THE STRALEY FAMILY IN NEW MEXICO

In 1917, in World War I, my brother Tom and I were called into the Service. Tom went first and was sent to France. He stayed until the war was over and a year with the Army of Occupation. My brother Harry was turned down by the Army due to a crippled ankle, so he joined the Merchant Marines. I was drafted some time later, got my training in California and was sent to Siberia via Hawaii, China and Japan.

We were the first American soldiers ever to land at the now famous Nagasaki, where the first atom bomb of World War II was dropped. One of my buddies was Lewin Perry of Glenwood. We spent 18 months in Siberia. My father was appointed postmaster in August 1917. Before going into the Army he and I traded his first 160-acre homestead to Gus Hall for the Guthrie holdings at the Luna Pump Station. This was our ranch headquarters for many years.

In 1922 a new school house was built out of the Ancho No. 1 brick. Through the 20's a lucrative business was done in cordwood and then came the influx of homesteaders. In 1922 my father opened a store and moved the post office to the site of the Deal building at the west end of Ancho. There were several families of homesteaders who lived around Jacks Peak, among them the Burnett, Boydstons, Simpsons, and the Stonemans. The story was told us that Jacks Peak got its name from being used as a lookout by Black Jack Ketchum. The peak was high enough to give a view five miles around.

On the Fourth of July 1924 was the meeting place for people near and far. They came to the picnic, races and dance from as far away as 30 miles. I remember Jimmy Cooper always had a horse to run in the races.

The blizzard in December of 1923 was the worst one we ever had. It snowed steady for three days and strong winds piled drifts 15 feet high. There was no travel over the highway for two weeks. The wind blew so hard we closed the front door of the store, facing the east, for three days. During the 30's there was much gold mining activity in the Jicarillas. It was during this time we had four teachers in our school, with 140 children enrolled and five school buses. Ancho had the first hot lunch program in the county. It was organized under the able guidance of a former county school superintendent, Mrs. Ola C. Jones, now of Glenwood.

In 1937 the Ancho Brick Co. property was sold and we acquired that part of the townsite lying north of the S. P. Ry. tracks. In 1938 the store and post office was moved to its present location. In 1936 we lost our sister Sallie. She passed away in El Paso and was buried there. In May of 1937 we lost our father and mother. Our mother passed away May 15 on Sunday. Just two weeks later to the day, on Sunday, May 30, our father passed on. He was postmaster for 21 years. My brother, John C. Straley, was appointed postmaster in 1937 and served until his death in 1963. This was a period of 16 years. "Cap" or "Cappy" as he was fondly called by his family and friends, was also the manager of the store.

Law Says 'Nix' on All Types Fireworks

What was intended to be a practical joke back-fired last week and as a result four youths will have a day in court. A cherry bomb, the most powerful type of fireworks, was exploded late last Friday evening on the front porch of the home of Supt. and Mrs. R. G. Firman. The blast, heard for several blocks, awakened the Firman family and Mrs. Firman's first thought was that there had been a gas explosion in the house. The four youths were traced through the car they had been driving and were cited for illegal possession of fireworks. Two of them were juveniles and will appear before Juvenile Judge W. T. Scoggin. One of the youths over 18 will appear in district court and the other before Police Magistrate John Mackey. Sheriff S. M. Ortiz calls attention to the following Section 40-18-B of the criminal code of New Mexico, which defines possession of fireworks as illegal and affixes penalties for such violation: "It shall be unlawful for any person, co-partnership, corporation, or other organization to sell, offer to sell, display for sale, own, possess or discharge within this state, any firecracker, roman candle, skyrocket, torpedo, bomb, blank cartridge or any other type or form of explosive commonly known as fireworks."

