

Ramblin' Around Lincoln County

(G. A. Rowland, now 82, recently re-visited Lincoln County, where he worked at various jobs in the early '90s. The following tape recording was made at the News office.)

Farmington is the finest place in the state of New Mexico for a farmer to make a living and still stay at home.

The El Paso Natural Gas Company has strung gas and oil up there. I saw a 6-inch cast iron pipe carrying their gas from San Juan county to Albuquerque. Also they told me they had a ten-inch gas line headed for California. It was at Prescott, Ariz., at that time, somewhere along in 1953 or 1954.

The Navajo reservation lays right around the town. There is the only cornerstone in the United States that meets four states — New Mexico, Arizona, Colorado and Utah.

I think it was about 1904 or 1905, when I lived in Farmington, that the government established an Indian agency. The San Juan and Animas run together three miles south of Farmington. From there on it is a tributary of the Little Colorado and from that junction on they call it the San Juan River.

Down that river around some 30 odd miles is a place they call Shiprock. The government established an agent there and shipped in farming material — plows, shovels, hoes, rakes, wagons and harness. They worked those Navajo Indians who were decreasing in population instead of increasing. They paid the Indians \$1 a day in cash for 30 days. They could buy all the machinery that was available in those days, such as hand planters, turning plows, double shovels, picks, wagons and the like. They could buy any of that stuff on time and work it out at \$1 a day.

They were selling a 2 and 3-4 Studebaker wagon for \$50. I paid Paul Mayer \$35 for a Studebaker wagon in White Oaks in 1903 and drove it to Farmington.

There I farmed a little and bought and sold fruit. I would haul the fruit with my two horses and wagon up into Colorado to people who lived in the mountains so high they couldn't raise fruit. I carried my fruit up there in boxes nailed up. At that time I and my two horses and wagon made an average of \$50 a week. I would buy the fruit in the orchard and pick it myself. The boxes were bought at a sawmill where I also sold a lot of fruit. The boxes were knocked down to 500 in a package and I would bring them home and build them. Fifty dollars a week was good money in those days.

The latter part of 1905 I left Farmington and went up thru Durango where I ran into three families. We four families decided to leave Durango. We traveled east to Pagosa Springs and turned south and went thru Pagosa Junction. I was driving the lead wagon with my wife and three children. Our baby girl was five months old when we started out. We were six weeks getting to Las Cruces. That was the happiest trip I ever made in my life and it was all in a covered wagon.

We went through Carrizozo and I stopped at some grocery store and bought a sack of oats to feed my team. We went out through the I Bar X ranch, or close to it, across to Tularosa, and from there on to White Sands. We got to the point of the Sands about dark and it was sprinkling rain.

My old cowboy friend Wayne Brazel had a little bunch of cattle there. He and his kid brother who was Wayne's baby brother.

We stayed there three days and nights — four wagons of us in a three-room house. The kitchen was a shed room. It had no floor in it and the water was about two inches deep the next morning. I put my gum boots on and my slicker. The rain was leaking in on the cook stove but Wayne and I built a fire. We cooked breakfast and passed it inside to the rest of the family.

We had along a man by the name of Butler from Idaho. He had a grown boy about 18 or 20 years old. Mr. Butler thought he was a sick man. His wife had to cook special grub for him to eat and then he could hardly eat that. We never asked him what he wanted to eat. Wayne and I cooked beans, potatoes, salt bacon and sourdough biscuits on that stove. We just dished it out cafeteria style.

Mr. Butler ate it and never said a word. Mrs. Butler spoke about it to me the next day when we were eating dinner down at Chalk Hill some 20 or 25 miles from there. She took me off to speak to me private. She said, "Mr. Rowland, I had to laugh up my sleeve when you and Mr. Brazel passed our tin plates around to us with our rations and our cup of coffee; my husband ate it and never said a word."

I said "If he couldn't eat that kind of cooking he was just out of luck."

Hearing in Ruidoso On Highway 70

Highway officials have called the hearing in accordance with the 1956 highway act which provides that such hearings be held on all Federal-aid projects which bypass, or go through, any community.

Any resident of the area interested in the project is urged to attend the hearing and to participate in the discussions with state and county representatives.

Along the Way..

It's good to be back in Carrizozo and at work again after three weeks' vacation. We returned somewhat tanned, a case of "seatitis" from riding 5,000 miles and some aching muscles, but with many pleasant memories of visits with relatives and friends.

When I got back to my desk, one of the first things that caught my eye was a press release on "How to Enjoy a Vacation" (I suspect that Fred Miller put it where I would be sure to see it).

"For maximum benefit," I read, "a vacation above all should be restful—rest the mind, rest the eyes and rest the body—don't get into a cross-country driving marathon... start your sports activities in mild doses and, finally, don't stay out too long in the sun."

