"Missions by Moonlight" Tours to View Spectacular Ruins at Gran Quivira Park

Most pueblos of the Southwest are built of earth-blending materials such as adobe and sandstone, but the Pueblo of the Humanas at Gran Quivira National Monument was constructed from underlying Chupadera limestone. This blue-gray sedimentary rock tends to a lightness of color which also blends with the gravelly soils of the region.

Since the spectacular quality of the large San Buenaventura Mission Church and Convento is well illustrated at night, the monument proposes two evenings of public guide service for full phases of the moon, September 7 and 8, at the hours of 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 p.m.

Bring your flashlight or come as you are, and join the parade of "Missions by Moonlight" at Gran Quivira.

Although this pueblo ruin is spectacular in the daytime, as indicated in the writing of Charles Lummis, pioneer explorer and popularizer of southwestern archeology, there is an additional magic of ancientness imparted by the illumination by moonlight.

Lummis wrote, "A mile to the south, where a whaleback ridge noses the uncanny valley, stands out a strange ashen hulk that brings us back to earth. Wan and weird as it is, it he speaks the one-time presence of man, for Nature has no such squarenesses. I do not believe that the whole world can show elsewhere, nor that a Dore could dream into canvas a ghostliness so apropos. Stand upon the highest ridges to the east and it is all spread before you, a wraith in pallid stone — the absolute ghost of a city.

"Its ashen hues which seem to hover above the dead grass, felled by the sombre blotches of the junipers; its indeterminate gray hints, outspoken at last in the huge, vague shape that looms in its center; its strange dim outlines rimmed with a flat,

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FOLKLORE CORNER

ENGLE FERRY

Engle Ferry has had its day. It has been many years since the ferry at Engle, east of Truth or Consequences, transported people, horses and wagons east and west across the Rio Grande. The ferry was operated only two or three months of the year while the river was high. Travelers and freighters forded the Rio for the remainder of the year unless there were floods.

The ferry was running when one old-timer came to Sierra County in 1892. Ten years later he took over operation of the ferry and ran it until about 1912 when, by joint arrangement between the Reclamation Service and the county commissioners, a bridge was built across the river at the dam on the downstream side. The ferry probably was used more for the old-timer's freight wagons than for other purposes.

The ferry was 50 feet long and 10 feet wide. It would take six horses and two loaded wagons. Here's how the ferry was oper-

ated. A cable was stretched across the Rio Grande. There was a center block on the cable, and pulley blocks fore and aft on the ferry. If going west across the river, the pulley block aft would be loosened and the fore block tightened, turning the ferry into the current. The ferry then split the current and was propelled across the river by the current. In crossing to the east the operation was reversed.

A notice used to be posted on the ferry that people who used it did so at their own peril.

Eugene Rhodes gave Engle Ferry a permanent niche in New Mexican history with his celebrated poem. The ferry has disappeared from the scene but it will not be forgotten.

Here is Rhodes' poem on Engle Ferry, which appeared in the Saturday Evening Post August 10, 1929:

Engle Ferry is narrow and deep,
The current is strong and the banks are steep;
Teamster and horseman, they praise the Lord
For the stony footing of Engle Ford;
Scoured and cleansed of quivering sand,
The safest ford on the Rio Grande.
The patient oxen may drink their fill,
With thankful eyes on the farther hill;
Drink and lean to their yokes again,
Toiling over, with heave and strain.
To night, and rest, and the scanty sword
Of the starlit meadows by Engle Ford.
A winding road upon either hand,
Between black lava and yellow sand,
Between red water and close blue sky,
Leads to the ferry when floods are high.
Chain your wheels with a double hitch,
Skid and lurch on the last steep pitch,
Slide on the ferry and close the gates,
Block your wagons—and trust the fates!
Clouds brood low on the sultry air,
Stabbing the gorge with lightning flare;
Angry echoes from hill to hill
Mutter and clamor and threaten still;
The pulleys whine to the cable's strain—
But Engle Ferry is crossed again!
Engle Ferry is lost and gone,
Engle Ford and Ferry.
The owl hoots over Babylon,
Deep over Ur the sand is blown,
Carthage city is cown with palt,
And never again will wagons halt
At Engle Ford and Ferry.
Never again shall moon or star
Kiss the hill where the camp fire are;
Never again beneath the sun
Glance and glitter and lance and gun,
Drum and bugle and flag and sword,
And soldiers splashing through Engle Ford!
The passionless waters are deep and still
On golden mesa and dreaming hill;
Never again shall echoes call
To plunging ferry and lava wall.
Ditches may reach to the thirsty plain,
Roads may wander through fields of grain,
Valleys blossom with cities strange—
But Engle Ferry will never change!
Silence and darkness keep watch and ward
On Engle Ferry and Engle Ford.

