July 1 Date to Apply For Gas Tax Refunds

Beginning July 1, you may apply for a refund of the federal taxes you paid on gasoline used in your farming operations during the 12 month period ending lune 30. This federal tax amounts to 2 cents per gallon or \$20 per thousand.

To be eligible for a tax refund on your purchases of gasoline, you must be the owner, tenant, or operator of the farm. No tax refunds are allowed on resoling

460,000-acre reservation. During the 18th and 19th centuries the many Apache groups roamed over a vast area stretching from the Staked Plains of West Texas to central Arizona, from northern Mexico to southern Colorado. They were not a single tribe, but a people unified only by language. Two Apache tribes live in New Mextoo today—the Jicarilla, in the north, and the Mescalero in the

south. Two of the most feared Apache chleis of the late 19th century, Cochise and Geronimo, led the southern Apache tribes of Mescaleros and Chiricahuas, whose descendants live today in New Mexico. The famous Apache scout, Bigmouth, is still living to 100.

Many of the early Mescalero ceremonies have been lost of forgotten by the Indians, but their annual gathering in early July includes some of their most important rituals.

Chief among these is the Gahan ceremony, erroneously "devit dance" by white visitors. This is primarily a maturity ceremony for Apache girls who have reached marriageable age. The following year, eight animals were taken by 80 hunters, and in 1950, 80 hunters took only five.