The good advice came too late. To any who may be interested, I can report that there are still lots of fish in the Pacific Ocean. I extracted only one in a day's deep sea fishing—an 11-lb. yellowtail that I'm sure won't be missed. No one can have much luck using a half-dead minnow as bait. The secret of catching the prized yellowtail, I was informed, is to bait your hook with an anchovy and get it overboard quickly while it is still lively. It made me realize how lucky I was to catch even one.

I can also report that the Pacific Northwest is still green and beautiful in the summer time. Rain and low clouds hung over the mountain peaks, but we were pointed out the approximate location of snow-capped Mt. Hood and Mt. Rainier.

We had better luck in getting a view of Grand Coulee Dam, which turned out to be the biggest gully plug in the world. We were told that plans are to add 40 feet to the height of the dam, which will back water of the Columbia river an additional 100 miles into Canada and furnish water power for nine more turbines.

I can also report that fishing in Montana is very good. It must be when I could catch my limit every day out. The Swan river, which empties into Flathead lake, is the place to go.

The motorist who plans to cover a certain number of miles in a day's travel, may find himself behind schedule if he fails to allow delays caused by road construction. Everywhere in the mountain states, where road building must be done during the summer months, the traveler finds the familiar signs "Road Construction Ahead — Detour — Proceed With Caution — Be Prepared to Stop" Washington, Montana, Colorado and New Mexico are making great progress rebuilding highways to modern standards. The most common type of new construction is wide two-lane asphalt with improved shoulders and two-lane travel up grades. Wyoming has wide open spaces like New Mexico. A lady in a small town said they don't think anything of driving a hundred miles: "It's only two flats away".... Sign in a window at Globe, Ariz., read "Moved Across the st. to Fred's Garage" and another sign in a cafe there asked "Have You Et Yet? ... Raton Pass on the New Mexico side has a novel way of slowing down trucks whose brakes may fail on the long grade. It is called a "truck trap" and is located at the end of the grade. The highway curves at this point but a runaway truck can be guided straight ahead on a clear path up the mountainside until it loses momentum.

Western Washington and Montana are harvesting bumper wheat crops. The farmers are doing all right as the government, under Soil Bank provisions, is paying for ground that is summer fallowed—land which the farmers previously held from production at their own expense.

Wyoming, Colorado and Northern New Mexico, green and beautiful, show no lack of rain. On the way down from Raton the range looked to be in good shape except for southern Guadalupe and places in northern Lincoln county.

Arriving in Corona last Friday afternoon Clara and I asked how much rain the county had been getting. We were told that a few showers had fallen in Corona and it was raining toward Carrizozo. When we got home the rain had passed over, but the streets were still wet and the air was delightfully fresh and cool. It was a perfect welcome home for two tired vacationists glad to be safely back, along with two new pets — a Hartz Mountain Warbler that lost its voice and a noisy little brown bantam chick. We are hoping the canary will learn to warble again in this Land of Enchantment.

Misses Clara Brazel and Rachel Hughes returned Saturday night from Silver City, where they had taken a course in the summer normal.