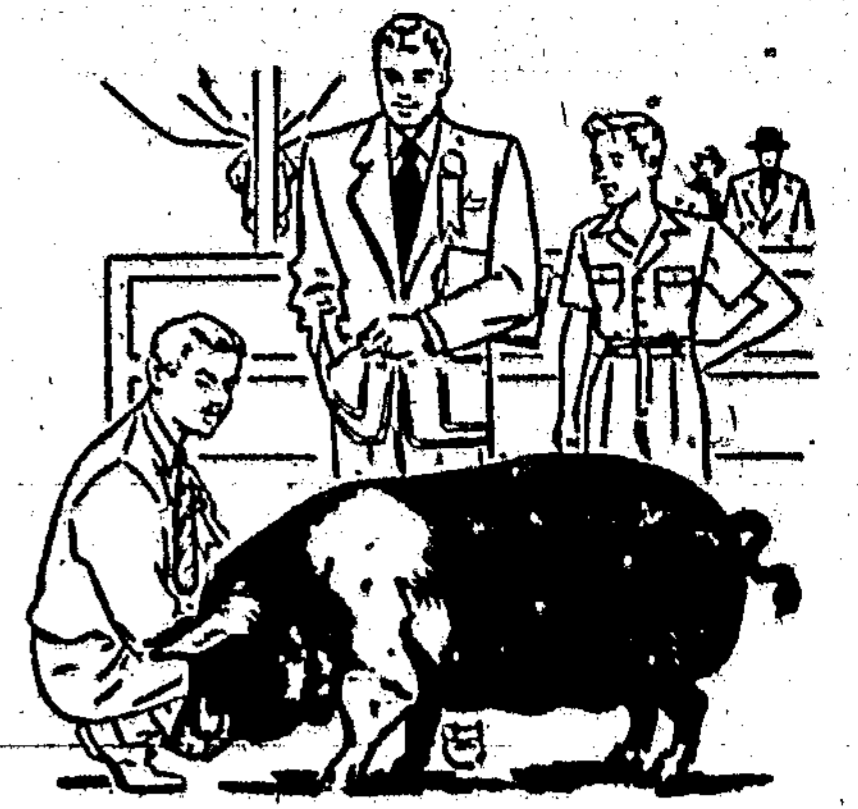

Ornamental Tree Loss Not Tax Deductible
S. E. Vidal, director of Internal Revenue for this district, this week cautioned taxpayers that no deduction may be taken on Federal income tax returns for the loss of ornamental trees on their home property resulting from disease.

Mr. Vidal explained that he was calling attention to this rule because of an article appearing recently in a national magazine which stated that a home-owner had been allowed a \$700 income tax deduction for a tree killed by "Dutch elm" disease.

Mr. Vidal pointed out that the Internal Revenue Code allows a deduction for loss of personal property only in cases where the loss results from fire, storm, shipwreck, or other casualty, or from theft.

The Internal Revenue Service holds that a deductible casualty loss is one that results from a sudden destructive force, such as fire, storm, flood, hurricane, or other similar events.

Nat'l Home Makers To Meet Sept. 8-11 at Ohio State University

The National Home Demonstration Council meeting will be held September 8-11 on the campus of Ohio State University at Columbus, Mrs. Virgil Blakley of Rogers, president of the New Mexico Association of Home Extension Clubs, announced this week. Mrs. Blakley will represent association members of New Mexico at the national meeting.

The theme of this year's meeting will be "Opportunity, Responsibility, and Achievement." "What is that in thine hand," Exodus 4:3, will provide topics for noted speakers at the 21st annual meeting.