To Fire Ajax Missile at Armed Forces Day on New McGregor Range

Highlight of the Armed Forces Day activities at Fort Bliss will be a public Nike Ajax guided missile shoot at newly-opened McGregor Range Saturday, May 18. This is the first guided missile shoot to which the public has been invited. In addition to the guided missile shoot, the day's activities will include firing demonstrations of the Army's fully automatic 75 MM "Skysweeper" conventional antiaircraft artillery weapon. Both weapons will be fired against radio controlled aircraft targets. The shoot is scheduled to begin at 10:30 a.m.

Spencer Ranch Home Is Half Completed

Talk on Thorium to Be Given at Denver

The Uranium Institute of America has asked David Shaw, assistant general manager of the Atomic Energy Commission, to clarify for the uranium producing industry the conflicting statements issued by the nation's leading atomic authorities on the immediate and future importance of thorium as a source of atomic fuel.

Mr. Shaw has accepted the Institute's invitation to address the final banquet of its annual meeting in Denver, May 17-18 at the Cosmopolitan Hotel. His responsibilities in the Commission include the supervision of all production, milling, and manufacturing of fissionable materials.

Findings of the Uranium Institute in its flying tour of atomic installations in the eastern United States pointed up the support for thorium by nuclear power scientists. These findings were reported by the May 4th issue of Business Week and the April 27th issue of Chemical Week.

Just in case people from far-away places might go to Colorado Springs looking for the Nike missile firing range, Marvin H. Roberts, secretary of the Carrizozo Chamber of Commerce, has written a letter to the El Paso Times to set the record straight. He wrote the letter after he saw an item in the El Paso paper, with a Colorado Springs date line, describing the firing of a Nike missile and a long list of officials who witnessed the firing.

"This article is well written," Secretary Roberts wrote, "and is a real credit to our missile program, but one thing is misleading—the failure to mention the geographic location of Red Canyon Range Camp. We here in Carrizozo are proud of Red Canyon Range Camp and thus designate our town as 'The Home of the Nike Guided Missile.'"

G. A. Rowland of Wichita Falls, Texas, was visiting in Lincoln County Friday and Saturday of last week. He stopped en route to his home from Truth or Consequences, where he has been taking baths in the hot springs for 10 days.

The night before leaving T or C he was honored at a banquet given by the Odd Fellows Lodge, of which he has been a continuous member for 40 years. He also visited a great nephew at White Sands, E. E. Stewart.

Mr. Rowland, who is active and in good health at 82, first came to Lincoln County in 1908 with his parents who farmed on Little Creek.

When still a boy he worked for Billy Lane in White Oaks, hauling coal with mules to the Old Abe and Homestake mines. Another one of his jobs for Lane was putting up 75 tons of prairie hay in the vicinity of Red Lake.

He also worked on a farm in Ruidoso for Frank Coe and Jap Coe, and herded cattle for Jim Tully when he had a beef cow tract with Fort Stanton. He herded cattle all over what is now the townsite of Carrizozo, along with the late Peto Johnson, who was foreman of the Bar-W Ranch.

Mr. Rowland lived in Lincoln county for 20 years before moving to Las Cruces in the 90's. He was married there and later moved to San Antonio.

In Las Cruces he worked for Pat Garrett and in the 90's led one of Garrett's horses all the way to Seaborn Grey's place in Capitan. This horse, named Capitan, was fast and won lots of races. Capitan's sire was Sanford, an English horse, known as a mile and a repeater. Capitan's dam was Winnie Woods, a quarter horse. Sanford was owned by Pat Garrett and was used as a cowpony until its sudden death following a day's roundup.

Mr. Rowland was living in Dona Ana county at the time of the disappearance of Col. Fountain and his 13-year-old son. He recalls that the Colonel and his son stayed all night at La Luz and started out in a buggy the next day for Las Cruces.

Hearsay is that he stopped at a wayside place in White Sands and told a friend that he had seen horsemen at some distance following his rig. His friend urged him to stay overnight and take the mail back into Las Cruces, but Col. Fountain said that he had a rifle and was not afraid, besides he thought having his young son with him would be protection against attack. Their complete disappearance has been an unsolved mystery. Col. Fountain, as legal advisor for the Cow Association of New Mexico, had known enemies.