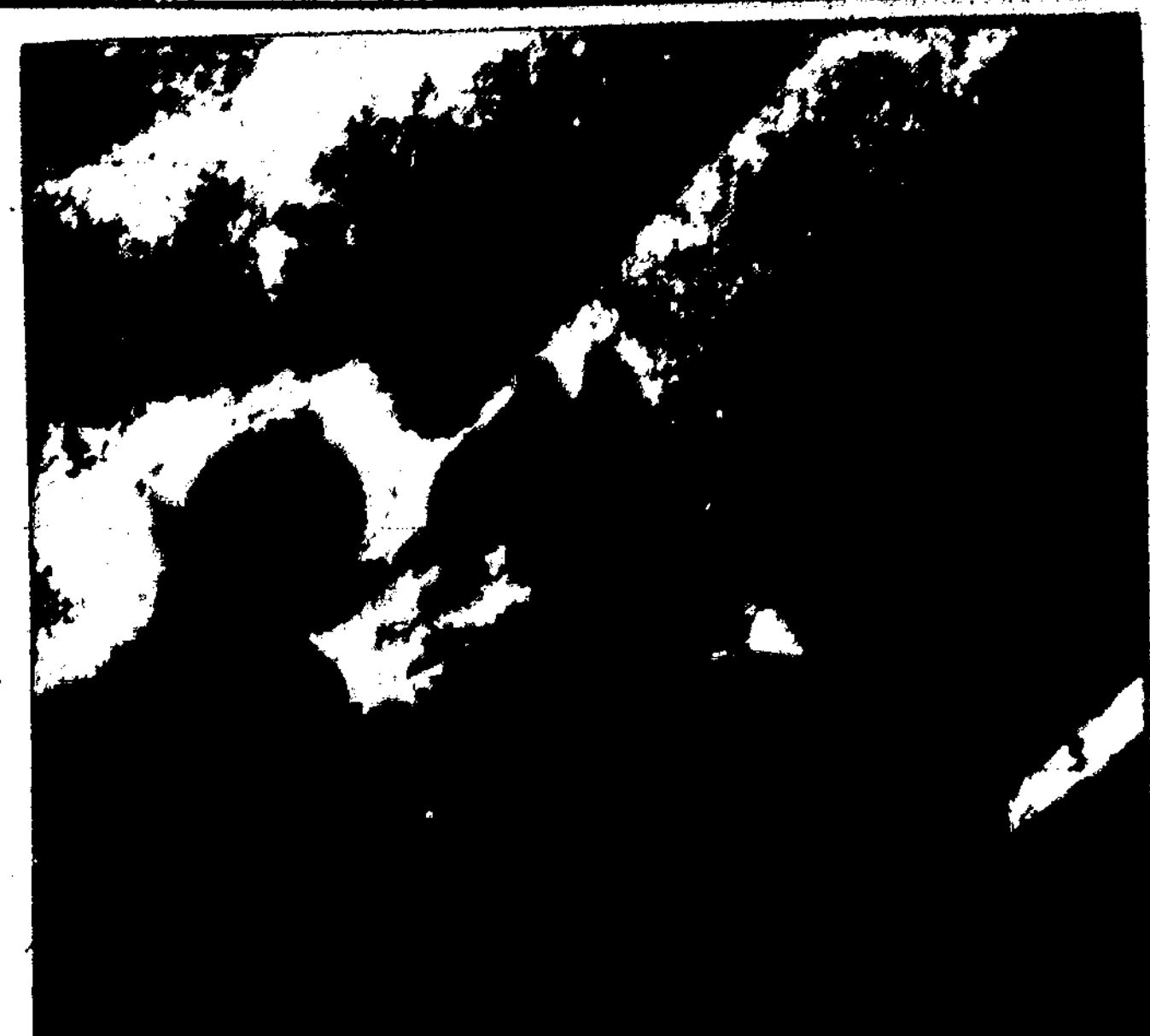

# FOLKLORE CORNER

By TED RAYNOR

## DEATH IN THE DESERT

On June 8, 1942, the body of Benjamin P. Cheney of Boston, a former vice president of the Santa Fe Railroad, was found near the junction of two desert roads in Mohave County, Ariz. A cattleman, Lee Eaton of Yucca, Ariz., discovered the body.

Cheney was a friend of C. G. Perry of Lordsburg, and the two men had a mutual interest in the Butterfield stage and Overland mail routes. The retired railroad executive's hobby was traveling the old routes. On his way to Boston, from San Diego, Calif., Cheney had planned to visit Perry, who was then living at Stein's in Hidalgo County.

Perry said Cheney "was the sort of man you couldn't lose out in this country."

But the desert can kill those who know it well. A wrong turn, a car stuck in the sand, an empty canteen, thirst and weakness, the uncertainty that help may lie in any direction you stumble, then the hope that someone will pass by on the road that no human being travels for weeks at a time. As thirst and hunger and weakness grow, there is the terrifying realization that you cannot fight intelligently to survive in the silent, pitiless desert. At last you lie down, and the desert gathers you into its own isolation, and you are as still as the desert.

That apparently was what happened to Cheney, intelligent and resourceful though he was.

A letter to Perry from Ernest Graham, then Mohave County sheriff, gave a brief and plausible explanation of Cheney's death. The letter was in reply to Perry's request for information and was written at Kingman June 25, 1942. It follows, in part:

Cheney's car became stuck in the sand and he walked 13 miles to a junction of roads. He evidently had water with him when he left the car but not enough to do him until someone came along.

"It is the opinion of the investigating officers that he remained at the junction of these two roads for at least three days before he came to his end. These roads are traveled only at intervals by the ranchers going to the town of Yucca and that is only about every two weeks or longer."

A letter to Perry, written on June 19, 1942, by R. E. Conkling of El Paso, a friend of Cheney, gave further details. The sheriff had wired Conkling after finding his address in Cheney's car, and the El Pasoan had gone to the inquest in Kingman. The pertinent part of the letter follows:

"I had your letter on June 15th on my return home yesterday from a trip to Kingman, Arizona, where I had gone to obtain information concerning the tragic ending of my very dear friend, Benjamin P. Cheney. Here are the details:

"Mr. Cheney left the Santa Fe Railroad Station at Yucca, Ariz., about eleven o'clock in the morning of May 24th. He was last seen alive by the agent at that place, who testified at the inquest that Mr. Cheney appeared in good health and spirits and set out for Congress Junction by way of a desert road known as the Cottonwood Crossing road. I believe he traveled that cut-off on his trip last year, his destination being Ash Fork where he was to meet a friend, a Mr. Atters.