C. M. Ferguson, administrator of the Federal Extension Service, Washington, D. C., will present the "opportunity" phase of the program. Rabbi Jerome D. Workshops have been planned for standing committee chairmen of the National Council.

The pesky cockleburs have cost Lea thousands of dollars in past years by reducing wool quality when they became imbedded in the wool. So early last spring, when cockleburs were in the six- to-eight leaf stage, Lee sprayed 15 acres of infested lake-bottom land with two pounds of the weedicide, Esteron 10-10, a 2,4-D compound, per acre. In two or three weeks, most of the cockleburs were dead—and the rest were dying. And they haven't grown back.

Lee will continue to spray each spring to control new cocklebur plants which grow from seed accumulated over the past years. He thinks his range will be entirely free of the pest within a few seasons—and his wool will be worth more than ever.

Sheepmen Urged To Guard Against Scrapie

The sheep disease scrapie is not known to exist in Lincoln County, but recent outbreaks in the midwestern, eastern and west coast areas are causing jitter among sheepmen all over the country. However, no traces of the disease so far has been found in New Mexico or adjacent states.

Teams of disease control officials are working to eradicate the disease in the infected areas.

Scrapie, a virus disease, is comparatively new to the United States. The first outbreak occurred in Canada in 1933, and it appeared in the U. S. in 1947.

The disease attacks nerve cells of the brain. Infected sheep are restless and easily excited. They may grind their teeth and show muscle tremors. The most evident symptom — and the one from which the disease derives its name — is a severe itching which causes infected sheep to rub against fences, buildings, and other objects. The disease also can be fatal. There is no known prevention or treatment for the disease.

The disease has a long incubation period—up to 42 months. Some sheep merely act as carriers and pass the disease on to their offspring.

Lincoln County sheep raisers can defend themselves against the disease by buying their replacement stock only from areas which are free of the disease—and avoiding infected flocks and areas.

Featured speaker on the program will be J. C. Hackleman, head of the Illinois Crop Improvement Association, Urbana, and Lane Wilson, executive vice-president of the Southern Seedman's Ass'n Shreveport, La.

A president, vice-president and one director will be elected during the business session. W. F. Hayner, Las Cruces, is present head of the organization.

The annual banquet for association members will be held at Town and Country, Las Cruces from 7 p.m. Dr. Robert H. Black, dean and director of the school of agriculture and home economics at A&M will be toastmaster. A dance will follow the banquet. Reservations for the banquet and dance should be made by writing or telephoning Stovall at State College (P. O. Box 41 or telephone JA 9-6511, ext. 241).

Meat Institute to Sponsor Poster Contest

Mrs. Linda Lambert, Mosquero, chairman of the New Mexico Meat Institute, announces that the group will again sponsor a meat poster contest among the state's school children. Top prize will be a scholarship to New Mexico A&M.

To assist students in getting information for their posters, the information department of New Mexico A&M College will have films and tape recordings on meat available for use in schools throughout the state. Entry forms will be available at county agent's offices or at the schools. Currently, Mrs. Lambert is appointing a committee in each county to assist in the contest. Each committee will include a livestock producer and a member of a women's extension club.

Care of Leather

simply to dampen a cloth or sponge in warm water, wring it out, then rub it over the bar of soap or the saddle soap. Rub the leather briskly. Then rub with another moist cloth without soap. Rub dry with a clean soft cloth. Any gloss which disappears will be restored by friction of the last rubbing.

The New Jersey State University specialist warns against using furniture polishes, oils or varnishes on leather because these preparations frequently contain solvents that cause leather to become sticky.

