

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

(G. A. Rowland, now 82, recently re-visited Lincoln County, where he worked at various jobs in the early '90s. The following tape recording was made at the News office.)

ROWLAND It don't seem possible for the railroad and houses to be here in Carrizozo where I used to run cattle all over it years ago when Pete Johnson was wagon boss for the Bar W Ranch, which furnished the first governor ever elected by ballot for New Mexico when it came into statehood. We elected him in 1912 he had took seat in 1913. That's when I left New Mexico and went to San Antonio.

I have been in and out of Texas ever since, except during the last 20 years. Since then I have contracted hay fever and asthma. My doctors told me the best medicine for both diseases was to change climate and altitude. I have seen 36 states in the last 18 or 20 years and I have not been bothered with either hay fever or asthma. One doctor was a surgeon and the other one was a medical doctor and I have outlived both of them. I'm still here and going strong.

I just came from Hot Springs, New Mexico. They made a bad mistake a few years ago and changed the name of it to T. O. C. My judgment tells me that they killed the health resort of Hot Springs. There is more vacant property and property for sale there than any place in New Mexico, at the present time, I believe.

I have just been over in the White Mountains close to Alto to visit one of my old boy friends. I used to work for his daddy and mother, the Lige Peebles who had two boys, Henry and Charles Peebles. Henry Peebles at the present time lives on Nogal flat, on what is known as the old Luge Skinner homestead, Charlie still lives on Little creek about three miles from Alto. He and his only son, Lawrence Peebles, who lives on his great-grandma's old homestead and in his great-grandma Peebles' house that she lived in over 50 or 60 years ago.

I find very few people in Lincoln County who were here in 1908 when I came. All have passed away. One of my best old friends, Sayers Crockett, I visited here a few years ago in the hospital. He had a broken hip in November of that year, when I bid him goodbye, but I wouldn't tell him forever. My judgment told me I wouldn't ever see him again.

He lived till the following February and passed away, according to the records, I believe. He owned a ranch about 15 miles west of the town and had a nice bunch of whiteface cows. He was the only boy around my age. He was a year younger than I. He was the only boy in the county that toughed it out. He had a few cows when he got married way back yonder, I can't recall the year. His daddy gave him two cows and calves to start with.

They had a drought in this country for about three years and Sayers told me that he came near going broke, but the cows rode him out. When he died he had about 200 or 300 head of whiteface cows and he didn't owe anyone a dime. Sayers was noted almost all of his life. He was the oldest boy of a family of five boys and one girl.

I met his baby brother in Phoenix, Ariz., in 1954. His name is Joe Crockett. He was a sign painter, when I saw his last, for the State Highway in Phoenix. His only sister lived about 25 miles east and north of Sacramento, Calif. She was a school teacher. She raised one only girl. Bald was her given name. She married in Sacramento and had two boys.

I saw one of Stella Crockett's grandsons and two of his boys, who are Stella's great grandsons, in 1954. I stayed a couple of nights in Stella's home. She had a nice home out in the country. I left there and went north into Nevada, through Reno and Las Vegas and on into Salt Lake City, Utah.

I have been through Salt Lake City several times. Every time my curiosity is raised and I take a night-seeing bus and go thru the city and see new things. Salt Lake City has one of the finest capital buildings I ever was in. I went through the Mormon square which covers a whole city block inside a stone wall about 30 inches thick and 25 feet high. It has a tabernacle in it which I visited and sat on the high seat in the tabernacle which seats 10,000 people comfortably. At 12:15 every day the organ player gives a little 15 minute recital on the organ.

I and another gentleman got on the highest seat in the tabernacle and sat and listened to him. There were about 30 or 40 people in the tabernacle at the time. When he quit playing and started to leave he sent the gentleman sitting beside me said, "Mister do you want your piece before you come or after you come to the tabernacle?"