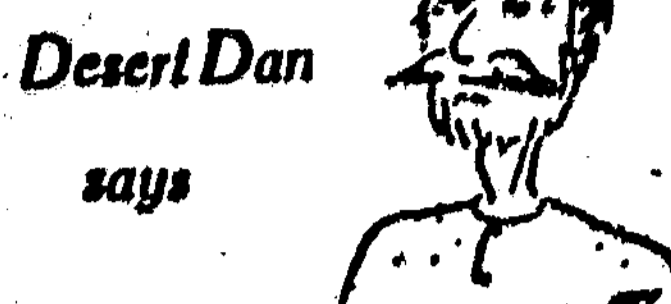
In 1912, Mr. Rowland helped Mr. Kelly, a civil engineer, survey the townsite of Alamogordo.

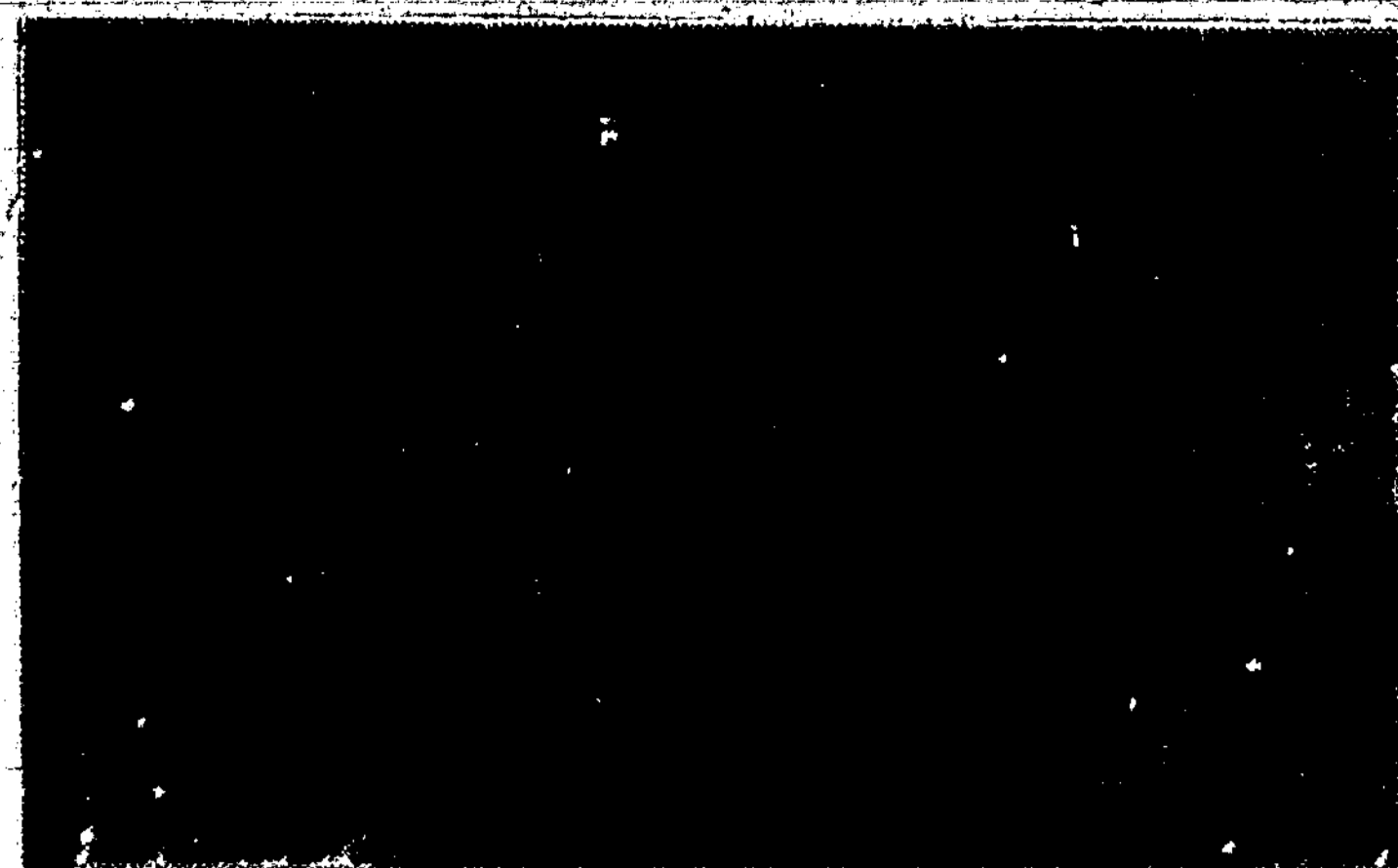

**THE CHRISTIAN ENDEAVOR SOCIETY
AT LAKE VALLEY**



IN BETTER DAYS—This picture of the Christian Endeavor Society building, from D. M. Miller's collection of early-day Lake Valley photographs, shows the structure before neglect and disuse had taken over. The strictly non-sectarian society possibly was unique in New Mexico. It continued until 1937 in the Sierra County town.

In 1896 five women organized the Lake Valley Christian Endeavor Society, dedicated to Christian living and to community improvement.

It was strictly a non-sectarian organization. Presbyterians and Episcopalians, Methodists and Baptists, Catholics, Mormons and Quakers attended its services during the more than 40 years that the society existed.

Lake Valley, once a boom mining town, never had a denominational church. The Christian Endeavor Society which the women organized for the spiritual betterment of the Lake Valley people and those in the surrounding countryside possibly was unique in New Mexico.

D. M. (Dan) Miller, a native of Lake Valley, said the organizers were his mother, Mrs. D. S. (Sam) Miller, Mrs. Margaret Williams, Mrs. Parvin, Mrs. Williams' sister who brought the idea of the society with her from Muscatine, Iowa, Mrs. Sarah Johnson and Mrs. Elizabeth McLean.

Although the society used Christian Endeavor books, it never affiliated with a particular church and remained strictly local, Miller said.

Lake Valley's population already was declining when the society was organized. At the time the town probably had a population of about 200, compared to 1,000 persons in its heyday when the silver and manganese mines were being worked to capacity.