"Just why he preferred to

travel this infrequently used cut-off, which resulted in his death, will never be known. He could have made much better time over the main highway from Needles to Ash Fork than by the desert cut-off.

"The investigations proved that about twenty miles from Yucca, he took a wrong turn in the road which led to a dry wash. Here his car stalled in the heavy sand and from the evidence he worked several hours trying to extricate the car, but failed, decided to walk back over his track no doubt hoping to meet help on the way. He had locked the switch and left the car with the top down which seems to indicate that the weather was not hot at the time.

"His trail was followed by the Kingman officials for several miles back on the road he had mistaken, and then for some reason he turned off and walked south away from the road and finally died from hunger, thirst and exhaustion.

"There was no sign of foul play, all of his effects, money, personal belongings and equipment were found unmolesated. An empty canteen was near the body besides an empty tin of vegetable juice.

"His body was found on June 8th and it was estimated that he had been dead for eight days. I am of the opinion that he met his end on the seventh day after May 24th. It seems too terrible that he could have been wandering about all that time without obtaining help, when ranchmen were driving during the time over the desert road. Why the agent never took the trouble to inquire if he had been seen, is hard to understand. It was a tragic blunder..."

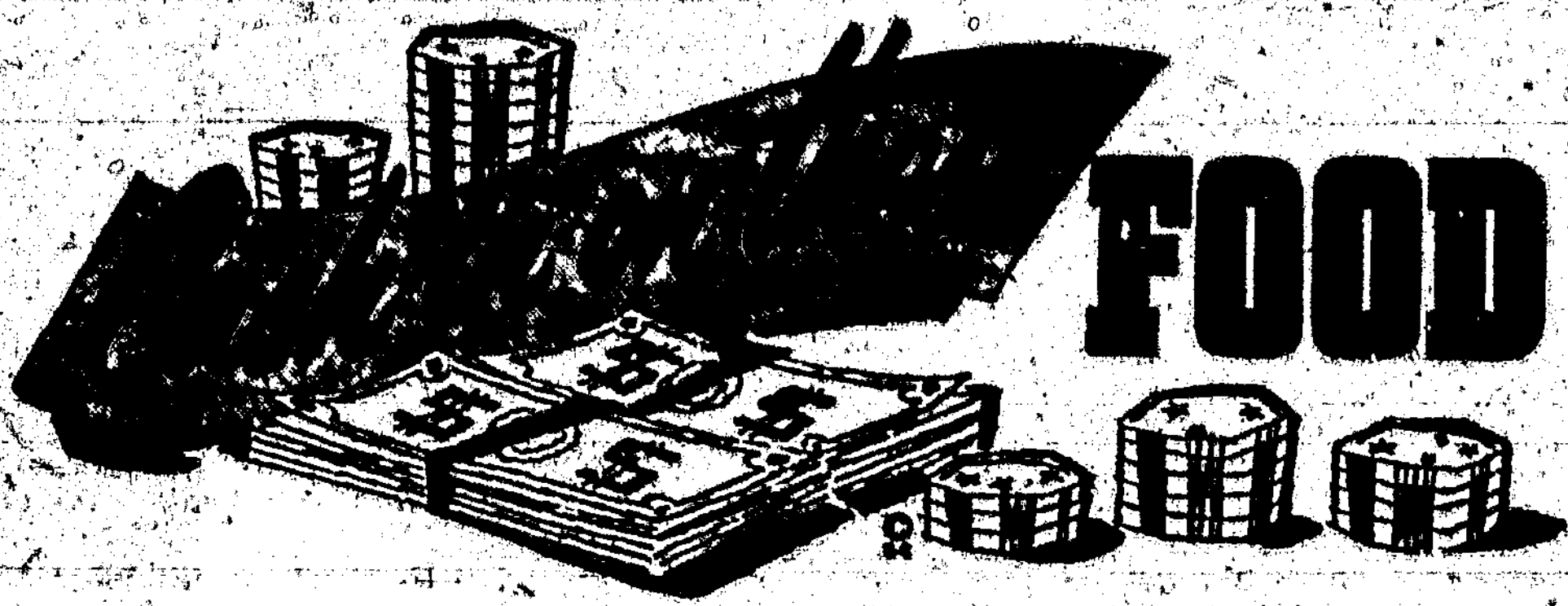