Everybody in Old Lincoln County is requested to wear an old fashioned costume on Sunday. There will be a parade of these costumes, and prizes will be awarded to the first, second and third selections. The judging will be as follows: best dressed family; best lady; best man; best girl under 18 years; and best boy under 18. Begin now to assemble an old time costume: bustles for the girls and ladies, colorful shirts and big hats for the boys and men.

There will be music and song all day. The Mesquero Indians will perform the Devil Dance, Sunday. There will be Spanish songs and Mexican quadrilles, as well as cowboy and ranch songs.

Lincoln has two museums and other important historical points of interest. Make plans now to attend the pageant on one of the evenings of August 2, 3, or 4, and plan to spend all day in Lincoln on Sunday, August 4. Plenty of good food and cold drinks for everybody.

Navy Recruiting Service Announcement

J. W. Moore, Chief Petty Officer in charge of the U. S. Navy Recruiting Office in Roswell, announced today that no waiting lists exist for men desiring to enlist in the U. S. Navy and who meet the required physical and mental qualifications.

Upon enlisting, men are sent to the U. S. Naval Training Center at San Diego, California, for a short period of indoctrination and training. Upon completion of training, those qualified are sent to trade schools and others are sent to sea or a short establishment where the rapidly expanding fleet offers opportunities for promotion and increased pay greater than ever before in the history of the Navy.

Moore stated that men enlisting under the High School Graduate Training Program may select the field of their choice prior to enlisting, and will be guaranteed a school in the field they choose upon qualifying.

Men who are not high school graduates, and wish to enter under an interesting program, may select the Naval Aviation Field. Men who qualify for this program will at the completion of recruit indoctrination, be sent to an Aviation Class "A" school to qualify for one of thirteen different class "A" schools. Men accepted for enlistment under this program will be designated as "Aviation Recruit."

Speaking with more than 22 years of active Naval service, Chief Moore stated that if a young man wishes to select a good trade, continue his education, travel to all parts of the world, participate in all types of sports, and at the same time get good pay and medical attention, the U. S. Navy offers him all this today, along with a multitude of other benefits.

Meeting Called to Discuss paving of Cedarvale Road

The proposed reconstruction and surfacing of State Road 42, between Cedarvale and Corona, will be discussed at a public hearing in Corona Tuesday, July 16, State Highway Department officials announced in Santa Fe this week.

The hearing will be held in the Corona High School at 10 a.m. The project to be considered is a 12-mile stretch on the Federal-aid secondary system that is scheduled for letting the end of August.

Highway officials have called the meeting in accordance with the Federal-aid Highway Act of 1956 which provides that such hearings be held on Federal-aid projects which bypass, or go through, any community.

Those attending the hearing from the state road office in Santa Fe will include E. L. Smith, Engineer of Secondary Highways; Austin Roberts, Department attorney; Frank Horn, Right-of-Way section; and Lamar Floyd, Personnel Officer. Also expected to attend is E. E. Anderson, of the U. S. Bureau of Public Roads office in Santa Fe. Any citizen interested in the project is urged to attend the hearing and to participate in the discussions with state and county representatives.

Camp Meetings Will Begin July 17

By DOROTHY QUCE The eighteenth annual inter-denominational camp meeting will open on Nogal Mesa with supper and evening services on Wednesday, July 17, and will close Sunday night, July 21.

Back in 1940, when the first Ranchmen's Camp meeting was held up on the Mesa, the stockmen and their families, who lived very far from any community, seldom had the opportunity to enjoy the privilege of attending any religious service. The roads were bad oftentimes making it impossible to finish the morning chores and arrive in town in time for Sunday services.

Joe Evans, a rancher who brought the idea of camp meetings to New Mexico from his boyhood participation in summer meetings in the Davis Mountains at Texas, Ralph Hall, who worked with the Presbyterian Board of Missions and had the equipment, and Roger Sherman, a fellow minister, had little trouble gaining the enthusiastic support of the cattlemen of Lincoln County in establishing the first camp meeting on Nogal Mesa. Now, the camp is an integral part of the life of all the people of this part of New Mexico.