After organizing, the society bought a rooming house from May Morgan Morgan who had been an officer in the Union Army. The members put in a new floor, painted the front of the wooden building, tacked oil cloth on the walls, placed wall lamps, and provided chairs.

The building is standing today, but like buildings in many former mining towns it is unused and neglected. The seven roof oil lamps which illuminated the interior for evening services disappeared or were stolen about ten years ago, Miller said. Much of the oil

cloth which covered the walls is gone and most of the windows are out. Some years ago, some one kicked in the back door and cattle have wandered into the building, damaging the floor.

There was never a regular minister, although pastors traveling through preached at meetings of the society. A leader was chosen each Sunday from among the active members, including adults and children, and sometimes the leaders for the services were as young as 12 years.

In the rear of the building were living quarters for preachers who came to town for a short stay. The preachers were of any Protestant denomination. They and their families ate at various houses in town and sometimes stayed with Lake Valley families if the accommodations in the society's building were not large enough.

Officers of the society were a president, vice president, secretary, corresponding secretary and treasurer. Choir practice was held every Thursday night and a business meeting once a month. Duas were ten cents monthly.

The Christian Endeavor sponsored a number of community projects, including a schoolhouse which was completed in 1905. The society raised most of its money by holding socials. With this money the society fenced the town cemetery, contributed to famine relief in China, for flood victims in the eastern United States and also helped victims of a flood in Monticello in Sierra County. Its funds also assisted hungry persons coming through Lake Valley by wagon and team.

