe Eagle, a weekly newspaper in White Oaks, printed a Christmas advertisement of Tallafiero Bros. Store on the front page.

In large type were the words "Dreams Fulfilled," with two bars of music and an illustration of Santa Claus with a pack bending over the crib of a sleeping child. Beneath were the words:

" 'Twill be a happy youngster

whose dreams of the coming of old Santa Claus shall be fulfilled. No reason why they shouldn't be. Our holiday stock is complete with everything the tot could yearn for, and prices lower than we ever before knew them to be.

"We also have presents for older folks, in fact, Santa Claus has made our store his headquarters.

"Between now and Christmas you will have to live. Why wouldn't it be a good idea to buy your Groceries, Dry Goods, Boots and Shoes of us? We will save you money, probably enough to buy what presents you want."

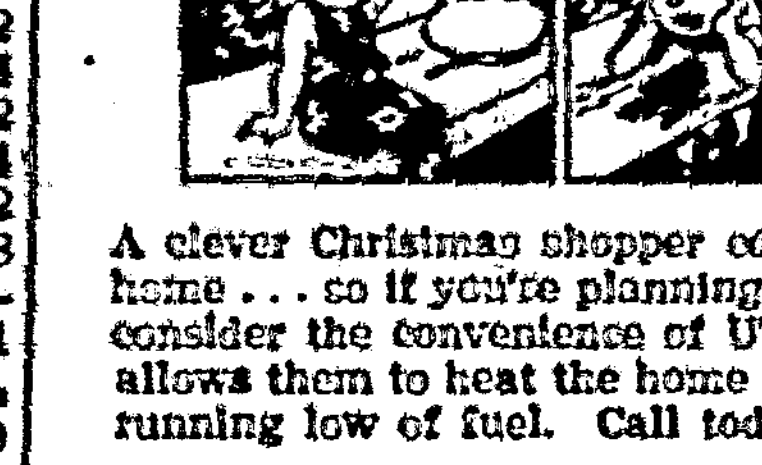

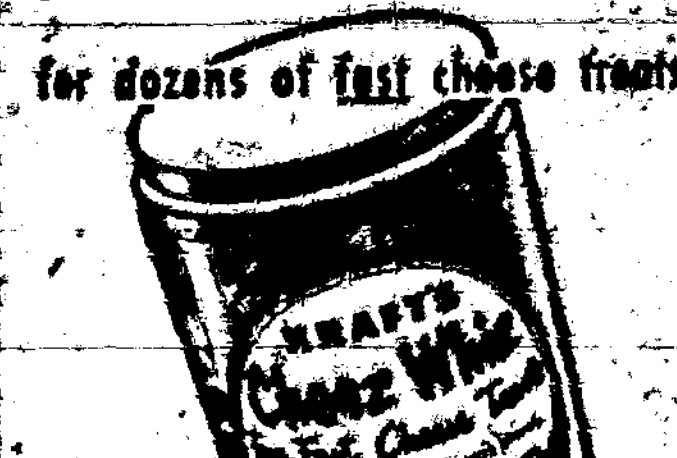