A large, blueboard tabernacle has replaced the tent of former years. A spacious dining hall with shelter from summer showers, adequate barbecue pits and other cooking facilities, and a fenced play area for the small fry have added to the enjoyment of the camp meeting; but the services have not changed. Each day at 10:30 a.m., about 2 p.m., and at 7 p.m., the big bell announces the beginning of services in the tabernacle. Between times, services are carried on by the men in the open under their Prayer Tree, and other places on the grounds for the young people and the women.

At the tabernacle services two ministers of different protestant churches take turns speaking. Their messages are given as Christians, not as speakers of certain creeds, and always end with the plea, "Please go to the church of your choice." This year both preachers are well known to the camp meeting goers. They are Rev. Paul Gaston of El Paso, and Rev. Everett King of Albuquerque. Rev. Bill Lytle of Corona will again direct the music and invites everyone to join the choir. Rev. Ralph Hall and Rev. Roger Sherman will again be managers.

Meals are served three times daily by the ranchers to all who attend the services. The grounds include 23 acres of area where you may pitch your tent or park your house trailer without cost. Expenses are met by donation which are not solicited.

The camp grounds may be reached from Highway 390, the turnoff being about 5 miles west of Capitan and 15 miles east of Carrizozo. The turnoff, a dirt road, called Indian Divide, is well marked and passes Nogal Lake south of the camp grounds to join State Road 47 which leads to Capitan, Ruidoso, or back through Nogal to Carrizozo.

The grounds are at 7200 feet in altitude, cool, and forested. There may be summer showers which make a work jacket a necessity.

An old time cowhand's rodeo was held at the Bud Crenshaw ranch in White Oaks, July 4. Many of the neighboring ranches pitched in to help finish building the bucking chutes and pens. Others brought stock. Bud supplied roping goats, calves, wild cows, kid ponies, dogging steers and several saddle broncs. Tommy Knight and the Straley boys brought a tough saddle bronc and dogging steer. Pat Dunning brought nine head of dry cows to ride and a pony for the children. Jack Phillips brought two bucking horses and dogging steers; Lupe Gabaldon sent a bucking horse and a kid's pony.

The rodeo started at 9 a.m. and continued, in spite of high winds and dust, until dark. Everyone helped, and every cowboy from junior to senior size had plenty of chances to rope and ride.

There were no entry fees, just jackpots; and Zane Leslie, Tommy Knight and Dan Richards sold unused movie tickets to the audience to help pay for improving the arena for further shows. Orene Crenshaw handled the cold drink concession, supplied by the aid of Monte Vista Service Station and Pat Dunning, trucking and ice department.

Many of the ranchers and cowboys have felt that rodeo has been going too "Big Time." They are too busy to practice regularly, and entry fees in most shows are high. Also competition from strictly rodeo hands is too tough to be worth it; so this show was a community project to prove that a lot of fun can be had on a very little, with most of the cowboys swearing they hadn't roped a calf since the last branding.

John Meigs, the well-known artist, was very enthusiastic and remarked that this was probably the last "old-time" rodeo he'd ever see—we hope not. We hope that it will be the renewal of many such community get-togethers that everyone can enjoy without worrying about the big dollar sign.

Dee Proctor, Judy McKnight, Marietta Sultemeler and Douglas McKnight were chosen as a team to represent Lincoln County at the state contest to be held at State College the week of August 5-9. These 4-H'ers were the top scoring individuals at the county livestock judging contest held July 9.

The Hondo Valley 4-H Club will meet July 18 at 2 p.m. at the home of J. P. McKnight. Those members planning to go to county camp who have not given their demonstration will give it at this time in order to be eligible to go.

Members in home living or clothing projects are to bring their garments to the meeting.