Tom Ying, a Chinese cook in Lake Valley, was asked by Mrs. D. S. Miller if he would assist in fund raising for Chinese famine relief, and he helped with a will. The society later bought him a pipe in appreciation for his efforts.

The biggest community project of the society was the building of the school. A considerable

part of the schoolhouse funds were raised by a big July 4 celebration in 1954. In addition, people in the Lake Valley district were asked to contribute money towards the joint schoolhouse and community center. No tax was ever levied. Before the school was erected a building had been rented for classes.

Political rallies, dances and other community gatherings were held in the schoolhouse. A charge was made for dances to provide a school maintenance fund.

In 1920 or 1921, Miller said, Lake Valley School District No. 1 Board petitioned the county commissioners, meeting in Hillsboro, then the Sierra County seat, to levy an assessment and build an addition which doubled the size of the building. The schoolhouse, still a sturdy looking structure, now stands unused like the Christian Endeavor building.

But church services still are held in Lake Valley (population 8). Once a month the Episcopal rector comes from Deming to conduct services in the small Mission of St. Colombo on the eastern edge of the town.

Miss King plans to enter the summer session of the University of Denver where she has been awarded a tuition scholarship for outstanding work in high school.

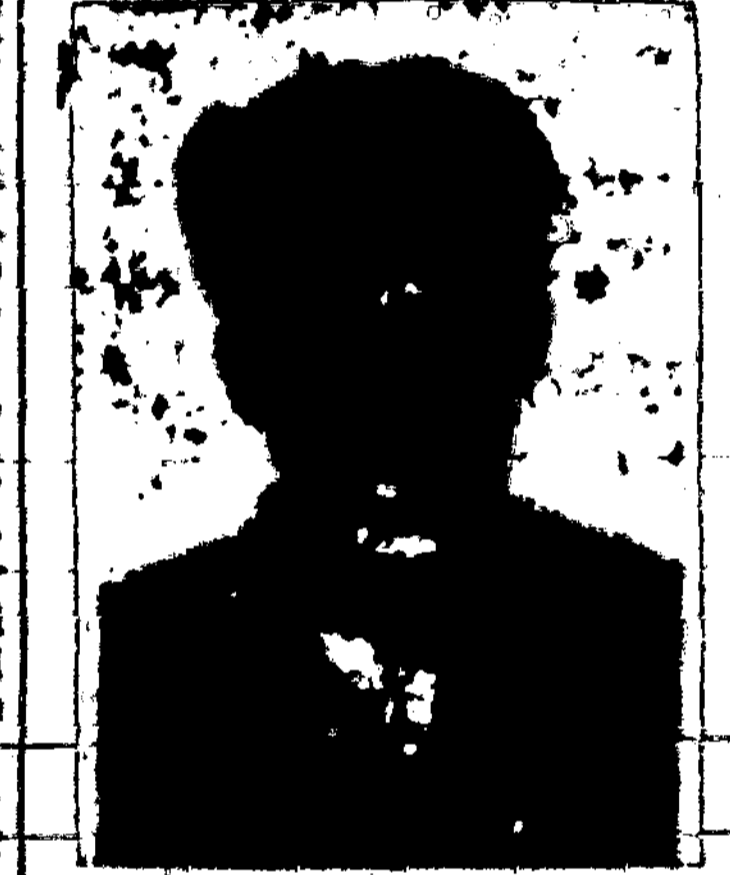

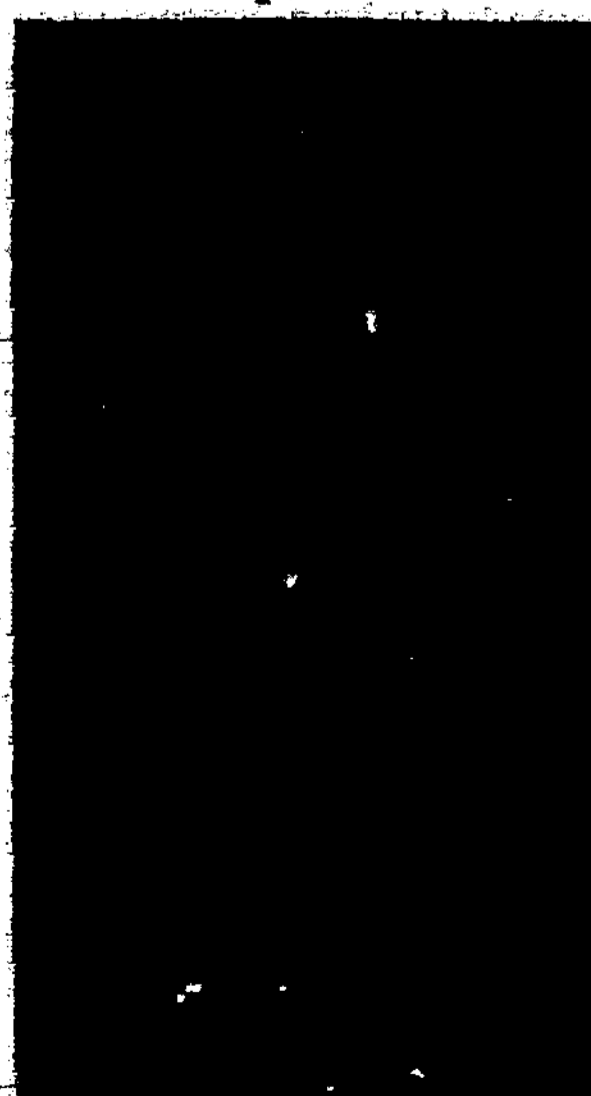

PLANS MADE FOR SHEEP DEMONSTRATION JUNE 11

Tentative plans were made for the sheep demonstration June 11 at the Green Ranch south of Picocho. The program will start at 10:30 with a session on "Recognizing Grades of Wool by the Grower." J. R. Stauder, wool marketing specialist will be in charge of this session.

The afternoon will start with the raling of sheep with the "wool squeeze" machine, Ivan Watson in charge.