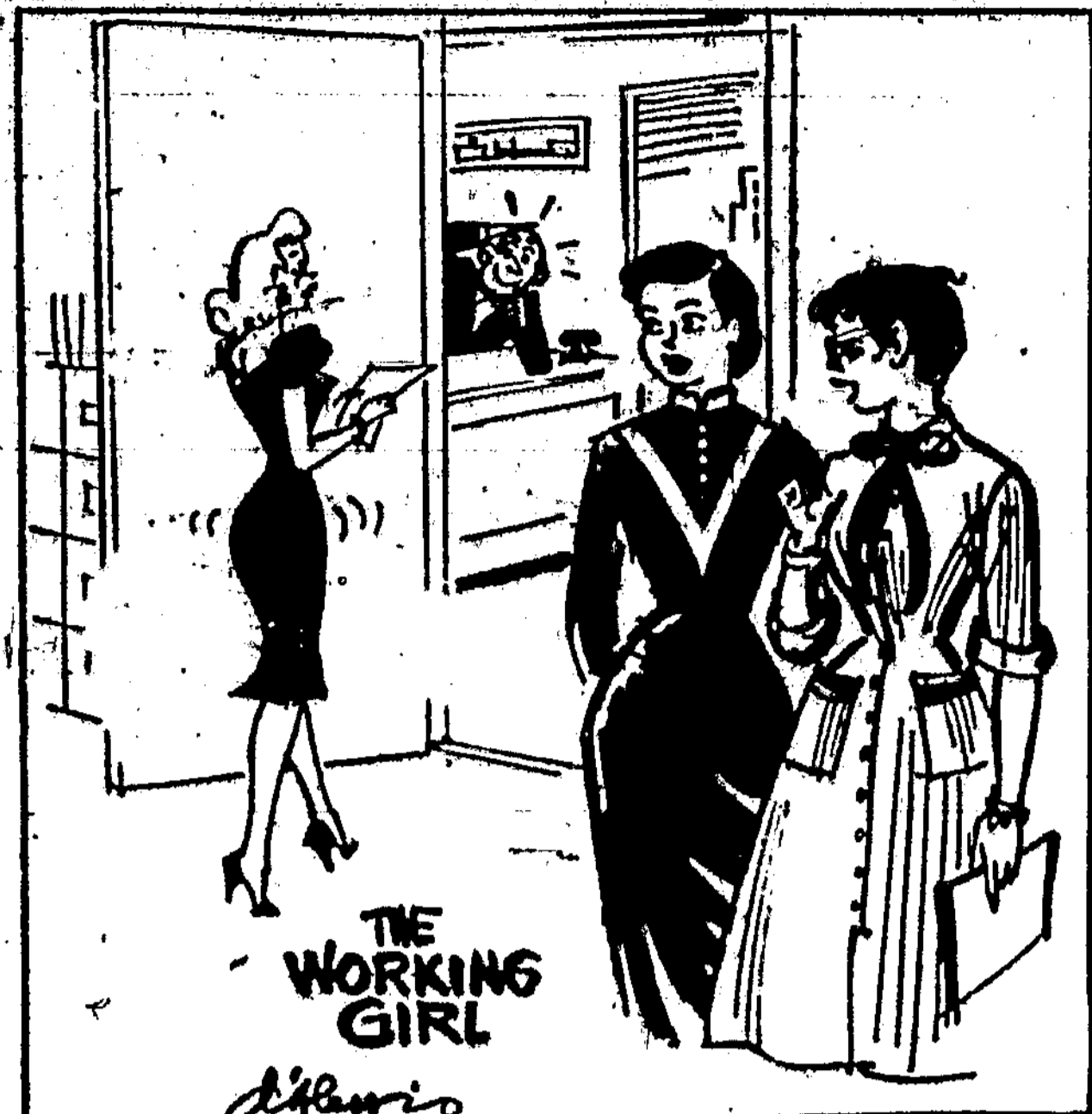

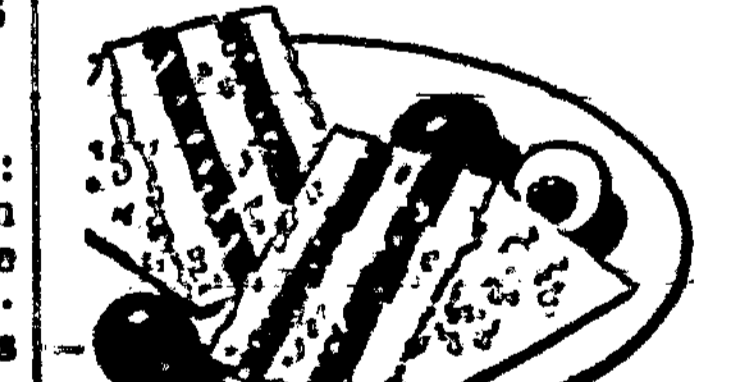