Workday for the Lincoln County Fair has been changed to Friday, July 12, due to conflicting dates with the date originally set.

A meeting will be held at the Canitan City Hall on July 15 at 7:30 p.m. to discuss the brucellosis program in Lincoln County. Dr. P. A. Humble and Dr. M. O. Nottingham, who are in charge of the brucellosis program for southern New Mexico, will be at the meeting.

All area committeemen for the brucellosis program are urged to attend, as well as any other interested individuals.

The outcome of this meeting will likely affect the shipping of breeding livestock this fall.

4-H county camp is planned for July 29 to August 1 for Lincoln county 4-H members. Other counties included will be Chavez, DeBaca and Otero. Camp will be at Scott Able 4-H Camp near Cloudfort.

Now is the time for 4-H members to make plans to attend camp. Be sure to check with your leader to see if you are eligible to go.

All reservations for county camp should be sent to the county agent before July 24.

Are you one of the thousands of Americans who plan to travel overseas this summer, or over the border into Mexico or Canada? If so, you can save yourself trouble and help to protect your country's food supply by refraining from bringing back foreign agricultural materials such as fruits, vegetables, plants and animal products.

Greatly stepped-up travel in recent years has increased the danger of introduction into this country of plant and animal pests and diseases which can threaten domestic crops and livestock. The Bureau of Customs cooperates with the U. S. Department of Agriculture in inspecting the personal effects of all incoming visitors and tourists at border, sea, and air ports to intercept such unwelcome immigrants. Last year, plant pests alone were intercepted more than 17,000 times, insects over 11,000 times, and plant diseases almost 6,000 times.

Some kinds of plant material are definitely prohibited; that is, they cannot be brought in under any circumstances. Others may be imported after proper inspection or treatment. If you have some definite reason and plan to bring back plants or plant materials, you can save yourself time and trouble by writing ahead of time to the Plant Quarantine Division, U. S. Department of Agriculture, Washington, D. C., for information and permits.

The inspector at the border is carrying out his duty to protect both consumers and producers in this country from the high costs of plant and animal pests and diseases. You can ease his job and speed your way through customs by leaving behind agricultural products of a prohibited nature.

Program Changes

Announced by Burch

After a good initial turnout the summer youth program has slowed down, either due to laziness or the heat. Coach Al Burch announced to the News.

He continued, there are about 20 boys still going out for baseball in the mornings from 7:30 to 9:30. This number should be around 50 so there could be four teams to play each other on Tuesday and Thursday from 6:15 to 7:30 p.m. The hope was to have four teams sponsored by local clubs or groups and have a league which would play out-of-town teams on Saturdays. This can be done on a small scale if we can just get the boys out of bed and out to the field.

The gym activities from 10 a.m. to 12, and 1:30 to 3:30 p.m., have from 15 to 20 boys still turning out, Burch said. The gym should have from 50 to 75 children a day in order to develop skill in team games and have play-offs in table tennis or checkers and like games.

The girls have not participated at all in the summer program. Not more than 30 have even come to the gym; so a new schedule will go into effect, as follows: Baseball, 7:30 to 9:30 a.m., Monday through Friday; Gym, 10 to 12, Boys on Monday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and girls on Tuesday; from 1:30 to 3:30, girls on Thursday and boys the remaining days.

We would like to see some of the Junior High students take advantage of the tennis courts from 4:00 to 6:00. The equipment is at the high school and can be checked out to individuals wanting to play. The lights should be installed soon, so the courts will be available after dark, Burch said.

The dance every Friday night, open to all high school people in this area, has had good attendance. It starts at 8 p.m. and closes at 10:30.

Colorful Ceremony Held at Gran Quivira

Mons. was held in the seventeenth century Mission Church, "San Buenaventura" by Fr. John Borley, Franciscan Father of Tularosa, on July 4, 1957 at Gran Quivira National Monument.