Wool growers will have a chance to rate some sheep on clean wool production and see how their estimate compares with the machine estimate.

Along with the use of the machine, plans are to have a discussion on use of the wool squeeze machine in herd improvement and estimating wool shrinkage with F. E. Keale as moderator.

The program will be concluded with a group discussion of problems affecting the wool grower.

All woolgrowers are invited to attend the wool demonstration June 11.

Ask County Residents To Assist in Research On Food Radioactivity

Lincoln county residents this week were urged by Dr. Carl F. Tarlowski, district health officer, to help in a nation-wide study to investigate the possible radioactivity of foods.

All persons having commercial or home canned food products dating prior to 1945—Year One of the Atomic Era—were asked to notify the Lincoln County Health Department, P. O. Box 123, Carrizozo, or phone 453.

The items will be collected by an inspector representing the Food and Drug Administration district office in Denver.

"The purpose of the program," Dr. Tarlowski explained, "is to determine the naturally occurring 'background radioactivity' in staple foods from different geographic areas. These foods will be monitored for any changes in radioactivity which might be caused by weapons testing and other applications of atomic energy."

All food collected will be shipped to the Food and Drug Administration's headquarters in Washington, D. C., for study by chemists.

"It would be difficult to attempt to estimate how many families might have canned foodstuffs dating back to more than 12 years ago," the health officer said, "however, it is hoped that the search will turn up some forgotten food cans in basements or garages."

Commissioner George P. Larick of the Food and Drug Administration, said in Washington that there is no evidence of any significant radioactivity in the food supply. "We want to be prepared scientifically to protect the public in the event this should ever be necessary," he said.
